## TOWN COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

October 07, 2025 / 250 River Circle - Alpine, WY 83128

**CALL TO ORDER** Mayor Green called the meeting to order at 7:00 PM.

**PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:** Mayor Green led the Pledge of Allegiance.

**ROLL CALL:** Clerk Chenault conducted roll call. **Present:** Mayor Green, Councilmember Larsen, Councilmember Scaffide, Councilmember Wierda, and Councilmember Burchard. A quorum was established. Also in attendance was Town Attorney James Sanderson.

**ADOPT THE AGENDA:** Councilmember Larsen made a motion to adopt the agenda. Councilmember Burchard seconded the motion. Voting Yea: Mayor Green, Councilmember Larsen, Councilmember Scaffide, Councilmember Wierda, Councilmember Burchard. Motion carried.

#### REPORTS

#### **Mayor's Report:**

Mayor Green reported that new carpet has been installed in the Town Hall and that the office staff repainted the walls, including accent colors. He expressed appreciation for their efforts, noting that the updates were long overdue and greatly improved the appearance of the building.

Mayor Green provided an update on the Semiquincentennial Committee, stating that the group has met approximately four times and is currently brainstorming ideas. He noted that several concepts are taking shape and that he will provide further updates as plans develop.

Mayor Green also mentioned that the new town signs have received positive feedback, with other municipalities expressing admiration. He stated that he is proud of the improvements and humorously added that he is somewhat envious of another town's mural, suggesting Alpine may consider a similar project in the future.

## Clerk/Treasurer Report - Monica Chenault:

Clerk Chenault reported that on September 23, she and Assistant Clerk Greenwald attended the *Safe Streets for All* kickoff meeting. The Town is currently in the early stages of drafting a Request for Proposals (RFP) for consultant services related to the Transportation Master Plan and Safe Streets Demonstration Project. The goal is to complete the draft RFP within the next week and present it to the Town Council for review and approval prior to advertising for proposals.

Clerk Chenault also provided an update on the revisions to the Utility Procedure and Utility Billing Fee Ordinances. She noted that staff, Mayor Green, and Amy have all reviewed and contributed to the revisions. The revised drafts incorporate feedback received during the recent work session. The updated ordinances are expected to be distributed to Council by October 13 for review, with the first reading anticipated on October 21, barring any significant changes. The Capacity Fee Ordinance has not been modified since the initial work session and will be presented as previously discussed.

Clerk Chenault further reported that Wade Hershey with RCPA recently completed the self-audit portion of the F-66 financial report. She finalized the remainder of the report and submitted it earlier in the day. In addition, she confirmed that the Fiscal Year 2023–2024 has been officially closed out, and the Town is now operating under Fiscal Year 2024–2025.

## **Public Works Director Report - Craig Leseberg:**

Public Works Director Leseberg reported that the Level I Master Plan is nearing completion. He spoke with Lonnie earlier in the day, who indicated that the final deliverables, including the GIS system components, should be completed within approximately ten days.

Director Leseberg noted that the Level III project remains under review within the state office, where it must pass through several divisions before a recommendation is made regarding support. Regardless of the outcome, the Town will present its case before the board in Casper on November 5.

He provided an update on the Radio Read Meter Project, stating that progress continues but at a slower pace than anticipated. The antenna installation is scheduled for October 18, after which the system will be fully operational as an Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) system. Approximately 60 meters remain to be installed, and Director Leseberg is working on a plan to complete the remaining installations.

Director Leseberg also reported that the Pre-Treatment Plant is operational, and the screw press is scheduled to be started on Thursday. He noted that several issues remain to be addressed as part of the startup process.

Lastly, Director Leseberg announced that the long-requested engine brake signs have been installed. He expressed satisfaction that the project was completed in compliance with all legal requirements and noted that the signs look great.

## Code Enforcement Officer Report - Tara Bender - Submitted in writing

#### **ACTION ITEMS**

#### **AEF Business Plan:**

Councilmember Larsen made a motion to accept the Alpine Education Foundation business plan. Councilmember Burchard seconded.

Discussion: Mayor Green stated that this item represents the final requirement necessary for the lease to become official. He noted that the Council has reviewed similar versions of the plan over the past year and a half and that the submitted version includes financial projections and related information. He acknowledged that some details, such as enrollment numbers, remain estimates but indicated that the plan fulfills the Town's expectations. Mayor Green also commended the Foundation for its recent fundraising success at the golf tournament which raised a significant amount of money for the project.

Councilmember Scaffide expressed concern that the plan appeared to include only a construction facility budget rather than an enrollment or operational budget. She noted that while the plan lists a net income figure, it does not appear to include details such as teacher salaries or other operational expenses.

Mayor Green clarified that the document represents the Alpine Education Foundation's business plan and not the charter school's governing budget. He stated that financial questions could be directed to Luke, who manages the Foundation's financial work and is available to meet with any Councilmember for further explanation.

Councilmember Scaffide inquired about site work activity at the project location, noting that it appeared construction had begun prior to the issuance of a building permit. Clerk Chenault clarified that while no building permit has been issued, Town code does not require a permit for lot grading or dirt work that is not directly related to building construction. Excavation for a foundation, however, must be performed in conjunction with an approved building permit.

No further discussion occurred.

Voting Yea: Mayor Green, Councilmember Larsen, Councilmember Wierda, Councilmember Burchard. Voting Abstain: Councilmember Scaffide. Motion carried, with all in favor except one abstention.

## 2024 Single Audit - Financial Report:

Councilmember Larsen made a motion to accept DeCoria & Company, PC 2024 Single Audit - Financial Report. Councilmember Burchard seconded.

Clerk Chenault explained that the single audit was required for Fiscal Year 2024 because the Town expended more than \$750,000 in grant funds received from the State, which originated from federal sources. She noted that entities receiving more than \$300,000 in direct federal grant funding, or \$750,000 in total federal pass-through funding, must complete a single audit.

She further explained that the Town's CPA, Wade Hirschi, does not perform single audits due to their technical complexity and the extensive review required. Only a few accounting firms in Wyoming are qualified to conduct single audits for municipalities, and DeCoria & Company, PC is one of those firms.

Councilmember Larsen added that the report identified one significant deficiency—Finding 2024-001—stating that the Town's staff size is not large enough to allow for complete segregation of duties in financial reporting. He noted that this is common among small municipalities and that the Town Council and management are aware of the condition and have made a conscious decision to accept the associated degree of risk.

No further discussion occurred.

## Resolution No. 2025-043 - Appointing Gina Corson as Planning and Zoning Administrator:

Councilmember Burchard made a motion to approve Resolution No. 2025-043 - Appointing Gina Corson as Planning and Zoning Administrator. Councilmember Larsen seconded.

Mayor Green stated that when Ms. Corson was hired as Acting Planning and Zoning Administrator, she was placed on a 90-day probationary period. He noted that Ms. Corson has performed exceptionally well during that time and has demonstrated that she is the right person to assume the position permanently. Mayor Green commended her work and stated that many residents will have the opportunity to interact with her through various permitting processes.

No further discussion occurred.

Voting Yea: Mayor Green, Councilmember Larsen, Councilmember Scaffide, Councilmember Wierda, Councilmember Burchard. Motion carried.

## Resolution No. 2025-044 - A Resolution Authorizing The Opening Of A Bank Account For Escrow Funds With First Bank of Wyoming:

Councilmember Burchard made a motion to Resolution No. 2025-044 - A Resolution Authorizing The Opening Of A Bank Account For Escrow Funds With First Bank of Wyoming. Councilmember Larsen seconded.

Mayor Green requested that Clerk and Treasurer Chenault provide an overview of the purpose of the new account. Clerk Chenault explained that the establishment of a separate escrow account is both an accounting best practice and a statutory requirement. Funds accepted by the Town as deposits from outside parties must be maintained separately from all other Town funds.

She noted that the account will hold security deposits from individuals renting Town property, as well as deposits collected for annexations and development-related fees. Clerk Chenault confirmed that the account will be non–interest-bearing, following guidance from both the Town Attorney and CPA, to prevent any obligation for the Town to pay interest upon refunding deposits.

No further discussion occurred.

## Resolution No. 2025-042 - Appointing Councilmember Jeremy Larsen To The Employee Policy & Procedure Committee Effective October 7, 2025:

Councilmember Burchard made a motion to Resolution No. 2025-042 - Appointing Councilmember Jeremy Larsen To The Employee Policy & Procedure Committee Effective October 7, 2025. Councilmember Wierda seconded.

Clerk Chenault provided background information on the committee, noting that it was established in December 2023 by resolution to allow three Councilmembers and the Clerk to meet as an official committee. The committee was created to facilitate discussions regarding employee policies, procedures, and related issues without creating a quorum of the full Council. She explained that the Clerk, rather than the Mayor, calls committee meetings and that the committee's role is advisory—making recommendations to the Mayor and Council but not taking official action or making spending decisions.

Mayor Green stated that Councilmember Larsen was being nominated due to his seniority on the Council and prior experience serving as the employee liaison. He noted that this appointment would fill the current vacancy through the end of the year, with all committee appointments to be re-evaluated in January.

Councilmember Scaffide questioned whether the committee remained necessary now that the employee handbook has been completed and expressed a preference for limiting the committee to two Councilmembers. She also suggested that broader management perspectives, such as from Public Works Director Leseberg, could be valuable.

Mayor Green responded that the committee continues to play an important role in addressing employee issues and serves as a forum for collaboration and guidance. He added that employee matters are discussed regularly during the Town's weekly management meetings, which include the Clerk and Councilmember Burchard, ensuring coordination on personnel-related topics.

No further discussion occurred.

Voting Yea: Mayor Green, Councilmember Wierda, Councilmember Burchard. Voting Abstain: Councilmember Larsen. Voting Nay: Councilmember Scaffide. Motion carried.

Resolution No. 2025-045 - A Resolution Recommending The Appointment Of Riley Hovorka To The Alpine Education Foundation Board As The Representative Of The Alpine Town Council:

Councilmember Larsen made a motion to Resolution No. 2025-045 - A Resolution Recommending The Appointment Of Riley Hovorka To The Alpine Education Foundation Board As The Representative Of The Alpine Town Council. Councilmember Burchard seconded.

Mayor Green explained that this position was established in the lease agreement for the charter school, which grants the Town Council the authority to appoint a community member to serve on the Alpine Education Foundation Board. He stated that Councilmember Wierda brought forward the recommendation of Riley Hovorka, whom he recently met and found to be highly qualified.

Mayor Green noted that Ms. Hovorka serves as the Town Clerk for the Town of Jackson and holds a master's degree in public administration. She has lived in Alpine for approximately four years and expressed a strong interest in becoming more involved in the community. Mayor Green commented that Ms. Hovorka was enthusiastic about the opportunity to serve in this

capacity and felt it would be a meaningful way to contribute to the town. The appointment would run through the end of the year, with future participation to be re-evaluated in January.

Councilmember Scaffide expressed concern that a public notice had not been issued for the position and stated that she had believed the appointment was intended to be filled by a Councilmember rather than a community member. Mayor Green clarified that the position could be filled by any community member and that no other candidates had been brought forward. He added that the Alpine Education Foundation must also ratify the appointment, which provides an additional level of review to ensure the selected representative is a good fit for the board.

No further discussion occurred.

Voting Yea: Mayor Green, Councilmember Larsen, Councilmember Wierda, Councilmember Burchard. Voting Abstain: Councilmember Scaffide. Motion carried.

Resolution No. 2025-046 - A Resolution Of The Town Council Of The Town Of Alpine, Wyoming, Recommending That The Lincoln County Commission Provide Live Streaming Of Commission Meetings For The Benefit Of The Public:

Councilmember Larsen made a motion Resolution No. 2025-046 - A Resolution Of The Town Council Of The Town Of Alpine, Wyoming, Recommending That The Lincoln County Commission Provide Live Streaming Of Commission Meetings For The Benefit Of The Public. Councilmember Scaffide seconded.

Mayor Green provided background on the resolution, noting that the topic of encouraging the Lincoln County Commission to live stream its meetings has been discussed multiple times over the past two years. He explained that commission meetings are held in Kemmerer on the first and third Tuesdays of each month, which makes in-person attendance challenging for residents of Alpine due to the two-hour drive. While the county currently allows participation through a limited virtual option in Afton, the Mayor emphasized that a public live stream would promote transparency, accountability, and accessibility. He added that the Town of Alpine's own success with live streaming meetings demonstrates the value of this practice and expressed appreciation that the resolution had been shared with other municipalities in the county.

Councilmember Scaffide expressed strong support for the resolution, stating that it reflects modern standards of accessibility and transparency. She shared that she and other Town representatives have raised the issue with the County Commission's Chief of Staff several times without much progress. Councilmember Scaffide emphasized that providing live streams is not only feasible with today's technology but also essential for residents across the large geographic area of Lincoln County who are unable to attend meetings in person. She added that this effort should extend beyond County Commission meetings to include the County Planning and Zoning Commission, as many county-level decisions directly affect municipalities.

Mayor Green noted that copies of the resolution were sent to all eight other municipalities in Lincoln County, and several towns had expressed interest in adopting similar resolutions.

Clerk Chenault confirmed that if approved, the resolution would be signed and forwarded to the Lincoln County Commission accompanied by a formal cover letter from the Town.

No further discussion occurred.

Voting Yea: Mayor Green, Councilmember Larsen, Councilmember Scaffide, Councilmember Wierda, Councilmember Burchard. Motion carried.

#### GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT

• Patricia McQuade, Town of Alpine resident, addressed the Council regarding the Alpine Education Foundation Business Plan. She stated that after reviewing the plan, she was hoping to see additional financial detail. Ms. McQuade referenced pledged contributions noted from the Ferst Foundation and the Daniels Fund and questioned the timing of when those funds would be received, noting that the Daniels Fund typically does not allocate funding until a school is officially open.

She expressed concern that the plan lacked itemized cost details related to preparing the school site, including expenses for relocating the modular buildings, site work, water and sewer connections, and retrofitting requirements such as overhang adjustments. Ms. McQuade reiterated her ongoing concerns about the project's financial transparency and requested further information on student enrollment commitments, noting that a minimum of 100 students is required for operation and that enrollment projections remain uncertain.

• **Councilmember Burchard** recognized and congratulated Mr. Dan Dockstader for his 40 years of service with the *Star Valley Independent*. She expressed appreciation for his long-standing contributions to the community and his leadership in transitioning the publication into digital media.

Mayor Green and other Councilmembers joined in congratulating Mr. Dockstader and thanked him for his continued dedication to providing local news coverage. Council members commended the *Star Valley Independent* team for their outstanding coverage of local sports, noting the value it brings to families who are unable to attend games in person. Councilmember Burchard highlighted how meaningful it is for parents to watch their children compete through the paper's live coverage of volleyball, football, and other events, especially during state tournaments.

The Council also acknowledged the paper's growth and success in broadcasting statewide athletic events across multiple divisions, as well as the professional development of its staff, including former team members who have advanced into collegiate media roles.

Mayor Green and the Council collectively thanked Mr. Dockstader for his decades of service and contributions to the Star Valley community.

• Anessa Melnik, Alpine resident, addressed the Council regarding concerns about potential lighting impacts associated with the proposed charter school development. She stated that the area currently maintains dark skies and expressed concern that new parking lot lighting could disrupt the visibility of the night sky and affect neighboring properties. Ms. Melnik asked whether the planned lighting would comply with dark-sky standards, including motion sensors or dimming capabilities during nighttime hours.

Mayor Green responded that the Town has consistently encouraged the project developers to consider dark-sky preservation in their lighting plans. He noted that the Town recommended they implement lighting similar to that used at the Lincoln County Library, which adjusts brightness based on motion detection—brightening when activity occurs and dimming to approximately 25% when inactive.

Councilmember Larsen added that the Town of Alpine has existing ordinances regulating exterior lighting, including downward-facing fixtures and lumen limitations, which the project must comply with.

Mayor Green encouraged Ms. Melnik to contact the Clerk's Office to share her interest and ideas for a potential Dark Sky initiative.

### **EXECUTIVE SESSION**

Councilmember Larsen made a motion to enter Executive Session to discuss legal matters. Councilmember Burchard seconded. Voting Yea: Mayor Green, Councilmember Larsen, Councilmember Scaffide, Councilmember Wierda, Councilmember Burchard. The Council entered Executive Session at 7:42 p.m.

Councilmember Larsen made a motion to exit Executive Session and reconvened the regular meeting at 8:26 p.m. Councilmember Burchard seconded. Voting Yea: Mayor Green, Councilmember Larsen, Councilmember Scaffide, Councilmember Wierda, Councilmember Burchard.

#### ADJOURNMENT

Councilmember Larsen made a motion to adjourn. Councilmember Burchard seconded the motion. Voting Yea: Mayor Green, Councilmember Larsen, Councilmember Scaffide, Councilmember Wierda, Councilmember Burchard. Motion carried. Meeting adjourned at 8:27 p.m.

#### 3. TONIGHT'S APPOINTMENTS/ NEW BUSINESS:

a. Reynolds, Daniel, and Patricia-469 Greys River Loop Lot #12 Greys River Village #1- Minor Construction (MC-0825-002)- Deck repair

The existing deck currently extends beyond the minimum setback requirements established by the current Land Use Development Code (LUDC). Under the LUDC, when a structure is modified, it is generally required to be brought into full compliance with all current codes.

However, another section of the LUDC provides that "an existing nonconforming structure may be enlarged or expanded an accumulative amount of twenty (20) percent of the existing structure. However, no enlargement or expansion may encroach any further into setbacks than the existing structure encroaches."

As a result, this project appears to fall into a conflict or overlap between two provisions:

The requirement to bring modified structures into compliance with current standards, and

The allowance for limited expansion (up to 20%) of existing nonconforming structures without increasing the degree of nonconformity.

This creates uncertainty regarding which provision governs in this specific case, and clarification or interpretation may be needed to determine whether the proposed work qualifies as a permitted expansion of a nonconforming structure or if full compliance with current setbacks is required.

Staff clarified that the checklist is intended to be a working document to assist Planning & Zoning members in reviewing applications for compliance with Town codes. The checklist is not a finalized document or ordinance but a procedural tool to streamline plan reviews. The checklist should make it easier for reviewers to confirm that submittals are complete and compliant before meetings.

There was discussion about whether separate checklists should be developed for R-1 single-family and R-2/multifamily or commercial projects; members agreed that one checklist may suffice if non-applicable items can be marked "N/A."

Members agreed the checklist should include clear definitions, particularly for "site plan" requirements, including utilities, access, and snow storage locations.

Traffic study requirements may be listed as "if applicable" depending on project type.

The group agreed that the document is still under development and should be reviewed individually and brought back for discussion at the next meeting.

- 2.) Implementation of cutoff dates for application materials was recommended (approximately two and a half weeks before the meeting for residential projects and earlier for commercial projects).
- 3.) Additional discussion followed regarding the potential need for an ordinance requiring trash receptacles or dumpsters for active construction projects. Members noted differing opinions on whether such a requirement should apply to all building permits or only new construction. Consensus was reached to place the item on a future agenda for formal discussion and possible recommendation to Town Council.

#### ADDENDUM TO LEASE AGREEMENT

This Addendum ("Addendum") is made and entered into this \_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_\_, 2025, by and between the TOWN OF ALPINE, a Wyoming municipality ("Landlord"), and GET DOWN LLC, d/b/a Melvin Brewing Company, a Wyoming limited liability company ("Tenant").

This Addendum modifies that certain Lease Agreement dated October 6, 2025 (the "Lease") by and between Landlord and Tenant, concerning the property described in the Lease. Except as specifically modified herein, all other terms and conditions of the Lease shall remain in full force and effect.

## 1. Commencement of Rent Payments

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in the Lease, the Commencement Date for rent payments shall begin upon completion of construction of the Melvin Branded sign and related improvements ("Construction Completion Date"), as determined by issuance of a final inspection approval or other written confirmation by the Town of Alpine.

Tenant shall not be required to make monthly rent payments until the Construction Completion Date. Thereafter, Tenant shall begin paying rent in accordance with the terms of the section titled "RENT" of the Lease, beginning on the first day of the month following the Construction Completion Date.

#### 2. Renewal Term

Section titled "EXTENSION OF TERM OF LEASE" is hereby replaced in its entirety with the following:

#### **EXTENSION OF TERM OF LEASE:**

Upon expiration of the initial five (5) year term, Tenant shall have the option to renew this Lease for one (1) additional term of five (5) years (the "Renewal Term"), upon the same terms and conditions set forth in the Lease, except that rent may be renegotiated by mutual agreement between Landlord and Tenant prior to commencement of the Renewal Term.

Tenant shall provide written notice of its intent to exercise this renewal option to Landlord no later than ninety (90) days prior to the expiration of the initial term.

#### 3. Effect of Addendum

All other provisions of the Lease not expressly amended by this Addendum shall remain in full force and effect. In the event of a conflict between this Addendum and the Lease, the provisions of this Addendum shall control.

I received the letter about Melvin's request for signage. I fully support businesses wanting to improve access to their business and drive more traffic. And, I love Melvin and that it is in Alpine.

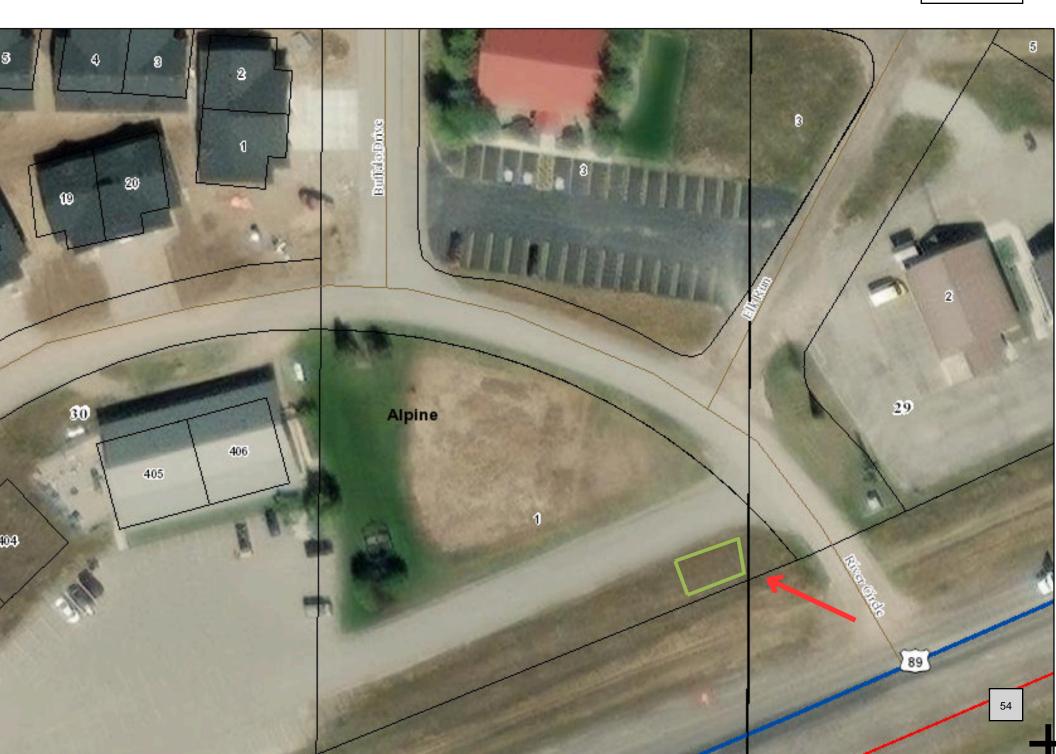

Box 3070, Alpine, Wyoming 83128 ("Landlord"), and the GET DOWN LLC, DBA MELVIN BREWING COMPANY, a Wyoming corporation, 624 County Rd 101, Alpine, Wyoming 83128 ("Tenant"); (Landlord and Tenant are sometimes individually referred to as a "Party" and collectively referred to as the "Parties").

WITNESSETH, that Landlord does by these presents lease to Tenant, and Tenant does by these Property Lease and accept from Landlord, the following described property, consisting of space on the Town of Alpine's land, adjacent to the highway, for the installation of a Melvin Branded sign with opportunity to expand the sign to include future businesses at the Town of Alpine's benefit.

That real property depicted in 'Exhibit A: Melvin Sign Lease Area,' attached hereto, which includes approximately 793.4 square feet of land located on the Town of Alpine's property.

Subject to all covenants, conditions, restrictions, easements, reservations, and rights-of-way, whether of record or by sight. An encroachment permit from the Town of Alpine will be required for extending power to the sign, which will be handled under a separate agreement.

Lease of the Property is subject to the following terms and conditions, to-wit:

- 1. **LEASE TERM:** This Lease is for the term of five (5) years, commencing on the effective date of the Signage Permit issued by the Town of Alpine, Wyoming (the "Commencement Date"), and ending five (5) years from the date of the Building Permit (the "Expiration Date"), both dates inclusive, unless sooner terminated as herein provided (the "Lease Term").
- 2. **RENT:** This Lease is made for and in consideration of, and Tenant agrees to pay to Landlord rent as follows: Rent in the amount of Four Thousand Two Hundred dollars (\$4,200) per year is payable in lawful money of the United States, payments to be made monthly at the rate of Three Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$350) per month. The first such payment shall be due on the execution of this Lease, and subsequent payments shall be due on the 1st day of each month following. All rental payments shall be payable to and mailed to Landlord at the address provided herein, or such other place as Landlord may designate. in writing.
- 3. **SECURITY DEPOSIT:** No security deposit is required from the Tenant for this Lease.
- 4. **CONDITION OF PROPERTY:** At the Commencement Date, Tenant shall accept the Property AS IS, in its existing condition. No representation, statement, or warranty, expressed or implied, has been made by or on behalf of Landlord as to such condition, or as to the use that may

be made of such property. In no event shall Landlord be liable for any defect in such property or for any limitation on its use.

- 5. **LEGAL FEES AND EXPENSES:** Tenant shall pay and indemnify Landlord against all legal costs and charges, including legal fees lawfully and reasonably incurred, in obtaining possession of the Property after a default of Tenant, or after Tenant's default in surrendering possession upon the expiration or earlier termination of the term of this lease, or by Landlord's enforcement of any covenants contained in this Lease.
- 6. **TENANT'S USES:** Tenant may only use and occupy the Property for its branding sign placement and for no other purpose or purposes unless written consent has been approved by Landlord prior to the commencement of any other use.

Tenant shall not commit, nor suffer to be committed, any nuisance or other act or thing against public policy, or which may disturb the quiet enjoyment of anyone adjacent to the Property. Tenant agrees not to deface or damage the Property in any manner.

- 7. COVENANT OF QUIET ENJOYMENT: Tenant, upon payment of the rent herein reserved and upon performance of all the covenants of this Lease, shall at all times during this Lease term peaceably and quietly enjoy the Property without disturbance from Landlord or from any other person claiming through Landlord.
- 8. **COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS AND REGULATIONS:** In connection with its use and improvement of the Property pursuant to the terms of this Lease, Tenant, at Tenant's sole expense, shall comply with all applicable laws, orders, and regulation of Federal, State, and Municipal authorities, and with any direction of any public officer pursuant to the law.
- 9. **SURRENDER UPON TERMINATION:** On or before the Expiration Date, Tenant shall surrender the Property in as good condition as it was at the beginning of the term, reasonable wear and tear and damages by the elements excepted.

No later than one hundred twenty (120) days after Termination of the Lease, Tenant, at its cost, shall remove all building and/or structures from the Property.

10. **ALTERATIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS:** Tenant shall not commence any alterations, additions, or improvements to the Property until the plans therefore have been reviewed and approved in writing by Landlord.

Any such alterations, additions, or improvements made by Tenant shall become the property of Landlord upon the Expiration Date or other sooner termination of this Lease.

Tenant shall keep the Property free and clear of all liens arising out of or claimed by reason of any work performed, materials furnished, or obligations incurred by or at the instance of Tenant, and shall indemnify and save Landlord and the Property harmless of all such liens or claims of lien and all attorney's fees and other costs and expenses incurred by reason thereof.

- 11. **UTILITIES:** Tenant shall pay all charges for the installation and / or connection of utility services that may be required for Tenant's use of the Property. Tenant shall be responsible for all utility charges in connection with Tenant's use of the Property, including electricity charges and telephone charges, water and sewer fees, and trash removal fees.
- 12. **REPAIRS AND MAINTENANCE:** Tenant shall, at Tenant's sole expense, keep the Property in at least as good order and repair as it is at the time of the commencement of this Lease, reasonable wear and tear and damage by accidental fire or other casualty excepted. Tenant shall be responsible for ordinary and routine repair and maintenance of the Property, including but not limited to any and all alterations, improvements, and additions placed or installed by Tenant in or on the Property with the consent of the Landlord.

Tenant shall give Landlord prompt written notice of any accident to, or any defects in, the Property that may come to Tenant's notice, and shall first obtain the written consent of Landlord prior to making any substantial repairs or alterations to the Property.

Tenant shall be solely responsible for all costs associated with construction, operation, repair, and maintenance of the Property and all improvements located thereon for the duration of the Lease. Landlord shall have no obligation whatsoever for costs related to construction, repair, upkeep, or operation of the charter school or any related activities.

13. **TERMINATION UPON DEFAULT:** If any one or more events of default occurs, then Landlord has the right, at Landlord's election: (i) to give Tenant written notice of Landlord's intention to terminate this Lease on the earliest date permitted by law or on any later date specified in such notice, in which case Tenant's right to possession of the Property will cease and this Lease will be terminated, except as to Tenant's liability, as if the expiration of the term fixed in such notice were the end of the term; (ii) without further demand or notice, to reenter and take possession of the Property or any part of the Property, repossess the same, expel Tenant and those claiming through or under Tenant, and remove the effects of both or either, using such force for such purposes as may be necessary, without being liable for prosecution, without being deemed guilty of any manner of trespass, and without prejudice to any remedies for arrears of rent or other amounts payable under this Lease or as a result of any preceding breach of covenants or conditions; or (iii) without further demand or notice to cure any event of default and to charge Tenant for the cost of effecting such cure, including without limitation reasonable attorneys' fees, provided that Landlord will have no obligation to cure any such event of default of Tenant.

If this Lease is terminated on account of the occurrence of an event of default, Tenant will remain liable to Landlord for damages in an amount equal to rent and other amounts that would have been owing by Tenant for the balance of the term, had this Lease not been terminated, less the net proceeds, if any, of any re-letting of the Property by Landlord subsequent to such termination, after deducting all of Landlord's expenses in connection with such re-letting.

Each of the following shall be deemed an "event of default" under this Lease: (i) Tenant defaults in the due and punctual payment of rent, and such default continues for fifteen (15) days after written notice from Landlord; however, Tenant will not be entitled to more than one (1) written notice for monetary default, and if after such written notice any rent is not paid when due, an event of default will be considered to have occurred without further notice; (ii) Tenant permanently vacates or abandons the Property; (iii) this Lease or the Property or any part of the Property are taken upon execution or by other process of law directed against Tenant, or are taken upon or subject to any attachment by any creditor of Tenant or claimant against Tenant, and said attachment is not discharged or disposed of within sixty (60) days after its levy; (iv) Tenant files a petition in bankruptcy or insolvency or for reorganization or arrangement under the bankruptcy laws of the United States or under any insolvency act of any state, or admits the material allegations of any such petition by answer or otherwise, or is dissolved or makes an assignment for the benefit of creditors; (v) involuntary proceedings under any such bankruptcy law or insolvency act or for the dissolution of Tenant are instituted against Tenant, or a receiver or trustee is appointed for all or substantially all of the property of Tenant, and such proceeding is not dismissed or such receivership or trusteeship vacated within sixty (60) days after such institution or appointment; or (vi) Tenant breaches any of the other agreements, terms, covenants, and such breach continues for a period of thirty (30) days after written notice from Landlord to Tenant or, if such breach cannot be cured reasonably within such 30-day period, if Tenant fails to diligently commence to cure such breach within thirty (30) days after written notice from Landlord and to complete such cure within a reasonable time thereafter.

Upon termination for default, as contained in this Paragraph, the Tenant shall remove from the Property all buildings and/or structures within one hundred twenty (120) days of the issuance of a *Notice of Termination Upon Default*. Tenant, or in the event of insolvency of the Tenant, any creditor or bankruptcy trustee, or assignee of any obligation due by the Tenant, shall pay all costs associated with removal of all building and/or structures.

14. **INSURANCE:** Tenant shall maintain general liability insurance on the Property with limits of coverage as defined in the Wyoming Governmental Claims Act.

Tenant agrees that Tenant shall immediately notify and thereafter cause a full and complete report to be made to, Landlord of any and all injuries and accidents that occur in or the Property.

Each Party agrees to waive subrogation rights against the other Party to the extent of insurance coverage.

15. **INDEMNIFICATION:** Tenant shall indemnify and hold harmless Landlord from any and all claims, damages, liabilities, or expenses arising out of any injury to persons or damage to property occurring on or about the Property or in connection with Tenant's use thereof, except to the extent caused by Landlord's willful misconduct.

- 16. **WAIVER OF BREACH:** No waiver of any breach of any term of this Lease shall be effective unless in writing, and any such waiver shall not bar the rights of Landlord or Tenant to declare a default under this Lease for any subsequent breach of any such term at any time thereafter.
- 17. **NEGATIVE COVENANTS OF THE TENANT:** Tenant covenants that Tenant will not do any of the following:
- A. Fail to observe a standard of reasonable care with regard to the repair, operation, and maintenance of the Property so as to create or fail to abate any situation which possesses a risk of injury to any person reasonably expected to come upon the Property, or to do or suffer to be done, anything objectionable to fire or other insurance companies which would cause those policies to be voided or suspended, or to cause the Property to be rated as a more hazardous risk than at the date when Tenant receives possession of the Property.
- B. Commit, or suffer to be committed by any person, any waste or nuisance upon the Property.
- **ASSIGNMENT:** Landlord hereby agrees that Tenant may lease the Property to Get Down 18. LLC DBA Melvin Brewing Company, a Wyoming corporation, for sign installation and operation. Tenant shall not otherwise assign, mortgage, hypothecate, or otherwise encumber this Lease or any interest therein, nor sublet or permit the Property or any part thereof to be used by any other person or persons other than Tenant without the written consent of Landlord in each instance. Landlord shall have discretion as to approval of any proposed transferees or assignees. If this Lease is assigned, or if the Property or any part thereof is sublet or occupied by anyone other than Tenant, Landlord may, after a default by Tenant, collect rent from the assignee, subtenant, or occupant, and apply the net amount collected to the rent herein specified. No such assignment, sublet, occupancy, or collection shall be deemed a waiver of this covenant, or the acceptance of the assignees, subtenant, or occupant as tenant, or a release of Tenant from the further performance by Tenant of the covenants of this Lease. Upon any such assignment, subletting, or occupancy without Landlord's written consent, Landlord may elect to consider this Lease void and terminated. The consent by Landlord to an assignment or subletting shall not be construed as releasing Tenant from obtaining Landlord's consent in writing to any further assignment or subletting.
- 19. **NOTICES:** All notices, demands, or other writings provided to be given, made, or sent in this Agreement by either Party hereto to the other shall be deemed to have been fully given, made, or sent when made in writing and deposited in the United States mail, certified or registered mail, postage prepaid, and addressed to the addresses specified above or as may be designated by either Party from time to time in writing in the same manner as provided herein.
- 21. **BINDING EFFECT:** This Lease shall extend to and be binding upon heirs, executors, administrators, successors, and assigns of Landlord and Tenant, and wherever reference is made to either Landlord or Tenant, it shall be held to include and apply also to the heirs, successors, executors, administrators and assigns of such Party.

22. GOVERNING LAW AND VENUE.

This Lease shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Wyoming. Any legal action or proceeding brought by either Party arising out of or relating to this Lease shall be brought exclusively in the Third Judicial District Court in Lincoln County, Wyoming.

- 23. **ENTIRE AGREEMENT:** This Lease contains the entire agreement between the Parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and cannot be changed or terminated orally, but only by an agreement in writing, signed by the Party against whom enforcement of any waiver, change, modification, or discharge is sought.
- 24. **CONSTRUCTION OF THIS LEASE.** The language in all parts of this Lease shall in all cases be construed as a whole according to its fair market meaning and not strictly for nor against either Landlord or Tenant. Paragraph headings in this Lease are for convenience only and are not to be construed as a part of this Lease or in any way defining, limiting, or amplifying the provisions hereof. The words "Landlord" and "Tenant" as used herein shall include the plural as well as the singular, as appropriate. Landlord and Tenant hereby agree that in the event any term, covenant, or condition herein is held to be invalid or void by any court of competent jurisdiction, the invalidity of any such term, covenant, or condition shall in no way affect any other term, covenant, or condition herein.
- 25. **TIME OF ESSENCE:** Time is of the essence in this Lease.
- 26. **SOVEREIGN IMMUNITY APPLICABLE.** Both Parties reserve all sovereign immunity applicable specifically retain immunity and all defenses available pursuant to Wyo. Stat. Ann. § 1-39-104 and all other applicable Wyoming laws.
- 27. **REASONABLE CONSENT.** Landlord agrees not to unreasonably withhold Landlord's approval or consent to any act of Tenant where such approval or consent is required by the terms of this Lease.
- 28. THIRD-PARTY BENEFICIARY RIGHTS. The Parties do not intend to create in any other individual or entity the status of third-party beneficiary, and this Lease shall not be construed so as to create such status. The rights, duties and obligations contained in this Lease shall operate only between the Parties to this Lease, and shall inure solely to the benefit of the Parties to this Lease. The provisions of this Lease are intended only to assist the Parties in determining and performing their obligations under this Lease. The Parties to this Lease intend and expressly agree that only Parties signatory to this Lease shall have any legal or equitable right to seek to enforce this Lease, to seek any remedy arising out of a Party's performance or failure to perform any term or condition of this Lease, or to bring an action for the breach of this Lease.
- 29. **EXTENTION OF TERM OF LEASE:** This Lease will automatically be extended for a period of five (5) calendar years.

## **Town of Alpine – Staff Compliance Review Report**

Project: Get Down LLC DBA Melvins Brewing Company – Special Use Permit

Location: 624 County Road 101

Zoning District: Public and Community Facilities (PCF)

Reference Ordinance: Ordinance No. 2025-004 – Special Use Permits

## 1. Purpose of Review

This report evaluates the compliance of Get Down LLC DBA Melvin Brewing Company, Special Use Permit (SUP) application and application materials with the criteria for approval outlined in Section 6 of Ordinance No. 2025-004. The analysis is based on the submitted application package (dated June 20, 2025), the accompanying project narrative and conceptual exhibits, and the adopted land-use and zoning framework for the PFC District.

## 2. Compliance with Section 6 Criteria

## a. Compatibility with Zoning

The site lies within the Public and Community Facilities (PCF) zoning district. Off-premise commercial signage is not ordinarily permitted in this zone; however, LUDC §4-803(h)(5) allows such signage under an approved Special Use Permit when consistent with Town policy and surrounding land uses. The Town's executed lease agreement and authorization letter provide the necessary legal and policy basis for this installation Finding: Complies.

#### b. Impact on Public Health and Safety

The directional sign will improve safety and traffic flow by preventing brewery-bound traffic—including delivery trucks and visitors—from entering residential streets. WYDOT review confirmed that the sign's proposed height, placement, and lighting meet visibility and highway-safety standards. No adverse effects on water, sewer, or emergency services are anticipated.

Finding: Complies.

#### c. Environmental Impact



The leased area is within previously disturbed right-of-way land and poses **no significant environmental risks**. There are no wetlands or sensitive features within the vicinity. The applicant reported no adverse effects on air or water quality, noise, or wildlife habitat. Finding: Complies.

#### d. Traffic and Access

The purpose of the signage is to **reduce unintended traffic circulation** in residential neighborhoods by clearly directing commercial and customer vehicles to appropriate routes. Access to the leased parcel will be limited to installation and maintenance; no new driveways or parking areas are proposed. WYDOT coordination ensures sight distances and access along U.S. 89 remain safe.

Finding: Complies, subject to WYDOT review.

f. Consistency with Community Character

## e. Mitigation of Negative Effects

The sign's illumination is internally contained, minimizing light spillover. Landscaping will be installed and maintained at the sign base, as required by **LUDC §4-803(c)(5)**, to soften visual impact and integrate the sign into the corridor environment. The proposed design avoids visual clutter and aligns with Town design guidelines. Finding: Complies

The design incorporates materials and aesthetics consistent with Alpine's branding and the U.S. 89 commercial corridor. The Town's 2006 Comprehensive Plan emphasizes wayfinding and coordinated signage; this proposal advances those goals by improving orientation for visitors and supporting local tourism.

Finding: Complies.

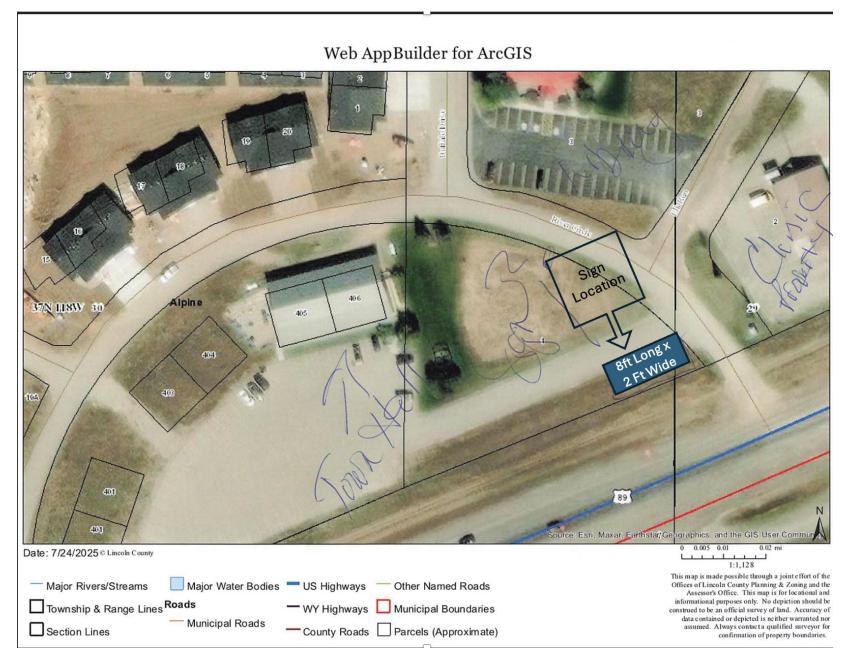

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# Wyoming Department of Transportation **Outdoor Advertising**

#### **CHAPTER 16**

### Section I. Authority and Purpose.

The Wyoming Department of Transportation, pursuant to W.S. 24-10-105 is authorized to promulgate rules governing outdoor advertising along the interstate, national, and former primary highway systems.

#### Section 2. **Definitions.**

The following words or terms when used shall have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

- (a) "Abandoned sign" means a sign that is obliterated, displays an obsolete advertising message, or is in need of repair for 9 continuous months.
- (b) "Back-to-back sign" means a sign with 2 display surfaces mounted on a single structure with the display surfaces visible to traffic from opposite directions of travel. (See Figure 1.)
- (c) "Blank sign" means a sign structure having no panel or face, or whose panel or face is not covered at least 50 percent in area by an advertising message for 9 continuous months. If the sign structure has multiple display surfaces, a blank sign means a sign with either surface having an advertising message covering less than 50 percent of its area.
- (d) "Blinking" means a form of flashing in which the pattern of sudden illumination changes occurs with more than 2 on-off cycles per second.
- (e) "Commercial or industrial activities" means those activities generally recognized as commercial or industrial by zoning authorities in this state, except that none of the following shall be considered commercial or industrial activities:
  - (i) Outdoor advertising structures;
- (ii) Agricultural, forestry, grazing, farming, and related activities including wayside fresh produce stands;
- (iii) Seasonal activities, or activities not conducted an average of at least 30 hours per week or at least 5 days a week;

- (iv) Activities not visible from the main-traveled way;
- (v) Activities conducted in a building principally used as a residence;
- (vi) Railroad tracks and minor sidings unless abutting land on at least one side of the tracks is classified as a zoned or an unzoned commercial or industrial area:
- (vii) Mineral extraction in the form of oil wells, pumping stations, transfer stations, storage tanks, and so forth;
  - (viii) Activities located more than 660 feet from the highway right-of-way;
- (ix) Mobile home parks consisting primarily of blocked and skirted mobile homes;
  - (x) Activities that violate state or local law, ordinances, or covenants.
- (f) "Commercial or industrial zone" means those areas reserved for business, commerce, or trade pursuant to comprehensive local zoning ordinances or regulations, or enabling state legislation, including highway service areas in which the primary use of the land is reserved for commercial and roadside services other than outdoor advertising. To be accepted, any commercial or industrial zone shall be adopted in accordance with the planning and zoning provisions of W. S. 18-5-201 through W.S. 18-5-208.
- (g) "Conforming sign" means a sign that is lawfully in place and complies with size, lighting, or spacing requirements and all other pertinent lawful regulations.
  - (h) "Department" means the Wyoming Department of Transportation.
- "Digital billboard" means a billboard displaying static images controlled by electronic communications.
- (j) "Directional sign" means a sign identifying and containing directional information to public places and

(i) owned or operated by federal, state, or local governments or one of their agencies;

a sign identifying and containing directional information to publicly or privately owned natural phenomena or historic, cultural, scientific, educational, and religious sites; or

- (iii) a sign identifying and containing directional information to ranches, oil fields, missile sites, and so forth, located off highways where the side road is not signed by the Department. (See Figures 3, 4, and 5.)
- (k) "Dissolve" means a transition between digital messages that is achieved with varying light intensity and in which the first message gradually appears to dissipate and loses legibility simultaneous to the gradual appearance legibility of the subsequent message.
- (l) "Double-faced sign" means a sign with 2 display surfaces with multiple messages visible to traffic from one direction of travel. (See Figure 1.)
- (m) "Erect" means to construct, build, raise, assemble, place, affix, attach, create, paint, draw, or in any other way bring into being or establish; but it shall not include any of the foregoing activities when performed as an incident to the change of advertising message or normal maintenance or repair of a sign structure.
- (n) "Facing" means the total advertising surface of an outdoor advertising sign, display, or device visible from the main-traveled way of the highway.
- (o) "Fade" means a transition between static message displays achieved with varying light intensity and in which the first message gradually loses light intensity to the point of not being legible and the subsequent message gradually increases intensity to the point of legibility.
- (p) "Flashing" means a pattern of changing light illumination in which the sign illumination alternates suddenly between fully illuminated and fully non-illuminated in less than 4 seconds.
- (q) "Foot candle" means a unit of illuminance equal to one lumen, uniformly incident upon an area of one square foot.
- (r) "Unlawful sign" means a sign erected or maintained in violation of the state law, the outdoor advertising rules and regulations, or local law ordinance.
- (s) "Immediate" means a transition between static message displays achieved in 2 seconds or less.
- (t) "Intermittent" means a pattern of changing light intensity, other than that achieved with immediate, fade, or dissolve transitions, in which any message remains static for over 4 seconds.

- (u) "Interstate system" means that portion of the national system of interstate and defense highways located within this state, as officially designated, or as may be so designed by the Department and approved by the secretary of transportation pursuant to the provisions of Title 23, United States Code, "Highways."
  - (v) "Maintain" means to allow to exist.
- (w) "Main-traveled way" means the traveled way of a state highway on which through traffic is carried. In the case of a divided highway, the traveled way of each of the separated roadways for traffic in opposite directions is a main-traveled way. It does not include such facilities as frontage roads, turning roadways, or parking areas.
- (x) "Moving light" means the physical change in position of any visible illumination source while lighted or the simulation of movement achieved with a pattern of sequentially illuminating visible illumination sources within close proximity to each other.
- (y) "National highway system" means that portion of connected main highways, including interstate and defense highways, as officially designated by the Department and approved by the secretary of transportation pursuant to the provisions of Title 23, United States Code, "Highways."
- (z) "Nonconforming sign" means a sign that was lawfully erected but does not comply with the provisions of the state law or regulations passed later or that later fails to comply with state law or regulations because of changed conditions.
- (aa) "Official signs" means signs maintained by public agencies, public utilities, or nonprofit organizations. (See Figures 6 and 7.)
- (bb) "Off-premises sign" means an outdoor advertising sign that advertises an activity, service, or product and located in an area other than the premises at which such activity or service occurs or the product is sold or manufactured.
- (cc) "On-premises sign" means a sign consisting solely of the name of the establishment or identifying the establishment's principal or accessory products or services offered on the property on which they are located.
- (dd) "Outdoor advertising" means any permanent or portable outdoor sign, display, light, device, figure, painting, drawing, plaque, poster, billboard, or other object designed, intended, or used to advertise or inform, and which is visible from any place on the main-traveled way of the interstate or national highway systems.

- (ee) "Primary system" means the federal-aid primary system in existence June 1, 1991, and any highway not on this system but included on the National Highway System.
- (ff) "Poor state of repair" means an outdoor advertising unit that has been damaged or allowed to deteriorate to the extent that the message or symbols or both are incomplete, the structure has been weakened, or parts of the face or structure have been detached and are free to be moved by the wind.
- (gg) "Safety rest area" means an area or site established and maintained within or adjacent to the right-of-way by or under public supervision or control for the convenience of the traveling public.
- (hh) "Static" means having no motion within a particular message or copy displayed on a digital billboard.
- (ii) "Unzoned Commercial or Industrial Area" means those areas within 660 feet of the nearest edge of the highway right-of-way that are not zoned by state or local law, regulation, or ordinance and
- (i) on which is located one or more permanent structures devoted to a business or industrial activity and not predominantly used for residential purposes, or
- (ii) on which a commercial or industrial activity is conducted whether or not a permanent structure is located there.
- (iii) These areas shall extend along the highway for 600 feet on either side of the activity and those lands on the direct opposite side of the highway to the extent of the same dimensions, as long as the Department has not deemed those lands on the opposite side as scenic or as having aesthetic value.
- (iv) In determining such an area, measurements shall be made from the furthest or outermost edges of the regularly used area of the commercial or industrial activity, structures, normal points of ingress and egress, parking lots, storage, and processing area constituting an integral part of the commercial or industrial activity.
- (v) All signs located within an unzoned area shall become nonconforming if the commercial or industrial activity used to define the area ceases for 6 months. (See Figure 8.)
- (vi) To be defined as an unzoned commercial or industrial area, the commercial or industrial activity shall be a business that is presently active and easily recognizable as a commercial or industrial activity. The business shall not qualify if:

- (A) The majority of the business activity is not actually conducted on the premises during normal business hours.
  - (B) It is not connected to one or more utilities.
  - (C) It is not reasonably accessible to the public.
- (D) It is located either partially or totally within an area zoned other than as commercial or industrial by local government zoning authority.
- (E) The business activity is conducted in a building principally used as a residence.
- (F) The commercial or industrial activity is established primarily to qualify an area for displaying outdoor advertising.
- (G) The business activity and land use is not characteristic of that generally permitted in areas actually zoned commercial or industrial under the authority of state or local law, regulations, or ordinances.
  - (vii) Following are typical non-qualifying business activities:
    - (A) Local, county, state, or federal governmental offices or entities.
- (B) Enterprises such as nursing homes, child care centers, hospitals, retirement centers, airports, golf courses, rodeo grounds, and fairgrounds.
- (C) Non-profit organizations, service clubs, membership organizations, or any other private or semi-private organization, association, or entities not established for commercial profit, such as country clubs, trap clubs, and veterans clubs.
- (jj) "V-type sign" means 2 signs erected independently of each other or attached to each other with multiple display surfaces having messages visible to traffic from opposite directions, with an interior angle between the 2 signs of not more than 120 degrees and with the signs separated by not more than 10 feet at the nearest point. (See Figure 2.)
- (kk) "Visible" means capable of being seen, whether or not legibly, without visual aid by a person of normal visual acuity.

### Section 3. Outdoor Advertising Permitted.

- (a) No outdoor advertising visible from the main-traveled way of the interstate or primary highways may be erected or maintained except:
- (i) Signs maintained by public agencies and public utilities and directional or other official signs or notices required or authorized by law, including but not limited to, signs pertaining to natural wonders and scenic and historic attractions.
- (ii) On-premises signs including signs, displays, and devices advertising the sale or lease of property upon which they are located; and signs, displays, and devices advertising activities conducted on the property upon which they are located.
- (iii) Off-premises signs including signs, displays, and devices located in areas adjacent to and within 660 feet of the nearest edge of the highway right-or-way and zoned industrial or commercial areas under the authority of law.
- (iv) Off-premises signs including signs, displays, and devices located in areas that are adjacent to and within 660 feet of the nearest edge of the highway right-or-way and are unzoned industrial or commercial areas under the authority of law. Actual land use shall determine the unzoned industrial or commercial areas.
- (v) All off-premises outdoor advertising signs located beyond 660 feet of the highway right-of-way within urban boundaries as defined by the Department are not controlled by state outdoor advertising law.

### Section 4. Digital Billboards.

- (a) The message, messages, or copy displayed on a digital billboard:
- (i) Shall not be displayed through blinking, intermittent, flashing, or moving lights;
  - (ii) Shall remain fixed for at least 8 seconds;
- (iii) Shall not increase the ambient lighting level by more than 0.3 foot candles when measured by a foot candle meter at:
- (A) 150 feet for a digital billboard with a surface area of not more than 242 square feet;

- (B) 200 feet for a digital billboard with a surface area greater than 242 square feet but not more than 378 square feet;
- (C) 250 feet for a digital billboard with a surface area greater than 378 square feet but not more than 672 square feet; and
- (D) 350 feet for a digital billboard with a surface area greater than 672 square feet.
- (b) In no case shall a digital billboard increase the ambient lighting level by more than 0.3 foot candles at the property line of a single family dwelling located in a zoned district in which billboards are prohibited.
- (c) Each digital billboard shall have a light sensing device to adjust the brightness as ambient light conditions change to conform to the requirements of this section.
- (d) Transitions between messages shall be accomplished in 2 seconds or less by employing an immediate, dissolve, or fade method.

## Section 5. Limits on Size, Form, Lighting, Locations, Spacing, and Overall Height.

- (a) The following limits apply to size.
- (i) A single-face outdoor advertising sign shall not exceed a length of 60 feet, a height of 25 feet, or an area of 1,200 square feet.
- (ii) A double-face outdoor advertising sign shall not exceed a total of 650 square feet. Neither face shall exceed 325 square feet.
  - (b) The following limits apply to form.
- (i) No more than 2 facings visible and readable from the same direction on the main-traveled way may be erected on any one sign structure defined as a double-faced sign.
- (ii) Double-faced, back-to-back, and V-type signs shall be considered one structure and require one permit.
  - (c) The following limits apply to lighting.

- (i) Unshielded lighting or signs with flashing, intermittent, or moving light or lights are prohibited.
  - (d) The following limits apply to location.
- (i) Signs may not be erected to obscure or otherwise interfere with an official traffic sign, signal, or device, or obstruct or interfere with the driver's view of approaching, merging, or intersecting traffic.
- (ii) Signs may not be located within 500 feet of any public park, forest, playground, cemetery, or scenic area designated by the Department or other state agency and adjacent to the highway unless the signs are in an incorporated area.
- (iii) No signs may be located on railroad right-of-way in areas where the railroad right-of-way intersects the highway right-of-way. (See Figure 9.)
- (iv) Outside incorporated villages and cities, signs may not be located within 500 feet of the following, measured from the point of pavement widening, for the longest on or off interchange ramp in both directions:
  - (A) An interchange,
  - (B) An at-grade intersection, or
  - (C) A safety rest area.
  - (e) The following limits apply to spacing.
- (i) The spacing requirements for outdoor advertising in zoned or unzoned commercial or industrial areas adjacent to the interstate and primary highway systems are as follows:
- (A) Interstate highways—No new off-premises sign shall be erected closer than 500 feet to an existing off-premises sign either inside or outside incorporated villages and cities.
- (B) Primary highways—No off-premises sign shall be erected closer than 100 feet from an existing off-premises sign within incorporated villages and cities. Outside incorporated villages and cities, no off-premises sign shall be erected closer than 300 feet from an existing off-premises sign.

- (C) The preceding spacing requirements do not apply to structures separated by buildings or other obstructions if only one sign facing located within the preceding spacing distance is visible from the highway at any one time. The minimum distance between structures shall be measured along the nearest edge of the pavement between points directly opposite the nearest sign support along each side of the highway and shall apply only to structures located on the same side of the highway.
- (D) The spacing requirements of this section do not apply to onpremises, directional, or official signs, nor shall measurements be made from such signs.
  - (f) The following limits apply to overall height.
- (i) An outdoor advertising sign generally shall not exceed an overall height of 40 feet measured from the sign's highest point to the grade level of the highway from which the sign is to be viewed. If the ground level at the sign location is higher than the highway grade level, the 40-foot overall height criteria may be increased only as needed for sign visibility. Department approval is required to exceed the 40-foot overall height. (See Figure 10.)

### Section 6. Directional Signs.

- (a) The message on a directional sign shall be limited to identifying the site and directional information useful in locating the site, such as mileage, route number, or exit number. Descriptive words, phrases, pictorial representations, and logos are prohibited.
  - (i) The following directional signs prohibited.
    - (A) Signs advertising any unlawful activity.
- (B) Signs that obscure any official traffic control device or interfere with a driver's view of approaching, merging, or intersecting traffic.
- (C) Signs erected or maintained upon trees or drawn upon rocks or other natural features.
- Signs whose directional messages refer to sites that no longer exist.
  - (E) Signs that are structurally unsafe or in disrepair.
- (F) Signs with unshielded lighting or signs with flashing, intermittent, or moving light or lights.

- (G) Signs located in rest areas, parklands, or scenic areas.
- (H) Signs with a commercial advertising legend or symbol.
- (b) Directional signs **Types I and II-Type I** directional signs contain directional information to public places owned or operated by federal, state, or local governments or areas the Department deems of interest to the traveling public. **Type II** directional signs contain directional information to privately owned natural phenomena; historical, cultural, scientific, religious, or educational sites; areas suited for outdoor recreation; or areas the Department deems of interest to the traveling public. (See Figures 3 and 4.)
  - (c) All Type I and Type II directional signs shall be permitted.
    - (i) The following size limits shall apply to Type I and Type II signs:
- (A) **Types I and II** directional signs shall not exceed an area of 150 square feet, a height of 20 feet, or a length of 20 feet.
- (ii) The following shall apply to the location and spacing of **Types I and**II signs.
- (A) Signs shall not be located closer than 2,000 feet to a rest area, parkland, or scenic area or to an interchange or intersection at grade, measured from the point of widening at the entrance or exit from the main-traveled way.
- (B) Directional signs facing the same direction of travel shall be spaced more than one mile apart.
- (C) No more than 3 **Type I** directional signs relating to the same activity may be erected along a single route approaching the activity.
- (D) No directional signs located adjacent to the interstate highway shall be located more than 75 air miles from the attraction or activity. Signs adjacent to primary highways shall be within 50 air miles of the attraction or activity.
  - (iii) Following are eligibility criteria for Types I and II signs.
- (A) A site shall be regionally or nationally known. To qualify as regionally known, the site shall be known within the entire state of Wyoming and any state contiguous to Wyoming.

- (B) The site shall be of outstanding interest to the traveling public and have a substantial number of tourist visitors. The dominant attraction shall benefit and enlighten the traveling public and not be a tourist-oriented roadside business.
- (C) The site shall be within 10 miles of the state highway access on an adequate all-weather road. If the activity is clearly visible from the highway access, "on-premises" signs shall suffice.
- (D) Attractions or activities having official highway signs on the right-of-way shall not qualify for directional signs on private property along that respective route.
- (E) Historical sites, in addition to complying with preceding subsections (A) through (D), shall be listed in the national register of historic places.
- (F) Educational or cultural sites, in addition to meeting preceding subsections (A) through (D), shall comply with one of the following by being:
  - (I) a site where intellectual faculties are developed; or
- (II) a site where characteristic features of a particular stage in the advancement of civilization took place; or
  - (III) a site where education is advanced; or
- (IV) a site containing a structure significant to education. The structure shall either have architectural value or be the surviving structure most associated with a historically significant person or event.
- (G) Scientific sites, in addition to complying with preceding subsections (A) through (D), shall be sites or institutions for the systematic study of scientific principals where hypotheses are formulated and tested.
- (H) Religious sites, in addition to meeting preceding subsections
   (A) through (D), shall comply with one of the following:
- (I) The site shall be related to religious activities of a particular culture; or
- (II) The site shall be the location of religious activity of historical or cultural significance, but it cannot currently be used for worship.

- (I) Natural phenomena sites, in addition to complying with preceding subsections (A) through (D), shall be naturally occurring (such as caves, unusual rock formations, water falls, and so forth) as distinguished from man-made sites.
- (J) Outdoor recreation sites, in addition to meeting subsections (A) through (D), shall comply with one of the following:
- (I) The site shall have a minimum of 5 acres, 50 percent of which shall be unoccupied open space accessible to the public; or
- (II) The site shall have a picnic area, tables, benches, litter barrels, drinking water, and sanitary facilities; or
- (III) The site shall have adequate maintenance staff to keep facilities in a clean and sanitary condition; or
- (IV) The site shall have one or more of these facilities: a public boat landing, a supervised swimming area, public fishing access, a campground, a golf course, a tennis court, or a playground.
- (iv) The following shall apply to **Type III** directional signs. These signs contain directional information to ranches, oil fields, missile sites, and so forth, located off highways where the side road is not signed by the Department. (See Figure 5.)
  - (v) **Type III** eligibility criteria include the following.
- (A) **Type III** directional signs shall not exceed an area of 32 square feet.
  - (B) The sign shall be within 500 feet of the approach road.
- (C) Only one sign is permitted per activity and may be placed on a back-to-back installation.
- (D) The sign shall be on the same side of the highway as the activity.
- (E) The Department shall approve the location of all **Type III** directional signs before erection.
  - (F) A permit is not required for a Type III directional sign.

### Section 7. Official Signs.

- (a) Type I Official Signs are signs and notices erected and maintained by public officers or public agencies within their territorial or zoning jurisdiction to carry out an official duty or responsibility. These signs shall not be any larger than necessary to adequately inform the traveling public. The Department shall approve the location of official Type I signs before erection, but these signs do not require an advertising permit. (See Figure 6.)
- (b) **Type II Official Signs** are signs and notices relating to meetings of nonprofit service clubs or charitable associations or to religious services. The size of these signs shall not exceed an area of 8 square feet. The message content is limited to the organization's name and the meeting times. No more than one such sign may be erected in each approach direction of traffic. The Department shall approve the location of official **Type II** signs before erection, but these signs do not require an advertising permit. (See Figure 7.)

### Section 8. On-premises Signs.

- (a) On-premises signs are signs advertising on-premises activities only. On-premises signs are further defined as follows:
- Signs that advertise the sale or lease of the property on which the sign is located;
- (ii) Signs advertising a principal product sold, a service rendered, or an activity conducted on the specific property on which the sign is located; and
- (iii) Signs that identify the goods produced on the property; the name of the business; or the name of the person, firm, corporation, or agency occupying the property.
  - (b) "On-premises" qualifying criteria include the following.
- (i) The premises on which any activity is conducted is determined by the physical facts rather than by property lines. The premises consist of the land occupied by the buildings or other physical uses that are necessary or customarily incident to the activity, including such open spaces arranged to be used in connection with such buildings.
- (ii) Generally, the property may be defined as a parcel of land on which is a regularly used building or a service, repair, processing, storage or parking area, or some combination of these facilities, used in conjunction with the on-premises activity.

- (c) The following land uses shall not be considered part of the premises on which the activity is conducted, and any signs located on such land shall be considered "offpremises" outdoor advertising and subject to permit regulations.
- (i) Any land that cannot be reasonably used as an integral part of the business. This includes, but is not limited to, land separated from the activity by a roadway, highway, or other obstruction and not used as an integral part of the business. The same restriction applies to undeveloped highway frontage adjacent to the land actually used by the advertised activity.
- (ii) Any vacant land or land used for a purpose unrelated to the advertised activity (for example, land adjacent to or adjoining a service station but devoted to farming or ranching, residence, or other commercial or industrial uses having no relationship to the service station activity).
- (iii) Any land occupied solely by structures or uses that are only incidental to the principal activity and serving no purpose other than to attempt to qualify the land for signing purposes.
- (iv) Where the sign site is located at or near the end of a narrow strip adjacent to the advertising activity, the sign site shall not be considered part of the premises. A narrow strip shall include any configuration of land that cannot be put to any reasonable use related to the activity other than signing.
  - (d) Examples of prohibited "on-premises" displays include the following.
- (i) A sign advertising a product or service provided on the property but incidental to the business's principal purpose (such as a sign located on top a service station advertising cigarettes).
- (ii) A sign that advertises products, activities, or services conducted on the property but also advertising activities not performed on the property (for example, a sign advertising a motel not located on the property with an additional message stating "rock shop here" to advertize an on-premises rock shop).
- (iii) A sale or lease sign advertising a product or service not located on the property and unrelated to the business of selling or leasing the property on which the sign is located (for example, a sign advertising an off-premises restaurant with the message "this property for lease-apply at . . .").

### Section 9. Political Signs.

- (a) Written campaign advertising shall not be placed on or attached to any real or personal property of the state or its political subdivisions, except:
- (i) The Department of Transportation shall allow campaign materials to be placed on state rights-of-way within municipalities subject to rules and regulations adopted by the municipality.
- (b) Written campaign advertising shall not be placed within the right-of-way of any interstate highway.

#### Section 10. Permits.

- (a) A permit shall be obtained for each advertising structure before construction of any sign. If a structure or sign has been erected before a permit is issued, the structure or sign shall be deemed unlawful. Signs exempt from permits are on-premises, official, and Type III directional signs, although official and Type III directional signs require written permission from the Department before erection.
- (b) Each permit issued shall be assigned a separate identification number on a permanent tag provided by the Department. The permit tag shall be affixed to the lower corner of the sign face nearest the right-of-way line or to the face of the upright, leg, or pole of the structure nearest the right-of-way line. The permit tag shall be visible from the nearest point of the highway. A sign that fails to have the permit tag affixed is subject to revocation and removal by the Department.
- (c) If the original permit tag becomes lost, damaged, or unreadable, the permit holder shall request a replacement tag. The Department shall provide replacement tags bearing the original permitted number for \$25 each.
- (d) Outdoor advertising signs may have the sign owner's name, address, logo, or trade name affixed on a separate name panel of wood or metal construction fastened to the sign or sign structure. A commercial sign company shall limit its name plate to its logo or trade name only, provided that the logo or trade name is as indicated on all the company's outdoor advertising permit applications.
- (e) Sign structures bearing permit tags for signs other than the one for which they were issued shall be in violation.
- (f) Permit holders shall notify the Department in writing when the sign structure has been erected.

(g) Sign permits may be transferred from the current sign owner to a new owner upon written notification to the Department from the current sign owner.

### Section 11. Application for Permit and Fees.

- (a) A separate application for a permit shall be made for each separate outdoor advertising structure, sign, or display, on an application form furnished by the Department and containing all information the Department requires. Each application shall be accompanied by the following:
  - (i) A nonrefundable application fee specified by W.S. 24-10-107.
- (ii) Written consent of the owner or occupant of the real property upon which the structure, sign, or display is to be erected or maintained.
- (iii) A statement from the appropriate zoning authority verifying the zoning classification of the proposed sign site in each city or county where zoning laws are enforced if the sign is located in an area zoned commercial or industrial.
- (iv) A zoning map or a diagram of the sign location showing the highway route number and such physical features and other stationary landmarks necessary to describe the location adequately. The zoning map or sketch shall also indicate the distance in feet from the sign location to the nearest milepost marker and the spacing between the sign location and any existing off-premises sign or commercial or industrial activity used to define the area.
- (b) Location-Before submitting an application, the applicant shall stake the proposed sign location and attach to the stake the applicant's name and address. The stake shall be located at the proposed location of the sign support closest to the highway right-of-way and shall be visible from the highway. Each pending application location may be field checked for compliance with state law and Department regulations before application approval. After approval, the applicant shall in some manner display the permit number, excluding the permit tag, on the location stake.
- (c) Fees-Each permit shall be valid for 3 years and then renewed annually. Permits for **Type I** directional signs shall be renewed at no cost to the owner agency. Permit renewal fees shall become delinquent 30 days after the annual renewal date. On becoming delinquent, such sign structures are unlawful and shall be removed.

### Section 12. Repair, Maintenance, and Relocation.

- (a) All signs, including official and directional signs, shall be maintained in a safe condition and in sound repair. The Department shall remove signs in an unsafe condition or poor state of repair if they are not repaired upon notice. Relocation of advertising signs shall not be permitted since outdoor advertising permits are issued for specific locations. The Department shall consider written requests to improve conforming signs and structures and shall grant approval if appropriate.
- (b) For nonconforming signs and structures, advertising messages may be changed and structures may be repaired, but they shall not be improved in a manner that increases the structure's value. Some examples of improvements not approved for nonconforming signs are the following:
  - (i) Adding lighting.
  - (ii) Revising the structure from wood to steel posts.
- (iii) Increasing the size of the original sign face by attaching additional signs, or increasing the size of the existing sign face.
  - (c) Such improvement of a structure shall cause its permit to be revoked.
- (d) A nonconforming sign or structure may be replaced if destroyed by vandals. Prior approval of the Department shall be obtained before replacing an entire structure.

### Section 13. Unlawful Signs and Revocation of Permits.

- (a) Any of the following can cause a sign to be unlawful and the permits or renewals to be revoked or denied. Upon the revocation of any permit, the sign for which it was issued constitutes unlawful advertising and shall be removed.
- (i) Outdoor advertising maintained without a permit or Department approval.
  - (ii) Outdoor advertising in an unsafe condition or in poor repair.
- (iii) Outdoor advertising erected after March 5, 1971, contrary to the terms of the Outdoor Advertising Act (W.S. 24-10-101 through W.S. 24-10-115).
  - (iv) Outdoor advertising not complying with size or spacing limits.

- (v) Outdoor advertising maintained under a permit issued pursuant to an applicant's false and misleading statement.
- (vi) Outdoor advertising hindering the clear, unobstructed view of approaching or merging traffic, obstructing the view of any traffic sign or other official sign, or signs imitating a traffic sign.
- (vii) Outdoor advertising with unshielded lighting or signs with flashing, intermittent, or moving light or lights.
- (viii) Directional signs Type II, or Type III with a commercial advertising legend or symbol.
- (ix) Outdoor advertising that is erected or repaired from within the highway right-of-way.
  - (x) A sign that is blank or abandoned for 9 continuous months.
- (xi) A nonconforming sign once removed from a permitted location becomes unlawful to replace.
  - (xii) Outdoor advertising painted or affixed to any natural feature.
- (xiii) Permitted outdoor advertising not displaying the assigned permit number tag.
- (xiv) Failure to renew a permit within 30 days after the expiration of the permit period.
- (xv) Failure to erect advertising signs within one year of the date a permit is issued.
  - (xvi) To otherwise violate state law or Department regulations.
- (b) When the Department determines that a violation of outdoor advertising has occurred, the Department shall give written notice of the violation by certified mail to the permit holder and specify that remedial action has to be taken within 30 days, or the permit shall be revoked and action for removal of the sign commenced.

### Section 14. Sign Removal Procedures.

- (a) The procedures for sign removal are set forth in W. S. 24-10-109 and include the following:
- (i) Removal notice shall be given by certified mail to the sign owner and owner or occupant of the land. If the owner of the sign is unknown, notice shall be posted on the structure in a conspicuous place.
- (ii) The land or the structure owner may make written request no later than 15 days after receiving the removal notice for a hearing pursuant to General Section, Chapter 3, Appeals and Hearings, of the Wyoming Department of Transportation's rules and regulations. Upon receiving the written hearing request, the Office of Administrative Hearings shall set a date for a hearing within 30 days.
- (iii) If a hearing is not requested, or if no appeal is taken from the hearing examiner's decision at such hearing, or if the hearing examiner's decision is affirmed on appeal, the Department shall immediately remove the offending outdoor advertising at its own expense with no compensation to the owner.

#### Section 15. Local Ordinances.

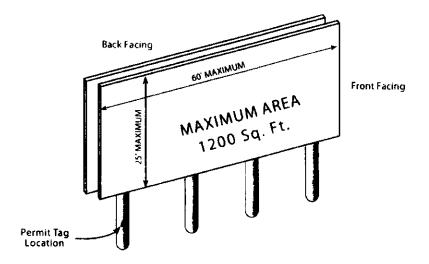
Local ordinances, regulations, or resolutions more restrictive than the provisions of the Outdoor Advertising Act are not affected by these rules.

#### Section 16. Violations.

All outdoor advertising not conforming to the requirements of the Outdoor Advertising Act are declared in violation of the act and are also declared public nuisances. Individuals observing violations of the Outdoor Advertising Act are urged to report their complaints immediately to the nearest Department office. Any person violating this act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

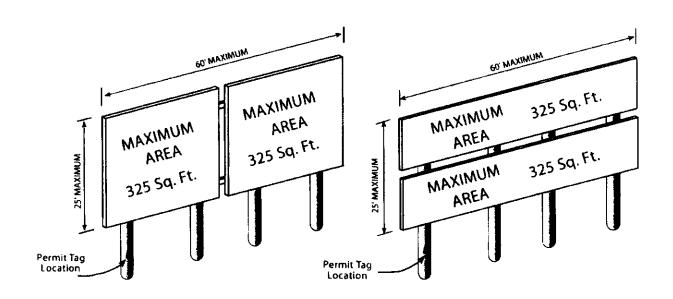
#### Section 17. Federal Law.

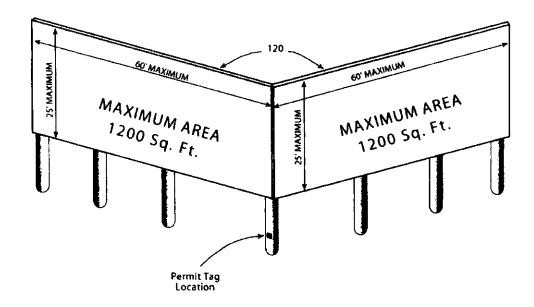

#### **PURPOSE**

To provide background information, review the application for completeness and conformance to the procedural requirements associated with the Special Use Permit application process in Town ordinance No. 2025-004, and make recommendations to the Planning and Zoning Commission and Town Council to aid in their decision-making process.

#### **BACKGROUND**

- 1. Special Use Permit Application and Supplemental Information were submitted on June 20, 2025; All related filing fees have been submitted; the Application was reviewed and evaluated by the Zoning Administrator. "Attachment #1"
- **2.** Required advertising was submitted to Star Valley Independent for consecutive advertising from September 17th through September 24th, 2025, in anticipation of an October 14<sup>th</sup>, 2025, public hearing. "Attachment #2"
- **3.** As required, all property Owners within a five-hundred-foot (500) radius of the proposed property were notified via supplied information of the project, with ample opportunity to provide comment and/or to give a response to the mailing, either in person or in writing. A response deadline of August 6<sup>th</sup>, 2025, was given. "Attachment #3"
- **4.** Approximately thirty-one (31) mailings were sent out.
- 5. To date, the Town has received one written response. (Attachment #4)
- **6.** A copy of the Plat map of the land to be leased from the Town of Alpine for the sign is attached, further referred to as "Attachment #5".
- 7. A lease agreement for the land to place the proposed sign has been approved by the Town Council. Melvins is waiting to sign the lease agreement to verify the start date of their payments based on the time of the year and the fact that they will not be able to place the sign until spring.(attachment #6)

#### NEED FOR SPECIAL USE APPLICATION



The subject property is zoned **Public and Community Facilities**, and per the Alpine Land Use and Development Code (LUDC), off-premise signs are only allowed on commercial lots that adjoin a public road unless a Special Use Permit is granted. Therefore, a Special Use Permit is required in order to place the signs on Town property.

# APPLICATION SUMMARY

**Property Location:** Approximately 793.4 square feet of land located on the SE corner of Lot #3 of Alpine Third West Subdivision, within the incorporated boundaries of the Town of Alpine, Lincoln County, Wyoming.

Parcels Involved: Alpine Third West Addition, also known as Lot #1

**Proposal:** The lease holder is requesting a **Special Use Permit** to allow flexibility in placement location for a directional sign.

# **Project Overview:**

Get Down, LLC dba Melvin Brewing Company submitted a Special Use Permit (SUP) application to allow placement of off-premise directional signage on Town-owned property adjacent to U.S. Highway 89. The signage will direct traffic—specifically delivery trucks and taproom patrons—to Melvin Brewing's facility at 624 County Road 101, Alpine, Wyoming.

The request was filed using the Town's official SUP Application and includes all required criteria responses. The applicant states that the signage will:

- Improve traffic patterns by directing brewery and truck traffic away from residential neighborhoods;
- Provide clearer navigation for visitors and delivery drivers; and
- Maintain aesthetic consistency with Alpine's design standards and branding

# **Special Use Permit Application**

The applicant has indicated that there are no anticipated negative effects on public health, safety, or the environment and that lighting and design will be consistent with the Town's codes.



A Master Authorization to Act on Behalf of the Property Owner, signed by Mayor Eric Green, was submitted, formally authorizing Melvin Brewing to represent the Town for the purpose of this signage request (Attachment #7)

**STAFF REVIEW AND FINDINGS** (references to WYDOT Outdoor Advertising, attachment #8, and currently adopted Land Use Development code.)

# 1. Applicable Zoning and Code Compliance

The subject parcel is zoned Public and Community Facilities (PCF). Signs permitted within this zone are typically limited to governmental, civic, and institutional identification signs. However, under LUDC §4-803(h)(5), a Special Use Permit may authorize off-premise signage for a private business on non-commercial property when consistent with Town policy and surrounding land uses

# 2. Design Standards

All sign dimensions, height, illumination, and materials must conform to PCF District sign regulations under Section 4-803. Any deviation from these standards would require redesign or reduction prior to Town Council approval. Landscaping is required at the base of freestanding signs in accordance with Section 4-803(c)(5), ensuring year-round aesthetic integration

# 3. Off-Premise Sign Requirements

The LUDC restricts off-premise signs to commercial and industrial zones adjoining public streets, unless an approved contract exists between the property owner (Town of Alpine) and the business owner (Melvin Brewing) as reviewed by the Planning and Zoning Commission

This authorization has been provided through the Town's executed agreement and ownership consent.

# 4. AGENCY AND DEPARTMENT REVIEW

- WYDOT: Provided written coordination confirming the proposed sign meets directional standards and does not interfere with highway visibility or safety.
- Public Works Department: No objection, provided final design allows adequate sight distance and does not interfere with municipal signage.
- Planning Staff: Recommends ensuring illumination and size conform to PCF sign limitations and that base landscaping be maintained year-round.



- **5 Findings:** (see attachment # 9 for proposed sign design)
- The application complies with the **procedural requirements** of Ordinance No. 2025-004 for Special Use Permits.
- The proposed use is **consistent with the intent** of the PCF Zone and **Section 4-803(h)(5)** of the LUDC.
- The project supports **public safety** by directing vehicular and delivery traffic more efficiently to the Melvin Brewing facility.
- The proposed design is **compatible with surrounding Town facilities** and highway corridor aesthetics.
- The **property owner authorization** and **WYDOT review** demonstrate adequate interagency coordination and legal authority.
- Landscaping and design requirements under Section 4-803(c)(5) will ensure visual compatibility and compliance with Town standards.

# 6. Implications for Current Interpretation

Given the 2006 policy framework and the 2025 regulatory structure, the **Special Use Permit request** to allow subdivision and individual ownership of units:

- **Directly aligns** with the **original policy vision** of the MRC Zone;
- Maintains the required design cohesion and infrastructure adequacy; and
- **Fulfills** both the **intent and practical application** of the Town's mixed-use development policies.

# 7. Overall Finding

The proposed off-premise directional sign for **Get Down, LLC dba Melvin Brewing Company** complies with the **Town of Alpine Land Use Development Code (LUDC)** and aligns with the **intent of the Public and Community Facilities (PCF) zoning district.** While signage within the PCF zone is typically limited to governmental or institutional identification, **LUDC §4-803(h)(5)** allows off-premise signage by **Special Use Permit** when consistent with Town policy



and surrounding land uses. The applicant has obtained formal authorization from the Town of Alpine, meeting this key requirement.

The proposed signage design meets all applicable **PCF District standards** under **Section 4-803**, including conformance with prescribed limits for size, height, materials, and illumination. Landscaping at the base, required under **Section 4-803(c)(5)**, ensures visual cohesion and year-round aesthetic integration. Any future deviation from these standards would require redesign or Town Council reapproval.

Agency reviews confirmed regulatory compliance and safety. **WYDOT** verified that the proposed sign location and dimensions meet highway visibility and directional standards. The **Public Works Department** raised no objection, contingent on maintaining sight distance and avoiding conflicts with municipal signage. **Planning Staff** found the proposal consistent with Town design expectations and recommended continued adherence to PCF design and maintenance requirements.

Staff finds the application procedurally complete and substantively compliant with **Ordinance No. 2025-004**. The project enhances **public safety and traffic circulation** by clearly directing delivery and visitor traffic to the Melvin Brewing facility. The sign's design and placement are **compatible with the surrounding public uses** along the U.S. 89 corridor and align with **the 2006 Master Plan's goals** for coordinated signage, wayfinding, and community branding. The application demonstrates appropriate interagency coordination and legal authority through property owner consent and WYDOT approval. Landscaping and design features ensure long-term compliance and visual quality consistent with Town standards.

- Publication in Star Valley Independent on September 24 and October 1, 2025.
- Public notices we posted at the Town of Alpine Post Office and Town Hall for 1 month before the Public hearing date

- Written responses received

## RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends **approval** of the **Special Use Permit** for **Get Down, LLC dba Melvin Brewing Company** to install an **off-premise directional sign** on Town-owned property along U.S. Highway 89, subject to the following **conditions of approval**:



# 1. **Design Compliance:**

Final sign dimensions, height, lighting, and materials must conform to the PCF District design standards in LUDC §4-803.

# 2. Landscaping:

The base of the freestanding sign shall include landscaping consistent with **Section 4-803(c)(5)**, maintained year-round.

# 3. WYDOT Coordination:

Installation shall comply with all WYDOT directional sign regulations and approvals on file with the Town.

## 4. Maintenance:

The applicant shall maintain the sign and landscaping in good repair at all times.

# 5. Future Modification:

Any modification to design, size, or lighting shall require additional review by the Planning & Zoning Commission.

# 6. Fees and Costs:

Verify Town has been reimbursed for the public notice advertising with SVI.

# 7. Execution of Lease:

The Town Council and Melvins need to agree upon and execute a lease agreement.

# TOWN OF ALPINE, WYOMING ORDINANCE NO. 2025-004 SPECIAL USE PERMITS AND SPECIAL REVIEW

# AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF ALPINE, WYOMING ESTABLISHING A REVIEW AND ISSUANCE PROCESS FOR SPECIAL USE PERMITS WITHIN THE TOWN OF ALPINE.

# BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE TOWN OF ALPINE, WYOMING:

**SECTION 1.** *PURPOSE AND INTENT:* The purpose of this Ordinance is to provide a regulatory framework for the review and issuance of Special Use Permits in the Town of Alpine, Wyoming, to ensure that land use and development activities are compatible with the goals and objectives of the Town's Comprehensive Plan. The Special Use Permit process allows for the review of certain uses that are deemed to be compatible with the zoning district but may require special conditions for approval due to their impact on surrounding properties, public services, or infrastructure.

**SECTION 2.** *AUTHORITY:* This Ordinance is adopted pursuant to the authority granted by Wyoming Statutes §15-1-601 through §15-1-604 and any other applicable provisions of state law. This Ordinance provides for the regulation of special uses to ensure the public health, safety, and general welfare of the citizens of the Town of Alpine.

## **SECTION 3.** *DEFINITIONS:*

- i. **Special Use Permit (SUP)** A permit granted by the Town Council or Planning Commission for land uses or activities that are not otherwise permitted by right within a zoning district but may be approved with specific conditions to mitigate potential impacts.
- ii. **Special Review** A formal process through which a proposed use or development is reviewed for compliance with the Town's land use regulations, zoning laws, and other applicable standards, including public hearings and the evaluation of potential environmental, economic, and social impacts.

# **SECTION 4.** APPLICABILITY:

The provisions of this Ordinance apply to all land uses within the Town of Alpine that may require a Special Use Permit or Special Review as defined herein. Special Use Permits may be required for uses such as, but not limited to:

- i. Commercial establishments in residential zones
- ii. Mobile home parks
- iii. Wireless communication towers
- iv. Industrial uses in mixed-use districts
- v. Event venues
- vi. Public utility structures

# **SECTION 5.** APPLICATION PROCESS:

# 1. Application Submission

- An applicant seeking a Special Use Permit must submit a completed application to the Alpine Town Planning Commission. The application shall include:
  - A description of the proposed use

- Site plans, architectural drawings, or other relevant documents required by the Planning and Zoning Staff and/or Commission
- A traffic impact analysis (if applicable)
- Environmental assessment (if applicable)
- Written explanation addressing how the proposed use complies with the criteria in Section 6

# 2. Planning and Zoning Review

Upon receipt of the application, the Planning Commission or designated staff shall review the proposal to ensure it meets the minimum requirements for review, including conformance with zoning, the Town's Comprehensive Plan, and other applicable regulations.

# 3. Public Hearing

o A public hearing shall be scheduled, and the applicant shall provide written notice to all owners of property within five hundred (500) feet of the property and other interested parties as prescribed by the Town's notification requirements.

# 4. Review by Planning Commission

o The Planning Commission shall conduct a public hearing to review the application, considering all relevant factors and public input. The Planning Commission may recommend approval, approval with conditions, or denial of the Special Use Permit to the Town Council.

#### 5. Final Decision

 The Town Council shall make the final decision to approve, approve with conditions, or deny the Special Use Permit based on the Planning Commission's recommendation and findings made during the public hearing.

## SECTION 6. CRITERIA FOR APPROVAL:

The Town Council or Planning Commission shall base its decision on the following criteria:

- 1. **Compatibility with Zoning** The proposed use shall be compatible with the surrounding area and consistent with the Town's Comprehensive Plan and zoning district regulations.
- 2. **Impact on Public Health and Safety** The proposed use shall not result in undue adverse impacts on public health, safety, or welfare, including adequate provisions for water, sewer, transportation, and emergency services.
- 3. **Environmental Impact** The proposed use shall not result in significant negative impacts on the environment, including air quality, water quality, noise levels, or wildlife habitats.
- 4. **Traffic and Access** The proposed use shall not generate excessive traffic or create unsafe conditions for pedestrians or vehicles. Adequate access and parking must be provided.
- 5. **Mitigation of Negative Effects** The applicant must demonstrate that any negative effects (such as noise, light, traffic, etc.) will be minimized through appropriate mitigation measures.
- 6. **Consistency with Community Character** The proposed use shall be consistent with the aesthetic and character of the surrounding neighborhood or district.

#### **SECTION 7.** CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL:

The Town Council may impose conditions on the issuance of a Special Use Permit, including but not limited to:

- 1. Limits on hours of operation
- 2. Restrictions on signage and lighting
- 3. Requirements for landscaping, buffering, or screening
- 4. Compliance with building and fire safety codes
- 5. Traffic control measures, including the construction of additional access points or improvements to roadways
- 6. Other conditions deemed necessary to mitigate potential impacts

## **SECTION 8.** APPEALS:

Any applicant or aggrieved party who is dissatisfied with the decision of the Town Council may appeal the decision to the Town's Board of Adjustment. The appeal must be filed in writing within 30 days of the decision, stating the grounds for the appeal

## **SECTION 9. SPECIAL REVIEW FOR SPECIFIC USES:**

- 1. **Review Process** Certain land uses, such as industrial or commercial developments, may undergo additional special review procedures to assess their broader impacts on the community. The Town Council, upon recommendation from the Planning Commission, may require special reviews that go beyond the regular Special Use Permit process.
- 2. Factors for Review The Town may consider, but is not limited to, the following factors in its special review:
  - o Compatibility with existing infrastructure
  - o Impact on neighboring properties
  - o Environmental sustainability
  - o Economic impact on the Town

# **SECTION 10. ENFORCEMENT AND VIOLATIONS:**

Failure to comply with the conditions of a Special Use Permit may result in the revocation of the permit or other penalties as provided by the Town's zoning and land use regulations. Violations of this Ordinance may be subject to fines, penalties, or legal action as deemed appropriate by the Town.

# SECTION 11. SEVERABILITY:

Constitution. 16-006. Loan of credit; donations prohibited; works of internal improvement. Neither the state nor any county, city, township, town, school district, or any other political subdivision, shall loan or give its credit or make donations to or in aid of any individual, association or corporation, except for necessary support of the poor, nor subscribe to or become the owner of the capital stock of any association or corporation, except that funds of public employee retirement systems may be invested in such stock under conditions the legislature prescribes. The state shall not engage in any work of internal improvement unless authorized by a two-thirds vote of the people.

<u>Constitution. 16-007.</u> Payments of <u>public money.</u> No money shall be paid out of the state treasury except upon appropriation by law and on warrant drawn by the proper officer, and no bills, claims, accounts or demands against the state, or any county or political subdivision, shall be audited, allowed or paid until a **full itemized statement in writing**, certified to under penalty of perjury, shall be filed with the officer or officers whose duty it may be to audit the same.

W.S. 9-4-831 (h). Investment of public funds. Every political subdivision shall have on file a "Statement of Investment Policy..." This policy shall be at least as restrictive with respect to the types of investments authorized as those listed under subsection (a) of this section.

# W.S. 15-1-125. Presentation and payment of claims:

(a) All claims and demands against any city or town shall be presented to the governing body by itemized invoice or other document from the vendor with a full account of the quantity and total cost for each item or for the services rendered. No payment shall be approved by the governing body unless the claim is certified under penalty of perjury by the vendor or by an authorized person employed by the city or town receiving the items or for whom the services were rendered. No claim or demand may be...instituted against a city or town for any claim unless it has been first presented to the governing body and a reasonable time given to act upon the claim.

# W.S. 16-2-102. Facsimile signature: authorized use: legal effect.

- (a) After filing with the secretary of state his manual signature certified by him under oath, any authorized officer may execute or cause to be executed with a facsimile signature in lieu of his manual signature:
- (i) Any public security, provided that at least one (1) signature required or permitted to be placed thereon shall be manually subscribed; and
  - (ii) Any instrument of payment.

# W.S. 22-25-102. Contribution of funds or election assistance restricted: limitation on contributions: right to communicate, civil penalty.

(a) Except as otherwise provided in this section, <u>no organization of any kind</u> including a corporation, partnership, trade union, professional association or civic, fraternal or religious group...except a political party, political action committee or candidate's campaign committee organized under W.S. 22-25-101, directly or indirectly through any officer, member, director or employee, shall contribute funds, other items of value or election assistance directly to any candidate or group of candidates. No person shall solicit or receive a payment or contribution from an organization prohibited from making contributions under this subsection.

# **SUGGESTED PROCEDURES FOR A SELF-AUDIT, 2025**

- These procedures can be completed a board or council member with understanding of the system, a clerk or treasurer from another special district or town (our recommendation is to exchange this service with another district or town), a local citizen who may be an active or retired bookkeeper and would volunteer to assist your entity, or by a paid independent third party, if desired.
- The treasurer/bookkeeper may assist in locating records, but the person doing the self-audit should independently select the transactions to be traced and verified.
- If your revenues or expenses are over \$100,000 and you do not have a CPA audit or review, this process is required.

The following steps are designed to provide evidence that the accounting work is done, that the entity's transactions are accurately and completely recorded, and that the officials have had access to the accounting records. These are tests commonly used by CPAs to assist them in forming an opinion on an entity's financial statements.

# **RECEIPTS TEST:**

- 1. Randomly *select* 10 receipts from the receipt book.
- 2. *Trace* each one to the Receipts Journal (this is the first entry to the books).
- 3. *Verify* the amount, name, date, and the correct accounting category (taxes, water billing, grant or loan, etc.).
- 4. Add the total of the column in which it was entered.
- 5. *Trace* this total to the *Financial Statement* (or the next summary document), same category, for the month or quarter, whichever is used.
- 6. *Trace* the payment to the *bank deposit slip*; all the detail should agree, including the name, date and amount.
- 7. Trace the deposit slip to the reconciled bank statement.

# **EXPENDITURE TEST:**

- 1. Randomly select 10 check numbers from complete list of all check numbers.
- 2. Pull the related disbursement voucher, with invoice attached, from file.
- 3. Locate the canceled check from the bank.
- 4. Compare the canceled check, the entry to the disbursement journal, the voucher and the vendor invoice for agreement for the following items: a. payee name b. amount c. date agreement d. correct account classification in books.
- 5. Review the canceled check for any changes, erasures, white-outs.
- 6. If possible, review the canceled check for endorsements. (Should agree to payee name.)
- 7. If not known to you as a vendor, look in telephone book or online to see *if payee is a legitimate business*.

# **PAYROLL TEST:**

Review one month (in the fiscal year) of each bank's statements, for the following:

- 1. Verify that every *debit and credit on the bank statement* has either a canceled check, a deposit ticket, or a written bank record of a transaction.
- 2. Review every *check for the month* to make sure there are no unauthorized checks to employees or officials of the entity. Watch for any duplicate payroll amounts.
- 3. For each check, make sure that there are no whiteouts or other alterations.
- 4. Trace the month's payroll checks to the recording entries in the journals.
- 5. Review the payroll records for one quarter and agree to the IRS Form 941. Verify that the information on the form agrees to the actual liability shown on the records.
- 6. Agree the year end IRS form W-2 to the entity payroll records.

# **FINANCIAL STATEMENTS:**

Trace the monthly column totals from the detailed postings of the General Ledger to the Financial Statement report and make sure they agree.

# **GRANT AND LOAN ACCOUNTING (if applicable):**

Review the request for payment reimbursement file. Make sure that all requests have the supporting vendor charges (copies) in the file. Review the grant agreement for your entity's compliance with all of the terms of the grant.

If you find any exceptions to the testing, ask the treasurer/bookkeeper for an explanation. If you still have some questions, please call the Department of Audit at (307) 777-7799.

Attached are forms to use in recording the testing procedures, keep a copy for your records.

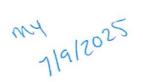
