Mayor Cleveland declared that based upon the declaration of immediate hazard determined on July 16, 2025, and the findings of this hearing, the Commission does continue that this structure has been found dangerous or unsafe. The Commission orders the structure to be removed and the site to continue to be made safe until completion of the removal. Said removal is to commence October 24th and be completed by October 31st. If the structure is not removed by said date, the city will cause the removal and the cost of such will be paid by the property owner. Mayor Cleveland closed the public hearing.

17. Dangerous Structure Resolution No 1169 208 E Main Boyd 2025

RESOLUTION NO. 1169

A RESOLUTION FINDING THAT THE STRUCTURE LOCATED ON LOT FIVE (5) IN BLOCK FIFTY-ONE (51) IN THE CITY OF ANTHONY, HARPER COUNTY, KANSAS, COMMONLY KNOWN AND REFERRED TO AS 208 E MAIN ST ANTHONY, KANSAS, IS DANGEROUS OR UNSAFE AND DIRECTING THAT THE STRUCTURE BE REMOVED AND THE PREMISES MADE SAFE AND SECURE.

WHEREAS, the Enforcing Officer of the City of Anthony, Kansas did on the 16th day of July 2025, file with the governing body of said City a statement in writing that a certain structure, hereinafter described, was dangerous or unsafe; and,

WHEREAS, the governing body did by Resolution No. 1161 dated the 16th day of July 2025, fix the time and place of a hearing at which the owner, his or her agent, lienholders, any occupants and all other parties of interest of such structure could appear and show cause why such structure should not be condemned and ordered repaired or demolished, and provided for giving notice thereof as provided by law; and,

WHEREAS, Resolution No. 1161 was published in the official city paper on the 23rd day of July 2025, and on the 30th day of July 2025, and a copy of said resolution was served upon all persons entitled thereto as provided by law; and,

WHEREAS, on the 2nd day of September 2025, the governing body did conduct the hearing scheduled in Resolution No. 1161 and took evidence from the following: the enforcing officer, Kenny Hodson on behalf of the city. The following parties in interest failed to appear or appeared and did not present evidence: David Boyd

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF ANTHONY, KANSAS, THAT:

1. The governing body hereby finds that the structure located at:

LOT FIVE (5) IN BLOCK FIFTY- ONE (51) IN THE CITY OF ANTHONY, HARPER COUNTY, KS.

and commonly known and referred to as 208 E MAIN ST, Anthony, Kansas, is dangerous or unsafe and directs that such structure is to be removed and the premises made safe and secure.

2. The owner of such structure is hereby directed to commence the removal of the property within 30 days from the date of publication of this resolution (not later than the 10th day of October 2025,) and to have the removal completed within 7 days of the date of commencement (not later than the 24th day of October, 2025). Provided, that upon due application by the owner and for good cause shown, the governing body, in its sole discretion, may grant the owner additional time to complete the removal of the property. The owner shall bear full responsibility for any and all expenses associated with the removal of the structure and making the premises safe and secure.

APPEAL, Any person affected by an order issued by the governing body under this resolution may, within 30 days following service of the order, petition the district court of Harper County for an injunction restraining the enforcing officer from carrying out the provisions of the order pending final disposition of the case.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that if the owner fails to commence the repair or removal of the structure within the time provided herein or fails to diligently prosecute the same until it is completed, the governing body may take such further action as it deems necessary to raze and remove the structure without further notice to the owner or other parties in interest.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Clerk or designated representative shall cause this Resolution to be published once in the official city paper and mail a copy to the owner, agents, lienholders, occupants, and other parties in interest.

AND WHEREAS, the City of Anthony's Personnel Policies and Guidelines needs to be amended to reflect a new and updated Pay Range Plan.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF ANTHONY, KANSAS:

Section 1. Appendix D to the City of Anthony's Personnel Policies and Guidelines is hereby amended as follows:

Placement of new employees on the pay scale above the minimum wage for that position can be considered for existing job-related experience as follows:

- a. No or minimal experience (<3 years) will be placed at the minimum of their wage grade.
- b. 3-5 years verifiable experience in a similar role may be placed 3%-4% above the minimum grade (higher placement if work was in a municipality or similar agency).
- c. Greater than 5 years of experience may be placed 5%-15% above depending upon the number of years of verifiable experience.

The City Administrator shall establish the pay for seasonal, part-time, or temporary employees. The Anthony Recreation Commission shall establish the pay for the part-time Recreation Director.

WHEREAS, the property owner has not alleviated the alleged violations nor requested a hearing before the City Commission within the time periods specified;

WHEREAS, the public officer and other agents of the City of Anthony presents this Resolution to the City Commission;

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COMMISSION that the Public Officers and other Agents of the City of Anthony are authorized to abate the conditions causing the violations at the end of September 26, 2025, and;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the cost incurred by the City shall be charged against the Lot or Lots or parcel of ground on which the nuisance or nuisances were located. The City Clerk shall, at the time of certifying other taxes to the County Clerk certify the cost as provided and the County Clerk shall extend the same on the tax roll and it shall be collected by the County Treasurer and paid to the City as other City taxes are collected and paid.

Amount is due from property owner(s) for services rendered by the City of Anthony upon presentation of bill. Failure of property owner(s) to pay amount due may result in the City bringing an action in district court, or causing a special assessment to be levied on the property, or any other manner of collection provided by law.

I was asked several months ago by City Administrator Cyndra Kastens to look at the properties in Anthony to see if there were any properties that I thought might need to be inspected for dangerous structures. I made a list of several homes and a couple of businesses that I thought could be a dangerous structure and I sent the list to Mark Manville, which is with IBTS a company the city has hired to do inspections for the city. Mark later asked me to take pictures of the properties and send them to him, and he would contact me and set up a date for an inspector to come to inspect the properties. The list included the property at 206 E. Main. The business on the property had a large hole in the roof in the middle of the building and the south wall and part of the roof had collapsed.

On 07/15/2025 Mr. Manville contacted Cyndra and set a date of 07/16/2025 for the inspections of the properties. On 07/16/2025 I met with Edythe Leslie, the inspector for IBTS, and I took her around to several properties for her to inspect, including the property at 206 E. Main.

The inspector will forward me her inspection report and copies of her photos as soon as she completes it.

City of Anthony Ordinance: building

ORDINANCE NO. G-2865

7-502. Definitions.

For the purpose of this article, the following words and terms shall have the following meanings:

- (a) Enforcement Officer means the building inspector or police chief,
- (<u>b</u>) <u>Structure</u> shall include any building, wall, superstructure, or other structure which requires location on the ground or is attached to something having a location on the ground.
- (c) <u>Dangerous or Unsafe Structure</u> A Structure in which conditions exist in such structure which are dangerous or injurious to the health, safety or morals of the occupants of such buildings or other residents of the municipality or which have an adverse impact on properties in the area. Such conditions may include, but are not limited to, the following: Defects increasing the hazards of fire, accident, or other calamities; air pollution; light or sanitary facilities; dilapidation; disrepair; structural defects, uncleanliness; walls, sidings or exteriors of a quality and appearance not commensurate with the character of the properties in the neighborhood; vermin infestation; inadequate drainage; or any violation of state or local health, fire, building or zoning regulations including violations of construction permitting processes which cause a Structure to remain in a state as described herein.




7-511. Immediate lazard.

When in the opinion of the governing body any structure is in such condition as to constitute an immediate hazard requiring immediate action to protect the public, the governing body may direct the enforcing officer to without delay. Such action may be taken without prior notice to or hearing of the owners, agents, lien holders erect barricades or cause the property to be vacated, demolished, repaired, shored or otherwise made safe and occupants. The cost of any action under this section shall be assessed against the property as provided in section 7-510.



The Unsecure structures interior exists with a concrete floor approximately 4" thick has collapsed along with structural supports causing the roof to buckle and start collapsing. It does not appear to have any further supports for the brick walls other than the concrete holding the bricks together. The front of this structure faces Main St along a commonly used sidewalk.










N. Side interior of 208 seen through opening.

This structure is unfit for habitation. The primary structure from the street is a definite blight due to do the deterioration of exterior paint, overgrowth of grass/natural vegetation. There are some open windows on the 2nd floor and the window above the air conditioner N of the deteriorated front door is broken out. Another window is broken out with a wood plank sticking out of it.

The roof is deteriorated; window frames are deteriorated.



Admin Report:

- 1. EPA Tech Assistance: We have the Draft Preliminary Engineering Report ready for the Commission to review. Though the Engineering team has moved to final recommendations (which is to replace the pipe) I would still like to see the non-broken piece of pipe we cut out of the line tested. The team moved away from testing this since the city has already tested pipe twice in the past. However, both pieces were broken pipes. You cannot do a pressure test on broken pipe. At the same time, it would not change the concluding recommendation to replace the pipe. So it remains a question as to whether the results warrant the cost of the test. This will be discussed further at our next team meeting. Geotech results identified the weak bedding as the primary cause (not rock impingement as was determined from the lab in Colorado). Again however, since geology is an issue with the existing line, according to this report, it would make rehab options like sliplining, cured-in-place-pipe, pipe bursting, and spray-in-place lining (and mudjacking) not feasible since poor Geotech conditions are not conditions that pipe rehab can solve. These other solutions would result in a temporary fix that would end up costing the city more money and resources. The PER concludes that the only solution is the replacement of the transmission main and bedding. Once we have worked through the final versions of the draft PER, I will email it to you for review. The engineering team will be attending the October 21st Commission meeting via zoom to present the report officially.
- 2. Water Main Replacement Funding Initiatives This will become its own category since we will need to come up with approximately \$22 million dollars (according to the PER OPC). As you know I will be presenting at the Kansas Water Summit on October 8th to broaden the knowledge (hopefully in the ear of some legislators) of the city's plight with our water main. The more that know, the more chance we might have at funding opportunities. Additionally, on September 30th at 10:10 p.m. I submitted the grant to the Kansas Water Office to apply for \$7,643,922 to pay for the final engineering plan for the replacement of the entire 16" main and the actual construction replacement of 2 miles of the main. Since we know we do not have \$22 million today to pay for the project, and since the max amount we can ask for through the Kansas Water Office is \$8 million, the engineering team and I came up with a phased approach to the replacement of the main. Doing 1-2 miles per phase depending on what I can secure in funding. I will explain this in greater detail when the PER is presented to the Commission. For now, though, I had a deadline, already had commission approval to apply, and didn't want to miss this window of funding. It's super competitive and the KWO has never been awarded a grant larger than \$3.6 million, so the

chances are pretty slim for award but at least we can say we tried. Awards will be announced in February 2026.

I worked all weekend to prepare the presentation for the Kansas Water Summit. If anyone would like a copy of the slide deck presentation for review, please let me know.

- 3. Sunrise 2nd House construction is finally underway. I have continued to meet with prospective buyers of interest. It will be time to deal with the KHITC tax credits next. We are working on an agreement with the local bank to escrow the credits so the city can release them per lot instead of releasing all of them up front to the main builder. The lots were always intended to be on a per lot benefit basis. More to come on this.
- 4. KCC 40101d Grant We have received word that KCC, and the DOE must take all necessary steps to minimize incurring any new federal costs meaning, KCC cannot pull down funds for grant reimbursements. We do not know what this means for the ability to reclaim costs on our 40101d project. However, these projects were on our capital plan and the scope of the project (replacement of two alleys and four in-town sub reclosers) must still be done either way. I plan to have a backup plan for the funding as we still need to proceed. Let me know if you want to have this on the agenda. Otherwise, I plan to continue with the project and will keep you posted as it progresses. Materials have been ordered, and we are on KMEA's work list to perform the alley replacements.
- 5. 2025 Tax Sale I am continuing to work with Brandon on the topic of the county clearing the city's special assessments at the tax sale, especially as the date looms closer. Currently, there are five properties on the sale with a total between the five of \$3,681 in specials that will be lost. We are continuing to work, but I am not feeling hopeful that this is going to be resolved by this tax sale. We will keep at it.
- 6. Lake Trail We opened bids for the lake trail construction on September 26th. At the meeting I will have a bid tab with the bidding results and a vetted recommendation to award a bidder. I did not include this information in the packet since it is still an open bid and not subject to public records. Next step we will be finalizing the 2 easements for the trail project: 1. The permanent easement for the trail. 2. Construction easement which will be slightly wider during construction only. Be prepared at this point that the city agreed to allow the landowner to connect two RV's to our city RV dump station in lieu of payment for the easement. The landowner-owned RV's will not be on city property; they will remain on private property located just east of the dump station. The city will give them an easement to run their sewer line across our property and connect to our dump station. The city will make the tap on the dump station, but the landowner's plumber will be responsible for the installation of the line to our connection. Please let me know during the meeting if there are any questions about this as I move into the preparation of legal document phase of the project.

Additionally, now that we know the project cost, we will need to bid out the electrical lighting. I asked Jerry to have some lighting options for you at this meeting. I have not received those yet so I am not sure what I will have to show but basically, we I want to know if the Commission has

any preference for lighting i.e. solar or regular wired lights like street lighting, decorative or non-decorative, etc. For the sake of formality, I have added to the consent agenda to bid out the electrical lighting for the Lake Trail project. Just to have that covered while I am thinking about it. You can still take some time to decide what type to bid.

- 7. KMU Asset Management Video Kansas Municipal Utilities through WSU was present on September 17th to shoot the new asset management training video. KMU asked the City of Anthony to be a part of this video to share our testimony and inspire other cities to incorporate the asset management utility planning that we have (what I call our department operations plans). I want to give hats off to Larry Berry who had an excellent testimony to share with other cities but due to filming location he did not end up being in the video at the last minute. It is a very big loss for KMU because he could have really reached other department heads across Kansas with his experience of department operations planning. However, we are still thankful for the opportunity to be in the video. Matt was filmed from the perspective of someone just learning. We hope we can inspire other communities to incorporate the same utility management planning that has brought so much success to Anthony.
- 8. Harper County Appraiser I have met with the new Harper County Appraiser, Joe Pennycuff, twice now in the last two weeks to discuss topics such as HRP's and AVRP's (since the multijurisdictional agreement is expiring at the end of 2025) and incorrectly classed city properties (such as the ID Board Land at Garfield and LL&G). From these conversations, it does appear that he tentatively agrees with the few classification corrections. Hopefully those will be cleared up soon. We will check back in a few weeks for the changes.
- 9. USD361 Superintendent I have met with Chris Wetzel, USD361 Interim Superintendent. He requested the meeting to discuss the HRP/AVRP agreement and also the letter the school board received from the city regarding the USD361 Tennis Courts. Since he is new, he mostly needed assistance with historical information on the two issues. Now that he is versed on the topic, I will leave the request in his hands to share with the school board.
- 10. Community Solar Project Still working on it. I will not say too much more here since this does involve the acquisition of real estate, but we are still working through the agreement legalities. If you want me to schedule an executive session to bring you up to speed let me know. Otherwise, once the details are taken care of, I will bring in a contract for approval and can explain at that time. Additionally, the feasibility study numbers are simply waiting on me to finish the RFP and send it out. I am trying but do not have it finalized just yet.
- 11. Solar Customer Billing After the Air Tour was a wrap, I had to spend many days auditing the account of a solar customer who was concerned that the billing did not look right. Final conclusions of the audit showed two things: 1. The multipliers were wrong, and we were over billing them and over crediting their solar. 2. On some accounts the solar does not appear to be offsetting their load as best as it was hoped it would. I have been communicating with the account holder, and we have discussed these items. This is the same account that the city was historically underbilling to the tune of approximately \$50K. We did not require repayment of that under billing

in 2024. Now it appears since September 2024 the city has been overbilling and over crediting. When you balance the two (I am not quite finished yet) it will end up with the city owing the customer money of which I do intend to pay. Let me know if you want this on an agenda item to discuss or explain further.

- 12. Copier The new copier is finally here, and our IT rep has it connected to our server. It is online and operational!
- 13. PD Cruiser One of the officers' vehicles was backed into from a sheriff department vehicle. Minor damage, estimated between \$3k-\$3k to repair. It will be turned into the sheriff department insurance.
- 14. City Software Update I am placing this item on the agenda, but I still need time to review a few more pieces. I may or may not pull it back down and wait for the next meeting depending on how much I can get reviewed Tuesday before the meeting. If I can get it done, I will have copies on your desks for review since it will be a bid tab and not subject to open record yet, I did not attach it to the packet.
- 15. City Staff We have had an interview for the water department and extended an offer. Fingers crossed.
- 16. City Uniforms The shirts have been in for a few weeks, and I believe we are waiting for printing at Anthony Republican so they should be here soon. The pants have turned into a whole different legal issue as just providing a stipend for pants constitutes a taxable employee benefit. Jamie has spent a large amount of time on the phone trying to find ways around this. We are quite honestly exhausted over the issue so I have directed here to contact the HR Company we used for the last wage study and ask them to craft a policy that complies with law that we can write into our personnel handbook and get moving on the jeans. Hopefully they can help us get past this hurdle and get this finally taken care of.
- 17. Kansas Association of Airports I attended the KAA conference last week in Garden City. A couple of large takeaways: 1. There is a lot legally we need to be doing at our airport. Since we are trying to position ourselves for larger economic development and or future aviation generation training, it will be important that we do not fly so under the radar on these safety and legal procedures. At some point, when I have time (that's funny) I hope to take all the notes I made and at least try to incorporate some of the safety basics. 2. I made two additional contacts that I will hopefully meet with in the next couple of months that will help the city lay the groundwork for how to get started with economic development. I plan to bring the Anthony Eco Devo Board, the Airport Board, and the two Commissioners appointed for the airport (Greg and Eric) to assist once I have got the communications locked in enough to know how these contacts can assist and what those steps look like to get started. More to come. 3. Anthony was given a special shoutout during the conference for how we did our Air Tour stop. The president of the Air Tour said, "We always knew what we hoped the airports could do with the air tour and the curriculum, but Anthony
































































































