This two-year project was selected as overall runner-up by The Associated General Contractors of America, Inc. City Manager Frazer along with Mayor Warren accepted the award during the Associated Contractors of Kansas State Building Awards luncheon on Friday, February 23, 2024.

City Manager Frazer delightfully announced the appointment of Jim Holloway as Chief of Police flactorium, in Arkansas City Police Department, effective February 24, 2024. Chief Holloway brings a wealth of experience and expertise to his new position having served under six ACPD Chiefs, including Bill Rice, Oren Skiles, Dan Givens, Sean Wallace, Dan Ward, and Eric Burr.

City Clerk Parsons officially swore in Holloway as Police Chief. Chief Holloway's wife, Teresa of 32 years, pinned his new collar brass to his uniform with honor.

New Business

City Clerk Parsons offered the following items for consideration:

City Manager Department

1. An Ordinance annexing, incorporating within, and adding territory to the City of Arkansas City, Cowley County, Kansas, a municipal corporation in conformity with the provisions of K.S.A § 12-520c and all acts amendatory thereof or supplemental thereto, at a location commonly known as 28379 81st Rd., Arkansas City, KS.

Principal Planner White prompted that the 5-acre tract on 81st road, owned by Etzanoa Conservancy, who filed a petition with the city to annex the property into the city limits was adopted on January 16, 2023 by Resolution 2024-01-3593. This approved request prompted the city to file said resolution with the Board of County Commissioners of Cowley County, to make the determination the annexation of land at 28379 81st Road will not prevent growth or hinder the development of the area. This request succeeds the proposal submitted to the County Commission who on February 6, 2024, passed Resolution No. 24-04 authorizing the city to continue with the annexation process.

Motion made by Commissioner Beeson, jointly Seconded by Commissioner Stover and Commissioner Tweedy to approve the item as written.

Roll Call Voting Yea: Commissioner Beeson, Commissioner Spielman, Commissioner Stover, Commissioner Tweedy, and Mayor Warren. Mayor Warren declared the motion approved; given **Ordinance No. 2024-03-4604**.

Section III, Item 1.

2. An Ordinance authorizing the rezoning of 28379 81st Road, from "R-1" (Low Density Residentia "R-3" (High Density Residential District).

Principal Planner White explained that when a property is annexed, it automatically comes in as an R-1 classification, so for this reason the known use would need to be changed for encompass this facility.

Motion made by Commission Stover, Seconded by Commissioner Spielman to accept an Ordinance authorizing the rezoning of 28379 81st Road, from "R-1" (Low Density Residential District) to "R-3" (High Density Residential District).

Roll Call Voting Yea: Commissioner Beeson, Commissioner Spielman, Commissioner Stover, Commissioner Tweedy, and Mayor Warren. Mayor Warren declared the motion approved; given **Ordinance No. 2024-03-4605**.

3. An Ordinance granting a conditional use permit to allow a non-profit institution of an educational nature in an R-3, High Density Residential District, located at 28379 81st Road requested by the Etzanoa Conservancy, in the City of Arkansas City, Kansas.

This item requires a condition use permit to be applied due to the zoning. Principial Planning White explained the following included conditions: 1.) Traffic shall not be permitted to travel north of the site on 81st Road; 2.) All parking shall be onsite.

Motion made by Commission Beeson, Seconded by Commissioner Stover to accept an Ordinance granting a conditional use permit to allow a non-profit institution of an educational nature in an R-3, High Density Residential District, located at 28379 81st Road requested by the Etzanoa Conservancy, in the City of Arkansas City, Kansas.

Roll Call Voting Yea: Commissioner Beeson, Commissioner Spielman, Commissioner Stover, Commissioner Tweedy, and Mayor Warren. Mayor Warren declared the motion approved; given **Ordinance No. 2024-03-4606**.

4. A Resolution authorizing the City of Arkansas City to cover a portion of the roof replacement costs to the City owned building located at 115 E. Radio Ln., currently occupied by the City-Cowley County Health Department, for an amount not to exceed \$13,631.67.

Randy spoke the city owned building having a lease agreement with the City-Cowley County Health Department, where the health department is responsible for building repairs but they only have \$20,000.00 budgeted. City staff would like to pick up the \$13,000.00 difference which covers code related item.

Motion made by Commissioner Beeson, jointly Seconded by Commissioner Stover and Commissioner Tweedy to approve the item as written.

Voice Voting Yea: Commissioner Beeson, Commissioner Spielman, Commissioner Stover, Commissioner Tweedy, and Mayor Warren. Mayor Warren declared the motion approved; given **Resolution No. 2024-03-3603**.

5. Hear from Walnut Valley Disc Golf Association Representative Arty Hicks on ideas for a course expansion at Knebler Pond.

Hicks spoke of needing to re-do the adoption contract for another two years, as the group did in 2021 and expanding the course by another 18 baskets on the northeast side of the course to make it even more challenging and attract more disc golfers. The group has self-funded all improvements with donations to the course so far. The current Public Land Adoption Agreement adopted by Resolution 2022-04-3470 is set to expire April 5, 2024. Staff will work on developing an updated contract with the added improvements for expansion.

Public Services Department

1. A Resolution authorizing the City of Arkansas City to accept a bid from Wichita Tractor Company, to purchase a 2024 Kubota utility vehicle, for an amount not to exceed, \$20,897.00.

Public Services Superintendent Tapia revealed that this new 2024 Kubota UTV will replace the current 2012 John Deere Gator with a trade in cost of \$1,800.00. Staff recommends the 2024 Kubota UTV Model No. RTV-X1100CWL-H due to it meeting all the specs including having a hydraulic dump bed and it will be utilized to spray chemicals, provide snow removal, and service levee walking path trash routes and signage. This purchase will be split between two budgets.

Motion made by Commissioner Spielman, Seconded by Commissioner Tweedy to approve the item as written.

Voice Voting Yea: Commissioner Beeson, Commissioner Spielman, Commissioner Stover, Commissioner Tweedy, and Mayor Warren. Mayor Warren declared the motion approved; given **Resolution No. 2024-03-3604**.

City resident Jeff Judd of 1112 N. 3rd, inquired about how to get funding for the Docking Gardens at Wilson Park. He will partner with City Manager Frazer later in the week for information.

County resident Russell Graves of 6916 306th Ln. extended an invitation to the commission and community leaders to attend a fentanyl forum at Rivers Eagle Bar and Grill.

City Manager Updates & Reminders

City Manager Frazer provided the following reminders and updates before the commission.

- 1. Staff is to meet with PEC on February 28th to:
 - Go over the CCLIP application
 - Review of CIP and possible funding sources
 - Explore more funding opportunities for Safe Streets program
 - Discuss the Passenger Rail Station assessment to make sure it meets ADA standards
 - Consider a street condition assessment
- 2. Walking Trail Update Staff to meet with Local Road Engineer Matt Grahm with KDOT and Project Designer/Surveyor Chris Meinen with Smith and Oaks on February 29th to work out final plan so the project can go out for bids.
- 3. Meet with Winfield City Manager and Cowley County administrator to discuss ambulance and fire district funding. The last three years the city wasn't full funded as it should be.
- 4. City Attorney Schwartz and City Manager Frazer will meet with Foulston Siefkin and other participating cities on March 13th to discuss the Evergy street light rate case results.
- 5. Affordable Equity Partners have been invited to submit a full application to KHRC due May 10th.
- 6. Alfredo Sampayo and Partners did not receive tax credits but are moving forward with Sleeth Project, still waiting on Brownfield phase 1.
- 7. City Manger Frazer and Municipal Project Manager Rizzio met with the Cowley County Clerk about possible election date for a half-cent sales tax to work on the street improvement projects.

Purpose: A Resolution authorizing the City of Arkansas City to enter into an agreement with Aging

Projects Inc. (API), for provision of nutritional services at the Senior Citizens Center, term

effective October 1, 2023 to September 30, 2024. (Voice Vote)

Background:

API is a not-for-profit corporation operating under a contract with the South-Central Kansas Area Agency on Aging (SCKAAA) to provide nutrition services, including congregate mails services, home delivered meal services, and nutritional information to senior residents over a ten-county area in South Central Kansas.

API shall reimburse the City monthly for payroll, Medicare, and FICA in accord with a budget mutually agreed upon by API in the SCKAAA contact as listed in Schedule 1. This agreement has been modified back to an annual renewal of the agreement with API effective October 1, 2023 to September 30, 2024. Previously, on September 15, 2015 via Resolution 2015-09-2991, the agreement had been modified only to add provisions for automatic yearly renewals.

Normally API facility agreements are sent by Oct. 1st every year. API has gone through recent turnover in staff causing these facility agreements to not get completed. For this reason, API would like to bring the agreement back to an annual basis.

RESOLUTION NO. 2024-03-

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY OF ARKANSAS CITY TO CONTRACT WITH AGING PROJECTS, INC. TO PROVIDE PERSONNEL MANAGEMENT SERVICES AND BUILDING SPACE TO ALLOW API TO PROVIDE NUTRITION SERVICES, INCLUDING CONGREGATE MEAL SERVICES, HOME DELIVERED MEAL SERVICES AND NUTRITIONAL INFORMATION TO SENIOR RESIDENTS OVER A TEN COUNTY AREA IN SOUTH CENTRAL KANSAS, FOR A TERM EFFECTIVE OCTOBER 1, 2023 UNTIL SEPTEMBER 30, 2024.

WHEREAS, it is in the public interest for the City of Arkansas City to contract with a third party to provide meals to senior citizens that are unable to provide meals for themselves; and

WHEREAS, the governing body of the City of Arkansas City has reviewed and accepted the proposed AGREEMENT between Aging Projects, Inc. and the City of Arkansas City, Kansas attached hereto, and finds that such Agreement is proper and necessary to fulfill a needed service required by the City of Arkansas City.

NOW, THEREFORE, IN CONSIDERATION OF THE AFORESTATED PREMISES, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF ARKANSAS CITY, KANSAS:

SECTION ONE: That the Governing Body of the City of Arkansas City hereby authorizes the City Manager to execute the above-referenced Agreement with Aging Projects, Inc. to provide meals to the City's senior citizens from **October 1, 2023, until September 30, 2024**. Such Agreement is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

SECTION TWO: The Governing Body of the City of Arkansas City hereby authorizes City Staff of the City of Arkansas City to take such further and other necessary actions that are required to effectuate the intent and purposes of this Legislative Enactment.

AGREEMENT

This Agreement made and entered into this	day of	, by and between the
City of Arkansas City, hereinafter referred to as	"City", and	Aging Projects, Inc., hereinafter
referred to as "API".		

PURPOSE:

API is a not-for-profit corporation operating under a contract with the South-Central Kansas Area Agency on Aging (SCKAAA) to provide nutrition services, including congregate meal services, home delivered meal services and nutritional information to senior residents over a tencounty area in South Central Kansas. The City of Arkansas City is a municipal corporation operating under Kansas statues and home rule authorities applicable to cities of the second class. The city owns and operates a Senior Citizens Center located at 320 S A Street. The purpose of this Agreement is for the City to enter into an agreement with API for the provision of personnel management services and building space.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY AGREED BY AND BETWEEN THE CITY AND API AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Personnel Management. The City will supply API with personnel management services sufficient to provide nutritional services that meet Federal and State regulations as outlined through the South-Central Kansas Area Agency on Aging. All employees managed by the City will be City Employees and shall be governed by the City's rules and regulations as outlined in the City personnel handbook. The City shall have sole discretion in the hiring and termination procedures of all employees. API shall reimburse the City monthly for payroll, Medicare, and FICA in accord with a budget mutually agreed upon by API in the SCKAAA contract as listed in Schedule 1. The City shall be allowed at its discretion to increase the pay and benefits of staff retained to perform work for API to conform to other similar City staff. City staff retained to work for API will perform their duties in accord with standards and protocols established by API and or SCKAAA. Any concerns about staff qualifications, training or performance will be addressed and resolved by the city within a reasonable time frame agreed to by API.

SECTION 2. *Space*. The City shall provide API with space in the building for preparation of meals, storage of commodities, serving congregate meals and for distribution of prepared meals to the home delivered or satellite congregate meal programs. Kitchen facilities shall be available for use for API meal service during hours necessary for preparation of meals and clean up. The dining room will be available from 10:00am to 1:30pm on days that services are provided by API. Excluded days shall be November 23 and 24, 2023; December 25 and 26, 2023; January 1 and 15, 2024; March 29, 2024; May 27, 2024; June 19, 2024; July 4, 2024; and September 2, 2024, or as mutually agreed between API and the City. Designated storage areas are available to API on a continuous basis throughout the term of the Lease. API may provide a breakfast program if it so chooses. If so, the dining room will be available from 8:00am to 9:00am. API shall reimburse the City for any additional payroll expenses due to additional breakfast programs based on the rate of pay outlined in their agreement with SCKAAA.

Page 2

The city will be responsible for all ordinary and extraordinary repairs to the building facility including the space occupied by API.

The city will be responsible for payment of the cost of all utilities for the senior center including the utility charges generated by API's use of the facility. In its use of the facility API will conduct its operations in an energy efficient fashion, consistent with best practices for the operation of a commercial kitchen.

The kitchen and storage areas designated for API use will have lockable doors at access points. API will have a key to the doors and may restrict access, as it may deem appropriate to maintain the security of its commodities and equipment and to prevent injury or accident from unauthorized persons using the equipment. API will provide the city with a list of all persons to whom it provides a key to any of the doors. This list will be added to the master list of persons holding keys maintained at the Center. Any equipment locks as well as persons having keys to those locks will also be reported to the Senior Center Director. The Senior Center Director shall have the right of entry to all areas of the Senior Center and shall maintain master keys to all locks in the facility for inspection and emergency purposes.

The kitchen and equipment shall be available for use during hours that it is not in use by API or the City, in accordance with City policy requirements. No kitchen equipment may be taken off the premises without express permission of API. No API food products may be used without the express permission of API. The city may require a cleanup deposit to cover the cost of cleaning the kitchen if the group using the kitchen fails to do so.

SECTION 3: *Equipment*. API agrees to provide all equipment necessary for the operation of the kitchen and storage rooms. The equipment will be maintained in safe and sanitary condition according to generally accepted standards. The city will provide utility hookups to the equipment. API will provide the city with an inventory listing API equipment in the Center to be kept in the Center office.

The City will provide all tables and chairs necessary for the serving of congregate meals in the dining room, provided that the City acknowledges that API originally provided 18 dining tables to the Center. The City and API will each provide for the necessary maintenance and replacement of their own equipment.

SECTION 4: <u>Commodities and Supplies</u>. API will provide all commodities and supplies necessary and appropriate for the operation of its nutrition program at the Center.

SECTION 5: <u>Donations and Accounting</u>. All donations to API for nutrition services provided to senior citizens or fees paid by others to the program will be received and accounted for by the City in accordance with API standard procedures. It is acknowledged that all center staff under the age of 60 shall be required to pay API the non-senior price for any API meals consumed.

All API and City fund raising will be kept separate, each entity following rules, regulations and guidelines set forth by their funding sources. Any donations made to the Center will be received by the City staff and accounted for as per policy set forth by API and the City. In addition, the City shall have the prerogative of augmenting the funds available for nutrition services if use of such funds is acceptable to API.

It is the specific intention of both API and the City that the Center operates smoothly as a coordinated, multifaceted program for the benefit and enjoyment of all senior citizens of Arkansas City.

SECTION 6: <u>Reports</u>. API will provide adequate monthly financial and service reports to the City on its nutrition operation. The city will provide API with monthly reports on the operation of the Center and the personnel services cost and staff hours provided. API shall be responsible for the completion of all regulatory report requirements outlined by SCKAAA and other State, Federal, and Local agencies. The City and Nutrition Manager shall be responsible for maintaining and submitting required information to API to meet requirements set forth by SCKAAA and other regulatory agencies.

SECTION 7: <u>Term.</u> This Agreement will be for the term of one year from and after October 1, 2023, until September 30, 2024, or may expire at the time SCKAAA reviews its annual agreement with API at the option of SCKAAA. Should at any time either API or the City become unable or unwilling to substantially perform its duties and responsibilities as set out hereinabove in this Agreement either through physical damaged to the facility, loss of funding or some other reason, the other party shall receive a "30 Day-Notice of Agreement Termination" in writing and the Agreement shall effectively terminate with neither party having further rights or responsibilities under the Agreement.

SECTION 8: *Insurance*. The City will purchase and keep in force a fire and extended coverage policy covering any damage to the building and contents. The City will purchase worker's compensation insurance naming API as an additional insured under this coverage. API will purchase property insurance for its equipment and commodities and a product liability policy covering its operations, naming the City as an additional insured under this coverage. Both the City and API shall be responsible for their own operations and shall hold each other harmless and indemnify each other against any claims for damages or injury arising out of their respective operations.

Now, the City and API hereinbelow affix their signatures to this Agreement and bind their heirs, successors and assigns to the faithful performance of the terms and conditions hereinabove set forth on the date first written above.
