CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Smith called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.

PLEDGE AND PRAYER

Councilman Adkins led the Pledge of Allegiance of the United States of America and the prayer.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

A motion was made by Councilman Kerrigan, Seconded by Councilman Smith, to approve the agenda. All approved by voice vote.

PUBLIC FORUM

Thomas Taylor - Mr. Taylor stated that he is concerned about connecting Skyview and Annette. He stated that there are a lot of kids on this road, and it would be hard for law enforcement to enforce the 20MPH speed limit. Mr. Taylor stated that there is a petition with approximately seventy-seven (77) signatures opposing the connection.

Michael Cook - Mr. Cook stated that he was concerned about Walker Trucking Co and the blasting in residential areas. He stated that he lives on Riverview Lane and the blasting occurs six (6) days a week. Mr. Cook asked if a permit for this was required.

Sandra Braden - Ms. Braden stated that she moved here 15 years ago after losing her home to Katrina. She stated that her house is always shaking, rattling, and her pictures are tilted. Ms. Braden stated that her dog is traumatized, hides, and shakes. She stated that the blasting happens 7 days a week from 6:15 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. and that she cannot even open her windows. Ms. Braden asked how this is allowed and stated that the elected officials needed to step up and represent the taxpayers.

NEW BUSINESS

1. Planning and Future Growth: Financial Forecasting Work Session Mr. Rick Gregory presented the board with some handouts and a slide show. Councilman Kerrigan asked if they could have different guidelines for developers. Mr. Gregory stated they could, but it is touchy and hard to do as an elected body. Councilman Greer stated that Franklin is a good example of things to come. Mr. Gregory stated that we need to focus on the downtown area. Councilman Smith asked if we would continue to allow someone to buy a property and build multiple tiny houses on it. Mr. Gregory stated that they can fix it with setbacks and zones. Councilman Greer stated that he would like to have a committee of seven (7) members; two (2) council members, two (2) planning members, (2) members of the public, and the mayor. After much discussion, it was decided that they would like one person from each district on the committee, three (3) members of the community, and they would need to apply. A motion was made by Vice Mayor Greer, Seconded by Councilman Smith, to add this item to the September Workshop agenda. Voting Yea: Mayor Smith, Vice Mayor Greer, Councilman Adkins, Councilman Kerrigan, Councilman Smith, Councilman Thompson, Councilman Young.

Ms. Noe stated that this is a standard form of what is expected of all the parties and the City. A motion was made by Vice Mayor Greer, Seconded by Councilman Kerrigan, to approve the agreement. Voting Yea: Mayor Smith, Vice Mayor Greer, Councilman Adkins, Councilman Kerrigan, Councilman Smith, Councilman Thompson, Councilman Young.

Valerie Kemp - Ms. Kemp stated that she was speaking on behalf of the possible ban of fireworks. She stated that there is nothing more American than fireworks and that she was unaware of any problems. Ms. Kemp stated that she would be concerned about the council passing a law that limits the citizens from being able to participate. She stated that her second concern is regarding the Planning and Growth Committee and that it should be made up of 3 to 4 citizens per ward and not of current council and board members.

Patsy Smiley - Ms. Smiley stated that she was granted a building permit in August to build a deck on her rental property. She stated that she submitted drawings, paid the fees, everything was issued, and then she was told a mistake was made and she had to come ask for a variance because of setbacks. Ms. Smiley stated that she had already spent over \$4000.00, and the city admitted a mistake was made. She asked what she should do as a citizen.

Thomas Taylor - Mr. Taylor stated that he was concerned about the connection of Skyview and Annette. He stated that their questions have not been answered. Mr. Taylor stated they want to know how to stop it from happening and if not, how to control the speeding.

3. Caldwell Nature Park Discussion

Mr. Clark stated that a few months ago they had gotten some numbers together. He stated that they spoke about an 800sq foot building there and to do that with the parking lot, paving, and septic system it would cost \$175,000. Mr. Clark stated that is without the cost of manning it. Councilman Smith stated that Ms. Crisp was willing to donate the majority of the money. Ms. Bowman stated that Josh Wright will be at the November workshop to present his plans for the park in the city. A motion was made by Councilman Thompson, Seconded by Councilman Smith, to table this discussion until the November workshop meeting. All approved by voice vote.

4. Ordinance: Amend Title 9 Chapter 2- Peddlers Ms. Noe stated this is for second and final reading. She stated the ordinance was outdated. A motion was made by Councilman Kerrigan, Seconded by Councilman Adkins, to approve the amendment. Voting Yea: Mayor Smith, Councilman Adkins, Councilman Kerrigan, Councilman

Smith, Councilman Thompson, Councilman Young.

NEW BUSINESS

5. Ordinance: Modify Title 7, Chapter 6 Fireworks

Mr. Nicholson stated that the Planning Commission had recommended to ban all fireworks. Ms. Noe stated that this is basically to rescind our current ordinance. Councilman Adkins asked about limiting to only professional displays. Ms. Noe stated that it was talked about, but it would put a hefty expense on some people. Councilman Kerrigan asked why they were governing this if there is no problem. He stated that the people have not had a voice in this, and the firework stands bring a few jobs to the community. Councilman Adkins stated that we should have a drought plan in place, but regardless people are going to do it. He asked how it would be regulated. Chief Walker stated that if we are not going to ban them, we should at least shorten the time on when they can shoot them. Councilman Smith asked if this could be deferred. A motion was made by Councilman Smith, Seconded by Councilman Kerrigan, to defer. All approved by voice vote.

6. Memorial Dedications Discussion

Mr. Clark stated that he had a few phone calls regarding memorial dedications in the parks and trails. He stated that they are asking about benches and trees and the city has nothing in writing regarding them. Mr. Clark asked for the council's opinion. Councilman Thompson stated he did not see an issue as long as there are limitations. Ms. Bowman stated that the City of Clarksville does something like this. Councilman Thompson requested to defer this discussion so that we can look into it more. A motion was made by Councilman Thompson, Seconded by Councilman Young, to defer. All approved by voice vote.

7. Gun Range for PD

Chief Ray asked for approval to move forward. He stated that Josh Wright is drawing it up. A motion was made by Councilman Thompson, Seconded by Councilman Smith, to approve moving forward. Voting Yea: Mayor Smith, Councilman Adkins, Councilman Kerrigan, Councilman Smith, Councilman Thompson, Councilman Young.

8. Discussion on 510 Gloria Circle

Mr. Biggers stated that a sewer tap is \$3000.00, and the amount could be credited towards the installation. Ms. Noe stated that TCA 22-3302 explains the statute of limitations. Councilman Thompson stated that the city made a mistake and needs to pay it back. Councilman Kerrigan stated that the customer had the charges on their bill for twelve (12) years and no one noticed it. Ms. Kelly White stated that they thought they had sewer. Councilman Kerrigan stated that we have these laws for a reason, and this is an expensive mistake. After much discussion, a motion was made by Councilman Smith, Seconded by Councilman Thompson, to credit the full amount of \$2475.42 plus the new bill sewer amount. Voting Yea: Councilman Smith, Councilman Thompson. Voting Nay: Councilman Adkins, Councilman Kerrigan, Councilman Young, Mayor Smith. The motion failed. A motion was made by Councilman Kerrigan, Seconded by Councilman Young to approve a credit of \$1760.60 plus the new bill sewer amount and crediting the account. Voting Yea: Mayor Smith, Councilman Adkins, Councilman Kerrigan, Councilman Smith, Councilman Thompson, Councilman Young.

9. Skyview Drive Discussion

Mr. Nicholson stated that the original plat in 1975 shows the connection of Annette and Skyview. He stated that when Bell Construction presented their plat, it was approved. Councilman Young asked if there would be sidewalks. Mr. Nicholson stated no. Councilman Smith asked about speed bumps. Mr. Biggers stated that they had to be removable. Mr. Nicholson stated that emergency services want the connection. After much discussion, a motion was made by Councilman Smith, Seconded by Councilman Kerrigan, to defer this discussion. All approved by voice vote.

- 10. Planning and Future Growth Committee Discussion
 - Mr. Nicholson stated that the council has received all applications submitted. A motion was made by Councilman Young, Seconded by Councilman Kerrigan, to extend the application deadline until September 23, 2022, appoint two people per ward, review at workshop, and to interview at the October council meeting. Voting Yea: Mayor Smith, Councilman Adkins, Councilman Kerrigan, Councilman Smith, Councilman Thompson, Councilman Young.
- 11. CCCHS Football Bon Fire Donation
 - Mr. Clark stated that this is a donation for the Cheatham County High School bonfire. A motion was made by Councilman Adkins, Seconded by Councilman Kerrigan, to approve the donation. Voting Yea: Mayor Smith, Councilman Adkins, Councilman Kerrigan, Councilman Smith, Councilman Thompson, Councilman Young.
- 12. Panasonic FZ-55 Contract
 - Chief Ray stated that this agreement is for the laptops in the police cars. A motion was made by Councilman Thompson, Seconded by Councilman Kerrigan, to approve the agreement. Voting Yea: Mayor Smith, Councilman Adkins, Councilman Kerrigan, Councilman Smith, Councilman Thompson, Councilman Young.
- 13. Industrial Sewer Contract
 - Mr. Biggers stated that he suggests we keep the same rate. Ms. Bowman stated we need to deny this contract because they are going down. A motion was made by Councilman Thompson, Seconded by Councilman Smith, to deny the agreement. Voting Yea: Mayor Smith, Councilman Adkins, Councilman Kerrigan, Councilman Smith, Councilman Thompson, Councilman Young.
- 14. Cheatham County Library Agreement
 - Ms. Bowman stated this is the annual agreement with the library. A motion was made by Councilman Kerrigan, Seconded by Councilman Thompson, to approve the agreement. Voting Yea: Mayor Smith, Councilman Adkins, Councilman Kerrigan, Councilman Smith, Councilman Thompson, Councilman Young.
- 15. Benefits Inc Hold Harmless Agreement
 - Ms. Bowman stated that this the yearly contract where they file the ACA for us. Ms. Noe stated she sent over the changes. A motion was made by Councilman Thompson, Seconded by Councilman Kerrigan, to approve the agreement with changes. Voting Yea: Mayor Smith, Councilman Adkins, Councilman Kerrigan, Councilman Smith, Councilman Thompson, Councilman Young.
- 16. Resolution: Hazard Mitigation Grant Program
 - Mr. Nicholson stated that this is a request to apply for a grant through TEMA to get mast arms on traffic lights at three intersections. A motion was made by Councilman Kerrigan, Seconded by Councilman Thompson, to approve the Resolution. Voting Yea: Mayor Smith, Councilman Adkins, Councilman Kerrigan, Councilman Smith, Councilman Thompson, Councilman Young.
- 17. Proclamation Request
 - Mayor Smith stated that Mr. Hadley's family is having a reunion at the end of the month, and they are expecting about two hundred people. He stated that they are wanting to do a proclamation for him. A motion was made by Councilman Smith, Seconded by Councilman Kerrigan, to approve the request. All approved by voice vote.

A representative of Parker Towing stated that they will have a groundbreaking September 28, 2022 from 1:00 p.m. - 3:00 p.m.

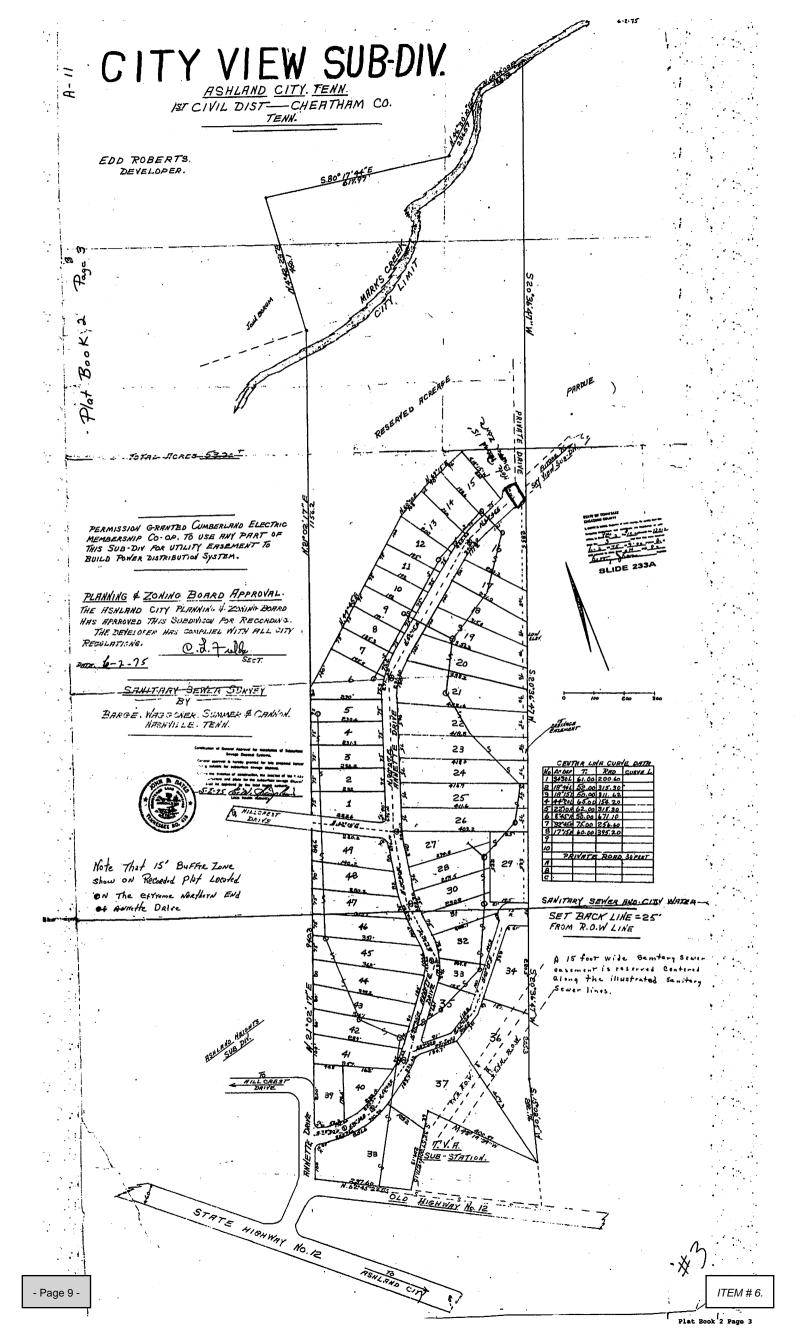

Town of Ashland City Memorial Bench and Tree Dedication Policy

The Town of Ashland City supports the needs and principles of allowing memorials in parks and green space areas, but it is also mindful that these facilities have many uses and are enjoyed by a wide range of people. Therefore, the City desires to manage and regulate memorials for the mutual benefit of all.

Applications for memorial bench or tree dedications may be picked up at the City Hall or downloaded by going to www.ashlandcitytn.gov/memorialdedications

Memorial Benches

- The cost for a memorial bench sponsorship is \$500.00 (five hundred dollars) made payable to the Town of Ashland City. This cost is for a 10-year sponsorship of a currently existing bench. This includes the procurement and installation of the plaque/plate, and one replacement within that time period, if necessary.
- The cost for the purchase and installation of a memorial bench that is not currently in place is \$2,000 (two thousand dollars). This cost includes the concrete bench footing or concrete pad, procurement and installation of the bench and plaque/plate, 10-year sponsorship of the donated bench and plaque/plate and replacement of the plaque/plate within that time if necessary. New bench installation is at the Town of Ashland City's discretion.
- Donors of NEW benches will receive a letter confirming the donation of the bench to the City.
- Once the 10-year sponsorship period has lapsed, the sponsor will be contacted, and the
 memorial plate will be made available for pick-up. It is the responsibility of the donor,
 or their designated representative to make arrangements to retrieve the removed
 plaque/plate, the City will not mail. Plaques/plates must be picked up within 60 days of
 removal.
- The bench style and location of new benches must conform to the ADA (American Disabilities Act) resting bench program and the City's policy.

- Page 14 -

- Memorial benches will be positioned to maximize benefit to an area. The City will attempt to accommodate the wishes of an applicant at all times.
- The number of memorials will be limited based on the City policy, must not interfere with normal park use or maintenance operations and shall not detract from the prime recreational purpose of an area.
- The City accepts no liability for damages to any memorials from vandals or third parties.
- The City reserves the right to remove any memorials that have been damaged, and is, in the view of city staff, beyond repair.

Tree Dedications

- The Town of Ashland City Tree Dedication program allows members of the public to purchase trees for dedication purposes. Trees that are dedicated through this program are placed on City property, in City parks or along park trails.
- The cost of a tree purchased through the dedication program is \$300 (Three Hundred Dollars). This cost is for the purchase and installation of the tree.
- No plaques/plates, rocks or other engraved recognition items are allowed on or around the donated tree that falls outside the City's Memorial/Dedication Policy.
- The tree type, species and location will be subject to the recommendations of City staff.
- Donated trees will be located to maximize benefit to an area and minimize the impact on normal park use and maintenance operations. The City will attempt to accommodate the wishes of an applicant at all times.
- The number of tree dedications within the city may, at any time, be limited or temporarily placed on-hold based on available maintenance resources such as staff, contract services, water restrictions, or other factors.

For both the Memorial Bench and Tree Dedications the donor will receive confirmation from the City once the installation has been complete. It is the intention that the memorial policy covers the broad sense of memorials but is not meant to be exhaustive. Memorial proposals outside the scope of this policy will not be considered.

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An Ordinance modifying Title 3, Section 1 for the Town of Ashland City, Tennessee.

WHEREAS, the Town of Ashland City in Ordinance 596 determined that it was in the best interest of the Town to abolish General Sessions jurisdiction and set forth that all new cases cited after October 1, 2022 would be cited to Cheatham County General Sessions.

WHEREAS, the Town further determined that all cases cited prior to October 1, 2022 would appear in front of the municipal Judge and that the Judge would continue with General Sessions jurisdiction until all of cases were adjudicated and the term of the probation had expired.

WHEREAS, the Town has determined after reviewing all active cases through the end of September 30, 2022 that the Court should be able to complete General Sessions jurisdiction on or before June 30, 2024 which will be at the end of the fiscal year.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Council of the Town of Ashland City, Tennessee that Title 3, Chapter 1 shall be amended as follows by replacing 3-101 Section 2 and 3 in the entirety as follows:

CITY JUDGE

3-101

- (2) Qualifications and term. Anyone serving as city judge shall be a licensed attorney in the State of Tennessee and a resident of the State of Tennessee for two (2) years. The Judge shall be twenty-five (25) years of age or older. However, up until June 30, 2024, the Judge shall also be a resident of Ashland City, TN.
- (3) <u>Jurisdiction and powers.</u> (a) The city judge may impose fines, costs and forfeitures, and punish by fine for violation of city ordinances. (b) The judge may preserve and enforce order in the court and enforce the collection of all fines, costs and forfeitures imposed. Prior to the passage of this Ordinance, the Judge has had concurrent general sessions jurisdiction with Cheatham County General Sessions court. The Judge shall continue with concurrent General Sessions jurisdiction until June 30, 2024 in order to adjudicate all current matters. However, beginning October 1, 2022, all cases cited by the police department that are not municipal offenses shall be cited to Cheatham County General Sessions.

Date of effect. This ordinance shall take effect 20 days from and after its final passage, the public welfare requiring it.

ORDINANCE #598

An Ordinance modifying Title 7, Chapter 6 Fireworks for the Town of Ashland City, Tennessee.

WHEREAS, the Town has determined that for the public safety of its citizens and to protect property that it is in the Town's best interest to modify Title 7, Chapter 6.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Council of the Town of Ashland City, Tennessee that Title 7, Chapter 6 shall be amended by adding Section 7-604 as follows:

FIREWORKS

7-604. <u>Discharge of fireworks restricted.</u> The discharge of fireworks shall be allowed within the corporate city limits of the Town of Ashland City and are restricted as follows:

- (1) The discharge of fireworks is restricted except for the following days: June 20th thru July 5th and December 10th thru January 2nd. Fireworks may not be discharged after _____ p.m.
- (2) If there is a drought or any other concern as to the public safety of the citizens, the Mayor along with the Fire Chief may prevent the use of fireworks during the time period set out above. In the event that fireworks are prohibited during this time, the Mayor along with the Fire Chief shall designate another time period whereas fireworks may be discharged.

Date of effect. This ordinance shall take effect from and after it's final passage, the public welfare requiring it.

On Monday, August 1, 2022, you appeared before the Town of Ashland City Board of Zoning and Appeals requesting a setback variance to construct a deck at 104 W. Elm St. On this date the request was denied unanimously by the board which does not allow you to complete the construction nor leave the deck. Later that week my office had contacted you asking what your plans were to remove the deck and you had advised you had no intentions of removing the deck. You then advised you were going to leave the deck as a covered porch. You are still not allowed to use the structure as a covered porch as you are still not meeting the setback regulations that are required per our zoning ordinance. With that said, we are allowing you fifteen (15) business days from receiving this letter to entirely remove the structure in its entirety.
