# **ORDINANCE#**

# AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF ASHLAND CITY, TENNESSEE ARTICLE V., SECTION 5.053.2(C) I-2 SPECIAL EXCEPTIONS

- WHEREAS, the Town of Ashland City Planning Commission has reviewed and discussed the amendment and has voted to recommend its passage; and
- **WHEREAS,** the Mayor and Council of Ashland City, Tennessee has given due consideration to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Ashland City

**NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF ASHLAND CITY, TENNESSEE,** that Article V., Section 5.053.2(C) be amended as follows:

# 5.053.2 I-2, Light Industrial District.

# <u>A.</u> <u>District Description:</u>

This district, like the I-1 District, is designed for a wide range of industrial and related uses which conform to a relatively high level of performance standards. Industrial establishments of this type, within completely enclosed buildings, provide a buffer between Commercial Districts and other industrial uses which involve more objectionable influences. New residential developments are excluded from this district, both to protect residences from an undesirable environment, and to ensure the reservation of adequate areas for industrial development. Community facilities which provide needed services to industrial developments are permitted.

# B. Uses Permitted:

In the I-2, Light Industrial District, the following uses and their accessory uses are permitted:

- 1. Warehousing, goods transport and storage uses.
- 2. Wholesale sales facilities.
- 3. Limited manufacturing facilities.
- 4. Intermediate manufacturing facilities.
- 5. Aircraft dealers.
- 6. Animal care and veterinary services.
- 7. Agricultural services.

- 8. Essential public transport, communication, and utility services.
- 9. Signs as regulated by City Sign Ordinance.
- 10. Plant and forest nurseries.
- 11. Building materials and farm equipment sales facilities.
- 12. Dairies and truck gardens.
- 13. Mini-Warehouse Facilities.
- <u>C.</u> <u>Uses Permitted as Special Exceptions:</u>
  - 1. Group assembly uses, other than racetracks (auto, motorcycle, dog, and horse), and drag strips.
  - 2. Food and beverage service facilities.
  - 3. Food service take-out facilities.
  - 4. Commercial recreation facilities.
  - 5. Contract construction services.
  - 6. Consumer repair services.
  - 7. Intermediate impact facilities.
  - 8. Government administrative services.
  - 9. Adult oriented business establishments subject to the supplemental requirements cited in ARTICLE VII, SECTION 7.060. (Added by Ord 319, July 11, 2006, Renumbering 9 to 10, 10 to 11, 11 to 12)
  - 10. Planned developments as regulated in ARTICLE V, SECTION 5.060.
  - 11. Outdoor Firearms Training Facilities.
  - 12. Special institutional care facilities.
  - 13. Propane Storage, refueling, and customer tank storage center.
  - 14. Outdoor storage materials to be used in manufacturing.
- D. <u>Uses Prohibited:</u>

Uses not specifically permitted or uses not permitted upon approval as a special exception.

# <u>E.</u> <u>Dimensional Regulations:</u>

All uses permitted in the I-2, Light Industrial District shall comply with the following requirements except as provided in ARTICLE VI:

- <u>1.</u> <u>Minimum Lot Size:</u> No minimum lot size is required in the I-2 District.
- 2. <u>Minimum Yard Requirements:</u> Front Yard 60 feet Side Yard 30 feet Rear Yard 35 feet
- <u>3.</u> <u>Maximum Lot Coverage:</u> On any lot or parcel of land, the area occupied by all buildings including accessory buildings may not exceed fifty (50) percent of the total lot area of such lot or parcel.
- 4. <u>Height Requirements:</u> No building shall exceed forty (40) feet in height, unless on-site water storage facilities or other acceptable firefighting equipment is approved by the town's fire department. If approved, buildings may attain to sixty (60) feet in height, except as provided in Article VI, Section 6.040.
- 5. <u>Parking Space Requirements:</u> As regulated in Article IV, Section 4.010.

**BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED**, this Ordinance shall be effective twenty (20) days after the final passage, to the public welfare requiring it.



# **Executive Summary**

With the continued commercial and industrial growth in Middle Tennessee, demand has been created for an additional marine cargo handling facility in Ashland City which will be located at 1037 Thompson Road. This marine cargo transfer facility will primarily unload barges containing non-hazardous break bulk and bulk commodities that will then be stored on site pending final delivery to manufacturing plants and industrial consumers throughout middle Tennessee. In this terminal development, Ingram will expend approximately \$41M for the development of multiple docks, warehouses, and material handling equipment supporting 24 full time jobs with an average annual wage of \$104,000.

In accordance with Ashland City Zoning Codes, Ingram is requesting that 1037 Thompson Road be rezoned from Light Industrial (I-2) to Heavy Industrial (I-3) therefore facilitating the storage of break bulk materials outside of enclosed storage areas on paved laydown yards.





# Ingram Marine Group Cargo Terminal Economic Impact Analysis

# **Introduction & Scope**

Ingram Marine Group retained Younger Associates to conduct an analysis of the economic impact of a new marine cargo operation to be located in Ashland City, Cheatham County, Tennessee.

This analysis evaluates the full economic impact of the construction and ongoing operations of the new terminal and is based on a complete capital expenditure of \$41 million. It is intended to provide key stakeholders, policymakers, and elected officials with a better understanding of the economic significance of new developments like the one proposed by Ingram Marine Group.

The analysis is based upon data from the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) and a model of the local economy utilizing historical employment patterns, wage rates, tax rates, and tax collection ratios. Primary data regarding site development costs and construction costs were provided by Ingram Marine Group.

The analysis provides impact projections from capital investments and ongoing operations of the terminal and is based on the full development of the terminal, which is subject to final customer demand for services. Impact is measured in terms of jobs, wages, and tax revenue, both direct and indirect.

# Methodology

The economic impact calculations in this study were generated using a model of the Cheatham County economy based on regional input-output multipliers (RIMS II) from the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA). The BEA developed the RIMS II system based on historical economic activity at the county level for 372 industry sectors. The RIMS II multipliers account for inter-industry relationships within regions comprised of one or more counties, in both the public and private sectors. The multipliers were originally developed to estimate the regional impacts of public projects such as military base closings and airport construction. The multipliers eliminate the need for surveys, which can introduce bias into the data. It should be noted that the RIMS II Type II Multipliers are utilized in this analysis, which project the total indirect as well as the induced jobs. When the term "indirect job" is used, it includes the induced jobs as well.

To effectively use RIMS II multipliers for economic impact analyses, detailed geographical and operational information on the initial changes in output, earnings, or employment is utilized. This data, which includes capital investment costs and operational data such as operational spending, jobs, and wages, was provided by Ingram Marine Group. The model also utilizes local wage rates, local tax rates, historical local tax collection ratios, local property values, and historical regional consumer spending patterns.

Younger Associates has used this impact calculation methodology in hundreds of projects across the United States for more than 30 years. The methodology is recognized by the International Economic Development Council and utilized in courses by the Economic Development Institute. The Younger Associates model for impact analyses is highly accurate, yet slightly conservative by design, in projecting tax revenue generation.

Secondary data collected by Younger Associates from the U.S. Department of Labor - Bureau of Labor Statistics, the U.S Bureau of Economic Analysis, the State of Tennessee Department of Revenue, and the State of Tennessee Department of Labor and Workforce Development is also used in this analysis.

### **Impact Definitions**

Economic Impact – the total dollar value of change in output from all industries within the local economy that results from \$1 of change in output from operations. This impact represents the total dollars flowing through the local economy due to the activity associated with the new marine cargo terminal.

Direct Jobs – the number of jobs directly employed by Ingram Marine Group.

Indirect Jobs – the number of jobs across all industries in the local economy supported by the ongoing operations of the marine cargo terminal. This includes jobs (or hours of work, which comprise portions of a job) of vendors and other businesses that provide direct services to the terminal, as well as induced jobs that are supported in ancillary sectors such as retail stores, restaurants, personal services, transportation, and all other industry sectors.

Local Taxes – the dollar amount of taxes collected for Ashland City and Cheatham County both directly and indirectly from local option sales tax and other, smaller local tax revenue sources such as business permits and alcohol and tobacco taxes. The state portion of sales tax and other state and federal taxes that are reapportioned to the city and county are not included.

### **One-Time Impact**

Ingram Marine Group plans to invest \$41.8 million for construction and set-up of the new cargo terminal. This includes \$23.3 million for the building and \$18.5 million for equipment. This investment is projected to generate a one-time impact of \$56.2 million for the local economy during the construction and set-up period.

Additionally, 234 jobs will be supported during the development period. For example, should the construction period be two years, an average of 117 jobs would be supported annually. Total wages paid to jobs supported during the construction and set-up period are projected to be \$12.6 million.

Direct sales tax from taxable goods and services for the construction of the terminal and indirect sales tax generated by the spending of wages paid to jobs supported are estimated to total \$707,000 during the development period.

### Impact from Ongoing Operations

Ingram Marine Group estimates an annual operating budget of \$2.7 million, and the annual economic impact generated by these operations is estimated to be \$3.5 million. This is a measure of the total dollars flowing through the Cheatham County economy because of the terminal's operations.

# Jobs, Wages and Local Taxes

The ongoing operations of the cargo terminal will support 24 jobs directly paying \$2 million in wages. Operations of the terminal will support an additional 21 indirect jobs paying \$1.1 million in wages. Spending of wages paid to the direct and indirect jobs is projected to generate over \$104,000 in local indirect tax revenue annually.

- 1. U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis RIMS II final demand aggregate output multiplier for Cheatham County, Tennessee for Construction. This multiplier represents the total dollar change in output that occurs in all industries for each additional dollar of output delivered by the specified industry.
- 2. U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis RIMS II final demand aggregate output multiplier for Cheatham County, Tennessee for wholesale trade support activities.
- 3. U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis RIMS II final demand employment multiplier for Cheatham County, Tennessee for Construction. This multiplier represents the number of jobs supported per million dollars of output from the specified industry.
- 4. Projection based upon data from Tennessee Department of Labor; Annual Average Wage/Salary for all industry sectors in Cheatham County, 2022. Assumes an average wage increase of 1.5% for 2023.
- U.S. Department of Labor, "Consumer Expenditure Survey, Southern US" 2021; factor applied to direct and indirect wages to determine the rate of indirect or "downstream" expenditures on sales taxable goods and services at the Ashland City and Cheatham County local option rate of 2.75%.
- 6. Based upon July 2022 June 2023 collections of business, motor vehicle and other local taxes compared to sales tax for Cheatham County.
- 7. U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis RIMS II direct effect employment multiplier for Cheatham County, for truck transportation. This multiplier represents the total change in the number of jobs supported in all industries for each additional job created by the specified industry.
- 8. Indirect property tax for Cheatham County and Ashland City is based on the new direct jobs created by the company. For this calculation, it is assumed that 75% of the direct jobs reside in Cheatham County and represent one household per job. The 2023 median home value is utilized as a proxy for residential property value, to determine property tax generated per job. The residential assessment rate of 25% is utilized for all residences, including those in multifamily buildings assessed at 40%, and a combined Cheatham County (\$2.4766) and Ashland City (\$0.58) tax rate of \$3.06 per \$100 of assessed value is used to project the annual tax per job. The property tax from new or expanded commercial property that is generated indirectly from economic activity associated with the jobs supported by the company is not projected.
- 9. U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis RIMS II final demand aggregate output multiplier for Cheatham County, Tennessee for truck transportation.

Note: All calculations are in constant 2023 dollars. No tax rate increases are assumed. The 2012/2021 RIMS II multipliers are utilized for this analysis.

# 2. Rezone Request: 1037 Thompson Road

Analysis – This is a request for rezoning approximately 38 acres from I-2 Light Industrial district to I-3 Heavy Industrial district. The new owner, Ingram Barge Company, wants to construct a marine cargo handling facility. While the use as a marine cargo facility is permitted in the I-2 district, outdoor storage of goods is not, and is only allowed in the I3 district as a special exception.

This is a difficult request to support as currently presented with current zoning ordinance language simply because of the treatment of outdoor storage. All uses permitted outright in the I-1 and I-2 districts are permitted in the I-3 district, outdoor storage materials to be used in manufacturing is a special exception and Extensive manufacturing facilities is a permitted use.

Staff suggests that this distinction may be the exact opposite of what may have been originally intended for uses in the I-3 district. While staff is struggling to support the change to I-3 because of the inclusion of Extensive manufacturing as a permitted use, an alternative that would travel along the same time line may be preferrable. Staff suggests that Outdoor storage be made a permitted use in I-3 while Extensive manufacturing be made a special exception, essentially swapping their place in the listings within the I-3 district.

At the same time and with the same suggested ordinance change, staff recommends that "outdoor storage materials to be used in manufacturing" be made a special exception in the I-2 district. This would take the same time to go through the zoning ordinance amendment process as a rezoning but would provide oversight of outdoor storage uses and take Extensive manufacturing uses from permitted to a special exception in I-3. The need for a rezoning to I-3 would be replaced with a trip to the board of zoning appeals for review of a special exception for outdoor storage, just as it would if the property were rezoned to I-3 under the current ordinance language.

Recommendation – Staff suggests that an ordinance language amendment may be a better solution to the question of outdoor storage than a rezoning to I-3 and recommends such as the preferred course of action.

# Final Plat Approval - Brookhollow Senior Living

- Page 28 -

Analysis – This is a request for final site plan approval of Brookhollow Senior Apartments consisting of 33 one-bedroom units and 30 two-bedroom units – 63 units total. Several issues were addressed during preliminary site plan review, such as access to the rear of the building, fire protection, parking layout, etc. Those issues have been satisfactorily addressed. Remaining, minor issues have to do with the "look and feel" of the proposed development rather than the physical layout. Retaining walls are said to be engineered by another firm but are part of this proposal and, as such, subject to site plan review also. Retaining wall material is not specified but should be considered with this proposal. Outflow from the top of the hill travels over an energy dissipator before being released onto Brookhollow Drive. This should be given a better treatment since the ditch on the west side of Brookhollow is shallow and may not be capable of handling the amount of runoff being directed to it. One bay of parking spaces near the building appears to be graded in a way that will accumulate storm water. This should be rectified. Building elevations are not provided but should be a part of the discussion and approval process.

The last note in the Calculations/Reports section of the document titled "Plan Revision Re-Submittal #1" states this is a 92 bed establishment while the site plan notes 33 one bedroom units and 30 two-bedroom units. This calculation may be the same but needs to be better explained.

It is difficult to determine the total amount of disturbed acreage with this proposal but landscaping proposed has an installed caliper inch total of 35 inches, equivalent to one acre. If the disturbed area is larger than one acre, landscaping treatment should be adjusted accordingly.

12 of the 16 proposed sugar maple trees are shown to be placed in the Right-of-way of SR 49 (Frey Street). The intent of the landscape ordinance is that landscape material should be placed on the property where the owner has control of the landscaping and the maintenance of that landscaping. The owner would have no say in the matter if TDOT were to remove proposed trees and would not necessarily be liable for replacement. The site should be amended to show all landscape material to be placed within property boundaries.

Recommendation – While the site plan largely meets zoning ordinance requirements, some issues should be further discussed for consistency with the intent of the affected requirements. Staff recommends approval after discussion and resolution of those items. Any outstanding engineering issue solutions should also be made a part of approval.

# Resolution 2023-

A resolution of the Mayor and Council of the Town of Ashland City to amend their current Charter which was last amended in 2023 by the Private Acts of the General Assembly of the State of Tennessee and ratified by Resolution 2023-21 on the 9<sup>th</sup> day of May, 2023.

WHEREAS, the Tennessee Legislature amended Tennessee Code Annotated 6-53-110 which becomes effective January 1, 2024 whereas an individual who has to be qualified to run in a specific district may not be elected at large.

WHEREAS, the Town's Charter provides under Section 4 that the City shall be divided into three wards.

WHEREAS Section 8 (a) of the Charter it provides that an election shall be conducted to elect a Mayor and six (6) councilmen including two (2) Councilmen from each of the three (3) wards of the Town, all by electors from the Town at large.

WHEREAS Section 8 of the Charter provides that elections shall be held every even-numbered year on the first Thursday in August. At the election held in August, 2024, and every other even-numbered year thereafter, one (1) Councilman for each ward and the Mayor shall be elected. At the election held in August 2026, and every other even-numbered year thereafter, one (1) Councilman shall be elected for each ward. The terms of the Mayor and Councilman shall begin at the first regularly scheduled meeting of the Council in September next following their election, and they shall serve for a term of four (4) years and until their successors are elected and qualified.

WHEREAS Section 4 and Section 8 of the Charter are not in compliance with the modification in the law pursuant to Tennessee Code Annotated 6-53-110 that takes effect January 1, 2024.

WHEREAS the City Mayor and the City Council for the Town of Ashland City, Tennessee desire to modify the current Charter to address the change in the law and to abolish wards in the Town of Ashland City and have all councilmen qualified to run at large and be elected at large.

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council request the General Assembly to amend their current Charter with the proposed changes. The following changes are set out as follows:

Section 4 of the Charter shall be deleted in its entirety.

Section 8 (a) of the Charter shall be deleted in its entirety and replaced as follows:

At the election held on the first Saturday in December 1999, a nonpartisan election was conducted by the county election commission pursuant to the election laws of this State, to elect a Mayor and six (6) Councilmen, including two (2) Councilmen from each of the three (3) wards of the Town, all by the electors of the Town to be elected at large. Any elector who has been a resident of the Town for at least two (2) years may be qualified as a candidate by submitting a nominating petition to the county election commission in accordance with state law. Elections shall continue to be nonpartisan. Beginning in 2024, all wards are abolished and councilmen are qualified at large and elected at large.

Section 8 (d) shall be deleted in its entirety and replaced as follows:

At the election held in December 1999, each elector voted for six (6) candidates for Councilman based upon the three wards that were established at the time. The three (3) Councilmanic positions from each ward in December 1999 that received the highest number of votes were elected for a term of four (4) years. The three (3) candidates for the Councilmanic positions from each ward receiving the second highest number of votes were elected for terms of two (2) years. The Mayor and Councilmen elected in each regular Town elections thereafter shall serve a term of four (4) years. Elections shall be held every even-numbered years on the first Thursday in August beginning 2024. Beginning at this election, all Councilmanic positions and the Mayor's position that are up for election shall be qualified as a candidate at large and elected at large. The terms of the Mayor and Councilmen shall begin at the first regularly scheduled meeting of the Council in September next following their election, and they shall serve a term of four (4) years and until their successors are elected and qualified. All elections shall be conducted in conformity with the requirements of this Charter and the election laws of the State.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Mayor and Council of Ashland City, Tennessee that the revised Charter, as set out above, is hereby approved to be presented to the General Assembly of the State of Tennessee for adoption.

WHEREAS, Railroad and the City are parties to a certain License Agreement for Ashland City Recreation Trail NWR RE 2017-1 ("the Agreement) dated January 1, 2017 and Railroad and the City amended the License Agreement on October 1, 2019 ("1<sup>st</sup> Amendment").

WHEREAS, the Railroad and the City mutually desire to enter into a second amendment to the License Agreement for the Ashland City Recreation Trail as setout below:

<u>WHEREAS</u>, the purpose of this Second Amendment is to renew the license agreement and to extend the limits of the property for the pathway ("Phase 2").

Therefore, the original agreement is amended and supplemented as set forth below:

- 1. The license agreement is renewed, and the term is extended for 25 years ending July 31, 2048, subject to Railroads future use of the property for passenger and/or freight rail service as described in paragraph 1.
- 2. The trail will be extended 7,080 feet beginning at TN Waltz Road (north) to TN Waltz Road (south) as shown in Attachment A.
- 3. In consideration, the City shall pay Railroad an additional fee of \$6,513.60 once every five years in advance for Phase 2, commencing August 1, 2023. Said fee may be increased by the rate of inflation (measured by CPI) every five years.

In all other respects, the terms of the original Agreement remain in effect. No changes or deviation from the Agreement may be made except in conformity with one or more Amendment(s) executed prior to all such changes or deviations.

This Amendment is hereby made a part of the License Agreement for Ashland City Recreation Trail and supersedes any contrary provisions contained therein; and the terms of this Amendment shall be controlling. 

## A. CRIME DATA, PROBLEM STATEMENT, AND TARGET POPULATIONS

A.1. Please provide current population, demographics, and violent crime data for your jurisdiction, including Tennessee Incident-Based Reporting System (TBIRS) data, local law enforcement data, and local court data.

Located in Cheatham County in northwest Tennessee, the Town of Ashland City has a population of approximately 5,193 people (2020 Census) and the city spans approximately 10.8 square miles. The demographic make-up of the city is approximately 80.4% White, 5.95% African American, 4.43% other and 8.2% Hispanic or Latino. The Town of Ashland City is the home of State Industries, now known as A.O. Smith, where they produce water heaters. Recently, the city limits were extended to include the industrial park which is home to Nashville Fabrication and Caymas Boats. The Town of Ashland City also hosts two large events annually: Summerfest and Music on Main. Those events attract hundreds, and sometimes thousands, of people.

According to TIBRS (Tennessee Incident Based Reporting System) data, between 2020 and 2022, Ashland City responded to 19 aggravated assaults and 761 drug incidents. Additionally, the Town of Ashland City had 110 domestic violence incidents in that time frame.

While drug crime, in and of itself, is not a violent crime, there is a link between drug crime and violent crime. Approximately 5% of aggravated assaults and 3% of homicides in Tennessee are related to drug activity. Furthermore, with the increased potency of opioids, drug overdoses that result in death are becoming more and more common. Based on the statistics above, it is apparent there is an issue within our community with overdoses and overdoses resulting in deaths. In these cases, if the supplier can be identified, there may be resulting murder charges. It should be noted that violent crime numbers in Tennessee, as a whole, are significantly higher than the national average which, therefore, increases the possibility that law enforcement officers will encounter violent crime incidents, even if they are not currently, or traditionally have been, prevalent in their community.

The Ashland City Police Department plans to use the VCIF funding to address officer safety and their ability to respond safely to all incidents of violent crime. The drug use in our community grows daily and a large part of overdoses come from dark parking lots and parks with the regular influx of people coming into Ashland City for work and pleasure, Ashland City Police Department plans to use VCIF funding to improve their investigative capabilities of all violent crime by purchasing license plate readers (LPR's).

A.3. Please briefly describe any obstacles or issues your agency has experienced with addressing these targets previously. How will VCIF funding help your agency to mitigate those obstacles?

The Ashland City Police Department is a small agency with 16 officers, a Deputy Chief, and Chief. The police department provides 24-hour coverage, year-round. As a result of this, Ashland City Police Officers are frequently working by themselves with the only backup being officers from surrounding agencies. The police department operates on a small budget and as a reg

not have the funds to purchase equipment that is essential to effectively respond to violent crime incidents including domestic violence. Ashland City police officers find themselves in increasingly dangerous situations without the necessary equipment to ensure the officers' safety and the safety of all involved parties. The VCIF funding would allow Ashland City Police Department to purchase license plate readers (LPR's) which in turn would improve officer safety, the efficacy of violent crime responses and investigations, and the safety of the community.

Although there will not be any formal collaboration agreements, we plan to work cooperatively with surrounding agencies or agencies that entered the license plate to help aide in their investigations.

The Ashland City Police Department plans on purchase the following items:

9 License plate readers: LPRs are small, high-speed cameras systems that automatically capture all license plate numbers that come into view, along with the location, date, and time. They provide the capability of searching for specific license plates, alerting if it is detected; it also ha ITEM # 23. search capabilities. The LPRs will be mounted on state right of ways. Note that this item will be purchased on statewide contract. The agency will work with TDOT in order to install and operate the LPRs on state right of ways.

Improving the Ashland City Police Department's ability to respond to violent offenders and situations will increase officer safety, as well as the safety of those involved in the situation, and the community as a whole.

License plate readers are a powerful tool in violent crime investigations. The allow investigators to search for vehicles that have been identified as being involved in violent crime. Furthermore. they can generate a pattern of travel or place a vehicle in a certain location at a specific time. All of these things serve to generate leads and help contribute towards the successful prosecution of violent offenders. Additionally, LPRs can alert police to the presence of stolen vehicles and can be crucial in resolving time-sensitive issues such as Amber Alerts. Research has shown that LPRs result in more follow-up arrests than traditional policing methods with less manpower making them a cost-effective way to combat violent crime.<sup>1</sup> The LPRs will be installed on state rights-of-way, in locations that will maximize their usefulness including the walking track, the park parking lot, and on the main highway. Ashland City Police Department will work with TDOT in the purchase and installment of the LPRs on specific roadways within our agency's jurisdiction.

D.4. What impact will this funding have on your agency's ability to respond to violent crime?

> The VCIF funding will provide Ashland City Police Department with the ability to purchase equipment that would not otherwise be available due to budget restrictions. These items will allow Ashland City police officers to respond to violent crime incidents effectively and safely; therefore, improving their ability to arrest and prosecute violent criminals. The safety of officers and the community is paramount. The LPR's will provide Ashland City Police Department with the investigative capabilities to identify and apprehend violent offenders.

> SIM cards will be purchased and utilized for the LPRs. These SIM cards are used to store and secure identifying information and data associated with these devices. The SIM card purchase and data storage costs will be applicable in FY24 and FY25.

During the contract period, the Ashland City Police Department will gather data using our records management software, Tyler, to keep track of violent crime trends and data. This provides the police department with the capability to generate reports based on specific crimes at any time and monitor the effect of the newly acquired equipment on violent crime intervention and officer safety. Additionally, the Ashland City Police Department will continue with accepted TIBRS standards and practices in reporting crime statistics. This will allow the Ashland City Police Department to measure the efficacy of the newly implemented technology with regards to violent crime intervention.

## G. ACCOUNTABILITY

G.1. Describe how this funding will have long term impact on the violent crime in your region.

The VCIF funding will allow the Ashland City Police Department to improve their ability to respond to violent crime through the addition of license plate readers. With this equipment, the Ashland City Police Department will be able to respond safely and effectively to incidents of violent crime ensuring the safety of the community. Ashland City is a small community and the money provided by the VCIF allows the police department to purchase equipment that they would not have been able to afford. The VCIF funding ensures that the Ashland City Police Department is well-equipped to address any violent crime that may arise in the community.

The acquisition of new equipment through the VCIF funds will improve the Ashland City Police Department's ability to intervene in and investigate violent crime with successful outcomes.
