1. Summary of Request:

This case pertains to two parcels totaling 1.39 acres, located at the border between Richmond County and the City of Grovetown within Columbia County. 703 and 709 East Robinson Avenue, currently zoned A (Agricultural), are an outlier along the approximately 0.2 mile stretch of Robinson Avenue extending from the Columbia County line to the road's terminus at Gordon Highway, across from Fort Gordon's recently closed Gate 2. All parcels along this brief corridor, with the exception of the subject parcels, are zoned B-2 (General Business). The applicant seeks to eliminate this outlier, in order to proceed with construction of a retail shopping center.

The proposed retail center encompasses the two subject parcels, as well as 0.52 acres of land within City of Grovetown jurisdiction. That remaining land, which lacks an address but receives the Columbia County parcel number 069 434, is understood to be zoned compatibly with the proposed land use.

Per the concept plan presented with the application, the retail center would feature nine (9) total units, with eight (8) units of twenty (20) feet in width and fifty-five (55) feet in depth (1,100 ft²), and one (1) 'anchor' end unit at four (4) times the width (4,400 ft²). Access points are proposed along Pepperhill Drive (in the City of Grovetown) and along Captain Drive within Augusta-Richmond County; there is no direct access proposed along East Robinson Avenue.

As the subject parcels are located within 3,000 feet of Fort Gordon, submittal of this rezoning request triggered a mandatory notification from Planning & Development to Fort Gordon officials. This notification, which must be received at least thirty (30) days prior to the public hearing, was sent to Fort Gordon officials on January 25, 2023, forty (40) days prior to the scheduled Planning Commission meeting on March 6. As of this writing, Fort Gordon has not presented comments or concerns to Planning & Development staff regarding the rezoning request.

Prior to the submittal of this rezoning request, the applicant applied to have the concept plan for the subject parcels scrutinized by a Development Review Committee (DRC), which provides feedback on concept plans prior to full site plan review. The DRC was distributed on January 13, and comments were returned to the applicant on February 2.

2. Zoning History:

There are no known zoning cases concerning this address.

3. Comprehensive Plan Consistency:

The subject property is located within the Belair character area. The Comprehensive Plan describes the part of Belair "west of Powell Road to the Columbia County line" as consisting of rural residential uses; this description, however, does not account for this particular area within Belair, which has been a nexus of suburban growth owing to its prime location at the intersection of Fort Gordon, one of the CSRA's chief economic drivers, and rapidly growing Columbia County. The proposed rezoning and its associated land use are an extension of this growth pattern.

4. Findings:

- 1. The applicant requests rezoning from A to B-2 for the parcels at 703 and 709 East Robinson Avenue.
- 2. There are no known zoning cases pertaining to the subject parcel.
- 3. There are public water and sewer lines along Captain Drive which the subject parcels could access, as well as a fire hydrant located at the corner of Captain and E. Robinson nearest the subject property. There may also be lines available from Columbia County; DRC feedback from Utilities indicates that the developer should choose one county's lines or the other's.
- 4. East Robinson Avenue (Georgia Route 223) is classified as a principal arterial road on the Georgia Department of Transportation (GDOT) Functional Classification map, while Captain Drive and Pepperhill Drive are classified as local roads. Augusta Transit service does not extend to this area.
- 5. There are no floodplains or wetlands located on the subject property. The topography of the site is quite flat, ranging from approximately 517 to 522 feet above sea level.

- 6. This segment of East Robinson Avenue is predominantly commercial, serving adjacent residential stock in Richmond County, Grovetown, and on Fort Gordon. The proposed rezoning is compatible with land use patterns in this area.
- 5. <u>Recommendation:</u> The Planning Commission recommend <u>Approval</u> of the rezoning request, with the following condition:
 - 1. The three involved parcels shall be combined with the Clerk of the Superior Court, as shown on the plat presented with the application, prior to submittal for site plan review.

Note: This staff report includes the information available approximately two weeks prior to the Planning Commission hearing. It represents an evaluation of the facts presented by the applicant, research done by the staff, and consideration of the relevant factors in the Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance of Augusta, Georgia. New facts may emerge, and staff reserves the right to make a verbal recommendation at the hearing based on all the information available at that time.







The subject property currently contains three zoning classifications: R-1A (One-family Residential), B-2 (General Business) & LI (Light Industry). Zoning History:

Z-84-164 rezoned approximately .75 acres from B-2 to LI to allow an auto body shop to operate on the property. There is no record of any other zoning case(s).

Comprehensive Plan Consistency:

According to the 2018 Comprehensive Plan the property is located within the South Augusta Character Area. The Commercial development in South Augusta is characterized by shopping centers, small strip centers, professional offices, and individual commercial establishments arranged in a linear pattern along the major streets and highways and clustered near Interstate 520 interchanges.

Findings:

- 1. The subject property currently contains three zoning classifications R-1A (One-family Residential), B-2 (General Business) & LI (Light Industry).
- 2. The request is to rezone approximately 1.50 acres of the 3.48 acres from R-1A (One-family Residential to LI (Light Industry) to expand the existing storage building sales lot. - 3. There are no active LI business licenses or uses on the property.
- 4. The conceptual site plan submitted with the application shows the proposed expansion of storage building sales lot directly behind the existing warehouse building.
- 5. Public water serves the subject property. The subject property does not have immediate access to a sanitary sewer line.
- 6. The Georgia Department of Transportation (GDOT) Function Classification Map classifies this section of Lumpkin Road as a minor arterial road.
- 7. The subject property contains areas of 500-year floodplain (0.2% annual chance of flood hazard) but no jurisdictional wetlands area.
- **8.** To the west of the subject property are parcels zoned and/or developed as single family residential with some commercial uses interspersed fronting Lumpkin Road. B-2 and Industrial zoning exists along the railroad tracks to the east.
- 9. A site plan review will be required for the expansion of the storage building sales lot.


My property at 1801 Lumpkin Rd, Augusta GA, needs to be rezoned. Currently this property has three zonings on it, residential, b2, and light industrial





1. Summary of Request:

This case pertains to an approximately 0.73-acre parcel along Cardinal Drive, just to the north of Wrightsboro Road near Daniel Field. Total structures on the parcel amount to 1,769 square feet, with the 1,213 square foot main building originally built in 1940. The parcel, which is not located in a historic district, is currently zoned R-1A (One-family Residential).

At present, the subject parcel is approximately 200 feet deep with 150.82 feet of street frontage. The applicants wish to demolish the home on site, subsequently subdividing the parcel into two equal lots with 75.41 feet of frontage. These lots would then be sold individually as "raw land", per the letter of intent.

To achieve these ends, the applicants initially applied for, and received, rezoning of this property from R-1 to R-1A. This was done with the understanding that the subject parcel featured 160, and not just over 150, feet of street frontage. At a minimum frontage of 80 feet, R-1A zoning represented the least intensive rezoning the applicants could apply for in order to split the parcel legally.

Upon formal land surveying (which was only conducted subsequent to the rezoning process) it was discovered that there was discrepancy between historical platting of the parcel and the actual dimensions. The parcel, while over 160 feet wide at the rear, is only 150.82 feet wide at its frontage along Cardinal Drive. This requires the applicant to seek an additional upzoning to R-1B, in order to remedy the errant rezoning to R-1A. The R-1B zone carries a minimum frontage of seventy-five (75) feet, which the proposed parcel split would satisfy, as well as a

minimum lot area of 7,500 square feet. The proposed parcels would each more than double this areal minimum.

While Cardinal Drive (with the exception of the subject parcel) is entirely zoned R-1, most parcels on that street are nonconforming with current regulations. Assuming the subject parcel is split as proposed, 43 parcels carry a Cardinal Drive address. Were these parcels assessed and assigned a zone today based on Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance regulations, only eight (8) would be classified as R-1. Twenty-four (24) parcels would be classified R-1A, three (3) would be classified R-1B, seven (7) would receive R-1C zoning, and one (1) parcel would be zoned R-1D. Furthermore, none of the parcels adjacent to the subject parcel along Cardinal Drive would receive R-1 zoning. Therefore, while an R-1B designation is unprecedented on Cardinal Drive, the parcel split proposed by the applicants is perfectly in character with neighboring lots.

2. Zoning History:

The parcel is situated in an R-1A (One-family Residential) zone. The subject property was initially rezoned from R-1 to R-1A, with the Planning Commission recommending approval in a 6-3 vote at their meeting on November 7, 2022, and the Augusta Commission unanimously concurring with the recommendation at their meeting on November 15 (Case Z-22-63).

3. Comprehensive Plan Consistency:

These parcels can be identified as part of the Old Augusta character area. While this particular neighborhood is relatively affluent, several Old Augusta neighborhoods have been identified as clusters of disinvestment, poverty, and/or unemployment. Old Augusta consists of neighborhoods that developed prior to the Second World War, and therefore reflect defining characteristics of "traditional neighborhoods". Such characteristics include:

- small or irregularly shaped lots
- diverse housing types
- moderate residential density
- public transit access
- buildings closer to the front of property lines
- narrow setbacks between buildings
- neighborhood-scale businesses
- sidewalks and street trees
- civic/institutional uses scattered throughout the area

The proposed use and subdivision of the parcel is consistent with historical patterns of development in Old Augusta.

4. Findings:

- 1. The applicant requests R-1B zoning for the parcel at 3029 Cardinal Drive.
- 2. The 0.73 acre parcel, located north of Wrightsboro Road near Daniel Field, is presently zoned R-1, with a stucco home on site originally built in 1940.
- 3. The applicant seeks to demolish the home and subdivide the approximately 150 foot wide parcel into two 75 foot wide parcels.

- 4. Parcels of this width require R-1B zoning; the minimum street frontage for an R-1A lot is 80 feet.
- 5. The two new parcels would then be sold by the owner as "raw land", per the applicant's letter of intent.
- 6. The applicant previously received a rezoning from R-1 to R-1A from the Augusta Commission on November 15, 2022 following a recommendation of approval from the Planning Commission, under the pretense that the total lot frontage was 160 feet and not just over 150 feet.
- 7. While the parcel would be the only R-1B property along Cardinal Drive—all parcels addressed to this road are zoned R-1—this novelty is the result of a high degree of nonconformity in the neighborhood's zoning scheme. Over 75 percent of parcels on Cardinal Drive lack the necessary frontage for R-1 designation.
- 8. The site, located in Old Augusta, features both water line and sewer access.
- 9. It is along Cardinal Drive, a local road per GDOT functional classification.
- 10. Augusta Transit Routes 1 and 7 run along Wrightsboro Road, with a stop near the subject parcel at the corner of Wrightsboro and Magnolia Drive.
- 11. There are no floodplains or wetlands located on the property. Topography is fairly flat, ranging from 432 to 444 feet above sea level.
- 12. This parcel would cohere with patterns of residential development along Cardinal Drive, and with broader land use patterns in the Old Augusta character area.

Recommendation: The Planning Commission recommend <u>Approval</u> of the rezoning request, with the following condition:

1. Each proposed lot shall have at least 75 feet of road frontage, in accordance with Section 10-1(b) of the Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance of Augusta, Georgia as amended.





1. Summary of Request:

The purpose of this rezoning request is to divide the property into two (2) parcels. The property is approximately 150 feet in depth with 125 feet of frontage on Russell Street containing approximately 0.43-acre. Standard lot width requirements in a R-1C zoning district are sixty (60) feet. The requested zoning change to R-1D allows for a minimum lot width of forty (40) feet. The owner is requesting to rezoning the property to R-1D to allow him to divide the property with one lot having a road frontage of seventy-five (75) feet with the existing house and one lot having a road frontage of fifty (50) feet as indicated on the conceptual subdivision plat date January 3, 2023 and submitted with the application.

2. Comprehensive Plan Consistency:

According to the 2018 Comprehensive Plan, the property is located within the Old Augusta Character Area. The 2018 Comprehensive Plan's vision for the Old Augusta Character Area will be to continue re-development in some neighborhoods and maintain stability in others, by removing deteriorated and dilapidated structures, and construct new or rehabilitate existing single-family housing. Recommended development patterns include infill of residential development at compatible densities with the surrounding area. The proposed use and subdivision of the parcel is consistent with historical patterns of development in Old Augusta.

3. Findings:

- 1. According to the Richmond County Tax Assessor's Office, currently located on the property is a 2,880 square foot home built in 1906.
- 2. The property is not located within a historic district.
- 3. There are no previous zoning cases on file for the property.
- 4. The property is currently being served by public potable water and sanitary sewer.
- 5. Georgia Department of Transportation (GDOT) Functional Classification map, 2017 classifies Russell Street between Walton Way and Central Avenue as a local road. Transit routes and stops are located within a half a mile of the property, both on Walton Way and Central Avenue.
- 6. According to the FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM) the property is not located within a Special Flood Hazard Area.
- 7. According to the Augusta-Richmond County GIS Wetlands Layer there are no wetlands located on the property.
- 8. The residential block the property is situated in consists of single-family homes on lots ranging in width from fifty (50) feet to one hundred twenty-five (125) feet. Across the street is Richmond Academy. The surrounding area is zoned R-1C.
- 9. At one hundred twenty-five (125) feet the subject property is the widest lot on this block of Russell Street.
- 10. R-1C zoning requires a minimum lot frontage of sixty (60) feet. Four (4) of the thirteen (13) or 30% of the lots on this block of Russell Street where the property is located meet the required lot frontage of sixty (60) feet. The majority or 70% of the lots on this block of Russell Street are non-conforming. The current R-1C zoning of this area is inconsistent with the established development pattern of the neighborhood.
- 11. The rezoning of the property to R-1D would allow for the creation of lots with a minimum of forty (40) feet lot width frontage.
- 12. The referenced conceptual subdivision plat shows the property being divided with one lot having seventy-five (75) feet of frontage with the existing home and one vacant lot having fifty (50) feet of frontage.
- 13. The proposed subdivision of the property by the applicant creating the new lot with fifty (50) feet of frontage is consistent with 70% of the existing lots along this block of Russell Street and with the character and established land use pattern on this block of Russell Street and the Old Augusta Character Area.

- 14. The rezoning to R-1D would make it the only property in this block of Russell Street with this zoning designation.
- 15. The proposed subdivision of the property as shown on the submitted conceptual subdivision plat shows 6.21 feet from the existing home to the newly created north side property line. In accordance with Section 8-8(b) of the Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance the division of the property as presented would make the lot non-conforming as a ten (10) foot side setback from building to property line is required.

Recommendation: The Planning Commission recommend <u>Approval</u> of the rezoning request with the following conditions:

- 1. The owner shall first apply and obtain approval for a variance for the north side yard setback requirement for the lot containing the existing home prior to this rezoning application being placed on the agenda of the Augusta Commission for their approval.





The subject property is a 5.33-acre vacant tract located approximately 300 feet southwest of the intersection of Stevens Creek Road and Mayo Road. The applicant is seeking a rezoning to allow development of 36 attached townhomes under the R-1E regulations. The proposed units will be developed in groups of 6 fronting an internal cul-de-sac that will enter at the northeastern end of the parcel closest to Stevens Creek Road.

Zoning History:

The property was granted a Special Exception in 2005 (Z-05-43) to allow single family residential units not to exceed 4 units per acre. This approval was subject to the following condition:

The minimum building line on all lots fronting Mayo Road be no less than 30 feet.

The development never materialized.

Across Mayo Road are two parcels. 2708 and 2710 Mayor Road, that were rezoned from A (Agriculture) to Zone B-1 (Neighborhood Business) in 1978 to allow for a retail florist. That change contained a reversion condition and the property has since reverted to the original A Zone. One lot is vacant and the other contains a single-family home. Immediately adjacent to the subject property is 821 Stevens Creek Road which was rezoned to B-1 (Neighborhood Business) with conditions in 2022 (Z-22-22) for a proposed office that has yet to materialize.

Comprehensive Plan Consistency:

West Augusta Character Area, as described within the 2018 Comprehensive Plan, is characterized by suburban development patterns largely dating from the 1950s and 1980s. There is a moderate-to-high degree of building separation, although some multi-family residential is scattered throughout the area.

Findings:

- 1. The subject property is a 5.33-acre vacant tract located approximately 300 feet southwest of the intersection of Stevens Creek Road and Mayo Road.
- 2. The applicant is seeking a rezoning to allow development of 36 attached townhomes under the R-1E regulations.
- 3. The conceptual site plan submitted with the application shows the units will be developed in groups of 6 fronting an internal cul-de-sac with a 60 ft. right-of-way. The townhome end units will have a width of 30 ft. while interior units are 25 ft. wide.
- 4. The area along Mayo Road is predominantly zoned R-1A and developed for single family detached residences. Brookfield Park and Pierce Grove Baptist Church are also located on Mayo Road. Both are also zoned R-1A.
- 5. The property was granted a Special Exception in 2005 (Z-05-43) to allow single family residential units not to exceed 4 units per acre. The development never materialized.
- 6. Public water serves the subject property.
- 7. Sanitary sewer is located at Sterling Road and Stevens Creek Road, east across Stevens Creek Road from the subject parcel. Augusta Utilities staff commented that details for the sewer connection will require engineered plans approved by the city at the developer's expense. The petitioner is aware that a lift station may be required.
- 8. The Georgia Department of Transportation (GDOT) Functional Classification Map, 2017, identities Stevens Creek Road as a collector street and Mayo Road as a local street. Access is proposed from Mayo Road which has a pavement width of approximately 21 feet and a 60 foot of right-of-way.

- 9. The intersection is served by a stop sign on the Mayo Road corner and there are no turn lanes on either Mayo Road or Stevens Creek Road serving this intersection.
- 10. Augusta Traffic Engineering approved the Preliminary Traffic Impact Worksheet with the comment that if the development had been much larger the outcome may have been different.
- 11. The subject property contains no floodplain or jurisdictional wetlands areas.
- 12. A concept plan and elevations were submitted with this application and are provided in this report.



The north side of the property is bounded by two large single-family residential lots, Parcel I.D. Nos. 006-0-013-02-0 & 006-0-013-07-0 (owned by a rental company) and both are zoned R-1A.

The west side of the property, parcel I.D. 006-0-013-06-0, is bound by a large residential lot owned by Thomas Fleming and zoned R1-A.

The south side of the property is bound by Mayo Road.



SITE DESCRIPTION

The subject property consists of approximately 5.33 acres and is undeveloped. Topography within the site slopes down from northwest to southeast and is generally rolling with grades at ranging from 7% to 10% with wetlands in the southwest corner as shown on the concept plan.

Public water and sanitary sewer are available to the site at Mayo Road. Electrical power and telecommunication services are also available at the site.


Proposed improvements will be eight townhome structures of six units each and associated infrastructure, (utilities, access drives and paved parking).







 have occurred within a square city block of the proposed location during the twelve (12) months
 immediately preceding the date of application.
- Previous Denial or Revocation. The denial of an application or revocation of a license, occurring
 within the preceding twelve (12) months, which was based on the qualifications of the proposed
 location.

FINANCIAL IMPACT: The applicant will pay a fee of \$1,330.00.

Background: Currently, Augusta-Richmond County does not charge a resubmission fee for

commercial plan review. (Multi-family and apartments are subject to

commercial plan review process and fees).

The commercial plan fee is a one-time fee that is collected at the end of multiple reviews at the developer's discretion to move the project forward to

permitting/construction.

Analysis: Because there is no resubmission plan review plans are submitted in a

revolving fashion with no quality control in most cases. The plans examiners

are unable to prioritize exploratory submissions from ready-to-build

submissions.

Commercial plan reviews typically require 3+ revisions equating to three plan reviews but only one review fee. Resubmissions span from 3 days to 12

months after the initial submission; therefore, the entire plan must be

reviewed again but only one fee is paid and that is after all of the reviews and

if the project moves to the construction phase.

Financial Impact: A Resubmission Fee of \$50.00 upon the 3rd and each subsequent

resubmission for a commercial plan review.

STANDARD TERMS AND CONDITIONS

SECTION 1 – Services by Consultant

1.1 General

Consultant shall provide services under this Agreement only upon request of the Client, and only to the extent defined and required by the Client. These services may include the use of outside services, outside testing laboratories, and special equipment.

Attachments to this Agreement are as identified on the signature page to this Agreement or using serially numbered Work Authorizations, and with these GENERAL CONDITIONS, are all as attached hereto, and made a part of this Agreement.

1.2 Scope of Services and Fees

The services to be performed by Consultant and the associated fee are attached hereto and made a part of this Agreement or by using serially numbered Work Authorizations, all as identified on the signature page to this Agreement, and shall be performed by the Consultant in accordance with the Client's requirements. The Scope of Services and Fee Estimate (Attachment A) is valid for sixty (60) days, after which Consultant reserves the right to revise the Scope or Fee Estimate.

It is mutually understood that Consultant's fee is not a firm contractual amount, except the total fee by the Consultant shall not be exceeded unless authorized in writing by the Client. The intent of the Scope of Services is to identify the services to be provided by Consultant. However, it is specifically understood that by written notice to Consultant, Client can decrease or, with concurrence of Consultant, increase the Scope of Services.

SECTION 2 – Payments to Consultant

2.1 Method of Payment

Payment for Consultant's personnel services and direct expenses shall be based on the Method of Payment which is identified on the signature page to this Agreement or serially numbered Work Authorizations, attached hereto, and made a part of this Agreement.

2.2 Payment for Personnel Services

2.2.1 Payment

Payment for the services rendered by Consultant's personnel shall be based on the hours of chargeable time and in accordance with Consultant's Schedule of Unit Rates, which is identified on the signature page to this Agreement and attached hereto, and made a part of this Agreement.

2.2.2 Chargeable Time

Chargeable time for Consultant's personnel is that portion of their time devoted to providing services requested by Client. Chargeable time for field personnel located away from Consultant's office for more than one week is a minimum of eight hours per day and five days per calendar week, except for Consultant observed legal holidays or during an employee's sick leave or vacation time. Travel

time from Consultant's office to an assigned work site, and return to Consultant's office, is chargeable time; or if more economical for Client, Consultant shall lodge its personnel overnight near the work site in lieu of traveling back to Consultant's office at the end of each work day.

2.2.3 Overtime Rates

The basis for payment to Consultant for each hour worked in excess of forty (40) hours in any calendar week shall be the applicable hourly rate as specified in the Schedule of Unit Rates.

2.3 Payment for Direct Expenses

2.3.1 Payment

For Direct Expenses incurred by Consultant, payment to Consultant by the Client shall be in accordance with Consultant's Schedule of Unit Rates.

2.3.2 Direct Expenses

For the purposes of this Agreement, Direct Expenses to be contracted and managed by Consultant and payable by Client to Consultant shall include: Outside Services including the services and reimbursable expenses for firms other than Consultant which are necessary for the work the Consultant is directed to perform; Laboratory Tests and related reports necessary for the work the Consultant is directed to perform, either by the Consultant or by an outside service for the Consultant; Special Equipment expenses including the costs of the Consultant locating, acquiring, leasing, or renting any equipment or facilities not currently owned, leased, or rented by Consultant at the time of the request for services which are necessary to enable Consultant to provide the services requested; vehicles furnished by Consultant for Consultant's authorized travels and for Consultant's field personnel; Per Diem expense or actual costs of maintaining Consultant's field personnel on or near the Project site, for each day of field assignment away from Consultant's office; and Other Direct Expenses associated with all services provided hereunder and identified in the Schedule of Unit Rates.

2.4 Payment Conditions

- 2.4.1 Consultant shall submit monthly invoices for all personnel services and direct expenses under this Agreement and a final invoice upon completion of services.
- 2.4.2 Invoices are due and payable upon receipt by Client. Interest at a rate of 1.5% per month, or the maximum allowed by law, will be charged on all past due amounts starting thirty (30) days after date of invoice. Payments will first be credited to interest and then to principal.
- 2.4.3 In the event of a disputed or contested invoice, Client must provide written notice to Consultant within ten (10) days of the date of any invoice, otherwise the invoice will be considered to be correct. In the event Client timely submits in writing a dispute on a particular invoice, only that portion so contested will be withheld from payment and the Client will pay the undisputed portion. No interest will accrue on any reasonably contested portion of the invoice until mutually resolved.

2.4.4 If Client fails to make payment in full to Consultant of amounts owed pursuant to this Section 2 within forty-five (45) days of the date of the invoice, Consultant may, after giving seven (7) days' written notice to Client, suspend services under this Agreement until paid in full, including interest. Consultant shall have no liability to Client for delays or damages caused by such suspension of services. Client agrees to pay all costs of collection, including reasonable attorney's fees, incurred by Consultant as a result of Client's failure to make payments in accordance with this Agreement. No final plans, documents or reports will be released for any purpose until Consultant has been paid in full.

<u>2.4.5</u> The billing rates specified in the Schedule of Unit Rates for subsequent years shall be adjusted annually in accordance with Consultant's costs of doing business, subject to Client's review and concurrence.

SECTION 3 - Term of Agreement

3.1 Term

Consultant's obligations to perform under this Agreement shall extend from the date of execution until terminated by either party.

3.2 Abandonment of Work

Client shall have the absolute right to abandon any work requested hereunder or to change the general scope of the work at any time, and such action on its part shall in no event be deemed a breach of contract.

3.3 Termination of Agreement

3.3.1 Termination with Cause

The obligation to provide further services under this Agreement may be terminated with cause by either party by written notice stating the basis for the termination and providing 7 days to cure. The termination will be effective seven (7) days after delivery of written notice thereof if the basis for the termination has not been cured. In the event of termination by Consultant caused by failure of the Client to perform in accordance with the terms of this Agreement, Client shall pay for all services performed prior to the effective date of the termination, including all project termination expenses, collection fees and legal expenses. Consultant shall prepare a progress report, including information as to all the services performed by Consultant and the status of the services as of the date of the termination, and provide information and documents developed under the terms of this Agreement to the Client upon receipt of final payment. In the event of termination by the Client caused by failure by Consultant to perform in accordance with the terms of this Agreement, Consultant shall prepare a progress report, including information as to all the services performed by Consultant and the status of the services as of the date of the termination and provide information and documents developed under the terms of this Agreement to the Client. Upon receipt of all other information and documents, Client shall pay Consultant for services performed prior to the effective date of the termination.

3.3.2 Termination without Cause

Either party may, at its sole discretion, terminate this

Agreement without cause at any time. In the event of such termination, the terminating party will promptly notify and confirm the termination in writing to the other party. The termination will be effective seven (7) days after delivery of written notice thereof. Upon termination, Consultant shall prepare a progress report, including information as to all the services performed by Consultant and the status of the services as of the date of the termination, and provide information and documents developed under the terms of this Agreement to the Client upon receipt of final payment.

3.4 Payment for Work Upon Abandonment or Agreement Termination

If Client abandons requested work or terminates this Agreement, Consultant shall be paid on the basis of work completed to the date of abandonment or effective date of termination. Consultant shall perform no activities other than reasonable wrap-up activities after receipt of notice of abandonment or termination. Payment for the work shall be as established under Section II.

SECTION 4 - General Considerations

4.1 Assignment and Responsibility for Personnel

4.1.1 The assignment of personnel and all phases of the undertaking of the services which Consultant shall provide hereunder shall be subject to the oversight and general guidance of Client.

4.1.2 While upon the premises of Client or property under its control, all employees, agents, and subconsultants of Consultant shall be subject to Client's rules and regulations respecting its property and the conduct of its employees thereon.

4.1.3 However, it is understood and agreed that in the performance of the work and obligations hereunder, Consultant shall be and remain an independent Consultant and that the employees, agents or subconsultants of Consultant shall not be considered employees of or subject to the direction and control of Client. Consultant shall be responsible for the supervision and performance of all subconsultants which are to perform hereunder.

4.2 Insurance

4.2.1 Consultant shall furnish Client a certificate of insurance upon request showing amounts and types of insurance carried by Consultant, which certificate shall contain a commitment by the Insurance Company that during the time any work is being performed by Consultant under this Agreement it will give Client notice of cancellation or non-renewal of the insurance coverage shown on such certificates in accordance with policy provisions.

4.2.2 Any construction contracts relative to Consultant's Services shall require that the Client and Consultant be included as additional insureds on the contractor's and contractor's subcontractors' commercial general liability and commercial automobile liability insurance policies and that the coverage afforded Client and Consultant is primary to any insurance maintained by Client or Consultant and that Client and Consultant's insurance is non-contributory with any coverage afforded by contractor and subcontractors. Client will also require contractor and all subcontractors to purchase and maintain workers' compensation and employer's liability insurance.

Consultant will name the Client as additional insured on Consultant's commercial general liability insurance.

4.3 Successors and Assigns

- <u>4.3.1</u> Client and Consultant each binds itself and its partners, successors, executors, administrators, assigns, and legal representatives to the other party to this Agreement and to the partners, successors, executors, administrators, assigns, and legal representatives of such other party, in respect to all covenants, agreements, and obligations of this Agreement.
- **4.3.2** Neither Consultant nor Client shall assign or transfer any rights under or interest in (including, but without limitation, moneys that may become due or moneys that are due) this Agreement without the written consent of the other party, except as stated in paragraph 4.3.1 and except to the extent that the effect of this limitation may be restricted by law. Unless specifically stated to the contrary in any written consent to an assignment, no assignment will release or discharge the assignor from any duty or responsibility under this Agreement. Nothing contained in this paragraph shall prevent Consultant from employing such independent consultants, associates, and subconsultants as it may deem appropriate to assist in the performance of services hereunder.
- **4.3.3** Nothing herein shall be construed to give any rights or benefits hereunder to any one other than Client and Consultant except as otherwise provided herein.

4.4 Compliance with Law

- **4.4.1** Consultant shall exercise the professional standard of care to comply with, and cause its subconsultants to comply with, applicable Federal, state, and local laws, orders, rules, and regulations in effect at the time services are rendered, and relating to the performance of the services Consultant is to perform under this Agreement. If the Scope of Services requires Consultant to prepare an application for a permit, Consultant does not represent or warrant that said permit or approval will be issued by any governmental body.
- **4.4.2** Neither the Consultant nor the Consultant's agents or employees shall discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment to be employed in the performance of this Agreement with respect to hiring, tenure, terms, conditions, or privileges of employment, because of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin.

4.5 Ownership and Reuse of Documents

- 4.5.1 All drawings, specifications, test reports, and other materials and work products which have been prepared or furnished by Client prior to this Agreement shall remain Client's property. Consultant shall be permitted to rely on Client furnished documents and Client shall make available to Consultant copies of these materials as necessary for the Consultant to perform the services requested hereunder.
- 4.5.2 All drawings, specifications, test reports, and other materials and work products, including computer aided drawings, designs, and other data filed on electronic media which will be prepared or furnished by Consultant (and Consultant's independent professional associates and subconsultants) under this Agreement, are instruments of

service in respect to the Project and Consultant shall retain an ownership and property interest therein whether or not the Project is completed. Client may make and retain copies for information and reference in connection with the use and the occupancy of the Project by Client and others; however, such documents are not intended or represented to be suitable for reuse by Client or others acting on behalf of Client on extensions of the Project or on any other project. Further, Consultant makes no warranty as to the compatibility of computer data files with computer software and software releases other than that used by Consultant in performing services herein, and to the condition or availability of the computer data after an acceptance period of thirty (30) days from delivery to Client. Any reuse without written verification or adaptation by Consultant for the specific purpose intended will be at Client's sole risk and without liability or legal exposure to Consultant or to Consultant's independent professional associates or subconsultants, and Client shall indemnify and hold harmless Consultant and Consultant's independent professional associates and subconsultants from all claims, damages, losses, and expenses including attorneys' fees arising out of or resulting therefrom. Any such verification or adaptation will entitle Consultant to further compensation at rates to be agreed upon by Client and Consultant.

4.6 Consultant's Personnel at Project Site

- 4.6.1 The presence or duties of the Consultant at a Project site, whether as onsite personnel representatives or otherwise, do not make the Consultant or its personnel in any way responsible for those duties that belong to the Client and/or the construction contractors or other entities, and do not relieve the construction contractors or any other entity of their obligations, duties, and responsibilities, including, but not limited to, all construction methods, means, techniques, sequences, and procedures necessary for coordinating and completing all portions of the construction work in accordance with the project documents and any health or safety precautions required by such construction work. The Consultant and its personnel have no authority to exercise any control over any construction contractor or other entity or their employees in connection with their work or any health or safety precautions and have no duty for inspecting, noting, observing, correcting, or reporting on health or safety deficiencies of the construction contractor or other entity or any other persons at the site except Consultant's own personnel.
- 4.6.2 To the extent Consultant's Scope of Work includes construction observation, the Consultant shall keep the Owner reasonably informed about the progress and quality of the portion of the Work completed, and report to the Owner (1) known deviations from the Contract Documents and from the most recent construction schedule submitted by the Contractor, and (2) defects and deficiencies observed in the Work. Consultant neither guarantees the performance of the contractor(s) nor assumes responsibility for contractor(s)' failure to perform their work in accordance with the project documents.

4.7 Opinions of Cost, Financial Considerations, and Schedules

In providing opinions of cost, financial analyses, economic feasibility projections, and schedules for the Project, the Consultant has no control over the cost of labor, materials, equipment, or services furnished by others, or over the Contractor(s)' methods of determining prices, or over competitive bidding or market conditions. Consultant's opinions of probable Total Project Costs and Construction Costs provided for herein as appropriate are made on the basis of Consultant's experience and qualifications and represent Consultant's judgments as an experienced and qualified professional consultant familiar with the construction industry. Consultant makes no warranty that the Client's actual Total Project or Construction Costs, financial aspects, economic feasibility, or schedules will not vary from the Consultant's opinions, analyses, projections, or estimates. If Client wishes greater assurance as to any element of the Total Project or Construction cost, feasibility, or schedule, Client will employ an independent cost estimator, contractor, or other appropriate advisor.

4.8 Discovery of Unanticipated Pollutant and Hazardous Substance Risks

- **4.8.1** If Consultant, while performing the services, discovers pollutants and/or hazardous substances that pose unanticipated risks, it is hereby agreed that the scope of services, schedule, and the estimated cost of Consultant's services will be reconsidered and that this Agreement shall immediately become subject to renegotiation or termination.
- **4.8.2** In the event that the Agreement is terminated because of the discovery of pollutants and/or hazardous substances posing unanticipated risks, it is agreed that Consultant shall be paid for its total charges for labor performed and reimbursable charges incurred to the date of termination of this Agreement, including, if necessary, any additional labor or reimbursable charges incurred in demobilizing.
- 4.8.3 Client also agrees that the discovery of unanticipated pollutants and/or hazardous substances may make it necessary for Consultant to take immediate measures to protect health and safety. Consultant agrees to notify Client as soon as practically possible should unanticipated pollutants and/or hazardous substances be suspected or encountered. Client authorizes Consultant to take measures that in Consultant's sole judgment are justified to preserve and protect the health and safety of Consultant's personnel and the public. Client agrees to compensate Consultant for the additional cost of taking such additional precautionary measures to protect employees' and the public's health and safety. This section is not intended to impose upon Consultant any duties or obligations other than those imposed by law.

SECTION 5 - Professional Responsibility

5.1 Performance of Services

Consultant shall perform its services consistent with the professional skill and care ordinarily provided by firms practicing in the same or similar locality under the same or similar circumstances (hereinafter the "Standard of Care").

Consultant expressly disclaims all express or implied warranties and guarantees with respect to the performance of professional services, and it is agreed that the quality of such services shall be judged solely as to whether the services were performed consistent with the Standard of Care. Consultant owes Client only that level of performance defined in this Section 5.1, and nothing herein shall be construed as creating a fiduciary relationship.

If at any time prior to construction Client believes Consultant's services are deficient due to not meeting the Standard of Care, Client must immediately inform Consultant in writing and shall afford Consultant the opportunity to correct such deficiency. If, upon review by Consultant it is determined there is a deficiency that fails to meet the standard of care and it is attributable to Consultant, the deficiency shall be corrected at no additional cost to Client.

5.2 Limitation of Liability

Client and Consultant agree to allocate certain of the risks so that, to the fullest extent permitted by law, Consultant's total liability to Client is limited to the amount paid under the contract or \$50,000 whichever is greater, this being the Client's sole and exclusive remedy for any and all injuries, damages, claims, losses, expenses, or claim expenses (including attorney's fees) arising out of this Agreement from any cause or causes. Such causes include, but are not limited to, Consultant's negligence, errors, omissions, strict liability, breach of contract, or breach of warranty.

5.3 No Special or Consequential Damages

Client and Consultant agree that to the fullest extent permitted by law neither party shall be liable to the other for any special, indirect, or consequential damages whatsoever, whether caused by either party's negligence, errors, omissions, strict liability, breach of contract, breach of warranty, or other cause or causes.

5.4 Indemnification

To the fullest extent permitted by law, Client and Consultant mutually agree to indemnify and hold each other harmless from and against any and all claims, damages, losses and expenses, defense costs including reasonable attorneys' fees, and court or arbitration costs and other liabilities arising from their own negligent acts, errors or omissions in performance of their services under this Agreement, but only to the extent caused that each party is responsible for such damages, liabilities and costs on a comparative basis of fault

5.5 No Third Party Beneficiaries

Client and Consultant expressly agree that this Agreement does not confer upon any third party any rights as beneficiary to this Agreement. Consultant accepts no responsibility for damages, if any, suffered by any third party as the result of a third party's use of the work product, including reliance, decisions, or any other action taken based upon it.

Client agrees that Consultant's services and work products are for the exclusive present use of Client. Client agrees

that Consultant's compliance with any request by Client to address or otherwise release any portion of the work product to a third party shall not modify, rescind, waive, or otherwise alter provisions of this Agreement nor does it create or confer any third party beneficiary rights on any third party.

SECTION 6 - Miscellaneous Provisions

6.1 Notices

Any notice to either party herein shall be in writing and shall be served either personally or by registered or certified mail addressed to the signing party shown on the signature page.

6.2 Joint Preparation

For purposes of contract interpretation and for the purpose of resolving any ambiguity in this Agreement, the parties agree that this Agreement was prepared jointly by them and/or their respective attorneys.

6.3 Headings

Headings used in this Agreement are for the convenience of reference only and shall not affect the construction of this Agreement

6.4 Severability

If any of the provisions contained in this Agreement are held for any reason to be invalid, illegal, or unenforceable in any respect, such invalidity, illegality, or unenforceability will not affect any other provision, and this Agreement shall be construed as if such invalid, illegal, or unenforceable provision had never been contained herein.

6.5 Dispute Resolution

If negotiation in good faith fails to resolve a dispute within thirty (30) days of written notice of the dispute by either party, then the parties agree that, with the exception of claims that are subject to the applicable venue's small claims court jurisdiction, each dispute, claim or controversy arising from or related to this Agreement or the relationships which result from this Agreement shall be subject to mediation as a condition precedent to initiating legal or equitable actions by either party. Unless the parties agree otherwise, the mediation shall be in accordance with the Commercial Mediation Procedures of the American Arbitration Association then currently in effect. A request for mediation shall be filed in writing with the American Arbitration Association and the other party. No legal or equitable action may be instituted for a period of ninety (90) days from the filing of the request for mediation unless a longer period of time is provided by agreement of the parties. Cost of mediation shall be shared equally between the parties and shall be held in a location mutually agreed upon by the parties. The parties shall memorialize any agreement resulting from the mediation in a mediated settlement agreement, which agreement shall be enforceable as a settlement in any court having jurisdiction thereof.

During the pendency of any dispute, the parties shall continue diligently to fulfill their respective obligations

hereunder. Any dispute not resolved through mediation shall be subject to litigation in a court of competent jurisdiction in the state in which the project is located.

6.6 Equal Opportunity

Consultant will, in the performance of this Agreement, comply with federal, state, and local laws, and all regulations and orders issued under any applicable law related to equal employment opportunity, non-discrimination, or employment generally.

Consultant certifies that it will not knowingly employ or contract with a non-legal resident of the United States to perform work under this Agreement, and verifies or attempts to verify employee eligibility of its employees through participation in the U.S. Department of Homeland Security and Social Security Administration's E-Verify system.

6.7 Governing Law

This Agreement is to be governed by the laws of the jurisdiction in which the project is located. For locations outside of the United States, this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Illinois.

6.8 Entire Agreement

This Agreement, along with those documents specified, attached, or hereby cited together, and serially numbered Work Authorizations if used, constitute the entire Agreement between the parties hereto and no changes, modifications, extensions, terminations, or waivers of this Agreement, or other documents, or any of the provisions herein, or therein contained, shall be valid unless made in writing and signed by duly authorized representatives of both parties.

SUPPLEMENTAL CONDITIONS FOR SURVEY, ENVIRONMENTAL OR GEOTECHNICAL SERVICES

Sec. 1-10-47. Request for qualifications; pre-qualifications of contractors.

- (a) The Procurement Director, in consultation with the Administrator and using agency head may determine that it shall be in the best interest of Augusta, Georgia to pre-qualify offerors for contracts of a particular type. The imposed standards shall be met by any contractor who wishes submit a bid or proposal for the subject project. The contractor shall submit required data in order to obtain a fair and impartial determination of whether the pre-qualification standards have been met. When pre-qualification is required, only those contractors who submit the required pre-qualification information and who are actually pre-qualified to submit a bid or proposal for the proposed solicitation.
- (b) Public notice. Public notice of pre-qualification shall be given in the same manner as provided in section 1-10-50 (c).
- (c) Pre-qualification standards. The Procurement Director and affected using agency heads shall review all information submitted by the suppliers and, if necessary, require additional information. The standards set for pre-qualification shall include but not be limited to factors set forth in section 1-10-50-Sealed Bids; Bid Acceptance and Bid Evaluation or section 1-10-52-Sealed Proposals; Evaluation and Selection. If the Procurement Director and Administrator determine that the contractor meets all standards, then the contractor shall be so pre-qualified. The contractor shall be notified in writing.
- (d) Failure to pre-qualify. Should a contractor not be pre-qualified, appropriate written notice shall be sent and the contractor may appeal such determination as provided in Article 9.
- (e) In no instance shall a contract be awarded from the solicitation of request for qualifications.

Sec. 1-10-51. Request for proposals.

Request for proposals shall be handled in the same manner as the bid process as described above for solicitation and awarding of contracts for goods or services with the following exceptions:

(a) Only the names of the vendors making offers shall be disclosed at the proposal opening.

- (b) Content of the proposals submitted by competing persons shall not be disclosed during the process of the negotiations.
- (c) Proposals shall be open for public inspection only after the award is made.
- (d) Proprietary or confidential information, marked as such in each proposal, shall not be disclosed without the written consent of the offeror.
- (e) Discussions may be conducted with responsible persons submitting a proposal determined to have a reasonable chance of being selected for the award. These discussions may be held for the purpose of clarification to assure a full understanding of the solicitation requirement and responsiveness thereto.
- (f) Revisions may be permitted after submissions and prior to award for the purpose of obtaining the best and final offers.
- (g) In conducting discussions with the persons submitting the proposals, there shall be no disclosure of any information derived from the other persons submitting proposals.

Sec. 1-10-52. Sealed proposals.

- (a) Conditions for use. In accordance with O.C.G.A. § 36-91-21(c)(1)(C), the competitive sealed proposals method may be utilized when it is determined in writing to be the most advantageous to Augusta, Georgia, taking into consideration the evaluation factors set forth in the request for proposals. The evaluation factors in the request for proposals shall be the basis on which the award decision is made when the sealed proposal method is used. Augusta, Georgia is not restricted from using alternative procurement methods for obtaining the best value on any procurement, such as Construction Management at Risk, Design/Build, etc.
- (b) Request for proposals. Competitive sealed proposals shall be solicited through a request for proposals (RFP).
- (c) Public notice. Adequate public notice of the request for proposals shall be given in the same manner as provided in section 1-10- 50(c)(Public Notice and Bidder's List); provided the normal period of time between notice and receipt of proposals minimally shall be fifteen (15) calendar days.

- (d) Pre-proposal conference. A pre-proposal conference may be scheduled at least five (5) days prior to the date set for receipt of proposals, and notice shall be handled in a manner similar to section 1-10-50(c)-Public Notice and Bidder's List. No information provided at such pre-proposal conference shall be binding upon Augusta, Georgia unless provided in writing to all offerors.
- (e) Receipt of proposals. Proposals will be received at the time and place designated in the request for proposals, complete with bidder qualification and technical information. No late proposals shall be accepted. Price information shall be separated from the proposal in a sealed envelope and opened only after the proposals have been reviewed and ranked.
 - The names of the offerors will be identified at the proposal acceptance; however, no proposal will be handled so as to permit disclosure of the detailed contents of the response until after award of contract. A record of all responses shall be prepared and maintained for the files and audit purposes.
- (f) Public inspection. The responses will be open for public inspection only after contract award. Proprietary or confidential information marked as such in each proposal will not be disclosed without written consent of the offeror.
- (g) Evaluation and selection. The request for proposals shall state the relative importance of price and other evaluation factors that will be used in the context of proposal evaluation and contract award. (Pricing proposals will not be opened until the proposals have been reviewed and ranked). Such evaluation factors may include, but not be limited to:
 - (1) The ability, capacity, and skill of the offeror to perform the contract or provide the services required;
 - (2) The capability of the offeror to perform the contract or provide the service promptly or within the time specified, without delay or interference;
 - (3) The character, integrity, reputation, judgment, experience, and efficiency of the offeror;
 - (4) The quality of performance on previous contracts;
 - (5) The previous and existing compliance by the offeror with laws and ordinances relating to the contract or services;
 - (6) The sufficiency of the financial resources of the offeror relating to his ability to perform the contract;

- (7) The quality, availability, and adaptability of the supplies or services to the particular use required; and
- (8) Price.
- (h) Selection committee. A selection committee, minimally consisting of representatives of the procurement office, the using agency, and the Administrator's office or his designee shall convene for the purpose of evaluating the proposals.
- (i) Preliminary negotiations. Discussions with the offerors and technical revisions to the proposals may occur. Discussions may be conducted with the responsible offerors who submit proposals for the purpose of clarification and to assure full understanding of, and conformance to, the solicitation requirements. Offerors shall be accorded fair and equal treatment with respect to any opportunity for discussions and revision of proposals and such revisions may be permitted after submission and prior to award for the purpose of obtaining best and final offers. In conducting discussions, there shall be no disclosure of information derived from proposals submitted by competing offerors.
- (j) From the date proposals are received by the Procurement Director through the date of contract award, no offeror shall make any substitutions, deletions, additions or other changes in the configuration or structure of the offeror's teams or members of the offeror's team.
- (k) Final negotiations and letting the contract. The Committee shall rank the technical proposals, open and consider the pricing proposals submitted by each offeror. Award shall be made or recommended for award through the Augusta, Georgia Administrator, to the most responsible and responsive offeror whose proposal is determined to be the most advantageous to Augusta, Georgia, taking into consideration price and the evaluation factors set forth in the request for proposals. No other factors or criteria shall be used in the evaluation. The contract file shall contain a written report of the basis on which the award is made/recommended. The contract shall be awarded or let in accordance with the procedures set forth in this Section and the other applicable sections of this chapter.

INTERGOVERNMENTAL SERVICE AGREEMENT

This INTERGOVERNMENTAL SERVICE AGREEMENT, dated as of _______, 2023, by and between the Augusta-Richmond County Coliseum Authority (the "Authority"), a public corporation created and existing under the laws of the State of Georgia, and Augusta, Georgia ("Augusta"), a political subdivision created and existing under the laws of the State of Georgia;

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Authority and Augusta have determined that it is in their best interest to create a relationship in which the Parties shall seek government relations and federal lobbying services; and

WHEREAS, such relationship is to the mutual benefit of the Authority and Augusta as the provision of these Services will allow the Parties to present a more comprehensive plan for the allocation of federal funds; and

WHEREAS, in a Meeting of the Augusta, Georgia Commission (the "Commission") held on ______, 2023, the Commission authorized the transfer of one hundred and twenty thousand dollars (\$120,000.00) to the Authority for the purpose of coordinating the delivery of Services;

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the promises and covenants hereinafter contained, the Parties hereby agree as follows:

- 1. SERVICES. The Authority will undertake to enter into such agreements as necessary to expand the above-referenced Services. The Authority does not guarantee the results of these Services or any federal funding as a result of these Services.
- 2. FUNDS TRANSFER. Upon the execution of this Agreement, Augusta shall transfer one hundred and twenty thousand dollars (\$120,000.00) to the account of the Authority to fund the Services described in paragraph 1 above.
- 3. **DURATION.** This Agreement shall become effective upon execution by the Parties and shall remain in place until such time as the transferred funds, in the amount of one hundred and twenty thousand dollars (\$120,000.00), are depleted. Upon the depletion of said funds, the Parties may mutually agree to renew this Agreement, in writing, and such renewal shall be contingent upon the additional funds being transferred between the Parties. Each subsequent renewal shall remain in place until such time that the additional funds have been depleted, and there shall be no limit on the number of renewals between the Parties; however, under no circumstances shall this Agreement extend beyond three (3) years from the date of execution, regardless of the availability of funding.
- 4. COUNTERPARTS. This Agreement may be executed in two (2) or more identical counterparts, which, when delivered, shall constitute one in the same instrument and shall be enforceable as if all Parties had executed a single document. To expedite the execution of this

Consent, the Parties agree that this Consent may be signed by hand or by electronic means on the signature line of this document. The Parties agree that all such signatures shall be fully binding and that the counterpart signatures may be transmitted by mail, hand delivery, email and/or by any other electronic method to the other party or counsel of record for the party and will have the same binding effect as any original ink signature. It is further agreed that this Consent shall be fully effective when signed by all Parties hereto.

Caption: Motion to authorize the execution of a Joint Funding Agreement with the U.

S. Department of the Interior U. S. Geological Survey (USGS) for the operation, modeling and analyzing of monitoring wells to investigate water levels and water quality for Augusta's groundwater production facilities. The request is to include an annual renewal for an additional three years unless the cost increases above \$150,000 in any year. (Approved by Engineering

Services Committee March 14, 2023)

Background: Monitoring groundwater levels and quality is important for protection and

effective management of our water resources. The Augusta water supply at our three groundwater production facilities draws water from the Dublin-Midville aquifer system. The continuation of the monitoring program that is being proposed will provide valuable information to protect this important water source for Augusta. The attached proposed agreement for year 2023

sets the cost at \$123,400.00.

Analysis:

The proposed program is to continue monitoring the current groundwater

levels, flow directions and water quality in the Dublin-Midville aquifer system up-gradient of our three established well fields. The data gathered from the monitoring process will provide information to support water management and water quality protection for our production facilities. This program also includes a groundwater modeling component. This program is

an important part of our efforts to insure the future availability of

groundwater as a valuable component of our water production capabilities. As such, we believe that the continuation of our ongoing partnership with the USGS into the foreseeable future is highly desirable. Since this needs to be an ongoing commitment we believe that this agreement should be approved and authorized for annual renewal for an additional three years unless the

cost increases above \$150,000 in any year.

Financial Impact: \$123,400.00 is within the budgeted amount included in our approved 2021

budget for this expense.

Alternatives: No feasible alternatives.

Groundwater resources in the Cretaceous aquifer system, Augusta, Richmond County area, Georgia, 2023

Background

The Cretaceous aquifer system is the second most productive aquifer in Georgia and a major source of water in the region (Painter, 2019; Williams, 2007; Fanning, 2003). About 166.4 million gallons per day (Mgal/d) of water was withdrawn from the Cretaceous aquifer system during 2015 in Georgia (Painter, 2019). The Augusta, Richmond County Water System is the largest public water supplier in Richmond County, withdrawing about 7.68 Mgal/d in 2021 from the Cretaceous aquifer system.




Figure 1. Cretaceous aquifer system, location of Richmond County, Georgia; map and hydrogeologic cross section (map modified from USGS, 2006).

The Cretaceous aquifer system extends as a band, roughly 50 to 75 miles wide, from southwest to eastern Georgia. The up-dip limit of the Cretaceous aquifer system is the Fall Line, the boundary between the Piedmont and Coastal Plain Provinces (Clark and Zisa, 1976; fig. 1). Sand and clay units comprise the Cretaceous aquifer system. Underlying the Cretaceous is crystalline rock; overlying the Cretaceous are Tertiary sand and clay deposits that make up the stratigraphic equivalent of the carbonate Floridan aquifer system in coastal Georgia (figs. 1 and 2).




Figure 3. Augusta Utilities three well fields, selected continuous-recorder wells, surface geology, and municipalities, Richmond County, Georgia. The two continuous-recorder wells at the north end of Well Field 2 are schematically shown.

All groundwater for the Augusta, Richmond County Water System is from three well fields that withdraw water from the upper and lower Midville aquifers, in the lower part of the Cretaceous aquifer system (fig. 3). In 1999, low levels of volatile organic compounds (VOCs) were detected in water samples from several wells in Augusta's northernmost well field within the up-dip part of the Cretaceous aquifer system (Well Field 1, fig. 3). Detections of the VOCs resulted in the closure of those wells. Also in 1999, the VOCs tetrachloroethene (PCE) and trichloroethene (TCE) were detected in a production well at the northernmost extent of Well Field 2 (fig. 3).

Problem

The Augusta, Richmond County, GA area is dependent upon groundwater resources from the Cretaceous aquifer for water-supply. This resource has been extensively developed by communities within the county and several instances of water-quality impairment have resulted in water-supply wells being abandoned. As mentioned above, Augusta Utilities has closed some wells in the up-dip part of the Cretaceous aquifer system due to contamination. Down-dip of the Augusta, Richmond County area, groundwater levels are steadily declining based on water-level data from wells in Well Field 3 and several continuous recorder wells south of Well Field 3. Groundwater levels and water quality in the study area need to be monitored, long-term, to determine continued sustainability of the groundwater resource. Tracking water-level changes and possible movement of contaminants is essential to management and future development of water-supplies.

Objective and Scope

The main objective of this project is to continue assessing the groundwater resource in the Cretaceous aquifers within the Augusta, Richmond County area, to assist water suppliers with management and planning. Specific objectives for 2023 include:

- 1. Continue the operation of four continuous-recorder wells.
- 2. Measure discrete groundwater levels once during the summer at approximately 60 wells throughout the Richmond County area.
- 3. Collect water-quality samples at approximately 12 wells once during the summer.
- 4. Measure the discharge rate of each operating Well Field 2 well once during the spring.
- 5. Provide ongoing technical expertise to review and interpret monitoring results.

Relevance and benefits

This study aligns with at least three USGS Water Science objectives (Evenson and others, 2013): (1) assessment of water resources and their suitability to meet human and ecosystem needs; (2) understanding of human interactions with water availability; (3) development and application of models to predict changes in the quantity and quality of water resources in response to changing climate. Monitoring groundwater levels and water quality will provide key information concerning the sustainability of the groundwater resource, and the nature of local groundwater recharge and discharge in the up-dip (outcrop area) part of the Cretaceous aquifers. The study will provide updated information that can be used in the future to update a groundwater flow model and to simulate the effects of pumping and climate variability on water quality and quantity in the Cretaceous aquifer system. Results will aid in determining how physiographic features such as minor streams, major tributaries, and the Savannah River alluvial plain and channel, and pumping stress affect local flow patterns within the groundwater system. The study will improve understanding of contamination of the aquifer system from surface sources and potential directions and rates of movement of contaminants. Findings from Well Field 2 will be transferrable to the up-dip part of the Cretaceous aquifer system throughout the region.

Approach

Specific objectives for 2023 will be achieved by accomplishing the following tasks. Data-collection efforts (tasks 1-4) are summarized in table 1 and described in more detail within this section and in appendix tables 1 and 2.

1. Ongoing operation of four continuous-record wells

The USGS proposes to continue to record groundwater levels at 15-minute intervals at 4 wells, during calendar year 2023 (fig. 3; table 2; appendix table 1). Long-term records are critical for understanding how factors such as nearby well pumping, barometric effects, earth tides, and rainfall events impact water levels and how the aquifer responds to stress. These sites are already established and have been operated for several years.

2. Measure discrete water levels throughout Richmond County

The USGS has conducted a summertime synoptic survey of groundwater levels in Richmond County for several years to document long-term groundwater-level trends as well as spatial variations across the study area in individual years. We propose to continue this effort annually during calendar year 2023. With the continued cooperation of well owners, the USGS will measure water levels in approximately 60 wells throughout the Richmond County area over a period of less than two weeks to provide a "snapshot" of groundwater levels throughout the county. Candidate wells are listed in Appendix table 1. In active Augusta Utilities well fields, measurements will be made only after all well-field pumps have been off for at least four hours. This minimizes the effect of pumping on measured water levels from year to year, thereby enhancing the assessment of long-term water-level trends.

3. Assess water quality in selected wells

Water quality samples will be collected from 12 wells annually during the summer, along with quality-control samples. Sampling will focus on production wells in Well Field 2 and "sentinel" wells up-flow from Well Field 2 (appendix table 1). The sentinel wells (wells 101, 102, 108, west Airport well, and the two Tobacco Road wells) have already been early warning beacons for mercury and TCE. Starting in 2021, one Well Field 3 well also has been sampled per year, alternating among the four production wells. Alternating wells in Well Field 3 well each year allows all wells to be sampled over time while minimizing sample cost. Production wells can only be sampled if they are in operation. If a production well that is planned for sampling is not in operation, USGS will attempt to sample another well. A lack of alternate wells may result in fewer sampled wells than was planned.

Field properties (water temperature, dissolved oxygen, specific conductance at 25°C, pH, turbidity, and deliberature) water below land surface) will be measured at the time of sampling. Water samples will be collected for analysis of additional physical properties, major ions, trace elements, nutrients, radon-222, and volatile organic compounds (table 3; appendix table 2). All samples will be analyzed at USGS laboratories using methods that are adequately sensitive to monitor the low concentrations detected in previous years. Results will characterize current water-quality and also support assessments of trends in potential contaminant concentrations and/or movement of contaminants within the study area—information that is vital for water suppliers.

Major ions provide insight about water chemistry and possible groundwater flow within the system. Trace elements, nutrients, and volatile organic compounds may reveal contamination from surface sources. For example, samples previously collected from Well Field 2 contained detectable concentrations of lead, mercury, beryllium, nitrate plus nitrite, chlorinated ethenes such as TCE, MTBE, and trichloromethane. Radon-222 is a naturally occurring radioactive isotope; however, consumption of water with high concentrations of radon-222 or breathing radon-222 exsolved from running water increases the incidence of cancer (U.S. EPA, 2018). Well Field 2 wells are being sampled for radon-222 for a period of 5 years to assess its presence and possible trends. Radon-222 has already been sampled for two years (2021 and 2022) and will be sampled for another three years (2023 through 2025) to complete the 5-year study period.

4. Measure discharge rate of Well Field 2 wells

Discharge (pumping) rate of wells provides valuable input to a groundwater model and a better understanding of water use. In 2023 and subsequent odd-numbered years, discharge rates will be measured at active production wells in Well Field 2 (wells 103, 104, 105, 106, 107, 112 planned for 2023; appendix table 1) in careful coordination with Augusta Utilities staff. The procedure is relatively easy to perform (performed in 2013, 2014, and 2019) using the existing SCADA system which monitors combined flow from all production wells of a given well field. This procedure has even detected problems when production wells were not pumping. In addition to measuring discharge rate, USGS maintains a dialogue with Augusta about well pump status. This information creates a pump history which is crucial in groundwater modeling work, and assists in planning water-quality data collection.

5. Ongoing technical expertise and review

Continued monitoring into the future will reveal different processes. The USGS will review the data for quality assurance and will also regularly check for new trends and patterns that are important to understand groundwater supply and water quality. As in previous years, findings will be discussed with Augusta Utilities on, at minimum, an annual basis.

Quality Assurance/Quality Control

Groundwater-level and water-quality data will be reviewed and entered into the National Water Information System (NWIS). Water levels are verified by measuring non-pumping wells at least twice and pumping wells at least three times after the pump is shut off, during a single visit. Groundwater-level measurement techniques will adhere to the South Atlantic Water Science Center (SAWSC) Groundwater Quality-Assurance Plan (U.S. Geological Survey, internal document).

All water-quality activities will be conducted in accordance with the Quality-Assurance Plan for Water-Quality
Activities of the South Atlantic Water Science Center (U.S. Geological Survey, internal document). Equipment cleaning
and sample collection and processing will follow procedures outlined in the USGS National Field Manual for the
Collection of Water-Quality Data (U. S. Geological Survey, variously dated). These protocols were developed to prevent
contamination of samples containing low-level concentrations of trace elements and have been used by the USGS since
1994. In addition to environmental water-quality samples collected from wells, field blanks, field replicates, and spikes
will also be collected. Approximately 25 percent of the water-quality samples will be equipment blanks, field blanks, and
field replicate samples for quality assurance of sample collection procedures and laboratory analyses.

Samples collected by USGS will be either analyzed in the field or analyzed at the USGS NWQL in Denver,

Colorado, which is accredited by the National Environmental Laboratory Accreditation Conference (table 3). Field

parameters (water temperature, dissolved oxygen, specific conductance at 25°C, pH, turbidity, and depth to water

below land surface) are measured using techniques described in USGS (variously dated) or Cunningham and Schalk

(2011). The NWQL adheres to a comprehensive Quality Management System to ensure the quality of its work processes,

products, and services (Maloney, 2005). Project personnel will review all field and laboratory analytical results. Data will

be entered into the USGS National Water Information System (NWIS) data base. Data stored in NWIS pass through

automated quality-control checks of data consistency and will be available online.

Products

Groundwater-level and water-quality data will be stored in NWIS and available on the internet through NWIS-Web (USGS, 2021). Monthly groundwater withdrawals, by well field, will be compiled and entered in the NWIS (Site-specific Water-Use Data System or "SWUDS"). One or more presentations will be provided each year to the cooperator on project status and outcomes. Other presentations will be given at applicable conferences. A summer annual meeting will be held to discuss plans for the next calendar year. As in previous years, a winter annual meeting will be held to present the state of the groundwater in Richmond County and the well fields based on data collected during the previous summer and from previous years.

Timeline

Study activities throughout 2023 will be similar to previous years (table 4). Annual data collection for synoptic, discrete water levels and collection of water-quality samples occurs in early summer. The available groundwater model may be interrogated to gain insight into the latest data findings. Two annual meetings with Augusta Utilities will be conducted. At the meeting in July (annual summer meeting), we will discuss plans for the following calendar year. At the meeting in December (annual winter meeting), we will discuss the state of the groundwater system based on data collected during the summer and from previous years.

Personnel

One project lead, hydrologist, will oversee the completion of the review and publication of the Scientific Investigations Report and Data Releases, perform annual measurements of groundwater levels and site visits for about 60 wells, assist in water-quality sampling, compile and analyze data, manage the project, discuss plans for next calendar year in annual summer meetings, and present findings and project progress at an annual winter meeting with the Augusta Utilities. Multiple hydrologic technicians will operate the four continuous-recorder wells and collect and send water samples to the National Water-Quality Lab in Denver, Colorado. Other experienced USGS staff will provide expert guidance on data review and entry of collected data, and the review and completion of the Scientific Investigations Report and Data Release.

Potential Future Directions

- Sample one well in Well Field 3, each year, for two cycles. A decision needs to
 be made whether or not to sample LSC5 which currently is a back-up well on the
 southern end of the well field. After each well has been sampled twice, and a
 decision is made about well LSC5, it will be determined if 4 of or all 5 wells in
 Well Field 3 will be sampled annually.
- Add three additional water-quality wells around Well Field 2.
- A one-time sample collected from Well Field 2 wells for pesticides, pharmaceuticals, and hormones (see appendix table 3)
- Regular production of information products (water-quality trends, modeling TCE, MTBE and mercury, water-level trends).

Project Budget

The multi-year funding agreement is for the period from January 01, 2023, through December 31, 2023. Total cost of the project will be \$216,700. The U.S. Geological Survey will contribute \$93,300. This leaves \$123,400 for Augusta Utilities to contribute to the cost of the project for calendar year 2023.

Analysis: Thermal imaging cameras, commonly referred to TICs, are a type of camera

used in firefighting. Thermal imaging cameras render infrared radiation as visible light and allow firefighters to see areas of heat through smoke, darkness, or heat permeable barriers. Since thermal imaging cameras can "see" through darkness or smoke, they enable firefighters to quickly find the seat of a structure fire and the heat signature of visually obscured victims.

Article 22 John S. McCain National Defense Authorization Act of Fiscal Year 2019

Recipients, subrecipients, and their contractors and subcontractors are subject to the prohibitions described in section 889 of the John S. Mr. Frantom: Thank you, Mr. Mayor. Just before we vote on this, I just think that as far as Chair and whatnot ought to be determined by this committee. I also think that the meetings ought to be in an open forum as well where the public is invited. Thank you.

Mr. Mayor: Thank you, Commissioner. The Chair recognizes the commissioner from the 1st.

Mr. Johnson: Thank you, Mr. Mayor. I want to add to this list of committee members the Procurement Director and I want also to just make the recommendation that the Administrator chairs it. It may not need to be in the motion but I want to make the recommendation that the Administrator chairs this committee but most definitely adding Procurement to the committee.

Mr. Mayor: Thank you, commissioner from the 1st. There is a couple of people in the medical community that have also expressed an interest in being a part of this committee. One is Lily Henson who is the new CEO of Piedmont Healthcare System. Her name is Dr. Lily Henson. There is another, her name is Dr. Abell. She is an EMS physician with AU Medical Center and for clarity I want to make sure I get her name correct. We did call her today asking her if she was

still interested in serving and she did. Her name is Becky Abell and she is an EMS physician with Augusta University Medical Center.

Mr. Brown: Mayor.

Mr. Mayor: Yes, sir.

Mr. Brown: Are these medical providers, are they sitting on as advisory members as they are not part of Augusta's staff?

Mr. Mayor: I would imagine they are serving as advisory members to this committee to provide their input and expertise from the medical community. The Chair now recognizes the commissioner from the 5h, Commissioner Williams.

Mr. Williams: Yes, sir. Mr. Garrett, I think that the people that the Mayor mentioned, is that enough hospital or do we need more hospital people?

Mr. Mayor: Yes, Dr. Abell is with the Augusta University Medical Center and Dr. Lily Henson is CEO of Piedmont Healthcare System.

Mr. Garrett: Should we have somebody from Doctors also represented?

Mr. Mayor: I think that would be prudent.

Mr. Williams: Yes, somebody from Doctors and also we have to make sure they have to be Augusta residents, am I right, Mr. Brown?

Mr. Brown: Actually, in an advisory capacity there wouldn't be any residential, residency requirement.

Mr. Williams: I'm in agreement with what everybody said so far and add the person from Doctors Hospital.

Mr. Mayor: Thank you, Commissioner. The Chair recognizes the commissioner from the 7th, Commissioner Frantom.

Mr. Frantom: Motion to approve as stated.

Ms. McKnight: Second.

Mr. Mayor: All right, Madam Clerk, there's a motion and a second. Commissioner from the 1st.

Mr. Johnson: Just want to get it restated because we added a few things.

The Clerk: The motion is to approve appointing the following positions on the 2023 Augusta Emergency Management sub-committee: the Administrator, General Counsel, Fire Chief, the Director of 911, Procurement, I'm sorry, CEO of the Piedmont Medical Center, Augusta University Medical Center Dr. Abell and members from Doctors and these will be advisory positions.

Mr. Johnson: Thank you, Mr. Mayor.

Mr. Mayor: And are the meetings going to be open to the public? Was that part of –

The Clerk: I don't know.

Mr. Johnson: Can we get a determination from legal on that one?

The Clerk: Yeah.

Mr. Johnson: Before we make that decision. I understand the premise, but I want to make sure that we don't get ourselves into a mess.

Mr. Brown: That would be the will of the Commission. Whatever the will of the Commission would be whether that's a public sub-committee or even though normally I will say that negotiating committee is treated as a staff function to which the public would not be, neither the public nor the Commission would be entitled to be present.

Mr. Mayor: Commissioner from the 1st.

Mr. Johnson: And that is a concern. I'll never advocate for the community not to be involved in things of this nature because the community should be but I think that in meetings like this where staff is deliberating, I don't know if having it in that type of forum is going to be helpful to the conversation. I mean certainly if any of us would like to attend, I'm not sure if anything would stop that but I don't understand the premise of the ask. I mean when our staff is going to the table to really fight on behalf of the citizens of Augusta, I think that they should have the full time to do that without commissioners or sub-groups or anyone breathing down their neck. So I would caution against the open forum although again it's the will of the Commission. But I just wanted to get a little clarity on what the intent there is.

Mr. Mayor: Thank you, Commissioner. I think the intent would be initially while we start the progress, the process, that we keep it open to the public but certainly once contract negotiations begin, that should be a closed process. I think having our medical professionals and our medical community involved in the input and the information being related from both sides is a benefit to the city as a whole but you're right and correct in that once the negotiations begin, that process should be done with the committee that represents Augusta Richmond County.

Mr. Johnson: Would the negotiations not be what this group is going to the table to do originally?

Mr. Mayor: I think this group is probably going to the table to understand what information is needed by Central EMS as well as trying to understand the needs of the community from a number of ambulances perspectives, understand the needs once they arrive at our medical facilities, how can we best get them away from there instead to wasting time there so I would imagine there should be some discussion initially about how we build a program and then from that point once we've done that, I think the discussions will get a little bit more specific regarding costs.

Mr. Johnson: Okay, just one last question. I'm done, Mr. Mayor, thank you. So just for my personal clarity so the negotiations will be done by a different committee or would this committee still be doing the negotiations?

Mr. Mayor: It's my understanding this committee will continue to do negotiations. I think the medical professionals are needed just to provide some input as to how we build a program that benefits the City. Once we get to specific terms on contractual terms, I think that's a decision that should be made by the City.

Mr. Johnson: Okay, thank you, Mr. Mayor.

Mr. Mayor: The Chair recognizes the commissioner from the 3rd.

Ms. McKnight: Thank you, Mr. Mayor. I just want to say that I believe that with what we've been through in the past it is very important for us to be transparent and to allow the citizens of Augusta and have the community be able to have this open and have them be able to come in and listen. That's my stance. Thank you.

Mr. Mayor: Commissioner from the 5th.

Mr. Williams: Yes, sir, I see Mr. Coker in the back. Can we have him come up and give us the purpose of this committee? And the second thing since we've got this back and forth about should it be public and not public or whatever I think that should be put in the form of a motion.

Mr. Mayor: Thank you, sir, I appreciate it. We'll entertain that motion just as soon as Mr. Coker addresses us. If you will, sir, for the record, please state your name and address.

Mr. Coker: Sure. Gary Coker, Marble Hill, Georgia. I'm the president of Central EMS. Mr. Mayor and commissioners, ladies and gentlemen, thank you. So, Mayor, did you have a question for me, sir?

Mr. Mayor: No, sir, I didn't.

Mr. Williams: I did. You know we're going back for what's the purpose of your committee. Can you tell us what's the purpose of your committee?

Mr. Coker: Yes, sir. Number one, as your provider going forward, we need to be able to develop a system that's going to work for you. As I've said before, I think your system currently is broken and together let's sit down and build a system that will work. In order to do that, we're

going to need the help. We're going to need the help that you've given us this committee to work with. It seems to me that that's a very talented committee that actually has people that understand ambulance and EMS systems and they should be able to come to some good decisions. So we're going to need to get the information that says things like this. What do you think the response time should be for your community? What do you think your citizens would want? What do you want? What number of ambulances will that take in order to provide that? What type of system do you want? Do you want an all-paramedic system? Do you want it to be blended to be paramedic and ambulance EMT or do you want the quick response vehicles with paramedics that can go out into the field and assist? A lot of specific things, criteria, that private ambulance service and public ambulance service both will work to aspire and we're going to put a private/public together. We need to have this data so we can decide what type of system you want built, number one. Number two, then we'll come in and say all right, here are the costs for this. Those will be completely transparent almost like your county budget, line item by line item by line item for everybody to see. This is what it costs to build the system and then of course this is the question that I'm asked 24 times, what is the cost. Right. Once we get these laid out on the table by your committee, we will then develop the cost and say here is the cost that it's going to be. And we want the cost to be where the government gets the best that they can for the dollars they spend for the citizens' dollars and so that the company can maintain and be profitable so that it will be here the next year and the next. That's what we need, sir.

Mr. Williams: Just surmising what you were saying is that that will be where you build consensus as to what we want but that won't necessarily be where the full negotiating will be. That will be with Procurement and whatever we deem necessary, correct?

Mr. Coker: We will negotiate with whoever you tell us to negotiate with. You, being the government, will assign someone to negotiate with us and then that's when we will negotiate with full transparency.

Mr. Williams: Thank you.

Mr. Mayor: The Chair recognizes the commissioner from the 7th.

Mr. Frantom: Thank you, Mr. Mayor. Number one, this should absolutely be open. The history of what has happened with this issue is the reason that I'm so adamite about it. I just think it's the right thing to do. The second piece is I would hope that this committee with the fact that we're on a May 8 deadline would be able to do the entire thing. We've already talked about how only our staff would be able to vote or however or whatever that is but there's not really time to kick the can down the road to make sure that this group isn't having the full discussion on what it's going to take for the ambulance service and to get a contract with Central so I'm in support. Hopefully if the motion is to open, I'm ready to vote. If it's to close, I'm going to make a substitute motion. Thank you.

Mr. Mayor: Thank you, commissioner. The Chair recognizes the commissioner from the 1st.

Mr. Johnson: Thank you, Mr. Mayor. I have clarity now. I was under the impression that

this committee was going to be doing the negotiations, but if this is just a meeting to where we're just having a conversation as to what it is going to take to get us to negotiations, I don't have a problem with the meeting being open. I just want to make sure that when we get into negotiations that we're out of the equation and that ya'll don't have the press and just folks down your throat, down your neck, you know what I mean so with that being said my concern has been addressed properly and I don't have an issue with this meeting being open.

Mr. Mayor: Thank you, Commissioner. So with that being said, Madam Clerk, do we need to entertain a motion to have this open or are we clear as a body?

The Clerk: Well, if you're adding it to the motion with no objection, we can do it without a separate motion.

Mr. Mayor: All right. Are there any objections to making this process open on the dias? All right. So it's unanimous.

The Clerk: Okay, it's added to the motion.


