Background: Motion to approve the FY 2021 Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG),

accept the grant award in the amount of \$52,800 (Grant No. EMW-2021-FG-

11673), and authorized the mayor to execute all required documents.

Analysis: Thermal imaging cameras, commonly referred to TICs, are a type of camera

used in firefighting. Thermal imaging cameras render infrared radiation as visible light and allow firefighters to see areas of heat through smoke, darkness, or heat permeable barriers. Since thermal imaging cameras can "see" through darkness or smoke, they enable firefighters to quickly find the seat of a structure fire and the heat signature of visually obscured victims.

Financial Impact: 10% Match of \$5,280

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Article 1 Assurances, Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, Representations and Certifications

I. The Buy America preference only applies to articles, materials, and supplies that are consumed in, incorporated into, or affixed to an infrastructure project. As such, it does not apply to tools, equipment, and supplies, such as temporary scaffolding, brought to the construction site and removed at or before the completion of the infrastructure project. Nor does a Buy America preference apply to equipment and furnishings, such as movable chairs, desks, and portable computer equipment, that are used at or within the finished infrastructure project but are not an integral part of the structure or permanently affixed to the infrastructure project. Waivers When necessary, recipients may apply for, and the agency may grant, a waiver from these requirements. Information on the process for requesting a waiver from these requirements is on the website below.
