**BACKGROUND/HISTORY:**

The Chief Financial Officer, or appointed staff, provides the City Council a monthly financial report overview for all funds to include detailed analysis for General Fund, Development Services Fund, Water-Wastewater Fund, Bastrop Power & Light and the HOT Tax Fund.

This reporting requirement is set forth by the City of Bastrop Financial Management Policies, Chapter IV. Operating Budget, Section D. Reporting, as adopted by Resolution R-2025-16 on September 23, 2025.

May 2026 financial highlights include:

The General Fund revenue (in total) exceeds the forecast by 8% or \$1.1M, while expenditures are running -10% below forecast or -\$1.3M. Sales Tax revenue is exceeding forecast by 7% and Property Tax Revenue is exceeding forecast by 9%. (The forecast for Sales Tax Revenue and Property Tax Revenue was conservative when it was established.)

The Enterprise Funds revenue is under forecast by -3% or -\$358K. While their expenditures are running -7%, or -\$918K under forecast.

As of May, the Special Revenue Funds revenues are less than forecasted by -3% or -\$461K and expenditures are running -12% or -\$1.3M less than forecasted.

- Development Services revenue is -8% under forecast with expenses running -15% less than forecast.
- Street Maintenance Fund revenue is 4% above forecast with expenses running 13% above forecast.
- Water/Wastewater Impact Fees revenues are running -12% lower than forecast or -\$280K for the month. Their year-to-date expenses are running 4% above forecast or \$112K.
- The HOT Fund revenue continues to run less than forecast with year-to-date revenues being -9% (-\$260K) less than forecast. While expenditures are running -7%, or -\$267K lower than forecast. The revenue forecast was based on more hotels coming online in FY2026.
- Hunters Crossing PID revenue year-to-date is -9% less than forecast, or -\$55K.

- BEDC's revenue is exceeding forecast by \$51K while their expenditures are running -43% below forecast.

Year-to-date Capital Expenditures include a total of \$12.6M with Street Projects totaling \$1.7M, Fleet and Facilities project totaling \$106K, \$7.7M on Park Projects which includes the Old Iron Bridge project, \$121K on BP&L Projects, \$2.9M on W/WW projects, as well as \$132K for Discover Bastrop.

# STAFF REPORT

**MEETING DATE:** June 23, 2026

**TITLE:**

Conduct a public hearing, consider and act on Ordinance No. 2026-17 a City-initiated zoning map amendment, as shown in Exhibit A, to rezone a portion of a block of properties located northeast of Fayette Street and Farm Street, within the city limits of Bastrop, Texas, from PI, Public and Institutional, to SF-1, Single Family Residential Low Density, for the following properties: PID Nos. 32234, 32243, 32279, 32333, 32288, 32324, 32315, 8736625, 49236, 32306, 32261, 32297, 32270, 53104, 36833, and 32342.

**BACKGROUND AND PURPOSE:**

On April 14, 2026, City Council adopted the new Bastrop Development Code, Ordinance No. 2026-06, and the associated Official Zoning Map, Ordinance No. 2026-07. These ordinances replaced the Bastrop Building Block (B3) Code and the former PlaceType Map.

Ordinance No. 2026-07 adopted the new Official Zoning Map and primarily served as a map conversion from the existing B3 PlaceTypes to the most comparable Bastrop Development Code zoning districts. The conversion used a crosswalk approach intended to maintain the overall land use patterns established under the previous map while transitioning to the new zoning district structure and terminology. The crosswalk was intended as follows:

Previous District Name (B3 Code)	New District Name and New Map Colors
P1 – Natural	P/OS – Parks and Open Space
P2 – Rural	RR – Rural Residential
P3 – Neighborhood	SF – Single Family Residential (SF-1, SF-2, SF-3)
P4 – Mix	MU – Mixed Use
P5 – Core	GC – General Commercial
Civic	PI – Public Institutional
Employment Center (EC)	IND – Industrial
Planned Development District (PDD)	PDD – Planned Development District

After adoption, staff identified a mapping error affecting a portion of the block located northeast of Fayette Street and Farm Street. The affected area includes 16 individual properties that were previously zoned P3, Neighborhood, under the B3 Code and PlaceType Map. Based on the

adopted zoning crosswalk, these properties should have been converted to SF-1, Single Family Low Density. However, the adopted map inadvertently showed the properties in blue, which represents the PI, Public Institutional zoning district.

To correct this error, staff is bringing forward a City-initiated zoning change to rezone the affected properties from PI, Public Institutional, to SF-1, Single Family Low Density. The SF-1 zoning district is the appropriate zoning classification based on the crosswalk presented and is the equivalent zoning district for the prior P3 PlaceType designation.

Property owners of the affected properties were notified by mail and by hand-delivered notice to the property address. If direct contact could not be made, the notice was left at the door. Property owners within 200 feet of the affected properties were also notified by mail. Notice was additionally provided by newspaper publication and by posted signs within the right-of-way along the affected block.

**PLANNING AND ZONING COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION:** Recommended approval with a vote of 6-0 at their May 28<sup>th</sup>, 2026 Regular Meeting.

**CITY COUNCIL FIRST READING:** Approval with a vote of 5-0 at their June 9<sup>th</sup>, 2026 Regular Meeting.

**RECOMMENDATION:**

Act on a City-initiated zoning map amendment, as shown in Exhibit A, to rezone a portion of a block of properties located northeast of Fayette Street and Farm Street, within the city limits of Bastrop, Texas, from PI, Public and Institutional, to SF-1, Single Family Residential Low Density, for the following properties: PID Nos. 32234, 32243, 32279, 32333, 32288, 32324, 32315, 8736625, 49236, 32306, 32261, 32297, 32270, 53104, 36833, and 32342.

**ORDINANCE NO. 2026-17**

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF BASTROP, TEXAS, AUTHORIZING A CITY-INITIATED ZONING MAP AMENDMENT TO REZONE CERTAIN PROPERTIES LOCATED NORTHEAST OF FAYETTE STREET AND FARM STREET, WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF BASTROP, TEXAS, FROM PI, PUBLIC AND INSTITUTIONAL, TO SF-1, SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL LOW DENSITY, AS SHOWN IN EXHIBIT A; AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF ALL NECESSARY DOCUMENTS; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; REPEALING CONFLICTING ORDINANCES; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE**

**WHEREAS,** the City of Bastrop, Texas (the “City”) is a home rule municipality located in Bastrop County, Texas acting under its Charter adopted by the electorate pursuant to Article XI, Section 5 of the Texas Constitution and Chapter 9 of the Texas Local Government Code; and

**WHEREAS,** on April 14, 2026, the City Council adopted the Bastrop Development Code, Ordinance No. 2026-06, and the associated Official Zoning Map, Ordinance No. 2026-07, and City staff subsequently identified a mapping error affecting certain properties located northeast of Fayette Street and Farm Street that were previously designated P3, Neighborhood, and should have been converted to SF-1, Single Family Residential Low Density, but were inadvertently shown as PI, Public and Institutional; and

**WHEREAS,** the City Council desires to correct the mapping error by approving a City-initiated zoning map amendment to rezone the affected properties from PI, Public and Institutional, to SF-1, Single Family Residential Low Density, as shown in Exhibit A, and notice of the proposed zoning map amendment was provided as required by law; and

**WHEREAS,** the City finds that this Ordinance was passed and approved at a meeting of the City Council of the City of Bastrop held in strict compliance with the Texas Open Meetings Act at which a quorum of the City Council Members was present and voting.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BASTROP, TEXAS, THAT:**

**Section 1.** The facts and recitations set forth in the preamble of this Ordinance are hereby found to be true and correct.

**Section 2.** The City Council of Bastrop authorizes the execution of the City-initiated

zoning map amendment to rezone certain properties located northeast of Fayette Street and Farm Street, within the city limits of Bastrop, Texas, from PI, Public and Institutional, to SF-1, Single Family Residential Low Density (attached and incorporated herein as Exhibit A).

- Section 3.** The City Council grants the zoning map amendment for the following properties: PID Nos. 32234, 32243, 32279, 32333, 32288, 32324, 32315, 8736625, 49236, 32306, 32261, 32297, 32270, 53104, 36833, and 32342. Upon the effective date of this Ordinance, the zoning classification for the affected properties shall be SF-1, Single Family Residential Low Density.
- Section 4.** The City Council directs the City Manager, or the City Manager's designee, to take all necessary actions to amend the Official Zoning Map to reflect the zoning map amendment approved by this Ordinance, and authorizes the execution of all documents necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of this Ordinance.
- Section 5.** Severability. If any clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be deemed to be unenforceable for any reason, such unenforceable clause or provision shall be severed from the remaining portion of the Ordinance, which shall continue to have full force and effect.
- Section 6.** Repeal. This Ordinance shall be and is hereby cumulative of all other ordinances of the City of Bastrop, Texas, and this Ordinance shall not operate to repeal or affect any of such other ordinances except insofar as the provisions thereof might be inconsistent or in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance, in which event such conflicting provisions, if any, in such other Ordinances, are hereby repealed.
- Section 7.** Effective Date. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately after its final passage and any publication in accordance with the requirements of the City of Bastrop and the laws of the State of Texas.

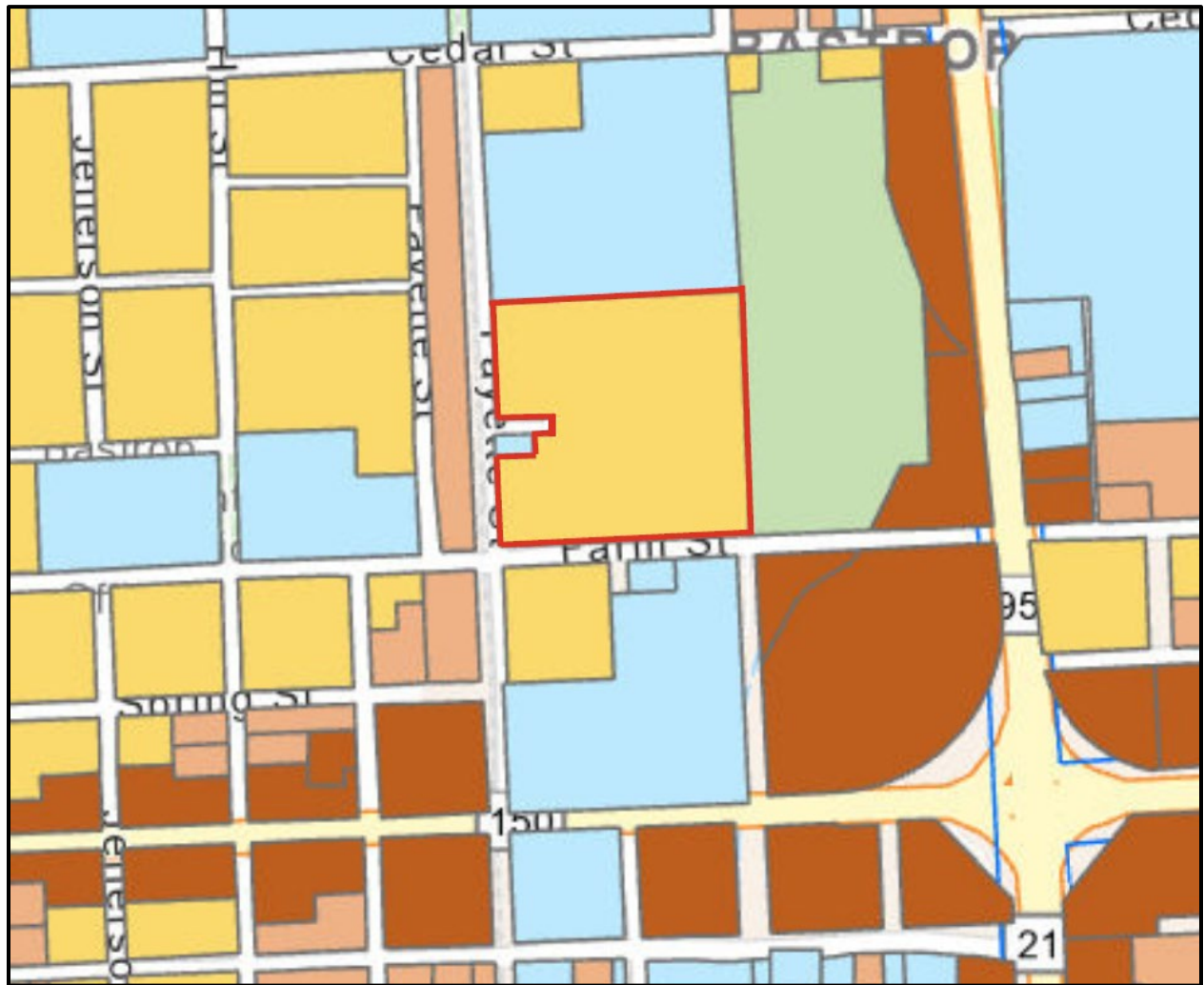

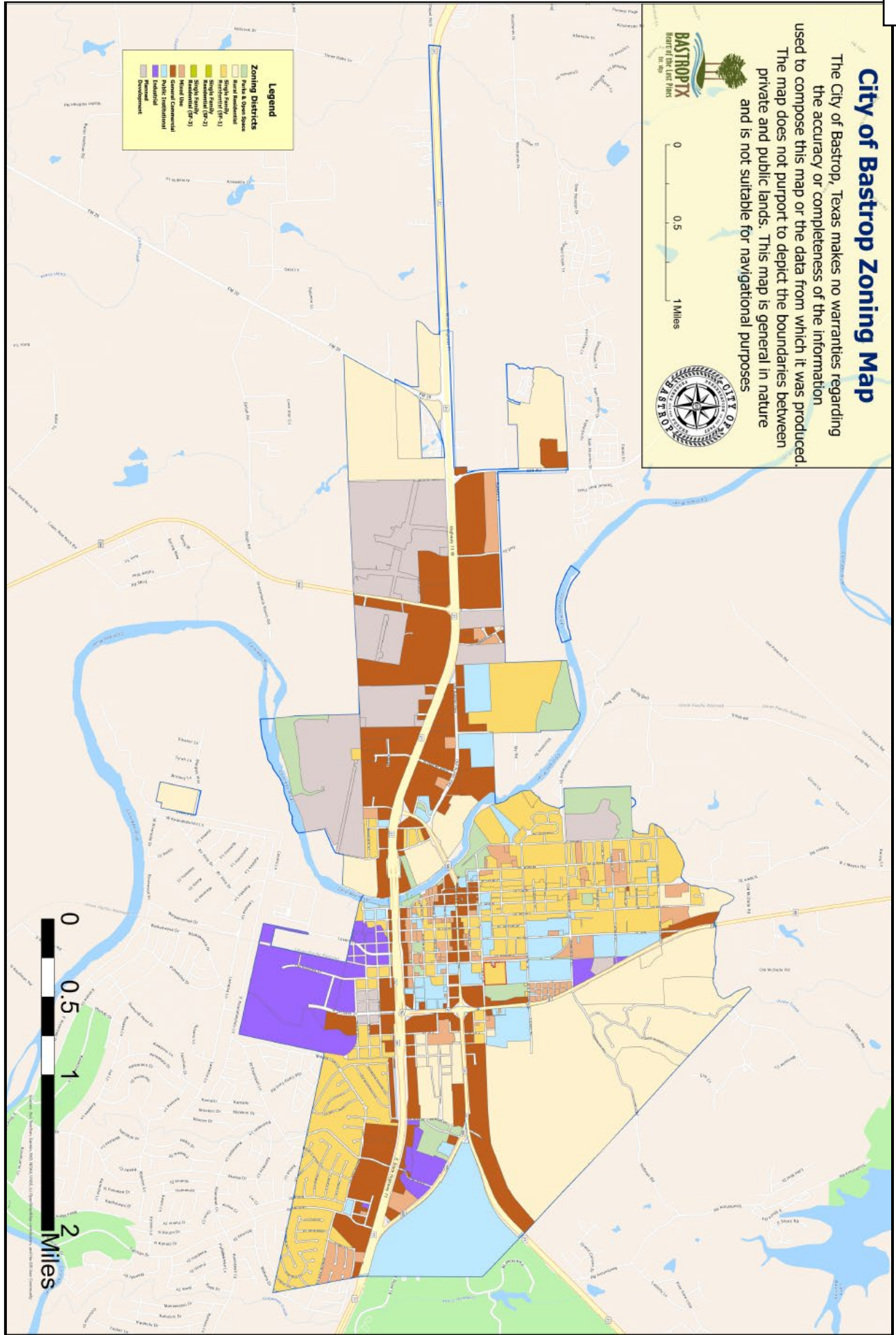

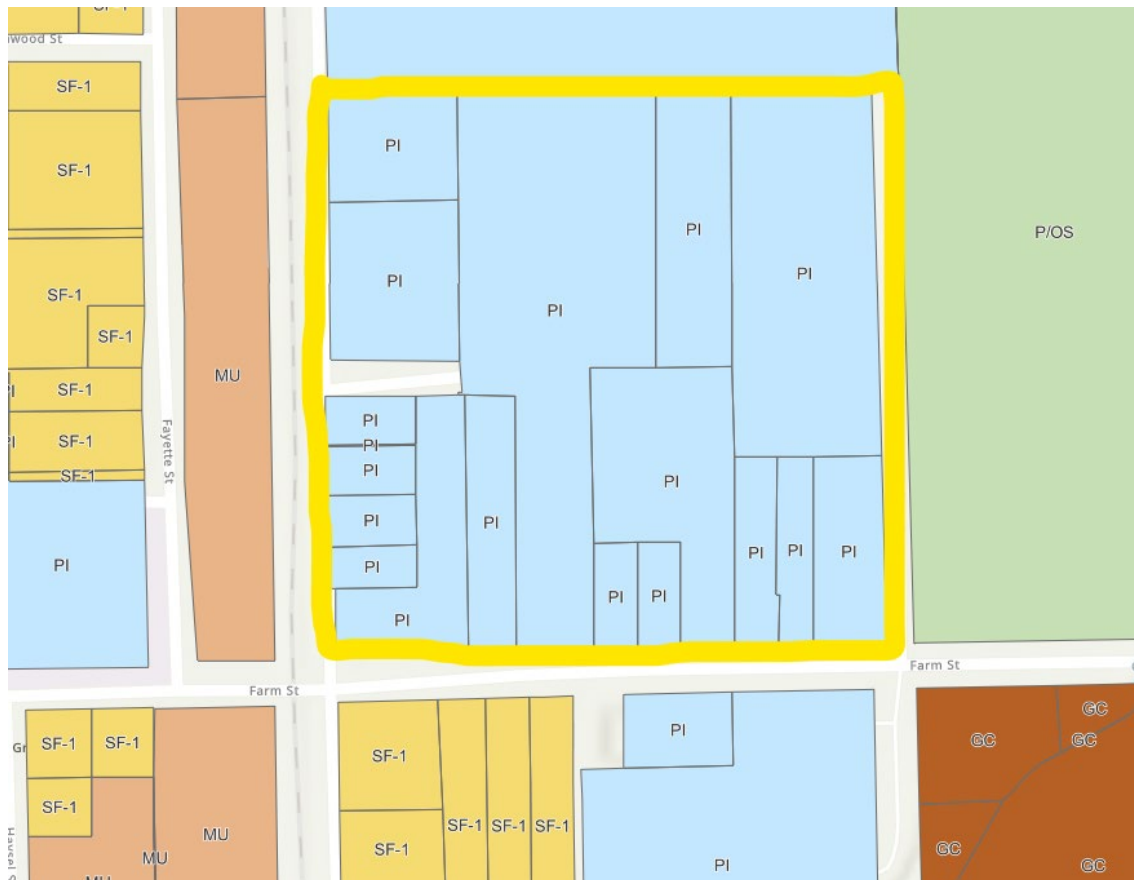

Conduct a public hearing, consider and act on Ordinance No. 2026-18 a City-initiated zoning map amendment, as shown in Exhibit A, for two City of Bastrop properties located on Grady Tuck Lane and south of Old Austin Highway, within the City limits of Bastrop, Texas. The request is to rezone the properties identified as PID 66319 and PID 35527 from PI, Public Institutional to P/OS, Parks and Open Space.

**BACKGROUND AND PURPOSE:**

The City of Bastrop owns a 0.84-acre tract generally located southeast of Grady Tuck Lane, northwest of Loop 150, and south of Old Austin Highway, further identified as Lot 3 of the Adell Powell Subdivision, Cabinet 4, Page 6-B, Plat Records of Bastrop County, Texas, Parcel 66319. The City also owns a 1.009-acre tract generally located west of Grady Tuck Lane and south of Old Austin Highway, further identified as Lot 2A, being a replat of Lot 2 of the Adell Powell Subdivision.

The Parks and Recreation Board has continued to discuss trail connectivity and parkland service gaps identified in the Parks and Recreation Master Plan. As part of those discussions, the Board considered the potential activation of these City-owned parcels and the opportunity to provide additional open space for residents along Old Austin Highway. At its March meeting, the Parks and Recreation Board voted to recommend that City Council dedicate these parcels as parkland.

The Bastrop Development Code establishes a Parks and Open Space zoning district intended for City-owned parks, open space areas, and floodplain properties. Rezoning these parcels to Parks and Open Space would officially designate the properties on the Official Zoning Map, support future park planning and tracking, and assist with potential grant application opportunities.

**PLANNING AND ZONING COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION:**

Recommended approval with a vote of 6-0 at their May 28<sup>th</sup>, 2026 Regular Meeting.

**CITY COUNCIL FIRST READING:**

**ORDINANCE NO. 2026-18**

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF BASTROP, TEXAS, AUTHORIZING A CITY-INITIATED ZONING MAP AMENDMENT TO REZONE TWO CITY-OWNED PROPERTIES LOCATED ON GRADY TUCK LANE AND SOUTH OF OLD AUSTIN HIGHWAY, WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF BASTROP, TEXAS, FROM PI, PUBLIC INSTITUTIONAL, TO P/OS, PARKS AND OPEN SPACE, AS SHOWN IN EXHIBIT A; AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF ALL NECESSARY DOCUMENTS; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; REPEALING CONFLICTING ORDINANCES; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE**

**WHEREAS,** the City of Bastrop, Texas (the “City”) is a home rule municipality located in Bastrop County, Texas acting under its Charter adopted by the electorate pursuant to Article XI, Section 5 of the Texas Constitution and Chapter 9 of the Texas Local Government Code; and

**WHEREAS,** the City owns two properties located on Grady Tuck Lane and south of Old Austin Highway, within the City limits of Bastrop, Texas, identified as PID 66319 and PID 35527, which are currently zoned PI, Public Institutional; and

**WHEREAS,** the Parks and Recreation Board has considered trail connectivity, parkland service gaps, and the potential activation of the subject properties as open space for residents along Old Austin Highway, and voted to recommend that City Council dedicate the parcels as parkland; and

**WHEREAS,** the City Council desires to approve a City-initiated zoning map amendment to rezone the subject properties from PI, Public Institutional, to P/OS, Parks and Open Space, as shown in Exhibit A, in order to officially designate the properties on the Official Zoning Map and support future park planning, tracking, and potential grant opportunities; and

**WHEREAS,** the City finds that this Ordinance was passed and approved at a meeting of the City Council of the City of Bastrop held in strict compliance with the Texas Open Meetings Act at which a quorum of the City Council Members was present and voting.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BASTROP, TEXAS, THAT:**

- Section 1.** The facts and recitations set forth in the preamble of this Ordinance are hereby found to be true and correct.
- Section 2.** The City Council of Bastrop authorizes the City-initiated zoning map amendment to rezone two City-owned properties located on Grady Tuck Lane and south of Old Austin Highway, within the City limits of Bastrop, Texas, from PI, Public Institutional, to P/OS, Parks and Open Space, as shown in Exhibit A, attached and incorporated herein.
- Section 3.** The City Council grants the zoning map amendment for the properties identified as PID 66319 and PID 35527. Upon the effective date of this Ordinance, the zoning classification for the subject properties shall be P/OS, Parks and Open Space.
- Section 4.** The City Council directs the City Manager, or the City Manager's designee, to take all necessary actions to amend the Official Zoning Map to reflect the zoning map amendment approved by this Ordinance, and authorizes the execution of all documents necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of this Ordinance.
- Section 5.** Severability. If any clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be deemed to be unenforceable for any reason, such unenforceable clause or provision shall be severed from the remaining portion of the Ordinance, which shall continue to have full force and effect.
- Section 6.** Repeal. This Ordinance shall be and is hereby cumulative of all other ordinances of the City of Bastrop, Texas, and this Ordinance shall not operate to repeal or affect any of such other ordinances except insofar as the provisions thereof might be inconsistent or in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance, in which event such conflicting provisions, if any, in such other Ordinances, are hereby repealed.
- Section 7.** Effective Date. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately after its final passage and any publication in accordance with the requirements of the City of Bastrop and the laws of the State of Texas.
- Section 8.** Proper Notice and Meeting. It is hereby officially found and determined that the meeting at which this Ordinance was passed was open to the public, and that public notice of the time, place, and purpose of said meeting was given as required by the Open Meetings Act, Texas Government Code, Chapter 551. Notice was also provided as required by Chapter 52 of the Texas Local Government Code.

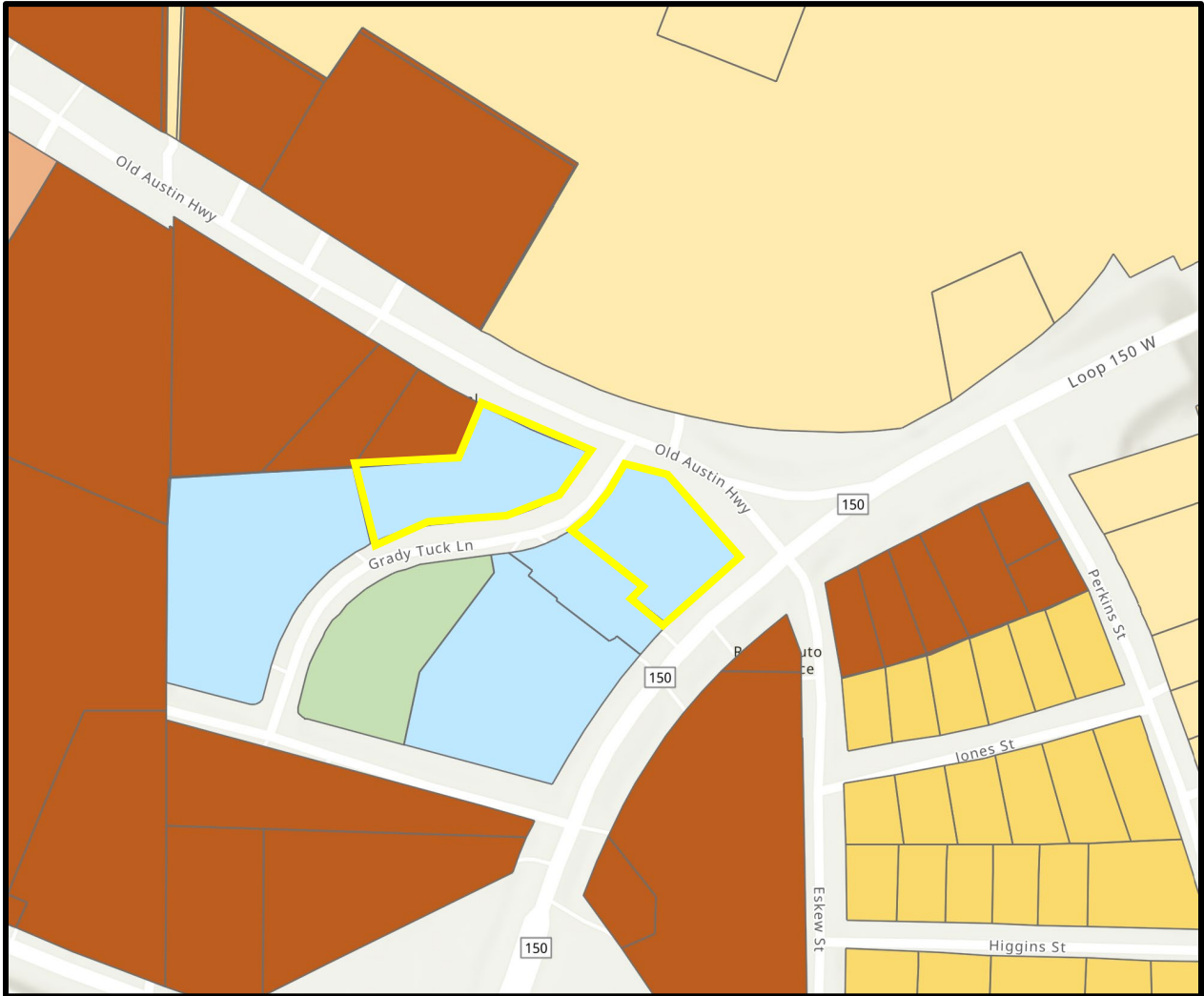

**WHEREAS**, the City Council has exclusive control over and under its public streets and may control or regulate certain aspects of the movement of vehicles pursuant to Texas Transportation Code Chapter 311, and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council finds the attached amendments reasonable and necessary.

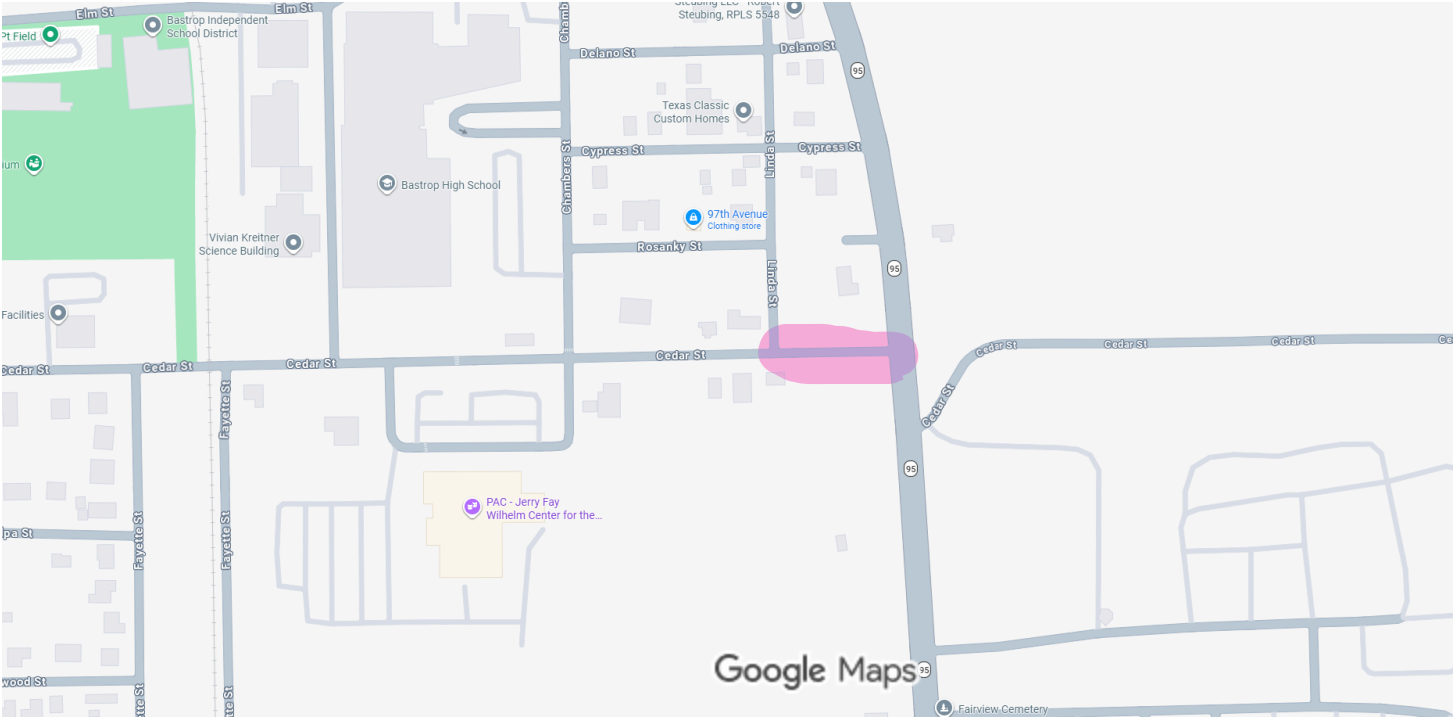

### **Section 3.08 Mayor and Mayor Pro Tem**

The Mayor shall preside over the meetings of the Council and perform such other duties consistent with the office as may be imposed on the Mayor by this Charter and all ordinances and resolutions passed in pursuance thereof. The Mayor may not vote, except in elections, to break a tie and as otherwise provided in this Charter. The Mayor shall have no veto power. The Mayor shall appoint members to all City boards and commissions, subject to confirmation by the Council. The Mayor shall also be recognized as the chief presiding officer of the City. The Mayor shall also be recognized as the head of the City by all courts for the purpose of serving civil processes, by the Governor for the purpose of enforcing military law and for all ceremonial purposes.

At the first meeting of the Council following the City's general election, the Council shall elect one of its members to serve a one-year term as Mayor Pro Tem of the City. In the absence or disability of the Mayor to perform the duties of that office, the Mayor Pro Tem shall perform all such duties, and while acting as Mayor Pro Tem may not vote, except in elections and to break a tie.

### **Section 3.09 City Secretary**

The City Manager shall appoint, subject to confirmation by the City Council, an officer of the City and such assistants as deemed necessary, who shall have the title of City Secretary. The City Secretary and assistants shall give notice of Council meetings, shall keep minutes of its proceedings, shall authenticate by signature and shall record in full in a book kept for that purpose all ordinances and resolutions, shall preserve and keep in order all books, papers, records and files of the Council, shall have custody of the seal of the City and shall affix same to such documents and obligations as legally authorized. The City Secretary and assistants shall perform such other duties as shall be required by this Charter, the Council or the City Manager.

### **Section 3.10 City Attorney**

The Council shall appoint a City Attorney(s) and such assistant city attorneys as from time to time shall be deemed necessary by the Council and who shall be competent, duly licensed and admitted to the practice of law by the State of Texas. The City Attorney(s) shall be legal advisor to and attorney for all officers of the City acting in their official capacities and shall represent the City and its departments in all legal proceedings.

### **Section 3.11 Investigations**

The Council shall have the power to make investigations into City affairs and to inquire into the official conduct of any department, agency, office or employee of the City. For this purpose the Council shall have the power to administer oaths, to subpoena witnesses and to compel the production of books, papers and other evidence material to the

**BACKGROUND/HISTORY:**

The Hunters Crossing Local Government Corporation (HCLGC) was established by the City of Bastrop to assist in the administration and management of the Hunters Crossing Public Improvement District (PID) pursuant to Chapter 372 of the Texas Local Government Code. The HCLGC has historically overseen certain responsibilities related to the implementation, operation, and maintenance of public improvements within the PID.

The Hunters Crossing Local Government Corporation Board was organized to aid, assist, and act on behalf of the City to implement the City-approved Service Plan for the Hunters Crossing Public Improvement District and to perform such other functions as the City from time to time lawfully may delegate to the Corporation.

The HCLGC Bylaws currently contain membership qualifications and criteria governing service on the Board of Directors. Since the adoption of those provisions, the role and responsibilities of the HCLGC have evolved. The Corporation is currently in the process of transferring certain property interests and maintenance obligations to the City of Bastrop. As a result, the operational responsibilities of the Corporation are anticipated to decrease significantly.

The proposed amendment modifies the membership criteria required for service on the HCLGC Board of Directors.

As the Corporation transitions away from direct ownership and maintenance responsibilities, Council has determined that the existing Board membership requirements are no longer necessary to effectively carry out the Corporation's reduced administrative functions. Removing these restrictions will provide the City Council with greater flexibility when considering future appointments to the Board and will allow the Corporation's governance structure to better reflect its evolving role.

The amendment does not alter the purpose of the HCLGC, the authority of the Board, or the City's oversight of the Corporation. Rather, it updates the governing documents to align with the anticipated operational changes resulting from the transfer of assets and maintenance obligations to the City.

The ordinance also authorizes the City Manager, or designee, to provide formal notice of the bylaw amendment to the Secretary of the HCLGC Board of Directors, as required by the Corporation's governing documents.

**FISCAL IMPACT:**

There is no direct fiscal impact associated with the proposed bylaw amendment.

**RECOMMENDATION:**

**ORDINANCE NO. 2026-22**

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF BASTROP AMENDING THE BYLAWS FOR THE HUNTERS CROSSING LOCAL GOVERNMENT CORPORATION; AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO PROVIDE NOTICE TO THE SECRETARY FOR THE CORPORATION; PROVIDING FOR REPEAL, SEVERABILITY, AND OPEN MEETINGS COMPLIANCE; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.**

**WHEREAS**, the City of Bastrop, Texas (the “City”) is a home-rule municipality with the authority to enact laws to protect the public, health, and safety of residents and visitors to the City; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council for the City (“City Council”) finds that the City created the Hunters Crossing Public Improvement District (the “PID”) pursuant the authority provided in Chapter 372 of the Texas Local Government Code, and the Hunters Crossing Local Government Corporation (“HCLGC”) to manage the PID; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council finds that the HCLGC Bylaws require that the members of the Board of Directors for the HCLGC (the “Board”) must meet certain criteria; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council finds that the HCLGC is in the process of transferring property and maintenance obligations to the City to minimize the maintenance and operation costs assessed to PID members; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council finds that membership criteria for the Board is no longer necessary in light of the anticipated changes in the HCLGC; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council desires to amend the Bylaws for the HCLGC to modify the membership criteria for the Board and provide notice of such amendment to the Secretary for the HCLGC as required by the Bylaws.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL FOR THE CITY OF BASTROP, TEXAS THAT:**

**Section 1.** The statements set forth in and by reference in the recitals of this Ordinance are true and correct, and the Corporation hereby incorporates such recitals as a part of this Ordinance as if recited herein.

**Section 2.** The City Council hereby approves the Third Amended Bylaws in a form substantially similar to that attached hereto, as amended and approved by the General Counsel for the HCLGC.

**Section 3.** The City Council hereby authorizes the City Manager, or their designee, to provide notice to the Secretary of the HCLGC Board of Directors of the

amended Bylaws along with an executed copy thereof.

**Section 4.** This Ordinance shall be and is hereby cumulative of all other Ordinances of the City and this Ordinance shall not operate to repeal or affect any such other Ordinances except insofar as the provisions thereof might be inconsistent or in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance, in which event such conflicting provisions, if any, in such other Ordinance or Ordinances are hereby repealed.

**Section 5.** If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance shall for any reason be held to be invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

**Section 6.** The City Council hereby finds and declares that written notice of the date, hour, place and subject of the meeting at which this Ordinance was adopted was posted and that such meeting was open to the public as required by law at all times during which this Ordinance and the subject matter hereof were discussed, considered and formally acted upon, all as required by the Open Meetings Act, Chapter 551, Texas Government Code, as amended.

**Section 7.** This Ordinance shall become effective and be in full force and effect from and after the date of passage and adoption by the Corporation.

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**THIRD AMENDED BYLAWS OF THE****HUNTERS CROSSING LOCAL GOVERNMENT CORPORATION**

## ARTICLE I.

## PURPOSES

The Hunters Crossing Local Government Corporation (the "*Corporation*") is organized for the purpose of aiding, assisting, and acting on behalf of the City of Bastrop, Texas (the "*City*") to implement the City-approved Service Plan for the Hunters Crossing Public Improvement District (the "*Project*") and to perform such other functions as the City from time to time lawfully may delegate to the Corporation.

The Corporation is formed pursuant to the provisions of Subchapter D, Chapter 431, Texas Transportation Code ("the *Act*") as it now or may hereafter be amended, and the authorities cited therein, which authorizes the Corporation to assist and act on behalf of the City and to engage in activities in the furtherance of the purposes for its creation.

The Corporation shall have and exercise all of the rights, powers, privileges, authority, and functions given by the general laws of Texas to non-profit corporations incorporated under the Act including, without limitation, Article 1396-1.01 et seq., Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, consistent with the Articles of Incorporation and other applicable laws.

The Corporation shall have all other powers consistent with the Articles of Incorporation of a like or different nature not prohibited by law which are available to non-profit corporations in Texas and which are necessary or useful to enable the Corporation to perform the purposes for which it is created, including the power to issue bonds, notes or other obligations, and otherwise exercise its borrowing power to accomplish the purposes for which it was created, provided that the Corporation shall not issue bonds or otherwise exercise its borrowing power without the COJ?-Sent of the governing body of the City.

The Corporation is created as a local government corporation pursuant to the Act and shall be a governmental unit within the meaning of Subdivision (2), Section 101.001, Texas Civil Practice and Remedies Code. The operations of the Corporation are governmental and not proprietary functions for purposes of the Texas Tort Claims Act, Section 101.001 et seq., Texas Civil Practice and Remedies Code. Consistent with the Corporation's status as an instrumentality of the City, the Corporation shall perform such duties and functions with respect to public property and public business within the area of the Hunters Crossing Public Improvement District boundaries, not prohibited by law, and shall perform such other functions as the City by official action shall delegate to the Corporation.

ARTICLE II.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

*Section 1. Appointment, Classes, Powers, Numbers~~4~~; and Terms of Office.* All powers of the Corporation shall be vested in the Board of Directors (the "Board of Directors"). The Board of Directors shall consist of ~~seven (7)~~ five (5) persons, but may be expanded to include more ~~than seven (7) members~~, at the discretion of the City Council. The City shall appoint the members of the Board of Directors, as follows City Council may appoint individual people to serve on the Board of Directors or may appoint the City Council itself as the Board of Directors. In that instance, the Board of Directors will comprise of sitting City Council members and membership of the Board of Directors will automatically update with changes in City Council.

- ~~1. One appointed member shall be a currently serving Council Member.~~
- ~~2. One appointed member shall be a current property owner and resident in the Hunters Crossing Subdivision.~~
- ~~3. One appointed member shall be a representative of a Commercial enterprise that has a place of business in the Public Improvement District.~~
- ~~4. All other appointed members are at the Council's sole discretion.~~

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Each Director shall serve for a term which expires on the date set forth below for the position to which such person was appointed, or until his or her successor is appointed by the City unless such Director has been appointed to fill an unexpired term in which case the term of the Director shall expire on the expiration date of the term of the Director whose position he or she was appointed to fill or until his or her successor is appointed qualifies for the position. Any Director may be removed from office at any time, with or without cause, by the City Council. The number of Directors may only be increased or decreased by the City Council.

The terms of office of the initial Board of Directors will be seven (7) years. Upon the expiration of the term of office of the initial Directors, except as otherwise provided by the Bylaws of the Corporation or the official action of the governing body of the City appointing a Director or Directors, Directors shall be divided into three classes, one class of one (1) Director initially to serve for a term of one (1) year, the second class of two (2) Directors initially to serve for a term of two (2) years, and the third class of two (2) Directors initially to serve for a term of three (3) years. The Board of Directors shall determine the class in which each Director shall be placed, including placement of any new membership position created by the City Council, from time to time. Thereafter each class shall serve for a term of three (3) years. All Directors shall hold their respective offices until their successor is appointed and qualifies as a Director.

*Section 2. Meetings of Directors.* The Directors may hold their meetings and may have an office and keep the books of the Corporation at such place or places within the City as the Board of Directors may from time to time determine; provided, however, in the absence of any such determination, such place shall be the registered office of the Corporation in the State of Texas.

To the extent provided by law, the meetings of the Board of Directors and any committee of the Board of Directors shall be held in accordance with and notice of such meetings shall be

filed for the same length of time and in the same manner and location as is required of a City under Chapter 551, Government Code (the "*Open Meetings Act*").

To the extent provided by law, the records of the Corporation, the Board of Directors, and any committee of the Board of Directors exercising the powers of the Corporation are subject to Chapter 552, Government Code (the "*Public Information Act*").

**Section 3. Annual Meetings.** If an annual meeting is required by law, the annual meeting of the Board of Directors shall be held at the time and at the location in the City designated by the resolution of the Board of Directors for the purposes of transacting such business as may be brought before the meeting.

**Section 4. Regular Meetings.** Regular meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held at such times and places as shall be designated, from time to time, by resolution of the Board of Directors.

**Section 5. Special and Emergency Meetings.** Special and emergency meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held whenever called by the President or the Secretary or by a majority of the then appointed Directors.

The Secretary shall give notice of each special meeting in person, by telephone, FAX, mail or telecommunication at least three (3) days before the meeting to each Director and to the public in compliance with the Open Meetings Act. Notice of each emergency meeting shall also be given in the manner required of the City under Section 551.045 of the Open Meetings Act. Unless otherwise indicated in the notice thereof, any and all matters pertaining to the purposes of the Corporation may be considered and acted upon at a special or emergency meeting. At any meeting at which every Director shall be present, even though without any notice, any matter pertaining to the purposes of the Corporation may be considered and acted upon to the extent allowed by the Open Meetings Act.

**Section 6. Quorum.** A majority of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum for the consideration of matters pertaining to the purposes of the Corporation. If at any meeting of the Board of Directors there is less than a quorum present, a majority of those present may adjourn the meeting from time to time. The act of no fewer than a majority of the members of the entire membership of the Board of Directors at a meeting at which at least a quorum is in attendance shall constitute the act of the Board of Directors, unless the act of a greater number is required by law, by the Articles of Incorporation, or by these Bylaws.

A Director who is present at a meeting of the Board of Directors at which any corporate action is taken shall be presumed to have assented to such action unless his dissent or abstention shall be entered in the minutes of the meeting or unless he shall file his written dissent or abstention to such action with the person acting as the secretary of the meeting before the adjournment thereof or shall forward such dissent or abstention by registered mail to the Secretary of the Board of Directors immediately after the adjournment of the meeting. Such right to dissent shall not apply to a Director who voted in favor of the action.

**Section 7. Conduct of Business.** At the meetings of the Board of Directors, matters pertaining to the purposes of the Corporation shall be considered in such order as from time to time the Board of Directors may determine.

At all meetings of the Board of Directors, the President shall preside, and in the absence of the President, the Vice-President shall preside. In the absence of the President and the Vice-President, a President shall be chosen by the Board of Directors from among the Directors present.

The Secretary of the Board of Directors shall act as secretary of all meetings of the Board of Directors, but in the absence of the Secretary, the presiding officer may appoint any person to act as secretary of the meeting.

**Section 8. Committees.** The Board of Directors may, by resolution passed by a majority of the Directors, designate two (2) or more Directors to constitute one or more committees. A committee shall act in the manner provided in the authorizing resolution. Each committee so designated shall keep regular minutes of the transactions of its meetings and shall cause such minutes to be recorded in books kept for that purpose in the office of the Corporation and shall report the same to the Board of Directors from time to time.

**Section 9. Compensation of Directors.** Directors, as such, shall not receive any salary or compensation for their services as Directors; unless otherwise directed by the governing bodies of the City and County. A Director may be reimbursed for reasonable out-of-pocket expenses incurred as a Director in accordance with guidelines established by the Board of Directors which are reasonable and necessary in carrying out the Board of Directors' purposes.

**Section 10. Director's Reliance on Consultant Information.** A Director shall not be liable if while acting in good faith and with ordinary care, he relies on information, opinions, reports, or statements, including financial statements and other financial data that were prepared or presented by:

- (a) one or more other officers or employees of the Corporation;
- (b) legal counsel, public accountants, or other persons as to matters the officer reasonably believes are within the person's professional or expert competence; or
- (c) a committee of the Board of Directors of which the Director is not a member.

### ARTICLE III.

#### OFFICERS

**Section 1. Titles and Terms of Office.** The officers of the Corporation shall be a President, a Vice-President, a secretary, a treasurer, and such other officers as the Board of Directors may from time to time shall elect. One person may hold more than one office, except that the President of the Board may not hold the office of Secretary. The term of office for each officer (other than the Treasurer) shall be coincident with the Director's term of office.

Officers shall be subject to removal, with cause, at any time by a vote of a majority of the whole Board of Directors.

A vacancy in the office of any officer shall be filled by the Board of Directors. The designation of the Treasurer shall be governed by the provisions of Section 5 of this Article.

**Section 2. Powers and Duties of the President.** The President shall be a member of the Board of Directors and shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Directors. He or she shall have such duties as are assigned by the Board of Directors. The President may call special or emergency meetings of the Board of Directors.

**Section 3. Powers and Duties of the Vice-President.** The Vice-President shall be a member of the Board of Directors and shall perform the duties and exercise the powers of the President upon the President's death, absence, disability, or resignation, or upon the President's inability to perform the duties of his or her office. Any action taken by the Vice-President in the performance of the duties of the President shall be conclusive evidence of the absence or inability to act of the President at the time such action was taken.

**Section 4. Execution of Documents.** In furtherance of the purposes of the Board of Directors and subject to the provisions of the Articles of Incorporation and By-laws, the Board of Directors may authorize the President or Vice President to sign and execute all bonds, notes, deeds, conveyances, franchises, assignments, mortgages, notes, contracts and other obligations and instruments in the name of the Corporation.

**Section 5. Treasurer.** Notwithstanding the provisions of any other Section of this Article (other than the second paragraph of Section 1), The City's Director of Finance (or Interim or Acting Director of Finance) shall be the Treasurer of the Corporation during the term of office of the initial Directors. The Treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Corporation which come into his or her hands. When necessary or proper, he or she may endorse, on behalf of the Corporation, for collection, checks, notes and other obligations and shall deposit the same to the credit of the Corporation in a special Corporation fund in depository bank or banks located in the City of Bastrop. He or she may sign all receipts and vouchers for payments made to the Corporation, either alone or jointly with such other officer as is designated by the Board of Directors. He or she shall perform all acts incident to the position of Treasurer subject to the control of the Board of Directors and he or she shall, before beginning to perform the duties of office, shall execute, and thereafter throughout his or her term of office, shall maintain in full force and effect a bond for \$100,000 payable to the Corporation and conditioned on the faithful performance of the Treasurer's duties. Such bond shall be approved by the Board of Directors and paid for by the Corporation. . All Corporation funds shall be secured in the same manner as City funds, as required by Chapter 2256, Government Code, the Public Funds Investment Act.

**Section 6. Secretary.** The Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Directors in books provided for that purpose. He or she shall attend to the giving and serving of all notices; in furtherance of the purposes of the Corporation and subject to the limitations contained in the Articles of Incorporation, he or she may sign with the President in the name of the Corporation and/or attest the signatures thereof, all contracts, conveyances,

franchises, bonds, deeds, assignments, mortgages, notes and other instruments of the Corporation. He or she shall have charge of the Corporation's books and records, except the books of account and financial records and securities of which the Treasurer shall have custody and charge, and such other books and papers as the Board of Directors may direct, and, he or she shall in general perform all duties incident to the office of Secretary subject to the control of the Board of Directors.

**Section 7. Officer's Compensation.** Officers may not receive salary or compensation for personal services. Members of the Board of Directors, even in their capacity as officers, are not entitled to compensation.

**Section 8. Officer's Reliance on Consultant Information.** In the discharge of a duty imposed or power conferred on an officer of the Corporation, the officer may in good faith and with ordinary care rely on information, opinions, reports, or statements, including financial statements and other financial data that were prepared or presented by:

- (a) one or more other officers or employees of the Corporation, including members of the Board of Directors; or
- (b) legal counsel, public accountants, or other persons as to matters the officer reasonably believes are within the person's professional or expert competence.

#### ARTICLE IV.

##### MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

**Section J. Fiscal Year.** The fiscal year of the Corporation shall begin October 1 of each year.

**Section 2. Seal.** The seal of the Corporation shall be such as from time to time may be approved by the Board of Directors.

**Section 3. Notice and Waiver of Notice.** Whenever any notice whatever, other than public notice of a meeting given to comply with the Open Meetings Act, is required to be given under the provisions of these Bylaws, such notice shall be deemed to be sufficient if given by depositing the same in a post office box in a sealed postpaid wrapper addressed to the person entitled thereto at his or her post office address, as it appears on the books of the Corporation, and such notice shall be deemed to have been given on the day of such mailing. A waiver of notice, signed by the person or persons entitled to said notice, whether before or after the time stated therein, shall be deemed equivalent thereto.

**Section 4. Resignations.** Any Director or officer may resign at any time. Such resignations shall be made in writing and shall take effect at the time specified therein, or, if no time be specified, at the time of its receipt by the President or Secretary. The acceptance of a resignation shall not be necessary to make it effective, unless expressly so provided in the resignation.

**Section 5. Gender.** References herein to the masculine gender shall also refer to the feminine in all appropriate cases and vice versa.

**Section 6. Appropriations and Grants.** The Corporation shall have the power to request and accept any appropriation, grant, contribution, donation, or other form of aid from the federal government, the State, any political subdivision, or municipality in the State, or from any other source.

**Section 7. Financial Reports; Annual Audits.** The Corporation shall prepare of cause to be prepared a statement or statements of its operations for and as of the end of each of its fiscal quarters, using the substantially same format that is employed by the City. The Corporation shall deliver each such financial statement to the Chief Financial Officer of the City not later than thirty (30) days after the end of the fiscal quarter to which such statement refers.

The Corporation shall also cause an audit of the Corporation's financial affairs to be performed, and a written report thereof prepared by an independent certified public accountant or firm of independent certified public accountants for each of the Corporation's fiscal years. Such audits shall be performed and reported by the auditor employed by the City for its corresponding fiscal year (unless such auditor declines to perform the Corporation audit) and shall employ substantially the same standards and format employed in connection with the City's corresponding annual audit. The Corporation shall deliver each such audit to the City's Chief Financial Officer not later than thirty (30) days after the close of the Corporation's fiscal year to which such audit refers.

**Section 8. Organizational Control.** The City may, at its sole discretion, and at any time, alter or change the structure, organization, programs, or activities of the Corporation (including the power to terminate the Corporation), subject to applicable law and any limitation on the impairment of contracts entered into by the Corporation.

**Section 9. Effective Date.** These Bylaws shall become effective only upon the occurrence of the following events: (a) the approval of these Bylaws by the governing body of the City; and (b) the adoption of these Bylaws by the Board of Directors.

#### ARTICLE V.

##### INDEMNIFICATION OF DIRECTORS AND OFFICERS

**Section 1. Right to Indemnification.** Subject to the limitations and conditions as provided in this Article V and the Articles of Incorporation, each person who was or is made a party or is threatened to be made a party to or is involved in any threatened, pending or completed action, suit or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative, arbitrative or investigative (hereinafter a "*Proceeding*"), or any appeal in such a proceeding or any inquiry or investigation that could lead to such a Proceeding, by reason of the fact that he or she, or a person of whom he or she is the legal representative, is or was a director or officer of the Corporation or while a director or officer of the

Corporation, is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a director, officer, partner, venturer, proprietor, trustee, employee, agent or similar functionary of another foreign or domestic corporation, partnership, joint venture, sole proprietorship, trust, employee benefit plan or other enterprise, shall be indemnified by the Corporation to the fullest extent permitted by the Texas Non-Profit Corporation Act, as the same exists or may hereafter be amended (but, in the case of any such amendment, only to the extent that such amendment permits the Corporation to provide broader indemnification rights than said law permitted the Corporation to provide prior to such amendment) against judgments, penalties (including excise and similar taxes and punitive damages), fines, settlements and reasonable expenses (including, without limitation, attorneys' fees) actually incurred by such person in connection with such proceeding, and indemnification under this Article V shall continue as to a person who has ceased to serve in the capacity which initially entitled such person to indemnity hereunder. The rights granted pursuant to this Article V shall be deemed contract rights, and no amendment, modification or repeal of this Article V shall have the effect of limiting or denying any such rights with respect to actions taken or proceedings arising prior to any such amendment, modification or repeal. It is expressly acknowledged that the indemnification provided in this Article V could involve indemnification for negligence or under theories of strict liability.

*Section 2. Advance Payment.* The right to indemnification conferred in this Article V shall include the right to be paid in advance or reimbursed by the Corporation the reasonable expenses incurred by a person of the type entitled to be indemnified under Section 1 who was, is or is threatened to be made a named defendant or respondent in a proceeding in advance of the final disposition of the proceeding and without any determination as to the person's ultimate entitlement to indemnification; provided, however, that the payment of such expenses incurred by any such person in advance of the final disposition of a proceeding, shall be made only upon delivery to the Board of Directors of a written affirmation by such Director or officer of his or her good faith belief that he or she has met the standard of conduct necessary for indemnification under this Article V and a written undertaking, by or on behalf of such person, to repay all amounts so advanced if it shall ultimately be determined that such indemnified person is not entitled to be indemnified under this Article V or otherwise.

*Section 3. Indemnification of Employees and Agents.* The Corporation, by adoption of a resolution of the Board of Directors, may indemnify and advance expenses to an employee or agent of the Corporation to the same extent and subject to the same conditions under which it may indemnify and advance expenses to Directors and officers under this Article V; and the Corporation may indemnify and advance expenses to persons who are not or were not Directors, officers, employees or agents of the Corporation but who are or were serving at the request of the Corporation as a Director, officer, partner, venturer, proprietor, trustee, employee, agent or similar functionary of another foreign or domestic corporation, partnership, joint venture, sole proprietorship, trust, employee benefit plan or other enterprise against any liability asserted against him or her and incurred by him or her in such a capacity or arising out of his or her status as such a person to the same extent that it may indemnify and advance expenses to Directors under this Article V.

**Section 4. Appearance as a Witness.** Notwithstanding any other provision of this Article V, the Corporation may pay or reimburse expenses incurred by a Director or officer in connection with his or her appearance as a witness or other participation in a proceeding involving the Corporation or its business at a time when he or she is not a named defendant or respondent in the proceeding.

**Section 5. Non-exclusivity of Rights.** The right to indemnification and the advancement and payment of expenses conferred in this Article V shall not be exclusive of any other right which a Director or officer or other person indemnified pursuant to Section 3 of this Article V may have or hereafter acquire under any law (common or statutory), provision of the Articles of Incorporation of the Corporation or these Bylaws, agreement, vote of shareholders or disinterested Directors or otherwise.

**Section 6. Insurance.** The Corporation may purchase and maintain insurance, at its expense, to protect itself and any person who is or was serving as a Director, officer, employee or agent of the Corporation or is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a Director, officer, partner, venturer, proprietor, trustee, employee, agent or similar functionary of another foreign or domestic corporation, partnership, joint venture, proprietorship, employee benefit plan, trust or other enterprise against any expense, liability or loss, whether or not the Corporation would have the power to indemnify such person against such expense, liability or loss under this Article V.

**Section 7. Notification.** Any indemnification of or advance of expenses to a Director or officer in accordance with this Article V shall be reported in writing to the members of the Board of Directors with or before the notice of the next regular meeting of the Board of Directors and, in any case, within the 12-month period immediately following the date of the indemnification or advance.

**Section 8. Savings Clause.** If this Article V or any portion hereof shall be invalidated on any ground by any court of competent jurisdiction, then the Corporation shall nevertheless indemnify and hold harmless each Director, officer or any other person indemnified pursuant to this Article V as to costs, charges and expenses (including attorneys' fees), judgments, fines and amounts paid in settlement with respect to any action, suit or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative or investigative, to the full extent permitted by any applicable portion of this Article V that shall not have been invalidated and to the fullest extent permitted by applicable law.

#### ARTICLE VI.

#### AMENDMENTS

These Bylaws may be amended at any time and from time to time by either of the following methods: (1) a proposal to alter, amend, or repeal these Bylaws may be made by the affirmative vote of a majority of the full Board of Directors at any ~~annual or regular meeting, proving or at any special meeting if notice of the proposed amendment be contained in the notice of said special meeting;~~ however ~~that~~, any such proposed change or amendment to the Bylaws must be approved by the governing body of the City to be effective; or (2) the governing body of the City may, in its sole discretion, and at any time, amend these Bylaws by adopting an amendment or amendments to these Bylaws and delivering such amendment or amendments to the Secretary of the Corporation.

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**THIRD AMENDED BYLAWS OF THE  
HUNTERS CROSSING LOCAL GOVERNMENT CORPORATION**

ARTICLE I.

PURPOSES

The Hunters Crossing Local Government Corporation (the "*Corporation*") is organized for the purpose of aiding, assisting, and acting on behalf of the City of Bastrop, Texas (the "*City*") to implement the City-approved Service Plan for the Hunters Crossing Public Improvement District (the "*Project*") and to perform such other functions as the City from time to time lawfully may delegate to the Corporation.

The Corporation is formed pursuant to the provisions of Subchapter D, Chapter 431, Texas Transportation Code ("the *Act*") as it now or may hereafter be amended, and the authorities cited therein, which authorizes the Corporation to assist and act on behalf of the City and to engage in activities in the furtherance of the purposes for its creation.

The Corporation shall have and exercise all of the rights, powers, privileges, authority, and functions given by the general laws of Texas to non-profit corporations incorporated under the Act including, without limitation, Article 1396-1.01 et seq., Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, consistent with the Articles of Incorporation and other applicable laws.

The Corporation shall have all other powers consistent with the Articles of Incorporation of a like or different nature not prohibited by law which are available to non-profit corporations in Texas and which are necessary or useful to enable the Corporation to perform the purposes for which it is created, including the power to issue bonds, notes or other obligations, and otherwise exercise its borrowing power to accomplish the purposes for which it was created, provided that the Corporation shall not issue bonds or otherwise exercise its borrowing power without the COJ?-Sent of the governing body of the City.

The Corporation is created as a local government corporation pursuant to the Act and shall be a governmental unit within the meaning of Subdivision (2), Section 101.001, Texas Civil Practice and Remedies Code. The operations of the Corporation are governmental and not proprietary functions for purposes of the Texas Tort Claims Act, Section 101.001 et seq., Texas Civil Practice and Remedies Code. Consistent with the Corporation's status as an instrumentality of the City, the Corporation shall perform such duties and functions with respect to public property and public business within the area of the Hunters Crossing Public Improvement District boundaries, not prohibited by law, and shall perform such other functions as the City by official action shall delegate to the Corporation.

## ARTICLE II.

## BOARD OF DIRECTORS

**Section 1. Appointment, Classes, Powers, Numbers; and Terms of Office.** All powers of the Corporation shall be vested in the Board of Directors (the "**Board of Directors**"). The Board of Directors shall consist of five (5) persons, but may be expanded to include more, at the discretion of the City Council. The City shall appoint the members of the Board of Directors City Council may appoint individual people to serve on the Board of Directors or may appoint the City Council itself as the Board of Directors. In that instance, the Board of Directors will comprise of sitting City Council members and membership of the Board of Directors will automatically update with changes in City Council.

Each Director shall serve for a term which expires on the date set forth below for the position to which such person was appointed, or until his or her successor is appointed by the City unless such Director has been appointed to fill an unexpired term in which case the term of the Director shall expire on the expiration date of the term of the Director whose position he or she was appointed to fill or until his or her successor is appointed qualifies for the position. Any Director may be removed from office at any time, with or without cause, by the City Council. The number of Directors may only be increased or decreased by the City Council.

The terms of office of the initial Board of Directors will be seven (7) years. Upon the expiration of the term of office of the initial Directors, except as otherwise provided by the Bylaws of the Corporation or the official action of the governing body of the City appointing a Director or Directors, Directors shall be divided into three classes, one class of one (1) Director initially to serve for a term of one (1) year, the second class of two (2) Directors initially to serve for a term of two (2) years, and the third class of two (2) Directors initially to serve for a term of three (3) years. The Board of Directors shall determine the class in which each Director shall be placed, including placement of any new membership position created by the City Council, from time to time. Thereafter each class shall serve for a term of three (3) years. All Directors shall hold their respective offices until their successor is appointed and qualifies as a Director.

**Section 2. Meetings of Directors.** The Directors may hold their meetings and may have an office and keep the books of the Corporation at such place or places within the City as the Board of Directors may from time to time determine; provided, however, in the absence of any such determination, such place shall be the registered office of the Corporation in the State of Texas.

To the extent provided by law, the meetings of the Board of Directors and any committee of the Board of Directors shall be held in accordance with and notice of such meetings shall be

filed for the same length of time and in the same manner and location as is required of a City under Chapter 551, Government Code (the "*Open Meetings Act*").

To the extent provided by law, the records of the Corporation, the Board of Directors, and any committee of the Board of Directors exercising the powers of the Corporation are subject to Chapter 552, Government Code (the "*Public Information Act*").

**Section 3. Annual Meetings.** If an annual meeting is required by law, the annual meeting of the Board of Directors shall be held at the time and at the location in the City designated by the resolution of the Board of Directors for the purposes of transacting such business as may be brought before the meeting.

**Section 4. Regular Meetings.** Regular meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held at such times and places as shall be designated, from time to time, by resolution of the Board of Directors.

**Section 5. Special and Emergency Meetings.** Special and emergency meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held whenever called by the President or the Secretary or by a majority of the then appointed Directors.

The Secretary shall give notice of each special meeting in person, by telephone, FAX, mail or telecommunication at least three (3) days before the meeting to each Director and to the public in compliance with the Open Meetings Act. Notice of each emergency meeting shall also be given in the manner required of the City under Section 551.045 of the Open Meetings Act. Unless otherwise indicated in the notice thereof, any and all matters pertaining to the purposes of the Corporation may be considered and acted upon at a special or emergency meeting. At any meeting at which every Director shall be present, even though without any notice, any matter pertaining to the purposes of the Corporation may be considered and acted upon to the extent allowed by the Open Meetings Act.

**Section 6. Quorum.** A majority of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum for the consideration of matters pertaining to the purposes of the Corporation. If at any meeting of the Board of Directors there is less than a quorum present, a majority of those present may adjourn the meeting from time to time. The act of no fewer than a majority of the members of the entire membership of the Board of Directors at a meeting at which at least a quorum is in attendance shall constitute the act of the Board of Directors, unless the act of a greater number is required by law, by the Articles of Incorporation, or by these Bylaws.

A Director who is present at a meeting of the Board of Directors at which any corporate action is taken shall be presumed to have assented to such action unless his dissent or abstention shall be entered in the minutes of the meeting or unless he shall file his written dissent or abstention to such action with the person acting as the secretary of the meeting before the adjournment thereof or shall forward such dissent or abstention by registered mail to the Secretary of the Board of Directors immediately after the adjournment of the meeting. Such right to dissent shall not apply to a Director who voted in favor of the action.

**Section 7. Conduct of Business.** At the meetings of the Board of Directors, matters pertaining to the purposes of the Corporation shall be considered in such order as from time to time the Board of Directors may determine.

At all meetings of the Board of Directors, the President shall preside, and in the absence of the President, the Vice-President shall preside. In the absence of the President and the Vice-President, a President shall be chosen by the Board of Directors from among the Directors present.

The Secretary of the Board of Directors shall act as secretary of all meetings of the Board of Directors, but in the absence of the Secretary, the presiding officer may appoint any person to act as secretary of the meeting.

**Section 8. Committees.** The Board of Directors may, by resolution passed by a majority of the Directors, designate two (2) or more Directors to constitute one or more committees. A committee shall act in the manner provided in the authorizing resolution. Each committee so designated shall keep regular minutes of the transactions of its meetings and shall cause such minutes to be recorded in books kept for that purpose in the office of the Corporation and shall report the same to the Board of Directors from time to time.

**Section 9. Compensation of Directors.** Directors, as such, shall not receive any salary or compensation for their services as Directors; unless otherwise directed by the governing bodies of the City and County. A Director may be reimbursed for reasonable out-of-pocket expenses incurred as a Director in accordance with guidelines established by the Board of Directors which are reasonable and necessary in carrying out the Board of Directors' purposes.

**Section 10. Director's Reliance on Consultant Information.** A Director shall not be liable if while acting in good faith and with ordinary care, he relies on information, opinions, reports, or statements, including financial statements and other financial data that were prepared or presented by:

- (a) one or more other officers or employees of the Corporation;
- (b) legal counsel, public accountants, or other persons as to matters the officer reasonably believes are within the person's professional or expert competence; or
- (c) a committee of the Board of Directors of which the Director is not a member.

### ARTICLE III.

#### OFFICERS

**Section 1. Titles and Terms of Office.** The officers of the Corporation shall be a President, a Vice-President, a secretary, a treasurer, and such other officers as the Board of Directors may from time to time shall elect. One person may hold more than one office, except that the President of the Board may not hold the office of Secretary. The term of office for each officer (other than the Treasurer) shall be coincident with the Director's term of office.

Officers shall be subject to removal, with cause, at any time by a vote of a majority of the whole Board of Directors.

A vacancy in the office of any officer shall be filled by the Board of Directors. The designation of the Treasurer shall be governed by the provisions of Section 5 of this Article.

**Section 2. Powers and Duties of the President.** The President shall be a member of the Board of Directors and shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Directors. He or she shall have such duties as are assigned by the Board of Directors. The President may call special or emergency meetings of the Board of Directors.

**Section 3. Powers and Duties of the Vice-President.** The Vice-President shall be a member of the Board of Directors and shall perform the duties and exercise the powers of the President upon the President's death, absence, disability, or resignation, or upon the President's inability to perform the duties of his or her office. Any action taken by the Vice-President in the performance of the duties of the President shall be conclusive evidence of the absence or inability to act of the President at the time such action was taken.

**Section 4. Execution of Documents.** In furtherance of the purposes of the Board of Directors and subject to the provisions of the Articles of Incorporation and By-laws, the Board of Directors may authorize the President or Vice President to sign and execute all bonds, notes, deeds, conveyances, franchises, assignments, mortgages, notes, contracts and other obligations and instruments in the name of the Corporation.

**Section 5. Treasurer.** Notwithstanding the provisions of any other Section of this Article (other than the second paragraph of Section 1), The City's Director of Finance (or Interim or Acting Director of Finance) shall be the Treasurer of the Corporation during the term of office of the initial Directors. The Treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Corporation which come into his or her hands. When necessary or proper, he or she may endorse, on behalf of the Corporation, for collection, checks, notes and other obligations and shall deposit the same to the credit of the Corporation in a special Corporation fund in depository bank or banks located in the City of Bastrop. He or she may sign all receipts and vouchers for payments made to the Corporation, either alone or jointly with such other officer as is designated by the Board of Directors. He or she shall perform all acts incident to the position of Treasurer subject to the control of the Board of Directors and he or she shall, before beginning to perform the duties of office, shall execute, and thereafter throughout his or her term of office, shall maintain in full force and effect a bond for \$100,000 payable to the Corporation and conditioned on the faithful performance of the Treasurer's duties. Such bond shall be approved by the Board of Directors and paid for by the Corporation. . All Corporation funds shall be secured in the same manner as City funds, as required by Chapter 2256, Government Code, the Public Funds Investment Act.

**Section 6. Secretary.** The Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Directors in books provided for that purpose. He or she shall attend to the giving and serving of all notices; in furtherance of the purposes of the Corporation and subject to the limitations contained in the Articles of Incorporation, he or she may sign with the President in the name of the Corporation and/or attest the signatures thereof, all contracts, conveyances,

franchises, bonds, deeds, assignments, mortgages, notes and other instruments of the Corporation. He or she shall have charge of the Corporation's books and records, except the books of account and financial records and securities of which the Treasurer shall have custody and charge, and such other books and papers as the Board of Directors may direct, and, he or she shall in general perform all duties incident to the office of Secretary subject to the control of the Board of Directors.

**Section 7. Officer's Compensation.** Officers may not receive salary or compensation for personal services. Members of the Board of Directors, even in their capacity as officers, are not entitled to compensation.

**Section 8. Officer's Reliance on Consultant Information.** In the discharge of a duty imposed or power conferred on an officer of the Corporation, the officer may in good faith and with ordinary care rely on information, opinions, reports, or statements, including financial statements and other financial data that were prepared or presented by:

(a) one or more other officers or employees of the Corporation, including members of the Board of Directors; or

(b) legal counsel, public accountants, or other persons as to matters the officer reasonably believes are within the person's professional or expert competence.

#### ARTICLE IV.

#### MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

**Section J. Fiscal Year.** The fiscal year of the Corporation shall begin October 1 of each year.

**Section 2. Seal.** The seal of the Corporation shall be such as from time to time may be approved by the Board of Directors.

**Section 3. Notice and Waiver of Notice.** Whenever any notice whatever, other than public notice of a meeting given to comply with the Open Meetings Act, is required to be given under the provisions of these Bylaws, such notice shall be deemed to be sufficient if given by depositing the same in a post office box in a sealed postpaid wrapper addressed to the person entitled thereto at his or her post office address, as it appears on the books of the Corporation, and such notice shall be deemed to have been given on the day of such mailing. A waiver of notice, signed by the person or persons entitled to said notice, whether before or after the time stated therein, shall be deemed equivalent thereto.

**Section 4. Resignations.** Any Director or officer may resign at any time. Such resignations shall be made in writing and shall take effect at the time specified therein, or, if no time be specified, at the time of its receipt by the President or Secretary. The acceptance of a resignation shall not be necessary to make it effective, unless expressly so provided in the resignation.

**Section 5. Gender.** References herein to the masculine gender shall also refer to the feminine in all appropriate cases and vice versa.

**Section 6. Appropriations and Grants.** The Corporation shall have the power to request and accept any appropriation, grant, contribution, donation, or other form of aid from the federal government, the State, any political subdivision, or municipality in the State, or from any other- source.

**Section 7. Financial Reports; Annual Audits.** The Corporation shall prepare of cause *to* be prepared a statement or statements of its operations for and as of the end of each of its fiscal quarters, using the substantially same format that is employed by the City. The Corporation shall deliver each such financial statement to the Chief Financial Officer of the City not later than thirty (30) days after the end of the fiscal quarter to which such statement refers.

The Corporation shall also cause an audit of the Corporation's financial affairs to be performed, and a written report thereof prepared by an independent certified public accountant or firm of independent certified public accountants for each of the Corporation's fiscal years. Such audits shall be performed and reported by the auditor employed by the City for its corresponding fiscal year (unless such auditor declines to perform the Corporation audit) and shall employ substantially the same standards and format employed in connection with the City's corresponding annual audit. The Corporation shall deliver each such audit to the City's Chief Financial Officer not later than thirty (30) days after the close of the Corporation's fiscal year to which such audit refers.

**Section 8. Organizational Control.** The City may, at its sole discretion, and at any time, alter or change the structure, organization, programs, or activities of the Corporation (including the power to terminate the Corporation), subject *to* applicable law and any limitation on the impairment of contracts entered into by the Corporation.

**Section 9. Effective Date.** These Bylaws shall become effective only upon the occurrence of the following events: (a) the approval of these Bylaws by the governing body of the City; and (b) the adoption of these Bylaws by the Board of Directors.

## ARTICLE V.

### INDEMNIFICATION OF DIRECTORS AND OFFICERS

**Section 1. Right to Indemnification.** Subject to the limitations and conditions as provided in this Article V and the Articles of Incorporation, each person who was or is made a party or is threatened to be made a party to or is involved in any threatened, pending or completed action, suit or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative, arbitrative or investigative (hereinafter a "*Proceeding*"), or any appeal in such a proceeding or any inquiry or investigation that could lead to such a Proceeding, by reason of the fact that he or she, or a person of whom he or she is the legal representative, is or was a director or officer of the Corporation or while a director or officer of the

Corporation, is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a director, officer, partner, venturer, proprietor, trustee, employee, agent or similar functionary of another foreign or domestic corporation, partnership, joint venture, sole proprietorship, trust, employee benefit plan or other enterprise, shall be indemnified by the Corporation to the fullest extent permitted by the Texas Non-Profit Corporation Act, as the same exists or may hereafter be amended (but, in the case of any such amendment, only to the extent that such amendment permits the Corporation to provide broader indemnification rights than said law permitted the Corporation to provide prior to such amendment) against judgments, penalties (including excise and similar taxes and punitive damages), fines, settlements and reasonable expenses (including, without limitation, attorneys' fees) actually incurred by such person in connection with such proceeding, and indemnification under this Article V shall continue as to a person who has ceased to serve in the capacity which initially entitled such person to indemnity hereunder. The rights granted pursuant to this Article V shall be deemed contract rights, and no amendment, modification or repeal of this Article V shall have the effect of limiting or denying any such rights with respect to actions taken or proceedings arising prior to any such amendment, modification or repeal. It is expressly acknowledged that the indemnification provided in this Article V could involve indemnification for negligence or under theories of strict liability.

*Section 2. Advance Payment.* The right to indemnification conferred in this Article V shall include the right to be paid in advance or reimbursed by the Corporation the reasonable expenses incurred by a person of the type entitled to be indemnified under Section 1 who was, is or is threatened to be made a named defendant or respondent in a proceeding in advance of the final disposition of the proceeding and without any determination as to the person's ultimate entitlement to indemnification; provided, however, that the payment of such expenses incurred by any such person in advance of the final disposition of a proceeding, shall be made only upon delivery to the Board of Directors of a written affirmation by such Director or officer of his or her good faith belief that he or she has met the standard of conduct necessary for indemnification under this Article V and a written undertaking, by or on behalf of such person, to repay all amounts so advanced if it shall ultimately be determined that such indemnified person is not entitled to be indemnified under this Article V or otherwise.

*Section 3. Indemnification of Employees and Agents.* The Corporation, by adoption of a resolution of the Board of Directors, may indemnify and advance expenses to an employee or agent of the Corporation to the same extent and subject to the same conditions under which it may indemnify and advance expenses to Directors and officers under this Article V; and the Corporation may indemnify and advance expenses to persons who are not or were not Directors, officers, employees or agents of the Corporation but who are or were serving at the request of the Corporation as a Director, officer, partner, venturer, proprietor, trustee, employee, agent or similar functionary of another foreign or domestic corporation, partnership, joint venture, sole proprietorship, trust, employee benefit plan or other enterprise against any liability asserted against him or her and incurred by him or her in such a capacity or arising out of his or her status as such a person to the same extent that it may indemnify and advance expenses to Directors under this Article V.

**Section 4. Appearance as a Witness.** Notwithstanding any other provision of this Article V, the Corporation may pay or reimburse expenses incurred by a Director or officer in connection with his or her appearance as a witness or other participation in a proceeding involving the Corporation or its business at a time when he or she is not a named defendant or respondent in the proceeding.

**Section 5. Non-exclusivity of Rights.** The right to indemnification and the advancement and payment of expenses conferred in this Article V shall not be exclusive of any other right which a Director or officer or other person indemnified pursuant to Section 3 of this Article V may have or hereafter acquire under any law (common or statutory), provision of the Articles of Incorporation of the Corporation or these Bylaws, agreement, vote of shareholders or disinterested Directors or otherwise.

**Section 6. Insurance.** The Corporation may purchase and maintain insurance, at its expense, to protect itself and any person who is or was serving as a Director, officer, employee or agent of the Corporation or is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a Director, officer, partner, venturer, proprietor, trustee, employee, agent or similar functionary of another foreign or domestic corporation, partnership, joint venture, proprietorship, employee benefit plan, trust or other enterprise against any expense, liability or loss, whether or not the Corporation would have the power to indemnify such person against such expense, liability or loss under this Article V.

**Section 7. Notification.** Any indemnification of or advance of expenses to a Director or officer in accordance with this Article V shall be reported in writing to the members of the Board of Directors with or before the notice of the next regular meeting of the Board of Directors and, in any case, within the 12-month period immediately following the date of the indemnification or advance.

**Section 8. Savings Clause.** If this Article V or any portion hereof shall be invalidated on any ground by any court of competent jurisdiction, then the Corporation shall nevertheless indemnify and hold harmless each Director, officer or any other person indemnified pursuant to this Article V as to costs, charges and expenses (including attorneys' fees), judgments, fines and amounts paid in settlement with respect to any action, suit or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative or investigative, to the full extent permitted by any applicable portion of this Article V that shall not have been invalidated and to the fullest extent permitted by applicable law.

## ARTICLE VI.

### AMENDMENTS

These Bylaws may be amended at any time and from time to time by either of the following methods: (1) a proposal to alter, amend, or repeal these Bylaws may be made by the affirmative vote of a majority of the full Board of Directors at any meeting, proving however that any such proposed change or amendment to the Bylaws must be approved by the governing body of the City to be effective; or (2) the governing body of the City may, in its sole discretion, and at any time, amend these Bylaws by adopting an amendment or amendments to these Bylaws and delivering such amendment or amendments to the Secretary of the Corporation.

**BACKGROUND/HISTORY:**

The City of Bastrop Streets and Drainage department in conjunction with the Police Department received several requests to conduct a traffic study / traffic count on Carter St. The attached traffic study overall shows Carter Street (1) currently carries relatively low to moderate traffic volumes consistent with a residential/local collector roadway (2) Traffic along the corridor is overwhelmingly composed of passenger vehicles and light-duty trucks (3) Typical operating speeds are generally within the low-30 mph range; however, observed 85th percentile speeds indicate that a significant portion of motorists travel above 35 mph (4) The segment south of Linden Street demonstrates the highest occurrence of elevated vehicle speeds and may warrant additional evaluation.

The implementation of the stops signs is proposed to effectively enhance the safety of those vehicles attempting to cross or enter onto Carter Street.

**A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BASTROP, TEXAS RELATED TO CHAPTER 12 TITLED "TRAFFIC AND VEHICLES" ARTICLE 12.03.004 TITLED "INSTALLATION" AND 12.04.004 TITLED "SCHEDULE III:STOP SIGNS" ALLOWING FOR THE INSTALLATION OF TWO STOP SIGNS ON CARTER STREET AT THE INTERSECTION OF LINDEN STREET, INSTALLED BY STREETS AND DRAINAGE, AUTHORIZING THE CHIEF OF POLICE TO EXECUTE ALL NECESSARY DOCUMENTS PROVIDING FOR A REPEALING CLAUSE; AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.**

**WHEREAS**, the City of Bastrop ("City") has the responsibility to address any public health and safety problems; and

**WHEREAS**, northbound and southbound traffic on Carter Street and east and westbound traffic on Linden Street are public roadways within the incorporated limits of the city; and

**WHEREAS**, the City of Bastrop Streets and Drainage and the City of Bastrop Police department have determined upon the basis of a traffic investigation that the intersection of \*00 Carter Street and \*00 Linden Street should be controlled by two additional stop signs in order to protect public health, safety and welfare; and

**WHEREAS**, in accordance with Article 12.03.0004 titled "installation" the proposal will be presented before city council, and the traffic control devices will be maintained as a living document on file with the City secretary"; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council has exclusive control over and under its public streets and may control or regulate certain aspects of the movement of vehicles pursuant to Texas Transportation Code Chapter 311; and

**WHEREAS**, the city has the full power of local self-government as recognized by Tex. Loc. Gov't Code § 51.072; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council finds the attached reasonable and necessary.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BASTROP, TEXAS:**

**Section 1:** That the Chief of Police is hereby authorized to execute all necessary documents and forward to the City Secretaries office to be maintained on file. And the streets and drainage department shall erect the stop signs on Carter Street at the \*00 block and intersecting with the 800 block of Linden Street.

**Section 2:** All orders, ordinances, and resolutions, or parts thereof, which are in conflict or inconsistent with any provision of this Resolution are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict, and the provisions of this Resolution shall be and remain controlling as to the matters resolved herein.

**Section 3:** That this Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its passage, and it is so resolved.

**BACKGROUND/HISTORY:**

The City of Bastrop Streets and Drainage department in conjunction with the Police Department received several requests to conduct a traffic study / traffic count on Carter St. The attached traffic study overall shows Carter Street (1) currently carries relatively low to moderate traffic volumes consistent with a residential/local collector roadway (2) Traffic along the corridor is overwhelmingly composed of passenger vehicles and light-duty trucks (3) Typical operating speeds are generally within the low-30 mph range; however, observed 85th percentile speeds indicate that a significant portion of motorists travel above 35 mph (4) The segment south of Juniper Street demonstrates the highest occurrence of elevated vehicle speeds and may warrant additional evaluation.

The implementation of the stops signs is proposed to effectively enhance the safety of those vehicles attempting to cross or enter onto Carter Street.

**Section 3:** That this Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its passage, and it is so resolved.

**TITLE:**

Consider action to approve the second reading of Ordinance No. 2026-11 of the City Council of the City of Bastrop, Texas amending the Code of Ordinances, related to Chapter 8.06 providing for employment restrictions related to Registered Sex Offenders to include where registered sex offenders may be engaged in employment, within a specified distance of premises where children commonly gather. As attached in Attachment A; and provide for an effective date.

**BACKGROUND/HISTORY:**

Chapter 62 of the Texas Code of Criminal Procedures establishes the State of Texas sex offender registration program, which includes certain requirements to register with the local police department. The Texas local Government Code (341.906), to provide for public safety, authorizes cities to adopt ordinances restricting registered sex offenders from going in, on, or within a specified distance of premises where children commonly gather for the good of government, peace or order of the city.

This amendment to the city ordinance would restrict a registered sex offender from being employed within a specified distance of premises where children commonly gather.

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**CHAPTER 8. GENERAL HEALTH, SAFETY, AND SANITATION REGULATIONS**

**ARTICLE 8.06 - SEX OFFENDER ORDINANCE**

**Sec. 8.06.001 - Definitions**

(a) For the purposes of this article, the following words, terms and phrases when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

*Sex Offender.* An individual who, because of one or more violations, is required to register as a sex offender under: Chapter 62 of the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure; the laws of another state; federal law; the laws of a foreign country; or the Uniform Code of Military Justice.

*City Park.* Land located within the city limits is owned or controlled by a unit of local government which is designated by the unit of local government for use as a park, which includes regular use for children’s recreation.

*City Recreation Center.* City recreational areas, including but not limited to city recreational parks or other recreational facilities, as well as the soccer fields and baseball fields under the jurisdiction of a unit of local government.

~~*Employment. As defined in the Texas labor Code Section 201.041—General definition of Employment. Means a service, including service in interstate commerce, performed by an individual for wages or under an express or implied contract of hire, unless it is shown to the satisfaction of the commission that the individual’s performance of the service has been and will continue to be free from control or direction under the contract and in fact.*~~ *Employment.* Any service performed within the City for wages or under an express or implied contract for hire, performed on a regular or recurring basis, including service performed at the same place of business on three (3) or more occasions in any thirty (30) day period. The term “Employment” does not include the transitory presence of a sex offender at a place of business in the course of duties of a transient or intermittent character, including without limitation the delivery of goods, the pickup or transport of goods or persons, the provision of repair, installation, inspection, maintenance, or utility services, the making of sales calls or service calls, or other duties the performance of which requires the sex offender’s presence at the place of business only briefly and only as incident to a route, assignment, or scope of duties not principally located at that place of business.

*Covered Sex Offender.* A sex offender who has been assigned, by the Texas Department of Public Safety or by a court of competent jurisdiction in accordance with

40 Texas Code of Criminal Procedure articles 62.007 and 62.008, a risk level of: (i) three  
 41 (high); or (ii) two (moderate), where the offense requiring registration involved a victim  
 42 who was, at the time of the offense, a minor. The term does not include a sex offender  
 43 assigned a risk level of one (low). For purposes of this article, in the case of a sex offender  
 44 to whom no numeric risk level has been assigned, the sex offender shall be treated as a  
 45 Covered Sex Offender if the offense requiring registration is a sexually violent offense as  
 46 defined in Texas Code of Criminal Procedure article 62.001(6), classified as a Sexually  
 47 Violent Predator, a Predicate Sex Offender, or a Sexual Predator.

48 *Minor.* A person who is under the age of seventeen (17) years of age.

49 *Permanent Residence.* A place where a person abides, lodges, or resides for seven  
 50 (7) or more consecutive days.

51 *Premises where children commonly gather.* Any city park, city recreational center,  
 52 private or public youth center, video arcade, public or private school, child-care facility,  
 53 daycare center, or child safety zone, as those terms are defined in Texas Local Government  
 54 Code Section 341.906, Texas Health and Safety Code, sections 341.064 and 481.134, and  
 55 Texas Human Resources Code, section 42.002. The term does not include a church, as  
 56 defined by Texas Insurance Code Section 544.251.

57 *Property Owner.* Any owner of record, person who has contractual responsibility  
 58 for managing leases of the property, or person who has the legal right of possession of the  
 59 property.

60 *Temporary Residence.* A place where a person abides, lodges, or resides in the City  
 61 during any month in which the person on at least three (3) occasions spends more than  
 62 forty-eight (48) consecutive hours in the City, and which is not the person's Permanent  
 63 Residence.

#### 64 **Sec. 8.06.002 - Programs Involving Minors**

65 (a) *Generally.* A sex offender shall not participate in any program or event that includes minors  
 66 as participants and regularly provides athletic, civic, or cultural activities.

67 (b) *Halloween.* A sex offender shall not on each October 31<sup>st</sup> leave an exterior porch light on  
 68 or otherwise invite trick-or-treaters who are minors to the premises.

#### 69 **Sec. 8.06.003 - Offender Registration, Reporting, and Residency and Employment** 70 **Prohibitions**

71 (a) A sex offender shall register with the City of Bastrop Police Department when establishing  
 72 either a permanent or temporary residence in the City, consistent with the requirements of  
 73 Chapter 62 of the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure.

74 (b) A sex offender for whom the City of Bastrop Police Department is designated as that  
 75 person's primary registration authority by the Texas Department of Public Safety shall

76 report to the City of Bastrop Police Department to verify the information in the person's  
77 registration form maintained by the City of Bastrop Police Department either:

78 (1) At least once in each ninety (90) day period following the date the person first  
79 registered with the City of Bastrop Police Department, if the sex offender is subject  
80 to such a ninety (90) day reporting requirement under Article 62.058, Texas Code  
81 of Criminal Procedure, because the sex offender has been convicted two or more  
82 times for a sexually violent offense, received an order of deferred adjudication two  
83 or more times, or been convicted and received an order of deferred adjudication; or

84 (2) At least once each year, not earlier than the thirtieth (30<sup>th</sup>) day before and not later  
85 than the thirtieth (30<sup>th</sup>) day after the anniversary of the sex offender's date of birth,  
86 if the sex offender is subject to such annual reporting under Article 62.058, Texas  
87 Code of Criminal Procedure; or

88 (3) If the sex offender is subject to Article 62.202, Texas Code of Criminal Procedure,  
89 regarding persons civilly committed as a sexually violent predator, either:

90 a. If the person resides at a civil commitment center, at least once each year;  
91 or

92 b. If the person does not reside at a civil commitment center, at least once in  
93 each thirty (30) day period following either the date the person first  
94 registered with the City of Bastrop Police Department, or, if applicable, the  
95 date the person moved from a civil commitment center.

96 (c) It is unlawful for a sex offender, regardless of risk level assigned under Chapter 62 of the  
97 Texas Code of Criminal Procedure, to establish a permanent or temporary residence within  
98 one thousand (1,000) feet of any premises where children commonly gather.

99 (d) It is unlawful for a Covered sex offender to be employed at a place of business located  
100 within one thousand (1,000) feet of any premises where children commonly gather;  
101 provided, however, that this subsection shall not apply to a Covered Sex Offender who, on  
102 the effective date of the ordinance adopting this subsection, was employed at the place of  
103 business in question and has thereafter remained continuously so employed, and provided  
104 further that the Covered Sex Offender was, on the effective date of the ordinance adopting  
105 this subsection, and has at all times thereafter remained, in full compliance with all sex  
106 offender registration, reporting, verification, and other requirements imposed by Chapter  
107 62 of the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure, by any applicable order of a court of  
108 competent jurisdiction, and by any applicable condition of community supervision or  
109 parole. For purposes of this section, a Covered Sex Offender is not in full compliance if,  
110 on the effective date of the ordinance or at any time thereafter, the Covered Sex Offender  
111 (i) has been charged with a violation of any such requirement which charge has not been  
112 dismissed or otherwise finally resolved in the Covered Sex Offender's favor, (ii) has been  
113 the subject of a finding by the Texas Department of Public Safety or by any other

114 registration authority that the Covered Sex Offender has failed to satisfy any such  
 115 requirement, or (iii) is subject to an unexecuted warrant or capias relating to any such  
 116 requirement.

117 **Sec. 8.06.004 - Property Owners Prohibited from Renting Real Property to Sexual**  
 118 **Offenders**

119 (a) It is unlawful for a property owner to let or rent any place, structure or part thereof,  
 120 manufactured home or trailer, with the knowledge that it will be used as a permanent  
 121 residence or temporary residence by any sex offender prohibited from establishing such  
 122 permanent residence or temporary residence pursuant to the terms of this article, if such  
 123 place, structure or part thereof, manufactured home, trailer, or other conveyance, is located  
 124 within one thousand (1,000) feet of any premises where children commonly gather.

125 **Sec. 8.06.005 – Enforcement: Penalty; Affirmative Defenses; Evidentiary Matters**

126 (a) *Penalty.* Any firm, corporation or person who violates any provision contained in the  
 127 provisions of this article is guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, shall be fined in  
 128 an amount not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for each offense. Each day that a  
 129 violation is permitted to exist shall constitute a separate offense.

130 (b) *Affirmative defenses.* It is an affirmative defense to prosecution that any of the following  
 131 conditions apply:

132 (1) The sex offender established the permanent or temporary residence or employment  
 133 and has complied with all the sex offender registration laws of the state, prior to the  
 134 date of the adoption of this article;

135 (2) The person was a minor when he/she committed the offense and was not convicted  
 136 as an adult;

137 (3) The person is a minor;

138 (4) The premises where children commonly gather, as specified herein, within one  
 139 thousand feet (1,000) of the permanent or temporary residence or place of  
 140 employment of the sex offender was opened, established or created after the date  
 141 the sex offender had established the permanent or temporary residence or  
 142 commenced employment at the place of business and complied with all sex offender  
 143 registration laws of the state;

144 (5) The information on the state's sex offender registry database is incorrect, and if  
 145 corrected, this article would not apply to the person; or

146 (6) At the time of the violation, the person was subject to community services  
 147 supervision pursuant to Article 42A of the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure or a  
 148 period of supervision as a condition of parole pursuant to Chapter 508 of the Texas

149 Government Code, and the court or parole board reduced or waived the 1,000-foot  
150 restriction as it pertains to the person's residence or employment.

151 (7) For a violation of Section 8.06.002, the person posted a sign at the entrance to the  
152 person's residence on October 31<sup>st</sup> stating "No Trick-or-Treating", or substantially  
153 similar language expressly discouraging trick-or-treating at the residence, and such  
154 sign was posted by or before 3:00pm and remained posted through 11:59pm on  
155 October 31<sup>st</sup>.

156 (8) The person applied for and was approved for an exemption under Section 8.06.006  
157 specific to the violation.

158 (c) *Evidentiary Matters.*

159  
160 (1) Neither allegation, nor evidence, of a culpable mental state is required for the proof  
161 of an offense defined by this article, except for a violation under Section 8.06.004,  
162 which requires knowledge on the part of the property owner, and except for a  
163 violation of the employment prohibition under Section 8.06.003, which requires  
164 that the sex offender knew or reasonably should have known that the place of  
165 business was located within one thousand (1,000) feet of any premises where  
166 children commonly gather. It is an affirmative defense to prosecution under the  
167 employment prohibition of Section 8.06.003 that the sex offender, within thirty (30)  
168 days after commencing the employment or learning that the place of business is  
169 within one thousand (1,000) feet of a premises where children commonly gather,  
170 whichever is later, either terminated the employment or filed a written request for  
171 exemption under Section 8.06.006.

172 a. For purposes of Section 8.06.004, a property owner has knowledge that the  
173 property will be used as a permanent residence or temporary residence by a sex  
174 offender if either the sex offender's status on the state's sex offender registry  
175 database is disclosed to the property owner in an application to lease the  
176 property or through a related background check of the prospective tenant, or if  
177 the property owner is made aware of the sex offender's status on the state's sex  
178 offender registry database by any other means.

179 (2) It shall be prima facie evidence that this article applies to such a person if that  
180 person's record appears on the state's sex offender registry database.

181 (3) *Measurements.* For the purposes of determining the minimum distance separation,  
182 the requirement shall be measured by following a straight line from the outer  
183 property line of the permanent or temporary residence or, in the case of an alleged  
184 violation of the employment prohibition under Section 8.06.003, from the outer  
185 property line of the place of business at which the sex offender is employed, to the  
186 nearest property line of the premises where children commonly gather, as described  
187 hereinabove.

- 188 a. In the case of multiple residences on one (1) property, measurement is from the  
 189 nearest wall of the building or occupied structure or the parking/driveway,  
 190 whichever is closer to the nearest property line of the premises to the nearest  
 191 property line of the premises where children commonly gather, as described  
 192 herein.
- 193 b. The city will maintain a map depicting the prohibited areas. The city shall  
 194 annually review the map for changes. Said map will be available to the public,  
 195 at the city police department.
- 196 c. In cases of a dispute over measured distances, it shall be incumbent upon the  
 197 person(s) challenging the measurement to prove otherwise.
- 198 (4) Nothing in this section is intended to modify or reduce a “child safety zone”  
 199 implemented by a court or parole panel under other law.

200 **Sec. 8.06.006 – Exemptions**

- 201 (a) Exemptions from the terms of this article shall not be contrary to the laws of this State or  
 202 the public interest, but may be granted on an event-by-event basis where or when, owing  
 203 to special conditions, a literal enforcement of the provisions of this article (1) will result  
 204 in unnecessary hardship, such as interfering with the person’s ability to attend school ~~or to~~  
 205 ~~hold a job~~, and (2) is broader than necessary to protect the public, given the nature and  
 206 circumstances of the special conditions.
- 207 (b) A sex offender shall have the right to make an appeal for an exemption from a provision  
 208 of this article by making a request to the chief of police, in writing, stating the provision  
 209 from which an exemption is sought, the event for which an exemption is sought, the  
 210 special conditions which would cause a literal enforcement of the provision to result in  
 211 unnecessary hardship, and any other relevant factors showing that granting an exemption  
 212 would be in the public interest.
- 213 (c) Special conditions and factors that may be considered by the chief of police on whether  
 214 to grant an exemption include, but are not limited to, the following:
- 215 (1) Whether a literal enforcement of the provisions of this article in the event-specific  
 216 instance will result in unnecessary hardship, such as interfering with the person’s  
 217 ability to attend school ~~or to hold a job~~;
- 218 (2) Whether a literal enforcement of the provisions of this article in the event-specific  
 219 instance is broader than necessary to protect the public, given the nature and  
 220 circumstances of the special conditions;
- 221 (3) If the person is subject to a period of community supervision under Texas Code of  
 222 Criminal Procedure Article 42A, or a period of supervision as part of parole under  
 223 Texas Government Code Chapter 508, whether the person has served at least two  
 224 years of such period of supervision;

- 225 (4) If the person was subject to community services supervision pursuant to article 42.12,  
226 section 13B Article 42A of the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure or a period of  
227 supervision as a condition of parole pursuant to Chapter 508 of the Texas Government  
228 Code, the court or parole board reduced or waived the 1,000-foot restriction as it  
229 pertains to the person's residence or employment, or otherwise established conditions  
230 less restrictive than those of set forth in this article.
- 231 (5) Whether the person is seeking the exemption as part of a program to reunite with the  
232 person's family; and
- 233 (6) Whether the person's written request seeking the exemption has specified how the  
234 person intends to cope with any stressful situations that occur.
- 235 (d) The decision of the chief of police, which may be made based solely on the written  
236 appeal without further hearing, The decision of the chief of police may be appealed to

**BACKGROUND/HISTORY:**

The City Council Rules of Procedure establish the policies and procedures governing the conduct of City Council meetings and related legislative processes. Periodic review of these rules is necessary to ensure consistency with current practices, legal requirements, and organizational responsibilities.

The proposed amendments to Resolution No. R-2026-89 are administrative in nature and are intended to:

- Correct grammatical, formatting, and typographical errors throughout the document;
- Update legislative and statutory references to ensure accuracy and consistency;
- Clarify duties and responsibilities of elected officials, staff, and meeting participants;
- Revise and update forms and procedural documents referenced within the Rules of Procedure; and
- Improve the overall readability and usability of the document.

These revisions do not substantially alter the authority of the City Council or the fundamental procedures governing City Council meetings but are intended to provide greater clarity and administrative efficiency.

**RESOLUTION NO. R-2026-89**

**A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BASTROP, TEXAS, AMENDING THE CITY COUNCIL RULES OF PROCEDURE TO CORRECT GRAMMATICAL, TYPOGRAPHICAL, AND FORMATTING ERRORS; UPDATE LEGISLATIVE AND STATUTORY REFERENCES; CLARIFY DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES; REVISE FORMS AND PROCEDURAL DOCUMENTS; REPEALING ALL RESOLUTIONS OR PARTS OF RESOLUTIONS IN CONFLICT HERewith; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.**

**WHEREAS**, the City Council finds that adoption of the amended Rules of Procedure is in the best interest of the City and will promote the efficient and orderly conduct of City business.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BASTROP, TEXAS:**

**SECTION 1.** The City Council hereby adopts the amended City Council Rules of Procedure attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and incorporated herein for all purposes.

**SECTION 2.** The amendments contained in Exhibit "A" shall supersede any conflicting provisions contained in prior versions of the City Council Rules of Procedure.

**SECTION 3.** All resolutions or portions of resolutions in conflict with this Resolution are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

**SECTION 4.** If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or provision of this Resolution is held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Resolution.

**SECTION 5.** This Resolution shall become effective immediately upon its adoption.

# Rules of Procedure for the City Council and Boards & Commissions of the City of Bastrop, Texas

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## ARTICLE 1.

### AUTHORITY, APPLICABILITY, AMENDMENT, AND ANNUAL REVIEW

#### 1.1 Authority.

Article III, Section 3.13 of the City Charter of the City of Bastrop, Texas grants the City Council the right to determine its own rules of procedure. The following rules are enumerated under and by the authority of said provision.

#### 1.2 Applicability.

The rules of procedure adopted by the City Council are applicable not only to the City Council, but also to all boards, commissions, and committees of the City of Bastrop. When applied to boards, commissions, and committees, the term Mayor means the chairperson and the terms City Council or Council Members means the members of the board, commission, or committee.

#### 1.3 Amendment.

These rules may be amended, or new rules adopted by a minimum of three (3) of the five (5) voting members of the City Council present.

#### 1.4 Annual Review.

Following the municipal elections each year, the Council will review these rules of procedure annually, make changes as appropriate, and adopt their own rules of procedure in accordance with the Charter at the first scheduled meeting in July. In the event no annual review occurs, the standing rules of procedure continue in effect. This does not limit the Council's right and ability to amend the rules at any other time during the year, in accordance with the Charter.

## ARTICLE 2.

### GENERAL RULES OF PROCEDURE AND POLICIES

#### 2.1 Construction of Authority.

The construction of authority in all matters associated with the meetings and activities of the City Council, including the agenda, shall be (1) the U.S. Constitution and Statutes of the United States of America; (2) the Texas Constitution and Statutes of the State of Texas; (3) the City Charter; (4) the Code of Ordinances of the City of Bastrop, Texas; and (5) these rules. Rosenberg's Rules of Order are a preferred source of guidance for matters not addressed herein.

#### 2.2 Meetings Shall Be in Compliance.

All meetings of the City Council shall be in compliance with the Texas Government Code, Chapter 551, Open Meetings Act including the Act's prohibition of discussions about an item of public business among a quorum through a series of communications. Except in the case of an emergency meeting, notice of all meetings shall be given at least three business days before the scheduled date of the meeting.

If meetings are held at Bastrop City Hall, they may be televised live on the City's television channel via the appropriate cable providers and/or live streamed via social media. If unable to televise meetings live due to technical difficulties, the meeting shall be recorded for a later broadcast. The Council meetings shall be rebroadcast as a part of the City's on-going channel programming.

The Bastrop City Hall is wheelchair accessible and special parking is available on the west side of the building. If special accommodations are required, please contact the City Secretary a minimum of 24 hours in advance at 512-332-8800.

### **2.3 Conduct of Meetings.**

Meetings of the City Council shall be conducted according to the rules adopted by the City Council. For additional guidance (non-binding), the City Council may refer to Rosenberg's Rules of Order as amended herein and when not inconsistent with these rules.

### **2.4 Regular Meetings.**

Regular meetings of the City Council shall be on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month at 6:30 p.m. and end no later than 10:00 p.m. The Council may, by majority vote at a regular meeting, change the days or times of meetings as circumstances may necessitate. Per the City Charter, the Council shall meet regularly and at least once each month.

### **2.5 Special Meetings.**

The City Council may hold as many additional, special meetings as may be necessary for the transaction of the business of the City. Special meetings of the City Council may be called as necessary upon written notice to the City Secretary by the Mayor or by any three (3) members of the City Council unless made at a regular meeting at which a quorum of Council Members is present. The City Manager and all Council Members shall be notified of all special meetings.

### **2.6 Emergency Meetings.**

In case of an emergency or urgent public necessity, which shall be expressed in the meeting notice, it shall be sufficient if members receive, and notice is posted one (1) hour before the meeting is convened. Notice shall be provided also to the media as requested in accordance with the Texas Government Code, Section 551.047.

### **2.7 Workshops (Work Session).**

Workshops are special meetings called for the purpose of conducting a detailed and thorough exploration of matters that may properly come before the City Council. Citizen comments on agenda items listed for open portions of the workshop can be addressed to the City Council (i.e., not executive session) before or during the City Council's consideration of the item.

### **2.8 Executive Sessions.**

Executive sessions are meetings closed to the public. These sessions are only permitted for the purpose of discussing matters enumerated in Texas Government Code Chapter 551, the Open Meetings Act. Disclosure of topics to be discussed shall be made to the public in accordance with the requirements of the Open Meetings Act.

The City Council can retire into an executive session during a regular or special meeting as stated on

a posted agenda or when deemed necessary by the presiding officer or a majority of the City Council. However, before said session begins, the presiding officer shall announce that the executive session is commencing, the items to be discussed, and the section of the Open Meetings Act that justifies the executive session(s). The order in which an executive session may appear on the agenda is subject to the discretion of the mayor. A certified record of the meeting will be created by the presiding officer or their designee, sealed and permanently kept, subject to opening by court order. No voting or action shall be taken by the City Council during an executive session. No other subject but that posted on the agenda is to be considered. Adjournment of the executive session and any vote needed shall be made during the open public meeting.

**2.9 Recessed Meetings.**

No meeting shall be recessed for a longer period of time than until the next regular meeting except when required information has not been received, or, in the case of work sessions or special meetings, to a date certain by motion duly passed.

**2.10 Quorum.**

Four (4) members of the Council shall constitute a quorum to do business. Three (3) or more members of the Council should not meet to deliberate city business outside an open meeting unless:

- (a) They are placed on a sub-committee by Council; or
- (b) They are calling a city council meeting.

**2.11 Conflict of Interest.**

A Council Member prevented from voting by a conflict of interest shall file a conflict-of-interest affidavit with the City Secretary as soon as possible after the posting of an agenda, which contains a conflict unless an applicable conflict-of-interest affidavit has already been filed.

A Council Member prevented from voting by a conflict of interest shall step down from the dais and leave the Council Chambers, shall not vote on the matter, shall not participate in discussions regarding the matter or attempt to influence the Council’s deliberation of the matter in any way (during meetings or outside of meetings), shall not attend Executive Sessions regarding the matter, and shall otherwise comply with the state law and City ordinances concerning conflicts of interest including Chapter 171 of the Texas Local Government Code and City of Bastrop Code of Ethics, Article 1.15.

**2.12 Presiding Officer.**

The mayor shall serve as the Presiding Officer for all meetings of the City Council. In the absence of the Mayor, the Mayor Pro Tempore shall serve as the Presiding Officer. In the absence of the Mayor and Mayor Pro Tempore, the City Manager shall call the meeting to order, if a quorum of the Council is present, and the first order of business shall be for the Council to elect by majority vote, a temporary presiding officer from the members then seated and in attendance. The temporary presiding officer shall serve in such capacity until the meeting is adjourned. The Presiding Officer shall serve as the chair of all meetings and shall make final rulings on all questions pertaining to these rules. All decisions of the presiding officer are final unless overruled by the City Council through a motion to appeal as described in Article 3.9 – Courtesy, Decorum and Order of these rules.

The mayor, as Presiding Officer, is entitled to participate in the discussion and debate, but may not vote, except in elections, to break a tie, and as otherwise provided in the City’s Charter. Because the Presiding Officer conducts the meeting, it is common courtesy for the chair to take a less active role than other members of the Council in debates and discussions. This practice in no way

precludes the presiding officer from participating in the meeting fully and freely.

The presiding officer of boards and commissions shall be the person selected by the board or commission as the chair, co-chair, or vice chair. If these persons are not in attendance, the board or commission shall choose a temporary presiding officer from among the members in attendance.

### 2.13 Minutes of Meetings.

The City Secretary shall keep minutes of all proceedings of the City Council, and they shall be open to public inspection in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas. Staff Liaisons will take minutes of proceedings of the various Boards & Commissions and provide them to the City Secretary as Records Custodian.

### 2.14 Suspension and Amendment of Rules.

Any provisions of these rules not governed by federal, or state law or the City Charter may be temporarily suspended by a super majority vote (see Article 3.7 of these rules) of the City Council. Any provisions of these rules may be amended by majority vote if such amendment is appropriately posted on an agenda of a regular meeting of the City Council and receives approval of the majority of the City Council at such meeting.

### 2.15 Rules for the Press and Media.

The use of media equipment, such as lights, cameras, and/or microphones must be coordinated with the City Manager prior to the meeting to ensure that the equipment does not disturb or otherwise conflict with or disrupt the meeting or the Council's activities.

### 2.16 Council Use of Legal Services

The Council shall ~~have a personal identification number, PIN, assigned each fiscal year that corresponds to a fixed dollar amount, determined by Council at each budget appropriation, that shall be used when the services of the City Attorney are sought. If funds are expended prior to the end of the budget period, the Council Member shall request an agenda item before the entire council to seek additional funds.~~ contact the City Attorney as necessary for legal advice, guidance, or assistance related to City business. Any invoices for City Attorney services requested by an individual Council Member shall be coded to that Council Member's name for tracking purposes and processed in accordance with applicable budget and administrative procedures.

## ARTICLE 3.

### PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

#### 3.1 Purpose.

The purpose of these rules of parliamentary procedure is to establish orderly conduct of the meetings. Simple rules lead to a wider understanding and participation. Complex rules create two classes: (1) those who understand the rules, and (2) those who do not fully understand, and those who do not fully participate. The ultimate purpose of these rules of parliamentary procedure is to encourage and facilitate decision-making by the City Council. In a democracy, the majority opinion carries the day.

These rules enable the majority to express their opinion and fashion a result while permitting the minority to also express itself (but not dominate) and fully participate in the process.

#### 3.2 Model Format for an Agenda Item Discussion.

The following ten (10) steps may be used as a model or guidebook by the Presiding Officer. The meeting is governed by the agenda and the agenda constitutes the only items to be discussed.

Item 9E.

Each agenda item can be handled by the Presiding Officer (Mayor) in the following basic format:

1. *Announce the Item.* The mayor should clearly announce the agenda item number. The Mayor or the Mayor's designee shall clearly state the subject matter of the agenda item by reading the caption for the item being considered.
2. *Receive a Report.* The mayor should invite the appropriate people to report on the item, including any recommendations they might have.
3. *Ask Clarifying Questions.* The mayor should ask the Council Members if they have any technical questions for clarification. At this point, members of the City Council may ask clarifying questions to the people who reported on the item, and they should be given time to respond.
4. *Seek Citizen Input.* The mayor should invite citizen comments – or if a public hearing, open the public hearing. Upon conclusion, the mayor should announce that public input is closed, or if a public hearing, close the public hearing.
5. *Motion First.* The mayor should invite a motion from the City Council before debate is given on the merits of the item. The mayor should announce the name of the member who makes the motion.
6. *Motion Second.* The mayor should determine if any member of the City Council wishes to second the motion. The mayor should announce the name of the member who seconds the motion. If no member of the City Council wishes to second the motion, then the motion fails and should be so stated by the mayor.
7. *Repeat Motion.* If the motion is made and seconded, the mayor should make certain that everyone (including the audience) understands the motion. This is done in three ways:
  - a. The mayor can ask the maker of the motion to repeat it;
  - b. The mayor can repeat the motion; or
  - c. The mayor can ask the City Secretary to repeat the motion.
8. *Discuss the Motion.* The mayor should now invite the members of the City Council to discuss the motion. If there is no desired discussion, the mayor may call for a vote. If there has been no discussion or a brief discussion, then there is no need to repeat the motion before taking a vote. If the discussion has been lengthy, it is a good idea to repeat the motion before calling for a vote.
9. *Vote.* The mayor may ask the City Secretary to call the roll. Unless a super-majority is required for passage of the motion, a simple majority vote determines whether the motion passes or fails. Unless a member of the Council seeks recusal from voting on any question where the vote would constitute a conflict of interest, and that recusal is consented to by a majority of the remainder of the Council, all members of the Council shall vote upon every question, ordinance, or resolution. Action items require a vote.
10. *Announce the Outcome.* The mayor announces the results of the vote and should also state what action (if any) the Council has taken. The mayor should announce the name of

any member who voted in the minority on the motion.

### 3.3 The Basic Motions.

The basic motion is the one that puts forward a decision for consideration. A basic motion might be: “I move for approval of the ordinance as submitted,” or “I make a motion that we deny the resolution.” Multiple motions may be made on the same agenda item provided they are made and voted on sequentially.

A failed motion to approve shall be construed as a successful motion to deny. This shall be the case with or without conditions. However, the Mayor may call for additional motions to clarify what (if any action) the Council wishes to take.

### 3.4 The Motion to Amend.

If a member wants to change a basic motion, the member will have to motion to amend the original or previously amended motion. A motion to amend might be: “I move that we amend the motion to include the changes we discussed to the ordinance.” A motion to amend seeks to retain the basic motion on the floor (a motion made and seconded) but to modify it in some way. A motion to amend requires the agreement of the person making the original motion. If the basic motion has already been seconded, the motion to amend must be acknowledged and accepted by the member who seconded the basic motion.

### 3.5 Discussion and Debate.

The basic rule of motions is that they are subject to discussion and debate. Accordingly, the basic motion and the motion to amend are all eligible, each in their turn for full discussion by and before the City Council. Once the motion is made, the length of individual statements by the mayor and members is limited to five minutes unless the City Council votes to extend the time allotted. Discussion and debate can continue until the mayor, or any member decides that it is time to move on and call a vote on the motion once all council members have had the opportunity to discuss the motion.

### 3.6 Other Motions.

There are exceptions to the general rule of free and open debate on motions. The exceptions apply when there is a desire of the Council to move on. The following motions are not debatable, and the mayor must immediately call a vote on the motion if seconded by another member.

- *Motion to Adjourn.* This motion, if passed, requires the Council to immediately adjourn to its next regularly scheduled meeting. This motion requires a simple majority vote.
- *Motion to Recess.* This motion, if passed, requires the Council to immediately take a recess. Normally the Mayor will determine the length of the recess which could last for a few minutes to several hours. It requires a simple majority vote.
- *Motion to Fix the Time to Adjourn.* This motion, if passed, requires the Council to adjourn the meeting at the specific time set in the motion. For example, “I move we adjourn this meeting at Midnight.” It requires a simple majority vote.
- *Motion to Table.* This motion, if passed, requires discussion of the agenda item to be halted immediately, and the agenda to be placed on hold. The motion may contain a specific time to bring the item up again, or it may not specify a time. If no time is specified, the item shall

be placed on the agenda at the following Council meeting.

- *Motion to Remove from Table.* This motion, if passed, allows the Council to remove an item previously placed on hold. A vote in favor of removing an item from the table must be made before the Council can take action on an item that was tabled.

### 3.7 Motions Requiring a Supermajority Vote to Pass.

A supermajority vote consists of a majority plus one (i.e., To pass a motion under this section requires affirmative votes of a majority, plus one more).

- *Motion to Limit Debate.* This motion is sometimes referred to as, “moving the question” or, “calling the question.” When a member of the Council makes such a motion, the member is saying, “I have had enough discussion, let’s vote on the issue.” When such a motion is made, the mayor should ask for a second, stop the discussion, and vote on the motion to limit debate. The motion requires a supermajority vote to pass. Meaning, that the number of council members voting for the motion must equal four or more.
- *Motion to Object to the Consideration of an Item.* This motion, if passed, precludes the City Council from even considering the item on the agenda. It does not preclude the item from appearing on a future agenda. The motion requires a supermajority vote to pass. (Normally, this motion is unnecessary, because the objectionable item can be defeated outright or tabled.)
- *Motion to Suspend the Rules.* This motion is debatable but requires a supermajority vote to pass. This motion allows the Council to suspend its own rules for a particular purpose. For example, the Council may desire to give a particular speaker more time than normally allowed. A “motion to suspend the rules and give the speaker ten additional minutes,” accomplishes this desire.

### 3.8 Motion to Reconsider.

There is a special motion that requires a bit of explanation all by itself: the motion to reconsider. A tenet of parliamentary procedure is finality. After vigorous discussion, debate and a vote, there must be some closure to the issue. As such, after a vote is taken, the matter is deemed closed, subject only to reopening if a proper motion to reconsider is made.

A motion to reconsider requires a simple majority vote to pass, but two special rules apply only to the motion to reconsider.

The first issue involves timing. A motion to reconsider must be made at the meeting where the item was first voted upon, at the very next regular meeting, or at a special meeting called for that specific item (if properly noticed and on the posted agenda). A motion to reconsider made at a later time is considered untimely and it may not be considered unless the Council suspends the rules to consider it.

Secondly, the motion to reconsider can only be made by a member of the Council who voted in the majority on the original motion. The motion to reconsider may be seconded by any member of

the City Council regardless of how they voted on the original motion. If a member of the Council who voted in the minority on the original motion seeks to make a motion to reconsider, it MUST be ruled out of order by the mayor. The purpose of this rule is finality. If a member of the minority could make a motion to reconsider, then the item could be brought back again and again, which would defeat the purpose of finality.

If a motion to reconsider passes, then the original matter is back before the Council, and a new original motion is in order. The matter may be discussed as if it were on the floor for the first time.

The City Attorney should be consulted prior to making a motion to reconsider so that potential legal implications can be evaluated in advance.

### 3.9 Courtesy, Decorum, and Order.

These rules of order are meant to promote an atmosphere of courtesy and decorum appropriate for the efficient discussion of business. It is the responsibility of the mayor (and the members of the City Council) to maintain that atmosphere of courtesy and decorum. The mayor should always ensure that debate and discussion focus on the item and the policy in question, not on the personalities of the participants of the discussion. Debate on policy is healthy; debate on personalities is not. In order to assist in the creation and maintenance of that atmosphere, the following rules shall govern all meetings:

1. *Request to Speak.* Before a Council Member, staff member, or an audience member may speak on open session agenda items, they must first be recognized by the mayor. Upon recognition, the person requesting to speak shall hold the floor and shall make their point clearly and succinctly. Public comments must be kept relevant to agenda items or other matters over which the city council has jurisdiction. The mayor shall rule on the relevance of comments. Persons making irrelevant, impertinent, overly redundant or slanderous remarks may be barred by the mayor from further comment before the Council during the meeting. Audience members may criticize the city council, including criticism of any act, omission, policy, procedure, program, or service. The mayor has the right to cut a speaker off if the discussion becomes too personal to an individual, loud, crude, irrelevant, impertinent, redundant, or slanderous.
2. *Order.* While the Council is in session, all Council Members must preserve order and decorum. If a person fails to request to speak before speaking, the mayor shall rule them 'out of order' and remind them that they do not have the floor. A person shall neither, by conversation or otherwise, delay or interrupt the proceedings or the peace of the meeting, nor disturb any other person while speaking or refuse to obey the orders of the mayor. Members of the City Council should not leave their seats during a meeting without first recusing themselves, obtaining permission of the mayor, or making a motion to recess.
3. *Improper References Prohibited.* Every person desiring to speak shall address the entire Council and shall not single out a member of the Council, the audience or a staff member. Speakers shall confine themselves to the question under debate, avoiding all personal attacks and indecorous language.
4. *Interruptions.* A Council Member, once recognized, shall not be interrupted when

speaking unless it is to call the member to order, or other such interruption expressed below. If the Council Member, while speaking, is called to order, the member shall cease speaking until the question of order is determined, and if the Council Member is found to be in order, the member shall be permitted to proceed speaking. Allowable interruptions or points of order are as follows:

- a. *Point of Privilege.* The proper interruption would be: “Point of Privilege.” The mayor would then ask the interrupter to, “state your point.” Appropriate points of privilege relate to anything that would interfere with the normal comfort of the meeting. For example, the room might be too hot or cold, or a fan motor might interfere with a Council member's ability to hear.
- b. *Point of Order.* The proper interruption would be: “Point of Order.” The mayor would then ask the interrupter to, “state your point.” Appropriate points of order relate to anything that would not be considered appropriate conduct of the meeting. For example, if the mayor called for a vote on a motion that permits debate without allowing any discussion.
- c. *Motion to Appeal.* If the Mayor makes a ruling that a member of the body disagrees with, that member may appeal the ruling of the mayor by stating, “motion to appeal.” If the motion is seconded and after the debate, if it passes by a simple majority vote, the ruling of the mayor is reversed.
- d. *Call for orders of the day.* If a council member believes the discussion has strayed from the agenda, the member may say, “Let’s return to the agenda.” The motion does not require a vote. If the Mayor discovers that the discussion has strayed from the agenda, the mayor simply returns to the business of the day.
- e. *Withdraw a Motion.* During the debate and discussion of a motion, the original maker of the motion on the floor, at any time, may interrupt the speaker to withdraw his or her motion. The motion is immediately deemed withdrawn and discussion on the motion shall cease. Council members are free to make the same motion or another motion.

### 3.3 City Council and Board Member Disruptions.

As stated in Resolution R-2017-20, when members of the City Council or other Board Members become engaged in heated discussions that could be construed as not following parliamentary procedures, it will be the responsibility of the Presiding Officer (Mayor or Board Chair) to restore order to the meeting. In the event that order cannot be immediately restored, the Presiding Officer should call for a recess. When the recess is called, a sufficient number of the City Council or Board Members should depart the room so that a quorum is no longer present. Information Technology personnel will ensure that the microphones and audio for the television channel are turned off. The Presiding Officer will determine what action to take and will resume the meeting, when appropriate. Law enforcement personnel will not become involved unless a crime (i.e. assault, terroristic threat, etc.) is committed.

### 3.4 Audience Disruptions.

It is against the laws of the State of Texas for anyone to intentionally or recklessly disrupt official

proceedings. As stated in Resolution R-2017-20, if a member of the audience (gallery) becomes disruptive, the Presiding Officer will inform that person that their conduct is not permissible and to cease. If that person receives a second warning, the Chief of Police or the Chief's designee will position themselves in proximity to that person. On the third warning (when appropriate), the Presiding Officer will inform the person that their actions are disrupting this lawful meeting, and they must depart immediately. The Chief of Police or the Chief's designee has the discretion to escort the person out of the chambers and off of City property. In the event the person does not leave the chambers, the person may be subject to being arrested under Section 42.05 of the Texas Penal Code (TPC) and/or Section 38.13 of TPC or punished as provided in an ordinance enacted under Section 217.003 of the Texas Local Government Code. The person will be subject to arrest under Section 30.05 TPC if the person does not leave the property. In the event the same person comes to a subsequent meeting and disrupts that meeting to the point they are requested to leave again, a criminal trespass warning can be issued.

### **3.5 Council May Discipline its Own Members.**

In the event a Council Member violates the Charter, these rules, or any other ordinance of the city, or acts in a manner that causes embarrassment or disgrace to the City of Bastrop, the City Council on a supermajority vote may discipline the offending member. To consider such an action, the mayor or two Council Members may place the item on an agenda.

Such action may only take place after an executive session is held to discuss the offense. The offending member shall be present at the executive session to answer any questions asked by members of the City Council or make other statements as the member may desire to make in their defense. If the offending member refuses to attend the executive session, the remaining members of the City Council may proceed in their absence.

The outcome of the executive session may be as follows and shall be made publicly in open session in accordance with the Texas Open Meetings Act:

1. *No Action.* The City Council chooses to take no action.
2. *Private Censure.* The City Council may choose to privately censure the offending member, leaving their comments to the offending member left in the confines of the executive session.
3. *Public Censure.* The City Council may choose to publicly censure the offending member through a resolution passed by supermajority vote and entered into the public record.

## **ARTICLE 4.**

### **AGENDA ORDER**

The Mayor, City Manager, or an appropriate designee shall prepare a draft agenda and deliver it to the City Council via electronic transmission on the Monday prior to the final agenda posting. The City Manager or

an appropriate designee shall prepare an agenda and cause the same to be posted in accordance with the Texas Open Meetings Act. Agendas and packet material shall be delivered to the City Council via electronic format and uploaded into a cloud storage service. City Council shall be notified via email that the agenda and packet have been uploaded and available for review **three (3) business days, not to include the date of posting and the date of the meeting**, prior to a regularly scheduled Council Meeting. ~~The goal would be to upload the agenda and packet on Thursday prior to a regularly scheduled Council Meeting.~~ In the event of an emergency meeting of the City Council, this provision shall be suspended when not inconsistent with the provisions of federal or state law or the City Charter.

In order to facilitate the agenda process, the Mayor, two Council Members, or the City Manager may place an item on the agenda. Staff assistance, if required, should be requested through the City Manager (City Charter, Article III, Section 3.05 Prohibitions). Agenda items must be provided to the City Manager's Office at City Hall by 12:00 noon on the 7<sup>th</sup> calendar day preceding the date of the regular meeting. If the agenda topic does not allow for staff to adequately prepare information for Council's consideration, the item may be postponed until the next regular meeting.

#### **4.1 Call to Order.**

The mayor shall call the meeting to order. The mayor shall announce that a quorum of the City Council is present and shall state for the record the names of all members of the City Council that are absent.

#### **4.2 Pledges of Allegiance to the United States & Texas Flags.**

The Council shall recite the Pledge of Allegiance, first to the United States Flag, and then to the state Flag of Texas. The Council welcomes individuals and organizations, young and old, to lead the Pledges.

#### **4.3 Invocation.**

All regular meetings of the City Council shall include an invocation.

#### **4.4 Presentations.**

Presentations may be made by the Mayor, City Council, or Staff. The Mayor may deliver any proclamation as may be required from time to time. Outside entities and organizations granted permission to make a presentation shall be placed in this section.

Proposed proclamations and resolutions will not be placed on an agenda or brought before the City Council for discussion or action that:

- a. Take a position on a matter of religious or spiritual values or principles, including ones that advance one religion, denomination, or article of faith over another;
- b. Promote political partisanship favoring one party over another;
- c. Advocate outcomes in legal matters in which the City of Bastrop is not a party and are pending before a court or administrative law body (e.g., State Office of Hearings Examiners);
- d. Is contrary to a policy position stated in an ordinance previously adopted by the

Council (unless the Council is in the process of amending or repealing the prior ordinance).

#### 4.5 Work Session/Briefings.

Items may be included in this section for the purpose of conducting a detailed and thorough exploration of matters that may subsequently come before City Council as an item for individual consideration. All questions of a technical nature, which require a detailed explanation for understanding, may be considered in a work session. Council may, through the City Manager, request the attendance of such staff members or outside experts as may be required to answer such questions. No formal action may be taken on items. The council may provide staff direction on the matter being considered. Citizen comments and questions will be considered at the end of the prepared presentation and after the Council has asked questions.

#### 4.6 Staff and Board Briefings.

Items that are provided to the Council on a routine basis, such as monthly financial statements and quarterly investment reports, should be included in this section. Appointed boards of the city, who have been requested to provide periodic updates, such as the Bastrop Economic Development Corporation and Visit Bastrop, will be included in this section.

#### 4.7 Citizen Comments .

Every agenda must include the following language for purposes of open and transparency to inform the public of how to appropriately address the City Council:

~~At this time, three (3) minute comments will be taken from the audience on any topic. Anyone in attendance wishing to address the Council must complete a citizen comment form and give the completed form to the City Secretary prior to the start of the Citizen Comments. Alternatively, if you are unable to attend the council meeting, you may complete a citizen comment form with your comments at [www.cityofbastrop.org/citizencommentform](http://www.cityofbastrop.org/citizencommentform) at least two hours before the meeting starts on the requested date. Comments submitted electronically by this time will be given to the City Council during the meeting and included in the public record, but not read aloud. In accordance with the Texas Open Meetings Act, if a citizen discusses any item not on the agenda, the City Council cannot discuss issues raised or make any decision at this time. Instead, the City Council is limited to making a statement of specific factual information or a recitation of existing policy in response to the inquiry. Issues may be referred to the City Manager for research and possible future action.~~

~~It is not the intention of the City of Bastrop to provide a public forum for the embarrassment or demeaning of any individual or group. Neither is it the intention of the Council to allow a member of the public to slur the performance, honesty, and/or integrity of the Council, as a body, or any member or members of the Council individually or collectively, or members of the City's staff. Accordingly, profane, insulting, or threatening language directed toward the Council and/or any person in the Council's presence will not be tolerated.~~

~~At this time, three (3) minute comments will be taken from the audience on any topic. Anyone in attendance wishing to address the Board/Commission must complete a citizen comment form and give the completed form to the Board/Commission Secretary prior to the start of the Board/Commission meeting. In accordance with the Texas Open Meetings Act, if a citizen discusses any item not on the agenda, the Board/Commission cannot discuss issues raised or make any decision at this time. Instead, the Board/Commission is limited to making a statement of specific factual information or a recitation of existing policy in response to the inquiry. Issues may be~~

*referred to the City Manager for research and possible future action. Profanity, physical or other threats are not allowed and may subject the speaker to loss of the time for comment, and if disruptive to the conduct of business, could result in removal of the speaker.*

#### **4.8 (A) Approval of the Minutes.**

The Council shall consider the minutes of any meeting presented for their review since the last regular meeting. This heading will only be used when there are no other items listed on a consent agenda; otherwise, this heading may take the form of one item among others on the Consent Agenda.

#### **4.8 (B) Consent Agenda Items.**

There is hereby established, as a part of every agenda for regular and/or special meetings of the City Council, a portion of said agenda that shall be labeled “consent agenda.” Said consent agenda may consist of any and all business regularly coming before the City Council including approval of the minutes of previous meetings.

Any member of the City Council or a citizen may request that any item be removed from the consent agenda and considered separately prior to the City Secretary reading the caption of each item. If any item was removed from the consent agenda, it will be considered immediately following approval of the remainder of the consent agenda.

The ~~City Secretary~~ Mayor shall read the caption of each item and/or ordinance prior to a motion being made to approve the Consent Agenda. Once a second is received on the motion, the Council shall vote.

All items set out in the consent agenda shall be deemed passed upon passage of an affirmative motion, by a vote of the majority of the members of the City Council, that the consent agenda be adopted. No further action shall be deemed necessary, and all such items appearing on the consent agenda, upon passage of such motion, shall be deemed adopted as if voted upon separately.

#### **4.9 Items for Individual Consideration.**

Items for individual consideration shall be considered by the City Council individually and approved by either a simple majority vote or a supermajority vote as the case may be.

Public hearings, which are statutorily required, shall be included in this section. The mayor shall first request staff comments. The mayor shall open the public hearing and receive citizen input. While the public hearing is open, the Council may ask questions of the speakers but may not deliberate or argue with the public on the matter at hand. Those speaking at a public hearing are required to follow the rules established herein for citizen comments. Upon conclusion of citizen comments, the Mayor shall close the public hearing. Council may deliberate or take action on the matter at hand upon the closing of the public hearing.

Unless a majority of the City Council votes to proceed with consideration, items listed for individual consideration shall be removed at the request of one of the following:

- a. the mayor,
- b. the item’s sponsor(s),

- c. the city manager,
- d. the council liaison to the board or commission giving rise to the item, or
- e.
- f. the applicant seeking approval from the Council.

#### **4.10 Executive Session Items.**

This section is only used when it is known in advance that it is necessary for the Council to convene in executive session. Executive sessions are sessions closed to the public. They are only permitted for the purpose of discussing matters enumerated in Chapter 551, Open Meetings Act of the Texas Government Code. Disclosure of topics to be discussed shall be made to the public in accordance with the requirements of the Open Meetings Act.

If the subject of the executive session warrants, the executive session may be held prior to the regular session. Council may agree in Executive Session what can be shared in public prior to concluding the Executive Session. Nothing herein shall limit the ability of the Council to adjourn into Executive Session at any time during a meeting to discuss any agenda item.

#### **4.11 Action on Executive Session Items.**

This section is only used if the Council conducts an executive session. As a general rule, action on executive session items must be taken during public/open sessions of the Council, unless authorized by law. Action may include the taking of no action at all.

#### **4.12 Adjournment.**

The mayor shall adjourn the meeting upon passage of the appropriate motion.

## **ARTICLE 5.**

### **RULES GOVERNING CITIZEN COMMENTS**

#### **5.1 Purpose.**

It is the desire of the City Council to hear from the citizens of Bastrop to stimulate discussion and offer a forum for a cordial and meaningful public debate on matters that are properly a concern of the City Council. The following rules shall control and govern audience comments.

#### **5.2 Rules for Audience Comments.**

Immediately preceding the opening of a public hearing, the mayor may direct the City Secretary to read the rules governing citizen comments during a Public Hearing. Generally, the rules for a Public Hearing are the same as for Citizen Comments (below); however, the rules for Public Hearings may be altered by the mayor in advance of the hearing if reasonably necessary to facilitate audience input, Council deliberations, and an efficient meeting.

#### **5.3 Rules Governing Citizen Comments.**

1. Citizen comments are limited to those speakers who have been acknowledged by the Presiding Officer and who speak from the designated microphone.

2. Each speaker is limited to a maximum time limit of three minutes on any item except for a public hearing item for which the Presiding Officer has announced a longer time is allowed. Speakers cannot pool or donate their time allotment to other speakers.
3. No individual may address the Council without submitting a speaker card, which may be done online or in person. The card must clearly state the subject or issue on which the citizen wishes to speak. If the subject matter does not pertain to city business, the mayor shall advise the individual and/or make recommendations as to how they may get the issue addressed.
4. ~~No individual may address the Council without submitting a speaker card, which may be done online or in person. The card must clearly state the subject or issue on which the citizen wishes to speak. If the subject matter does not pertain to city business, the mayor shall advise the individual and/or make recommendations as to how they may get the issue addressed.~~ Individuals addressing the Council shall provide their name, address (street name or neighborhood) and whether they reside within the city limits.
5. Citizens speaking on agenda items shall restrict their comments to the subject matter listed. Citizens speaking on agenda items may make comments either during the Citizen Comment portion of the agenda or when the City Council takes up that particular agenda item.
6. Citizens speaking on non-agenda items shall only speak during the Citizens Comment portion of the agenda.
7. Council may not act upon or discuss any issue brought forth as a non-agenda item, except to:
  - a. Make a statement of specific factual information given in response to the inquiry, or
  - b. A recitation of existing policy in response to the inquiry.

Any deliberation of or decision about the subject of the inquiry shall be limited to a proposal to place the subject on the agenda for a subsequent meeting.

8. Proper respect, decorum, and conduct shall prevail at all times. Impertinent, slanderous, or personal attacks are strictly prohibited, and violators may be removed from the Council Chambers.
9. No placards, banners, or signs may be displayed in the Council Chambers or City Hall. Exhibits relating to a presentation are acceptable provided that copies are given to the City Attorney for reference, and to the City Secretary to be included in the official records of the meeting.
10. Because of cyber-security concerns, citizens are not allowed to utilize the City's audio-visual equipment for electronic multi-media presentations unless permission is granted by the City Secretary at least 24 hours in advance (at the City Secretary's sole discretion).

Hard copies must be provided to the City Secretary to be included in the official records of the meeting.

11. Arguing loudly or forcefully, efforts at intimidation of speakers or attendees, or other disruptive behavior is prohibited. Civil discussion and/or debate are acceptable on items specifically listed on the agenda.
12. Unauthorized remarks from the audience, stomping of feet, applauding, whistles, yells, or any type of disruptive behavior is prohibited. Applause of appreciation may be acceptable when recognizing a significant event or achievement.
13. Council meetings are the workplace to carry out the business of the City of Bastrop; therefore, any conduct that could constitute harassment in the workplace is prohibited.

#### **5.4 Preservation of Order.**

As referenced in Article 3.11 above, the mayor shall preserve order and decorum and, if necessary, shall cause to be silenced or removed from the Council Chambers any non-Council Member speaking out of order or disrupting the order of the meeting.

#### **5.5 Applicants.**

An applicant appearing before the Council seeking approval for items such as contracts or development authorizations is limited to a maximum time of ten minutes. An applicant who has made a presentation to the Council must again be recognized before being allowed to return to the podium to make additional comments or answer questions.

## **ARTICLE 6.**

### **COUNCIL LIAISONS TO BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS**

One Council Member will be appointed as the council liaison to each of the city's boards and commissions annually as a part of the Board & Commission Member appointment process, except for the Ethics Commission, Bastrop Housing Authority, Zoning Board of Adjustments, and the Hunters Crossing Local Government Corporation (Council Members are appointed to this board). The mayor will appoint council liaisons with consideration given to applicable expertise. Council liaisons are asked to make every effort to attend the meetings of the boards or commissions to which they have been appointed as liaisons. Board and commission members may contact their council liaison concerning items of concern or interest with regard to their appointed board.

The Statement of Officer form, commonly referred to as the “Anti-Bribery Statement,” must be executed and filed with the Office of the City Secretary. Article XVI, Section 1 of the Texas Constitution requires all elected or appointed state and local officers to subscribe to the anti-bribery statement in section 1(b) before entering upon the duties of their offices.



*Secretary of State Form #23-2 Rev. 09/2023*

The Oath of Office form must be executed and filed with the Office of the City Secretary. Article XVI, Section 1 of the Texas Constitution requires all elected or appointed state and local officers to take the official oath of office found in section 1(a). The Oath of Office may be administered by anyone authorized under the provisions of Chapter 602 of the Texas Government Code. Commonly used officials include notaries public and judges.



*City of Bastrop NOTICE TO ALL BOARD MEMBERS*

The Texas Open Records Act was amended to allow a board member of a governmental body to choose whether to allow public access to the information in the custody of the city that relates to the home address, home phone number, social security number, or that reveals whether the board members have family members. The Notice to All Board Members must be executed and filed with the Office of the City Secretary.



*City of Bastrop PUBLIC ACCESS OPTION FORM*

The Public Information Act allows employees, public officials, and former employees and officials to elect whether to keep certain information about them confidential. This Public Access Option Form must be executed and filed with the Human Resources Director no later than the 14<sup>th</sup> day after the date the employee/elected official begins employment. Unless you choose to keep your home address, home phone number, social security number, or information that reveals whether you have family members private this information is subject to public release.



*City of Bastrop CONFLICT OF INTEREST STATEMENT*

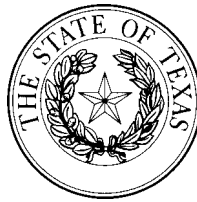
A local government official shall complete this affidavit before a meeting in which an agenda item is discussed in which they may have a 'substantial interest' as defined in Chapter 171 (TLGC) or to avoid the appearance of impropriety. The form is filed with the records administrator (city secretary or board secretary). A notice shall be included in the minutes that the member has filed a Conflict-of-Interest Statement and a copy of the form attached to the minutes. A city that maintains a website is required to post on that site statements and disclosures that are required to be filed under Chapter 176.



*Texas Ethics Commission LOCAL GOVERNMENT OFFICER CONFLICTS DISCLOSURE STATEMENT FORM CIS*

Section 176.003 of the Local Government Code requires certain local government officers to file this form. A "local government officer" is defined as a member of the governing body of a local governmental entity; a director, superintendent, administrator, president, or other person designated as the executive officer of a local governmental entity; or an agent of a local governmental entity who exercises discretion in the planning, recommending, selecting, or contracting of a vendor. This form is required to be filed with the records administrator of the local governmental entity not later than 5 pm on the seventh business day after the date on which the officer becomes aware of the facts that require the filing of this statement.

**Commentary**

Article XVI, section 1 of the Texas Constitution requires all elected or appointed state and local officers to take the official oath of office found in section 1(a) and to subscribe to the anti-bribery statement found in section 1(b) before entering upon the duties of their offices.

Elected and appointed state-level officers required to file the anti-bribery statement with the Office of the Secretary of State include members of the Legislature, the Secretary of State, and all other officers whose jurisdiction is coextensive with the boundaries of the state or who immediately belong to one of the three branches of state government. Questions about whether a particular officer is a state-level officer may be resolved by consulting relevant statutes, constitutional provisions, judicial decisions, and attorney general opinions. For more information, see Op. Tex. Att’y Gen. No. JC-0575 (2002) (determining the meaning of “state officer” as it is used in Article XVI).

Effective September 1, 2017, Senate Bill 1329, which was enacted by the 85<sup>th</sup> Legislature, Regular Session, amended chapter 602 of the Government Code to require the following judicial officers and judicial appointees to file their oath and statement of officer with the secretary of state:

Officers appointed by the supreme court, the court of criminal appeals, or the State Bar of Texas; and  
Associate judges appointed under Subchapter B or C, Chapter 201, Family Code.

Local officers must retain the signed anti-bribery statement with the official records of the office. *As a general rule, city and county officials do not file their oath of office with the Secretary of State— these officials file at the local level. The Legislature amended the Texas Constitution, Article 16, Section 1, in November 2001 to no longer require local level elected officials to file with our office. **The Office of the Secretary of State does NOT file Statements or Oaths from the following persons:*** Assistant District Attorneys; City Officials, including City Clerks, City Council Members, Municipal Judges, Justices of the Peace, and Police/Peace Officers; Zoning/Planning Commission Members; County Officials, including County Clerks, County Commissioners, County Judges, County Tax Assessors, and District Clerks; and Officials of Regional Entities, such as, Appraisal Review Districts, Emergency Service Districts, and School Districts (ISD’s).

## ***Commentary***

All state or county officers, other than the governor, lieutenant governor, and members of the legislature, who qualify for office, are commissioned by the governor. Tex. Gov’t Code, Section 601.005. The Secretary of State performs ministerial duties to administer the commissions issued by the governor, including confirming that officers are qualified prior to being commissioned. Submission of this oath of office to the Office of the Secretary of State confirms an officer’s qualification so that the commission may be issued.

Pursuant to art. XVI, Section 1 of the Texas Constitution, the Oath of Office *may not* be taken until a Statement of Officer (see Form 2201) has been subscribed to and, as required, filed with the Office of the Secretary of State. Additionally, gubernatorial appointees who are appointed during a legislative session *may not* execute their Oath until after confirmation by the Senate. Tex. Const. art. IV, Section 12. A Statement of Officer form required to be filed with the Office of the Secretary of State is filed upon receipt by the Secretary of State. The Oath of Office may be administered by anyone authorized under the provisions of Chapter 602 of the Texas Government Code. Commonly used officials include notaries public and judges.

### ***Officers Required to File Oath of Office with the Secretary of State:***

- Gubernatorial appointees, appellate and district court judges, and district attorneys
- Directors of districts operating pursuant to chapter 36 or 49 of the Texas Water Code file a duplicate original of their Oath of Office within 10 days of its execution. Tex. Water Code Ann. Sections 36.055(d); 49.055(d)

### ***Officers Not Required to File Oath of Office with the Secretary of State:***

- Members of the Legislature elected to a *regular* term of office will have their Oath of Office administered in chambers on the opening day of the session and recorded in the appropriate Journal. Members elected to an *unexpired* term of office should file their Oath of Office with either the Chief Clerk of the House or the Secretary of the Senate, as appropriate.

## Open Government Training

Each elected or appointed member of a governmental body must take at least one hour of training in both the Texas Open Meetings Act and the Texas Public Information Act. Under certain circumstances, the Office of the Attorney General may require a public official to complete additional training on a determination that a city has failed to comply with the Texas Public Information Act. ## Texas Open Meetings Act (TOMA)

**Definition of “meeting”** - A meeting occurs any time a quorum of the city council discusses public business that is within the city council's jurisdiction, regardless of the location or means of communication (e.g., phone, in person, email).

**General rule** - Every regular, special, or called meeting of the city council and most boards and commissions (depending on membership and authority) must be open to the public.

**Exception** - TOMA does not apply to purely social gatherings, conventions and workshops, ceremonial events, press conferences, or candidate forums, so long as any discussion of city business is incidental to the purpose of the gathering, and no action is taken.

**Exception** - A city may use an online message board that is viewable by the public for city councilmembers to discuss city business. The message board must meet several criteria provided for in TOMA.

**Exception** - Statutorily authorized executive or “closed” sessions, including deliberations concerning: (1) purchase or lease of real property; (2) consultation with attorney; (3) personnel matters; (4) economic development; (5) certain homeland security matters; and (6) certain cyber-security matters.

To hold an executive session, the governing body must first convene in open session, identify which issues will be discussed in executive session, and cite the applicable exception. All final actions, decisions, or votes must be made in an open meeting.

**Agenda** - A governmental body must post notice of its meeting that includes the date, hour, place, and subject of each meeting. The notice must be posted on a bulletin board at city hall in a place readily accessible to the public at all times for at least three business days before the scheduled date of the meeting. In addition, for cities that have a website, the city must concurrently post the notice of the meeting and the city council's agenda on the website at least three business days before the scheduled date of the meeting.

TOMA also requires that the notice of a meeting at which the city council will discuss or adopt a budget must include: (1) a physical copy of the proposed budget unless the proposed budget has been made clearly accessible on the homepage of the city's website;

and (2) a taxpayer impact statement showing, for the median-valued homestead property, a comparison of the property tax bill in dollars from the current fiscal year to an estimate of the property tax bill in dollars for the same property for the upcoming fiscal year if the city's proposed budget is adopted and if the budget funded by the no-new-revenue rate is adopted instead.

**Records of meetings** - Cities must keep written minutes or recordings of all open meetings, and a certified agenda or recording of executive/closed meetings, except for closed consultations with an attorney. The minutes must state the subject and indicate each vote, decision, or other action taken, and a city that has a website must post the approved minutes on that website.

Minutes and recording of an open meeting are public records, while certified agendas and recording of a closed meeting are confidential and cannot be released to the public except by court order.

**Penalties** - Penalties for violating the TOMA range from having the action voided to the imposition of fines and incarceration. Any action taken in violation of TOMA is voidable and may be reversed in a civil lawsuit. There are four criminal provisions under the TOMA, including:

- (1) Knowingly engaging in a series of communications of less than a quorum of members discussing city business that will ultimately be deliberated by a quorum of members;
- (2) Calling or participating in an impermissible closed meeting;
- (3) Participating in an executive session without keeping a certified agenda or recording; and
- (4) Disclosing a certified agenda or recording to a member of the public.

## Texas Public Information Act (PIA)

**Definition of "public information"** - Public information includes any information that is collected, assembled, or maintained by or for a governmental entity (including information held by an individual officer or employee in the transaction of official business), regardless of the format.

**General rule** - Most information held by a city (or a city official or employee) is presumed to be public information and must be released pursuant to a written request.

**Procedure** - Any member of the public may request information in writing. A city official is prohibited from inquiring into the requestor's motives, and is generally limited to:

- (1) Releasing the information as quickly as is practicable, but generally not later than ten business days following the request;
- (2) Requesting an opinion from the Texas attorney general's office within ten business days of the request as to whether the information may be withheld; or

- (3) Notifying the requestor that the city has no information responsive to the request for information not later than ten business days of the request.

**Penalties** - Penalties for violating the PIA range from a civil lawsuit against the city or a city official to the imposition of fines and incarceration.

There are three general prohibitions carrying criminal penalties under the PIA, including:

- (1) Refusing to provide public information;
- (2) Providing confidential information; and
- (3) Destroying government information improperly.

## Ethics

### Chapter 171 – Conflicts of Interest

**Definition of “conflict of interest”** - A local public official has a conflict of interest in a matter if any action on the matter would involve a business entity or real property in which the official has a substantial interest, and action on the matter would confer an economic benefit on the official.

**General rule** - If a local public official has a substantial interest in a business entity or real property, the official must file an affidavit with the city secretary stating the interest and abstain from any participation or vote on the matter. A local public official is considered to have a substantial interest if a close relative has such an interest.

**Exception** - If a local public official has a conflict of interest and files an affidavit, the official is not required to abstain from further participation or a vote on the matter if a majority of the members of the governing body also have a conflict of interest and file an affidavit.

**Penalties** - Penalties for violating the conflict of interest provisions range from having the action voided to the imposition of fines and incarceration.

### Chapter 176 – Conflicts Disclosure

**General rule** - Chapter 176 of the Local Government Code requires that mayors, councilmembers, and certain other executive city officers and agents file a “conflicts disclosure statement” with a city’s records administrator within seven days of becoming aware of any of the following situations:

- A city officer or the officer’s family member has an employment or business relationship that results in taxable income of more than \$2,500 in the preceding 12 months with a person who has contracted with or is considering contracting with the city (“vendor”).

- A city officer or the officer's family member receives and accepts one or more gifts with an aggregate value of \$100 in the preceding 12 months from a vendor.
- A city officer has a family relationship with a vendor.

The chapter also requires a vendor to file a conflict of interest questionnaire if the vendor has a business relationship with the city and an employment or other relationship with an officer or officer's family members, has given a gift to either, or has a family relationship with a city officer. The conflicts disclosure statement and the conflict of interest questionnaire are created by the Texas Ethics Commission and are available online at [www.ethics.state.tx.us](http://www.ethics.state.tx.us).

**Penalties** - An officer who knowingly fails to file the statement commits either a class A, B, or C misdemeanor, depending on the amount of the contract.

### Chapter 553 – Conflicts Disclosure

**General Rule** - Chapter 553 of the Government Code requires a “public servant” who has a legal or equitable interest in property that is to be acquired with public funds to file an affidavit within ten days before the date on which the property is to be acquired by purchase or condemnation. Chapter 553 applies to the acquisition of both real property (e.g., land) and personal property (e.g., a vehicle). In addition, Chapter 553 seems to apply even when the property is to be acquired by a governmental entity with which the public servant is not affiliated. The affidavit must be filed with the county clerk of the county in which the public servant resides as well as the county clerk of each county in which the property is located.

**Penalties** - A person who fails to file the required affidavit is presumed to have committed a Class A misdemeanor offense if the person had actual notice of the acquisition or intended acquisition of the property. A Class A misdemeanor is punishable by a fine not to exceed \$4,000, confinement in jail for a term not to exceed one year, or both.

## Nepotism

**Definition of “nepotism”** - Nepotism is the appointment or employment of a close relative of a city's "final hiring authority (the city council or city manager, depending on the form of government)” to a paid position with the city.

**General rule** - A public official, acting alone or as a member of a governing body, generally may not appoint a close relative to a paid position, regardless of the relative's merit. In addition, a person may not continue to be employed by a city if a close relative is elected to the city council, unless he or she falls under an exception.

**Exception** - If the employee has been continuously employed by the city for a certain period of time, the employee may remain employed by the city if a close relative is elected to city council.

**Exception** - The nepotism statute does not apply to cities with fewer than 200 people.

**Penalties** - Penalties for violating the nepotism provisions include a fine and immediate removal from office.

## Dual Office Holding/Incompatibility

**Definition of “dual office holding” and general rule** - The Texas Constitution generally prohibits one person from holding more than one paid public office at the same time.

**Definition of “incompatibility” and general rule** - Texas law prohibits one person from holding two public offices at the same time, regardless of whether one or both offices are paid, if one position might impose its policies on the other or subject it to control in some other way. There are three types of incompatibility:

- (1) “Self-appointment” incompatibility prohibits a member of a governing body from being appointed to another public office over which the governing body has appointment authority;
- (2) “Self-employment” incompatibility prohibits a member of a governing body from being employed in another public office over which the governing body has employment authority; and
- (3) “Conflicting loyalties” incompatibility prohibits one person from holding two public offices in which the duties of one office might negatively affect the duties of the other office.

**Penalties** - A person who accepts a prohibited second office automatically resigns the first office.

## Bribery/Gifts

**Definition of “bribery”** - A public official or public employee commits the crime of bribery when he accepts, agrees to accept, or solicits any benefit as consideration for a decision, opinion, recommendation, vote, or other exercise of discretion. The fact that a benefit or gift was not offered until after the exercise of official discretion is not considered a defense to a prosecution for bribery.

**Bribery penalty** - The penalty for violating the bribery law is a second degree felony, punishable by two to twenty years imprisonment and a fine of up to \$10,000.

**Gifts** - Public officials and employees are generally prohibited from accepting gifts from any person subject to their jurisdiction, whether or not the gift is related to a specific official action.

**Allowable gifts** - Certain exceptions may apply, such as: (1) an item with a value of less than \$50 (excluding cash or a negotiable instrument, such as a check or gift card); (2) a gift given by a person with whom the official or employee has a familial, personal, business,

or professional relationship, independent of the official or employee's status or work; (3) any benefit that the official or employee is entitled to receive by law or for which the person has performed a duty independent of the person's status as a public service (for example, a jury duty fee); or (4) any political contributions as defined by the Texas Election Code. In addition, a public employee or official may in certain circumstances accept as a guest an unsolicited gift or benefit of food, lodging, transportation, or entertainment, so long as the gift is not related to a specific official action.

**Gifts penalty** - The penalty for violating the acceptance of gifts prohibition is, with some exceptions, a class A misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of up to \$4,000 and/or jail time of up to one year.

Consider action to approve Resolution No. R-2026-90 of the City Council of the City of Bastrop, Texas, approving the execution of a Roadway Agreement between the City of Bastrop and BEBD Frontage Road, LLC, related to infrastructure improvements associated with Blakey Lane for an amount not to exceed \$690,000.00, as attached as Exhibit A.

**BACKGROUND/HISTORY:**

On September 26, 2023, the City of Bastrop approved a Planned Development District (PDD) Agreement with BEBD Frontage Road, LLC (Developer) via Ordinance No. 2023-36 for the Burleson Crossing East development. Under Section 2.4.4 of that PDD, the City assumed responsibility for constructing the Blakey Lane Extension, a roadway improvement identified as necessary to serve the businesses and customers of the development.

To date, the City has not commenced design or construction of the Blakey Lane Extension. In order to expedite the delivery of this infrastructure, the Developer has agreed to construct the improvements, including the roadway extension and installation of a water line in advance of City action, in exchange for reimbursement of actual costs incurred.

The proposed Roadway Agreement formalizes this arrangement. Under the agreement, the City will place estimated project funds into a separate account and reimburse the Developer on a monthly basis through a Certification for Payment process as construction progresses. The Project Engineer, LJA Engineering, Inc., will certify all payment requests. The Developer is required to complete the improvements within 18 months of the agreement's effective date, subject to Force Majeure delays. Prior to commencing construction, the Developer must provide performance and payment bonds and maintain appropriate insurance coverage naming the City as an additional insured. The Developer and its contractors must also comply with prevailing wage requirements under Chapter 2258 of the Texas Government Code.

The City shall place the estimated amount of the Actual Costs (\$680,000.00) into a separate account and draw down on the funds through a certification for payment process with the Developer as construction of the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements progresses. The City's total participation shall not exceed \$690,000.00, as established by Authorizing Ordinance No. 2024-29, adopted pursuant to Subchapter C, Chapter 212 of the Texas Local Government Code. The Developer is solely responsible for all costs in excess of that amount.

**FISCAL IMPACT:**

Funds will be drawn from the approved Blakey Lane Improvement project.

**RECOMMENDATION:**

Authorize the City Manager to execute the Roadway Share Agreement with BEBD Frontage Road, LLC.

## RESOLUTION NO. R-2026-90

**A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BASTROP, TEXAS, APPROVING THE EXECUTION OF A ROADWAY AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF BASTROP AND BEBD FRONTAGE ROAD, LLC, RELATED TO INFRASTRUCTURE IMPROVEMENTS ASSOCIATED WITH BLAKEY LANE FOR AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$690,000.00; PROVIDING FOR A REPEALING CLAUSE; AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.**

WHEREAS, on September 26, 2023, the City of Bastrop approved a Planned Development District (PDD) Agreement with BEBD Frontage Road, LLC (Developer) via Ordinance No. 2023-36 for the Burleson Crossing East development, under which the City assumed responsibility for constructing the Blakey Lane Extension; and

WHEREAS, the City has not commenced design or construction of the Blakey Lane Extension, and in order to expedite delivery of this infrastructure, the Developer has agreed to construct the improvements, including the roadway extension and installation of a water line, in exchange for reimbursement of actual costs incurred; and

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 2024-29, adopted by the City Council pursuant to Section 212.072(b) of the Texas Local Government Code, which establishes the limit of the City's participation in the cost of the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements; and

WHEREAS, the City shall place the estimated amount of \$680,000.00 into a separate account and reimburse the Developer through a Certification for Payment process as construction of the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements progresses, with the City's total participation not to exceed \$690,000.00 as established by the Authorizing Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that execution of the Roadway Agreement is in the best interests of the City and serves the public purpose of supporting planned infrastructure improvements.

**Section 1.** The City Council approves the execution of the Roadway Agreement between the City of Bastrop and BEBD Frontage Road, LLC, for an amount not to exceed \$690,000.00, substantially in the form attached hereto as **Exhibit A**, and incorporated herein for all purposes.

**Section 2.** The City Manager is authorized to execute the Roadway Agreement and any related non-substantive documents necessary to carry out the intent of this Resolution.

**Section 3. Fiscal Impact.** Funding for the City's obligations under the Roadway Agreement for BEBD Frontage Road, LLC (not to exceed \$690,000.00) shall be drawn from the approved project contingency.

**Section 4. Repealing Clause.** All resolutions, parts of resolutions, or provisions in conflict with the provisions of this Resolution are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

**Section 5. Effective Date.** This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its passage and approval.

THIS Roadway Agreement – Blakey Lane Extension (this “Agreement”) is executed by and between **BEBD Frontage Road, LLC**, a Texas limited liability company (“Developer”), and the **City of Bastrop, Texas**, a home-rule city and municipal corporation of Bastrop County, Texas, acting by and through its City Manager or their designee (the “City”). The City and Developer, for and in consideration of the mutual premises and promises described below, agree as follows:

**I. RECITALS AND FINDINGS**

- A. Pursuant to Section 2.4.4 of the Planned Development District Agreement approved by the City on September 26, 2023, pursuant to Ordinance No. 2023-36 (“PDD”), the City is responsible for the construction of the extension of Blakey Lane, as more particularly depicted in Exhibit G of the PDD (the “Blakey Lane Extension”).
- B. The City has not commenced design or construction of the Blakey Lane Extension and these improvements are needed to serve the businesses and customers of Burleson Crossing East, therefore Developer has agreed to construct the portion of the Blakey Lane Extension shown on the Approved Road Scope of Work in order to expedite the process in exchange for the City’s reimbursement of the Actual Costs to Developer.
- C. The City has determined that it is in the public interest to provide the funds for the Actual Costs set forth herein subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- D. This Agreement is a developer participation contract authorized by Subchapter C, Chapter 212, Texas Local Government Code (Sections 212.071 through 212.074). The Initial Blakey Lane Improvements are public improvements, not including a building, related to the development. The City has a population of less than 1.8 million. The City enters into this Agreement without complying with the competitive sealed bidding procedure of Chapter 252, Texas Local Government Code, because this Agreement satisfies the requirements of said Subchapter C. By the Authorizing Resolution, the City Council has established the limit of the City’s participation in the cost of the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements and has adopted additional safeguards against undue loading of cost, collusion, and fraud.

**II. DEFINITIONS**

- A. **Actual Costs** means the actual amount of out-of-pocket costs expended for the cost of the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements, the estimate of which is attached hereto as Exhibit B.
- B. **Approved Road Scope of Work** is attached hereto as Exhibit A.

- C. **Authorizing Ordinance** means Ordinance No. 2024-29, adopted by the City Council pursuant to Section 212.072(b) of the Texas Local Government Code, which establishes the limit of the City’s participation in the cost of the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements.
- D. **Certifications for Payment** means the payment request that includes a properly executed contractor’s “application for payment” from the respective contractor having performed the work for which disbursement is sought, for the amount requested, with all necessary supporting information, including, without limitation, paid invoices for materials or supplies, paid invoices stating the percentage that is certified and approved by the Project Engineer.
- E. **Force Majeure Delays** means delays resulting from an Act of God, fire, earthquake, flood, delays caused by extreme or unusual weather delays (as opposed to usual and typical weather delays that should be accounted for in the schedule for completion of the applicable work), explosion, war, invasion, insurrection, riot, mob violence, unusual delays in obtaining supplies or materials (provided that the party claiming such delay has used commercially reasonable efforts to order such supplies and materials with sufficient time to comply with the completion and/or performance dates set forth in this Agreement), governmental mandates and shut downs (including, without limitation, relating to pandemics or epidemics), sabotage, strike, lockout, action of labor unions, requisitions, laws, or orders of government or civil or military authorities.
- F. **Initial Blakey Lane Improvements** means the extension of Blakey Lane and installation of a water line, which are more particularly described and depicted on Exhibit A attached hereto and made a part hereof.
- G. **Project Engineer** means LJA Engineering, Inc.

### III. PERFORMANCE REQUIREMENTS

- A. Developer shall cause the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements to be constructed in a good and workmanlike manner and in accordance with the Approved Road Scope of Work.
- B. Developer shall keep the City reasonably apprised of its construction schedule and status of completion of the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements.
- C. Performance and Payment Bonds. Prior to commencing construction of the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements, Developer shall deliver to the City a performance bond and a payment bond for the construction of the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements, each in a penal sum not less than the total cost of the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements, executed by a corporate surety authorized and admitted to transact surety business in the State of Texas and otherwise acceptable to the City, in accordance with Section 212.073 of the Texas Local

Government Code and Chapter 2253 of the Texas Government Code. The bonds shall name the City as an obligee.

- D. Compliance with Laws; Prevailing Wage. Developer shall construct, and shall cause its contractors to construct, the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements in accordance with the City's design and construction standards and all applicable laws, and shall comply with and cause its contractors to comply with the prevailing wage rate requirements of Chapter 2258 of the Texas Government Code applicable to a public work.
- E. Insurance. Before commencing construction, Developer shall procure and maintain, or cause its contractors to procure and maintain, commercial general liability, automobile liability, and statutory workers' compensation insurance in amounts reasonably acceptable to the City, naming the City as an additional insured on the liability policies, and shall furnish certificates of insurance evidencing such coverage to the City.
- F. Inspection; Conformance; Acceptance; Conveyance. The City shall have the right to inspect the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements at all reasonable times during construction. Upon substantial completion, Developer shall deliver to the City record ("as-built") drawings and shall convey the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements to the City free and clear of all liens and encumbrances. The Initial Blakey Lane Improvements are subject to inspection and acceptance by the City, and the City's participation in the cost thereof is conditioned upon such acceptance.
- G. Warranty; Maintenance Bond. Developer warrants the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements against defects in materials and workmanship for a period of one (1) year following the City's acceptance and, upon the City's request, shall deliver to the City a maintenance bond covering such warranty period.
- H. Inspection of Records. In accordance with Section 212.074(b) of the Texas Local Government Code, all of Developer's books and other records related to the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements shall be available for inspection by the City.
- I. Indemnification. To the fullest extent permitted by law, Developer shall release, defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the City and its officers, employees, and agents from and against any and all claims, damages, losses, liens, causes of action, suits, and liabilities of every kind arising out of or in connection with Developer's or its contractors' construction of the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements, except to the extent caused by the negligence of the City.

#### **IV. REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES**

- A. The City hereby represents and warrants to the Developer that the City has full constitutional and lawful right, power, and authority, under current applicable law, to

execute and deliver and perform the terms and obligations of this Agreement, and all of the foregoing have been or will be duly and validly authorized and approved by all necessary City proceedings, findings, and actions. Accordingly, this Agreement constitutes the legal, valid, and binding obligation of the City, is enforceable in accordance with its terms and provision, and does not require the consent of any other governmental authority.

- B. The Developer hereby represents and warrants to the City that the Developer has full constitutional and lawful right, power, and authority, under current applicable law, to execute and deliver and perform the terms and obligations of this Agreement, and all the foregoing have been or will be duly and validly authorized and approved by all actions necessary. Accordingly, this Agreement constitutes the legal, valid, and binding obligation of the Developer, is enforceable in accordance with its terms and provisions, and does not require the consent of any other authority or entity.

## V. PAYMENTS

- A. As construction of the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements progresses, Developer shall deliver to the City Certification for Payments (herein so called), but in no event more frequently than one time per month.
- B. Certifications for Payment shall include a properly executed contractor's "application for payment" from the respective contractor having performed the work for which disbursement is sought, for the amount requested, with all necessary supporting information, including, without limitation, paid invoices for materials or supplies, paid invoices stating the percentage that is certified and approved by the Project Engineer. The Certification for Payment shall also include evidence satisfactory to the City that there are no liens or encumbrances filed against the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements. The certification by the Project Engineer is a final and binding certification for payment.
- C. The City shall pay the amount set forth in each Certification for Payment directly to the Developer (or at Developer's election, to the contractor) within thirty (30) days of the date of receipt of the applicable Certification for Payment. The City may withhold payment of any amount disputed by the City in good faith or attributable to defective or nonconforming work until such dispute is resolved or such work is corrected. Each payment shall be subject to the limit of the City's participation established by the Authorizing Ordinance and the Not-to-Exceed Amount set forth below.
- D. Upon Developer's substantial completion of the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements, Developer shall send the City a copy of its final Certification for Payment, together with a certified statement as to the Actual Costs, copies of paid invoices for materials and supplies, unconditional lien waivers for the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements, and evidence satisfactory to the City that there are no liens or encumbrances filed against the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements.

- E. Separate Account. The City shall place the estimated amount of the Actual Costs (\$680,000.00) into a separate account and draw down on the funds through a certification for payment process with the Developer as construction of the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements progresses. Notwithstanding anything in this Agreement to the contrary, the City's participation in, and total liability for, the cost of the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements shall not exceed the limit of participation established by the Authorizing Ordinance and shall in no event exceed \$690,000.00 (the "Not-to-Exceed Amount"). The City is liable only for the agreed payment of its share of the cost as determined in advance by the Authorizing Ordinance and this Agreement, and Developer shall be solely responsible for all costs of the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements in excess of the Not-to-Exceed Amount.

## VI. BREACH

- A. Breach. The following conditions shall constitute a breach of this Agreement:
1. The Developer fails to meet the performance criteria as specified in Article III above.
  2. The City fails to timely make payments to the Developer under the terms of this Agreement.
- B. Notice of Breach. Notwithstanding anything herein to the contrary, no Party shall be deemed to be in default under this Agreement until the passage of thirty (30) business days after receipt by such Party of notice of default from the other Party (the "Cure Period"), which notice shall specify, in reasonable detail, the nature of the default. Upon the passage of the Cure Period without cure of the default, such Party shall be deemed to have defaulted for purposes of this Agreement; provided that, if the nature of the default is such that it cannot be reasonably cured within the Cure Period, the Party receiving the notice of default may, during such Cure Period, give the other Party written notice that it has commenced curing the default within the Cure Period and will diligently and continuously prosecute the cure to completion as soon as reasonably possible
- C. Limitations on Liability. The City shall not be liable for consequential damages, specifically lost profits, and any damages claimed against the City shall be limited to amounts recoverable under Section 271.153 of the Texas Local Government Code. The Parties agree that this Agreement shall not be interpreted as or otherwise claimed to be a waiver of sovereignty on the part of the City for any cause of action not directly related to this Agreement and the enforceability thereof.
- D. Personal Liability of Public Officials; No Debt Created. No employee of the City, nor any councilmember or agent of the City, shall be personally responsible for any liability arising under or growing out of this Agreement. The Payments made hereunder shall be paid solely from lawfully available funds that have been appropriated by the City. Under no

circumstances shall the City's obligations hereunder be deemed to create any debt within the meaning of any constitutional or statutory provision.

## **VII. TERMINATION/SELF HELP**

After providing the applicable notice and opportunity to cure, the City may (i) terminate the Agreement or (ii) exercise self-help rights further outlined below, in the event that the Developer fails to complete the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements within 18 months after the Effective Date, subject to Force Majeure Delays.

In the event the City elects (ii) above, the City shall have the right, but not the obligation, to assume control of the construction of all or any designated portion of the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements upon written notice to the Developer, and upon such election, the City agrees to proceed to complete the same with reasonable diligence.

## **VIII. NOTICE**

All notices called for or required by this Agreement shall be addressed to the following, or such other party or address as either party designates in writing, by certified mail postage prepaid or by hand deliver:

## **IX. CITY COUNCIL AUTHORIZATION**

This Agreement was authorized by motion and vote of the City Council recorded in the minutes authorizing the City Manager or their designee to execute this Agreement on behalf of the City. In addition, the City Council adopted the Authorizing Ordinance establishing the limit of the City's participation in the cost of the Initial Blakey Lane Improvements, as required by Section 212.072(b) of the Texas Local Government Code.

#### **X. SEVERABILITY**

In the event any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, phrase, or word is held invalid, illegal or unconstitutional, the balance of this Agreement shall stand, shall be enforceable and shall be read as if the parties intended at all times to delete said invalid section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, phrase, or word.

#### **XI. ESTOPPEL CERTIFICATE**

Any party hereto may request an estoppel certificate from another party hereto, so long as the certificate is requested in connection with a bona fide business purpose. The certificate, which if requested will be addressed to a subsequent purchaser or assignee of the Developer, shall include, but not necessarily be limited to statements that this Agreement is in full force and effect without default (or if default exists the nature of same), the remaining term of this Agreement, the status of payments made and remaining under this Agreement and such other matters reasonably requested by the Party(ies) to receive the certificates.

#### **XII. DEVELOPER'S STANDING**

Developer, as part of this Agreement, shall be deemed a proper and necessary party in any litigation questioning or challenging the validity of this Agreement or any of the underlying ordinances, resolutions, or City Council actions authorizing same, and Developer shall be entitled to intervene in said litigation.

#### **XIII. APPLICABLE LAWS**

This Agreement shall be construed under the laws of the State of Texas without regard to its conflicts of laws provisions. Venue for any action under this Agreement shall be the State's District Court of Bastrop County, Texas. This Agreement is performance in Bastrop County, Texas.

#### **XIV. OTHER AGREEMENTS**

This Agreement embodies all the agreements of the parties relating to their subject matters as specifically set out therein and herein, supersedes all prior understandings and agreements regarding such subject matter, and may be amended, modified, or supplemented only by an instrument or instruments in writing executed by the parties.

#### **XV. HEADINGS**

The headings in this Agreement are for the convenience of reference only and shall not affect in any manner any of the terms and conditions hereof.

## **XVI. SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS**

The Parties each bind themselves and their successors, executors, administrators, and assigns of such other Party in respect to all covenants of this Agreement.

## **XVII. COUNTERPARTS**

This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which may be executed by any one or more of the parties hereto, but all of which shall constitute one instrument, and shall be binding and effective when all the parties hereto have executed at least one counterpart.

## **XVIII. NO THIRD-PARTY BENEFICIARIES**

For purposes of this Agreement, including its intended operation and effect, the parties specifically agree that: (1) the agreement only affects matters/disputes between the parties of this Agreement, and is in no way intended by the parties to benefit or otherwise affect any third person or entity, notwithstanding the fact that such third person or entities may be in a contractual relationship with the City or Developer or both; and (2) the terms of this Agreement are no intended to release, either by contract or operation of law, any third person or entity from obligations owing by them to either City or Developer.

## **XIX. REMEDIES**

Except as providing in this Agreement, no right or remedy granted herein or reserved to the parties is exclusive of any right or remedy herein by law or equity provided or permitted; but each shall be cumulative of every right or remedy given hereunder. No covenant or condition of this Agreement may be waived without the consent of the Parties. Forbearance or indulgence by either party shall not constitute a waiver of any covenant or condition to be performed pursuant to this Agreement.

## **XX. BOYCOTTS AND FOREIGN BUSINESS ENGAGEMENTS**

Verifications of Statutory Representations and Covenants. The Developer (the “Owner”) makes the following representations and covenants pursuant to Chapters 2252, 2271, 2274, and 2276, Texas Government Code, as heretofore amended (the “Government Code”), in entering into this Agreement. As used in such verifications, “affiliate” means an entity that controls, is controlled by, or is under common control with the Owner within the meaning of SEC Rule 405, 17 C.F.R. § 230.405, and exists to make a profit. Liability for breach of any such verification during the term of this Agreement shall survive until barred by the

applicable statute of limitations, and shall not be liquidated or otherwise limited by any provision of this Agreement, notwithstanding anything in this Agreement to the contrary.

- A. Not a Sanctioned Company. The Owner represents that neither it nor any of its parent company, wholly- or majority-owned subsidiaries, and other affiliates is a company identified on a list prepared and maintained by the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts under Section 2252.153 or Section 2270.0201, Government Code. The foregoing representation excludes the Owner and each of its parent company, wholly- or majority-owned subsidiaries, and other affiliates, if any, that the United States government has affirmatively declared to be excluded from its federal sanctions regime relating to Sudan or Iran or any federal sanctions regime relating to a foreign terrorist organization.
- B. No Boycott of Israel. The Owner hereby verifies that it and its parent company, wholly- or majority-owned subsidiaries, and other affiliates, if any, do not boycott Israel and will not boycott Israel during the term of this Agreement. As used in the foregoing verification, “boycott Israel” has the meaning provided in Section 2271.001, Government Code.
- C. No Discrimination Against Firearm Entities. The Owner hereby verifies that it and its parent company, wholly- or majority-owned subsidiaries, and other affiliates, if any, do not have a practice, policy, guidance, or directive that discriminates against a firearm entity or firearm trade association and will not discriminate against a firearm entity or firearm trade association during the term of this Agreement. As used in the foregoing verification, “discriminate against a firearm entity or firearm trade association” has the meaning provided in Section 2274.001(3), Government Code.
- D. No Boycott of Energy Companies. 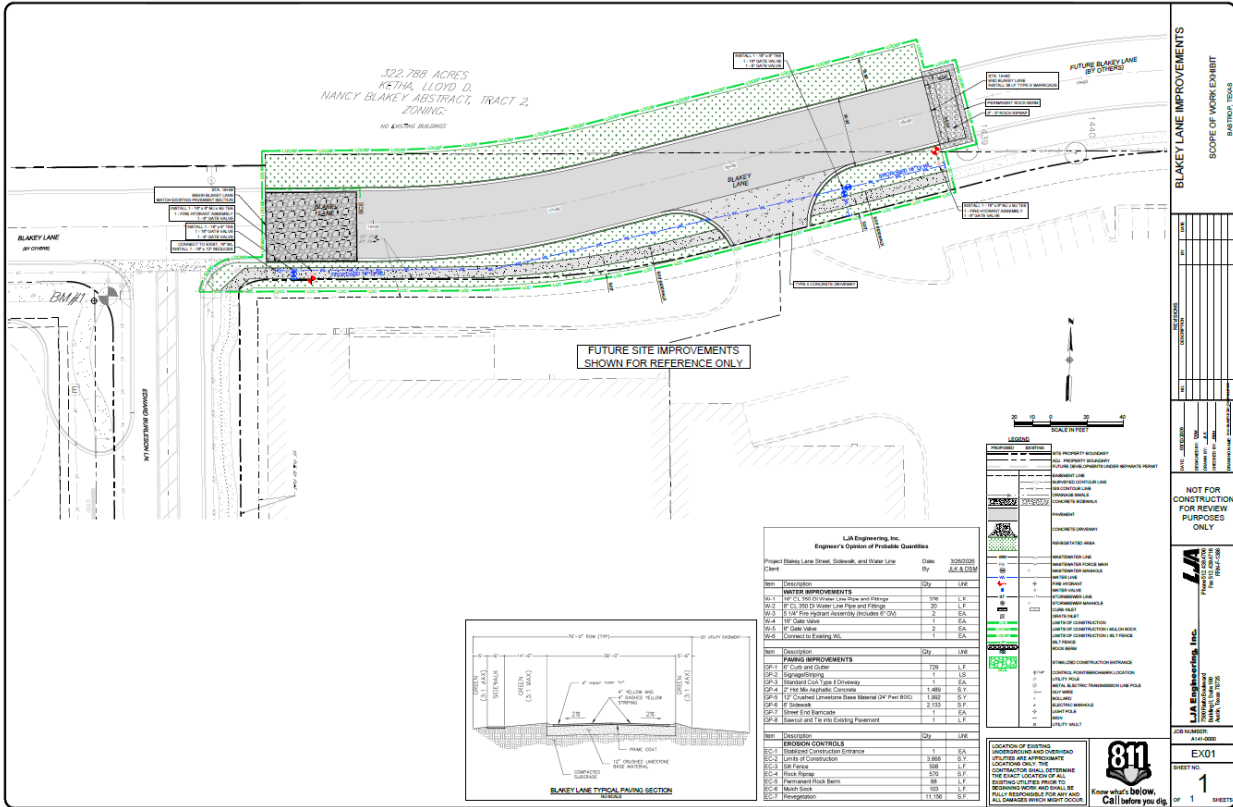
