

BACKGROUND/HISTORY:

The Chief Financial Officer, or appointed staff, provides the City Council a monthly financial report overview for all funds to include detailed analysis for General Fund, Development Services Fund, Water-Wastewater Fund, Bastrop Power & Light and the HOT Tax Fund.

REVENUE

Impact Fee Fund is now running 39% below forecast due to delays in receiving anticipated fees related to development.

HOT Tax Fund is below forecast by approximately 28.8% due to timing of revenues received.

<u>Hunters Crossing PID</u> is below forecast by approximately 7% also due to timing of revenues received

All other funds are positive to forecast.

EXPENDITURES

<u>Vehicle and Equipment Replacement Fund</u> running 39.5% over forecast due to purchasing vehicles & equipment needed by departments as it is available.

All other funds are below forecast.

This reporting requirement is set forth by the City of Bastrop Financial Management Policies, Chapter IV. Operating Budget, Section D. Reporting, as adopted by Resolution R-2023-123 on August 22, 2023.

Property tax represents 29% of the total General Fund revenue budget. As you can see from the forecast, they are generally collected from December to February. As of January projections are over by 25.3%



Chapter 271. Joint Elections

Sec. 271.002. JOINT ELECTIONS AUTHORIZED.

- (a) If the elections ordered by the authorities of two or more political subdivisions are to be held on the same day in all or part of the same county, the governing bodies of the political subdivisions may enter into an agreement to hold the elections jointly in the election precincts that can be served by common polling places, subject to Section 271.003.
- (b) If an election ordered by the governor and the elections ordered by the authorities of one or more political subdivisions are to be held on the same day in all or part of the same county, the commissioners court of a county in which the election ordered by the governor is to be held and the governing bodies of the other political subdivisions may enter into an agreement to hold the elections jointly in the election precincts that can be served by common polling places, subject to Section 271.003.
- (c) If another law requires two or more political subdivisions to hold a joint election, the governing body of any other political subdivision holding an election on the same day in all or part of the same county in which the joint election is to be held may enter into an agreement to participate in the joint election with the governing bodies of the political subdivisions holding the joint election.
- (d) The terms of a joint election agreement must be stated in an order, resolution, or other official action adopted by the governing body of each participating political subdivision.
- (e) The document containing the joint election agreement shall be preserved for the period for preserving the precinct election records.



This Agreement to Conduct Joint Election (this "Contract") is entered into by and among Bastrop Central Appraisal District, a political subdivision of the State of Texas ("BCAD"), City of Bastrop, a political subdivision of the State of Texas ("COB"), Bastrop Independent School District, a political subdivision of the State of Texas, ("BISD"), City of Smithville, a political subdivision of the State of Texas ("COS"), Smithville Independent School District, a political subdivision of the State of Texas, ("SISD"), City of Elgin, a political subdivision of the State of Texas, ("EISD"), Lexington Independent School District, a political subdivision of the State of Texas, ("LISD"), McDade Independent School District, a political subdivision of the State of Texas, ("MISD"), and Bastrop County Municipal Utility District No. 1, a political subdivision of the State of Texas, ("BMUD1"), each individually, a "Party" or, collectively, the "Parties," pursuant to Chapter 271 of the Texas Election Code.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the BCAD, COB, BISD, COS, SISD, COE, EISD, LISD, MISD and BMUD1 each expect to call an election to be held on May 4, 2024; and

WHEREAS, the BCAD, COB, BISD, COS, SISD, COE, EISD, LISD, MISD and BMUD2 desire to conduct such elections jointly pursuant to Chapter 271 of the Texas Election Code, and

WHEREAS, the BCAD, COB, BISD, COS, SISD, COE, EISD, LISD, MISD and BMUD211desire to enter into a contract setting out the respective responsibilities of the Parties;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties agree as follows:

ARTICLE I PURPOSE

1.01 The Parties have entered into this Contract to conduct a joint election on May 4, 2024. The purpose of this agreement is to maintain consistency and accessibility in voting practices, polling

places, and election procedures in order to best assist the voters of the Parties.

ARTICLE II JOINT ELECTION

2.01 The Parties agree to conduct their respective May 4, 2024 elections jointly pursuant to Chapter 271 of the Texas Election Code. Specifically, the Parties agree to the use of common polling places for both early voting and election day. The Parties also agree that the election officers may be appointed to serve both elections and that a common ballot may be used where appropriate and that common equipment and ballot boxes may be used for both elections for all relevant purposes as provided in Chapter 271.

ARTICLE III. TERM

3.01 Except as hereinafter set out, the term of this Contract shall be from the time of execution until all items with respect to this Contract have been completed.

ARTICLE IV EACH PARTY RESPONSIBLE FOR ITS PRO RATA COST OF SERVICE AS BILLED

4.01 The Parties acknowledge that they have each separately contracted for election services to be provided by Bastrop County Elections Administrator for the elections. All costs incurred by the Parties attributable to the coordination, supervision, and running of the election and incurred on behalf of the Parties, including expenses for supplies in connection with the election school(s), election supplies, wages paid for election workers, any paper ballots to be used for the election, and any other expenses reasonably and directly related to the election, including, without limitation, rental and programming of direct recording electronic voting devices and audio ballots shall be borne by the Parties based on their respective Election Services Agreement with the County Elections Administrator, and each Party will be responsible for their pro rata portion.

ARTICLE V GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 5.01 This Contract shall be construed under and in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas, and all obligations of the parties created hereunder are performable in Bastrop County, Texas.
- 5.02 In case any one or more of the provisions contained in this Contract shall for any reason be held to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any respect, the invalidity, illegality, or unenforceability shall not affect any other provision, and this Contract shall be construed as if the invalid, illegal, or unenforceable provision had never been a part of the Contract.
- 5.03 This Contract constitutes the only agreement of the Parties hereto and supersedes any prior understanding or written or oral agreement between the parties respecting the written subject matter.
- 5.04 No amendment, modification, or alteration of this Contract shall be binding unless it is in writing, dated subsequent to the date of the Contract and duly executed by all of the Parties.

AMENDING PARKS BOARD NAME

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF BASTROP, TEXAS, AMENDING THE BASTROP CODE OF ORDINANCES CHAPTER 1 GENERAL PROVISIONS, ARTICLE 1.10 PARKS, SECTION 1.10.001 PARKS BOARD; AND PROVIDING FOR FINDINGS OF FACT, REPEALER, SEVERABILITY, CODIFICATION, EFFECTIVE DATE, PROPER NOTICE AND MEETING.

- WHEREAS, pursuant to Texas Local Government Code Section 51.001, the City Council of the City of Bastrop (City Council) has general authority to adopt an Ordinance or police regulation that is for the good government, peace, or order of the City and is necessary or proper for carrying out a power granted by law to the City; and
- **WHEREAS**, the City Council desires to change the name of the parks board to the Parks and Recreation Board; and
- WHEREAS, the City Council finds certain amendments to the Bastrop Code of Ordinances are in the best interest of the City and necessary to meet changing conditions; and
- **WHEREAS**, the City Council finds the attached amendments reasonable and necessary.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Bastrop, Texas:

- **Section 1. Findings of Fact:** The foregoing recitals are incorporated into this Ordinance by reference as findings of fact as if expressly set forth herein.
- Section 2. Amendment: ARTICLE 1.10 Parks, Section 1.10.001 Parks Board of the City of Bastrop Code of Ordinances is hereby amended, and after such amendment, shall read in accordance with Attachment "A", which is attached hereto and incorporated into this Ordinance for all intents and purposes. Any underlined text shall be inserted into the Code and any struck-through text shall be deleted from the Code, as shown in each of the attachments.
- **Section 3.** Repealer: To the extent reasonably possible, ordinances are to be read together in harmony. However, all ordinances, or parts thereof, that are in conflict or inconsistent with any provision of this Ordinance are hereby

repealed to the extent of such conflict, and the provisions of this Ordinance shall be and remain controlling as to the matters regulated.

- **Section 4. Severability:** Should any of the clauses, sentences, paragraphs, sections, or parts of this Ordinance be deemed invalid, unconstitutional, or unenforceable by a court of law or administrative agency with jurisdiction over the matter, such action shall not be construed to affect any other valid portion of this Ordinance.
- **Section 5. Codification:** The City Secretary is hereby directed to record and publish the attached rules, regulations, and policies in the City's Code of Ordinances as authorized by Section 52.001 of the Texas Local Government Code.
- **Section 6. Effective Date:** This Ordinance shall take effect upon the date of final passage noted below, or when all applicable publication requirements, if any, are satisfied in accordance with the City's Charter, Code of Ordinances, and the laws of the State of Texas.
- Section 7. Proper Notice & Meeting: It is hereby officially found and determined that the meeting at which this Ordinance was passed was open to the public, and that public notice of the time, place, and purpose of said meeting was given as required by the Open Meetings Act, Texas Government Code, Chapter 551. Notice was also provided as required by Chapter 52 of the Texas Local Government Code.

ARTICLE 1.10 - Parks

SEC. 1.10.001 - Parks Board

- (a) Created; composition; compensation; appointment.
 - (1) There is hereby created a parks board of the city, which shall be referred to as the Parks and Recreation Board. Any references in the City Code to the parks board shall mean the Parks and Recreation Board.  - (2) One member of the board shall be held by the superintendent of the city's state park, or his/her designee, who may reside either within the city limits or in any other area within the BISD's jurisdiction.
- (b) Attendance. Attendance requirements for the board members are set forth in this code, section 1.02.002(b), et seq.

REQUEST:

The property owners at 1301 Church Street have local Historic Landmark designation.

BACKGROUND/HISTORY:

The structure was built between 1858-1867 and is comprised of two one-story wooden buildings each being 18 feet by 16 feet. These two buildings bear near identical resemblance to the barracks that were added for the Bastrop Academy/Military Institute in 1858. There are records and firsthand accounts of these barracks being sold and citizens moving them onto their property. The structure was built with square nails and hand-mortised joints.

Sometime after 1907 the owner added an L onto the church street end of the original building, which included a portion of the west "barrack". This created a T shaped house plan with simple Victorian features. At some point seven-foot-wide porches were added. In 1983 William Kesselus added an 18 (eight-teen) foot extension to the east following the same roofline. Then in 2003 the owners added porches to the front and the northwest of the house. The changes to the structure can been seen between the 1921 and 1934 Sanborn Insurance maps.

In addition to the architectural significance, the property has been associated with many people in the past such as James R. Nichols, M.B. Maynard and Dryer Moore to name a few. Details can be found on page 10 of attachment 2. A site layout, property details, and current pictures of the property are attached for the Commission to review and determine if 1301 Church Street meets two or more of the criteria in the policy explanation below.

POLICY EXPLANATION:

CHAPTER 9: HISTORIC LANDMARK PRESERVATION & IREDELL DISTRICT

SEC. 9.2.002 CRITERIA FOR HISTORIC LANDMARK STATUS

- (a) A Structure or Site is considered a local Historic Landmark if it is designated as a Recorded Texas Historic Landmark or State Archeological Landmark or is included on the National Register of Historic Places.
- (b) A Structure or Site also may be designated by the City as a Historic Landmark if it meets 2 or more of the criteria set out below.
- (1) Possesses significance in history, architecture, archeology, or culture;
- (2) Is associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of local, regional, state, or national history;
- (3) Is associated with the lives of persons significant in our past;
- (4) Embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of Construction;
- (5) Represents the work of a master designer, builder, or craftsman; or
- (6) Represents an established and familiar visual feature of the City.

SEC. 9.2.003 PROCESS FOR DESIGNATION OF HISTORIC LANDMARKS

- (a) Owners of property being considered for designation as a Historic Landmark shall be notified prior to the Historic Landmark Commission hearing on the recommended designation. The Historic Landmark Commission shall provide notice to property owners within 200 feet of the property and conduct a public hearing.
- (b) After consideration by the Historic Landmark Commission, a recommendation regarding designations shall be submitted the City Council to conduct a public hearing and consider the designations of a Historic Landmark. The adoption of the landmark shall be through a resolution.
- (c) Upon designation of a Historic Landmark, the City Council shall cause the designation to be noted as follows:
 - (1) Recorded in the official real property records of Bastrop County.
 - (2) Designated on the historic resource map of the City.
 - (3) Provide the property owner with a plaque and require the installation indicating the designation of the landmark as a City Historic Landmark.

86th Legislature House Bill 2496

Effective May 25, 2019, the Texas State Legislature adopted additional regulations municipalities must follow for designating historic landmarks. Most of the regulations are already present in the Bastrop Historic Landmark Preservation Ordinance. One additional requirement with which the city must comply is to send the property owner a statement the describes the impact of the designation to the property. The property owner is aware and received this letter.

NOTIFICATION:

Nineteen (19) property owners within 200 feet 1301 Church Street were notified of the public hearing on February 5, 2024.

HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION:

The HLC, the regular meeting on February 21, 2024, held a public hearing and recommended approval by a vote of 6-0, for 1301 Church Street to be a local Historic Landmark, provide the owner a marker and add to the inventory for rebates.

- WHEREAS, Chapter 9: Historic Landmark Preservation & Iredell District of the B³ Code adopted with Ordinance No. 2019-51 provides a designation process for historic sites and structures; and
- WHEREAS, notice of the historic designation was sent in accordance the B³ Code to notify property owners within 200 feet of the property and Texas Local Government Code section 211.0165 to notify the property owner of the impact of the designation; and
- **WHEREAS,** the Historic Landmark Commission held a public hearing and considered the request on February 21, 2024 and voted unanimously to recommend approval.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BASTROP, TEXAS:

- **Section 1:** The Historic Landmark status for 0.4670 acres of Farm Lot 1 West of Main Street, to be known as 1301 Church street, within the city limits of Bastrop, Texas, is hereby approved and Exhibit A, a copy of agreement to be signed by the Property Owner, and incorporated herein for all purposes.
- <u>Section 2:</u> The following findings of fact were established for the house located at 1301 Church: Structure meets the following criteria:
 - (4) Embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of Construction;
 - Exemplifies craftmanship of the era through the use of locally found materials and methods of construction (Hand-mortised joints).
 - (6) Represents an established and familiar visual feature of the City.

This house is characteristic of most older and smaller homes in Bastrop.



LOCATION -- 1301 Church ST

• The house sits on .467 acre of land that is part of Farm Lot #1 west of Main Street, a portion of Bastrop's first subdivision, formed when J.D. Hogan purchased Farm Lots #1 and #2, reserved 55 feet for a street (which became Church Street) and sold a number three-area lots to various owners, including J.R. Nichols, whose residence was on the lot next south to the land under consideration. (Bastrop County Deed Records Vol. G page 110, Vol. I, page 278, and Vol. T, page 175.)

DISTINCTIVE CHARACTERISTICS AND METHOD OF CONSTRUCTION IN SEVERAL PERIODS

Unlike some of the more well-known houses in Bastrop, this one is not grand or large, but it is very characteristic of most older and smaller ones in Bastrop. As contrasted with the Crocheron House, Wilbarger House, and perhaps one or two others, no large house is older than the oldest portion of the house at 1301 Church Street. Many surviving houses in Bastrop, including this one, built before 1880 began small and have been added on to and altered over the decades.

DESCRIPTION OF CONSTRUCTION PHASES

- Beginning / original structure circa 1858-1867
 - o Date Circa 1869 -- of the house being located at the current 1301 Church Street
 - J.R. Nichols owned both the property south of this lot (his homestead) and the current 1301 Church Street lot (Deed Records, Vol. I pages 175 and 278) Tax records indicated a significant increase in the combined value of the two lots, pointing to the fact that he added a house in about 1869. (Bastrop County Tax Rolls, Texas State Archives.)



o built with square nails, some hand-mortised joints (mortise and tenon) as evidenced by the following photograph taken during replaced wall material in 2003.




- o There were not plates with studs running from attack to sills,
- o It had cedar post piers replaced by concrete ones in 1948
- o Some original rough cedar sills are still intact
- The house, after being located on the current 1301 Church site was composed of two onestory wooden buildings (each 18 X 16 feet) and connected end to end, as illustrated below. (A) is the east building and (B) is the west one. A vertical board (C) covers the small "gap" formed by the connection of the two structures. It was of wood construction with a pitched roof of cedar shingles.



- As per Bird's Eye view above and circa 1907/8 photograph, the house, unusually, did not face Church Street but had an entrance facing south. This is apparently due to its being originally owned by Nichols whose residence at the time was south of the house. Perhaps it was for his servants possible freed slaves that he owned before Emancipation.
- Plausibility of original construction
 - When the 1851 Bastrop Academy became the Bastrop Military Institute in 1858, barracks were added to the north side large Academy building.
 - These are visible in the following photographs of the Academy building taken during the period when it was the military institute.

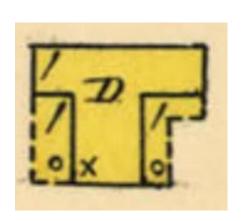
- The barracks bear nearly identical appearance to the two buildings that made up the first house.
- Mrs. Carolina Higgins recalled that "the old student barracks, built by Col. Allen ... were moved away by the citizens who had paid for the buildings." (In the Shadow of the Lost Pines, page 39.) She and her husband moved at least one of the barracks to the rear of their house at the present location of 1206 Church Street. The Allen/Bell House, just north of the Academy a little over a block from the locations of the barracks.
- It is plausible that The house faced the Nichols purchased two of the barracks and moved them to the north of his house and facing it. Since it had no entrance on the street side, it is possible that Nichols used them as servants' quarters. He had owned slaves prior to the Civil War.


First Addition

Sometime after the circa 1907 photograph, the owner added an L onto the Church Street end of the original building – including a portion of the west side "barrack" into it. This made it a "T-shaped" house plan with simple Victorian features. There were deep Victorian eaves, a gabled roof with eave returns. At some point seven-foot-wide porches were added.



In 1948, the Episcopal Church glazed the porches, remodeled and modernized the interior, and replace three layers of cedar shingle rooves with the existing metal one.

1983 Addition

In 1983, long time carpenter William Kesselus added an eighteen-foot extension to the east following the same roof line and including a stooped porch.

2003 additions

The owners added porches to the front and northwest of the house.

ASSOCIATION WITH THE LIVES OF PERSONS SIGNIFICANT IN BASTROP'S PAST.

Significant Owners/Residents

- o James R. Nichols, an early blacksmith and assistant to N.P. Tanner who manufactured rifles for the Confederate Army during the Civil War History of Bastrop County, 1846-1865, Jenkins Publishing Co., Austin, 1988.) He did not live in the house.
- If the first house were indeed composed of two barracks moved from the military institute, then the first occupants would have been cadets studying at the most important establishment ever to exist in Bastorp.
- o M.B. Maynard, Bastrop mayor in 1870s, Bastrop County attorney 1873-6, while living in the house, and later Texas State Senator. (Bill Moore, *Bastrop County*, page 148.)
- Dyer Moore served as Bastrop County Judge during the time when he owned the house. He was a very distinguished Bastrop citizen in the last quarter of the 19th century.
- William and Hattie Gibson taught a private school in the house for many years (Interview with Nell Fitzwilliam, 1983.)
- **T.N. Powell** served as County School Superintendent, part of which time he lived in the house (Shadow of the Lost Pines, page 44.)
- **Rectors of Calvary Episcopal Church** -- From 1920 (when the Episcopal Church bought the house) until 2,000, thirteen Rectors of Calvary Episcopal Church have lived in the house. The church and its clergy have been an important fixture in the life of the community since 1869.
- **Kenneth Kesselus** From 1981-2000 and 2003 to the present, he lived in the house. A fifth generation Bastropian, Kesselus is one of the most distinguished citizens of Bastrop in the last half century.



REQUEST:

The property owners at 1320 Farm Street have requested local Historic Landmark designation.

BACKGROUND/HISTORY:

The structure was built between 1870-1890 in the style of fold Victorian according to the Texas Historical Commission. This house is listed on the national register of historic places on 12/22/1978 with the criteria of significance in architecture. It is a 1 story wood frame ell shape house with a porch on the south and the east side. This house is a good example of a small Victorian home in Bastrop according to the information from the national register submittal. Back in 2001 the Historic Landmark commission invited the previous property owners for historical designation.

In addition to the architectural significance, the property has been associated with people of Bastrop's past, for example during renovations to the home, a signature from Alfred Grisenbeck was found on the wall which could mean he built the home before it was owned by Willis O Miley. Mr. Miley worked for the railway express in Bastrop, and his half-brother, William Jefferson Miley built and opened Lock drug store at 1003 Main street. Artifacts from Lock's have been found in the attic and on the property of 1320 Farm street.

POLICY EXPLANATION:

CHAPTER 9: HISTORIC LANDMARK PRESERVATION & IREDELL DISTRICT

SEC. 9.2.002 CRITERIA FOR HISTORIC LANDMARK STATUS

- (a) A Structure or Site is considered a local Historic Landmark if it is designated as a Recorded Texas Historic Landmark or State Archeological Landmark or is included on the National Register of Historic Places.
- (b) A Structure or Site also may be designated by the City as a Historic Landmark if it meets 2 or more of the criteria set out below.
- (1) Possesses significance in history, architecture, archeology, or culture;
- (2) Is associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of local, regional, state, or national history;
- (3) Is associated with the lives of persons significant in our past;
- (4) Embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of Construction;
- (5) Represents the work of a master designer, builder, or craftsman; or
- (6) Represents an established and familiar visual feature of the City.

SEC. 9.2.003 PROCESS FOR DESIGNATION OF HISTORIC LANDMARKS

- (a) Owners of property being considered for designation as a Historic Landmark shall be notified prior to the Historic Landmark Commission hearing on the recommended designation. The Historic Landmark Commission shall provide notice to property owners within 200 feet of the property and conduct a public hearing.
- (b) After consideration by the Historic Landmark Commission, a recommendation regarding designations shall be submitted the City Council to conduct a public hearing and consider the designations of a Historic Landmark. The adoption of the landmark shall be through a resolution.
- (c) Upon designation of a Historic Landmark, the City Council shall cause the designation to be noted as follows:
 - (1) Recorded in the official real property records of Bastrop County.
 - (2) Designated on the historic resource map of the City.
 - (3) Provide the property owner with a plaque and require the installation indicating the designation of the landmark as a City Historic Landmark.

86th Legislature House Bill 2496

Effective May 25, 2019, the Texas State Legislature adopted additional regulations municipalities must follow for designating historic landmarks. Most of the regulations are already present in the Bastrop Historic Landmark Preservation Ordinance. One additional requirement with which the city must comply is to send the property owner a statement the describes the impact of the designation to the property. The property owner is aware and received this letter.

Eleven 11 property owners within 200 feet 1320 Farm Street were notified of the public hearing on February 5, 2024.



- WHEREAS, Melinda and John Larson ("the Owner") has submitted a request for Historic Landmark status for the structure at 1320 Farm Street; and
- **WHEREAS,** Chapter 9: Historic Landmark Preservation & Iredell District of the B³ Code adopted with Ordinance No. 2019-51 provides a designation process for historic sites and structures; and
- WHEREAS, notice of the historic designation was sent in accordance the B³ Code to notify property owners within 200 feet of the property and Texas Local Government Code section 211.0165 to notify the property owner of the impact of the designation; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Historic Landmark Commission held a public hearing and considered the request on February 21, 2024, and voted unanimously to recommend approval.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BASTROP, TEXAS:

- Section 1: The Historic Landmark status for 0.531 acres out of Farm Lot Block 36 East of Main Street, to be known as the Willis O Miley House, within the city limits of Bastrop, Texas, is hereby approved and Exhibit A, a copy of agreement to be signed by the Property Owner, and incorporated herein for all purposes.
- **Section 2:** The following findings of fact were established for the house located at 1320 Farm Street:

Structure meets the following criteria:

- (a) A Structure or Site is considered a local Historic Landmark if it is designated as a Recorded Texas Historic Landmark or State Archeological Landmark or is included on the National Register of Historic Places.
 - This house was placed on the National Register of Historic Places on 12/22/1978
- (4) Embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of Construction;
 - Exemplifies craftmanship of the era through the use of locally found materials and methods of construction from Alfred Grisenbeck.
- Section 3: All orders, ordinances and resolutions, or parts thereof, which are in conflict or inconsistent with any provision of this Resolution are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict, and the provisions of this Resolution shall be and remain controlling as to the matters resolved herein.





These properties are found in the immediate vicinity of the four blocks that comprise the project area. The first property to be discussed is Bastrop's Iron Bridge over Gills Branch. It was formerly situated just west of the Farm Road and Highway 95 intersection. The bridge rested over Gills Branch, but it is listed in the NRHP as resting over Piney Creek, an alternate nomenclature. This iron-truss bridge was the first permanent bridge to be built in Bastrop County, and was erected in 1881 for a cost of \$1,400.00 (Moore 1977:93).






Figure 3-3. Current bridge over Gills Branch.

It was designed by the MO. Valley Bridge & Ironworks Company (THC 2008). It is unclear when this bridge was removed replaced with a modern concrete bridge (Figure 3-3), but some bricks that may have been part of its foundation, along with numerous other construction debris, still lie within the bed of Guis Branch.





Figure 3-4. Miley, Willis House at 1320 Farm Road.

The Miley, Willis House, located at 1320 Farm Road, maintains much of its architectural integrity (Figure 3-4). Its architectural style suggests it dates from around the 1870s to the turn of the nineteenth century (THC 2008). The single-level dwelling was constructed in the Folk Victorian style. The woodframe sits on brick piers (THC 2008). The home's gable-front and wing design was common in post-railroad America (McAlester 1984). Victorian detailing includes small eave brackets and semiturned columns. Façade fenestrations include two vertical 2/2 windows on the pedimented gable end and along the wing. Typical of Folk Victorian homes, the fenestrations are symmetrical with a central entry wrapped by a transom and side-lights. The exterior walls are clad in horizontal wood siding. Contemporary features include gutters along the porch, embossed metal skirting around the base and a metal roof. This property appears to be well-maintained.

The NRHP listed residence at 1316 Farm Road is a single-level home and appears to be a simple, side-gabled, hall-and-parlor plan with a rear extension, all typical features of the National Folk Style (Figure 3-5). As is common in the South, it also has the full-width, shed-roofed porch. Unlike the Miley, Willis house, this structure lacks the ornamentation to

classify it as Victorian Folk, and lacks the features expected of Greek Revival, as classified in the NRHP listing. The symmetrical façade contains two adjacent central doors with a single/double-hung 12-light window at either end. The walls are covered in a horizontal siding. The lack of window-surrounds indicates that the windows may be contemporary replacements or the house may be sheathed in modern building fabrics. The home appears to be well-maintained.

Reid Bend's Burial Ground (Lost Cemetery)

This was a private cemetery used by the descendants of James Reid Sr. from 1838 until at least 1919. It was located on the Austin tract above and aligning the town of Bastrop, TX i.e. "2.5 miles north of the town of Bastrop, TX" as described in 1889. There is no longer any trace of this cemetery. There are three confirmed burials on this site but many more presumed. These presumed individuals would have been buried here between 1838 and 1919. Once the Reid's Bend property was no longer owned by the Reids, family burials were moved to either other Bastrop County cemeteries or cemeteries found outside of Bastrop County as 3rd and 4th generations moved away from Reid's Bend tract.

Because members of the James Curtis Sr. family also lived on this Austin tract from 1829 to 1849 and were related by marriage to the Reids, the burial ground might also have been the final resting place for the earliest members of the Curtis (Old 300), Sims (Old 300), and Stewart families. No proof has been found to support this theory. By 1853, the first and most of the 2nd generation of the Curtis family were deceased.

This cemetery is not to be confused with Reid's Bend Hispanic Cemetery (abandoned) which is located on a shelf bank (first flood plain) on Reid's Bend river bend just above the Colorado River. There is a large physical separation of these two Reid's Bend located cemeteries. The cemetery was used in the 1920's and 1930's and on land now owned by Texas Aggregates, Inc. Only 7 graves can be found but others might exist.

Until Sept 2010 the Reid's Bend land was a mixed of cleared, grassy pasture and heavily brush. In June 2001, a group of Reid-Hutchi(n)son descendents tried to locate the cemetery with permission of the present owners, Bar W Ranch. They were unsuccessful. The last time the cemetery had been visited, prior to this, was in the 1950's by Effie and Claude Sharp who had taken her mother to visit the family plot. The Sharps were part of the 2001 gathering. The property has changed hands many times since the Reids. Bulldozing

has changed the surface of the land. It is very possible that the cemetery has been bulldozed over. The Sharps recall that most of the headstones are petrified rocks. However, the approximate location can be determined from Bastrop County deed records and a funeral card.

In September 2010, Bar W Ranch cleared some of the brushy land to make new pasture. Remains of a past settlement were uncovered. However, the bulldozer operator had scattered the remains of the archeological sites and burned the debris before he realized the significance of the find. All the finds were in the area that the cemetery was supposed to be based on early records. Bar W Ranch gave permission to Reid and Cindy Sharp and Charles and Linda Reid, descendants of James Reid Sr., to examine the newly cleared land before it was seeded for pasture.

The archeological finds included a large, single rock. According to the Effie (now dec'd) and Claude Sharp in 2001, there was a rock that marked the entrance to Reid's Bend Burial Ground. It was the only small boulder found. The rock was moved by the bulldozer but still remained in the general area. Three home sites used as late as the 1920's and 1930's were found. Bricks, both handmade and commercially made, were found scattered over the ground. A hand dug water well, that was manually lined with plaster, was also found near one of the home sites and the large rock.

Looking at a 1899 topo map of Bastrop County which showed the road to Reid's Bend and comparing it to a modern street map of Bastrop, TX and aerial map of Bar W Ranch, it was determined that the 2010 route to Reid's Bend is almost identical to one in 1899. Following directions to Reid's Bend Burial Ground from an 1889 funeral card, the location and mileage correlates to the location of the newly uncovered archeological site.

When James Sr.'s estate was finally settled in 1854, Thomas Reid [eldest son] bought back the portion of land that contained the burial ground from the new owner, W.J.S. Carter. The men were associated to one another by marriage through the Dancer family. As stated in Deed Book I, page 504, 21 Feb 1855 - 1/2 ac granted to Thomas Reid (pd \$1) for land on which James Reid Sr. was buried. The deed also described the cemetery location: "East of the Colorado River near the bank of said River, above the place where the house stands in which Bartlett Sims family [lived]." [Note: Bartlett S. Sims and Samuel H. Reid married





Curtis sisters. The Simses later moved to Williamson Co., TX in 1849.] Sims had his residence being "a part of the upper 1/3 part of the league above and aligning the town of Bastrop." The wording in the deed is such that it indicates more than one grave was buried on this half acre. The last know burial recorded was a granddaughter, Rebecca Greg Reid Miley in 1919. The funeral announcement in 1889 referred to the cemetery as Reid's Bend Burial Ground.





With the changes evident in the current and future growth of Bastrop, we hope that you agree that preserving the downtown historic district is not only important from an architectural and historical standpoint, but will also have a positive effect on property values and the continuance of our small town ambience.



STAFF REPORT

MEETING DATE: March 12, 2024

TITLE:

Consider and act on an application from Bastrop Old Town Visitor Center for an event known as Yesterfest for \$20,000 for a grant from the Hotel Occupancy Tax Fund to fund a uniquely Bastrop event.

AGENDA ITEM SUBMITTED BY: Sylvia Carrillo-Trevino, ICMA-CM, CPM, City Manager

BACKGROUND/HISTORY:

Yesterfest was a long held city tradition that went by the wayside until 2023. In 2023, the Museum and Visitors Center helped put on a modest version of the event.

This year, the Bastrop Old Town Visitor Center and Nancy Wood are partnering to bring back the event to its former glory, complete with period costumes and reenactments, to celebrate Bastrop's pioneer heritage during National History Month.

The organization is seeking \$20,000 to bring more than 4,000 visitors to Main St. to participate in the event. The event budget is attached.

Visit Bastrop historically is awarded \$75,000 to distribute to events. The larger events such as the Festival de La Cultura (\$20,000) and Corvette Invasion (\$20,000) have come directly to the City of Bastrop as it would have taken a large portion of the available HOT event fund provided to Visit Bastrop, and perceived unfair to smaller events.

However, while the HOT fund is healthy, it is performing under an aggressive forecast that was expected to take it from \$2.9M in FY23 to \$4M in FY 24, a 37% increase. HOT fund revenue is down \$19,000 from the same period last year. However, expenses are also down 30.5% or \$784,000.

Additionally, Visit Bastrop is moving towards a reimbursement policy that would prevent events such as Yesterfest from coming to fruition.

FISCAL IMPACT:

\$20,000 to the Hotel Occupancy Fund.

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve the expense, and reduce the contribution to Visit Bastrop HOT fund event budget by \$20,000 to \$55,000 instead of \$75,000.

1.Event Description: May is National Preservation Month, and a uniquely Bastrop event, with over 28-years of history, will again draw tourists to the historic downtown. Organized by the Bastrop Old Town Visitor Center, Yesterfest 2024 will highlight Bastrop's diverse history for tourists and residents through reenactments, demonstrators, vendors, speakers, story tellers, music, and activities for children, all of which are based in our history from 1830s to the 1950s.

For the attendee, begin at the BCHS Museum and Visitor Center at 904 Main Street, collect a program/map of the event, and stroll through the museum. Now, steeped in Bastrop history, step outside and see history come alive along Pine and Water Streets. Visit with vendors selling homemade items; see reenactments and demonstrations; listen to homespun music (no amplifiers here!); interact with story tellers and speakers on topics that recall yesterday and that teach sustainable practices for now and the future; participate in children's games and activities that were popular in the 1800s. Since the event takes place in the heart of historic downtown Bastrop there is much to explore, including restaurants and shops outside the event boundary...spend the weekend and feel at home with us!

Yesterfest is designed to engage tourist audiences in historic preservation while supporting a vibrant, modern community.

2, 3, 4.Use of HOT Funds: The requested funds will be used for Marketing the event outside the immediate area. Plans are underway to target travelers from Houston, San Antonio, College Station, Waco, Dallas Metroplex, and smaller communities surrounding those metro locations. Approximately 77% of the ask will be used for marketing; the remainder will be used for lodging reenactors and paying performers. BCHS budget will cover all other expenses through corporate sponsorships and in-kind services from within the community.

6, 7.Attendance Goals and Tracking: The attendance goal for this event falls in the range of 2500 to 4000 attendees for the one day event. To achieve this goal, we will market extensively using newspaper, digital channels, social media, TV, and signage. To track attendance and overnight stays, we will use social media tracking and work with the hotels to have a questionnaire available that can be used with guests on their properties. We will partner with the Bastrop Opera House to cross-market their Friday night production and will work with local restaurants to promote their music/food special offerings for both Friday and Saturday night. This is also a chance to kick-off a long holiday weekend, Memorial Day Weekend, and make Bastrop the destination of choice for holiday weekend visitors.

STAFF REPORT

TITLE:

Consider and act on an application from SRE Promotions, LLC for an event known as Corvette Invasion for \$1,300 for a grant from the Hotel Occupancy Tax Fund to fund a corvette car show.

BACKGROUND/HISTORY:

The annual Corvette Invasion is the largest corvette only car show in Texas. In prior years, the event has a direct economic impact of over \$150,000 (see Attachment 2).

The organization has submitted a budget that shows approximately \$20,000 of eligible expenses that can be attributed directly as eligible for HOT funds reimbursement as marketing (advertising the city). At the February 27, 2024 council meeting, council awarded \$18,700 out of the \$20,000 due to needing additional information to award the full requested amount.

HOT fund use

Excerpt from TML – The Hotel Tax Two-Step.

"Part 1: Heads in Beds The first element of the two-part test is this: Every expenditure of hotel taxes must put "heads in beds." What this means is that every funded project must attract overnight tourists to the city's hotels and motels, thus promoting the city's hotel industry. For example, how about a weekend-long arts and crafts show? There's a very good chance that out-of-town guests might come to visit such an event, so expenditure of hotel tax money on that event would likely qualify. On the other hand, how about a quilting bee at a local nursing home? While a worthy cause, the quilting bee is unlikely to attract overnight tourists and, therefore, probably wouldn't qualify to receive hotel tax funds.

Part 2: The Nine Categories Once a project has cleared the first part of the test, it's time for – you guessed it – the second part of the test. Here it is: Every expenditure of hotel taxes must also fit into one of nine statutorily authorized categories. These are the nine categories: (1) convention and visitor centers; (2) convention registration; (3) advertising the city; (4) promotion of the arts; (5) historical restoration and preservation; (6) sporting events in a county under one million in population; (7) enhancing or upgrading existing sports facilities or sports fields (only in certain cities); (8) tourist transportation systems; and (9) signage directing the public to sights and attractions that are visited frequently by hotel guests in the city. Thus, even if an event puts heads in beds, it cannot receive hotel tax money unless it also fits into one of the nine categories."

FISCAL IMPACT:

\$1,300 from the HOT fund account.
