OPEN MEETINGS NOTICE

A RESOLUTION CONCERNING GOVERNING BODY MEETINGS AND PUBLIC NOTICE REQUIRED

WHEREAS, Section 10-15-1B, NMSA 1978 provides that all meetings of a quorum of members of any board, commission or other policy-making body of any state agency, or any agency or authority or any county, municipality, district or any political subdivision held for the purpose of formulating public policy, discussing public business or for the purpose of taking any action within the authority of or the delegated authority of such board, commission or other policy-making body, are declared to be public meetings open to the public at all times, except as otherwise provided in the constitution or the provisions of the Open Meetings Act; and,

WHEREAS, Section 10-15-3A, NMSA 1978 provides that no resolution, rule, regulation, ordinance or action of any board, commission, committee or other policy-

making body shall be valid unless taken or made at a meeting held in accordance with the requirements of Section 10-15-1 NMSA 1978"; and,

WHEREAS, Section 10-15-4, NMSA 1978 provides that any person violating any of the provisions of Section 10-15-1 NMSA 1978 is guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not more than five hundred dollars (\$500) for each offense; and,

WHEREAS, Section 10-15-1D requires that any meeting at which the discussion or adoption of any proposed resolution, rule, regulation or formal action occurs, and at which a majority or quorum of the body is in attendance, and any closed meetings, shall be held only after reasonable notice to the public. The affected body shall determine at least annually in a public meeting what notice for a public meeting shall be reasonable when applied to such body.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the governing body of the municipality of Bayard, New Mexico that:

The clerk <u>may</u> in addition to posting, publish one or more times in a newspaper of general circulation within the municipality, even though it does not maintain an office within the municipality. In addition, written notice of such meetings shall be mailed or hand delivered to federally licensed broadcast stations and newspapers of general circulation in the municipality which have provided a written request for such notice.

In addition to the information specified above, all notices shall include the following language: If you are an individual with a disability who is in need of a reader, amplifier, qualified sign language interpreter, or any other form of auxiliary aid or service to attend or participate in the hearing or meeting, please contact the city clerk at 800 Central Avenue (575-537-3327) at least one week prior to the meeting or as soon as possible.



Goals and Local Impact

The rationale for the Union Hall Community History Center is to create a positive local impact. The following points make the case for how this project can have a real impact on the local community through building community, economic development, historic preservation and restoration, and stewardship of the historic legacy of the mining district.

- Providing a missing locus for communicating the history of the community, especially to younger generations.
- Preserving and restoring a historic site that embodies and enshrines important events in the heritage of the community.
- Building a greater sense of community and help to mend the existing divide (ethnic divides, union vs non-union divides) within the community.
- Providing new educational opportunities for local schools, and new opportunities for youth to be constructively engaged in community activities.





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

A colorful mural extending the length of the building depicts the Empire Zinc Mine strike. As visitors walk along the length of the mural on their way to the entrance to the building, they can appreciate the storytelling nature of the painting and discover more about it via interpretive panels.



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Entry Experience



As they pass through the entrance doors they are welcomed by staff or a volunteer who can help orient them to their visit.

Along the northeast side of the building, a shaded area shielded from the street by planting. provides outdoor space for educational activities for local youth, school groups, and the children of visitors.

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The Exhibition




An introductory wall orients visitors to the main themes of the exhibition. The central focal point of the exhibition space is a historic "War Room" setting that recreates the feeling and action that took place during planning sessions occurring inside the Union Hall. This installation serves as both a symbolic anchor to the visitor experience and a place that local residents can utilize as a meeting place. Wrapping around the perimeter of the room is a variety of

interpretive exhibits that offer visitors a range of ways to explore the content and stories behind the district's mining history and the community life it supports, to the depth and degree they choose. These displays include historic mining tools and equipment, an oral history station, a rotating display of the original murals that adorned the walls, and an art installation honoring the miners of the district.



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VisionWar Room Experience




This central focal exhibit and symbolic anchor is intended to be flexible to accommodate multiple uses by both visitors and residents. This installation is historically staged as a union meeting room with table, chairs, and other period props and documents and can include background ambient audio effects. During visiting hours, it operates as a physical setting that visitors can occupy and explore to catch glimpses into what union meetings were like.

This will be done through overheard audio conversations, video projections of recreated scenes and excerpts from the *Salt of the Earth* film, environmental effects simulating the presence of union members, and document facsimiles. The meeting table can function as a touch table or projection table with interactive text and images. During off hours, the space can be used for small meetings or fundraising events, and the video equipment can be used for presentations.



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Mural Display




A special exhibit is devoted to showcasing and interpreting the original historic murals restored from the interior of Union Hall. After having been carefully removed, stabilized, conserved, and remounted onto archival backing, the murals are rotated on display. To make all the murals fully accessible at all times, visitors can view digital versions on an interactive touchscreen.

By touching specified "hot spots" on the display, visitors can call up information about particular features they see in the murals and learn about who created them and why. Provision can be made so that the original murals can also be displayed in a traveling exhibition.



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Oral History Experience



A key component of the project is its oral history project. This project involves the recording, archiving, and playback of personal stories shared by residents of the district. A video wall serves as a playback area where visitors can select curated excerpts on topics or individuals of their choice. Provisions for recording local oral histories can also be provided on-site for use in conjunction with trained staff.




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Visitor Amenities



A small retail area is provided for the sale of books, souvenirs, and educational toys related to the history of the mining district. The welcome desk doubles as a sales desk for the retail area to process payments. Accessible restrooms are provided near the entrance to the building.

Staffing and Implementation

A critical component to the longevity and success of the Union Hall experience will be how to sustainably staff and operate the facility. To minimize staffing cost, a hybrid approach is proposed where the project is operated by combination of full time and part time staff, volunteers and interns, complemented by existing City of Bayard personnel, where possible.

A promising possibility is for the project to come under the umbrella of a potential future organization that would operate the other publicly owned Five Points sites. In this scenario, administrative, maintenance and support staff could be shared, where each site has a dedicated exhibit and programming director.

Regional Alignment and Networking

By becoming a part of a larger network of cultural heritage offerings in the region, the Union Hall stands to have: a broader reach; attract more visitors; have access to greater support; have a greater impact; and a better chance at success.

Networking and partnerships can involve a range of relationships that can include; collaboration on public programming, exhibits and special events, shared marketing and fundraising efforts, research, volunteer support, and off-



The quoted costs to conserve the painting artworks inside the Union Hall building are estimated in excess of 10% the total project costs; \$342,000. These fees add considerable costs to phase one of the project because the paintings will need to be stabilized and removed prior to demolition and construction. We recommend that City of Bayard find a painting conservation partner, such as the Conservation Department within the Museum Resources Division of Department of Cultural Affairs (DCA), to donate labor or resources to remove, stabilize, and also to conserve these artworks. These efforts could be made in exchange for temporary exhibition of the artworks at the DCA's New Mexico History Museum or at DCA's Historic Sites across the State of New Mexico, honoring the legacy of the Chicano population and its history in Bayard. Since the paintings will need to be removed in order to make the building habitable, please consider the production of a traveling exhibition of these artworks that

could travel to museum destinations around the region, country, and world.

This exhibit would honor the story of the community efforts embodied in the Bayard Union hall, attracting expanded interest into the history of the communities, miners, and unions in Bayard.

The design fees and estimated costs to demolish the structurally compromised elements of the Union Hall and then to renovate the building to the standard for public use amount to a cost that is equivalent to building an all new, purpose built, 3,500sf structure. The City of Bayard should consider whether the preservation of the building itself is the highest priority, and/or whether new construction might be a preferred direction.
