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ORDINANCE NO. 17-01

AN ORDINANCE BY THE CITY OF BELLE ISLE, FL AMENDING THE CITY OF BELLE ISLE CODE OF ORDINANCES TO REPEAL ORDINANCE 78-17 and ORDINANCE15-04; TO ADOPT A NEW FLOOD DAMAGE PREVENTION ORDINANCE: TO ADOPT FLOOD HAZARD MAPS, TO DESIGNATE A FLOODPLAIN ADMINISTRATOR, TO ADOPT PROCEDURES AND CRITERIA FOR DEVELOPMENT IN FLOOD HAZARD AREAS, TO ADOPT TECHNICAL AMENDMENTS TO THE FLORIDA BUILDING CODE, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES; PROVIDING FOR APPLICABILITY; REPEALER; SEVERABILITY; AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Florida has, in Chapter 166, Florida Statutes, conferred upon local governments the authority to adopt regulations designed to promote the public health, safety, and general welfare of its citizenry; and

WHEREAS, the Federal Emergency Management Agency has identified special flood
hazard areas within the boundaries of the City of Belle Isle and such areas may be subject to
periodic inundation which may result in loss of life and property, health and safety hazards,
disruption of commerce and governmental services, extraordinary public expenditures for flood
protection and relief, and impairment of the tax base, all of which adversely affect the public
health, safety and general welfare, and

WHEREAS, the City of Belle Isle was accepted for participation in the National Flood Insurance Program on September 15, 1978 and the City Council desires to continue to meet

the requirements of Title 44 Code of Federal Regulations, Sections 59 and 60, necessary for
 such participation; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 553, Florida Statutes, was adopted by the Florida Legislature to
 provide a mechanism for the uniform adoption, updating, amendment, interpretation and
 enforcement of a state building code, called the *Florida Building Code*; and

WHEREAS, the City Council adopted a requirement to limit partitioning of enclosed
areas below elevated buildings and to limit access to enclosed areas for buildings and
structures in flood hazard areas prior to July 1, 2010 and, pursuant to section 553.73(5), F.S., is
formatting that requirement to coordinate with the *Florida Building Code*;

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that it is in the public interest to adopt the proposed floodplain management regulations that are coordinated with the *Florida Building Code*.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Belle Isle that the following floodplain management regulations are hereby adopted.

SECTION 1. RECITALS.

The foregoing whereas clauses are incorporated herein by reference and made a part hereof.

SECTION 2. This ordinance specifically repeals and replaces the following ordinance(s)
and regulation(s): This ordinance specifically repeals and replaces the following
ordinance(s) and regulation(s): Belle Isle's Flood Damage Prevention Ordinance #78-17,
and as amended by Ordinance #15-04 in 2015; as well as any conflicting provisions of
Belle Isle Code, Chapter 48, Article V. Floodplains; and, any conflicting provisions of
Belle Isle Code, Chapter 50, Article II. Subdivision Regulations.

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DIVISION 1 GENERAL

48-121 Title. These regulations shall be known as the *Floodplain Management Ordinance* of **the City of Belle Isle,** hereinafter referred to as "this ordinance."

48-122 Scope. The provisions of this ordinance shall apply to all development that is wholly 6 within or partially within any flood hazard area, including but not limited to the subdivision of land; 7 filling, grading, and other site improvements and utility installations; construction, alteration, 8 9 remodeling, enlargement, improvement, replacement, repair, relocation or demolition of buildings, structures, and facilities that are exempt from the Florida Building Code; placement, installation, or 10 replacement of manufactured homes and manufactured buildings; installation or replacement of 11 tanks; placement of recreational vehicles; installation of swimming pools; and any other 12 development. 13

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48-123 Intent. The purposes of this ordinance and the flood load and flood resistant
construction requirements of the *Florida Building Code* are to establish minimum requirements
to safeguard the public health, safety, and general welfare and to minimize public and private
losses due to flooding through regulation of development in flood hazard areas to:

 Minimize unnecessary disruption of commerce, access and public service during times of flooding;

(2) Require the use of appropriate construction practices in order to prevent or minimize future flood damage;

(3) Manage filling, grading, dredging, mining, paving, excavation, drilling operations, storage of equipment or materials, and other development which may increase flood damage or

1	erosion potential;
2	(4) Manage the alteration of flood hazard areas, watercourses, and shorelines to minimize
3	the impact of development on the natural and beneficial functions of the floodplain;
4	(5) Minimize damage to public and private facilities and utilities;
5	(6) Help maintain a stable tax base by providing for the sound use and development of flood
6	hazard areas;
7	(7) Minimize the need for future expenditure of public funds for flood control projects and
8	response to and recovery from flood events; and
9	(8) Meet the requirements of the National Flood Insurance Program for community
10	participation as set forth in the Title 44 Code of Federal Regulations, Section 59.22.
11	48-124 Coordination with the Florida Building Code. This ordinance is intended to be
12	administered and enforced in conjunction with the Florida Building Code. Where cited, ASCE
13	24 refers to the edition of the standard that is referenced by the Florida Building Code.
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15	48-125 Warning. The degree of flood protection required by this ordinance and the Florida
16	Building Code, as amended by this community, is considered the minimum reasonable for
17	regulatory purposes and is based on scientific and engineering considerations. Larger floods can
18	and will occur. Flood heights may be increased by man-made or natural causes. This ordinance
19	does not imply that land outside of mapped special flood hazard areas, or that uses permitted within
20	such flood hazard areas, will be free from flooding or flood damage. The flood hazard areas and
21	base flood elevations contained in the Flood Insurance Study and shown on Flood Insurance Rate
22	Maps and the requirements of Title 44 Code of Federal Regulations, Sections 59 and 60 may be
23	revised by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, requiring this community to revise these
24	regulations to remain eligible for participation in the National Flood Insurance Program. No

guaranty of vested use, existing use, or future use is implied or expressed by compliance with
 this ordinance.

48-126 Disclaimer of Liability. This ordinance shall not create liability on the part of **City Council** of **the City of Belle Isle** or by any officer or employee thereof for any flood damage that results from reliance on this ordinance or any administrative decision lawfully made thereunder.

DIVISION 2 APPLICABILITY

48-127 General. Where there is a conflict between a general requirement and a specific requirement, the specific requirement shall be applicable.

48-128 Areas to which this ordinance applies. This ordinance shall apply to all flood hazard areas within the **City of Belle Isle**, as established in Section 48-129 of this ordinance.

48-129 Basis for establishing flood hazard areas. The Flood Insurance Study for Orange
County, Florida and Incorporated Areas dated September 25, 2009, and all subsequent
amendments and revisions, and the accompanying Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM), and all
subsequent amendments and revisions to such maps, are adopted by reference as a part of this
ordinance and shall serve as the minimum basis for establishing flood hazard areas. Studies
and maps that establish flood hazard areas are on file at the City Clerk's office at 1600 Nela
Avenue, Belle Isle FL 32809.

48-130 Submission of additional data to establish flood hazard areas. To establish flood
 hazard areas and base flood elevations, pursuant to Division 5 of this ordinance the Floodplain
 Administrator may require submission of additional data. Where field surveyed topography
 prepared by a Florida licensed professional surveyor or digital topography accepted by the
 community indicates that ground elevations:

- (1) Are below the closest applicable base flood elevation, even in areas not delineated as a special flood hazard area on a FIRM, the area shall be considered as flood hazard area and subject to the requirements of this ordinance and, as applicable, the requirements of the *Florida Building Code*.
- (2) Are above the closest applicable base flood elevation, the area shall be regulated as special flood hazard area unless the applicant obtains a Letter of Map Change that removes the area from the special flood hazard area.

<u>48-131</u> Other laws. The provisions of this ordinance shall not be deemed to nullify any provisions of local, state or federal law.

48-132 Abrogation and greater restrictions. This ordinance supersedes any ordinance in effect for management of development in flood hazard areas. However, it is not intended to repeal or abrogate any existing ordinances including but not limited to land development regulations, zoning ordinances, stormwater management regulations, or the *Florida Building Code*. In the event of a conflict between this ordinance and any other ordinance, the more restrictive shall govern. This ordinance shall not impair any deed restriction, covenant or easement, but any land that is subject to such interests shall also be governed by this ordinance.

48-133 Interpretation. In the interpretation and application of this ordinance, all provisions
 shall be:
 (1) Considered as minimum requirements;

(2) Liberally construed in favor of the governing body; and

(3) Deemed neither to limit nor repeal any other powers granted under state statutes.

DIVISION 3 DUTIES AND POWERS OF THE FLOODPLAIN ADMINISTRATOR

48-134 Designation. The **City Manager** is designated as the Floodplain Administrator. The Floodplain Administrator may delegate performance of certain duties to other employees.

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48-135 General. The Floodplain Administrator is authorized and directed to administer and enforce the provisions of this ordinance. The Floodplain Administrator shall have the authority to render interpretations of this ordinance consistent with the intent and purpose of this ordinance and may establish policies and procedures in order to clarify the application of its provisions. Such interpretations, policies, and procedures shall not have the effect of waiving requirements specifically provided in this ordinance without the granting of a variance pursuant to Division 7 of this ordinance.

48-136 Applications and permits. The Floodplain Administrator, in coordination with other pertinent offices of the community, shall:

 Review applications and plans to determine whether proposed new development will be located in flood hazard areas;

1	(2) Review applications for modification of any existing development in flood hazard areas
2	for compliance with the requirements of this ordinance;
3	(3) Interpret flood hazard area boundaries where such interpretation is necessary to
4	determine the exact location of boundaries; a person contesting the determination shall
5	have the opportunity to appeal the interpretation;
6	(4) Provide available flood elevation and flood hazard information;
7	(5) Determine whether additional flood hazard data shall be obtained from other sources or
8	shall be developed by an applicant;
9	(6) Review applications to determine whether proposed development will be reasonably
10	safe from flooding;
11	(7) Issue floodplain development permits or approvals for development other than buildings
12	and structures that are subject to the Florida Building Code, including buildings,
13	structures and facilities exempt from the Florida Building Code, when compliance with
14	this ordinance is demonstrated, or disapprove the same in the event of noncompliance;
15	and
16	(8) Coordinate with and provide comments to the Building Official to assure that
17	applications, plan reviews, and inspections for buildings and structures in flood hazard
18	areas comply with the applicable provisions of this ordinance.
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20	48-137 Substantial improvement and substantial damage determinations. For applications
21	for building permits to improve buildings and structures, including alterations, movement,
22	enlargement, replacement, repair, change of occupancy, additions, rehabilitations, renovations,
23	substantial improvements, repairs of substantial damage, and any other improvement of or work
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on such buildings and structures, the Floodplain Administrator, in coordination with the Building
 Official, shall:

(1) Estimate the market value, or require the applicant to obtain an appraisal of the market value prepared by a qualified independent appraiser, of the building or structure before the start of construction of the proposed work; in the case of repair, the market value of the building or structure shall be the market value before the damage occurred and before any repairs are made;

(2) Compare the cost to perform the improvement, the cost to repair a damaged building to its pre-damaged condition, or the combined costs of improvements and repairs, if applicable, to the market value of the building or structure;

- (3) Determine and document whether the proposed work constitutes substantial improvement or repair of substantial damage; and
- (4) Notify the applicant if it is determined that the work constitutes substantial improvement or repair of substantial damage and that compliance with the flood resistant construction requirements of the *Florida Building Code* and this ordinance is required.

48-138 Modifications of the strict application of the requirements of the *Florida Building*

Code. The Floodplain Administrator shall review requests submitted to the Building Official that

seek approval to modify the strict application of the flood load and flood resistant construction

requirements of the Florida Building Code to determine whether such requests require the

granting of a variance pursuant to Division 7 of this ordinance.

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48-139 Notices and orders. The Floodplain Administrator shall coordinate with appropriate
 local agencies for the issuance of all necessary notices or orders to ensure compliance with this
 ordinance.

48-140 Inspections. The Floodplain Administrator shall make the required inspections as
specified in Division 6 of this ordinance for development that is not subject to the *Florida Building Code*, including buildings, structures and facilities exempt from the *Florida Building Code*. The Floodplain Administrator shall inspect flood hazard areas to determine if
development is undertaken without issuance of a permit.

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48-141 Other duties of the Floodplain Administrator. The Floodplain Administrator shall have other duties, including but not limited to:

- Establish, in coordination with the Building Official, procedures for administering and documenting determinations of substantial improvement and substantial damage made pursuant to Section 48-137 of this ordinance;
- (2) Require that applicants proposing alteration of a watercourse notify adjacent communities and the Florida Division of Emergency Management, State Floodplain Management Office, and submit copies of such notifications to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA);
- (3) Require applicants who submit hydrologic and hydraulic engineering analyses to support permit applications to submit to FEMA the data and information necessary to maintain the Flood Insurance Rate Maps if the analyses propose to change base flood elevations, flood hazard area boundaries, or floodway designations; such submissions shall be made within 6 months of such data becoming available;

- (4) Review required design certifications and documentation of elevations specified by this ordinance and the *Florida Building Code* to determine that such certifications and documentations are complete; and

(5) Notify the Federal Emergency Management Agency when the corporate boundaries of the City of Belle Isle are modified.

48-142 Floodplain management records. Regardless of any limitation on the period required for retention of public records, the Floodplain Administrator shall maintain and permanently keep and make available for public inspection all records that are necessary for the administration of this ordinance and the flood resistant construction requirements of the *Florida Building Code*, including Flood Insurance Rate Maps; Letters of Map Change; records of issuance of permits and denial of permits; determinations of whether proposed work constitutes substantial improvement or repair of substantial damage; required design certifications and documentation of elevations specified by the *Florida Building Code* and this ordinance; notifications to adjacent communities, FEMA, and the state related to alterations of watercourses; assurances that the flood carrying capacity of altered watercourses will be maintained; documentation related to appeals and variances, including justification for issuance or denial; and records of enforcement actions taken pursuant to this ordinance and the flood resistant construction requirements of the *Florida Building Code*. These records shall be available for public inspection at **the City Clerk's office at 1600 Nela Avenue, Belle Isle FL 32809.**

1 DIVISION 4 PERMITS

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48-143 Permits required. Any owner or owner's authorized agent (hereinafter "applicant") who
intends to undertake any development activity within the scope of this ordinance, including
buildings, structures and facilities exempt from the *Florida Building Code*, which is wholly within
or partially within any flood hazard area shall first make application to the Floodplain
Administrator, and the Building Official if applicable, and shall obtain the required permit(s) and
approval(s). No such permit or approval shall be issued until compliance with the requirements of
this ordinance and all other applicable codes and regulations has been satisfied.

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48-144 Floodplain development permits or approvals. Floodplain development permits or
approvals shall be issued pursuant to this ordinance for any development activities not subject to the
requirements of the *Florida Building Code*, including buildings, structures and facilities exempt
from the *Florida Building Code*. Depending on the nature and extent of proposed development
that includes a building or structure, the Floodplain Administrator may determine that a floodplain
development permit or approval is required in addition to a building permit.

48-145 Buildings, structures and facilities exempt from the *Florida Building Code*.
Pursuant to the requirements of federal regulation for participation in the National Flood
Insurance Program (44 C.F.R. Sections 59 and 60), floodplain development permits or
approvals shall be required for the following buildings, structures and facilities that are exempt
from the *Florida Building Code* and any further exemptions provided by law, which are subject to
the requirements of this ordinance:

(1) Railroads and ancillary facilities associated with the railroad.

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1 (2) Nonresidential farm buildings on farms, as provided in section 604.50, F.S. (3) Temporary buildings or sheds used exclusively for construction purposes. 2 (4) Mobile or modular structures used as temporary offices. 3 4 (5) Those structures or facilities of electric utilities, as defined in section 366.02, F.S., which are directly involved in the generation, transmission, or distribution of electricity. 5 (6) Chickees constructed by the Miccosukee Tribe of Indians of Florida or the Seminole 6 Tribe of Florida. As used in this paragraph, the term "chickee" means an open-sided 7 wooden hut that has a thatched roof of palm or palmetto or other traditional materials, 8 9 and that does not incorporate any electrical, plumbing, or other non-wood features. (7) Family mausoleums not exceeding 250 square feet in area which are prefabricated and 10 assembled on site or preassembled and delivered on site and have walls, roofs, and a 11 floor constructed of granite, marble, or reinforced concrete. 12 (8) Temporary housing provided by the Department of Corrections to any prisoner in the 13 14 state correctional system. (9) Structures identified in section 553.73(10)(k), F.S., are not exempt from the Florida 15 Building Code if such structures are located in flood hazard areas established on Flood 16 17 Insurance Rate Maps 18 48-146 Application for a permit or approval. To obtain a floodplain development permit or 19 20 approval the applicant shall first file an application in writing on a form furnished by the community. The information provided shall: 21 22 (1) Identify and describe the development to be covered by the permit or approval. (2) Describe the land on which the proposed development is to be conducted by legal 23 description, street address or similar description that will readily identify and definitively 24 25

locate the site.

(3) Indicate the use and occupancy for which the proposed development is intended.

(4) Be accompanied by a site plan or construction documents as specified in Division 5 of this ordinance.

(5) State the valuation of the proposed work.

(6) Be signed by the applicant or the applicant's authorized agent.

(7) Give such other data and information as required by the Floodplain Administrator.

9 48-147 Validity of permit or approval. The issuance of a floodplain development permit or
10 approval pursuant to this ordinance shall not be construed to be a permit for, or approval of, any
11 violation of this ordinance, the *Florida Building Codes*, or any other ordinance of this community.
12 The issuance of permits based on submitted applications, construction documents, and
13 information shall not prevent the Floodplain Administrator from requiring the correction of errors
14 and omissions.

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48-148 Expiration. A floodplain development permit or approval shall become invalid unless the
work authorized by such permit is commenced within 180 days after its issuance, or if the work
authorized is suspended or abandoned for a period of 180 days after the work commences.
Extensions for periods of not more than 180 days each shall be requested in writing and
justifiable cause shall be demonstrated.

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48-149 Suspension or revocation. The Floodplain Administrator is authorized to suspend or revoke a floodplain development permit or approval if the permit was issued in error, on the

basis of incorrect, inaccurate or incomplete information, or in violation of this ordinance or any 1 other ordinance, regulation or requirement of this community. 2 3 4 48-150 Other permits required. Floodplain development permits and building permits shall include a condition that all other applicable state or federal permits be obtained before 5 commencement of the permitted development, including but not limited to the following: 6 (1) The **St. Johns River** Water Management District; section 373.036, F.S. 7 (2) Florida Department of Health for onsite sewage treatment and disposal systems; section 8 9 381.0065, F.S. and Chapter 64E-6, F.A.C. (3) Florida Department of Environmental Protection for activities subject to the Joint Coastal 10 Permit; section 161.055, F.S. 11 (4) Florida Department of Environmental Protection for activities that affect wetlands and 12 alter surface water flows, in conjunction with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers; Section 13 14 404 of the Clean Water Act. (5) Federal permits and approvals. 15 16 17 **DIVISION 5 SITE PLANS AND CONSTRUCTION DOCUMENTS** 18 19 48-151 Information for development in flood hazard areas. The site plan or construction documents for any development subject to the requirements of this ordinance shall be drawn to 20 scale and shall include, as applicable to the proposed development: 21 22 (1) Delineation of flood hazard areas, floodway boundaries and flood zone(s), base flood elevation(s), and ground elevations if necessary for review of the proposed 23 development. 24 25 ORD 17-01 - 15 OF 48

1	(2) Where base flood elevations or floodway data are not included on the FIRM or in the
2	Flood Insurance Study, they shall be established in accordance with Section 48-152(2)
3	or (3) of this ordinance.
4	(3) Where the parcel on which the proposed development will take place will have more
5	than 50 lots or is larger than 5 acres and the base flood elevations are not included on
6	the FIRM or in the Flood Insurance Study, such elevations shall be established in
7	accordance with Section 48-152(1) of this ordinance.
8	(4) Location of the proposed activity and proposed structures, and locations of existing
9	buildings and structures.
10	(5) Location, extent, amount, and proposed final grades of any filling, grading, or
11	excavation.
12	(6) Where the placement of fill is proposed, the amount, type, and source of fill material;
13	compaction specifications; a description of the intended purpose of the fill areas; and
14	evidence that the proposed fill areas are the minimum necessary to achieve the intended
15	purpose.
16	(7) Existing and proposed alignment of any proposed alteration of a watercourse.
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18	The Floodplain Administrator is authorized to waive the submission of site plans, construction
19	documents, and other data that are required by this ordinance but that are not required to be
20	prepared by a registered design professional if it is found that the nature of the proposed
21	development is such that the review of such submissions is not necessary to ascertain
22	compliance with this ordinance.
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1	48-152 Information in flood hazard areas without base flood elevations (approximate
2	Zone A). Where flood hazard areas are delineated on the FIRM and base flood elevation data
3	have not been provided, the Floodplain Administrator shall:
4	(1) Require the applicant to include base flood elevation data prepared in accordance with
5	currently accepted engineering practices.
6	(2) Obtain, review, and provide to applicants base flood elevation and floodway data
7	available from a federal or state agency or other source or require the applicant to
8	obtain and use base flood elevation and floodway data available from a federal or state
9	agency or other source.
10	(3) Where base flood elevation and floodway data are not available from another source,
11	where the available data are deemed by the Floodplain Administrator to not reasonably
12	reflect flooding conditions, or where the available data are known to be scientifically or
13	technically incorrect or otherwise inadequate:
14	(a) Require the applicant to include base flood elevation data prepared in
15	accordance with currently accepted engineering practices; or
16	(b) Specify that the base flood elevation is two (2) feet above the highest
17	adjacent grade at the location of the development, provided there is no
18	evidence indicating flood depths have been or may be greater than two (2)
19	feet.
20	(4) Where the base flood elevation data are to be used to support a Letter of Map Change
21	from FEMA, advise the applicant that the analyses shall be prepared by a Florida
22	licensed engineer in a format required by FEMA, and that it shall be the responsibility of
23	the applicant to satisfy the submittal requirements and pay the processing fees.
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48-153 Additional analyses and certifications. As applicable to the location and nature of the
proposed development activity, and in addition to the requirements of this section, the applicant
shall have the following analyses signed and sealed by a Florida licensed engineer for
submission with the site plan and construction documents:

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(1) For development activities proposed to be located in a regulatory floodway, a floodway encroachment analysis that demonstrates that the encroachment of the proposed development will not cause any increase in base flood elevations; where the applicant proposes to undertake development activities that do increase base flood elevations, the applicant shall submit such analysis to FEMA as specified in Section 48-154 of this ordinance and shall submit the Conditional Letter of Map Revision, if issued by FEMA, with the site plan and construction documents.

(2) For development activities proposed to be located in a riverine flood hazard area for which base flood elevations are included in the Flood Insurance Study or on the FIRM and floodways have not been designated, hydrologic and hydraulic analyses that demonstrate that the cumulative effect of the proposed development, when combined with all other existing and anticipated flood hazard area encroachments, will not increase the base flood elevation more than one (1) foot at any point within the community. This requirement does not apply in isolated flood hazard areas not connected to a riverine flood hazard area or in flood hazard areas identified as Zone AO or Zone AH.

(3) For alteration of a watercourse, an engineering analysis prepared in accordance with standard engineering practices which demonstrates that the flood-carrying capacity of the altered or relocated portion of the watercourse will not be decreased, and certification that the altered watercourse shall be maintained in a manner which preserves the channel's flood-carrying capacity; the applicant shall submit the analysis to

FEMA as specified in Section 48-154 of this ordinance.

48-154 Submission of additional data. When additional hydrologic, hydraulic or other
engineering data, studies, and additional analyses are submitted to support an application, the
applicant has the right to seek a Letter of Map Change from FEMA to change the base flood
elevations, change floodway boundaries, or change boundaries of flood hazard areas shown on
FIRMs, and to submit such data to FEMA for such purposes. The analyses shall be prepared
by a Florida licensed engineer in a format required by FEMA. Submittal requirements and
processing fees shall be the responsibility of the applicant.

DIVISION 6 INSPECTIONS

48-155 General. Development for which a floodplain development permit or approval is required shall be subject to inspection.

48-156 Development other than buildings and structures. The Floodplain Administrator
 shall inspect all development to determine compliance with the requirements of this ordinance
 and the conditions of issued floodplain development permits or approvals.

48-157 Buildings, structures and facilities exempt from the *Florida Building Code*. The
 Floodplain Administrator shall inspect buildings, structures and facilities exempt from the *Florida Building Code* to determine compliance with the requirements of this ordinance and the
 conditions of issued floodplain development permits or approvals.

1 48-158 Buildings, structures and facilities exempt from the *Florida Building Code*, lowest floor inspection. Upon placement of the lowest floor, including basement, and prior to further vertical construction, the owner of a building, structure or facility exempt from the Florida Building Code, or the owner's authorized agent, shall submit to the Floodplain Administrator: (1) If a design flood elevation was used to determine the required elevation of the lowest 5 floor, the certification of elevation of the lowest floor prepared and sealed by a Florida 6 licensed professional surveyor; or

(2) If the elevation used to determine the required elevation of the lowest floor was determined in accordance with Section 48-152(3)(b) of this ordinance, the documentation of height of the lowest floor above highest adjacent grade, prepared by the owner or the owner's authorized agent.

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48-159 Buildings, structures and facilities exempt from the Florida Building Code, final

14 inspection. As part of the final inspection, the owner or owner's authorized agent shall submit to the Floodplain Administrator a final certification of elevation of the lowest floor or final 15 documentation of the height of the lowest floor above the highest adjacent grade; such 16 17 certifications and documentations shall be prepared as specified in Section 48-158 of this ordinance.

48-160 Manufactured homes. The Floodplain Administrator shall inspect manufactured homes that are installed or replaced in flood hazard areas to determine compliance with the requirements of this ordinance and the conditions of the issued permit. Upon placement of a manufactured home, certification of the elevation of the lowest floor shall be submitted to the Floodplain Administrator.

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DIVISION 7 VARIANCES AND APPEALS

48-161 General. The Planning & Zoning Board shall hear and decide on requests for appeals and requests for variances from the strict application of this ordinance. Pursuant to section 553.73(5), F.S., the Planning & Zoning Board shall hear and decide on requests for appeals and requests for variances from the strict application of the flood resistant construction requirements of the *Florida Building Code*.

9 48-162 Appeals. The Planning & Zoning Board shall hear and decide appeals when it is
10 alleged there is an error in any requirement, decision, or determination made by the Floodplain
11 Administrator in the administration and enforcement of this ordinance. Any person aggrieved by
12 the decision may appeal such decision to the Circuit Court, as provided by Florida Statutes.

48-163 Limitations on authority to grant variances. The Planning & Zoning Board shall
 base its decisions on variances on technical justifications submitted by applicants, the
 considerations for issuance in Section 48-167 of this ordinance, the conditions of issuance set
 forth in Section 48-168 of this ordinance, and the comments and recommendations of the
 Floodplain Administrator and the Building Official. The Planning & Zoning Board has the right
 to attach such conditions as it deems necessary to further the purposes and objectives of this
 ordinance.

48-164 Restrictions in floodways. A variance shall not be issued for any proposed
development in a floodway if any increase in base flood elevations would result, as evidenced
by the applicable analyses and certifications required in Section 48-153 of this ordinance.

48-165 Historic buildings. A variance is authorized to be issued for the repair, improvement, or rehabilitation of a historic building that is determined eligible for the exception to the flood resistant construction requirements of the Florida Building Code, Existing Building, Chapter 12 Historic Buildings, upon a determination that the proposed repair, improvement, or rehabilitation will not preclude the building's continued designation as a historic building and the variance is the minimum necessary to preserve the historic character and design of the building. If the proposed work precludes the building's continued designation as a historic building, a variance shall not be granted and the building and any repair, improvement, and rehabilitation shall be subject to the requirements of the Florida Building Code.

48-166 Functionally dependent uses. A variance is authorized to be issued for the construction or substantial improvement necessary for the conduct of a functionally dependent use, as defined in this ordinance, provided the variance meets the requirements of Section 48-164, is the minimum necessary considering the flood hazard, and all due consideration has been given to use of methods and materials that minimize flood damage during occurrence of the base flood.

48-167 Considerations for issuance of variances. In reviewing requests for variances, the **Planning & Zoning Board** shall consider all technical evaluations, all relevant factors, all other applicable provisions of the *Florida Building Code*, this ordinance, and the following:

- (1) The danger that materials and debris may be swept onto other lands resulting in further injury or damage;
- (2) The danger to life and property due to flooding or erosion damage;

(3)	The susceptibility of the proposed development, including contents, to flood damage and
	the effect of such damage on current and future owners;
(4)	The importance of the services provided by the proposed development to the
	community;
(5)	The availability of alternate locations for the proposed development that are subject to
	lower risk of flooding or erosion;
(6)	The compatibility of the proposed development with existing and anticipated
	development;
(7)	The relationship of the proposed development to the comprehensive plan and floodplain
	management program for the area;
(8)	The safety of access to the property in times of flooding for ordinary and emergency
	vehicles;
(9)	The expected heights, velocity, duration, rate of rise and debris and sediment transport
	of the floodwaters and the effects of wave action, if applicable, expected at the site; and
(10) The costs of providing governmental services during and after flood conditions
	including maintenance and repair of public utilities and facilities such as sewer, gas,
	electrical and water systems, streets and bridges.
48-168	Conditions for issuance of variances. Variances shall be issued only upon:
(1)	Submission by the applicant, of a showing of good and sufficient cause that the unique
	characteristics of the size, configuration, or topography of the site limit compliance with
	any provision of this ordinance or the required elevation standards;
(2)	Determination by the Planning & Zoning Board that:
	(a) Failure to grant the variance would result in exceptional hardship due to the

1	physical characteristics of the land that render the lot undevelopable; increased
2	costs to satisfy the requirements or inconvenience do not constitute hardship;
3	(b) The granting of a variance will not result in increased flood heights, additional
4	threats to public safety, extraordinary public expense, nor create nuisances,
5	cause fraud on or victimization of the public or conflict with existing local laws
6	and ordinances; and
7	(c) The variance is the minimum necessary, considering the flood hazard, to afford
8	relief;
9	(3) Receipt of a signed statement by the applicant that the variance, if granted, shall be
10	recorded in the Office of the Clerk of the Court in such a manner that it appears in the
11	chain of title of the affected parcel of land; and
12	(4) If the request is for a variance to allow construction of the lowest floor of a new building,
13	or substantial improvement of a building, below the required elevation, a copy in the
14	record of a written notice from the Floodplain Administrator to the applicant for the
15	variance, specifying the difference between the base flood elevation and the proposed
16	elevation of the lowest floor, stating that the cost of federal flood insurance will be
17	commensurate with the increased risk resulting from the reduced floor elevation (up to
18	amounts as high as \$25 for \$100 of insurance coverage), and stating that construction
19	below the base flood elevation increases risks to life and property.
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21	DIVISION 8 VIOLATIONS
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23	48-169 Violations. Any development that is not within the scope of the Florida Building Code
24	but that is regulated by this ordinance that is performed without an issued permit, that is in
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conflict with an issued permit, or that does not fully comply with this ordinance, shall be deemed 1 a violation of this ordinance. A building or structure without the documentation of elevation of the lowest floor, other required design certifications, or other evidence of compliance required 3 4 by this ordinance or the Florida Building Code is presumed to be a violation until such time as that documentation is provided. 5

48-170 Authority. For development that is not within the scope of the *Florida Building Code* 7 but that is regulated by this ordinance and that is determined to be a violation, the Floodplain 8 9 Administrator is authorized to serve notices of violation or stop work orders to owners of the property involved, to the owner's agent, or to the person or persons performing the work. 10

48-171 Unlawful continuance. Any person who shall continue any work after having been served with a notice of violation or a stop work order, except such work as that person is directed to perform to remove or remedy a violation or unsafe condition, shall be subject to penalties as prescribed by law.

DIVISION 9 DEFINITIONS

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48-172 Scope. Unless otherwise expressly stated, the following words and terms shall, for the purposes of this ordinance, have the meanings shown in this section.

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22 48-173 Terms defined in the Florida Building Code. Where terms are not defined in this ordinance and are defined in the Florida Building Code, such terms shall have the meanings 23 ascribed to them in that code. 24

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48-174 Terms not defined. Where terms are not defined in this ordinance or the Florida Building Code, such terms shall have ordinarily accepted meanings such as the context implies.

Alteration of a watercourse. A dam, impoundment, channel relocation, change in channel 6 alignment, channelization, or change in cross-sectional area of the channel or the channel 7 capacity, or any other form of modification which may alter, impede, retard or change the 8 9 direction and/or velocity of the riverine flow of water during conditions of the base flood.

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Appeal. A request for a review of the Floodplain Administrator's interpretation of any provision of this ordinance.

ASCE 24. A standard titled *Flood Resistant Design and Construction* that is referenced by the Florida Building Code. ASCE 24 is developed and published by the American Society of Civil Engineers, Reston, VA. 16

Base flood. A flood having a 1-percent chance of being equaled or exceeded in any given year. [Also defined in FBC, B, Section 202.] The base flood is commonly referred to as the "100-year flood" or the "1-percent-annual chance flood."

22 Base flood elevation. The elevation of the base flood, including wave height, relative to the National Geodetic Vertical Datum (NGVD), North American Vertical Datum (NAVD) or other 23

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datum specified on the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM). [Also defined in FBC, B, Section
 202.]

Basement. The portion of a building having its floor subgrade (below ground level) on all sides. [Also defined in FBC, B, Section 202; see "Basement (for flood loads)".]

Design flood. The flood associated with the greater of the following two areas: [Also defined in FBC, B, Section 202.]

(1) Area with a floodplain subject to a 1-percent or greater chance of flooding in any year; or
 (2) Area designated as a flood hazard area on the community's flood hazard map, or
 otherwise legally designated.

Design flood elevation. The elevation of the "design flood," including wave height, relative to the datum specified on the community's legally designated flood hazard map. In areas designated as Zone AO, the design flood elevation shall be the elevation of the highest existing grade of the building's perimeter plus the depth number (in feet) specified on the flood hazard map. In areas designated as Zone AO where the depth number is not specified on the map, the depth number shall be taken as being equal to 2 feet. [Also defined in FBC, B, Section 202.]

Development. Any man-made change to improved or unimproved real estate, including but not
 limited to, buildings or other structures, tanks, temporary structures, temporary or permanent
 storage of equipment or materials, mining, dredging, filling, grading, paving, excavations, drilling
 operations or any other land disturbing activities.

Encroachment. The placement of fill, excavation, buildings, permanent structures or other
 development into a flood hazard area which may impede or alter the flow capacity of riverine
 flood hazard areas.

Existing building and existing structure. Any buildings and structures for which the "start of
 construction" commenced before September 5, 1978. [Also defined in FBC, B, Section 202.]

Existing manufactured home park or subdivision. A manufactured home park or subdivision for which the construction of facilities for servicing the lots on which the manufactured homes are to be affixed (including, at a minimum, the installation of utilities, the construction of streets, and either final site grading or the pouring of concrete pads) is completed before September 5, 1978.

Expansion to an existing manufactured home park or subdivision. The preparation of
 additional sites by the construction of facilities for servicing the lots on which the manufactured
 homes are to be affixed (including the installation of utilities, the construction of streets, and
 either final site grading or the pouring of concrete pads).

Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). The federal agency that, in addition to carrying out other functions, administers the National Flood Insurance Program.

Flood or flooding. A general and temporary condition of partial or complete inundation of
 normally dry land from: [Also defined in FBC, B, Section 202.]

(1) The overflow of inland or tidal waters.

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(2) The unusual and rapid accumulation or runoff of surface waters from any source.

Flood damage-resistant materials. Any construction material capable of withstanding direct and prolonged contact with floodwaters without sustaining any damage that requires more than cosmetic repair. [Also defined in FBC, B, Section 202.]

Flood hazard area. The greater of the following two areas: [Also defined in FBC, B, Section 202.]

(1) The area within a floodplain subject to a 1-percent or greater chance of flooding in any vear.

(2) The area designated as a flood hazard area on the community's flood hazard map, or otherwise legally designated.

14 Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM). The official map of the community on which the Federal Emergency Management Agency has delineated both special flood hazard areas and the 15 risk premium zones applicable to the community. [Also defined in FBC, B, Section 202.] 16

Flood Insurance Study (FIS). The official report provided by the Federal Emergency Management Agency that contains the Flood Insurance Rate Map, the Flood Boundary and Floodway Map (if applicable), the water surface elevations of the base flood, and supporting technical data. [Also defined in FBC, B, Section 202.]

Floodplain Administrator. The office or position designated and charged with the
 administration and enforcement of this ordinance (may be referred to as the Floodplain
 Manager).

Floodplain development permit or approval. An official document or certificate issued by the
 community, or other evidence of approval or concurrence, which authorizes performance of
 specific development activities that are located in flood hazard areas and that are determined to
 be compliant with this ordinance.

Floodway. The channel of a river or other riverine watercourse and the adjacent land areas
that must be reserved in order to discharge the base flood without cumulatively increasing the
water surface elevation more than one (1) foot. [Also defined in FBC, B, Section 202.]

Floodway encroachment analysis. An engineering analysis of the impact that a proposed
encroachment into a floodway is expected to have on the floodway boundaries and base flood
elevations; the evaluation shall be prepared by a qualified Florida licensed engineer using
standard engineering methods and models.

Florida Building Code. The family of codes adopted by the Florida Building Commission,
including: *Florida Building Code, Building; Florida Building Code, Residential; Florida Building Code, Existing Building; Florida Building Code, Mechanical; Florida Building Code, Plumbing; Florida Building Code, Fuel Gas.*

Functionally dependent use. A use which cannot perform its intended purpose unless it is
 located or carried out in close proximity to water, including only docking facilities, port facilities
 that are necessary for the loading and unloading of cargo or passengers, and ship building and
 ship repair facilities; the term does not include long-term storage or related manufacturing
 facilities.

Highest adjacent grade. The highest natural elevation of the ground surface prior to
 construction next to the proposed walls or foundation of a structure.

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Historic structure. Any structure that is determined eligible for the exception to the flood
 hazard area requirements of the *Florida Building Code, Existing Building*, Chapter 12 Historic
 Buildings.

Letter of Map Change (LOMC). An official determination issued by FEMA that amends or
 revises an effective Flood Insurance Rate Map or Flood Insurance Study. Letters of Map
 Change include:

Letter of Map Amendment (LOMA): An amendment based on technical data showing that a property was incorrectly included in a designated special flood hazard area. A LOMA amends the current effective Flood Insurance Rate Map and establishes that a specific property, portion of a property, or structure is not located in a special flood hazard area.

Letter of Map Revision (LOMR): A revision based on technical data that may show changes to flood zones, flood elevations, special flood hazard area boundaries and floodway delineations, and other planimetric features.

Letter of Map Revision Based on Fill (LOMR-F): A determination that a structure or parcel of land has been elevated by fill above the base flood elevation and is, therefore, no longer located within the special flood hazard area. In order to qualify for this determination, the fill must have been permitted and placed in accordance with the community's floodplain management regulations.

<u>Conditional Letter of Map Revision (CLOMR)</u>: A formal review and comment as to whether a proposed flood protection project or other project complies with the minimum NFIP requirements for such projects with respect to delineation of special flood hazard areas. A CLOMR does not revise the effective Flood Insurance Rate Map or Flood Insurance Study; upon submission and approval of certified as-built documentation, a Letter of Map Revision may be issued by FEMA to revise the effective FIRM.

Light-duty truck. As defined in 40 C.F.R. 86.082-2, any motor vehicle rated at 8,500 pounds Gross Vehicular Weight Rating or less which has a vehicular curb weight of 6,000 pounds or less and which has a basic vehicle frontal area of 45 square feet or less, which is:

 Designed primarily for purposes of transportation of property or is a derivation of such a vehicle, or

(2) Designed primarily for transportation of persons and has a capacity of more than 12 persons; or

(3) Available with special features enabling off-street or off-highway operation and use.

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Lowest floor. The lowest floor of the lowest enclosed area of a building or structure, including basement, but excluding any unfinished or flood-resistant enclosure, other than a basement,

usable solely for vehicle parking, building access or limited storage provided that such
 enclosure is not built so as to render the structure in violation of the non-elevation requirements
 of the *Florida Building Code* or ASCE 24. [Also defined in FBC, B, Section 202.]

Manufactured home. A structure, transportable in one or more sections, which is eight (8) feet
or more in width and greater than four hundred (400) square feet, and which is built on a
permanent, integral chassis and is designed for use with or without a permanent foundation
when attached to the required utilities. The term "manufactured home" does not include a
"recreational vehicle" or "park trailer." [Also defined in 15C-1.0101, F.A.C.]

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Manufactured home park or subdivision. A parcel (or contiguous parcels) of land divided into two or more manufactured home lots for rent or sale.

Market value. The price at which a property will change hands between a willing buyer and a willing seller, neither party being under compulsion to buy or sell and both having reasonable knowledge of relevant facts. As used in this ordinance, the term refers to the market value of buildings and structures, excluding the land and other improvements on the parcel. Market value may be established by a qualified independent appraiser, Actual Cash Value (replacement cost depreciated for age and quality of construction), or tax assessment value adjusted to approximate market value by a factor provided by the Property Appraiser.

New construction. For the purposes of administration of this ordinance and the flood resistant construction requirements of the *Florida Building Code*, structures for which the "start of

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construction" commenced on or after September 5, 1978 and includes any subsequent
 improvements to such structures.

New manufactured home park or subdivision. A manufactured home park or subdivision for which the construction of facilities for servicing the lots on which the manufactured homes are to be affixed (including at a minimum, the installation of utilities, the construction of streets, and either final site grading or the pouring of concrete pads) is completed on or after September 5, 1978.

Park trailer. A transportable unit which has a body width not exceeding fourteen (14) feet and
 which is built on a single chassis and is designed to provide seasonal or temporary living
 quarters when connected to utilities necessary for operation of installed fixtures and appliances.
 [Defined in section 320.01, F.S.]

Recreational vehicle. A vehicle, including a park trailer, which is: [see in section 320.01, F.S.)

(1) Built on a single chassis;

(2) Four hundred (400) square feet or less when measured at the largest horizontal projection;

(3) Designed to be self-propelled or permanently towable by a light-duty truck; and

(4) Designed primarily not for use as a permanent dwelling but as temporary living quarters for recreational, camping, travel, or seasonal use.

Special flood hazard area. An area in the floodplain subject to a 1 percent or greater chance of
 flooding in any given year. Special flood hazard areas are shown on FIRMs as Zone A, AO,
 A1-A30, AE, A99, AH, V1-V30, VE or V. [Also defined in FBC, B Section 202.]

Start of construction. The date of issuance of permits for new construction and substantial improvements, provided the actual start of construction, repair, reconstruction, rehabilitation, addition, placement, or other improvement is within 180 days of the date of the issuance. The actual start of construction means either the first placement of permanent construction of a building (including a manufactured home) on a site, such as the pouring of slab or footings, the installation of piles, the construction of columns.

Permanent construction does not include land preparation (such as clearing, grading, or filling), the installation of streets or walkways, excavation for a basement, footings, piers, or foundations, the erection of temporary forms or the installation of accessory buildings such as garages or sheds not occupied as dwelling units or not part of the main buildings. For a substantial improvement, the actual "start of construction" means the first alteration of any wall, ceiling, floor or other structural part of a building, whether or not that alteration affects the external dimensions of the building. [Also defined in FBC, B Section 202.]

Substantial damage. Damage of any origin sustained by a building or structure whereby the cost of restoring the building or structure to its before-damaged condition would equal or exceed
50 percent of the market value of the building or structure before the damage occurred. [Also defined in FBC, B Section 202.]

1 Substantial improvement. Any repair, reconstruction, rehabilitation, addition, or other improvement of a building or structure, the cost of which equals or exceeds 50 percent of the 2 market value of the building or structure before the improvement or repair is started. If the 3 4 structure has incurred "substantial damage," any repairs are considered substantial improvement regardless of the actual repair work performed. The term does not, however, 5 include either: [Also defined in FBC, B, Section 202.] 6 (1) Any project for improvement of a building required to correct existing health, sanitary, or 7 safety code violations identified by the building official and that are the minimum 8 9 necessary to assure safe living conditions. (2) Any alteration of a historic structure provided the alteration will not preclude the 10 structure's continued designation as a historic structure. 11 12 Variance. A grant of relief from the requirements of this ordinance, or the flood resistant 13 14 construction requirements of the Florida Building Code, which permits construction in a manner that would not otherwise be permitted by this ordinance or the *Florida Building Code*. 15 16 17 Watercourse. A river, creek, stream, channel or other topographic feature in, on, through, or over which water flows at least periodically. 18 19 **DIVISION 10 BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES** 20 21 22 48-175 Design and construction of buildings, structures and facilities exempt from the Florida Building Code. Pursuant to Section 48-145 of this ordinance, buildings, structures, and 23 facilities that are exempt from the Florida Building Code, including substantial improvement or repair 24 25

1 of substantial damage of such buildings, structures and facilities, shall be designed and constructed in accordance with the flood load and flood resistant construction requirements of ASCE 24. 2 Structures exempt from the Florida Building Code that are not walled and roofed buildings shall 3 4 comply with the requirements of Division 16 of this ordinance. 5 **DIVISION 11 SUBDIVISIONS** 6 7 48-176 Minimum requirements. 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1 **48-180 Water supply facilities.** All new and replacement water supply facilities shall be designed in accordance with the water well construction standards in Chapter 62-532.500, 2 F.A.C. and ASCE 24 Chapter 7 to minimize or eliminate infiltration of floodwaters into the 3 4 systems.

48-181 Limitations on sites in regulatory floodways. No development, including but not 6 limited to site improvements, and land disturbing activity involving fill or regrading, shall be authorized in the regulatory floodway unless the floodway encroachment analysis required in 9 Section 48-153(1) of this ordinance demonstrates that the proposed development or land disturbing activity will not result in any increase in the base flood elevation. 10

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48-182 Limitations on placement of fill. Subject to the limitations of this ordinance, fill shall be designed to be stable under conditions of flooding including rapid rise and rapid drawdown of floodwaters, prolonged inundation, and protection against flood-related erosion and scour. In addition to these requirements, if intended to support buildings and structures (Zone A only), fill shall comply with the requirements of the Florida Building Code.

DIVISION 13 MANUFACTURED HOMES

48-183 General. All manufactured homes installed in flood hazard areas shall be installed by an installer that is licensed pursuant to section 320.8249, F.S., and shall comply with the requirements of Chapter 15C-1, F.A.C. and the requirements of this ordinance.

1 48-184 Foundations. All new manufactured homes and replacement manufactured homes installed in flood hazard areas shall be installed on permanent, reinforced foundations that are 2 designed in accordance with the foundation requirements of the Florida Building Code 3 4 Residential Section R322.2 and this ordinance. Foundations for manufactured homes subject to Section 48-188 of this ordinance are permitted to be reinforced piers or other foundation 5 elements of at least equivalent strength. 6

48-185 Anchoring. All new manufactured homes and replacement manufactured homes shall 9 be installed using methods and practices which minimize flood damage and shall be securely 10 anchored to an adequately anchored foundation system to resist flotation, collapse or lateral movement. Methods of anchoring include, but are not limited to, use of over-the-top or frame 11 ties to ground anchors. This anchoring requirement is in addition to applicable state and local 12 anchoring requirements for wind resistance. 13

48-186 Elevation. Manufactured homes that are placed, replaced, or substantially improved shall comply with Section 48-187 or 48-188 of this ordinance, as applicable.

48-187 General elevation requirement. Unless subject to the requirements of Section 48-188 of this ordinance, all manufactured homes that are placed, replaced, or substantially improved on sites located: (a) outside of a manufactured home park or subdivision; (b) in a new manufactured home park or subdivision: (c) in an expansion to an existing manufactured home park or subdivision; or (d) in an existing manufactured home park or subdivision upon which a manufactured home has incurred "substantial damage" as the result of a flood, shall be elevated

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1 such that the bottom of the frame is at or above the elevation required, as applicable to the flood hazard area, in the Florida Building Code, Residential Section R322.2 (Zone A). 2 3 4 48-188 Elevation requirement for certain existing manufactured home parks and 5 subdivisions. 1 **DIVISION 14 RECREATIONAL VEHICLES AND PARK TRAILERS**

48-191 Temporary placement. Recreational vehicles and park trailers placed temporarily in flood hazard areas shall:

(1) Be on the site for fewer than 180 consecutive days; or

(2) Be fully licensed and ready for highway use, which means the recreational vehicle or park model is on wheels or jacking system, is attached to the site only by quickdisconnect type utilities and security devices, and has no permanent attachments such as additions, rooms, stairs, decks and porches.

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48-192 Permanent placement. Recreational vehicles and park trailers that do not meet the limitations in Section 48-191 of this ordinance for temporary placement shall meet the requirements of Division 13 of this ordinance for manufactured homes. 13

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DIVISION 15 TANKS

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48-192 Underground tanks. Underground tanks in flood hazard areas shall be anchored to prevent flotation, collapse or lateral movement resulting from hydrodynamic and hydrostatic loads during conditions of the design flood, including the effects of buoyancy assuming the tank 19 20 is empty.

48-193 Above-ground tanks, not elevated. Above-ground tanks that do not meet the 21 22 elevation requirements of Section 48-194 of this ordinance shall be permitted in flood hazard areas provided the tanks are anchored or otherwise designed and constructed to prevent 23 flotation, collapse or lateral movement resulting from hydrodynamic and hydrostatic loads during 24

conditions of the design flood, including the effects of buoyancy assuming the tank is empty and
 the effects of flood-borne debris.

48-194 Above-ground tanks, elevated. Above-ground tanks in flood hazard areas shall be attached to and elevated to or above the design flood elevation on a supporting structure that is designed to prevent flotation, collapse or lateral movement during conditions of the design flood. Tank-supporting structures shall meet the foundation requirements of the applicable flood hazard area.

48-195 Tank inlets and vents. Tank inlets, fill openings, outlets and vents shall be:

(1) At or above the design flood elevation or fitted with covers designed to prevent the inflow of floodwater or outflow of the contents of the tanks during conditions of the design flood; and

(2) Anchored to prevent lateral movement resulting from hydrodynamic and hydrostatic loads, including the effects of buoyancy, during conditions of the design flood.

DIVISION 16 OTHER DEVELOPMENT

48-196 General requirements for other development. All development, including man-made changes to improved or unimproved real estate for which specific provisions are not specified in this ordinance or the *Florida Building Code*, shall:

(1) Be located and constructed to minimize flood damage;

(2) Meet the limitations of Section 48-181 of this ordinance if located in a regulated floodway;

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(3) Be anchored to prevent flotation, collapse or lateral movement resulting from hydrostatic loads, including the effects of buoyancy, during conditions of the design flood;

(4) Be constructed of flood damage-resistant materials; and

(5) Have mechanical, plumbing, and electrical systems above the design flood elevation or meet the requirements of ASCE 24, except that minimum electric service required to address life safety and electric code requirements is permitted below the design flood elevation provided it conforms to the provisions of the electrical part of building code for wet locations.

48-197 Fences in regulated floodways. Fences in regulated floodways that have the potential to block the passage of floodwaters, such as stockade fences and wire mesh fences, shall meet the limitations of Section 48-181 of this ordinance.

48-1983 Retaining walls, sidewalks and driveways in regulated floodways. Retaining walls and sidewalks and driveways that involve the placement of fill in regulated floodways shall meet the limitations of Section 48-181 of this ordinance.

48-199 Roads and watercourse crossings in regulated floodways. Roads and watercourse crossings, including roads, bridges, culverts, low-water crossings and similar means for vehicles or pedestrians to travel from one side of a watercourse to the other side, that encroach into regulated floodways shall meet the limitations of Section 48-181 of this ordinance. Alteration of a watercourse that is part of a road or watercourse crossing shall meet the requirements of Section 48-153(3) of this ordinance.

SECTION 5. FISCAL IMPACT STATEMENT. 8

In terms of design, plan application review, construction and inspection of buildings and 9 structures, the cost impact as an overall average is negligible in regard to the local 10 technical amendments because all development has been subject to the requirements 11 of the local floodplain management ordinance adopted for participation in the National 12 Flood Insurance Program. In terms of lower potential for flood damage, there will be 13 continued savings and benefits to consumers. 14

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SECTION 6. APPLICABILITY.

For the purposes of jurisdictional applicability, this ordinance shall apply in the City of Belle Isle, FL. This ordinance shall apply to all applications for development, including building permit applications and subdivision proposals, submitted on or after the effective date of this ordinance.

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SECTION 7. INCLUSION INTO THE CODE OF ORDINANCES. 22

It is the intent of the **City Council** that the provisions of this ordinance shall become and be 23 made a part of the City of Belle Isle, FL Code of Ordinances, and that the sections of this 24



CITY GOVERNMENT



CITY COUNCIL: City Council acts as the governing body of the City. Council consists of seven elected Commissioners who are elected at large and serve threeyear terms without compensation. The Council establishes policies and programs and appropriates funds for each City

service function. Council approves all ordinances, resolutions and contracts, reviews proposals for community needs, initiates actions for new programs and determines the level of funding for City services and facilities.

Council holds regular public meetings on the first and third Tuesdays of each month at 6:30 p.m. at City Hall.

MAYOR: There shall be an elected mayor who shall be the "head of state" of the City of Belle Isle and shall have such duties and powers as are specified under the charter or as may be required by the City Council. The mayor presides over all council meetings and shall have the right to take part in discussion but may not vote.

CITY ADMINISTRATION

<u>CITY ADMINISTRATION</u>: City administration operates out of City Hall at 1600 Nela Avenue, Belle Isle, FL 32809.

According to the charter, Sec 3.10(c), Council cannot interfere with administration. This includes the hiring and firing of City employees, and directing City employees publicly or privately. These prohibitions are not put in place to prevent Council members from assisting operations. Instead, the hope is that this will encourage Council members to direct recommendations for improvement toward the City Manager so the City Manager can coordinate efforts of all City departments effectively.

CITY MANAGER: The City Manager is appointed by City Council to act as the Chief Administrative Officer of the City of Belle Isle. The City Manager keeps the Council fully informed as to the financial condition of the City and future needs. The City Manager also staffs City Hall, directs and supervises City departments, enforces laws and provisions of the Council, prepares and submits the annual budget.

CITY CLERK: The City Clerk is appointed by the Council and is responsible for safeguarding public records, preparing Council meeting agendas and minutes, and processing ordinances, resolutions and contracts. The City Clerk is also responsible for coordinating municipal elections.

<u>CITY ATTORNEY</u>: The City Attorney is appointed by the Council to serve as its chief legal adviser. The Attorney represents the City in all legal proceedings as directed by the Council.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT: The Finance Department is responsible for all accounting, financing, purchasing and treasury activities for the City.

CODE ENFORCEMENT DEPARTMENT: The Code Enforcement Department promotes and maintains a desirable living and working environment for the citizens of Belle Isle by enforcing compliance with Council-approved City ordinances. The department's Code Enforcement Officer strives to educate and communicate openly with residents. Code violators are provided time to correct violations. A Code Enforcement Magistrate conducts hearings for violations that are not corrected in due time. Magistrate hearings are held the first Monday of each month at 10:00 a.m. at City Hall. (Meetings can be cancelled or rescheduled any time due to unforeseen circumstances)

PLANNING AND ZONING DEPARTMENT: The Planning and Zoning Department ensures that the quality of life in Belle Isle is maintained and enhanced by providing vision, fostering good design and guiding development. The department administers the Land Development Code and provides information about the zoning codes to residents, property owners and business owners. The department serves as the liaison to the Planning and Zoning Board, as well as to the mayor and council.

BUILDING DEPARTMENT: The Building Department is responsible for the processing and inspection of any projects requiring a zoning permit. The department works closely with Universal Engineering to process any projects requiring a building permit.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT: The Public Works Department maintains a quality environment for the city. Public Works employees perform many important functions that directly affect residents' health and safety.

POLICE DEPARTMENT: The Belle Isle Police Department was established in 2009. The Police Department works in partnership with the community to enhance and protect citizens' quality of life through dedicated professional law enforcement. The department is not only responsible for keeping residents safe on land, but also during recreation on Lake Conway.



The purpose of this overview is to provide you with information about the City of Belle Isle and to introduce you to your city government. It is provided to you with hopes that your experience will become positive and productive as a result.

CITY OF BELLE ISLE POLICY OF CIVIL CONDUCT

1. Code of Civility

A community grows only through partnership, and among the partners must be the community and Mayor, City Council and City employees. Partnership is an active state that includes sharing responsibilities, meaningful communication and welcomed participation.

When people who are working together agree, the partnership runs smoothly. No two people will always agree and that can make a partnership difficult. The partnership is most powerful - when we agree on how to disagree. We must be civil in our discourse.

Civility is often described by its absence. We hear of harmful actions such as road rage, physical confrontation, ethnic stereotypes, and slurs. But civility is not just an absence of harm, it is the affirmation of what is best about each of us individually and collectively. It is more than saying "please" and "thank you." It is reflecting our respect for others in our behavior, regardless of whether we know or like them. It also is not simply being politically correct and is not to be used to stifle criticism or comment. It is being truthful and kind and is each of us taking responsibility for our own actions rather than blaming others.

Therefore, the City of Belle Isle requires that as we communicate, the Mayor, City Council members, City employees and all other members of the community shall:

- 1. Treat each other with courtesy and respect at all times. This means that:
- ο We listen carefully and respectfully as others express opinions that may be different from ours.
- We share our opinions and concerns without loud or 0 offensive language, gestures or profanity.

2. Treat each other with kindness.

This means that:

- 0 We treat each other as we would like to be treated.
- We do not threaten or cause physical or bodily harm to 0 another.
- We do not threaten or cause damage to the property of 0 another.
- ο We do not bully, belittle or tease another and we do not allow others to do so in our presence.
- We do not demean and are not abusive or obscene in ο any of our communications.

3. Take responsibility for our own actions. This means that:

- 0 We share information honestly.
- We refrain from displays of temper. 0
- We do not disrupt or attempt to interfere with the 0 operation of the City.

4. Cooperate with one another.

This means that:

- 0 We respect the legitimate obligations and time constraints we each face.
- We notify each other when we have information that 0 might help reach our common goal.
- 0 We respond when asked for assistance.
- 0 We understand that we do not always get our way.

5. As we communicate with each other, remember that we are working together to improve our community.



2. Authority and Enforcement of the **Code of Civility**

- If personal harm is threatened, the employee may contact • law enforcement.
- Anyone on City premises without authorization may be • directed to leave the premises by a City employee or police officer. Anyone who threatens or attempts to disrupt City operations, physically harm someone, intentionally cause damage, uses loud or offensive language, gestures, profanity or shows a display of temper may be directed to leave the premises by a City employee or police officer.
- If such person does not immediately and willingly leave, law enforcement shall be called if not already present.
- If a telephone call recorded by an answering machine, • email, voice mail message or any type of written communication is demeaning, abusive, threatening or obscene the employee is not obligated to respond.
- If personal harm is threatened, the employee may contact law enforcement.
- The employee shall save the message and contact his or her • immediate supervisor.

If any member of the public uses obscenities or speaks in a demeaning, loud or insulting manner, the employee to whom the remarks are directed shall take the following actions:

Calmly and politely ask the speaker to communicate civilly. a.

- If the verbal abuse continues, give appropriate notice to the
- b. speaker and terminate the meeting, conference or telephone conversation.
- c. If the meeting or conference is on school district premises, request that an administrator or authorized person direct the speaker promptly to leave the premises.
- d. If the speaker does not immediately leave the premises, an administrator or other authorized person shall notify law enforcement to take any action deemed necessary.

ROSENBERG'S RULES OF ORDER AT A GLANCE

THE THREE BASIC MOTIONS:

Simple majority to pass / open to debate.

- Basic Motion: "I move that we..."
- . Motion to Amend: suggests changes to the basic motion.
- Motion to Substitute: replaces the basic motion entirely.

SPECIAL MOTIONS

Simple majority to pass / no debate, goes directly to vote.

- Motion to Adjourn: ends the meeting.
- . Motion to Fix a Time to Adjourn: ends the meeting at a set time.
- . Motion to Recess: break in the meeting. Chair sets length of the break.
- Motion to Table: defers the motion under discussion to a future date.

MOTIONS THAT PERMANENTLY CLOSE DISCUSSION

2/3 majority to pass / no debate, goes directly to vote.

- Motion to Limit Debate: stops debate. "I move the question."
- Motion to Close Nominations: stops new nominations for a position.
- . Motion to Object to the Consideration of a Question: rare, stronger form of tabling. Used before debate has begun.
- Motion to Suspend the Rules: temporarily changes meeting rules. Cannot be used to suspend non-parliamentary bylaws. Can be debated.

MEETING INTERRUPTIONS

May be used at any time. Chair responds by asking you to state your point.

- Point of Privilege: points out uncomfortable surroundings, like a cold room or being unable to hear a speaker.
- Point of Order: points out failure to follow correct meeting procedures.
- Call for Orders of the Day: points out that the discussion has strayed from the agenda.
- ٠ Appeal: reverses a Chair's ruling when passed by simple majority. Requires a second and can be debated.
- Withdraw a Motion: used by the person making the motion. Others may immediately reintroduce the motion if they wish.

MOTION TO RECONSIDER

- . Simple majority to pass / open to debate.
- May only be made by a member who previously voted in the majority for the item.
- Must be made during the same meeting (or at the very next meeting, assuming it's been added to the agenda).
