SPECIAL PRESENTATIONS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

1. Receive an update from TxDOT on current highway construction projects ~ Eastland Area Engineer

Jordan Perry addressed the Commission to give an update on construction on US Highway 183. The current contractor has not worked on several occasions. This has put the project behind schedule. It was originally an 18-month project. Currently, the plan shows a completion approximation of April 2023.

2. Consider approval of the May 3, 2022, Regular Commission meeting minutes as recorded.

- 3. Consider approval of Resolution 2022-18 to suspend the June 17, 2022 effective date of Oncor Electric delivery company's requested rate change to permit the city time to study the request and to establish reasonable rates; approving cooperation with the steering committee of cities served by Oncor to hire legal and consulting services and to negotiate with the company and direct any necessary litigation and appeals.

Motion made to approve consent agenda items 2,3,4, and 6 as presented by Commissioner Durham, Seconded by Commissioner Mercer. **The motion passed 5-0.**

PUBLIC HEARING ITEMS

7. Public hearing and consider approval of Ordinance 2022-08 providing for a Specific Use Permit for the placement of a tiny house in a General Dwelling ("R4") District on property commonly known as 509 N. Shelton Street.

Public Hearing opened at 5:52 p.m.

Public Hearing Closed at 5:52 p.m.

City Manager McComis stated this item was approved by Planning and Zoning Committee in October of 2020. However, it was never brought before Commission to be approved by ordinance.

Motion made to approve Ordinance 2022-08 as presented by Mayor Pro Tem Moore, Seconded by Commissioner Durham. **The motion passed 5-0.**

ACTION ITEMS

5. Conduct approval of a recommendation from the Breckenridge Planning and Zoning Commission to approve a request to vacate the Popular Buildings Plat, filed in Cabinet 1, Page 116 of the Plat Records of Stephens County, Texas.

City Manager McComis stated this was a request by Mike Griffith to vacate a plat he filed to convert into apartments. It will be reverted to the regular plat. The request was approved by Planning and Zoning commission as is.

Motion made to approve Planning and Zoning commission recommendation to vacate the Popular Buildings Plat, filed in Cabinet 1, Page 115 of the Plat Records of Stephens County, Texas by Commissioner Mercer, Seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Moore.

The motion passed 5-0

8. Discuss and consider the adoption of Ordinance 2022-09 authorizing the issuance of City of Breckenridge, Texas Combination Tax and Surplus Revenue Certificates of Obligation, Series 2022A, in the principal amount of \$2,935,000 and awarding the sale of such Certificates of Obligation to the Texas Water Development Board.

City Manager advised Commission that items 8-12 are all similar items. Items 8 and 9 are in reference to wastewater. Eric Macha with Hilltop addressed Commission and explained that last year the City of Breckenridge applied for funding through the Texas Water Development Board. In total city received \$4,162,420. In funding. This will be broken down into three amounts. \$1,020,00.00 in a 0% loan. \$1,915,000 will carry a subsidized interest rate and \$1,227,420 in Principal Forgiveness grant money. By doing this, the City has saved \$3,413,060 in principal interest payments. The first payment will be due in 2024, with the final payment in 2053. Eric stated that action item 8 would approve the loan portion and action item 9 would approve the Grant. Closing will be on July 13, 2022.

Motion made to approve Ordinance 2022-09 as presented by Commissioner Durham, Seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Moore. **The motion passed 5-0.**

- 9. Discuss and consider adoption of Resolution 2022-19 approving the execution and delivery of a Principal Forgiveness Agreement for sewer system improvements; and resolving other matters relating to the subject.
 - Motion made to approve Resolution 2022-19 as presented by Mayor Pro Tem Moore, Seconded by Commissioner Mercer. **The motion passed 5-0.**
- 10. Discuss and consider adoption of Ordinance 2022-10 authorizing the issuance of City of Breckenridge, Texas Combination Tax and Surplus Revenue Certificates of Obligation, Series 2022B, in the principal amount of \$2,325,000 and awarding the sale of such Certificates of Obligation to the Texas Water Development Board.

Eric Macha with Hilltop stated to the Commission that Items number 10 and 11 are in reference to drinking water. The City will receive a total of \$3,637,809.00 in funding. This is broken down into three payments. \$1,0202,000.00 as a zero percent loan, \$1,3005,000 that will have a subsidized interest rate, and \$1,312,809 in Principal Forgiveness grant money. The City is saving an estimated \$3,336,835 in principal interest payments. This will have a July 13, 2022, closing date. The first payment will be due in 2024, with the final payment being in 2053.

Motion made to approve Ordinance 2022-10 as presented by Commissioner Mercer, Seconded by Commissioner Durham. **The motion passed 5-0.**

11. Discuss and consider adoption of Resolution 2022-20 approving the execution and delivery of a Principal Forgiveness Agreement for water system improvements; and resolving other matters relating to the subject.

Motion made to approve Resolution 2022-20 as presented by Commissioner Mercer, Seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Moore. **The motion passed 5-0.**

12. Discuss and consider adoption of Resolution 2022-21 authorizing and directing establishment of four construction accounts and a sinking fund with Depository Bank pursuant to Bond Ordinances and Principal Forgiveness Agreements with the Texas Water Development Board; appointing authorized signatories with respect to such accounts; and resolving other matters relating to the subject.

City Manager explained that we must have four different bank accounts for each of the clean water and Drinking Water funds payments.

Motion made to approve Resolution 2022-21 as presented by Mayor Pro Tem Moore, Seconded by Commissioner Mercer. **The motion passed 5-0.**

13. Discuss and consider approval of Resolution 2022-22 authorizing the submission of an application to the Texas Community Development Block Grant Program-2022 Downtown Revitalization Program and authorizing the Mayor and City Manager as authorized representatives.

Ken Coignet with Public Management addressed Commission, stating that action items 13 and 14 are regarding the City's application for the Downtown Revitalization Grant Program previously discussed. The City is applying for \$500,000.00, with \$75,000 being paid by the City. The application is due July 8, 2022, and will not be awarded until late 2022. Therefore, payment will not be made until the next fiscal year.

Motion made to approve Resolution 2022-22 as presented by Mayor Pro Tem Moore, Seconded by Commissioner Durham. **The motion passed 5-0.**

14. Discuss and consider approval of Resolution 2022-23 determining that an area of the downtown contains conditions that are detrimental to the community and constitute a slum and blighted area for the 2022 Downtown Revitalization Program grant application.

Ken Coignet explained that as part of receiving the 2022 Downtown Revitalization Grant the City is required to designate an area of the City as having conditions of slum and blight. The area being designated currently has cracked sidewalks and is not currently ADA compliant. The Grant will provide updated sidewalks and ramps.

Motion made to approve Resolution 2022-23 as presented by Commissioner Mercer, Seconded by Commissioner Akers. **The motion passed 5-0.**

15. Discuss and consider awarding a bid for the revamp of the existing prison lift station and authorize the Mayor to execute all necessary documents on behalf of the City.

Sage Diller with EHT stated lift station 4, which services the prison, was put into service in 1993 and is currently a self-priming pump configuration. This lift station has created many problematic issues in the past few years, requiring maintenance. Two Request or proposal (RFP) type proposals were generated. RFP 1 retrofits Lift Station 4 from a self-priming pump configuration to a submersible pump configuration, including all necessary piping and valve modification. This type is easier to service and maintain. RFP 2 is to replace the current pump with a like configuration. Proposals were open on June 3, 2022. Three (3) submissions were received for RFP 1. Dowtech specialty Contractors submitted the lowest cost bid in the amount of \$264,434.00. Two (2) proposals were received for RFP 2. The Lowest proposal was from Patterson Professional Services in the amount of \$187,425.00. The recommendation was made for RFP 1 to Dowtech Specialty Contractors.

Motion made to award a bid to Dowtech Specialty Contractors and authorize the Mayor to execute all necessary documents on behalf of the City by Commissioner Durham, Seconded by Commissioner Mercer. **The motion passed 5-0.**

16. Discuss and consider approval of Ordinance 2022-11 amending Chapter 20, "Traffic", of the Breckenridge Code of Ordinances by adding Article VII, "Motorized Carts"; allowing for the use of motorized carts on authorized streets within the City and establishing regulations concerning the operation of motorized carts.

Ericka McComis stated that the police department had received multiple requests from citizens requesting to use motorized carts on city streets. Research was completed to determine a way this could be done. Captain Jay Walker stated that resident's motorized carts would need to be insured, have headlights, taillights, be a licensed driver, and only allowed on city streets.

Motion made to deny Ordinance 2022-11 as presented by Commissioner Akers, Seconded by Commissioner Mercer. The motion passed 4-1 with Mayor Pro Tem Moore voting Nay.

17. Discuss and consider appropriate action on Resolution 2022-17 appointing a commissioner to serve as Mayor Pro-Tem.

Motion made to appoint Rob Durham to serve as Mayor Pro Tem by Mayor Pro Tem Moore, Seconded by Commissioner Akers. **The motion passed 5-0.**

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF BRECKENRIDGE, TEXAS, APPROVING AN INVESTMENT POLICY.

WHEREAS, Chapter 2256 of the Government Code, commonly known as the "Public Funds Investment Act," requires the city to adopt an Investment Policy by rule, order, ordinance, or resolution; and

WHEREAS, the Public Funds Investment Act requires the treasurer (City Secretary); the chief financial officer (City Secretary), if not the treasurer; and the Investment Officer (City Secretary) of the city to attend investment training; and

WHEREAS, the City of Breckenridge approves the investment training courses sponsored by the Texas Municipal League, University of North Texas-Center for Public Management, and the Government Treasurers Organization of Texas; and

WHEREAS, the treasurer (City Secretary); the chief financial officer (City Secretary), if not the treasurer; and the investment officer (City Secretary) of the city have attended investment training courses sponsored by the Texas Municipal League, University of North Texas-Center for Public Management, or the Government Treasurers Organization of Texas, as required by the Public Funds Investment Act; and

WHEREAS, the attached Investment Policy and incorporated revisions comply with the Public Funds Investment Act, as amended, and authorize the investment of city funds in safe and prudent investments.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the City Commission of the City of Breckenridge:

That the City of Breckenridge has complied with the requirements of the Public Funds Investment Act, Chapter 2256.008, Government Code, and the Investment Policy, as amended, attached hereto as "Exhibit A" is hereby adopted as the Investment Policy of the city effective July 7, 2020.

EXHIBIT A CITY OF BRECKENRIDGE INVESTMENT POLICY OBECTIVES

The investment policy of the City of Breckenridge shall be to:

- 1. Assure the safety and preservation of principal.
- 2. Maintain sufficient liquidity to provide adequate and timely operating needs.
- 3. Gain public trust from prudent investment activities.
- 4. Attain a rate of return that shall be the best possible rate for the City of Breckenridge under government backed securities

AUTHORIZED

The City of Breckenridge funds governed by this policy may be invested in the instruments described below, all of which are authorized by Chapter 2256 of the Texas Government Code (Public Funds Investment Act). Investment of the City of Breckenridge funds in any instrument or security not authorized for investment under the Act is prohibited.

- 1. Obligations, including letter of credit, of the United States of America, its agencies and instrumentalities.
- 2. Certificates of Deposit or share certificates issued by a depository institution that has its main office or branch office in Texas and is:
 - Guaranteed or insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or its successor or the National Credit Union Share Insurance Fund or its successor:
 - 2) Secured by obligations in a manner and amount provided by law for deposits of the City of Breckenridge, including mortgage backed securities directly issued by a federal agency or instrumentality that have a market value of not less than the principal amount of the certificates;
 - 3) Secured in any other manner and amount provided by law for deposits of the City of Breckenridge.

TRAINING REQUIREMENTS

Designated investment Officer(s) shall attend an investment training session no less than once in a two year period (based on the anniversary date of prior training of investment officer(s)) and shall receive not less than ten hours of instruction relating to investment responsibilities. The investment training shall be provided by an independent source approved by the City Commission. For purposed of this policy, and "independent source"

from which investment training shall be obtained shall include Texas Municipal League, University of North Texas-Center of Public Management, or the Government Treasurers Organization of Texas.

INTERNAL CONTROLS

A system of internal controls shall be documented in writing. Also, they shall be designated to prevent losses of public funds arising from fraud, employee error, and misrepresentation by third parties, unanticipated changes in financial markets or imprudent actions by employees and officers of the City of Breckenridge. Controls deemed most important shall include:

- Control of collusion.
- 2. Separation of transaction authority from accounting and record keeping.
- 3. Custodial safekeeping.
- 4. Avoidance of physical delivery securities.
- 5. Clear delegation of authority to subordinate staff members.
- 6. Written confirmation of telephone (voice) transactions for investments and wire transfers.
- 7. Development of wire transfer agreement with the depository bank or third party custodian.

SAFEKEEPING AND CUSTODIAL AGREEMENTS

The City of Breckenridge shall contract with a bank or banks for the safekeeping of securities either owned by the City of Breckenridge as part of its investment portfolio or held as collateral to secure demand or time deposits. Securities owned by the City of Breckenridge shall be held In the City of Breckenridge's name as evidence by safekeeping receipts of the institution holding the securities.

Collateral for deposits will be held by a third party custodian designated by the City of Breckenridge and pledged to the City of Breckenridge as evidence by safekeeping receipts of the institution with which the collateral is deposited. Original safekeeping receipts shall be obtained. Collateral may be held by the depository bank's trust department, a Federal Reserve Bank of a Federal Reserve Bank, a Federal Home Loan Bank, or a third party bank approved by the City of Breckenridge.

COLLATERAL POLICY

Consistent with the requirements of the Public Funds Collateral Act, it is the policy of the City of Breckenridge to require the full collateralization of all City of Breckenridge funds on deposit with a depository bank, other than investments. In order to anticipate market changes and provide a level of security for all funds, the collateralization level will be 102% of market value of principal and accrued interest on the deposits or investments less an amount insured by the FDIC. At its discretion, the City of Breckenridge may require a higher level of collateralization for certain investment securities. Securities pledged as collateral shall be held by an independent third party

with which the City of Breckenridge has a current custodial agreement. The Chief Financial Officer is responsible for entering into collateralization agreements with third party custodians in compliance with this Policy. The agreements are to specify the acceptable investment securities for collateral, including provisions relating to possession of the collateral, valuation of securities. A clearly marked evidence of ownership (safekeeping receipt) must be supplied to the City of Breckenridge and retained. Collateral shall be reviewed at least monthly to assure that the market value of the pledged securities is adequate. The City of Breckenridge shall accept only the following types of collateral:

- 1. Obligation of the U.S. or its agencies and instrumentalities
- 2. Direct obligations of the State of Texas or its agencies and instrumentalities.
- 3. Obligations of states, agencies counties, cities, and other political subdivisions of any state rated as to investment quality by a nationally recognized rating firm not less than A or its equivalent with a remaining maturity of (10) years or less.
- 4. A surety bond issued by an insurance company rates as to investment quality by a nationally recognized rating firm not less than A.
- 5. A letter of credit issued to the City of Breckenridge by the Federal Home Loan Bank.

Investment officials shall be bonded

All Collateral shall be subject to inspection and audit by the Chief Financial Officer or the City's independent auditor.

DELIVERY VS. PAYMENT

Securities shall be purchased using the delivery vs. payment method with the exception of investment pools and mutual funds. Funds will be released after notification that the purchased security has been received.

PORTFOLIO REPORT

A quarterly management portfolio shall be prepared by the investment officer relating to investments of the City of Breckenridge and appropriate collateral pledged for those investment instruments requiring security. A comprehensive report on the investment program and investment activity shall be presented annually to the governing body. The annual report shall include a review of the activities and yield return for the 12 months, suggest policies and improvements that might enhance the investment program, and include an investment plan for the ensuing fiscal year.

SAFETY, PRUDENCE, AND PUBLIC TRUST

The investment officer shall exhibit prudence and discretion in the selection and management of securities. Investment officers shall avoid any transaction that might impair public confidence in the City's ability to govern effectively. Skill and judgment shall be exercised in order that no individual or group of transactions undertaken would jeopardize the total capital sum of the overall portfolio. The City of Breckenridge shall not allow speculation (such as anticipating an appreciation of capital through changes in market interest rates) in the selection of any investments. Safety of principal is the foremost objective of the investment program. Investments shall be undertaken in a manner that seeks to ensure the preservation of capital in the overall portfolio.

The investment portfolio shall be diversified to reduce the risk of loss of investment income from over-concentration of assets in a specific issue, a specific issue size, or a specific class of securities. Nevertheless, the City of Breckenridge recognizes that in a diversified portfolio, occasional measured losses are inevitable and must be considered within the context of the overall portfolio's investment return. Also, it is intended that investments in all funds shall be managed in such a way that any market price losses resulting from interest rate volatility shall be offset by income received from the balance of the portfolio during a 12-month period.

LIQUIDITY

To meet the investment objectives of the City of Breckenridge the maturity of investments shall be targeted to coincide with the flow needs of the City of Breckenridge. Assets of the City of Breckenridge shall be invested in instruments whose maturities do not exceed approved periods as determined by the City of Breckenridge City Commission at the time of purchase. Assets held in debt retirement funds may be invested in maturities exceeding one year.

DELEGATION OF INVESTMENT AUTHORITY

The city Commission designates the City Treasurer (City Secretary) and/or the Chief Financial Officer (City Secretary) as the City of Breckenridge's Investment Officer(s). An investment Officer is authorized to execute investment transactions on behalf of the City of Breckenridge. No person may engage in an investment transaction or the management of the City of Breckenridge funds except as provided under the terms of this Investment Policy as approved by the City Commission. The investment authority granted to the investing officers is effective until rescinded by the City Commission.

INVESTMENT STRATEGY

The City of Breckenridge manages investment portfolios utilizing specific investment considerations designed to address the unique characteristics of the fund groups represented in the investment portfolios.

Investment strategies for Operating Funds have as their primary objective to assure that anticipated cash flows are matched with adequate investment liquidity. A secondary objective is to maintain an investment portfolio which experiences minimal volatility during economic cycles. Preservation of principal may be accomplished by purchasing high quality, short to medium term securities that complement each other in a laddered or barbell portfolio structure. A dollar weighted average maturity of 365 days or less will be calculated using the stated maturity date for each security. Purchased securities will have a stated final maturity of three years or less.

Investment strategies for Debt Service Interest and Sinking funds have as their primary objective the assurance of investment liquidity adequate to cover obligations on required payment dates. Securities purchased shall not have a stated final maturity date which exceeds the unfunded required payment date.

Investment strategies for Reserve Funds have as the primary objective the ability to generate a dependable revenue stream with a low degree of volatility. Except as may be otherwise required, securities should be of high quality, with short to intermediate term maturities. Purchased securities will have a stated final maturity of five years of less.

ETHICS AND CONFLICT OF INTEREST

An investment officer of the City who has a personal business relationship with an organization seeking to sell an investment business with the City shall file a statement disclosing that personal business interest. An investment officer who is related within the second degree by affinity or consanguinity to an individual selling to sell an investment to the City shall file a statement disclosing that relationship. This section is prescribed by chapter 2256.005 of the Government Code.

BRECKENRIDGE CEMETERY PERPETUAL CARE FUND

The Breckenridge Cemetery Perpetual Care Fund, as established by a trust agreement executed May 11, 194, is not considered public funds and is therefore not subject to the foregoing sections of this policy, but rather all funds in the Breckenridge Cemetery Perpetual Care Funds shall be invested according to Section 113.056 of the Texas Trust Code.

The City of Breckenridge, Texas hereinafter referred to as the "CITY" and BFI Waste Services of Texas, LP. DBA Republic Services of Abilene. Hereinafter referred to as "CONTRACTOR" have entered into a contract for solid waste collection and Disposal effective August 1st 2017 executed July 3rd 2017.

The contract provides for the collection and disposal of all residential sand commercial, acceptable waste and special waste as defined in the contract which is generated within the corporate limits of the city, and further grants the contractor a license and permit to use the public streets, alley ways, easements and throughfares within the CITY for said business during the term of this contract.

It is the mutual interest of the City and the Contractor to amend this contract to include the following.

Section 5.3 CITY AS TO COLLECTOR: Delete in its entirety and replace with "The CITY shall submit statements directly to residential customers only, CONTRACTOR shall be responsible for direct billing all commercial and industrial customers.

EXHIBIT A, Replace in its entirety and replace with attached new EXHIBIT A, Republic will bill commercial customers the same rate as the City utilized prior.
