APPROVAL OF MINUTES

A. Approve Minutes from May 25th, 2021 Public Art Advisory Committee Minutes were amended and approved: Cunningham first, M. Davis seconded.

PRESENTATION AND DISCUSSION ITEMS

B. Discuss Implementation Guidelines

The Committee discussed whether the General Public Art Fund be considered for performing, temporary art, local art shows or community arts educational programming. Schillinger said that the "acquisition of art" could include temporary art. He will confirm with the Attorney and will receive an update for the next meeting. There was discussion whether the RFP's specifically identifies that the City is an Equal Opportunity Employer. Schillinger says it does, but some of the Committee members wanted it brought more to the front of RFP's. There were also questions regarding potential situations where a developer and the Public Art Committee cannot come to an agreement on an acceptable art project on their private property. Schillinger will talk with the Attorney about this and work on some language to add to the guidelines.

The Committee also discussed that it may be a good idea to present the Council updates during the process for their feedback and potentially receive more input and comments from the Public. This could be a workshop or during Council Updates.

The Committee asked Schillinger to give an update on the General Arts Fund at the next meeting.

The Committee received public comment from Kevin Fryer. Fryer thought that the \$10k spent on the Skatepark artist was not a waste if the Committee learned from it. He asked why the Skatepark mural did not go to Council after the Park & Recreation Commission did not recommend the project. Schillinger stated that it was right at the beginning of the COVID19 pandemic and more urgent issues had arisen for the Council.

C. Discuss the Committee's Workplan

Due to the lateness of the meeting, this topic will be discussed at the next meeting.

Michael Barnes mentioned that about 15 years ago, Charles Jencks gave an Arts Education lecture that the Committee may be interested in watching.

Community Goal/Result

Community Building

Purpose

To improve the quality of life within the community by stimulating creativity and imagination, adding a unique human quality to the community environment, and enriching public spaces through works of art.

Recommendation

Receive report on the available resources within the Public Art Fund

Background

In 2014 the City Council adopted an Ordinance which required development to either have an art component or to pay money into an in-lieu of fund for public art to be placed in an alternative location. The portion of the Public Art Fund related to the contribution requirements is below.

15.85.050 - Contribution requirements.

- A. Private Developments
 - 1. Commercial Projects.

a. Private nonresidential and non-live-work building developments with building development costs from one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) through five million dollars (\$5,000,000.00) shall contribute in an amount equal to at least one percent of their building development costs into the Brisbane public art fund as an in-lieu contribution. This section shall apply to both new projects and building alterations/additions.

b. Private nonresidential and non-live-work building developments with building development costs above five million dollars (\$5,000,000.00) shall contribute in an amount equal to at least one percent of their building development costs into the

Brisbane public art fund as an in-lieu contribution. Alternatively, at the discretion of the owner or developer, such projects may devote in an amount equal to at least one percent of their building development costs for the acquisition and installation of publicly accessible art on the development site, subject to the provisions of <u>Section 15.85.060</u>. This section shall apply to both new projects and building alterations/additions.

2. Residential Projects.

a. Single and multiple family residential and live-work developments with ten (10) through twenty (20) units shall contribute in an amount equal to at least one-half percent of their building development costs into the Brisbane public art fund as an in-lieu contribution.

b. Single and multiple family residential and live-work developments with more than twenty (20) units shall contribute in an amount equal to at least one percent of their building development costs into the Brisbane public art fund as an in-lieu contribution.

c. Single and multiple family residential and live-work developments with building development costs above ten million dollars (\$10,000,000.00), regardless of the number of units, shall contribute in an amount equal to at least one percent of their building development costs into the Brisbane public art fund as an in-lieu contribution. Alternatively, at the discretion of the owner or developer, such projects may devote in an amount equal to at least one percent of their building development costs for the acquisition and installation of publicly accessible art on the development site, subject to the provisions of <u>Section 15.85.060</u>.

d. Private residential and live-work building developments designated as low or moderate income housing shall be exempt from the requirements of this chapter.

3. Compliance with the provisions of <u>Section 15.85.050</u>(A) shall be demonstrated by the owner or developer prior to the issuance of a building permit as follows: (a) payment of the full amount of the in-lieu contribution; or (b) written proof to the building department of a contractual agreement to commission or purchase and to install the requested artwork on the development site. The owner or developer shall provide the city with proof of installation of the requested artwork on the development site before issuance of the certificate of occupancy, unless the city has approved some other method of assuring compliance with the provisions of this chapter.

4. An in-lieu contribution shall not necessarily change the characterization of the project as a private development.

B. Public Developments. Building developments by the city with building development costs above five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000.00) shall devote in an amount equal to at least one-half percent of their building development costs for the acquisition and installation of publicly accessible art on the development site or for contribution into the Brisbane public art fund as an in-lieu contribution.

(Ord. No. 588, § 1, 10-2-14)

Discussion

Staff will provide quarterly updates on the cash balance in the Public Art Fund as requested by the committee. The City runs on a fiscal year basis. A fiscal year runs from July 1st through June 30th. As of June 30th 2019 the City had \$881,177.95 in the Public Art Fund. The City received \$224,507.11 from a variety of projects within the City. The Fund also earned \$7,210.23 in interest through May 31, 2021. City staff allocates interest sometime after the 20th of the

succeeding month based on the timing of receiving statements from our financial institutions. This is the reason the June 2021 interest has not been updated.

There are still two outstanding commitments the City Council has approved. The first is the final payment to the artist hired for the Library installation. The installation will take place over Labor Day weekend. The payment will be made after that date. The second commitment is for \$25,000 to restore the mural at Midtown Market. Based on recent conversations with the restoration specialist staff will probably need to go back to the City Council for additional funding once Mona Caron is able to review the recommendation from the restoration specialist and has looked at the mural in-person an additional time.

Fiscal Impact

There is no impact to the City's finance by the Committee receiving this report.

Measure of Success

The City is able to commission public art which enriches the community.
