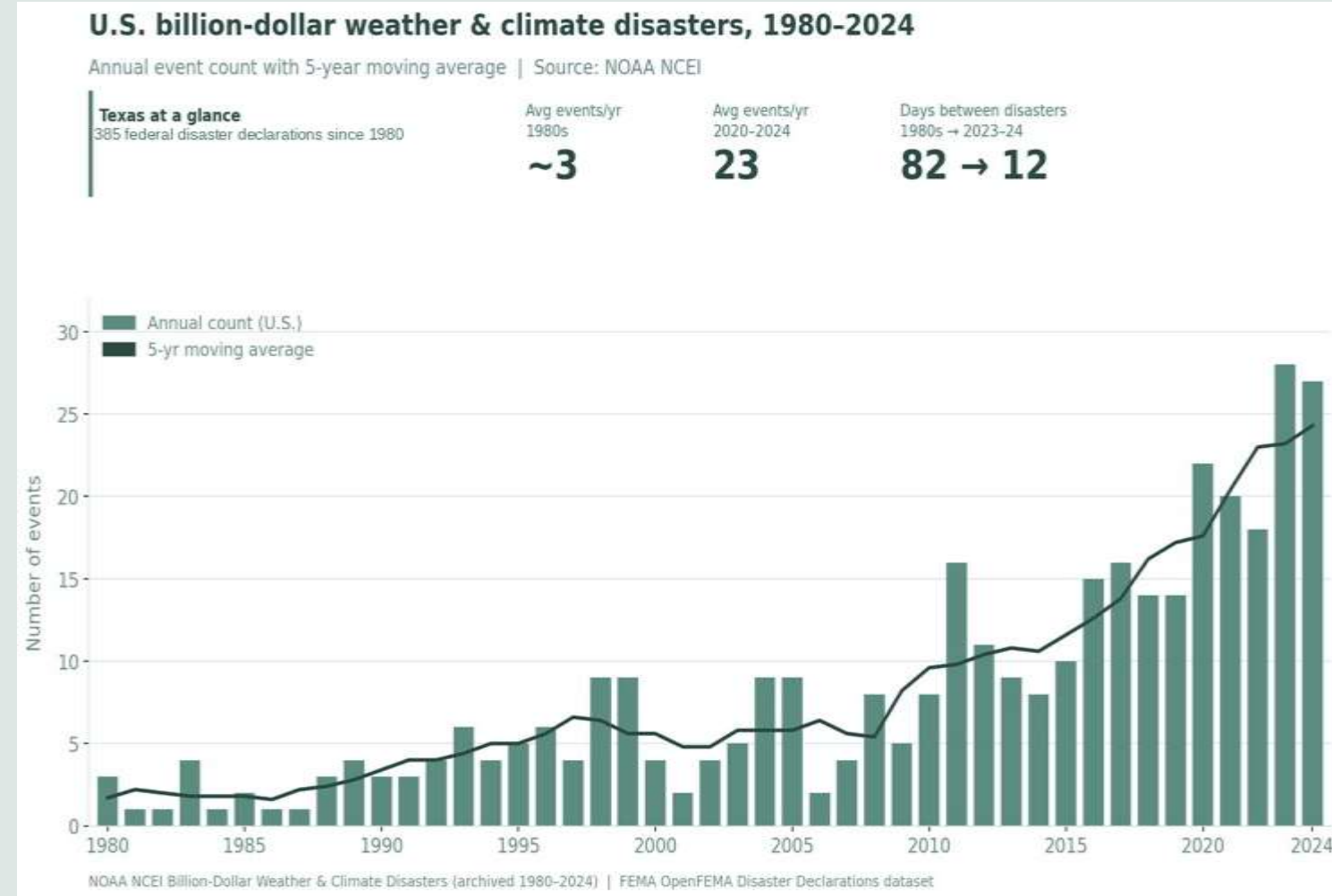


Preparedness is educating the public on the difference between “**blue sky** days” and “**grey sky** days” and how to prepare.

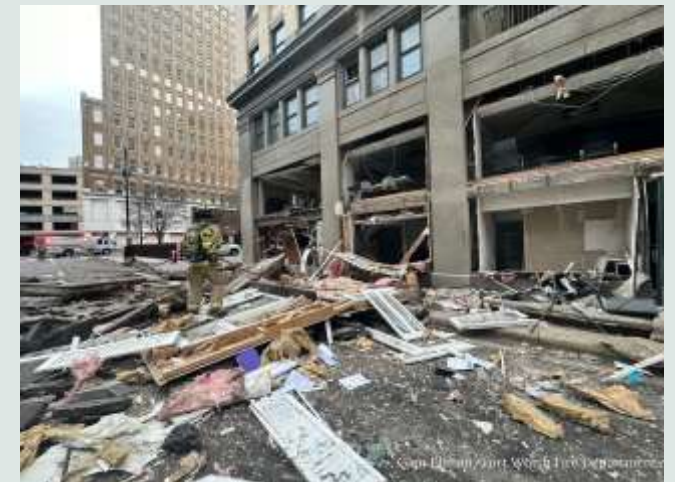

How Park and Recreation Departments Respond to Emergencies

Park and recreation departments play a **vital, often underrecognized role** in emergency preparedness and response, especially in the face of increasing extreme weather and natural disasters.

Examples of PARD Emergency Responses

1. Clear streets of trees and debris after storms
2. Parks can serve as debris collection site
3. Open recreation centers as shelters, temporary, overnight, heating, or cooling centers; serve as receiving centers or family reunification centers; serve as distribution site for emergency supplies such as sandbags, food, water, de-ice
4. Provide logistical support for Public Safety personnel
5. Provide logistical support for shelter staff

Burleson PARD role - Emergency Management

- Warming / cooling stations
- Store cots at service center that can then be deployed to warming and/or cooling centers
- Install weather safety signs at multiple outdoor park locations
- Park personnel work closely with OEM and follow EM recommendations and guidance when supporting city events



NATIONAL RECREATION AND PARK ASSOCIATION

- Mission: advance parks, recreation, and environmental conservation efforts that enhance the quality of life for all people.
- P&R (park and recreation) professionals and their agencies are involved in many aspects related to emergency preparedness and response.
- Involvement may include health concerns, injuries, hazards, structural accidents, natural disasters, and/or public safety.
- Parks and recreation play an **INTEGRAL** role in ensuring the safety of their community.

NRPA Report Highlights

1. Preparedness and Planning

- **Formal emergency plans:** About 86% of agencies have developed or follow a formal emergency plan.
- **Severe weather focus:** 85% are highly involved in preparing for and responding to natural disasters, particularly severe weather.
- **Partnerships:** They often collaborate with local government departments, the Red Cross, and local risk management agencies.
- **Funding:** Most (78%) fund this work through

NRPA Report Highlights continued

2. Roles During Emergencies

- **Shelter and command posts:** Recreation centers, gyms, and large facilities can serve as temporary shelters, command centers, or distribution points for food, water, and clothing.
- **Public safety:** They assist with hazard mitigation, such as green stormwater infrastructure for flood control.
- **Community relief:** During heat waves, splash pads, shaded areas, and other amenities can provide relief for vulnerable populations.

NRPA Report Highlights continued

3. Staff and Resource Use

- Personnel are often deployed to assist with evacuations, safety checks, and community outreach.
- Facilities are adapted for emergency use, such as converting gyms into sleeping areas or using open spaces for staging.

4. Challenges

- **Funding and staffing:** About 32% of agencies face challenges with funding and staff time/capacity for emergency work.

NRPA Report Highlights continued

5. Community Impact

- More than three-quarters of park and recreation professionals believe their role is highly essential to emergency resilience.
- Their involvement helps safeguard communities, reduce disaster impacts, and strengthen long-term resilience.

NRPA Report Summary

Park and recreation departments **respond** to emergencies by **leveraging** their facilities, personnel, and partnerships to **provide** shelter, safety, and relief, while **maintaining** formal emergency plans and **collaborating** with other agencies. This makes them a **critical** part of the

Burleson Survey Results as of 8/6/26

- 239 responses, average age 65 and older, followed by 55-64 years
- Respondents reported feeling somewhat prepared
- Financial hardship and lack of support system are considered being a challenge in their ability to evacuate or recover from a disaster
- 50% respondents indicate that they are aware they need a plan
- Only 26% of respondents have an emergency supply kit
- 92% of respondents are signed up to receive

SUMMARY:

On December 9, 2004, the City Council approved revised landscaping regulations via Ordinance B-726. These standards were contained in Chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances, *Buildings and Building Regulations*. In 2010, the city's landscaping requirements were moved to Chapter 86 of the Code of Ordinances.

The city's landscaping regulations are intended to:

- (1)** Promote the value of property, enhance the welfare, and improve the physical appearance of the city;
- (2)** Reduce the negative effects of glare, noise, erosion and sedimentation caused by expanses of impervious and un-vegetated surfaces within the urban environment; and
- (3)** Preserve and improve the natural and urban environment by recognizing that the use of landscaping elements and retention of existing trees can contribute to the processes of air

purification, oxygen regeneration, groundwater recharge, abatement of noise, glare and heat, provision of habitats for wildlife, and enhance the overall beauty of the city.

Properties zoned Neighborhood Services, General Retail, Commercial, Industrial...and non-residential uses (in residentially zoned areas) containing principle structures, parking areas and signage, are all subject to the same landscaping regulations.

Code Section 86-109 details standards for the *Landscaping of parking lots*. The purpose of this ordinance section is “to require incorporation of landscaping into the design and construction of parking areas while maintaining standards necessary for safe parking and maneuvering space.”

Parking lots require the installation of new trees from the city’s approved canopy and/or ornamental trees listed below. Landscaping plans must be approved by city staff.

Code section 86-109(g) *Parking lot interior*, lists regulations regarding landscape islands.

- Developments less than five acres shall be designed with a maximum of 20 parking spaces between landscape islands. Parking aisles of 20 or more spaces in length shall terminate in landscape islands.

- Developments five acres or greater in size shall provide a 162-square-foot landscaped island for each 12 parking spaces.
- For each landscaped island of at least 10 feet by 20 feet located within a parking lot, credit for four parking spaces will be provided. Credit for parking spaces cannot reduce the overall parking requirement by more than ten percent or to less than ten total spaces.

The city's parking requirements are located in Appendix B, Chapter 134, *Vehicle parking regulations*. Off-street parking is required in all zoning districts, except Central Commercial. This section does not specifically list off-street parking standards for public parks and recreation areas. However, private or commercial recreation areas require one space for each four persons to be accommodated in the establishment.

With few exceptions, the city's parking and landscaping standards apply to all land within the city. Variances or waivers to these standards require the consideration of the Planning and Zoning Commission and City Council.

Landscaping in Parking Lots

Landscaping standards

- City's landscaping requirements are contained in Chapter 86 of the Code of Ordinances.
- The city's landscaping regulations are intended to:
 - ❖ Promote the value of property, enhance the welfare, and improve the physical appearance of the city;
 - ❖ Reduce the negative effects of glare, noise, erosion and sedimentation caused by expanses of impervious and un-vegetated surfaces within the urban environment; and

Landscaping standards

- ❖ Preserve and improve the natural and urban environment by recognizing that the use of landscaping elements and retention of existing trees can contribute to the processes of air purification, oxygen regeneration, groundwater recharge, abatement of noise, glare and heat, provision of habitats for wildlife, and enhance the overall beauty of the city.
- Properties zoned as Neighborhood Services, General Retail, Commercial, Industrial and non-residential uses (in residentially zoned areas) containing principle structures, parking areas and signage are all subject to the same landscaping regulations.

Landscaping in parking lots

- Code Section 86-109 details standards for the *Landscaping of parking lots*. The purpose of this ordinance section is “to require incorporation of landscaping into the design and construction of parking areas while maintaining standards necessary for safe parking and maneuvering space.”
- Parking lots require the installation of new trees from the city’s approved canopy and/or ornamental trees list, irrigation and landscape islands. Landscaping plans must be approved by city staff.

Landscape islands

- Development sites less than five acres shall be designed with a maximum of 20 parking spaces between landscape islands. Parking aisles of 20 or more spaces in length shall terminate in landscape islands.
- Developments five acres or greater in size shall provide a 162-square-foot landscaped island for each 12 parking spaces.
- For each landscaped island of at least 10 feet by 20 feet located within a parking lot, credit for four parking spaces will be provided. Credit for parking spaces cannot reduce the overall parking requirement by more than ten percent or to less than ten total spaces.

Summary of landscape Requirements



Off-street parking

§ 86-109. Landscaping of parking lots. (Ord. No. B-726(A0310), § 1, 3-15-2010)

It is the purpose of this section to require incorporation of landscaping into the design and construction of parking areas while maintaining standards necessary for safe parking and maneuvering space. Within parking lots, landscaping shall be provided as follows:

- (a) New trees from the approved tree list contained in section 86-106.
- (b) Parking lot landscaping shall be provided as specified by Table 1, Summary of Landscape Requirements for Nonresidential Uses.
- (c) Unless otherwise approved by the planning director, trees planted to satisfy parking lot landscape requirements shall be chosen from the species specified by section 86-106.
- (d) Existing, onsite trees of any species that are of six inches minimum caliper, measured 12 inches above grade may be counted towards landscaping requirements established for parking lots.
- (e) An irrigation system must be provided with all landscape plans. Irrigation plans shall comply with the design standards set forth by the state commission on environmental quality, in 30 Tex. Admin. Code ch. 344, landscape irrigation.
- (f) Landscaping adjacent to public rights-of-way:
 - (1) A five-foot landscaped strip shall be provided adjacent to all public and private rights-of-way on lots with an area greater than one acre but less than five acres.
 - (2) A ten-foot landscaped strip shall be provided adjacent to all public and private rights-of-way on lots with an area greater than five acres.
 - (3) Within landscaped strips adjacent to rights-of-way, landscaping shall be required as follows:
 - a. One canopy street tree or two ornamental trees, for each 60 linear feet of frontage, at a minimum three-inch caliper.
 - b. An average density of one, five-gallon evergreen shrub for each five linear feet of frontage provided however, that any landscaping materials that will be located within ten feet of any public right-of-way shall not, at ultimate growth, exceed 30 inches in height above street grade unless otherwise permitted by the city. Shrubs may be grouped to provide variety in design.
 - c. A landscaped berm may be provided in lieu of required shrubs. The berm must be an average height of three feet, but in no case less than 18 inches, above the average grade of the street and parking lot curbs, and must be planted with evergreen groundcover and/or shrubs to provide full plant coverage of the berm surface area. A variation in height of the berm is encouraged. Shrubs may be grouped to provide variety in design. The combined height of the berm and ultimate height of plant materials shall not exceed 30 inches in height from street grade in any area that is within ten feet of a public right-of-way.

(g) Parking lot interior:

- (1) Developments with an area less than five acres shall be designed with a maximum of 20 parking spaces between landscape islands. Parking aisles of 20 or more spaces in length shall terminate in landscape islands.
- (2) Developments with an area five acres or greater shall provide a 162-square-foot landscaped island for each 12 parking spaces.
- (3) Within parking lot interiors, landscaping shall be provided as follows:
 - a. One canopy tree or one ornamental tree at a minimum three inches in caliper.
 - b. Evergreen ground cover or shrubs to a maximum ultimate height of 30 inches from parking lot grade, of a type that will provide full coverage of the landscape island shall be provided. Planted area shall be exclusive of the area within 18-inch radius from each required tree.
 - c. Areas that are not covered with live plant materials shall be permanently maintained with natural mulch materials such as hard wood, pine bark, or other typical mulch materials.
- (4) Exception: accessible parking - the design and location of accessible parking spaces shall comply with the State of Texas Architectural Barriers Act. A landscape island may be omitted at an aisle termination for the purpose of providing required access to accessible parking spaces.
- (5) Landscape material which is located within the interior of a parking lot shall not create a visibility obstruction. A visibility obstruction within a parking lot is defined as landscaping between 24 inches in height and seven feet in height. No shrubs shall exceed 24 inches in height. Tree canopies shall be at least seven feet in height.
- (6) For large existing trees located in the parking area, which are being retained and incorporated into the landscaping plan, an appropriate aeration system or an alternative method of protecting the tree must be provided and detailed in the landscape plan.
- (7) For each landscaped island of at least ten feet by 20 feet located within a parking lot, credit for four parking spaces will be provided. Credit for parking spaces cannot reduce the overall parking requirement by more than ten percent or to less than ten total spaces.

Project Overview

- The Warren Park Master Plan establishes a long-term vision for the 4.55-acre neighborhood park, evaluating existing amenities, infrastructure, accessibility, connectivity, and future recreational opportunities.
- Through site assessment and community input, the planning process will identify and prioritize improvements that enhance Warren Park as a safe, welcoming, and functional community gathering space for current and future users.

Master Planning Process: Existing Conditions

Warren Park is an established neighborhood park with existing recreational amenities that provide a strong foundation for future improvements.

Master Planning Process: What We Heard: Data Collection

Community feedback helped identify the priorities that should guide Warren Park's future.

Key Insights/Findings

- **Playground improvements were the top priority**, with strong interest in updated equipment, safer surfacing, and age-appropriate play.
- **Sports amenities remain important**, particularly basketball courts, followed by tennis, pickleball, and soccer.
- **Creek and nature preservation ranked highly**, emphasizing the importance of maintaining Warren Park's natural character.
- **Safety and security were recurring themes**, including fencing, lighting, and monitoring.
- **Family-friendly amenities** such as inclusive/toddler play, additional swings, shade, and seating were frequently requested.

Note: A total of 895 responses were collected from December 2025 through July 2026.

Resident feedback was evaluated alongside existing site conditions and operational considerations to help shape the finalized concept.

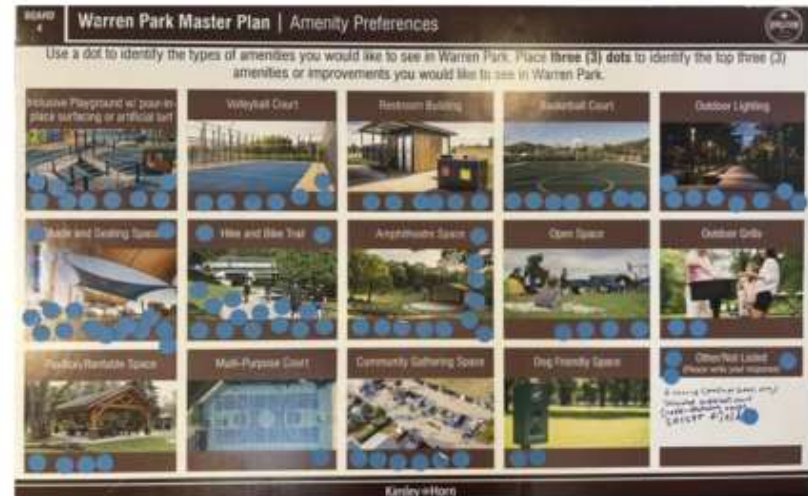

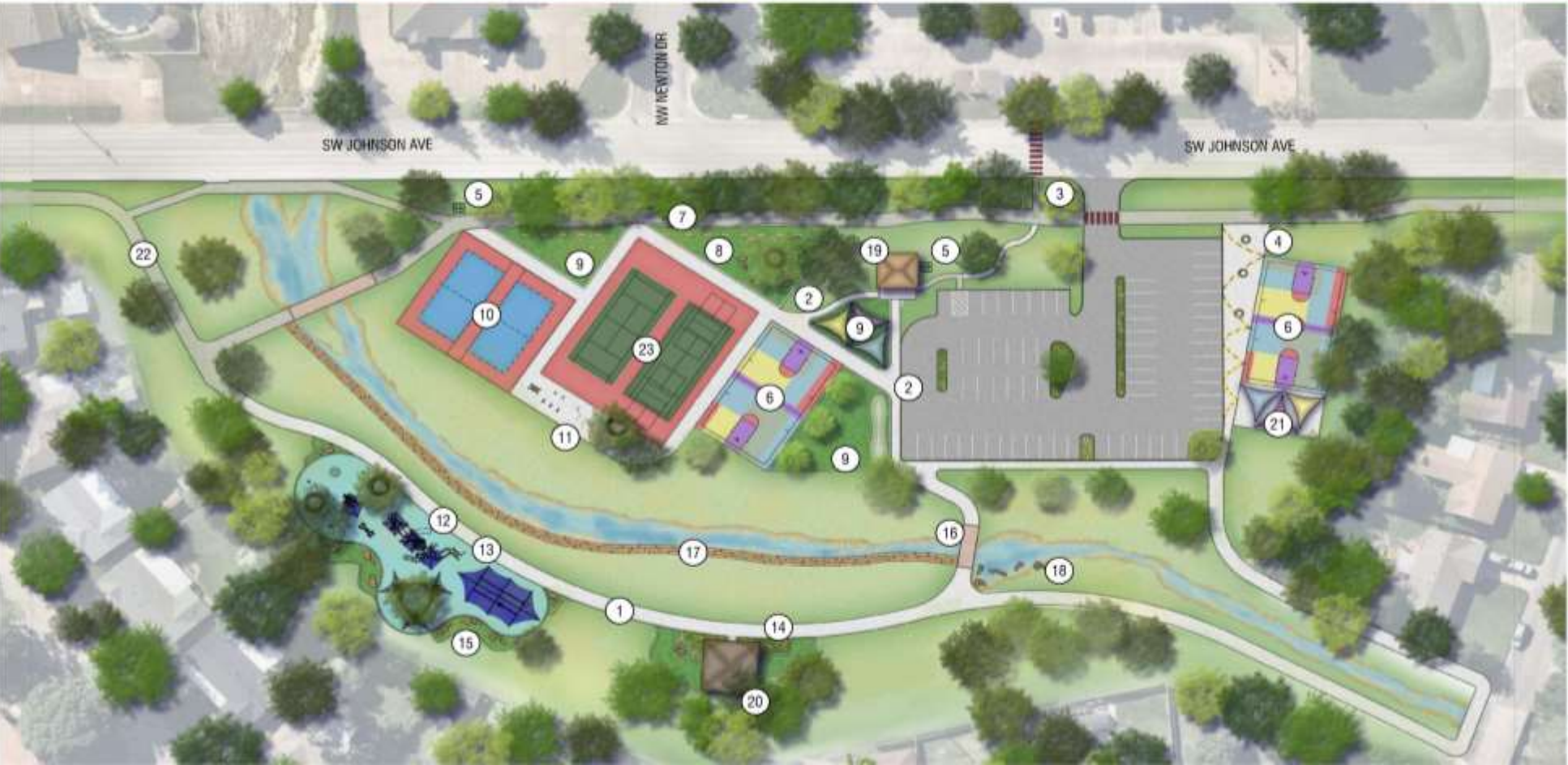

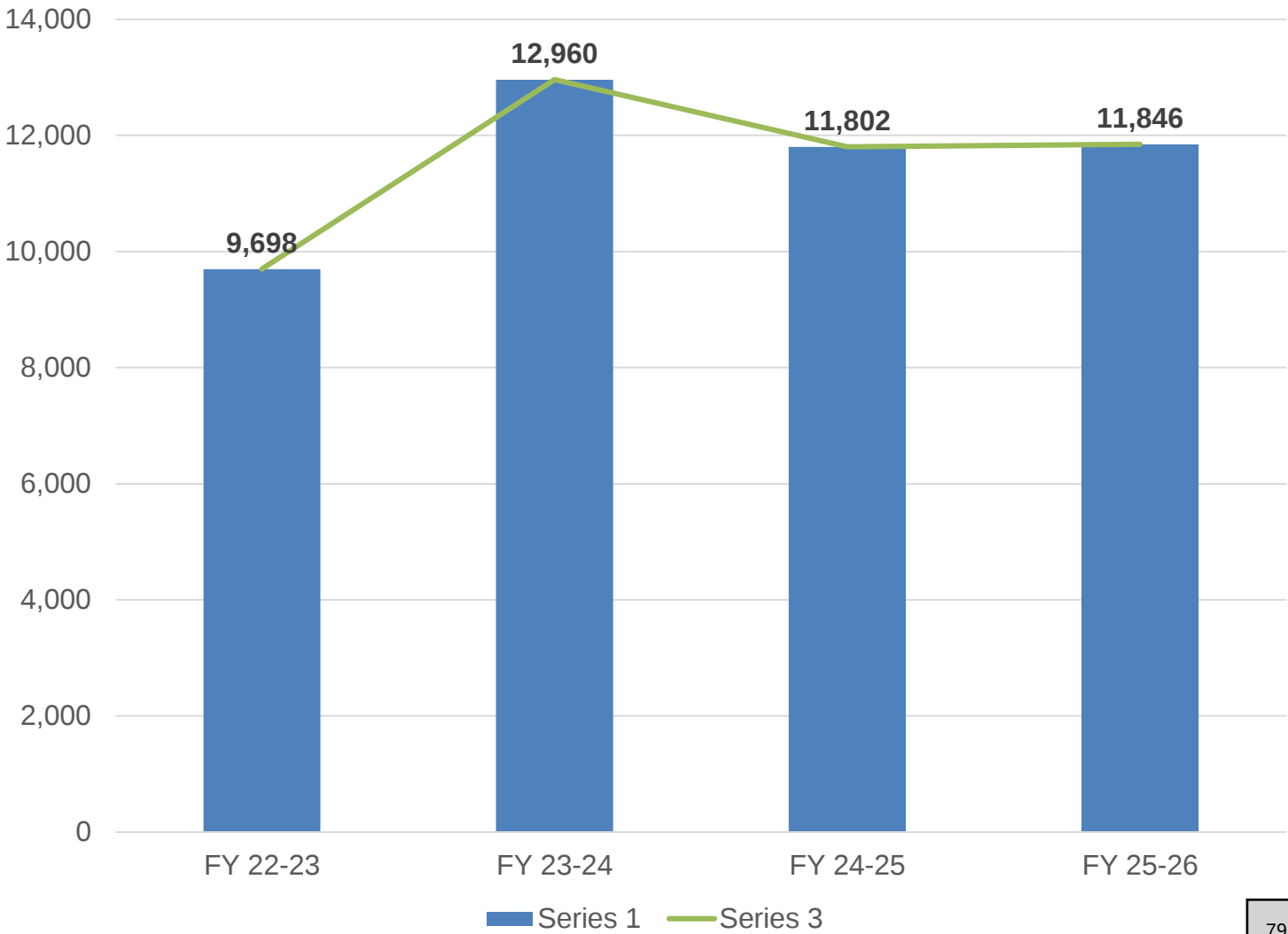

THE BRiCk: TOTAL MEMBERSHIPS IN AUGUST

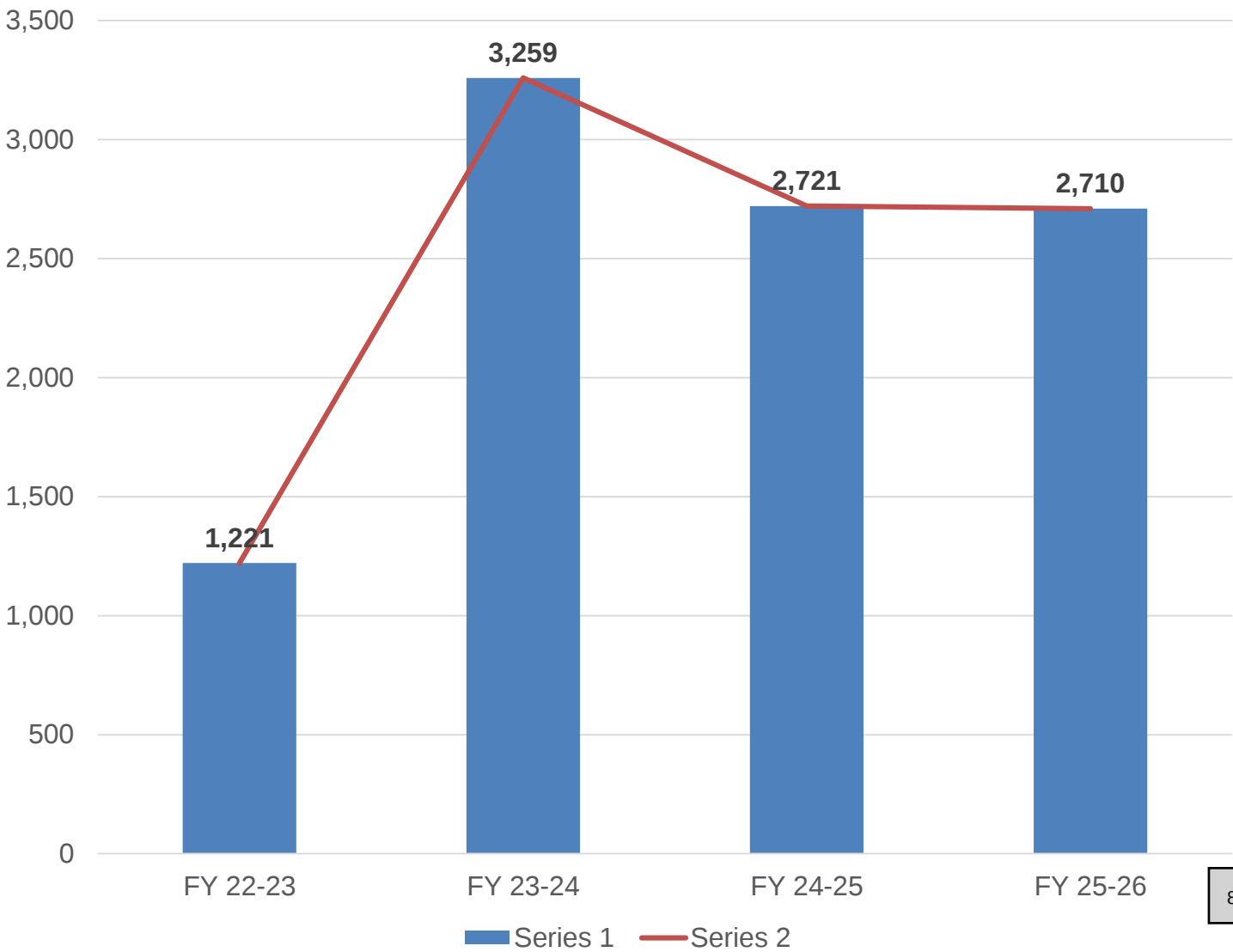

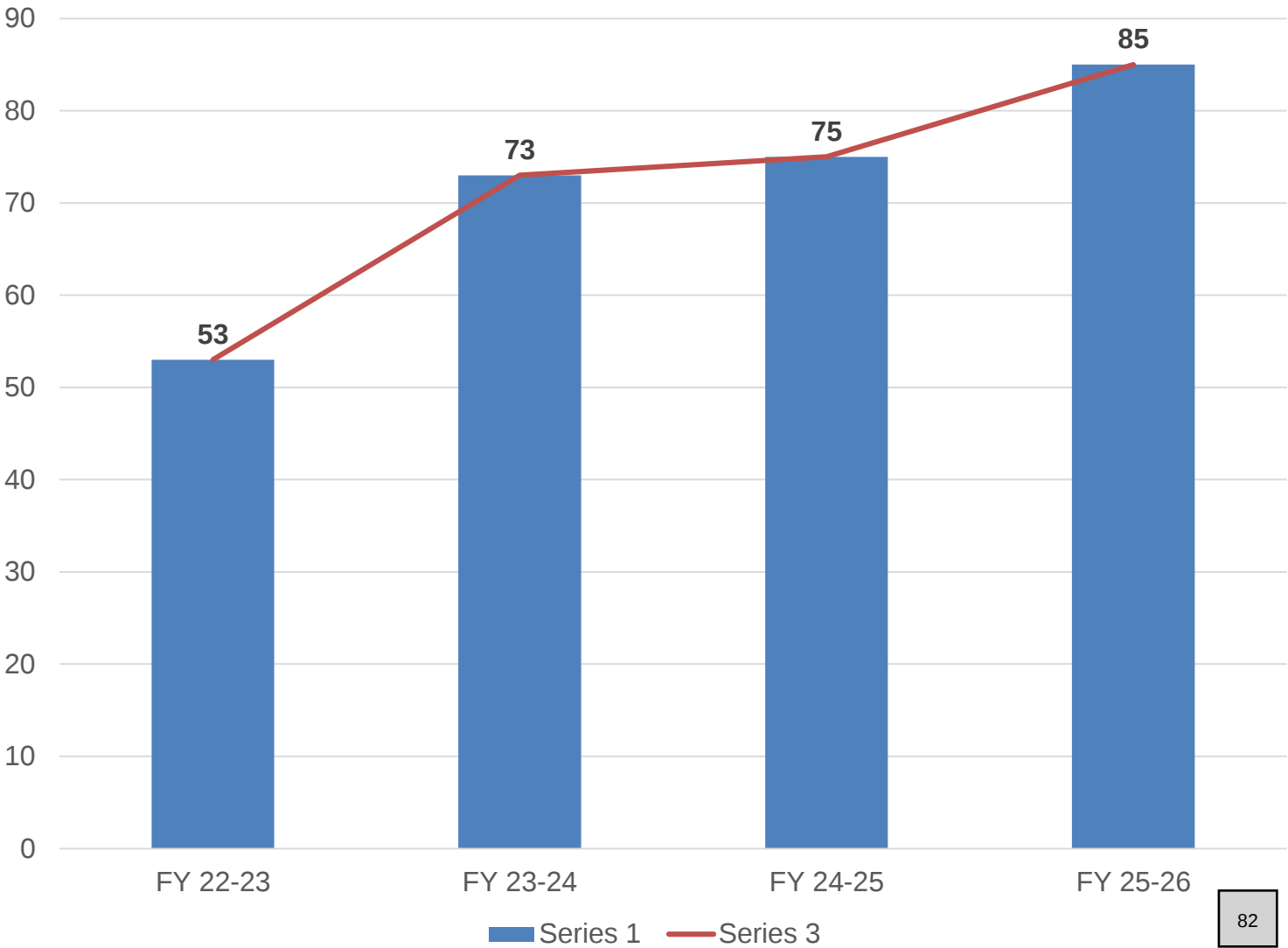

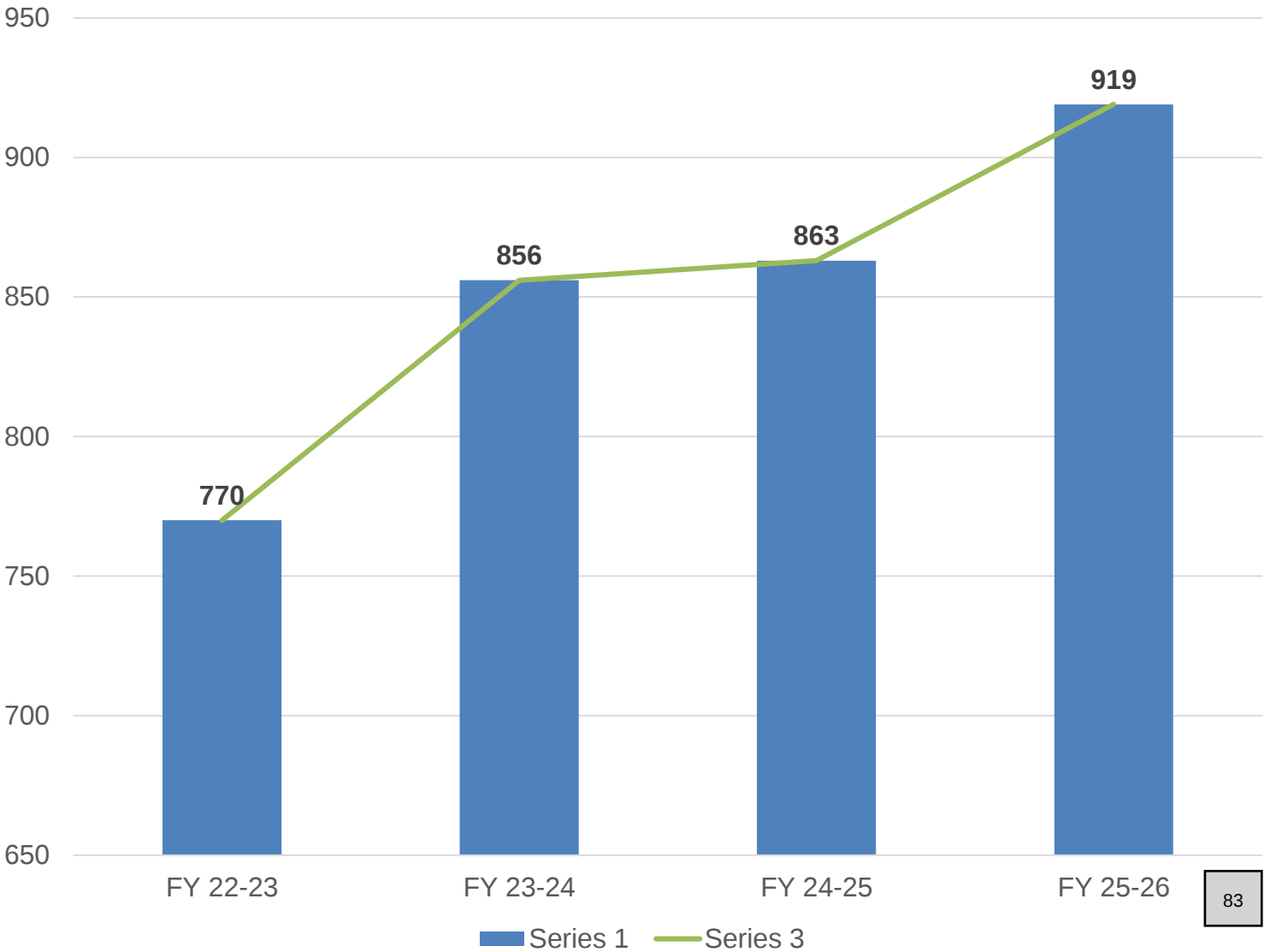

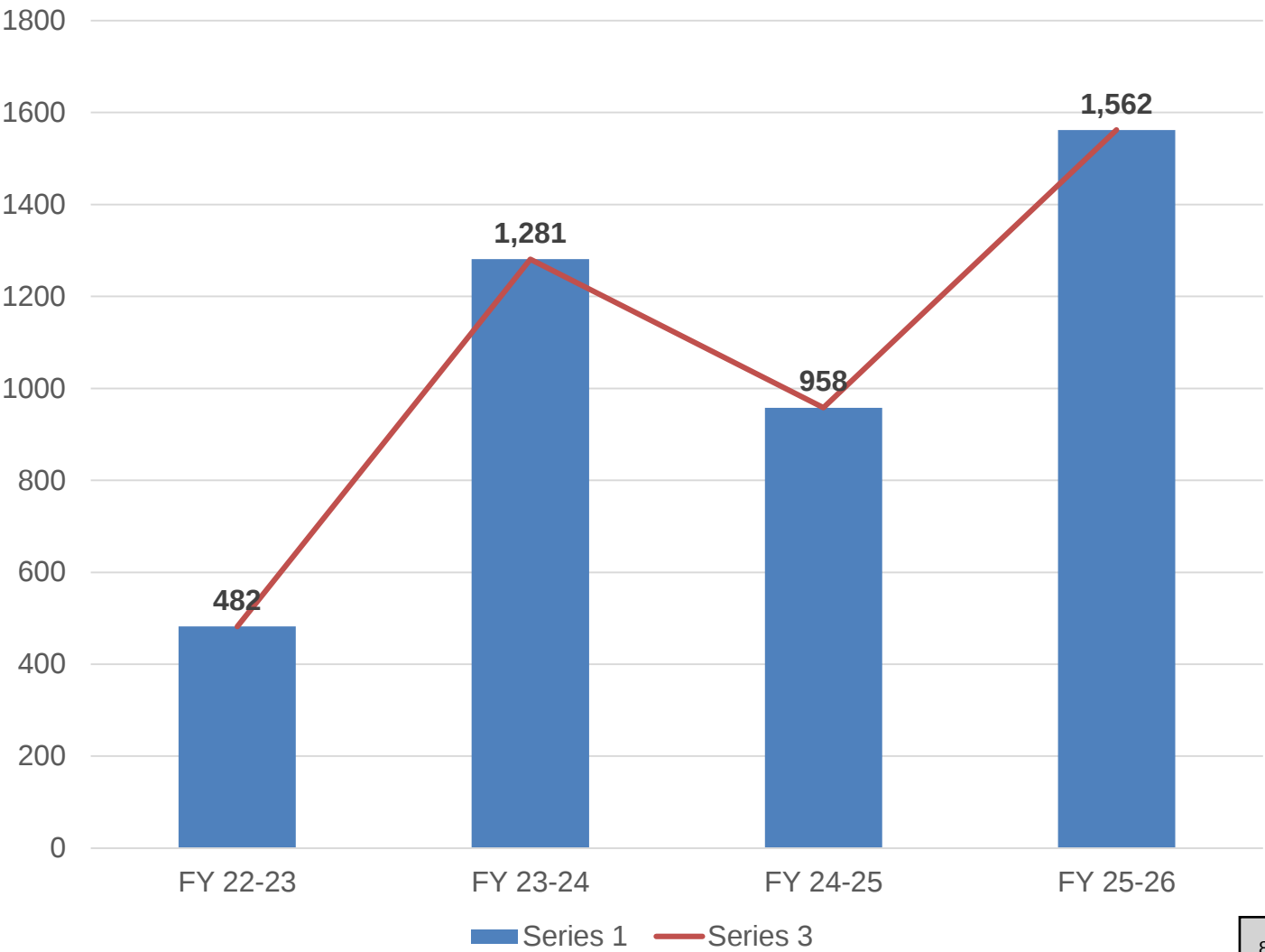
