- Discussion on the ongoing overcapacity of the shelter and what the city is doing regarding free adoptions to get capacity down.
- Discussed requiring spay/neuters for repeat offenders of surrendered litters.
- Donna Riggs discussed a possible rescue for feral cats.

B. Receive a report and hold discussion regarding the 2023 Paw Pals Academy. (Staff Contact: Kim Peckler, Animal Services Manager)

This will be the 12th year for area fifth graders to attend a free educational workshop on basic animal care and safety in a fun environment. Twenty (20) spots will be available for children attending the academy this year. Students learn about a variety of animals with a hands-on approach.

This year's events include the following courses:

- 1) June 3- Journey of a Rescue Animal. From Veterinary Medical Care to Forever Home
 - Taught by Melissa Stiles, Dr. Nicole Winquest DVM, and Tere Davis. Students will walk through the steps of animals taken into rescue for medical care to find a new home.
- 2) June 10- Easy Acre Alpacas.
 - Taught by Kimberly Munoz. Mrs. Munoz will bring several Alpacas for the students to groom, feed and learn about the breed.
- 3) June 17- Wildlife on the Move.
 - Taught by Eric Brittingham (Mr. B). Mr. B will bring snakes, lizards, spiders, and more for the students to interact with and learn their behavior
- 4) June 24 Graduation Question/Answer, Refreshments
 - The committee was happy to see that PawPals is coming back.

C. Receive a report and hold discussion on the FY2023-2024 Budget supplemental request (Staff Contact: Lisa Duello, Neighborhood Services Director

The FY2023-2024 budget preparation will begin on March 9, 2023. Animal Services will be requesting several supplemental requests for next year. Supplemental request is funding beyond base budget.

The following are the requests.

- Offsite adoption trailer Estimate \$65,000
- Replace the tile in the front lobby Estimate \$15,000
- Replace the front lobby reception desk Estimate \$5,000
- Gate for the sally port Estimate \$7,500
- Permanent shade structure over outside kennels Estimate \$15,000
- New Chairs for the front lobby Estimate \$3,000
- The committee was extremely excited to get an offsite adoption trailer possibly. Donna Riggs stated, "It would be a great community outreach presence." Estimate \$65,000.

D. Receive a report and hold a discussion regarding the upcoming renewal of the spay and neuter contract. (Staff Contact: Lisa Duello, Neighborhood Services Director)

The 3 year contracts for veterinarian services for the Spay/Neuter Program are up for renewal. The Spay/ Neuter program requires that all animals adopted from the shelter be sterilized and have current rabies vaccinations. The program is intended to assist in reducing the population of unwanted animals in the Burleson area and the State of Texas.

The contract with Burleson Small Animal Clinic and Texas Coalition for Animal Protection (TCAP) spay and neuter contracts expire on September 18, 2023. All local Burleson veterinarians will be afforded the opportunity to bid on the new contract. The renewal process will be initiated this summer 2023.

 Possible travel vet coming in to do spays and neuters in the new isolation building exam room.

Animal Services staff has encountered egret rookeries in the past few years. Every fall and spring, staff distributes educational flyers to the neighborhoods where the rookeries are and adjacent neighborhoods. Staff distributed 700 + educational flyers (see attachment) to the areas outlined in the attached map in February.

The Animal Shelter will be repainted to match the isolation building and other city buildings and fix the deteriorated beams. The current salmon color will be replaced by beige, and the awning will be white with post-painted black/dark grey to match the isolations. Staff received three bids from the following companies.

- Apex Roofing, Inc. Bid
 - \$18,990.00
- TJ's Professional Painting LLC. Bid \$51,014.87

Stephens Commercial Painting's Bid was accepted, and the painting will start soon. Once the work is commences, pending the weather, is it estimated to take two (2) weeks to complete job

The new isolation building opened in December and since then, staff has treated fiftyone (51) cats and twelve (12) dogs for various illnesses and injuries. The new isolation area has prevented the closure of the adoption areas due to illness.

Animal Care and Control The fiscal Year 2022 - 2023

September 2023 Monthly Report



Protect and serve the citizens of Burleson by enforcing state health and safety codes and the local animal care and control ordinance, educating citizens on animal-related issues, and maintaining a clean, efficient, and humane animal shelter.

Summary

Burleson Animal Services is committed to protecting and serving the citizens of Burleson as well as the animals of Burleson. The animal services respond to a variety of calls, including but not limited to at-large animals, animals in traps, and nuisance barking animals.

The shelter provides a temporary safe haven for lost, abandoned, or unwanted animals and attempts at finding reliable adopters, reputable rescue groups, and loving owners for these animals.

In addition to these services, the shelter also provides education services to the public regarding bite prevention, rabies prevention, responsible pet ownership, and proper dog training and behavior.

General Information FY 2022 - 2023

To date, we have had:

- 6653 telephone calls
- 2308 field calls for service
- 4199 visitors to the shelter
- 388 non-court-ordered volunteer hours
- 47 Animal(s) brought in for Rabies Quarantine

Field Services

- To date, 2308 calls for service have been completed.
- 457 written warnings have been issued to date.
- 31 citations have been issued to date.
- 75 animal(s) have been held for Rabies Quarantine to date.
- 22.00 hours have been completed in the field patrolling.

September 2023

Animals Handled September 2023

- 148 Animals were handled in September 2023.
- Of the 148 animals handled, approximately 100% were live released.
- 18 animals were euthanized.
- Of the 18 animals euthanized, 0 were feral cats.
- 0 animals, or 0%, were euthanized due to space.

Field Services

The Animal Services division responds to approximately 2,000 calls for service each year. Trends usually show the numbers peaking during the warmest months and declining during the coldest.



All Calls for Service are handled within 24 hours

Actions Taken by Officers

Attempts to educate and mediate are most often the first method of resolution. A written warning or citation could be issued when these techniques fail or are ignored. These methods help to reduce the number of repeat offenders, and animals impounded, and more effectively manage long-term problems. These actions are taken to enhance public safety and animal welfare.



Intake Information

Burleson Animal Shelter intakes about 2,000 animals per year and averages about 165 animals per month. Below you will see the intake data per month broken down by species and by intake type.



Euthanasia Information

The chart below depicts the breakdown of euthanasia numbers by reason for the fiscal year.

Volunteers

Volunteers perform a myriad of tasks at the shelter from walking dogs, to playing with puppies and kittens. It is very beneficial for the animals to be able to spend some time outside of their cage with one-on-one human contact. Socializing and daily exercise helps reduce stress on the animals and also help make them more adoptable.



Animal Quarantine

Animals that bite are subject to quarantine and are required to quarantine the animal for not less than ten days confinement from the date of the bite, at the owner's expense.

Community Outreach

Community outreach enables us to go out and interact with the community to improve adoptions, improve communication with residents and animal services, and provide unique services to get the community involved.

Definition of Terms

Adoption: Animals are released to new homes through a signed contract agreeing to have the animal sterilized and vaccinated for rabies.

Adoption Returns: An animal is adopted and then returned to the shelter.

After-hour calls: Calls received and completed after normal business hours.

Animal returned to the field: Animals are picked up by an animal control officer and then taken home rather than brought to the shelter.

Barking: Complaint of a dog barking for several hours, without provocation or reason.

Community service hours: Number of court-ordered community service hours performed.

Cruelty Investigation: An investigation performed to determine if an animal has been mistreated or abused.

DOA (Dead on Arrival): Animals that arrive at the shelter are deceased.

Euthanasia: The act of "mercy" killing, sick, injured, or unwanted animals in a shelter.



Age- An animal too young for adoption, or too old to be safely placed.

Aggression- An animal displaying fractious or potentially threatening behavior.

Behavior- An animal that displays traits that prevent it from being properly contained or extremely destructive. E.g. Jumps fence, barks excessively, anxiety disorders.

Feral- Any undomesticated animal.

Injured- An animal with broken bones, punctured / perforated organs, or large, open wounds.

Medical- An animal with a non-communicable disease such as heartworm or organ failure.

Sick- An animal with a communicable disease that cannot be properly housed away from other animals without potentially spreading the disease to them such as Parvovirus or distemper.

Space- The lack of cages or kennels in the shelter.

Wildlife- Any non-domesticated animal.

Fees collected: Funds are collected either from adoption fees, microchipping, vaccination, or reclamation fees.

Food donation: Animal food is given to citizens who request it due to the inability to provide food for themselves.

Fosters: An animal placed in temporary custody until ready for adoption.

Intake: Animals admitted to the animal shelter. These include animals surrendered by the general public, picked up by an animal control officer, and animals born at the shelter.

Reclaimed: Animals returned to their owners from the shelter.

Transfers: Animals are sent to a rescue group, humane society, or another shelter.

Low-cost vaccination: Vaccinations are given at a steeply discounted rate to provide access to people with a lower income.

Microchip: A small implant done under the skin to achieve permanent identification of an animal.

Multi-pet permits: Inspections and investigations are performed to be allowed to own more than four (4) animals within city limits.

Off-site adoption: An adoption event at an offsite location such as a city event, or PetSmart-type location.

Owner surrender: An animal willingly surrenders to the shelter by their owner.

Phone calls: Any incoming telephone calls to the shelter.

Rabies: A disease naturally occurring in the wild that primarily affects bats, coyotes, foxes, ractoons, and skunks but can be passed onto domesticated animals as well as humans and is fatal if not detected early.

Stray and at large: An animal not confined to its' owner's property.

Total animals handled (intake): The raw number of animals brought to the shelter.

Trap request: A request put in to borrow a trap to trap a feral, stray, or wild animal.

Volunteer hours: Number of hours donated by registered volunteers.

Habit Modification for Egrets/Herons

THE CITY OF

Migratory bird nesting has presented considerable challenges in and around your neighborhood in the past few years. In an effort to deter this nesting activity, the City will be collaborating with your neighborhood to assist with reducing/eliminating nesting for the 2023 season. It is important that action is taken during the fall / winter months before the egrets / herons arrive in the spring.

Here is how you can help:

Tree Maintenance (prior to spring)

- Trim tree canopy to allow sunlight to shine between limbs and other trees.
- Team up with your neighbors when hiring a tree trimming service and ask for discount rates for group service.
- Remove old / abandoned nests from the previous nesting season so that they do not attract egrets.
- Remove any / all underbrush.



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Migratory Bird Deterrent Measures

AFTER TRIMMING TREES – Before nesting season begins (December – February)

- ✓ Be on the lookout for "sentry" or "scout" birds, they are the first to arrive looking for nesting places.
- ✓ Report sightings to your neighbors and to the city. (817-426-9283)
- Check daily for birds and nesting material in your trees.
- ✓ Check for twigs on the ground, increased bird droppings and an increase in bird noises.
- ✓ Begin scare tactics as soon as you see birds on or near your property.
- ✓ Use noisemakers, water spray or shine lights at night, hang "scare eye" balloons or other moving objects in trees, use long poles, tennis balls or water hoses to disturb early nesting material.
- ✓ Be a good neighbor and help those near you who may not be able to help themselves.

What Will the City Do?

- The City has purchased two migratory bird deterrent sounds systems that can be strategically placed in areas to discourage birds from nesting in neigborhoods.
- City staff will be on high patrol during the start of the of nesting season. Please contact Animal Services if you have sightings of the birds.
