







Purpose of 10 Year Forecast


- Provides insights into current trends into the future

2024-2033 Forecast Assumptions




Property Taxes and Sales Tax








Largest Growth Revenues







Revenue Mix (Ongoing vs one-time)


Structural Deficit





Budget Summary

- Staff still dialing in Revenue and Expense projections. More to come through September.
- General Fund as of today, appears that additional Revenue <u>and</u> Expense cuts will be needed to balance budget (and/or use of additional Reserves)
- Operations additional resources/projects unlikely
- Capital Combined with debt service payments, anticipated slow-down in development will impact ability to fund new projects with PIF and REET
