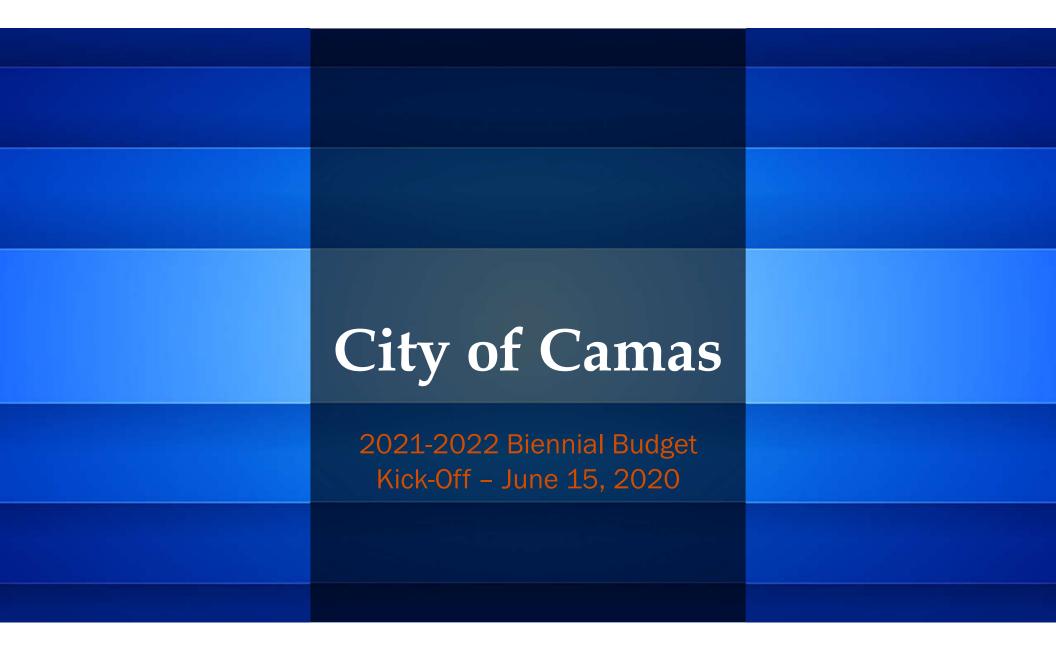

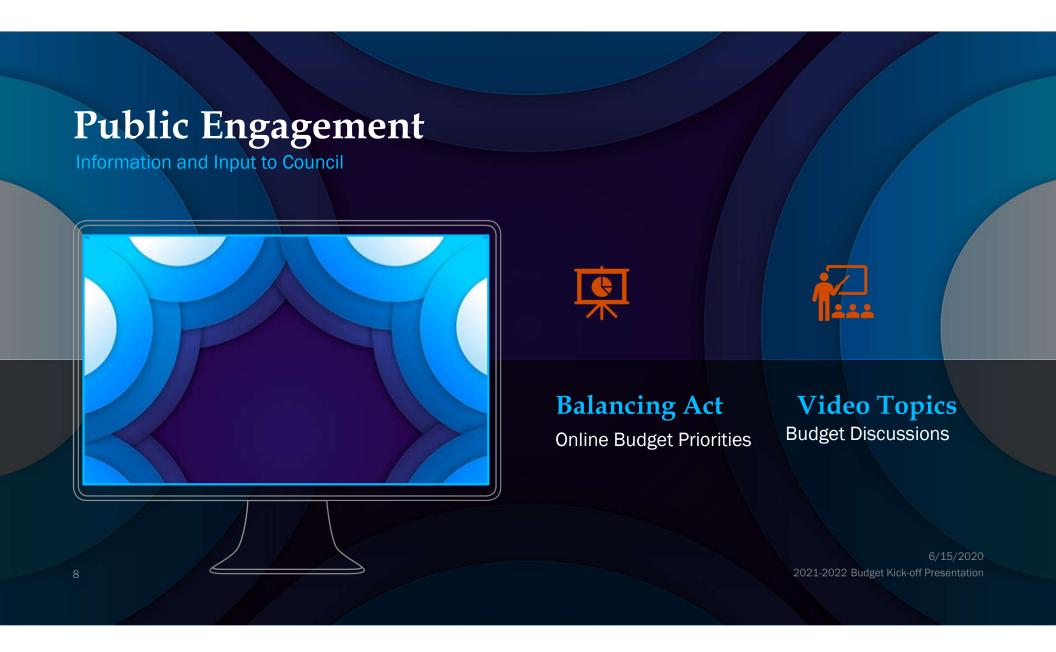

Firstly...Thank You Mayor McDonnell for your Video response addressing many of the Financial Issues and making plans for the future.

I think you would agree that the City of Camas would like to avoid the "Oh S... Moment" that other Municipalities, Counties, States and the US Treasury is going to face in the future.

Camas needs to get ahead of the REVENUE shortfalls that are coming in the years ahead.

To that point still outstanding are the following:

Since the 2019/2020 budget goes through the end of the year what is the LINE ITEM DETAIL of the \$191K monthly PHASE 1 Spending Cuts beyond what you covered in your 5/28/2020 video??

Maintaining a 17% reserve was stated as being the line in the sand BEFORE it is necessary to implement Phase 2.

What are the LINE ITEM DETAILS of the PHASE 2, 3 and 4??

When do the TAXPAYERS see the WHOLE PLAN?? Where is the TOTAL PLAN for 2020??

What are your plans for the rest of the year? How much do you believe you need to save in spending for the next 7 months?

EXPENSE REDUCTION

One of the key elements to address is EXPENSE REDUCTION. Make the plan for deep cuts now:

• Redo the balance of the remaining 2020 budget with an 18% target reduction in TOTAL spending

- Take the same approach with the upcoming 2021/2022 budget process
- Start with a hiring freeze including City Administrator and any other replacement positions
- Stop OT now Right now it is running at 6% of payroll for the last 2.5 years
- Stop Incentive Payouts 3% of payroll for the last 2.5 years Does anybody know what that really is?
- No COLA in 2020/2021
- Take a hard look at reassignment of idled staff for better utilization of available time
- Consultants and Outside Contractors have these been reviewed and only allowed to work on City Critical items. Has the WSP Contract been reviewed?

And most importantly!!!

Nobody buys anything discretionary or any capital items even though it is in the budget

Additionally has the City addressed the following??

• Renegotiation of Service Contracts

It still seems like the GOAL of this whole exercise is to TRACK SPENDING.

The GOAL should be REDUCE SPENDING!!

This needs to be a PROACTIVE vs. REACTIVE Process.

Hello,

During the last council meeting I was denied my full time to speak and I'm hopeful that won't happen again tonight. I have three minutes and I intend to use them uninterrupted as my neighbors do.

This city operates too often from fear in my opinion. Passing restrictive resolutions on citizen speech and starting meetings with lengthy defensive preambles that seem to presuppose guilt before accusation, as if it was borne of a fear of what's to come. In reality, in our beautiful corner of SW Washington, the people of Camas are so much more reasonable in public exchanges than this bodies constant defensive actions would suggest. We are well spoken, professional and reasoned on the whole - especially when compared to other municipalities with real questions that many of us need real answers to - a lot of citizens don't have the patience that Camas demonstrates week after week with this group. If anyone listening doesn't believe that, cross the bridge into Portland once and awhile and see what it can look like when you get a real raw take from a broader swath of the public.

My fellow citizens that comment to this city council are good people trying to be heard. They volunteer their time during public comment, time spent away from their families, with the hope that they might have a hand in improving life in this city for those families, along with their friends and neighbors. They suggest things like financial oversight committees that would help clarify spending, tree stewardship programs that would help keep Camas lush and green, biofilter repairs that may save our threatened lakes - just a few examples with little to no spend attached. And on top of volunteering those ideas, they offer their time and their commitment. Time to help arrange the structures of these efforts and even serve on them as well. Yet repeatedly and without an explanation worth their effort, all of that beautiful, wonderful, selfless energy falls flat on the floor of these meetings, ignored or half answered at best.

The depth of the mayor's latest few responses, provided in a video on the otherwise abandoned public comments page after a full month of delay is frankly unacceptable. This is so far off the path from the transparency Camas was promised. Citizens were literally asked to "go ask the assessors office" after a month long delay. Citizens were made to wait weeks and weeks past the promised deadline for half attempted answers like, "no further research has been done to answer this question, because there are not currently plans to do XYZ". Well there aren't plans to do a lot of bad things, until they are, and then it's often too late to discuss, or is that the point?

The question was asked if the term legacy lands actually meant something in legal terms, it doesn't, and it took this city almost an entire month passed the one week promised turnaround to make a false equivocation that Rose property contractual language was related to contractual language for the other few properties the city spent over \$20m dollars to acquire, and mostly during a global pandemic and pending economic fallout from this moment. None of that answers the question of if a legacy land has any meaningful legal protection. Again, it doesn't.

As I'd expressed, it's my opinion that this group governs through a good deal of fear. I don't believe you're afraid of the people of Camas though, I think what you're actually afraid of is a date in November next year when three members of this council will be asked by this city to answer for their actions during this moment and many before it. We're here now, and we'll be there then.

To the Mayor and Council.

Please consider what steps the city can take to improve water quality at LaCamas Lake.

The city found \$71,000 for work on a pond near Parker Estates. What has the city done about the biofilter at LaCamas Shores subdivision? Are there any plans to help repair the reportedly failed biofilter?

What impact do motorized watercraft have on water quality in LaCamas Lake? Has any consideration been given to possible restrictions on motorized watercraft in light of the increasing frequency of warnings about toxic algae in LaCamas Lake?

Lastly, my question about whether the city is now recruiting or has already hired an economic development manager has not been answered. I read the state audit reports and findings related to CWEDA and wonder how the city allowed city funds to be utilized without basic financial accounting from 2011-2019. The generous salary of 9,700-\$11,000 paid to former Camas Mayor Paul Dennis for an average of 4 hours of work seems excessive, especially with no financial reporting or accountability required.

Perhaps Camas can utilize the services of CREDC this year instead of hiring a full time economic development manager to replace the CWEDA director who resigned, and save funds for higher priority projects like road repair and improved water quality in the lakes.

PROCLAMATION OF CIVIL EMERGENCY CITY OF CAMAS, WASHINGTON

Whereas, Camas Municipal Code Section 2.48.020 provides that in the event an emergency occurs which causes or is tending to cause danger or injury to persons or damage to property to such an extent that extraordinary measures must be taken to protect the public health, safety and welfare then the Mayor may proclaim a civil emergency to exist; and

Whereas, in the interest of public safety and welfare, Washington state law under Chapter 38.52 RCW sets forth certain powers exercisable by municipalities in the event of emergencies; and

Whereas, Camas Municipal Code Chapter 8.56 sets forth additional procedures and powers related to Emergency Management; and

Whereas, on February 29, 2020, Governor Jay Inslee declared a state of emergency due to the public health emergency posed by the coronavirus 2019 (hereafter COVID-19); and

Whereas, on March 13, 2020, the Clark County Council announced a state of emergency resolution for Clark County regarding COVID-19. Similar emergency declarations have been issued in Washington, Multnomah, and Clackamas counties in the Portland metropolitan area; and

Whereas, on March 13, 2020, Governor Inslee ordered all K-12 public and private schools in Washington State to close by no later than March 17, 2020 and remained closed through April 24, 2020, further ordering on March 16, 2020 a statewide emergency proclamation to temporarily shut down restaurants, bars and entertainment and recreational facilities and ban all gatherings with over 50 participants, with all gatherings under 50 participants to be prohibited unless previously announced criteria for public health and social distancing are met; and

Whereas, on March 13, 2020, President Donald Trump declared a national emergency in the United States of America related to the COVID-19 outbreak; and

Whereas, as of March 14, 2020, the Washington State Department of Health reported a total of 642 confirmed cases of COVID-19 with 40 resulting deaths. As of March 14, 2020, at least 3 confirmed cases of COVID-19 have been reported in Clark County; and

Whereas, as reported by the Washington State Department of Health:

Public health experts agree that the true number of people who have been infected with COVID-19 in Washington greatly exceeds the number of COVID-19 infections that have been laboratory-confirmed. It is very difficult to know exactly how many people in Washington have been infected to date since most people with COVID-19 experience mild illness and the ability to get tested is still not widely available; and

Whereas, as Mayor of the City of Camas I have determined that it is necessary to proclaim the existence of a civil emergency and to take such actions as may be required to effectively utilize city resources in the protection of the public health, safety and welfare;

NOW, THEREFORE I, Barry McDonnell, Mayor of the City of Camas, Proclaim as follows:

- 1. I declare there is a civil emergency caused by COVID-19 in the City of Camas.
- 2. The civil emergency requires the implementation of those powers delineated in Chapter 2. 48 and 8.56 of the Camas Municipal Code and Chapter 38.52 RCW.
- 3. To the extent of such powers as granted by law, the City may enter into contracts and incur obligations, and take any other appropriate action necessary to address and respond to the emergency to protect the health and safety of persons and properties and to provide emergency assistance to persons affected by this emergency.
- 4. These powers will be exercised in light of the exigencies of the situation without regard to the formalities prescribed by State statutes and rules, or by City ordinance (except for mandatory constitutional requirements). These include but are not limited to budget law limitations, requirements for competitive bidding, publication of notices related to the performance of public work, entering into contracts, incurring of obligations, employment of temporary workers, rental of equipment, purchase of supplies and equipment, and the appropriation and expenditure of funds.
- 5. I delegate to the Department heads and their designees the authority to solicit quotes and estimates for contracts necessary to combat the emergency. Department heads may enter into contracts in an amount not to exceed Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000). Contracts over this amount will be signed by the Mayor.
- Department heads are further authorized to reassign staff from their ordinary duties to work
 deemed necessary to address the emergency outside their normal job duties and to require work
 beyond normal working hours in the performance of duties deemed necessary to respond to the
 emergency.
- 7. Pursuant to Camas Municipal Code sections 2.48.020 and 8.56.080 a copy of this Proclamation shall be filed with the City Clerk, a copy delivered to the Director of Emergency Management, State Emergency Management, and the Governor and the news media within the City shall be advised, with copies of this Proclamation posted at public places as may heretofore be designated.
- 8. This Proclamation will take effect upon my signature and will remain in effect until modified or terminated pursuant to Camas Municipal Code Section 2.48.040.

SUPPLEMENT TO PROCLAMATION OF CIVIL EMERGENCY ISSUED MARCH 18, 2020 CITY OF CAMAS, WASHINGTON

The recitals as set forth in the Proclamation of Civil Emergency, City of Camas, Washington issued March 18, 2020 are hereby adopted by reference.

For and as supplement to said Proclamation, as Mayor of the City of Camas, do Proclaim as follows:

- 1. The City hereby implements a moratorium on the hiring of new employees with exceptions to be granted on a case-by-case basis by the Mayor.
- 2. City employee accrual of overtime shall be limited to emergency and unavoidable circumstances.
- 3. The City hereby implements a moratorium on the hiring of any seasonal staff with exceptions to be granted by the Mayor.
- 4. No employee or elected official business travel, conference attendance, or training shall be occur except as required by law, with limited exceptions as may be otherwise approved in advance.
- 5. All City departments shall maintain their ongoing strict adherence to established budgets.
- 6. City capital projects deemed non-essential will be placed on hold.

This Supplement to Proclamation of Civil Emergency shall take effect upon my signature and will remain in effect until modified or terminated pursuant to Camas Municipal Code 2.48.040.

SUMMARY/NEED:

In 2013 and 2014, the City constructed Phase 1 of the NW 38th Avenue Roadway improvements project. This project connected NW 38th Avenue in Camas to SE 20th Street in Vancouver just east of SE 192nd Avenue. Due to project impacts to adjacent wetlands, a US Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) Wetland Permit (NWS-2011-0901) was issued in 2011. This permit required certain enhancements to these wetlands and requires the City to conduct monitoring and maintenance of these enhancements for a period of 10-years. The original contract with Environmental Land Services (ELS) covered the monitoring and maintenance for Years 1 through 5. Amendment 1 is for the maintenance and monitoring requirements for Years 6 through 8 of the 10-year Corps permit.

SCHEDULE:

Amendment 1 to the original contract enables ELS to continue with the monitoring and maintenance requirements for years 2020 (Year 6), 2021 (Year 7), and 2022 (Year 8).

DESIGN COST:

The original contract amount for years 1 through 5 was in the amount not to exceed of \$80,740.00. The amount for Amendment 1 for years 6 through 8 is for the total amount not to exceed \$32,700.00. The cost breakdown is as follows:

- Task 7 (Year 6) total is \$7,900.00
- Task 8 (Year 7) total is \$9,400.00
- Task 9 (Year 8) total is \$8,400.00
- Task 10 (Project Contingency Fund) total is \$7,000.00.

The contingency fund amount, which requires prior approval from the City, is to provide for any additional plantings or maintenance activities that may be identified by the Corps upon review of monitoring reports.

FUNDING:

The amount identified for Year 6 (Task 7) and the contingency fund (Task 10) amounts had been accounted for during the 2-year budget cycle for years 2019 and 2020.

The amounts for Year 7 (Task 8) and Year 8 (Task 9) will be included in the 2-year budget cycle for years 2021 and 2022. All costs are taken from the Stormwater fund.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends approval of the NW 38th Avenue Phase 1 Wetland Mitigation and Monitoring Professional Services Agreement Amendment 1 in the amount of \$32,700.00.

the mutTHIS AMENDMENT ("Amendment") to Professional Services Agreement is made as of the fler day of June, 2020, by and between the **City of Camas**, a municipal corporation, hereinafter referred to as "the City", and **Ecological Land Services**, hereinafter referred to as the "Consultant", in consideration of the mutual benefits, terms, and conditions hereinafter specified. The City and Consultant may herinafter be referred to collectively as the "Parties."

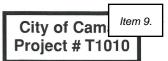
Plant Replacement Clause

NE 3rd Avenue Bridge Retrofit – Construction Services

SCOPE OF SERVICES -

Project Description

The existing NE 3rd Avenue Bridge in Camas is a two span structure approximately 225 feet long, carrying four lanes of traffic over the Washougal River. The nearest cross streets are NE Shepherd Road in Washougal, and NE 2nd Avenue in Camas. The bridge is comprised of two side by side structures, the first being a 1947 steel girder bridge which was then widened in 1970 with a concrete girder bridge. The bridge provides a critical arterial link between the cities of Camas and Washougal, and has ADTs in the range of 10k. Camas has received Federal Funding through the WSDOT Local Bridge Program to design and construct seismic and other related improvements.

- Full-time field visits will require 10 hours per visit, on average, for travel, on-site work, and field report preparation time.

SUMMARY/NEED:

Preliminary Engineering and Right-of-Way services for the NE 3rd Avenue Bridge Seismic Retrofit project have been completed, and the City has received approval from WSDOT to advertise for construction bids. The current contract with the City's engineering consultant (HHPR) does not include Construction Management and Administration services. Staff has determined that these services are essential to assure contractor compliance with contract documents and governmental regulations. These additional services have been negotiated with HHPR and are presented as a contract supplement.

SCHEDULE:

The city is currently soliciting bids for construction. Bids will be opened on June 29, 2020 and presented for Council consideration on July 6, 2020. Construction is scheduled to begin in August 2020 and will be completed in April 2021.

DESIGN COST:

The original contract with HHPR was supplemented twice for additional work during the Preliminary Engineering phase. Additional fees for Construction Management and Administration services are presented as Proposed Supplement 3. The amounts of the original contract and supplements are shown below:

- 1. HHPR Original Contract Amount: \$570,140
- 2. HHPR Supplement 1: \$15,405
- 3. HHPR Supplement 2: \$33,200
- 4. HHPR Proposed Supplement 3: \$399,937
- 5. Adjusted Contract Amount (sum of original and supplements): \$1,018,682

FUNDING:

Construction funding is 100% reimbursed by WSDOT through a federal grant. Proposed Supplement 3 fees are included in the construction funding. A summary of the project costs are shown below:

Staff recommends Council approve the Contract Supplement 3 agreement with HHPR for Construction Management and Administration in the amount of \$399,937.

SUMMARY/NEED:

The Six Year Transportation Improvement Program, also known as the 6 Year Street Plan, is updated each year prior to commencement of the Washington State fiscal year of July 1 per the requirements of the Revised Code of Washington (RCW) 35.77.010. This year's program is for calendar years 2021 through 2026. The plan consists of the list, map and appendices. The purpose of the Plan is to assure that each city shall perpetually have available advanced plans looking to the future for not less than six years as a guide in carrying out a coordinated transportation program.

CHANGES AFTER THE HEARING:

Based on comments from Council, staff made the following changes to the plan:

- Priority 1 SR-500 added "bridge replacement" to the description and raised the cost.
- NEW PROJECT Priority 6 NW Brady & Grand Ridge Intersection Safety Improvements
- Priorities 6 through 50 Moved 1 down the list
- Priority 12 (now) Crown Road Cost correction
- Priority 13 (now) SR-14 West Camas Slough Bridge Cost correction

PUBLIC COMMENTS:

Staff reported at the public hearing that there were no public comments to date; however, it was discovered that Adam Kluka, 7021 NW Friberg/Strunk Street, submitted comments to city hall prior to the public hearing. The dates on the submittals are May 29, 2020 and June 1, 2020. Staff missed these submittals due to working from home. Mr. Kluka requests that, due to new homes along the corridor, NW Payne Street from Lake Road to Camas Meadows Drive (now shown as Priority 28) be given a higher priority than the Northshore corridors that currently have little to know development at this time. Mr. Kluka also requests that, based on 3 new developments along the south edge of the corridor, North Dwyer Creek Street "B" from NW Friberg/Strunk Street to Larkspur Street (now Priority 27) be moved up the list. Staff notes that grant funding for these two corridors is quite challenging. As staff is neutral on these requests and Mr. Kluka's comments were not addressed at the public hearing, it is recommended that Council acknowledge and consider these requests prior to adoption of Resolution 20-006.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends adoption of Resolution No. 20-006.

The Comprehensive Street Program heretofore adopted and revised by the City Engineer for the City of Camas, as submitted to the City Council for the City of Camas, be and the same is hereby adopted and extended for an additional six (6) year period from the date thereof.

The City Clerk shall file a copy of said revised Comprehensive Street Program for the ensuing six (6) years, together with a copy of this Resolution, with the Secretary of Transportation of the State of Washington.

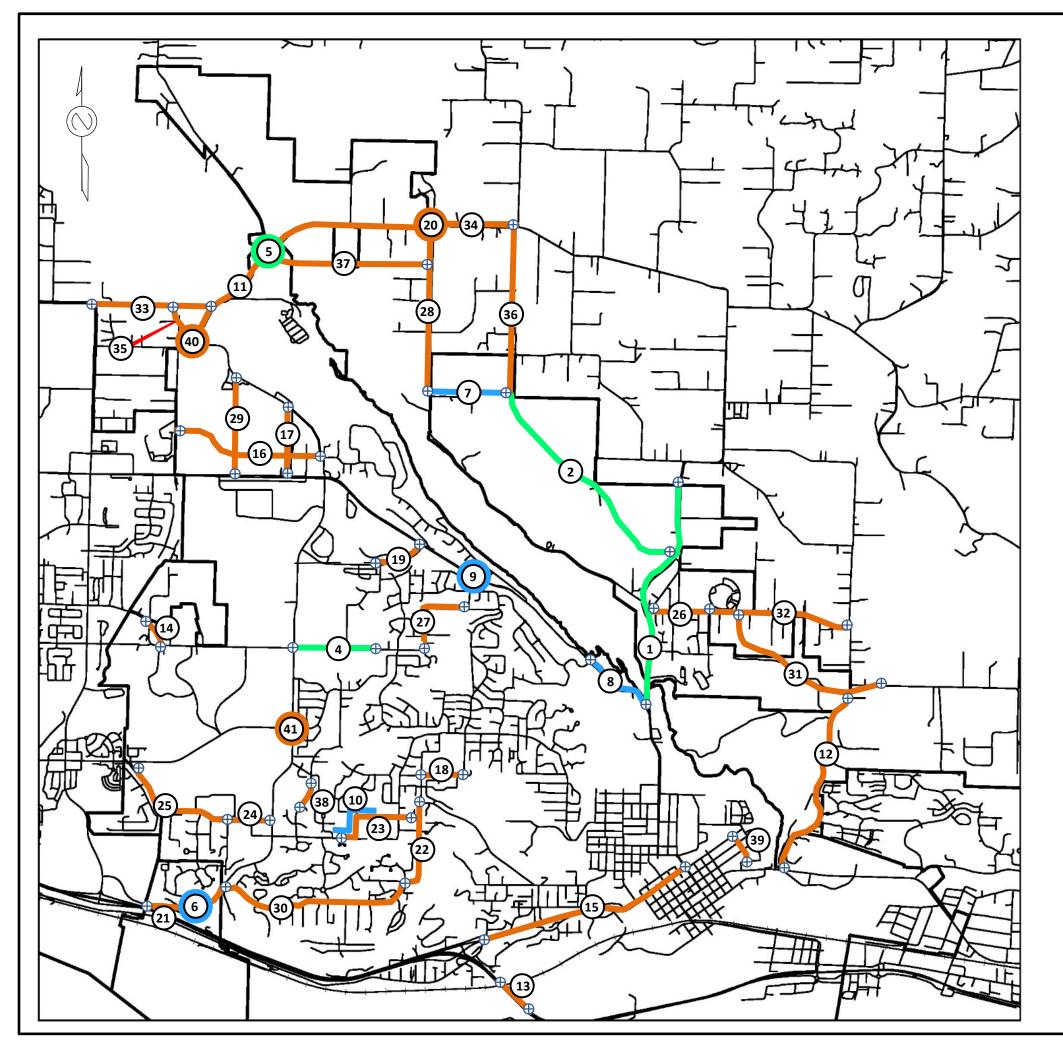

INTRODUCTION/PURPOSE/SUMMARY: This is a renewal of an existing program that started in 2019. Watershed Alliance of Southwest Washington has teamed up with Portland Audubon and Columbia Land Trust to bring the Backyard Habitat Certification Program (BHCP) to Clark County. The intent of the BHCP is to provide technical assistance, financial incentives, encouragement and recognition to people that want to create natural, low-maintenance gardens that support people, wildlife, and the planet. This program will help reduce the urban footprint and meet the City's Stormwater NPDES Permit requirements.

The Watershed Alliance visited a number of sites in the City of Camas this last year and there is still many eager participants on the waiting list.

BUDGET IMPACT: \$5,579 expenditure from the Stormwater Capacity Grant received from the Department of Ecology in 2019. There will be no direct budget impact to the Stormwater Fund.

Recommended Action: Staff recommends Council approve the Memorandum of Understanding and authorize the Mayor to sign on behalf of the City.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING FOR BACKYARD HABITAT CERTIFICATION PROGRAM (MOU) between

COLUMBIA LAND TRUST

(Administrative Lead for the Backyard Habitat Certification Program collaborators) and CITY OF CAMAS

A. Purpose: The Backyard Habitat Certification Program (BHCP) was created through a joint venture between Portland Audubon and Columbia Land Trust. Recently, the Watershed Alliance of SW Washington collaborated with Portland Audubon and the Land Trust with the goal of bringing this program to residents of City of Camas (City). Two of the five BHCP goals are to work directly with private property owners to improve stormwater management on their property and reduce the use of pesticides. The purpose of this agreement is to document the respective responsibilities of the BHCP collaborators and City.

B. Responsibilities of the City:

- 1. Provide support for the BHCP from July 1, 2020 thru June 30, 2021, not to exceed \$5,579.23.
- 2. Publicize program information (City webpage, social media outlets and flier distribution at events).
- C. <u>Responsibilities of Columbia Land Trust</u>: act as fiscal agent for BHCP and either provide for and arrange with Portland Audubon and the Watershed Alliance to provide the following:
 - 1. In-person site assessment by BHCP staff Habitat Technicians:
 - a. Collect baseline data pertaining to stormwater management and pesticide use for each property.
 - 2. Participant site reports:
 - a. Provide participants with information on stormwater management options.
 - b. Provide participants with information on how to recognize harmful herbicides/pesticides, reduce usage and create awareness of alternative pest management options.
 - 3. Biannual data reporting shall include;*
 - a. Total number of enrolled City residents;
 - b. Number of enrollees attaining certification status;
 - c. Follow-up data taken/improvements implemented (compared to baseline data) pertaining to stormwater and/or reductions in pesticide use.
 - d. Data reports shall be submitted biannually (timeline below);
 - Biannual 1, 2020 (July December). Due by January 10, 2020
 - Biannual 2, 2021 (January June). Due by July 10, 2020
 - *A spreadsheet with data collected during site assessments and certifications (stormwater, pesticide use, number of native trees and shrubs planted) will satisfy reporting requirements a c above.
