#### **MINUTES**

# CALL TO ORDER WITH INVOCATION GIVEN BY GAYLE TABOR, PASTOR OF CHURCH AT THE BOARDWALK, FOLLOWED BY THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mayor Barbee called the meeting to order at 6:30 PM.

Mayor Barbee said during the past month and a half, the Town has lost 3 community servants: Captain Mike Britt and Vickie Hester, both of whom were instrumental with the Carolina Beach Inlet Association, and Teresa Shue, who served on the Town's Board of Adjustment. He asked everyone to keep them in their hearts and think about their families.

Pastor Gayle Tabor of Church at the Boardwalk gave the invocation, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

#### **SPECIAL PRESENTATIONS**

10. Presentation by the Centennial Committee

Maureen Lewis, Chairman of the Centennial Committee, presented the nominated finalists for adult and youth logo submissions for the Town's 100<sup>th</sup> birthday celebration in 2025. She said the committee used a blind selection process from a pool of 13 adult submissions and chose the logo by Brent Myers, a Wilmington graphic designer. Ms. Lewis said the committee plans to use all submissions in some way during the centennial celebration.

The youth winner was Giovanna Cannistraci-Ortiz, a 6-year-old Carolina Beach Elementary School student.

If approved by Council, the adult winner will receive \$250 and the youth winner will get \$50, with both prizes funded by the Island Arts Council. Ms. Lewis said all submissions will be framed compliments of Skip Sprague of Tip Top Frame so they may be displayed at Town Hall.

11. Mid-Year Financial Update

Finance Director Debbie Hall presented a brief mid-year update on the Town's budget vs. actuals for July 1, 2021 -December 31, 2021.

#### Major General Fund Revenue Sources

Ms. Hall said overall the Town is at 60 percent of budgeted revenue, which is on target and a really good place to be.

#### **General Fund Expenses**

Ms. Hall said the Town has spent 48 percent of what was budgeted, and the number is not higher because a lot of debt service falls toward the end of the year.

#### **Utility Fund Revenue Sources**

Ms. Hall said 51 percent of budgeted revenue has been collected, which is where the Town is expected to be.

#### **Utility Fund Expenses**

Ms. Hall said 40 percent of expenses have been utilized, and there is revenue bond debt coming up toward the end of the fiscal year that will put the Town back on track.

#### Moody's Annual Credit Rating

Ms. Hall said the Town was assessed again in February and has the second-highest credit rating awarded, which is an impressive place to be for a Town of this size. The General Fund Rating is Aa1, and the Utility Fund Rating is Aa3. Ms. Hall said she feels confident the Town will maintain this good rating.

Council Member Benson asked if the Town had collected any revenue for The Proximity or if that would be coming later. Mr. Parvin said those plans are still under review, so the Town has not yet collected any revenue. He said projections in March would give an idea of the revenue that can be expected from The Proximity and other upcoming projects.

Council Member Benson pointed out that the slide regarding the Utility Fund showed that revenue was less than expenses. He asked if the difference is addressed by American Rescue Plan funds. Ms. Hall said that was a typo, and updated slides show a balanced budget.

Council Member Benson asked if the revenue bonds required increasing utility rates for the first 5 years of the 25-year term. Ms. Hall said yes, that was determined by a feasibility consultant, and to be able to meet the covenants the Town had to make those increases. Council Member Benson asked if the Town should anticipate those types of conditions on future revenue bonds. Ms. Hall said a feasibility consultant would have to assess it and decide as to how much the Town would need to increase or whether there should be any increase at all. She said the Local Government Commission (LGC) requires hiring an independent contractor.

Mayor Barbee asked if the Town is through the 5 rate increases. Ms. Hall said yes.

Council Member Benson asked whether rollover funds from previous years that are in the Powell Bill Fund now will be associated with conditions to be used for a particular street improvement project.

Mr. Oakley said he doesn't think that will be in the case in the rollover, but there may be some Powell Bill funds in the new budget tied to certain projects.

#### 12. Manager's Update

Town Manager Bruce Oakley gave an update on various projects and events.

He went over key dates for the budget schedule:

- January 27-28, annual retreat kickoff
- April 12, budget overview and community input
- April 26 and May 3, budget workshops
- May 24, present budget message
- June 14, adopt the budget

Mr. Oakley said there will also be a budget open house to allow for public input and review at a date to be determined.

#### CSRM - Beach Nourishment

- Great Lakes Dredge and Dock Company
- Construction Early February
- Completion March 30

#### Hamlet Bathhouse and Ocean Rescue

- Project is under construction
- Currently on schedule to be completed by end of March

#### American Rescue Plan Projects

- Florida Avenue: Public Utilities is awaiting receipt of final quotes for lining of sewer pipe. Survey work is being done to facilitate engineered drawings for roadway and bulkhead. Mr. Oakley added that inflation and lack of labor are affecting projects, which are taking longer and costing more. He said numbers may change going forward.
- Hamlet Avenue: Staff is obtaining quotes for the drainage work to the eastern end of the roadway.
- Spartanburg and Second Street: A survey is being conducted of this area to allow the engineer to rework the stormwater and ditch clearing.

Mayor Barbee asked Mr. Oakley if he will let Council know if projects result in budget troubles. Mr. Oakley said yes, but he thinks everything is OK for now as the Town awaits some information to get final costs.

Mr. Parvin gave an update on other projects.

#### Saint Joseph Bike Path

• The project is creating a multi-use path on Saint Joseph Street and Lewis Drive from North Lake Park Boulevard to Access Road.

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- Kimley-Horn is working on designing the scope for the project. The Town will forward to the N.C. Department of Transportation (DOT) when complete.
- Representatives from Kimley-Horn and DOT plan to be at the January 24 Bike/Ped Committee meeting.

#### Marina

- The project is the installation of new bulkheads and floating docks on the south and east sides
  of the marina. The design will mirror the recently completed west side.
- Project is out to bid.
- Bid opening is scheduled for February 3.

Mr. Parvin said this is a 24-month project that will cover 2 summer seasons. He said there is no way around this.

Mayor Barbee said one phase will require digging up Canal Drive, so he hopes that work can be done outside of peak season. Mr. Parvin said the project engineer grew up here and understands the need for this.

Council Member Hoffer asked for specifics about funds the Town recently received from the State. Mr. Oakley said the Town has filled out paperwork and is waiting for further details from the State for some of the funding. He said \$3 million is in the process of being turned over, and the remaining \$900,000 is in the budget and should come with further instructions soon.

Mayor Barbee said the dredging equipment that is now in the Intracoastal Waterway is for a U.S. Army Corps of Engineers project to dredge Snow's Cut. He said that sand will again be deposited on Masonboro Island instead of Freeman Park. Mayor Barbee said the Town tried to get it for Freeman Park, but due to legalities this effort was not attainable with the current property owners.

#### **PUBLIC COMMENT**

Wayne Carpenter of 1150 The King's Highway in Wilmington said although he lives just across the bridge, he is a Town business owner. He said his business, Coastal NC Adventure Co., does not have a brick-and-mortar presence but in 2021 spent more than 85 percent of its operating time in the Town's waters with kayaking, paddleboarding, and surfing. Mr. Carpenter said in the past he was able to purchase an annual non-resident parking pass, but this year Council has decided not to offer those. He said this would result in spending \$2,500 in parking fees over 100 days, which is a huge expense to a small business owner and would persuade him to do business in places where he can park for free. Mr. Carpenter said his business brings \$15,000 to \$20,000 per summer into the Town through employees and clients patronizing local businesses, but that money will go somewhere else under current circumstances. He urged Council to reconsider getting rid of the annual non-resident parking pass.

Patrick Boykin of 712 Glenn Avenue said he wanted to inquire about an alleyway behind his property. He said he has heard rumors that it will be sold, and his understanding when he purchased his property was that the alleyway was a Town easement and nothing was going to happen with it. Mr. Boykin said he has looked up tax records and can't find a parcel ID for that piece of property, so he can't determine

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who owns it. He said there is a fence along the far side in need of repair, and he is trying to find out who to contact about this.

Mr. Boykin also said he and his neighbors had gotten some response to the 5 petitions from the Ocean Heights subdivision, but they still haven't heard back about the possible addition of speed bumps or prohibiting through-traffic to slow the speed of cars in the community.

James Sattie of 610 Glenn Avenue passed some information to Council Members. He said it appears that the owner of the property in question is his neighbor at 608 Glenn Avenue and that the fence is in violation and has been since day one. Mr. Sattie said he thinks construction on the fence outlined on his drawing should begin immediately.

Olin Furr of 440 Oceana Way said he wanted to talk about resurfacing roads in the Town. He said there are many streets that need work on the North End, so he's hoping Council will make it a priority. Mr. Furr said he doesn't think the Town is maintaining streets like it should and needs a master plan. He said he would be glad to volunteer to help with this. Mr. Furr also said flooding on Canal Drive is a hard problem to solve, but it's time to fix it. He said someone mentioned dune infiltration to get rid of excess water, so the Town should look at this option.

Mayor Barbee asked Planning Director Jeremy Hardison to help Mr. Boykin understand who owns the property behind him. He said as far as paving, the Town needs a longer-range schedule at some point.

Council Member Benson asked if there are any stipulations in the Powell Bill related to paving. Mr. Oakley said Council can discuss this matter at the retreat. Mr. Hardison said Code Enforcement can look at what's going on with the fence.

#### 905 Basin Road

Current use: 7 mobile homes

- Marina Business District
  - Established to reserve area along the water's edge for water-dependent and wateroriented uses
  - o Provides for residential and other non-water-dependent uses
- Multi-family dwellings greater than 4 units (CZ)
  - Allowed in accordance with specific standards and conditions pertaining to an individual development project
  - Standards may include landscaping, design guidelines, and infrastructure, pedestrian, street, and right-of-way improvements

#### **Surrounding Uses**

- Tom's Marine
- Federal Point Yacht Club neighborhood

#### CZ

- Subject to specific conditions that ensure compatibility and enjoyment of neighboring properties
- Standards may include such things as landscaping, design guidelines, buffers, infrastructure improvements (i.e., water), and pedestrian, street, and right-of-way improvements
- Allows a particular use to be established only in accordance with specific standards and conditions pertaining to an individual development project

#### Site Plan

- 8 units (2 fronting Saint Joseph Street and others on Basin Road)
- 24 parking spaces (3 per unit)
- Each unit has 3 to 4 bedrooms

#### **CZ Process**

- Public meeting Friday, October 22
- 8 people attended
- Concerns stormwater issues on Basin Road
  - o Town is planning upgrades; currently in engineering stage

#### Conditions (proposed by staff)

- Utilities must be installed in accordance with Town requirements
- All relevant requirements of the fire code must be met (i.e., installation of fire hydrants and sprinklers)

The project includes an on-site stormwater control system per the Town stormwater ordinance.

#### Criteria

- When evaluating, Council shall consider the following:
  - Application's consistency to the general policies and objectives of the Town's CAMA Land Use Plan, any other officially adopted plan that is applicable, and the zoning ordinance
  - Potential impacts and/or benefits on the surrounding area and adjoining properties
  - Report of results from the public input meeting
- Council may include additional standards such as landscaping, design guidelines, buffers, infrastructure improvements (i.e., water), and pedestrian, street, and right-of-way improvements

#### Land Use Plan

The project is in general conformity with the 2020 Land Use Plan; this area supports mixed uses

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of commercial and residential.

Staff recommended approval of the project and so did the Planning and Zoning Commission by a vote of 6-0.

Ned Barnes of 814 Carolina Beach Avenue North, the attorney representing the applicant, said the property is going from a residential use to another residential use. He said the benefit is what's being built will be in compliance with current building codes. Mr. Barnes said owners of property in the surrounding area are all in favor of the project. He said the plan is to contain stormwater on the site, and he thinks the applicant has gone above and beyond what is required.

Mayor Barbee asked if there was any public comment. No one requested to speak.

Council Member Hoffer asked how the tree ordinance plays into this. Mr. Hardison said the applicant is going to try to keep existing trees, but nothing in the ordinance requires this. He said the applicant will be exceeding the current tree preservation ordinance.

Council Member LeCompte asked if this includes street improvements. Mr. Parvin said staff can bring back details on the Basin Road stormwater project.

Mayor Pro Tem Healy said it sounds like the applicant has addressed stormwater and gone above and beyond.

<u>ACTION:</u> Motion to approve Ordinance 22-1166, that whereas in accordance with the provisions of NCGS, the Council does hereby find and determine that the adoption of the Conditional Use District to allow for a multi-family project consisting of 8 townhome units located at 905 Basin Road is consistent with the goals and objectives of the adopted Land Use Plan and long-range plans and the potential impacts on the surrounding area are mitigated by the conditions

14. Conditional Zoning to consider a multifamily project consisting of 9 townhome units located at 406, 408, & 410 Canal Dr in the Tourist (T-1) zoning district.

Applicant: Tank Construction Supplies LLC

Mr. Hardison presented the details.

#### 406, 408, 410 Canal Drive

- Current use: vacant
- Tourist district
  - Complementary to Central Business District (CBD)
  - Moderate- to high-density residential
- Multi-family dwellings greater than 4 units (Conditional Zoning, or CZ)
  - Allowed in accordance with specific standards and conditions pertaining to an individual development project
  - Standards may include landscaping, design guidelines, and infrastructure, pedestrian, street, and right-of-way improvements

#### **Surrounding Uses**

- Single-family
- Planned Unit Development (PUD) behind it approved recently for 6 units

#### **Former Approvals**

2006 – one structure with 11 units (not built; lot is currently vacant)

#### CZ

- Subject to specific conditions that ensure compatibility and enjoyment of neighboring properties
- Standards may include such things as landscaping, design guidelines, buffers, infrastructure improvements (i.e., water), and pedestrian, street, and right-of-way improvements
- Allows a particular use to be established only in accordance with specific standards and conditions pertaining to an individual development project

#### Site Plan

- 9 units
- Providing 3 parking spaces per unit

#### **Plans**

Each unit will have about 3 bedrooms

#### **CZ Process**

- Public meeting Friday, October 29
- 3 people attended
- Concerns stormwater
  - Applicant plans to install underground stormwater systems

#### Conditions (proposed by staff)

- Utilities must be installed in accordance with Town requirements
- All relevant requirements of the fire code must be met
- Recombination plat required before building permit can be issued

The project includes an on-site stormwater control system per the Town stormwater ordinance.

#### Criteria

- When evaluating, Council shall consider the following:
  - Application's consistency to the general policies and objectives of the Town's Coastal Area Management Act (CAMA) Land Use Plan, any other officially adopted plan that is applicable, and the zoning ordinance
  - o Potential impacts and/or benefits on the surrounding area and adjoining properties
  - Report of results from the public input meeting
- Council may include additional standards such as landscaping, design guidelines, buffers, infrastructure improvements (i.e., water), and pedestrian, street, and right-of-way improvements

#### Land Use Plan

The project is in general conformity with the 2020 Land Use Plan; it supports higher-density residential/light commercial in this area.

Staff recommended approval of the project and so did the Planning and Zoning Commission by a vote of 6-0.

Council Member Hoffer said he likes that there is one driveway.

Mayor Pro Tem Healy asked why there are 9 and not 11 units. Mr. Shanks said they want to be conforming and refrain from creating an overly dense situation.

Mayor Barbee asked if Fire Chief Alan Griffin has seen and approved the project. Mr. Hardison said yes and that he had no access issues.

Mayor Barbee asked if there was any public comment. No one requested to speak.

16. Budget Amendment to pay the NCDOT administrative fees for the Island Greenway and Cape Fear Blvd MUP

In August 2020, the Town unexpectedly received "closeout" invoices totaling \$92,394 from DOT for administrative and construction inspections costs for the Island Greenway project. Project construction ended in March 2019, and final reimbursements were received in full as requested in March 2020. At

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no time during the 7-year project was there any communication from/with DOT that the Town was not being billed monthly for these services in accordance with the DOT-provided Programs Management Handbook and materials presented during Wilmington Urban Planning Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (WMPO) grant workshops.

Over the past 1.5 years, the Town has been working with WMPO and DOT staff concerning the invoices. The Town advised all that the charges were a complete surprise and there had been no communication that there would be closeout charges. The Town had closed the project out, and there was no money left in the budget. The Town also advised all it was the Town's intent to dispute these charges for various detailed reasons.

After working with DOT and WMPO, the Town was able to reduce the costs from \$92,394 to \$28,934.24. These projects are closed out, so a budget amendment would be required to allocate these funds.

Mr. Parvin presented the details.

The Oceana HOA hired an independent contractor to camera and assess the system. This report was followed by a list of recommended repairs. The Oceana HOA provided this report to the Town and sought approval for the necessary repairs, along with the proposed methods. Once in agreement, the HOA hired a utility contractor to perform the needed repairs, and these repairs were inspected by Town staff.

Mr. Oakley presented the details.

Council Member Hoffer said he's not that comfortable with this because he doesn't see how it's in the Town's best interest. Mr. Oakley said all property owners pay stormwater fees to the Town. Council Member Hoffer asked for specifics about the system. Mr. Parvin said it's piping that goes out to the wetland area between Freeman Park and Oceana.

Mayor Barbee said he is good with it.

Council Member LeCompte asked if this is an agreement made by a prior Council. Ms. Fox gave some background about the issue.

Council Member Hoffer and Council Member LeCompte said they'd like to hear more history about this. Mr. Oakley said he can bring back additional information in February.

#### 19. Resolutions for LGC approval of HVAC financing

Council approved debt service in the 2021-2022 fiscal year budget for replacement of the HVAC system at the Municipal Complex at 1121 North Lake Park Boulevard. Because replacement of the heating and cooling system is considered improvements to real property, the Town must submit an application to the LGC for approval.

Town Manager Bruce Oakley and Assistant Manager Ed Parvin gave an update on the State of the Town.

Utilities Director Mark Meyer presented his top three priorities for the 2022/2023 fiscal year. The number one priority is the headworks at a cost of \$3.3 million. Others included the Phase I Water Study, 7<sup>th</sup> Street Water Extension, and restoring the drying bed at the wastewater treatment plant.

Fire Chief Alan Griffin reviewed his top priorities, number one being personnel. He is requesting 3 additional firefighter positions to handle the growth and call volume. This would also assist in staffing the ladder truck. Chief also reviewed the 10-year plan for fire apparatus and equipment.

Police Chief Vic Ward also focused on personnel. He is requesting a 5% salary increase for current and future personnel. The estimated cost would be around \$85,000. He also mentioned adding a specialized unit for rapid intervention. His third priority is technology upgrades.

Public Works Direct Brian Stanberry focused on stormwater improvements. The first priority would be Canal Drive, specifically the Starfish street end. Other projects include roadway maintenance.

Planning Director Jeremy Hardison presented the need for adopting a Unified Development Ordinance. He also reviewed efficiencies in the permitting process.

Parks and Recreation Director Eric Jelinski reviewed the proposed projects for FY22/23, Some of those include the restroom at Lake Park, disability park opportunities at 1710 Carolina Beach Avenue North, and a skate park expansion. Eric also explained the newly formed non-profit organization, Friends of Carolina Beach Parks and Greenways.

Ed Parvin presented the Administration department's requests. The departments include Executive, Human Resources, Finance, Marina, and Town Clerk.

Bruce Oakley mentioned that admin is requesting three new positions including a public information officer in executive, a financial analyst in finance, and an administrative support specialist in human resources.

Ed Parvin reviewed the Lake Dredge project numbers. The scope is to dredge the remaining 50,000 cubic yards to an average depth of 6 feet. The bids received were between \$6.3 million and \$11.3 million. Staff recommends doing a phased approach. The first phase would reduce the lake depth as much as possible utilizing the spoils onsite. Council supported this idea if it meets the stormwater needs.

Meeting facilitator Chris Aycock reviewed strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats.

The budget portion of the workshop paused to allow former Congressman and lobbyist Mike McIntyre to give an update on the progress on the projects he is working on and potential money that may be coming available.

We are submitting a quote for the monitoring and relocation of the sea turtle nests for the 2022 sea turtle nesting season for Carolina Beach and Freeman Park. We are a 501C non-profit corporation comprised of volunteers. Many volunteers like myself have been involved in nesting activities at Carolina Beach since the volunteer program formed 21 years ago. This is my eighteenth year serving as volunteer coordinator for Carolina Beach, and my seventeenth year as the holder of the NC Wildlife Resources Commission endangered species permit for Carolina Beach (copy attached). We will be operating as a group under my permit. This permit will enable us to conduct activities involving nesting, hatching, and stranded sea turtles anywhere in North Carolina.

Surveying of the beachfront and/or monitoring of nests would begin May 1, 2022 and continue until the end of the hatching season on or before November 30, 2022.

Our fee will be \$6000, which covers our leased 4x4 vehicle that being used for ferrying volunteers to Freeman Park, and moving supplies to support our walking beach patrol. Our fee includes all aspects in the Scope of Work (attached).

Any and all nests laid in Freeman Park will be relocated to Carolina Beach for monitoring at the discretion of the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission.

We look forward to working with you, the town officials, and the citizens of Carolina Beach in the protection of this unique marine animal. We feel that we are an asset to the Town due to the popularity of our Sea Turtles and the educational programs that we provide to tourists and locals alike.

Friends of Felines was formed in 1996 as a 501 c 3 Non Profit Rescue group in New Hanover County. We are requesting \$3,000.00 in funding to trap/neuter/vaccinate/return feral and free roaming cats in Carolina Beach. This will neuter and vaccinate approximately 85 cats. Historically, Carolina Beach has been a dumping ground for unwanted cats from the Wilmington area. Sadly, these unaltered cats have become feral and reproduced causing an overpopulation of cats on the island.

Over the last 25 years the feral cat population has reduced greatly due to the TNVR program, however there is still much more to be done. We have already begun the process of identifying households that feed free roaming cats. The caregivers we have contacted are very positive in their response to any offer of assistance with their free-roaming cat colonies.

The funds we are requesting will help us continue to focus on the proactive approach as well as react to the current issues at hand. We are making a real difference in the overpopulation of feral and stray cats in this area with the help of committed caregivers and compassionate town council members like you.

Friends of Felines has a hotline, FB page, website, email address and monitor local social media pages where residents who need help can get in touch with us to get help. We loan caregiver's traps and carriers, show them how to use them and schedule an appointment with one of our dedicated veterinarians in the area. If someone is elderly or physically cannot trap/transport, we will have a volunteer help.

#### Protocols:

- 1. Cats must be feral/free roaming or un-owned.
- 2. Cats must have a caregiver to provide food/water and as much shelter as possible.
- 3. Volunteer will speak with each person asking for assistance to make sure it is okay to trap on the property.
- 4. Volunteer/Caregiver must have the okay from homeowner/renter or resident
- 5. Flyers will be passed out and placed in doors to let people know what we are doing and when we will be there.
- 6. Cats will be trapped in a humane trap with a towel placed over it to keep the cats quiet.

Cats will be transported to one of our participating Veterinarian hospitals where they will be seen by a licensed vet. Once under anesthesia, they will be given a physical and oral exam. The cats will then be spayed/neutered and vaccinated for rabies and distemper. They are placed in a carrier with a towel on the bottom where they will be observed during the recovery period. Volunteers/Caregivers will take the cats home for post-surgery observation (24 – 48 hours), then taken back to the area in which they were trapped and released.

Targeted TNVR will provide spay/neuter and vaccine services to approximately 85 cats and kittens in Carolina Beach. All of the Project's spay/neuter surgeries will be funded with this money. In addition, residents will be educated about feral cat care and the need for TNVR.

#### 1. Target Identification:

We are working with New Hanover County Animal Services & Carolina Beach residents to determine the area of greatest need within the community. We appreciate any and all input on areas that need help. We are currently working with Connie Jo Evans to get all of her colonies spayed/neutered and vaccinated. She has several colonies she cares for on the island, none of which are completely under control. We just finished the Mermaid project which was one of her colonies with 7 cats. The building was demolished the morning after we caught the last orange tabby cat. Connie Jo is just one example of people in need.

#### 2. Project effectiveness and impact:

We have reduced the number of complaints to the town and Animal Services by reducing the number of cats in the area. Once a cat is fixed, poor behavior such as spraying, fighting, mating and roaming are greatly reduced if not eliminated. We want to continue the downward trend of complaints.

We have reduced the number of killed or injured cats on our roads.

Our program has continued to reduce the number of kittens born under porches, houses, sheds and in the woods. These kittens would have grown up and continue the breeding cycle.

We reduce the number of animals turned into Animal Services which costs the county approximately \$100 for one cat to be housed and fed prior to being euthanized.

Community involvement and education is the key to any programs success. Colony caregivers will become aware of the importance of spaying/neutering their animals and how easy it can be achieved. Spreading knowledge and information about caring for feral cats, and hands on training will be vital to the proper continuing care for these animals.

With this money we will be able to reduce the number of cat complaints to the town, cats that are killed or injured on the side of the road, help educate the people on the importance of fixing their animals, reduce the euthanasia rate from this area at animal services and most importantly save animals lives. It is a win-win proposal.

#### 2022 Budget

Current year budget – we rely solely on donations. We spend as much money as we have available on spay/neuter, medical and food for feral cats that have gone through our program. Our budget varies based on donations. Our average spay/neuter cost per cat is \$35. This includes spay/neuter, rabies vaccine, distemper vaccine and ear tip.

We have no paid employees. Our volunteers work out of their homes.

Major sources of funding are from donations, grants and awards.

# FRIENDS OF FELINES

Friends of Felines is an all-volunteer, non-profit organization. Our purpose is:

PROMOTING HUMANE NON-LETHAL POPULATION CONTROL OF FERAL CATS BY MEANS OF A "TRAP/SPAY-NEUTER/VACCINATE/RETURN" PROGRAM; EDUCATION TO THE PUBLIC ABOUT RESPONSIBLE CAT OWNERSHIP.

What are Feral cats? Pet cats who have been abandoned by their owners and have not been spayed or neutered are left to forage for food wherever they can find it. They band together to form "colonies" at a food source. When kittens are born, the mothers teach them to be wary of humans, to defend themselves, and they become feral (wild, untamed, undomesticated).

Friends of Felines advocates a "trap/spay-neuter/vaccinate/return" program in which cats are returned to the location where they were trapped. There must be a committed caretaker for Friends of Felines to work with, and the caretaker must continue to provide food and water on a daily basis for the cats.

"Trap and Kill" has NOT worked!! Other cats fill the void if there is any type of food source, and the breeding starts over again. "Trap and kill" costs taxpayer money (approximately \$100 to process on cat through Animal Services to be killed).

The most humane and cost effective solution is "trap/spay-neuter/vaccinate/return". The cats protect their territory and eventually die out through natural attrition.

Friends of Felines provides education about the benefits of the "trap/spay-neuter/vaccinate/return" program. FOF provides instructions in humanely trapping feral cats and asks for a \$35 donation for the spay/neuter of each cat. All of the feral cats are vaccinated for rabies and distemper. We tip the left ear 1/8 inch to distinguish them apart from domestic cats. We loan humane traps and recovery pet carriers for use in our Feral Cat Program.

As an all-volunteer, non-profit, charitable organization, donations of any amount are needed and greatly appreciated.

# CARETAKER INFORMATION SHEET

Friends of Felines, the State of North Carolina and the County of New Hanover want you to know the laws and codes concerning the care and well being of your feral colony. The following paragraphs outline the expectations of caretakers regarding care, vaccinations and complaints.

The caretaker must maintain their colony in an environment of sanitary conditions. All cats need adequate protection from the elements and have adequate food and water supply. If any animal becomes sick or diseased, the caretaker must contact their veterinarian to have the animal examined and properly cared for. All cats in the colony must be spayed or neutered and vaccinated against rabies.

The first rabies vaccination of a cat is valid for one year from the date of vaccination. A second vaccination is due after one year and is valid for three years from the date of vaccination. Friends of Felines will assist caretakers by lending you traps to have the cats vaccinated against rabies at the proper time. Rabies as well as distemper vaccinations are critical in controlling the spread of these diseases.

If a nuisance complaint is reported to Animal Services regarding your feral colony, please contact Friends of Felines at friendsofelines@aol.com as soon as possible. A public nuisance is anything, which annoys and disturbs right and privileges of others. Example: a cat turning over garbage containers, or damaging flower or vegetable gardens. Friends of Felines will assist you in answering any medical questions, vaccination dates and overall condition of your colony. We will work with you and Animal Services to resolve the complaint.

We ask all caretakers to keep cats under sanitary and humane conditions, to provide proper food and water at all times, shelter from the weather, reasonably clean quarters and proper medical attention for sick, diseased or injured animals, as well as adequate vaccinations against disease according to the laws of the State of North Carolina and the County of New Hanover.

# **HUMANE TRAPPING INSTRUCTIONS**

# PREPARATION FOR TRAPPING

If possible, get the cats used to being fed at the same place and time of day.

You might try leaving the trap unset and covered with a large towel during routine feeding so that the cat will get used to seeing and smelling it in the area.

Don't feed the cats the day/night before you are going to trap so the cats will be hungry. Be sure to notify others who may feed the cats not to leave food out either.

Plan to trap so that you don't have to keep the cat too long before surgery. Trapping the night before is usually the best approach. Cats should not eat 8 hours prior to surgery. Water should be available if the cat is kept in the trap for more than 4 hours after capture.

Prepare the area where you will be holding the cats before and after the clinic. A garage or other sheltered, warm/cool, protected area is best. Lay down newspapers to catch the inevitable stool, urine and food residue. You may want to use pieces of wood to elevate the traps off the newspapers. This allows the mess to fall through the wire away from the cats. Spraying the area ahead of time with a cat safe flea spray (like Adams or Ovitrol) will discourage ants.

Prepare the vehicle you will use to transport them as well. Plastic may be an additional precaution, but remember that you will need to use newspapers or some other absorbent material on top of the plastic. Urine will roll right off of the plastic and that isn't what you want.

Plan your day of trapping carefully. Remember that if you trap an animal and release it for some reason, it is unlikely that you will be able to catch it again anytime soon... they learn very quickly.

If there are young kittens involved, remember that they should not be weaned from the mother before 4-6 weeks of age. If you are trapping a lactating female, you may want to wait until you have located the kittens and they are old enough to wean. If you wish to tame and foster the kittens to adopt out, they should be taken from the mother at 4-6 weeks. If you wait until the kittens are older than 4-6 weeks before trying to tame them you will find the job progressively harder with age. (FOF has written instructions on Taming Feral Kittens and Raising Orphan Kittens).

# SETTING THE TRAPS

Plan to set traps just before or at the cats' normal feeding time. This is often at night. Dusk is usually the best time to set traps.

Don't trap in the rain or the heat of the day without adequate protection for the trap. Cats are vulnerable in the traps and could drown during storms or suffer from heatstroke in the sun. Use common sense!

If you are having trouble catching your cat, line the bottom of the trap with pine straw or sand to cover the wire bottom. Only cover to the trip plate. This will feel more natural to them and may help coax them to the food. Be careful not to

put too much straw or sand in the trap. We do not want it to interfere with the trap mechanism or prevent the door from closing properly.

Plan placement of traps on a level surface in the area where the cats usually feed or have been seen. Cats are less likely to enter the trap if it wobbles. If trapping in a public area, try to place traps where they will not be noticed by passersby (who may not understand that you are not trying to harm the cat). Bushes are often places where cats hide and provide good camouflage for the trap.

Use smelly food to bait the trap. We find that canned mackerel is very effective and relatively inexpensive. It is best not to put any bowls inside the trap to hold food since the animal can easily hurt itself on it in a panic. Paper coffee filters or a small piece of aluminum foil works well. (Smelly canned cat food also works).

If the situation requires that you are trapping very early morning on the day of the vet appointment, soak a small scrap of newspaper in the mackerel juice and place it on the ground where you plan to place the rear of the trap.

Spoon a small amount of food onto the soaked newspaper scrap and place the trap on top of the food so the food is as far back in the trap as possible while still not accessible from outside the trap. (You want the cat to go all the way into the trap to avoid being injured when the trap door closes.) Press the trap down onto the food so that it squishes up through the wire. The idea is to make the food a little harder to get so that the cat has to go into the trap as far as possible and has to work at getting it long enough to trip the trap. (Some cats are very good at getting in and out of traps without getting caught. We don't want to make it too easy for them to get away with the trick. Also, having the food essentially outside of the trap prevents the cat from eating it in the trap before surgery and is less messy).

After baiting the trap, open the trap door pushing the top of the door in and pulling bottom of the door upward. There is a small hook attached to the right side of the trap top. It hooks onto a tiny metal cylinder on the right side of the door. The hook holds the door in an open position and raises the trip plate. When the cat steps on the plate it will cause the hook to release from the door and close the trap.

Just before you are ready to leave the trap for the cat to enter, you may want to push the hook (ever so slightly) a little bit back off the cylinder to create a "hair trigger". (Don't get too carried away with this step or the trap will trip as soon as the cat takes a sniff).

# WAITING FOR SUCCESS

Never leave traps unattended in an unprotected area, but don't hang around within sight of the cat (or you will scare it off). The trapped animal is vulnerable. Passersby may release the cat or steal the trap! Wait quietly in an area where you can still see the traps without disturbing the cats. Check traps every 15 minutes or so. You can often hear the traps trip from a distance. As soon as the intended cat is trapped, COMPLETELY COVER THE TRAP TO CALM THE CAT and remove the trap from the area if other cats are not in sight. You may consider putting another trap in the same on the ground when you pick up the trap. (You don't want to litter or give out any freebies and spoil any appetites!)

When you get the captured cat to a quiet area away from the other traps, lift the cover and check for signs that you have the correct animal and not a pet or previously neutered feral. If you note that you have captured a lactating female check the area for kittens and remember that this female must be released 10-12 hours after surgery so she can care for and nurse her kittens. A volunteer will advise the veterinarian that this is a lactating female who has kittens and needs

to be returned as quickly as possible. Cover the cat back up as soon as possible. Uncovered, the animal may panic and hurt itself thrashing around in the trap.

Of course, there is always the chance that you will catch some other wild animal attracted to the food or an unintended cat. Simply release the animal quietly as stated in the releasing procedures here.

# **HOLDING PROCEDURES**

After you have finished trapping, you will have to hold the cats overnight until you can take them to the vet the following morning.

Place cats in the prepared protected area. The cat should not have any food or water after midnight the night before surgery. If the cat is in the trap long enough to need a meal, canned cat foods have some water content and they can be dropped though the wire in the trap. One suggestion to give the cat some water is to place ice cubes into the trap by dropping them through the wire top of the trap.

Keep cats covered and check them periodically. They will probably be very quiet as long as they are covered. Don't stick fingers in the trap or allow children or pets near the traps. These are wild animals that can scratch and bite. ALL ANIMAL BITES ARE SERIOUS. IF YOU ARE BITTEN, SEEK MEDICAL ATTENTION AND DO NOT RELEASE THE CAT. IT MUST BE QUARANTINED. CONTACT ANIMAL CONTROL FOR QUARANTINE INSTRUCTIONS.

Wash and change clothes before having contact with your own pets as a precaution against spreading any contagious diseases the cats might carry.

Always get feral kittens checked out by a vet and isolate them from your pets. Some deadly diseases can incubate without symptoms. Check with your veterinarian and use caution.

# POST SURGERY CARE

After surgery, the cat is placed in a carrier provided by Friends of Felines. The caretaker picks up the cat from the veterinarian's office and provides a safe recovery area. The recuperation time for feral cats is 24 to 48 hours. A food and water dish is placed on the inside of the front door of the carrier so food and water can be placed in them without opening the carrier. Do not open the carrier door. The cat must recuperate in the carrier.

# RELEASING THE CATS

If the cat does not seem to be recovering well from the surgery, contact the FOF volunteer we will have it checked out by a vet before releasing. When cats are ready for release, return to the area in which they were captured and release them there.

**<u>DO NOT</u>** relocate the animal. It will be disoriented and most likely die. In all likelihood, area cats will drive it away.

If the veterinarian discovers a serious medical problem that cannot be treated, and the veterinarian deems that it is impossible for the cat to be returned safely to its colony, the decision to euthanise can be made. Feline leukemia (FeLv), FIV, respiratory infections, and a number of other conditions can mean suffering and a slow death.

The cat will be released back to the same spot where you trapped. It. Make sure the spot you pick for release does not encourage the cat to run into danger (like a busy street) to get away from you. When ready, simply place the carrier on the ground with the door facing away from you and open the door. The cat will probably bolt immediately out of the carrier. If it is confused, just tilt the carrier so the back is slightly up and tap on the back of the carrier to encourage it to leave. Never put your hand in the carrier.

After releasing the cats, clean traps and carriers with disinfectant, then with bleach. You can mix up 90% water and 10% bleach in a spray bottle. Spray the traps and carriers with the mixture, let set a few minutes and rinse off. Make sure all residue is out of the traps and carriers and ready for the next cat to use. Never store traps in the set position (door open); animals may wander into even un-baited traps and starve to death.

# HELPFUL HINTS

Bring a flashlight with you if trapping at night. It will come in handy for checking traps from a distance and might help you avoid a twisted ankle in the dark.

Bring a cap for the top of the Mackerel can. Nothing smells worse than fish juice spilled in the car. Don't forget a spoon.

Females with kittens will be attracted by the sound of their kittens if the previously captured kittens are placed in a covered carrier just behind the trap. Similarly, kittens will be easier to trap if the previously captured mother is in the carrier.

For advice regarding the taming and or fostering of feral or orphaned kittens, consult your veterinarian. You may also obtain information on these subjects from Friends of Felines. We have written instructions on "Taming Feral Kittens" and "Raising Orphan Kittens."

Pleasure Island PAWS is a Non Profit group on Carolina Beach. We are requesting \$2,000.00 in funding to trap/neuter/vaccinate/return feral and free roaming cats in Carolina Beach. Carolina Beach has been a dumping ground for unwanted cats in New Hanover County for years. These cats have become feral and reproduced causing an overpopulation of cats on the island.

We have been working on controlling the feral cat population on the Island since 2001, way before we started Pleasure Island PAWS, and most of the funds came out of our pockets. We have worked in conjunction with Friends of Felines, the local trap/neuter/vaccinate/return program for feral cats. Together we have worked on many problem areas on the island. Since 2001 the feral cat population has reduced greatly, however there is still much more to be done to take control of the feral cat population on the Island.

The funds we are requesting will help us to continue to work on the overpopulation issues on the Island.

The parameters for our mission are as follows:

- Cats must be feral/free roaming or un-owned.
- Cats must have a caregiver to provide food/water and as much shelter as possible.
- We will speak with each person asking for assistance to make sure it is okay to trap on the property.
- Cats will be trapped in a humane trap with a cover over it to keep them quiet and calm.

**SUBJECT:** Discussion on Accepting the Oceana Stormwater

# **BACKGROUND:**

The water and sewer infrastructure, located within the Oceana subdivision, was adopted by the Town of Carolina Beach Council in 2018. Since that time, the HOA and Town staff have been working together to make the Town's adoption of the stormwater infrastructure possible. The Oceana HOA hired an independent contractor to camera and assess the system. This report was followed by a list of recommended repairs. The Oceana HOA provided this report to the Town and sought approval for the necessary repairs along with the proposed methods. Once in agreement, the HOA hired a utility contractor to perform the needed repairs and these repairs were inspected by Town staff. Below is a brief timeline of how this has evolved over different administrations.

Early 2016: Discussions began between Oceana and Town Management/Previous Operations Director regarding the turnover of Water/Sewer/Stormwater infrastructure to the Town.

Early 2017: Town and Oceana worked together to have a survey completed of the water/sewer and stormwater system in Oceana.

February 2018: Town and Oceana came to agreement on the water and sewer infrastructure. Previous Operations Director requested that Oceana hire a contractor to professionally clean and thoroughly inspect the stormwater system to determine any needed repairs, to aid in moving forward with the Town's acceptance of the SW system.

September 2019: Ocean's hired contractor completed the cleaning and inspection of their stormwater system.

October 2019: The stormwater inspection along with the list of necessary repairs were sent to the Town for review and approval. The three pipe repairs were discussed and approved between Oceana and PW Director.

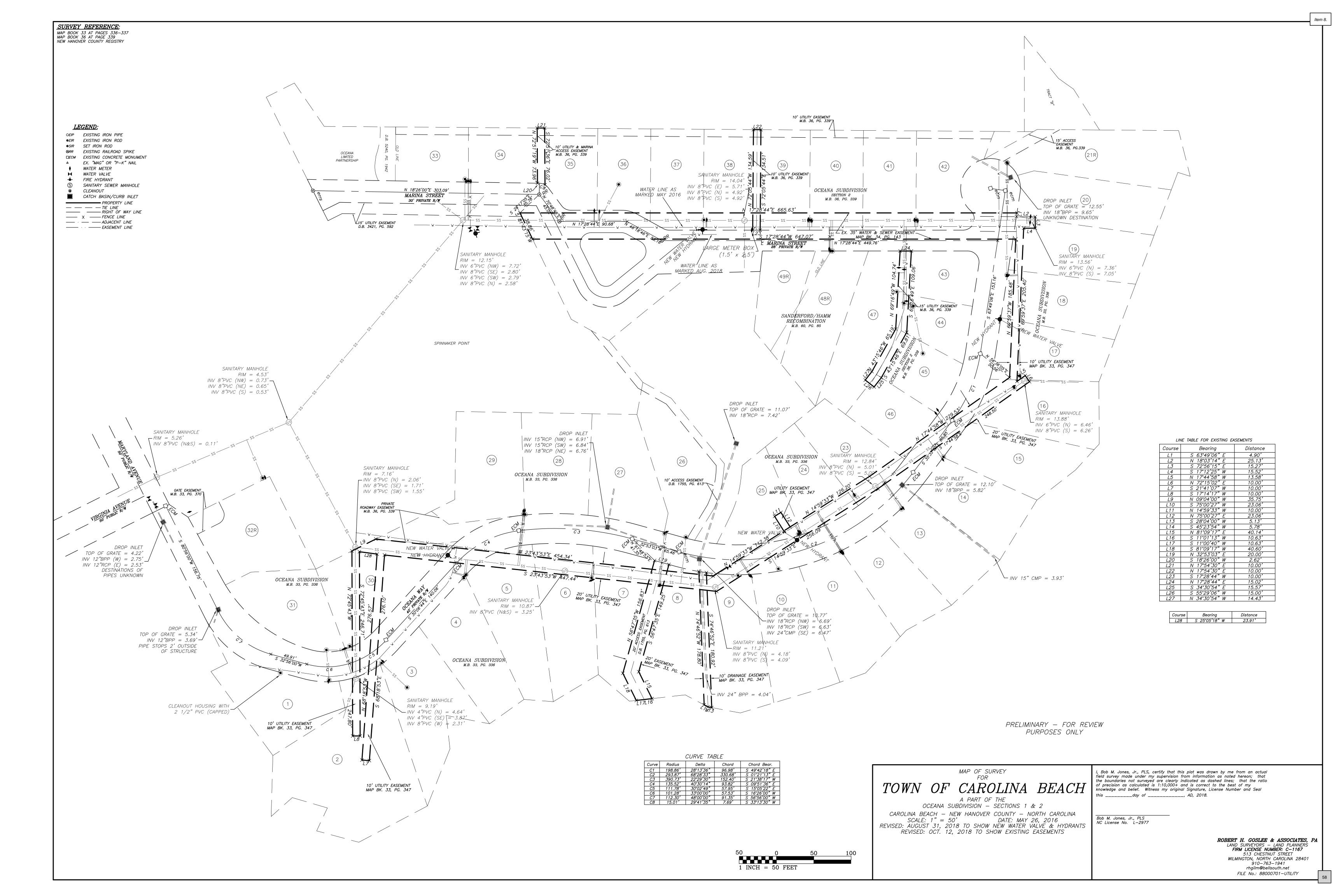
Early 2020: Repairs were completed by Oceana's contractor and inspected by Town staff. Contractor cost paid by Oceana was \$27,200.

# **ACTION REQUESTED:**

Currently, the stormwater infrastructure in the Oceana HOA is in satisfactory condition. Based on the due diligence Oceana has put forth in this effort, it is the recommendation of Town staff to adopt the Oceana stormwater infrastructure, which will provide future clarity on all utility maintenance in the subdivision.
