To the extent a speaker has previously addressed a Board or Committee on the same subject and at which a majority of the Board was present, then the Board Chair may limit repeat comments at the Board meeting by the same speaker.

The Board may provide members of the public the option to participate in Board or Committee meetings electronically. If such an option is provided, the procedures herein apply, but the Board or Committee will provide members of the public with an electronic means to complete an appearance card and present the card to the Clerk of the Trust prior to the start of the Board or Committee meeting.

Background:

The Children's Trust of Alachua County released its 2021 Summer RFP with the intentions of funding summer camp providers offering a range of programming activities. 21 providers received summer contracts, providing summer camp services to 1,125 children.

The target population for the Summer RFP is children from low-income families living in Alachua County and who are kindergarteners (five years old on or before September 1st) through 12th graders. Providers recruited and enrolled children into summer camp programming using the following guidelines:

- Full scholarships: children from families at or below 200% 2020 federal poverty threshold, children with Individualized Educational Plan (IEP), children from families receiving SNAP benefits, children in foster care, children in voluntary and formal kinship care, and children under in-home case management supervision.
- Partial scholarships: children from families between 200% 400% 2020 federal poverty level

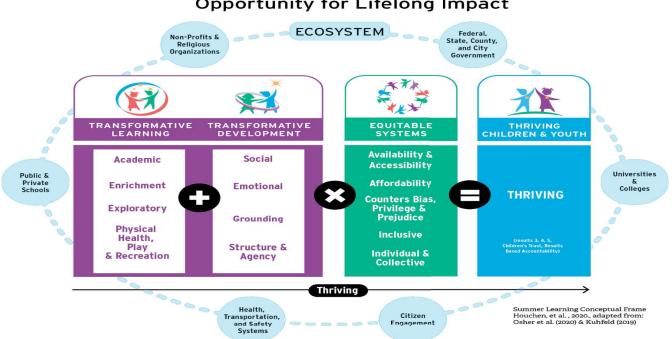

Summer Program Overview

The Children's Trust of Alachua County funded qualified summer camp providers to host rising kindergarteners (five years old on or before September 1st) through rising 8th graders from low-income families in safe and enriching summer programming in 2021.

- CTAC intended to award full and partial summer programming scholarships to summer camp providers across Alachua county
- Contracts were fee for service, based on actual enrollment and weekly attendance of children eligible for full and partial summer camp scholarships
- Programs were able to serve one or more program sites throughout Alachua County

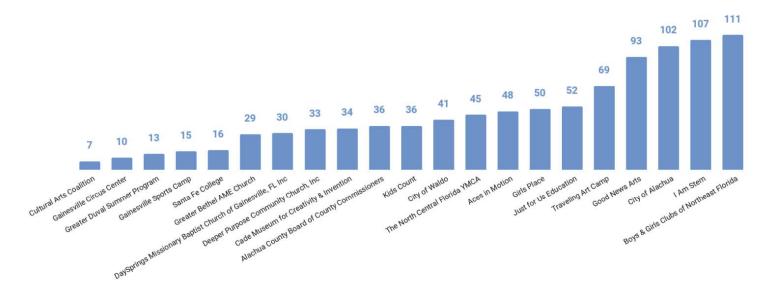

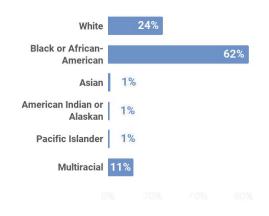
Traveling Art Camp, Summer 2021

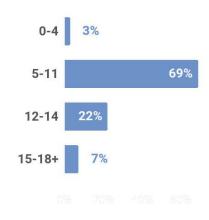




City of Alachua, Summer 2021

The majority of children were between 5-11 years old.



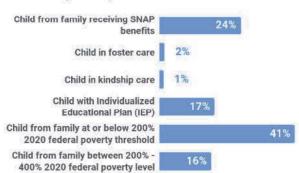


Good News Arts, Summer 2021

Most children live at or below 200% of the federal poverty level.





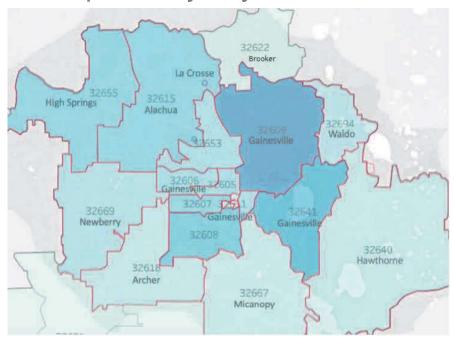
Greater Bethel AME Church, Summer 2021

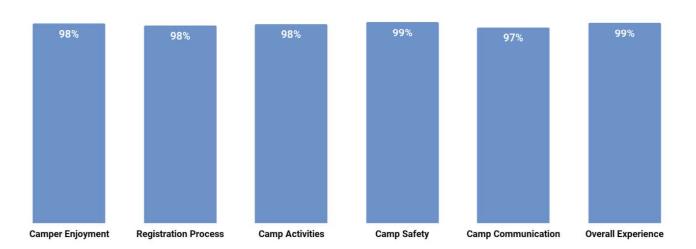

Rachel does not own a car and uses public transportation to get to and from work. It was a perfect opportunity to have her children at Camp Just for Us, especially with no vehicle.  impact children with continued funding
- Timely The report was submitted on or before 10/5/2021
- Alignment with CTAC Priorities The scope of work of the contract aligns with one of the CTAC strategies and particularly one of the strategies unfunded for FY2022

Qualified providers receiving an average score of **15** and above will be invited to submit a brief proposal with performance measures and budget for continued funding of their current scope of work. Those who submit a proposal for continued funding will be selected for funding based on their proposal's alignment with CTAC strategies and the cost - benefit of the proposed scope of works relative to other applicants.

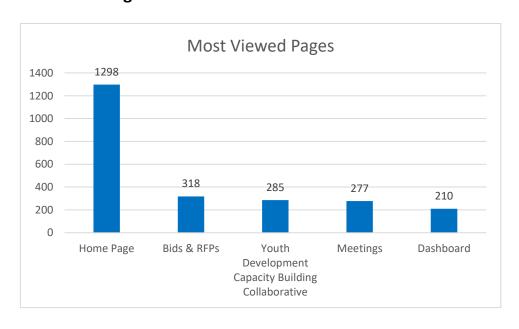

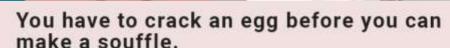
