Call to Order - Chair Cornell called the meeting to order at 4:00 PM

Roll Call

Agenda Review, Revision, and Approval – Member Pinkoson moved for approval; seconded by Treasurer Lambarta – motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

Chair's Report

Chair Cornell welcomed the Hon. Susanne Wilson Bullard back to the CTAC Board and administered the CTAC Oath of Office.

Executive Director's Report

ED Marsha Kiner officially welcomed everyone to the first meeting of the Board of Directors in the new training room/conference room in the new building. Keturah Bailey Acevedo was welcomed and introduced as the new Clerk of the Trust and Executive Assistant to ED Kiner. CTAC's official Open House and Building <u>Dedication is on March 29th</u>. Please plan to attend. CTAC staff represented the Trust at the Florida Alliance of Children's Councils and Trusts (FACCT) conference in Orlando. Kudos to Mia Jones (CTAC Early Childhood Coordinator) for a great presentation. Shout-out to Swampbots (CTAC funded program) for their 3rd place rank at their recent national competition.

12. Summer Camp and Freedom School RFP 2025-01

COO Kristy Goldwire, Amy Wagner (Research, Planning, and Evaluation Coordinator), Belita James (Director of Program Operations) presented on RFP 2025-01.

Requested Action:

- 1. The Trust is asked to approve the release of RFP 2025-01
- 2. The Trust is asked to approve the allocation of \$2 million (\$1.8 million for summer camps; \$160,000.00 for Freedom School expansion)
- 3. The Trust is asked to authorize the ED Kiner to appoint a review team of members with subject matter expertise.

Motion to approve: Member Pinkoson (seconded by Member Chance)

<u>Discussion:</u> Member Certain requested bonus points for applicants located in La Crosse. Additional discussion on bonus points for programs that include a literacy component; concerns were raised about staff capacity – Member Patton proposed coordinating with SBAC for grade-level appropriate material CTAC providers can use. Brief discussion on using program performance measures to determine future funding and contract changes. Member Chance noted that the point allocation for the summer program RFP needs to be modified to equal 100 points.

Public comments: Aldreka Everett (Executive Director, Aces In Motion) shared that the financial reimbursement process was a challenge due to student absences - requested more compromise in the process; also reminded that middle and high school students must be included in literacy initiatives. Kim Tuttle (Dance Alive/Let's Dance Program) requested an exemption for special needs camps to only be required for a half-day; provided a pamphlet for review and thanked CTAC for their previous support. Christi Arrington (Executive Director, Girls' Place) stated more time with the RFP would have been helpful; also spoke to timeline constraints with summer registration beginning in March but parents not knowing if they will be funded until April; disconnect between the Board's feedback and what is posted in the RFP (shorter days, guideline on \$300/week, partial scholarships); further commented that losing partial scholarships will hurt families; also questioned if transportation is available for students to be

transported to summer camp after summer school. Allysen Marks (Kids Count) echoed comments of her colleagues re: the timeline, support from SBAC and attendance; requested parents on field trips count as family engagement for reimbursement purposes. Eli Newman (Afterschool Acroyoga) is curious to learn more about partnership and opportunities to offer programming at CTAC funded sites. Violet Kyong (Behavior Bricks) introduced herself and offered her services to support students with special needs (autism, down syndrome, etc..) – looking to partner with CTAC to provide programming for kids with special needs.

CTAC staff responded to the questions raised during discussion. K. Goldwire suggested adding flexibility to the attendance requirement in the RFP to an average of three days/week and modifying the attendance requirement for special needs students to half days. The board did not object to the suggested modifications. Member Pinkoson amended the initial motion to include the following:

- 4. CTAC will coordinate with the School Board with recommendations of ageappropriate reading materials.
- 5. CTAC will include bonus points for programs in LaCrosse.
- 6. CTAC will change the point allocation as discussed. *Motion passed by a unanimous voice vote.*

In the interest of time, Member Pinkoson recommended the vote on Resolution 2025-02 be moved up on the agenda; the was approved by unanimous consent.

- 15. Resolution 2025-02 Authorization for Signatories on the CTAC Bank Accounts <u>Motion to approve:</u> Member Pinkoson (seconded by Member Chance) – no discussion. Motion passed by a unanimous voice vote.
- 13. Continuous Quality Improvement

Bonnie Wagner (Research, Planning, and Evaluation Coordinator) provided CQI FY2024 assessment results for all providers. Member Pinkoson moved to approve the CQI implementation plan (seconded by Wilson Bullard) – motion passed by unanimous voice vote.

- 14. Strategic Plan Key Indicators
 - B. Wagner provided information on Alachua County's progress in meeting goal areas. Noted major improvements in some CTAC prioritized fields. Member Pinkoson moved to receive the report (seconded by Member Chance) motion passed by unanimous voice vote.

General Public Comments

C. Arrington (Girl's Place) expressed gratitude for local funding supported by local people.

Board Member Comments

Member Chance expressed interest in receiving updates, training and more information about the Sunshine Data Portal from the Anita Zucker Center prior to the next Early Childhood Cycle.

Member Hardt urged everyone to be aware of the needs of ALICE families and that she wants CTAC to learn more about how to assist.

Vice Chair Twombly thanked B. Wagner for the information in her report and will follow-up with her offline.

Treasurer Labarta said that the meeting was rushed, would like to see the research reports moved up in the agenda going forward. Also thanked staff for the great information they are providing.

Chair Cornell expressed gratitude to CTAC staff for all the information and support provided; suggested improvements for next meeting set-up.

ED Kiner extended thanks; introduced Katrina Welch, new Program Specialist and Naomi Volcy, Communications Intern.

RESOLUTION 2025-02

A RESOLUTION OF THE CHILDREN'S TRUST OF ALACHUA COUNTY AUTHOIUZING THE CHAIR, TREASURER AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TO ACT AS SIGNATOIUES ON THE CHILDREN'S TRUST OF ALACHUA COUNTY'S BANK ACCOUNTS; AUTHOIUZING SIGNATURE CARDS AND DEPOSITORY AUTHOIUZATIONS TO BE EXECUTED; PROVIDING FOR CIRCULATION OF CERTIFIED COPIES HEREOF; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Children's Trust of Alachua County must establish bank accounts in order to conduct business; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Alachua County Ordinance 18-08 monies received by the Children's Trust of Alachua County shall be deposited in qualified public depositories, as defined in section 280.02, Florida Statutes; and

WHEREAS, monies deposited into the Children's Trust of Alachua County's bank accounts shall be withdrawn only by signature of the Chair and countersigned by either the Treasurer of the Children's Trust of Alachua County or the Executive Director; and

WHEREAS, a signature card signed by the Chair, the Treasurer, and the Executive Director will be necessary on all accounts; and

WHEREAS, administrative agreements may be required on some bank accounts;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CHILDREN'S TRUST OF ALACHUA COUNTY:

1. That the two following-named officers may withdraw any or all of the funds of the Children's Trust of Alachua County now or hereafter on deposit in the accounts to be established in Exhibit "A" attached hereto, and may endorse and sign checks, drafts, and orders

for the payment of money; provided, however, that one of the two signatories on each document shall be the Chair and the others shall be the Treasurer or the Executive Director, to wit:

- 2. That the Children's Trust of Alachua County shall furnish to every bank listed in Exhibit "A" a certified copy of this resolution and such banks are hereby authorized to act upon this resolution and to honor the signatures of the persons named herein, and each of them, notwithstanding that any such person may in fact have died or ceased to be an officer of this organization unless and until said bank shall be notified in writing that such event has occurred or that the authority of this resolution has been revoked or amended.
- 3. That all signature cards required by the bank are hereby authorized to be executed by the Chair, Treasurer and Executive Director, and that their facsimiles be placed on the cards and initialed by the respective signatories.
- In accordance with Section 116.34, Florida Statutes, required Certificates of Facsimile Signature will be filed with the Secretary of the State.
- That any administrative agreement required to be executed is hereby authorized to be entered into by the Children's Trust of Alachua County.
 - 6. That this resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

While this would be an exciting opportunity for anyone, it is an especially significant achievement given the challenges and setbacks she has overcome to reach this point.

She first joined AIM in middle school, where she was introduced to tennis through weekly instruction with certified coaches. Her passion for learning and improving in the sport gave her both structure and motivation in a supportive environment that fostered academic growth, social and emotional development, life skills, and mentorship to help her succeed.

During her sophomore year, she was involved in a fight that led to her expulsion, requiring her to enroll in a new school. During this challenging time, the academic guidance, counseling, and mentorship provided by AIM staff helped her navigate the transition. With their support, she successfully adjusted to her new environment while maintaining the 3.0 GPA required to stay on the tennis team and continue pursuing her dreams.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The relaunch of the Center for Nonprofit Excellence as a staffed, full-time project of the Community Foundation and supported by The Children's Trust has been a success. We can measure this by 3 outcomes:



Background:

Since 2022, Children's Trust of Alachua County (CTAC) has supported Partnership for Strong Families' (PSF) Family Resource Centers as well as the Community Resource Navigators. PSF's Family Resource Center Network includes two Gainesville Family Resource Centers and the Community Resource Navigation (CRN) Program. All of the services provided by PSF's Family Resource Center Network are tied to one of five protective factors, which when present in families are known to reduce the risk of abuse or neglect. FRC/CRN staff help families and individuals to meet their immediate needs (e.g., food, clothing, housing), identify strengths, set obtainable goals (e.g., finances, employment, education, mental health), and connect with existing community resources.

In 2024, CTAC partnered with PSF to implement a consulting program designed to assist public groups and organizations within Alachua County, who are interested in developing or enhancing a Family Resource Center within their own municipality. PSF Consulting focuses on communities that have experienced historically limited access to resources, with the goal of increasing access to quality family support services to Alachua County residents.

In addition, Help Me Grow has been integrated with in the Family Resource Center Model.

This report will share an update for 2024 and action for 2025.

Background:

In May 2023 the Children's Trust board had a joint meeting with the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners. During that meeting the Children's Trust staff were tasked with creating a Comprehensive Literacy Plan.

It was determined that a comprehensive needs assessment was needed to help inform the development of a comprehensive literacy plan aimed at improving literacy achievement for all students. In October 2023, discussions were held with UF Lastinger Center about project coordination and developing the assessment.

Project Phases Update:

As of February, The UF Lastinger Center (UFLC) have completed all organizational interviews, focus groups, and surveys. They have reviewed the Alachua County Public School Data and finalized the draft of the comprehensive literacy assessment report. At the last committee meeting held on February 17, 2025, the committee was tasked with reviewing and providing final feedback for the:

Draft Assessment Report

In March, the Children's Trust staff will be reviewing with Lastinger the recommendations and internally determining direction for the next phase of this project.

On April 7, 2025, the Lastinger Center will share the final report with the Children's Trust Board at the April board meeting. On April 21, 2025, Lastinger Center will share the final report with the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners at the joint meeting with the Children's Trust. A meeting to share with the Alachua County School District is pending at this time. We have completed all phases of the project plan. Attached to this staff report is a copy of the Executive Summary draft.

Executive Summary

Reading is among the most essential skills in life. Children who gain basic reading skills during the first few years of school can experience lasting benefits, such as academic achievement, positive social-emotional development, long-term economic security, and personal health and well-being (Connor et al., 2014; UNESCO, 2025). Literacy, defined in this report as the ability to read, write, speak, and listen, is important for Alachua County citizens to fully participate in an information-rich society.

Yet, Florida's students find reading difficult. Among Florida's fourth graders in 2024, **only one third read proficiently** on a national reading test (U.S. Department of Education, 2025) and **just over half read at grade level** on the Florida Assessment of Student Thinking (Florida Department of Education, 2024).

Like the rest of Florida, only about half of Alachua County's K-12 students are reading on grade level. However, scores in Alachua County are consistently lower for Black students and students with disabilities. Issues related to access to education, employment, housing, transportation, and healthcare highlight why scores vary for different groups of students (Annie E. Casey Foundation, 2024). **Improving reading outcomes for Alachua County students will take community-wide efforts.**

This comprehensive literacy needs assessment continues longstanding efforts by organizations and literacy leaders in Alachua County to improve literacy. In May 2023, the Children's Trust of Alachua County board had a joint meeting with the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners. The topic of discussion was the need to unite the entire community, along with schools and educational organizations, to reach the goals of children being ready for kindergarten and 90% of students reading on grade level by the end of third grade. In October 2023, the Executive Director of the Children's Trust, Marsha Kiner, asked the UF Lastinger Center to serve as coordinator for a comprehensive literacy needs assessment.

This executive summary as well as the <u>full report</u> [link to be added at a later date] describe education in Alachua County, detail the literacy needs assessment activities, and outline key recommendations to support literacy learning in Alachua County.

Education in Alachua County

Alachua County, Florida, has a comprehensive education system, with 132 licensed childcare programs and voluntary prekindergarten (VPK) offered by 66 local providers. The county has a range of public and private schools, including 66 elementary schools, 39 middle schools, and 38 high schools (Florida Department of Education Data Publications and Reports, n.d.).

In 2023, 63% of VPK completers were "ready for kindergarten" compared to 46% of their peers who did not attend VPK. In 2024, Alachua County earned a B grade as a district, one of 26 of Florida's 67 districts. Alachua County is home to 15 schools with an A grade, 13 with a B, 16 with a C, and 3 with a D (Florida Department of Education School Grades Overview, n.d.). Alachua County ranks 14th in the state for third-grade English Language Arts achievement, with 58% of students meeting the standard. The on-time high school graduation rate for the 2022-2023 school year was 84%. Higher education opportunities are provided by institutions such as Santa Fe College and the University of Florida, contributing to the county's robust educational landscape (Florida Department of Education Advanced Reports, n.d.).

Literacy Needs Assessment

Description

Despite many strengths, Alachua County needs to improve reading outcomes for all children, youth, and adults. This is especially true for groups who only have **1** in **4** students reading on grade level, as shown in the full report: Black students, students with disabilities, and English language learners (Florida Department of Education Know Your Data, n.d.).


The Children's Trust of Alachua County and the UF Lastinger Center for Learning collaborated on a comprehensive literacy needs assessment to improve literacy in Alachua County from birth through adulthood. Key partners who engaged in the literacy needs assessment included the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners, School Board of Alachua County (SBAC), and Alachua County Public Schools (ACPS). Several community organizations provided guidance on this

project, serving on the literacy needs assessment committee, including Alachua County Library District, Ask Meno, Cuscowilla Nature and Retreat Center, Early Learning Coalition of Alachua County, Episcopal Children's Services, Florida Campaign for Grade Level Reading, Alachua County Campaign for Grade Level Reading, Gainesville Thrives, Greater Gainesville Chamber of Commerce, One Community Health and Wellness Center, Peak Literacy, Sunshine Moss, UF Anita Zucker Center for Excellence in Early Childhood Studies, UF College of Education, UF Literacy Institute, and the United Way of North Central Florida.

Goals

The UF Lastinger Center, Children's Trust of Alachua County, and the committee members listed above created four goals for the literacy needs assessment (see Figure 1).

Activities

The UF Lastinger Center engaged in the following activities to meet these goals:

- (1) Reviewed information from prior efforts and from members of the literacy needs assessment committee.
- (2) Analyzed data provided by ACPS and community organizations or available from public sources.

- (3) Distributed an anonymous survey throughout the county.
- (4) Conducted focus groups with a wide range of family and community members and ACPS educators.
- (5) Interviewed elected officials, members of community organizations, ACPS district staff, and ACPS educators after visiting their classrooms.
- (6) Attended community events to create knowledge about the literacy needs assessment and solicit survey and focus group participation.
- (7) Compiled information for this report.
- (8) Presented findings, including recommendations for future implementation.

Participants

The UF Lastinger Center collected data through 73 interviews, 33 focus groups with 157 participants, 1,122 surveys, 11 community events, and 3 classroom visits (see Table 1).

Key Findings

The literacy needs assessment revealed the following strengths in supporting literacy in Alachua County:

- Home and Community-Based Literacy Practices Many families actively engage in literacy activities such as reading and discussing books with their children.
- Effective Classroom-Based Literacy Instruction Educators implement evidence-based strategies, such as structured phonics programs and digital learning tools, to support student learning.
- Community and Organizational Contributions Local organizations provide valuable literacy support through resources, training, and events that complement school-based initiatives.
- Policy and Governmental Support Local elected officials recognize the importance of early literacy, targeted interventions, and increased resources for children and youth who need them most.

However, several issues hinder literacy progress, such as:

- Challenges Faced by Families Limited access to literacy resources, financial constraints, and logistical challenges such as work schedules and transportation create obstacles for parents in supporting their children's literacy development.
- Challenges in Education Educators cited curriculum misalignment, a lack of professional development, and inadequate instructional support as key concerns. The Benchmark Advance (Benchmark Education, 2022) curriculum was particularly criticized for failing to support elementary students reading below grade level.
- Structural and Financial Challenges for Organizations Many literacysupporting organizations struggle to secure funding and implement structured, evidence-based literacy programs.

Recommendations

Based on these findings, this report outlines three areas of recommendations to improve literacy outcomes across the county (see Figure 2).

- 1. **Enhanced Awareness and Communication** Strengthen collaboration among literacy organizations, create a centralized literacy resource hub, and promote community-wide literacy initiatives.
- 2. **Focused Support** Increase funding for early literacy programs, increase reading achievement for all students but especially those shown in the data to need additional support, expand high-dosage tutoring, and enhance adult literacy programs.
- 3. **Expanded Professional Learning** Provide targeted professional development for educators, improve collaboration among teachers, and train educators on strategies to support students with disabilities, among other groups.

Next Steps

This report underscores the need for a coordinated, multi-sector approach to literacy improvement. Achieving long-term success will require sustained engagement from families, educators, policymakers, and community organizations. The next phase of this initiative will focus on developing a comprehensive plan, securing necessary funding, and continuing to monitor progress to ensure that all students in Alachua County achieve literacy proficiency.

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
