All witnesses testifying will be "sworn" prior to their testimony. However, the public is permitted to comment, without being sworn. An unsworn comment will be given its appropriate weight by the City Commission.

**Appeal of Decision:** If a person decides to appeal any decision made by the City Commission with respect to any matter considered at this meeting, he or she will need a record of the proceeding, and for that purpose, may need to ensure that a verbatim record of the proceeding is made, which record includes any testimony and evidence upon which the appeal will be based.

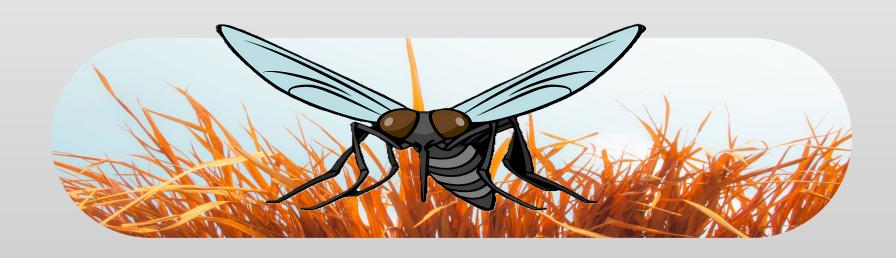

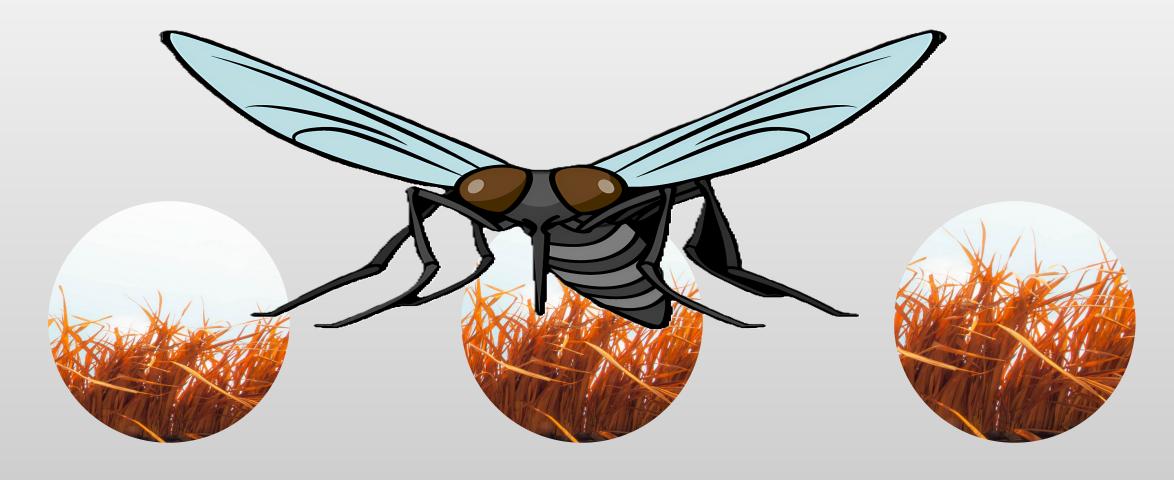

# Mosquito Life Cycle



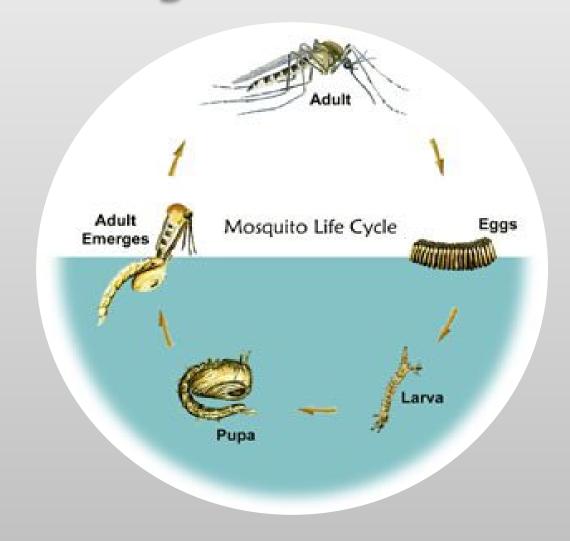

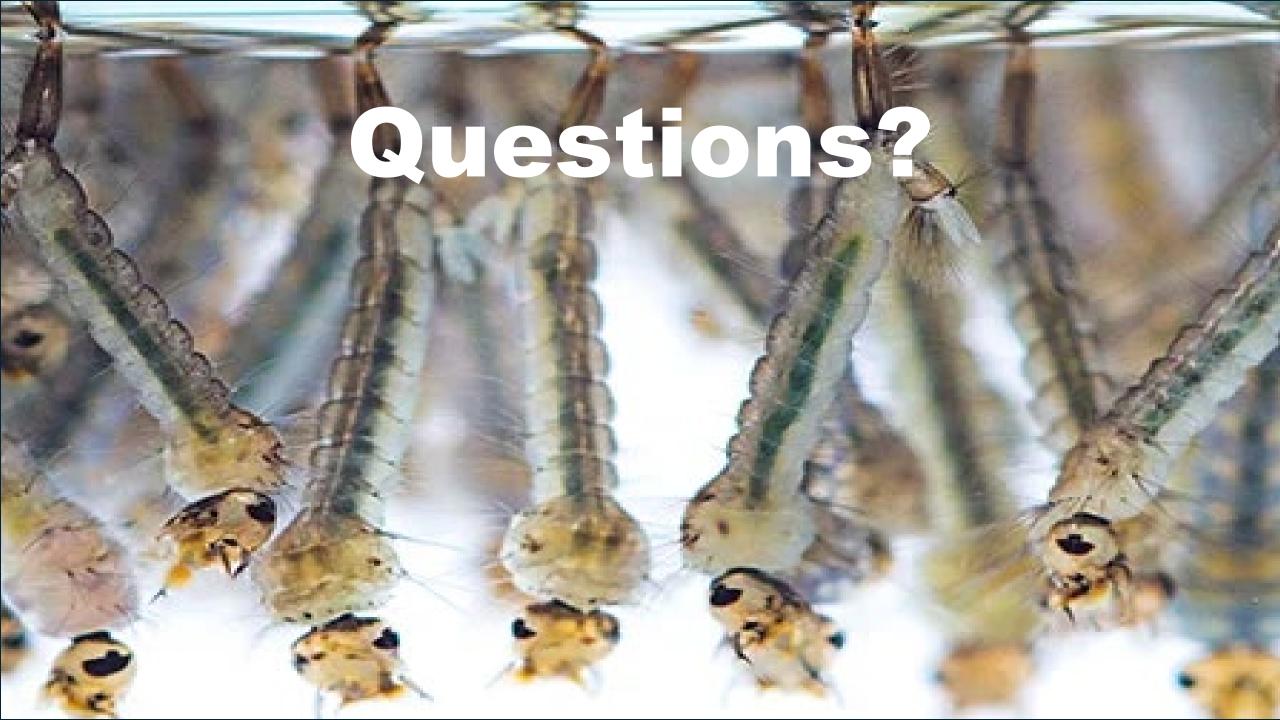

# PART II - CODE OF ORDINANCES Chapter 110 - ZONING ARTICLE V. - DISTRICTS AND DISTRICT REGULATIONS

#### DIVISION 14. US 27 COMMERCIAL CORRIDOR DISTRICT

#### DIVISION 14. US 27 COMMERCIAL CORRIDOR DISTRICT

#### Sec. 110-501. Purpose.

The purpose of the US 27 Commercial Corridor District is to provide lands for business and industry which support the economic base of the city and contribute to its economic growth and self-sufficiency. The US 27 Commercial Corridor District uses shall include commercial activities consisting of mixed-use not likely to be objectionable to neighboring properties. The US 27 Commercial Corridor District development standards provided herein are intended to result in new commerce that is attractive in appearance for the benefit of the property, the City of Clewiston and the owners and/or lessees of all lots within the US 27 Commercial Corridor. These requirements are intended to provide a pleasant, attractive, and safe business environment for the convenience and benefit of business owners and customers, and to foster an environment of economic growth and redevelopment in the City of Clewiston.

The US 27 Commercial Corridor District designation and development standards contained herein shall apply to all lands within the district at the date of adoption of this division and to all future expansions of the district. All requirements of chapter 110, Zoning, also apply in the US 27 Commercial Corridor District; section 110-501 through section 110-518 are additional requirements of the District. When the US 27 Commercial Corridor District requirements conflict with other provisions of chapter 110, the more stringent requirements shall be applied.

#### Sec. 110-502. Permitted uses.

Permitted uses within the US 27 Commercial Corridor District are as follows:

- (1) Appliance and furniture stores.
- (2) Bakeries, confectionery providing on-premises retail sales.
- (3) Clinics, medical and dental out-patient only.
- (4) Commercial or municipal parking lots or garages.
- (5) Commercial recreation facilities, including marinas.
- (6) Convenience food and beverage store.
- (7) Department stores.
- (8) Financial institutions with or without drive-thru teller units.
- (9) Gasoline service stations.
- (10) General retail establishments.
- (11) Hardware, paint, and garden supplies.
- (12) Hotels or motels.
- (13) Indoor and outdoor vehicular sales such as automobile, motorcycle, and all-terrain vehicles and boat and boat trailer and utility trailer sales.

- (14) Laundries and dry-cleaning plants, which do not use flammable solvents.
- (15) Mortuary and funeral homes.
- (16) Newsstand.
- (17) Personal services (including, but not limited to, barbershops, beauty salons, spas).
- (18) Pharmacy.
- (19) Theaters.
- (20) Professional services.
- (21) Public assembly buildings.
- (22) Repair and service of personal, household, and office items and equipment.
- (23) Restaurants.
- (24) Shopping centers.
- (25) Supermarkets.
- (26) Veterinarian clinics.

#### Sec. 110-503. Conditional uses.

The following uses are not permitted in the US 27 Commercial Corridor District, but may be authorized by the imposition of conditions of approval, if all negative impacts are ameliorated by those conditions:

- (1) Liquor store.
- (2) Nightclubs, lounges, bars.
- (3) Repair and services for automobiles, trucks, boats, recreational vehicles, and other automotive equipment.
- (4) Pawn shops.
- (5) Payday, check cashing or deferred deposit loan businesses.
- (6) Tobacco retailers.
- (7) Extended-stay hotel or motel, with occupancy limits for each unit established by condition.
- (8) Kindergarten and daycare facilities.
- (9) Vocational schools, limited to office-oriented vocations, such as, but not limited to secretarial, business, real estate and computer programming.
- (10) Automatic amusement centers/game rooms.
- (11) Limited residential use must be in harmony with overall development and not as a primary or principal use and not allowed on ground floor.

(Ord. No. 2022-10, § 1, 10-17-2022)

#### Sec. 110-504. Development standards.

Setback requirements.

- (1) Street side. All parcels shall have a minimum street side yard setback of four feet and, for every ten feet the building length exceeds 150 feet, an additional one foot of setback shall be required, up to the maximum of 30 feet. Street side yard setbacks shall be measured from back of street property line. Reduction in front yard setback may be approved by the TRC if additional conditions are met.
- (2) *Interior side yard.* The minimum interior side yard shall be 12 feet, except that the interior side yard setback may be reduced to zero on one side of the lot provided that:
  - a. A wall constructed of brick or maintenance-free masonry material with a stucco finish is constructed at the zero-setback side, and the opposite side yard is increased to 24 feet.
  - b. In the event that two contiguous property owners desire to construct buildings using zero side yard setbacks, utilizing a common driveway for ingress and egress to the rear of both properties, said opposite side yard may be reduced to 12 feet provided easements are obtained and recorded ensuring a 24-foot minimum separation between the two buildings for ingress and egress to the rear of the property. This 24-foot accessway shall be maintained free of obstructions skyward and with no openings that would facilitate any loading or unloading, in any portion of the buildings which fronts on the easement.
- (3) Rear yard. There shall be a minimum rear yard setback of feet.
- (4) Height. Maximum height of building in the US 27 Commercial Corridor District shall not exceed 55 feet.

\*Special exception height allowance may be authorized by the imposition of additional conditions of approval, if all negative impacts are ameliorated, height maximum may be increased not to exceed 65 feet.

#### Sec. 110-505. Reserved.

#### Sec. 110-506. Trash receptacles.

- (a) All properties must comply with chapter 74, article VI.
- (b) Trash receptacles located on public sidewalks for use by pedestrians shall be consistent with the size and style approved by city public works department.

(Ord. No. 2022-10, § 1, 10-17-2022)

#### Sec. 110-507. Parking.

- (a) Alternative parking plans (APP). An alternative parking plan is a means to meet vehicle parking requirements other than providing parking spaces on site in accordance with Code requirements. Applicants seeking to meet the requirements of this section by alternative means shall be required to secure approval of an alternative parking plan by the technical review committee (TRC).
  - (1) Contents: Alternative parking plans shall be submitted in a form and with such documentation as established by the community development director. At a minimum, such plans shall include the parking alternative and rationale for how the alternative will compensate for the provision of the required parking on site.

- (2) Eligible alternatives: Potential alternatives to be considered include, but are not limited to:
  - Shared parking: Shared parking is encouraged to promote efficient use of land and resources by allowing users to share off-street parking facilities for uses that are located near one another and that have different peak parking demands or different operating hours. Shared parking shall be subject to the following standards:
  - a. *Location.* Shared off-street parking spaces shall be located no further than 600 feet from the buildings and uses they are intended to serve.
  - b. Shared parking agreement. A shared parking plan shall require an application for shared parking and submission of a shared parking agreement, acceptable to the community development director and city attorney, which shall include an agreement by the owners(s) of record of the parking area and of the applicant. The owner who has applied for shared parking shall be responsible for recording the shared parking agreement in the county's official records and providing copies of the recorded agreement to the city prior to the issuance of site plan approval. The agreement shall specify that the shared spaces are not leased for a use that operates during the same time frame and would create a conflict. The agreement shall specify the time frame, number, and location of spaces to be shared.
  - c. Site plan. A site plan shall be submitted to indicate the spaces that are to be shared, the location and access to the properties to be served, the number of spaces, and the projected time of use of the properties which are sharing the spaces.
  - d. Changes in uses or other conditions. Once established, in order to maintain compliance with a shared parking agreement, the owner shall take one of the following actions to address any change in the uses identified in the agreement which would cause an increase in parking demand or to address a finding of any other related change in conditions by the community development director:
    - Submit a new shared parking plan agreement approved by the community development director with an application to officially amend the shared parking plan approval for the property.
    - 2. Provide the required number of parking spaces for each use to negate the need for shared parking and submit an application to officially amend the site plan approval accordingly.
    - 3. Revise the existing shared parking agreement addressing the changes.
      - Until such action is taken a certificate of zoning compliance shall not be approved for any proposed use on the property subject to the shared parking agreement which generates a parking demand, as determined by the town's parking requirements, which exceeds that of the previous use identified in the shared parking agreement.
- (3) Credit for on-street parking spaces. On-street parking spaces may be used to satisfy 50 percent of the requirements for off-street parking. Such on-street parking may be located in the public right-of-way and shall be located within 1,000 feet of the use. All such spaces must meet size and delineation requirements.
- (4) Bicycle parking. The TRC may approve a reduction in the number of required off-street parking spaces for developments or uses that provide bicycle parking or that make special provisions to accommodate bicyclists.
  - a. Bicycle parking shall be located and clearly designated in a safe and convenient location, at least as convenient as the majority of auto spaces provided.

- b. Facilities shall be designed to accommodate U-shaped locking devices and shall support bicycles in a stable position without damage to wheels, frame or other components and shall be securely anchored and of sufficient strength to resist vandalism and theft.
- (b) Parking lot landscaping. The following shall apply:
  - (1) A landscaped area shall have a minimum width of two feet, excluding curbs, retaining walls or similar enclosing structures.
  - (2) All front yard perimeter landscaping shall include concrete, masonry or metal barriers to contain and/or protect landscaping materials.

(Ord. No. 2022-10, § 1, 10-17-2022)

#### Sec. 110-508. Landscape requirements.

All areas not improved for parking, or occupied by a structure, or paved walkway, shall be landscaped in accordance with the landscaping requirements as follows:

- (1) Quality. Plant materials used in conformance with the provisions of this article shall conform to the standard for Florida No. 1 or better, as given in Grades and Standards for Nursery Plants, part I, 1963, and part II, published by the state department of agriculture, or equal.
- (2) Trees. Tree species shall have a minimum of five feet of clear trunk immediately after planting. Trees of species whose roots are known to cause damage to public roadways or other public works shall be prohibited.
- (3) Shrubs and hedges. Shrubs and hedges shall be a minimum of two feet in height when measured immediately after planting. Hedges, where required, shall be planted and maintained so as to form a continuous unbroken solid visual screen within one year after time of planting. At intersections and driveways, shrubs cannot be more than 24 inches high at maturity and any tree, in the visibility triangle, must have at least seven feet of clear trunk immediately after planting.
- (4) Vines. Vines shall be a minimum of 30 inches in height immediately after planting and may be used in conjunction with fences, screens or walls to meet physical barrier requirements as specified.
- (5) Ground covers. Ground covers in lieu of grass, in whole or in part, shall be planted in such a manner as to present a finished appearance and reasonably complete coverage and shall be used with a decorative mulch, such as pine or cypress bark or other material of a similar nature. In no instance shall stone or gravel be utilized for more than 20 percent of the ground cover area.
- (6) Plan approval. All new construction, prior to the issuance of a building permit, must have a landscape plan approved by the TRC. The landscape plan shall be drawn to a scale not less than one inch equals 20 feet and shall include all pertinent dimensions, walls, parking spaces, and vehicular use areas, buildings and accessory structures, pools, ponds and waterways, hydrants and irrigation systems, landscape materials, including types and location of planting protective devices, and a stormwater management plan with calculations.
- (7) Installation. All landscaping shall be installed in accordance with the landscape plan prior to issuance of a certificate of occupancy. All landscaping shall be installed in accordance with accepted landscape practices.
- (8) Maintenance. The owner and tenant, if any, shall be jointly and severally responsible for the maintenance of all landscaping, and landscaped areas shall be so maintained as to present a healthy, neat and orderly appearance and shall be kept free from refuse and debris. If trees, shrubs, or other landscape material should die, such materials must be replaced within 30 days.

- (9) *Preservation of existing plant material.* Where healthy plant material exists on a site prior to its development, an applicant will be encouraged to retain such landscaping where possible.
- (10) Landscaped areas. 50 percent of all lot lines fronting a public street shall be landscaped.
- (11) Other materials. Required landscaped areas shall be adequately landscaped with shrubs, grass, ground cover, or other approved landscape treatment. The TRC may approve alternative landscaping plans that include container plantings.
- (12) Areas abutting an interior property line. On any parcel providing an off-street parking area or other vehicular use area, storage area, outdoor dining area, or loading area there shall be provided landscaping between such area and the property line as follows:

Areas abutting to residential zoning: Where such area abuts property zoned for residential for that portion not entirely screened visually by an intervening structure or conforming buffer on the subject property, there shall be provided a landscaped buffer.

(Ord. No. 2022-10, § 1, 10-17-2022)

#### Sec. 110-509. Fences, walls and hedges.

Fences, walls and hedges shall be constructed and maintained in accordance with section 110-524 Fences, walls and hedges with the following exceptions:

- (1) Chain link fences and other wire fences are prohibited in front yard of lots in the US 27 Commercial Corridor District. Other fencing subject to TRC approval.
- (2) Barbed wire and razor wire are prohibited.

(Ord. No. 2022-10, § 1, 10-17-2022)

#### Sec. 110-510. Outside storage.

Except as expressly permitted by this section, no material, refuse, machinery, merchandise, or vehicles shall be stored outside of any enclosed structure within this district. This requirement shall not apply to the following:

- (1) Placement, storage, or keeping of construction equipment, tools, supplies, material, pallets, and all other material related to new construction, provided that all required permits have been obtained for that construction, and that all materials and products shall be removed from the premises promptly upon completion of that construction.
- (2) Motorized vehicles, boats or recreational vehicles for sale by an authorized dealer provided such outdoor storage is solely for display of vehicles immediately available for sale or lease.
- (3) Other outside storage uses as expressly permitted under a final site plan approval by the TRC.

(Ord. No. 2022-10, § 1, 10-17-2022)

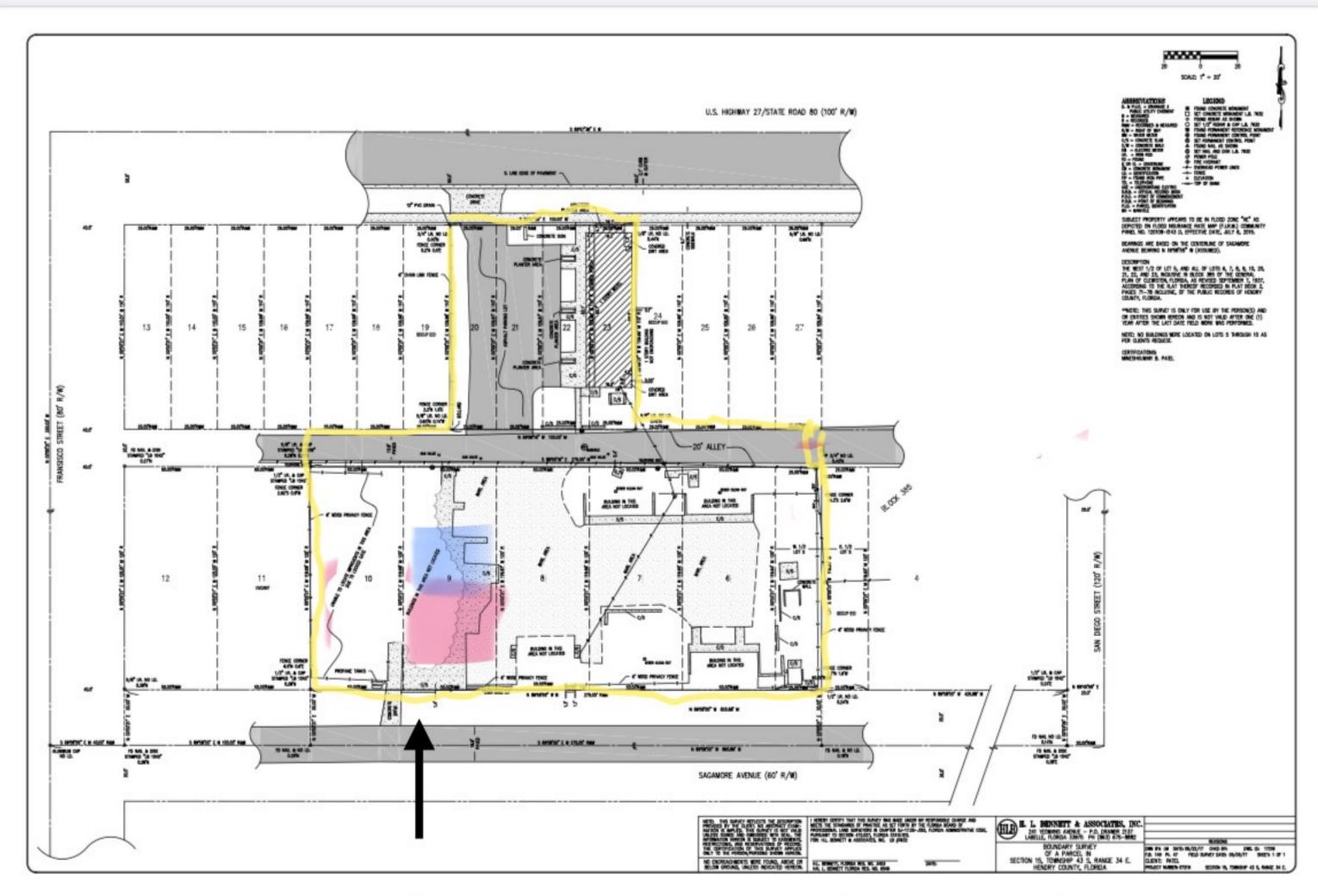
#### Sec. 110-511 Accessory structures.

Accessory structures located within the US 27 Commercial Corridor District must comply with the following regulations.

- (1) All accessory uses shall not exceed 30 percent of the gross floor area of the principal use. An accessory use shall be located on the same lot as the principal use, except for off-site parking, as approved by a valid development order.
- (2) Maximum height shall not exceed the principle structure or 20 feet in height.
- (3) Accessory structures shall not be used as living quarters.
- (4) Shall not be located on street side or front yard of parcel.
- (5) Exterior of structure shall match the principal building aesthetically.

# CITY OF CLEWISTON ELECTRIC UTILITY

# ELECTRIC METERING ENCLOSURE AND EQUIPMENT STANDARDS

To avoid the costs associated with having to replace unacceptable electric metering enclosures or equipment; all electric metering enclosures and equipment installed on the Clewiston Utilities (CU) system must comply with the following CU Metering Enclosure and Equipment Standards. The requirements listed below are in addition to requirements of the latest version of the National Electrical Code and requirements of local code enforcement agencies. Failure to comply may result in service being denied.

# **GENERAL REQUIREMENTS:**

- 1. All services must contain a neutral conductor.
- 2. Where service capacity is less than or equal to 400 amps on a 480 volt 4-wire service, the customer may use a self-contained socket type meter. These installations must have a lockable 480 volt utility disconnect and a 480 volt main disconnect on each side of the self-contained meter socket, and each enclosure must be marked with a non-ferrous metal or plastic plate that is riveted to the disconnect enclosure. (See: EXHIBIT 13).
- 3. Where service ampacity is greater than 400 amps on a 480 volt 4-wire service, transformer-rated metering equipment is required.
- 4. All electric services will normally be metered by a single secondary meter installation for each point of delivery. Customers with multiple points of delivery who desire the benefits of single point-of- service metering should contact the CU customer service at 863-983-1454.
- 5. Where multiple customers can be served by a common distribution point, all customers metered with instrument transformers shall be required to provide a load-side disconnecting means that is readily accessible to CU employees. The disconnecting means shall accept a CU padlock and will serve to disconnect and reconnect service, without affecting other customers.
- 6. Installation of load conductors in line side raceway is prohibited, conductor exiting a load panel shall not pass through any portion of a metering enclosure, and secondary metering conductors shall occupy their own individual raceways exclusive of any other wiring, control systems or cables. Any variation of this requirement shall first be approved by CU.

- 7. All 3-phase transformers with wye configured secondaries (120/208v or 277/480v) shall be wired to provide the customer with reverse rotation (CBA configuration). All 3-phase transformers with delta configured secondaries (120/240v + 208v high leg or 240/480v + 415v high leg) shall be wired to provide the customer with forward rotation (ABC configuration). If the customer requires opposite rotation from what CU provides, the customer shall be responsible for changing the rotation in their panels or at their equipment, as the Utility will not change rotation at the 3-phase transformers.
- 8. When there is more than one service coming from a utility transformer, each transformer-rated CT cabinet service must have a utility disconnect (with lockable handle) after the metering equipment. (See: EXHIBIT 14).

# **METERING SECURITY:**

The following provisions are applicable to sealing and/or locking of metering installations.

- 1. Metering enclosures shall provide a single latch or hasp for securing the enclosure cover with a seal and/or padlock. Enclosure covers attached with multiple bolts, screws or hasps are prohibited.
- 2. Metering enclosures and instrument transformer cabinets shall have provisions for locking and sealing exclusively by CU personnel. CU reserves the right to modify metering and/or equipment enclosures for the purposes of safety and security.
- 3. Security seals installed by CU shall not be removed, altered, or damaged in any way. Only authorized CU personnel or designees are permitted to install or remove security seals from metering equipment and enclosures. Unauthorized removal, altering, or damaging of CU security seals is considered tampering and is subject to a tampering fee.

# <u>METERING ENCLOSURE REQUIREMENTS:</u>

The following provisions are applicable to all metering installations.

- 1. All metering enclosures shall be labeled with the manufacturer's name, catalog number, electrical rating for volts + amps, and service + load terminal conductor size for both copper and aluminum.
- 2. All metering enclosures, single or multi-position, shall have a ringless cover.
- 3. Metering enclosures used on underground services must accept 3" conduit and must allow adequate clearance for line conductors based upon CU standards.

- 4. Sockets must have pressure type jaws designed for full contact with both sides of the meter blades.
- 5. Self-contained metering enclosure terminals shall be equipped with 1/2" hex head bolts or a minimum of 5/16" Allen set screws, unless otherwise authorized by CU.
- 6. Two neutral terminals shall be mounted on a common bus and connected to the grounding terminal.
- 7. Combination enclosures that would allow line side conductor to pass through the customer's load panel are permitted if acceptable safeguards are in place (See: EXHIBIT 1). On combination enclosures, a permanent metal barrier must be present between the meter enclosure and any attached load panel. This barrier must not be removable (See: EXHIBIT 2).
- 8. For multi-socket assemblies, each meter socket position shall have an individual, ring-less cover capable of being removed and replaced without disturbing the other socket positions.
- 9. For any 3-wire self-contained metering installation utilizing a 120/208-volt supply source, the customer shall furnish and install a grounded fifth terminal. This terminal is to be mounted in the nine o'clock position inside the meter socket.

# **SELF-CONTAINED METERING INSTALLATIONS:**

The following provisions are applicable to Self-contained metering installations.

- Self-contained meter enclosures and meter enclosures used for temporary power supply shall be the responsibility of the contractor and may be purchased from an equipment supplier. Meter enclosures provided by the contractor must be approved by CU. Approval is based on the unit's compliance with the Meter Equipment Group (MEG) specifications particularly U.L. listing, sealing requirements, bypass characteristics, and certain operational concerns. MEG publishes an approved device list that is updated annually and can be found here: Approved Meter Equipment Enclosure List
- 2. Unless approved by CU, all three-phase self-contained enclosures, all single-phase self-contained enclosures rated over 200 amps, and all self-contained commercial meter enclosures, regardless of capacity; shall have sockets equipped with a load bypass handle designed to allow for meter exchange without interruption of electric service to the customer (See: EXHIBIT 3).
- 3. CU assumes no responsibility for maintenance of self-contained meter enclosures.
- 4. Use of K-Base (bolt in) meter enclosures is prohibited.

# TRANSFORMER-RATED METERING INSTALLATIONS:

The following provisions are applicable to Transformer-rated metering installations.

- 1. For transformer-rated metering installations only: Contractors shall obtain metering enclosure and instrument transformers (contractor to supply equipment cabinet) from CU by presenting Electrical Permits for jobs located on the CU system. Metering enclosures and associated metering equipment that is furnished by the contractor for use on the CU system must have prior approval of CU. Transformer-rated metering enclosures and associated metering equipment issued by CU are customer-specific and shall be installed on the specified CU metered service only.
- 2. No metering enclosure or instrument transformers shall be issued after 180 days from date of permit without special permission from CU.
- 3. Instrument transformer cabinets shall not be used as a raceway for other conductors.
- 4. Instrument transformer cabinets and metering enclosures, used for residential or commercial applications, shall be installed by the electrical contractor to the specifications of CU.
- 5. Metering enclosures and instrument transformer cabinets must share a common ground if located within 6' of each other. A ground rod must be driven at the base of the metering installation, and the grounding lug must be tied to the ground rod with a minimum of #6 Soft Drawn Bare Copper wire.
- 6. CU is responsible for the control wire harness at the instrument transformers and in the metering enclosures.
- 7. Instrument transformer cabinets will be supplied by the electrical contractor, and the cabinets must be made of aluminum or mild steel (no plastic or fiberglass cabinets permitted). The dimensions of the cabinet shall be 34" Height x 32" Width x 10" Depth. See (EXHIBIT 7) for wiring instructions.

# TRANSFORMER-RATED METERING INSTALLATIONS (CONTINUED):

The following provisions are applicable to Transformer-rated metering installations.

- 1. CT polarity marks (dot or HI) shall face towards line feeding service (towards CU). For 3-phase delta services, mount "high leg" CT at furthest right or bottom position, no exceptions.
- 2. Conductors must be phased correctly through each CT with color coded phasing tape inside the CT cabinet.

3. All 3-phase transformers with wye configured secondaries (120/208v or 277/480v) shall be wired to provide the customer with reverse rotation (CBA configuration). All 3-phase transformers with delta configured secondaries (120/240v + 208v high leg or 240/480v + 415v high leg) shall be wired to provide the customer with forward rotation (ABC configuration). If the customer requires opposite rotation from what CU provides, the customer shall be responsible for changing the rotation in their panels or at their equipment, as the Utility will not change rotation at the 3-phase transformers.

# **LOCATION OF METERING EQUIPMENT:**

The following provisions are applicable to the physical location of metering equipment.

- 1. All metering equipment shall be located outdoors in fully accessible areas. These areas shall always be kept free of obstructions and open to utility representatives.
- 2. Meters shall not be located in commercial or residential garages, carports, screen porches or any other room or location that would cause unmetered conductors to be considered inside the building.
- 3. The location of the current transformers (secondary) shall be specified by the Clewiston Building Official and approved by CU.
- 4. Current transformers should typically be installed in a suitable enclosure supplied by the electrical contractor; but can also be installed inside a pad-mount type transformer when deemed applicable by the Clewiston Building Official and approved by CU. Instrument transformers must be within 25 feet of the meter enclosure.
- 5. A minimum of 1" schedule 40 PVC conduit shall be used from the instrument transformer location to the meter enclosure. The use of rigid metal conduit may be allowed on a case-by-case basis, though it is not preferred in most installations. A junction box or other device which would allow access to the metering conductors shall not be allowed. Contact CU for more information and details.
- 6. Meters shall be located on the line side of the individual customer's main disconnecting means. When used, current transformers should be located on the line side of the main disconnecting means. Exceptions may be specified and approved by CU.
- 7. Metering equipment or cabinets must have four feet minimum clearance around congested areas and traffic areas for CU maintenance and testing. (Drive thru, parking lot, back alleys, etc.)
- 8. The location of primary metering equipment shall be specified by CU. Installation

of primary metering equipment shall be the responsibility of CU personnel.

# **MOUNTING OF METER ENCLOSURES AND EQUIPMENT CABINETS:**

The following provisions refer to the physical mounting of meter enclosures and equipment cabinets.

- 1. The metering enclosure shall be mounted on the finished outside wall of all structures and shall not be fastened to a sub-wall and then surrounded by siding, brick, wood, plaster, stucco, etc. Meter enclosures must not be covered or hidden by trees, bushes, another cabinet, or any other structure. A minimum of 48" of clearance must be observed in front of the metering enclosure to allow for safe access during maintenance.
- 2. Individual and horizontal gang type meter enclosures shall maintain a maximum of 5'-6" and a minimum of 4'-6" in height to the centerline of the meter sockets, measured from finished grade. The bottom of each gang type meter enclosure must be no less than 1'-6" measured from final grade. (See: EXHIBIT 8).
- 3. Mounting heights for mobile home meter pedestals shall be subject to individual determination of CU, but the bottom of the meter pedestal must be no less than 3'-6" measured from final grade. (See: EXHIBIT 9).

# MULTIPLE-OCCUPANCY DWELLINGS AND STRUCTURES:

The following provisions are applicable to multiple-occupancy dwellings.

- 1. All meter sockets or enclosures on multiple-occupancy dwellings or commercial structures requiring the use of more than one meter shall be permanently identified as to the apartment, store, suite, or area served.
- 2. The meter enclosure cover and the interior of the enclosure shall both be permanently identified to correspond to the apartment or unit and building number. The use of a permanent marker or stamping of the enclosure will be acceptable for interior markings only. Exterior markings must be stamped or labeled with permanently affixed metal or plastic name plates. Numbers must be a minimum of 1/4 inch high to be acceptable. Use of plastic labeling tape, nameplates, or numbers fastened solely with adhesive backing is prohibited.
- 3. The contractor shall coordinate identification of multiple dwelling sites with CU. Power will not be turned on until the buildings, apartment doors, meter sockets, and enclosures are permanently identified, and wiring from the socket to the

corresponding unit/apartment is verified by CU. CU will accept any one of three verification methods for the wiring of equipment before energization:

- a) Letter of verification from a Professional Engineer stating that all wiring was tested with a continuity meter to ensure all secondary connections are correct.
- b) The Building Inspector (City of Clewiston or Hendry County) has observed the electrical contractor "ringing out the wires" with a continuity meter and has validated that all secondary connections are correct.
- c) The electrical contractor may use color coded wires for each secondary connection point in accordance with the CU standards illustrated in EXHIBIT 12 of this document.
- 4. Multi-position (vertical) meter centers: Vertical meter centers must be approved by CU prior to installation. Once approved, vertical meter centers for either residential or commercial applications shall be furnished, installed, and maintained by the customer. Vertical multi-position meter centers shall maintain a maximum height of 6'-0" measured from finished grade to the center of the highest meter socket. In all cases, the upper row of meter sockets shall be between 4'-0" and 6'-0" from finished grade; with no meter socket lower than 3'-0" from finished grade.

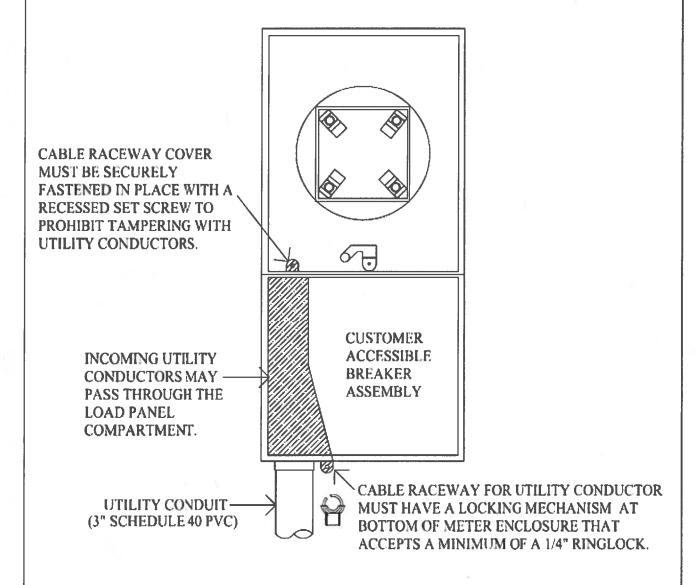
# **SERVICE ENTRANCE:**

# The following provisions shall apply to the customer's service entrance

- 1. Service entrance conduits or metallic tubing should be continuous where practical. When fittings with removable covers are necessary, they shall not be concealed.
- 2. Service provided through more than one meter shall be provided with each set of load side conductors in its own individual conduit or raceway.
- 3. Service raceways, wireways and pull boxes housing individual or multiple service taps shall be fitted with an approved means for sealing or locking.
- 4. Aluminum conductors are approved for use provided all connectors used with them are suitable for aluminum and provided all terminations are treated with corrosion inhibiting compound in the manner prescribed by the cable manufacturer. Service entrance conductors shall be aluminum or copper; combinations of the two are prohibited.
- 5. All service entrance neutral conductors shall be permanently identified inside of self-contained meter enclosures or instrument transformer cabinets, and at the point of service with a permanent white marking system. All neutral conductors shall be insulated. Conductors that are intended for use as ungrounded conductors, whether used as single conductors or in multi-conductor cables, shall be identified to be clearly distinguishable from grounded or grounding conductors.

- 6. The four-wire, three-phase, 120/240-volt delta service entrance shall have the phase with the highest voltage to ground (high leg) plainly identified at the weather-head, at the instrument transformer location, inside of the meter enclosure, and inside of the disconnecting means with an orange marking system. This high leg shall be located on the right outside (C- Phase) position, inside of the meter enclosure. When current transformers are used, the high leg shall be located on the bottom or right- hand side of the current transformer assembly.
- 7. The service entrance conductors shall project (3'-0" minimum) outside the weather-head for connection to the service wires on overhead installations.
- 8. Except for the installation and maintenance of its own property, CU does not normally install or repair wiring on customer's premises, and therefore is not responsible for the quality of electricity provided beyond the point of delivery and does not assume any responsibility for (or liability arising because of) the condition of wires or apparatus on the premises of any customer beyond this point.
- 9. On metering enclosures with an underground service entrance, the left portion of the metering enclosure will be used only for CU, and the customers load side conductors shall never crossover the line side conductors.

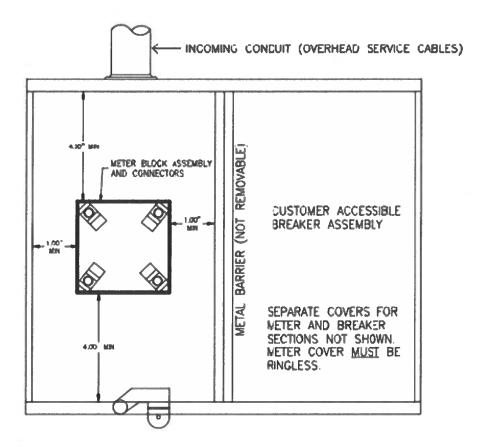

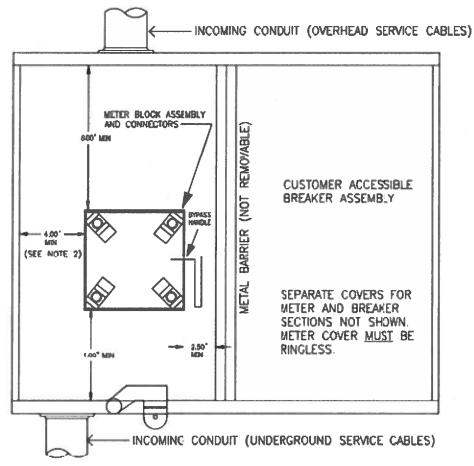

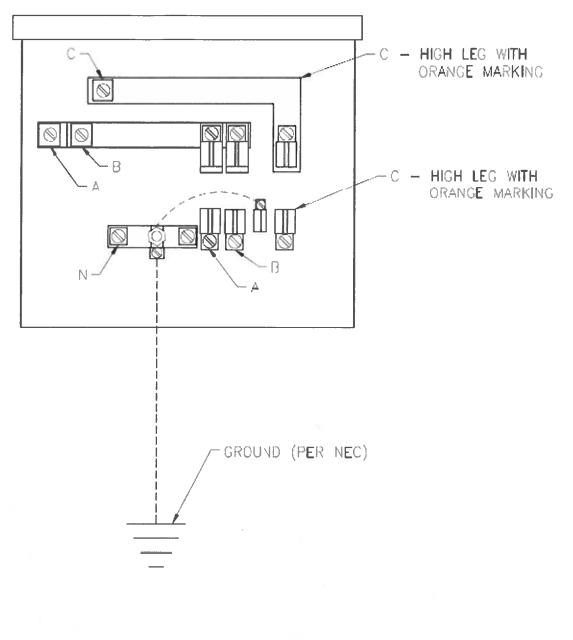

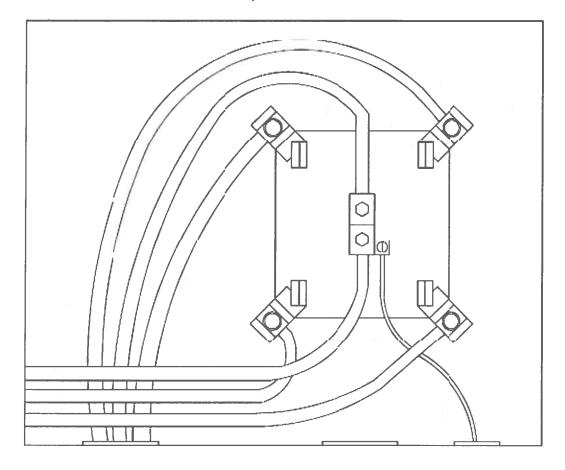

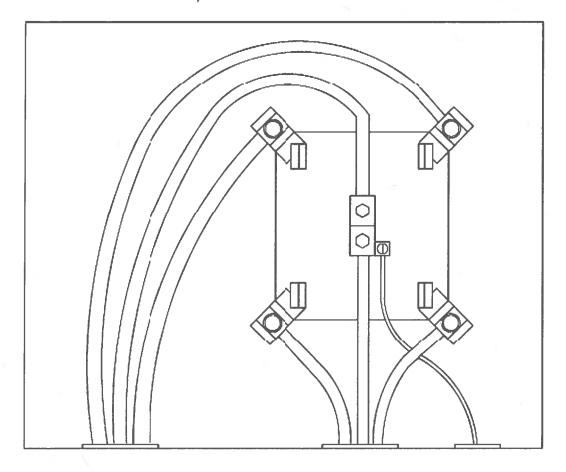

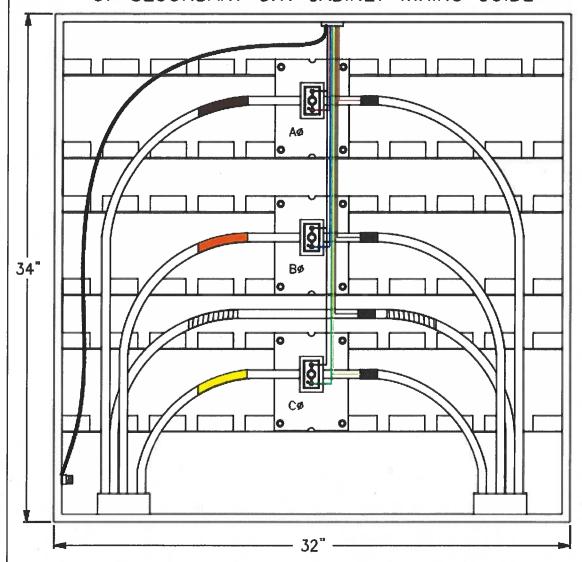

#### **Background:**

In 2023 and 2024 the City of Clewiston received appropriation funds, respectively, for two water main infrastructure projects: \$4 million funds were received for the Clewiston Water System Infrastructure improvements to Serve Airglades Airport, and \$1.7 million for the Clewiston Harlem Community Water Line Replacement Project. The City entered into agreements with Johnson Engineering for engineering services for both infrastructure projects.

Recently the engineers have advised the city that the Airglades 6-inch diameter pipe, as initially designed, is undersized to meet anticipated growth within the city service territory. A 16-inch diameter pipe in proposed.

Staff is recommending merging the projects and significantly shortening the Airglades project length. The merger enables the budget adjustments necessary to meet the increased cost of the larger pipe material. The attached maps illustrate the project limits before and after the merger.

The city received a letter of support for the modification from the projects Sponsor, Senator Passidomo to merge the two projects, and the city is pending approval of the modification from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection. Next month staff will bring the amended grant agreement to the Commission for consideration which will merge the Harlem grant under the Airglades grant. Before the Commission today is Resolution 2025-57 for the approval of the change orders to the Johnson Engineering Work Orders which reflect the change in scope of the water infrastructure projects.

## **Fiscal Impact**:

The combined change orders are a net decrease of \$ 184,737.50 in contract price, which can be transferred to the construction portion of the grant.

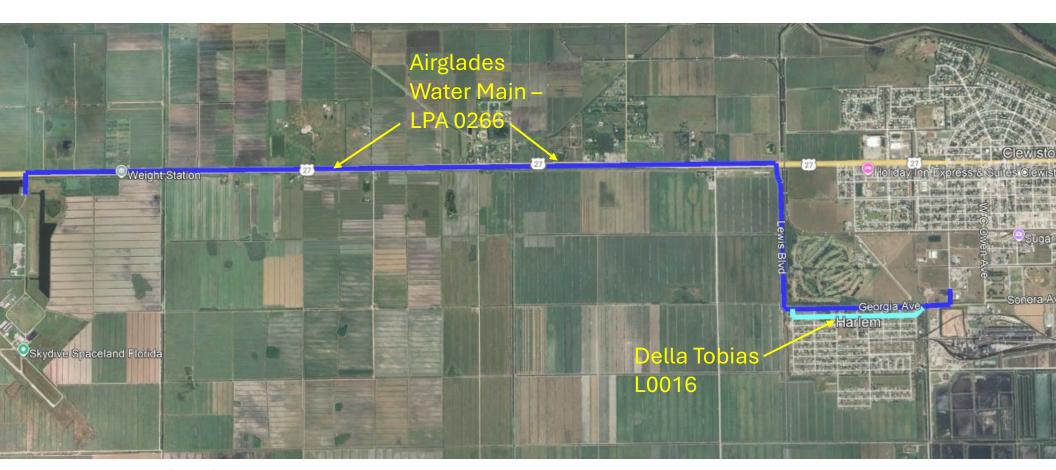

## **Background:**

The General Appropriations Act, 2023 Legislature, Section 123 provides approximately \$25,000,000 in nonrecurring funds to the FDLE for the Drone Replacement Program established in Chapter 2023-240, Laws of Florida. Section 934.50, Florida Statutes establishes rules, regulations, and security standards for the use of drones by governmental entities, and Rule 60GG-2.0075, Florida Administrative Code, the Department of Management Services (DMS) has published minimum security standards for drones used by governmental entities.

## **Proposed Action:**

It is recommended that the City Commission authorize staff to apply for the Florida Department of Law Enforcement grant funding under this agreement contingent upon an appropriation by the Legislature, availability of funds, and subject to any modification in accordance with Chapter 216, Florida Statutes or the Florida Constitution.

#### Recommendation:

Staff recommends approval of Resolution No. 2025-61 to authorize the Police Department to apply for grant funds and appropriations to purchase a new drone compliant with Rule 60GG-2.0075, Florida Administrative Code.

**WHEREAS**, the Police Department for the City of Clewiston desires to apply for funding pursuant to the Drone Replacement Program.

**NOW THEREFORE**, in consideration of the foregoing, the parties hereto agree to this agreement as follows:

- **Section 1.** The above recitals are true and correct, and are incorporated herein by reference.
- **Section 2.** The City Commission hereby authorizes the appropriate city staff or designees to apply for grant funding pursuant to the Drone Replacement Program, and authorizes the City Manager to execute the grant application and any related documentation on behalf of the City.
- **Section 3**. The State of Florida's performance and obligation to pay under any funding award is contingent upon an appropriation by the Legislature, availability of funds, and subject to any modification in accordance with Chapter 216, Florida Statutes or the Florida Constitution.
- **Section 4.** FDLE will administer and disburse funds under any received award in accordance with sections 215.97, 215.971, 215.981 and 215.985, F.S. for state financial assistance. The Recipient shall perform all tasks, activities, and provide deliverables, including reports, as specified in terms of the award. FDLE's determination of acceptable expenditures shall be conclusive.
- **Section 5.** The Recipient certifies with respect to any funding awarded that it possesses the legal authority to receive the funds to be provided under the award and that, if applicable, its governing body has authorized, by resolution or otherwise, the execution and acceptance of the award with all covenants and assurances contained herein. The Recipient also certifies that the undersigned possesses the authority to legally execute and bind Recipient to the terms of any award received.

#### **Program Activities and Scope of Work**

The Florida Legislature amended Section 934.50, Florida Statutes during the 2022 session. By July 1, 2022 governmental agencies using any drone not produced by an approved manufacturer must implement a plan to discontinue the use of the such drone by January 1, 2023. This grant provides funding for the Recipient to purchase drones that meet the compliance requirements outlined in Rule 60GG-2.0075, Florida Administrative Code.

The Recipient must prepare a Drone Funding Request Form (**Appendix A**) to receive funding under the revised program guidelines in Chapter 2025-199, Section 55, Laws of Florida. This form includes information about the recipient agency and how many drones they anticipate purchasing. The Department will review the request and allocate funding based on the information provided. The Recipient will be awarded funds, not to exceed \$25,000 per compliant drone, approved by the Department on the Drone Funding Request Form (**Appendix A**).

#### **DELIVERABLES**

As stated in the scope and responsibilities above, the Recipient shall purchase new drones that are compliant with Rule 60GG-2.0075, Florida Administrative Code.

#### **DISTRIBUTION AND PAYMENTS**

This award is a cost-reimbursement agreement with the ability to request a cash advance. The Recipient will be awarded funds, not to exceed \$25,000 for each compliant drone approved to purchase under this award.

Any funds paid in excess of the amount to which the participating agency is entitled under the terms and conditions of the agreement must be refunded to FDLE. Factual misrepresentations of drone purchases or other certifications will result in the loss of funding.

Funds under this agreement will be disbursed when all the following criteria are met:

- Executed agreement is signed by the Chief Official and provided to <a href="https://occupied.org/nct/95/40/fdle.state.fl.us">OCJGSFA@fdle.state.fl.us</a>;
- The Drone Funding Request Form (Appendix A) is prepared and signed by the Chief Official and provided to <a href="https://occupants.org/occu
- Criteria is met for Option 1 (Reimbursement) or Option 2 (Cash Advance):

Option 1 = Reimbursement: The Recipient may use its own funds to purchase the compliant drone and provide documentation related to the purchase including: purchase order, invoice, and proof of payment (cancelled check, bank/card statement, etc.).

Option 2 = Cash Advance: The Recipient may request a cash advance to receive program funds and subsequently purchase the compliant drone. In order to qualify for this method of payment, the Recipient must provide a valid, executed purchase order and must be ready to order the compliant drone immediately upon the receipt of advanced funds. The Recipient must provide documentation of purchase (invoice) and proof of payment (cancelled check, bank/card statement, etc.) within 45 days of receiving the advanced funds. Failure to provide documentation within 45 days will result in the Recipient being required to submit a refund to FDLE.

#### Appendix B - FY2025-26 State Financial Assistance Standard Conditions

The following terms and conditions will be binding upon approval of the grant award and execution of the contract by both the Recipient and the Florida Department of Law Enforcement. The Recipient will maintain required registrations and certifications for eligibility under this program.

The Department and the Recipient agree that they do not contemplate the development, transfer or receipt of intellectual property as a part of this agreement.

#### **SECTION I: PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION**

**Legal Authority:** The Recipient certifies with respect to this agreement that it possesses the legal authority to receive the funds to be provided under this agreement and that, if applicable, its governing body has authorized, by resolution or otherwise, the execution and acceptance of this agreement with all covenants and assurances contained herein. The Recipient also certifies that the undersigned possesses the authority to legally execute and bind Recipient to the terms of this agreement.

Not Operational within 60 and 90 Days: If a project is not operational within 60 days of the original start date of the award period, the Recipient must report by letter to the Department the steps taken to initiate the project, the reasons for delay, and the expected start date. If a project is not operational within 90 days of the original start date of the award period, the Recipient must submit a second statement to the Department explaining the implementation delay. Upon receipt of the 90-day letter, the Department shall determine if the reason for delay is justified or shall, at its discretion, require additional project documentation and justifications throughout the award period. The Department will also require the Recipient provide a revised project timeline that includes all anticipated project activities, tasks, and estimated completion date(s).

#### **SECTION II: PAYMENTS**

**Obligation to Pay:** The State of Florida's obligation to pay under this agreement is contingent upon an appropriation by the Legislature.

**Overpayments:** Any funds paid in excess of the amount to which the Recipient is entitled under the terms and conditions of the agreement must be refunded to the Department. Any balance of unobligated cash that has been paid and has not been authorized to be retained for direct program costs in a subsequent period must be refunded to the Department.

Advance Funding (Drone Program Only): Advance funding may be provided to a Recipient upon completion and submission of the following to the assigned FDLE Grant Manager: (1) a completed "Compliant Drone Cash Advance Request" form, (2) a valid, executed Purchase Order, and (3) vendor quote(s) for the compliant drone. The request form must be signed by the Chief Official. Advanced funds must be spent on drone purchase within 30 days of receipt. In order to reconcile the Cash Advance, the Recipient must provide the invoice and proof of payment for the compliant drone to the assigned FDLE Grant Manager within 45 days of the receipt of the advanced funding. Should extenuating circumstances arise which prevent the expenditure of advance funds within 30 days of receipt, or the provision of required documentation to reconcile the funds, a written request to retain the funds must be provided by the Recipient and approved by

the Department. Failure to provide documentation will result in a refund of any advanced funding.

#### SECTION III: PROJECT AND GRANT MANAGEMENT

**Personnel Changes:** The Recipient must notify the FDLE grant manager of any change in the Chief Officials or Project Director or any change in contact information, including mailing address, phone number, email, or title change.

**Obligation of Grant Funds:** Grant funds shall not under any circumstances be obligated prior to the effective date, or subsequent to the termination date, of the period of performance. Only project costs incurred on or after the effective date, and on or prior to the termination date of the Recipient's project are eligible for reimbursement. All payments must be completed within thirty (30) days of the end of the grant period of performance.

**Financial Management:** The Recipient must have a financial management system able to record and report on the receipt, obligation, and expenditure of grant funds. An adequate accounting system must be able to separately track receipts, expenditures, assets, and liabilities for awards, programs, and subrecipients. The Recipient shall maintain books, records, and documents (including electronic storage media) in accordance with generally accepted accounting procedures and practices. Recipient must have written procedures for procurement transactions.

**Travel:** Cost for travel shall be reimbursed at the Recipient's travel rate, but the maximum reimbursement for each type of travel cost shall not exceed rates established in State of Florida Travel Guidelines, §112.061, F.S.

Subcontracts: Recipient agrees that all employees, subcontractors, or agents performing work under the agreement shall be properly trained individuals who meet or exceed any specified training qualifications. Recipient agrees to be responsible for all work performance and all expenses incurred in fulfilling the obligations of this agreement, and will not assign the responsibility for this agreement to another party. If the Recipient subcontracts any or all of the work required under this agreement, the Recipient must provide a completed DFS-A2-NS (Recipient-Subrecipient vs. Vendor Determination) form and a copy of the executed subcontract within thirty (30) days after execution of the subcontract. The Recipient agrees to include in the subcontract that (i) the subcontractor is bound by all applicable state and federal laws and regulations, and (ii) the subcontractor shall hold the Department and Recipient harmless against all claims of whatever nature arising out of the subcontractor's performance of work under this agreement, to the extent allowed and required by law.

Grant Adjustments: Recipients must submit a Request for Grant Adjustment to the FDLE grant manager for substantive changes such as: scope modifications, changes to project activities, target populations, service providers, implementation schedules, project director, designs or research plans set forth in the approved agreement, and for any budget changes affecting a cost category that was not included in the original budget. Recipients may transfer up to 10% of the total budget between current, approved budget categories without prior approval, as long as the funds are transferred to an existing line item. Adjustments are required when there will be a transfer of 10% or more of the total budget between budget categories. Under no circumstances can transfers of funds increase the total award. Requests for changes to the grant agreement must be signed by the Recipient or Implementing Agency's chief official or the chief official's designee. All requests for

changes must be submitted no later than thirty (30) days prior to grant expiration date.

**Property Management:** The Recipient shall establish and administer a system to protect, preserve, use, maintain, and dispose of any property furnished to it by the Department or purchased pursuant to this agreement.

#### SECTION IV: MANDATORY DISCLOSURES

Conflict of Interest: The Recipient will establish safeguards to prohibit employees from using their positions for a purpose that constitutes or presents the appearance of personal or organizational conflict of interest, or personal gain. Recipients must disclose in writing any potential conflict of interest to the Department.

**Violations of Criminal Law:** The Recipient must disclose all violations of state or federal criminal law involving fraud, bribery or gratuity violations potentially affecting the grant award.

Convicted Vendors: The Recipient shall disclose to the Department if it, or any of its affiliates, as defined in §287.133(1)(a) F.S., is on the convicted vendor list. A person or affiliate placed on the convicted vendor list following a conviction for a public entity crime is prohibited from doing any activities listed in the agreement for a period of thirty-six (36) months from the date of being placed on the convicted vendor list.

**Vendors on Scrutinized Companies Lists:** If this agreement is in the amount of \$1 million or more, Recipient certifies upon executing this agreement, that it is not listed on either the Scrutinized Companies with Activities in Sudan List or the Scrutinized Companies with Activities in the Iran Petroleum Energy Sector List, created pursuant to §215.473, F.S., or engaged in business operations in Cuba or Syria. In the event that federal law ceases to authorize the states to adopt and enforce the contracting prohibition identified herein, this provision shall be null and void.

**Discriminatory Vendors:** The Recipient shall disclose to the Department if it or any of its affiliates, as defined by §287.134(1)(a), F.S. appears on the discriminatory vendors list. An entity or affiliate placed on the discriminatory vendor list pursuant to §287.134, F.S. may not a) submit a bid, proposal, or reply on a contract or agreement to provide any goods or services to a public entity; b) submit a bid, proposal, or reply on a contract or agreement with a public entity for the construction or repair of a public building or public work; c) submit bids, proposals, or replies on leases of real property to a public entity; d) be awarded or perform work as a contractor, subcontractor, Recipient, supplier, sub-recipient, or consultant under a contract or agreement with any public entity; or e) transact business with any public entity.

Reporting Potential Fraud, Waste, Abuse, and Similar Misconduct: The Recipient must promptly refer to the Department of Law Enforcement, Bureau of Criminal Justice Grants any credible evidence that a principal, employee, agent, contractor, subcontractor, or other person has either 1) submitted a claim for grant funds that violates the False Claims Act; or 2) committed a criminal or civil violation of laws pertaining to fraud, conflict of interest, bribery, gratuity, or similar misconduct involving grant funds.

**Non-Disclosure Agreements:** Restrictions and certifications regarding non-disclosure agreements and related matters Recipients or contracts/subcontracts under this award may not require any employee or contractor to sign an internal confidentiality agreement or statement that

prohibits, restricts or purports to prohibit or restrict, the reporting of waste, fraud or abuse in accordance with law, to an investigative or law enforcement representative of a state or federal department or agency authorized to receive such information. The Recipient certifies that if informed or notified of any subrecipient, or contractor/subcontractor has been requiring their employees to execute agreements or statements that prohibit the reporting of fraud, waste, or abuse that it will immediately cease all further obligations of award funds to the entity and will immediately notify the Department. The Recipient will not resume obligations until expressively authorized to do so from the Department.

#### SECTION V: COMPLIANCE WITH STATUTES, RULES, AND REGULATIONS

In performing its obligations under this agreement, the Recipient shall without exception be aware of and comply with all State and Federal laws, rules and regulations relating to its performance under this agreement as they may be enacted or amended from time-to-time, as well as any court or administrative order, judgment, settlement or compliance agreement involving the Department which by its nature affects the services provided under this agreement. The following are examples of rules and regulations that govern Recipient's performance under this agreement.

**Lobbying Prohibited:** The Recipient shall comply with the provisions of 11.062 and 216.347, F.S., which prohibit the expenditure of funds for the purpose of lobbying the Legislature, judicial branch, or a State agency. No funds or other resources received from the Department in connection with this agreement may be used directly or indirectly to influence legislation or any other official action by the Florida Legislature or any state agency.

State of Florida E.O. 20-44: Public-Private Partnerships: Any entity named in statute with which the agency must form a sole-source, public-private agreement; and any nongovernmental Recipient receiving 50% or more of their annual budget from any combination of state or federal funding must submit an annual report to the Bureau of Criminal Justice Grants. The report must include the most recent IRS Form 990, detailing the total compensation for the entities' executive leadership teams. Total compensation shall include salary, bonuses, cashed-in leave, cash equivalents, severance pay, retirement benefits, deferred compensation, real-property gifts, and any other payout. In addition, the Recipient must agree through appropriate contract or grant agreement amendment to inform the agency of any changes in total executive compensation between the annual reports. All compensation reports must indicate what percent of compensation comes directly from the State or Federal allocations to the Recipient.

Civil Rights: The Recipient agrees to comply with the Americans With Disabilities Act (Public Law 101- 336, 42 U.S.C. Section 12101 et seq.) and shall not discriminate against any employee (or applicant for employment) in the performance of this agreement because of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, disability, age, or marital status. These requirements shall apply to all contractors, subcontractors, subgrantees or others with whom it arranges to provide services or benefits to clients or employees in connection with its programs and activities.

E-Verify: The Department shall consider the employment by any contractor of unauthorized aliens a violation of section 274(e) of the Immigration and Nationalization Act. Such violation shall be cause for unilateral cancellation of this contract. Pursuant to F.S. 448.095, the Contracting Party and any subcontractors are required to register with and use the E-Verify system operated by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security beginning on January 1, 2021. The Contracting Party and any subcontractors are prohibited from entering into contracts with one another unless all parties

register and use the E-Verify system. Subcontractors who enter into contracts with the Contracting Party are required to provide a certification that the subcontractor does not employ or use unauthorized aliens as defined in the statute, a copy of which the Contracting Party must maintain. The Contracting Party and any subcontractors are required to terminate a contract if a party has a good faith belief that another party is in violation of F.S. 448.09(1), prohibiting the employment of unauthorized aliens. If a public employer has a good faith belief that the subcontractor has violated these requirements, but that the Contracting Party has otherwise complied, the public employer must notify the Contracting Party to terminate its contract with the subcontractor. A party may challenge a contract termination in accordance with these requirements. A penalized Contractor is prohibited from obtaining another contract with a public employer for at least one year.

**Background Check:** Whenever a background screening for employment or a background security check is required by law for employment, unless otherwise provided by law, the provisions of Chapter 435 F.S., shall apply. All employees in positions designated by law as positions of trust or responsibility shall be required to undergo security background investigations as a condition of employment and continued employment. For the purposes of the subsection, security background investigations shall include, but not be limited to, employment history checks, fingerprinting for all purposes and checks in this subsection, statewide criminal and juvenile record checks through the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, and federal criminal record checks through the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and may include local criminal record checks through local law enforcement agencies.

**Public Records:** As required by 287.058(1)(c), F.S., the Recipient shall allow public access to all documents, papers, letters, or other public records as defined in 119.011(12), F.S. as prescribed by 119.07(1) F.S., made or received by the Recipient in conjunction with this agreement, except public records which are made confidential by law must be protected from disclosure. It is expressly understood that the Recipient's failure to comply with this provision shall constitute an immediate breach of contract, for which the Department may unilaterally terminate this agreement.

Independent Contractor, Subcontracting and Assignments: In performing its obligations under this agreement, the Recipient shall at all times be acting in the capacity of an independent contractor and not as an officer, employee, or agent of the State of Florida. Neither the Recipient nor any of its agents, employees, subcontractors or assignees shall represent to others that it is an agent of or has the authority to bind the Department by virtue of this agreement, unless specifically authorized in writing to do so.

Timely Payment of Subcontractors: To the extent that a subcontract provides for payment after Recipient's receipt of payment from the Department, the Recipient shall make payments to any subcontractor within 7 working days after receipt of full or partial payments from the Department in accordance with §287.0585, F.S., unless otherwise stated in the agreement between the Recipient and subcontractor. Failure to pay within seven (7) working days will result in a penalty that shall be charged against the Recipient and paid by the Recipient to the subcontractor in the amount of one-half of one percent (.005) of the amount due per day from the expiration of the period allowed for payment. Such penalty shall be in addition to actual payments owed and shall not exceed fifteen (15%) percent of the outstanding balance due.

**Notice of Legal Actions:** The Recipient shall notify the Department of potential or actual legal actions taken against the Recipient related to services provided through this agreement or that may impact the Recipient's ability to complete the deliverables outlined herein, or that may adversely impact the Department. The Department's Grant Manager will be notified within 10 days of Recipient becoming aware of such actions or potential actions or from the day of the legal filing,

whichever comes first.

**Property:** In accordance with 287.05805, F.S., any State funds provided for the purchase of or improvements to real property are contingent upon the Recipient granting to the State a security interest in the property at least to the amount of the State funds provided for at least five (5) years from the date of purchase or the completion of the improvements or as further required by law.

### SECTION VI: RECORDS, AUDITS, AND INFORMATION SECURITY

Records Retention: Retention of all financial records, supporting documents, statistical records, and any other documents (including electronic storage media) pertinent to this agreement shall be maintained by the Recipient during the term of this agreement and retained for a period of five (5) years after completion of the agreement or longer when required by law. In the event an audit is required under this agreement, records shall be retained for a minimum period of five years after the audit report is issued or until resolution of any audit findings or litigation based on the terms of this agreement, at no additional cost to the Department. Upon demand, at no additional cost to the Department, the Recipient will facilitate the duplication and transfer of any records or documents during the term of this agreement and the required five (5) year retention period. No record may be withheld, nor may the Recipient attempt to limit the scope of any of the foregoing inspections, reviews, copying, transfers or audits based on any claim that any record is exempt from public inspection or is confidential, proprietary or trade secret in nature; provided, however, that this provision does not limit any exemption to public inspection or copying to any such record. These records shall be made available at all reasonable times for inspection, review, copying, or audit by State, or other personnel duly authorized by the Department.

**Records Inspection:** Pursuant to Section 216.1366, F.S., in order to preserve the interest of the state in the prudent expenditure of state funds, the Department shall be authorized to inspect the (a) Financial records, papers, and documents of the Contractor that are directly related to the performance of the Contract or the expenditure of state funds, and (b) Programmatic records, papers, and documents of the Contractor which the Department determines are necessary to monitor the performance of the Contract or to ensure that the terms of the Contract are being met. The Contractor shall provide such records, papers, and documents requested by the Department within ten (10) business days after the request is made.

Monitoring: The Recipient agrees to comply with the Department's grant monitoring guidelines, protocols, and procedures; and to cooperate with the Department on all grant monitoring requests, including requests related to desk reviews, enhanced programmatic desk reviews, site visits, and/or Florida Department of Financial Services contract reviews and Expanded Audits of Payment (EAP). The Recipient agrees to provide the Department all documentation necessary to complete monitoring of the award and verify expenditures in accordance with 215.971, F.S. Further, the Recipient agrees to abide by reasonable deadlines set by the Department for providing requested documents. Failure to cooperate with grant monitoring activities may result in sanctions affecting the Recipient's award, including, but not limited to: withholding and/or other restrictions on the Recipient's access to funds, and/or referral to the Office of the Inspector General for audit review.

Florida Single Audit Act (FSAA): The Recipient shall comply and cooperate immediately with any inspections, reviews, investigations, or audits deemed necessary by The Office of the Inspector General (§20.055, F.S.). In the event that the Recipient expends a total amount of state financial assistance equal to or in excess of \$750,000 in any fiscal year, the Recipient must have a single audit or project-specific audit in accordance with §215.97, F.S. and the

applicable rules of the Department of Financial Services and the Auditor General. In determining the state financial assistance expended in its fiscal year, the Recipient shall consider all sources of state financial assistance, including state financial assistance received from the Department of Law Enforcement, other state agencies, and other non-state entities. State financial assistance does not include Federal direct or pass-through awards and resources received by a non-state entity for Federal program matching requirements. The schedule of expenditures should disclose the expenditures by contract/agreement number for each contract with the Department in effect during the audit period. All questioned costs and liabilities due the Department shall be fully disclosed in the audit report package with reference to the specific contract number. If the Recipient expends less than \$750,000 in state financial assistance in its fiscal year, an audit conducted in accordance with the provisions of 215.97, F.S., is not required. In the event that the Recipient expends less than \$750,000 in state financial assistance in its fiscal year and elects to have an audit conducted in accordance with the provisions of 215.97, F.S., the cost of the audit must be paid from the non-state entity's resources (i.e., the cost of such an audit must be paid from the Recipient's resources obtained from other than State entities). Pursuant to 215.97(8), F.S., state agencies may conduct or arrange for audits of state financial assistance that are in addition to audits conducted in accordance with §215.97, F.S. In such an event, the state awarding agency must arrange for funding the full cost of such additional audits. Any reports, management letters, or other information required to be submitted to the Department pursuant to this agreement shall be submitted within nine (9) months after the end of the Recipient's fiscal year or within 30 days of the Recipient's receipt of the audit report, whichever occurs first, unless otherwise required by Florida Statutes. Criminal Justice Information Data Security: Acceptance of this award, constitutes understanding that transmission of Criminal Justice Information (CJI) between locations must be encrypted to conform to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) Criminal Justice Information Services (CJIS) Security Policy.

**Recipient's Confidential and Exempt Information:** By executing this agreement, the Recipient acknowledges that any information not marked as "confidential" or "exempt" will be posted by the Department on the public website maintained by the Department of Financial Services pursuant to 215.985,

F.S. The Recipient agrees that, upon written request of the Department, it shall promptly provide to the Department a written statement of the basis for the exemption applicable to each provision identified by the Recipient as "confidential" or "exempt", including the statutory

citation to an exemption created or afforded by statute, and state with particularity the reasons for the conclusion that the provision is exempt or confidential. Any claim by Recipient of trade secret (proprietary) confidentiality for any information contained in Recipient's documents (reports, deliverables or work papers, etc., in paper or electronic form) submitted to the Department in connection with this agreement cannot be waived, unless the claimed confidential information is submitted in accordance with the following two paragraphs.

The Recipient must clearly label any portion of the documents, data, or records submitted that it considers exempt from public inspection or disclosure pursuant to Florida's Public Records Law as trade secret. The labeling will include a justification citing specific statutes and facts that authorize exemption of the information from public disclosure. If different exemptions are claimed to be applicable to different portions of the protected information, the Recipient shall include information correlating the nature of the claims to the particular protected information.

The Department, when required to comply with a public records request including documents submitted by the Recipient, may require the Recipient to expeditiously submit redacted copies of documents marked as trade secret in accordance with this section. Accompanying the submission shall be an updated version of the justification, correlated specifically to redacted information, either confirming that the statutory and factual basis originally asserted remain unchanged or indicating any changes affecting the basis for the asserted exemption from public inspection or disclosure. The redacted copy must exclude or obliterate only those exact portions that are claimed to be trade secret. If the Recipient fails to promptly submit a redacted copy, the Department is authorized to produce the records sought without any redaction of proprietary or trade secret information.

SECTION VII: PENALTIES, TERMINATION, DISPUTE RESOLUTION, AND LIABILITY

**Financial Penalties for Failure to Take Corrective Action:** Corrective action plans may be required for noncompliance, nonperformance, or unacceptable performance under this agreement. Penalties may be imposed for failures to implement or to make acceptable progress on such corrective action plans.

**Termination:** The Department reserves the right to unilaterally cancel this agreement for refusal by the Recipient to allow public access to all documents, papers, letters or other material subject to the provisions of Chapter 119, Florida Statutes, and made or received by the Recipient in conjunction with this agreement, unless the records are exempt pursuant to Article I. Section 24(a), of the Florida Constitution and §119.07(1), F.S. The Department shall be the final authority as to the appropriation, availability and adequacy of funds. In the event the Recipient fails to fully comply with the terms and conditions of this agreement, the Department may terminate the agreement upon written notice. Such notice may be issued without providing an opportunity for cure if it specifies the nature of the noncompliance and states that provision for cure would adversely affect the interests of the State or is not permitted by law or regulation. Otherwise, notice of termination will be issued after the Recipient's failure to fully cure such noncompliance within the time specified in a written notice of noncompliance issued by the Department specifying the nature of the noncompliance and the actions required to cure such noncompliance. In addition, the Department may employ the default provisions in Rule 60A-1.006(3), F.A.C., but is not required to do so in order to terminate the agreement. The Department's failure to demand performance of any provision of this agreement shall not be deemed a waiver of such performance. The Department's waiver of any one breach of any provision of this agreement shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any other breach and neither event shall be construed to be a modification of the terms and conditions of this agreement. The provisions herein do not limit the Department's right to remedies at law or in equity. The validity of this agreement is subject to the truth and accuracy of all the information, representations, and materials submitted or provided by the Recipient in this agreement, in any subsequent submission or response to Department request, or in any submission or response to fulfill the requirements of this agreement, and such information, representations, and materials are incorporated by reference. The lack of accuracy thereof or any material changes shall, at the option of the Department and with thirty (30) days written notice to the Recipient, cause the termination of this agreement and the release of the Department from all its obligations to the Recipient. This agreement shall be construed under the laws of the State of Florida, and venue for any actions arising out of this agreement shall lie in Leon County. If any provision hereof is in conflict with any applicable statute or rule, or is otherwise unenforceable, then such provision shall be deemed null and void to the extent of such conflict, and shall be deemed severable, but shall not invalidate any other provision of this agreement. No waiver by the Department of any right or remedy granted hereunder or failure to insist on strict performance by the Recipient shall affect or extend or act as a waiver of any other right or remedy of the Department hereunder, or affect the subsequent exercise of the same right or remedy by the Department for any further or subsequent default by the Recipient. Any power of approval or disapproval granted to the Department under the terms of this agreement shall survive the terms and life of this agreement as a whole. The agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, any one of which may be taken as an original. In the event of termination, the Recipient will be compensated for any work satisfactorily completed through the date of termination or an earlier date of suspension of work.

Disputes and Appeals: The Department shall make its decision in writing when responding to any disputes, disagreements, or questions of fact arising under this agreement and shall distribute its response to all concerned parties. The Recipient shall proceed diligently with the performance of this agreement according to the Department's decision. If the Recipient appeals the Department's decision, the appeal also shall be made in writing within twenty-one (21) calendar days to the Department's clerk (agency clerk). The Recipient's right to appeal the Department's decision is contained in Chapter 120, F.S., and in procedures set forth in Fla. Admin. Code R.28-106.104. Failure to appeal within this time frame constitutes a waiver of proceedings under Chapter 120, F.S. After receipt of a petition for alternative dispute resolution the Department and the Recipient shall attempt to amicably resolve the dispute through negotiations. Timely delivery of a petition for alternative dispute resolution and completion of the negotiation process shall be a condition precedent to any legal action by the Recipient concerning this agreement.

**Liability:** Unless the Recipient is a state agency or subdivision, the Recipient shall be solely responsible to parties with whom it shall deal in carrying out the terms of this agreement, and shall save the Department harmless against all claims of whatever nature by third parties arising out of the performance of work under this agreement. For purposes of this agreement, Recipient agrees that it is not an employee or agent of the Department, but is an independent contractor. Nothing herein shall be construed as consent by a state agency of the State of Florida to be sued by third parties in any matter arising out of any contract. Nothing shall be construed affect in any way the Recipient rights, privileges, and immunities under the doctrine of "sovereign immunity" and as set forth in 768.28, F.S.
