C. Liberty Theatre Cultural Arts Center Proposed Transfer of Ownership to City and Grant Opportunity- Pam Hodge, Deputy City Manager of Finance, Planning and Development

<u>Deputy City Manager Pam Hodge</u> approached the rostrum to provide information on the proposed ownership transfer of the Liberty Theatre Cultural Arts Center to the City of Columbus and the grant opportunities that would be available as a result.

<u>City Manager Isaiah Hugley</u> stated if Council considers the request, he ensures the Liberty Theatre Cultural Arts Center would retain its identity because of its cultural and historical significance.

Resolution (379-22): A resolution authorizing the City Manager to accept ownership of the Liberty Theatre upon its transfer to the Columbus Consolidated Government. Councilor Woodson made a motion to approve a resolution authorizing the transfer of ownership of the Liberty Theatre Cultural Arts Center to the City of Columbus, seconded by Councilor Tucker and carried unanimously by the ten members of Council.

1. Memorandum of Understanding with the Greater Columbus Georgia Chamber of Commerce for Small Business and Non-Profit Grant Program Administration Services

Resolution (380-22): A resolution authorizing the execution of a Memorandum of Understanding with the Greater Columbus Georgia Chamber of Commerce to administer the Columbus Consolidated Government Small Business and Non-Profit Grant Programs funded by State Fiscal Recovery Funds under the American Rescue Plan. Councilor Tucker made a motion to approve the resolution, seconded by Councilor Woodson and carried unanimously by the ten members of Council.

Resolution (381-22): A resolution authorizing the purchase of three (3) 2023 Ford Explorers for the Fire & EMS Department, from Allan Vigil Ford (Morrow, GA), by cooperative purchase via Georgia Statewide Contract #99999-SPD-ES40199373-002, as follows: one (1) unit at a total cost of \$36,958.00, and two (2) units at a cost of \$33,983.00 each, totaling \$67,966.00; with a grand total for all three vehicles at \$104,924.00. Councilor Woodson made a motion to approve the resolution, seconded by Councilor Garrett and carried unanimously by the ten members of Council.

1. FORD F-250 4x4 PICKUP FOR HOMELAND SECURITY

On November 10, 2022, the City Manager approved the emergency purchase of one (1) Ford F-250 4x4 Pickup for Homeland Security, due to exigent circumstances, per the Procurement Ordinance, Article 3-115, Emergency Procurement.

This vehicle was approved in the FY23 Budget for use by staff in the performance of their daily duties. The State Contract vendor, Allan Vigil Ford, notified the Public Works Director on November 9, 2022, that the Order Bank for these vehicles will open and close on November 14, 2022. Consequently, the vehicle had to be ordered as soon as possible.

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2. 2023 CHEVROLET TAHOE FOR MUSCOGEE COUNTY PRISON

On November 16, 2022, the City Manager approved the emergency purchase of one (1) 2023 Chevrolet Tahoe for Muscogee County Prison, due to exigent circumstances, per the Procurement Ordinance, Article 3-115, Emergency Procurement.

This vehicle was approved in the FY23 Budget for use by Warden Herbert Walker. The State Contract vendor, Hardy Chevrolet, notified the Public Works Director on November 1, 2022, that the Order Bank for these vehicles will open and close between November 16, 2022 and November 18, 2022, but that the specific vehicle is available on their lot. Therefore, due to the order bank closing a request to purchase the vehicle was made due to its immediate availability.

The vehicle will be purchased from Hardy Chevrolet at a unit price of \$38,201.00 by Cooperative Purchase via Georgia Statewide Contract #99999-SPD0000183-0002. This is a new vehicle.

Funding is available in the FY23 Budget: General Fund – MCP – Warden – Light Trucks; 0101-420-1000-MCCI-7722.

A. Restoring Locks & Dams on ACF – Phillip Clayton, Director of Economic Development & Executive Director, TriRivers Waterway Development Association

<u>Executive Director Phillip Clayton (TriRivers Waterway Development Association)</u> approached the rostrum to provide a presentation on a project to restore the locks and dams of the inland waterways to allow the transportation of freight. He requested Council to approve a resolution, asking the local delegation to encourage the Army Corps of Engineers to direct \$136 million of Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) funding to repair the system.

RESOLUTION ON TRANSPARENCY:

<u>Councilor R. Walker Garrett</u> stated during the meeting on November 8, 2022, he requested a resolution on transparency in government, where important items for Council's consideration would be provided a week prior to the meeting. He expressed his concerns regarding a resolution that came before Council as a last-minute add-on at the November 15, 2022 meeting, and stated several Councilors were not aware of what was going on at the time when the vote was called.

B. Cooper Creek Tennis Center Update - CORTA Board President Michelle Fuller and Judy Pearce

Council Meeting/Work Session Minutes November 29, 2022

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<u>CORTA Board President Michelle Fuller</u> approached the rostrum to provide a presentation on the history of the Columbus Regional Tennis Association, Inc. (CORTA), partnerships, leagues, and the community programs it has implemented over the years. She also provided information on the future enhancement projects for the Cooper Creek Tennis Center. She explained through another public/private partnership between CORTA and the Columbus Consolidated Government, the aging areas of the complex and the addition of enhancements can be achieved.

<u>Deputy City Manager Pam Hodge</u> approached the rostrum to explain there is funding available in the SPLOST to assist; since, one of the projects on the list does include improvements at Cooper Creek.

D. 2023 Legislative Agenda – Add Ons: Approval is requested of the add on resolutions for the 2023 Legislative Session of the Georgia General Assembly, which the Mayor and Council deem appropriate.

Item #1- Designation of Muscogee County as A Single County Judicial Circuit

Councilor Woodson made a motion to approve the resolution, seconded by Councilor Tucker and opened for discussion.

<u>District Attorney Stacey Jackson</u> approached the rostrum to speak in opposition to the designation of Muscogee County as a single county judicial circuit. He expressed concerns with losing State resources as a single county judicial circuit.

<u>City Manager Isaiah Hugley</u> stated he would have his staff verify the information provided by District Attorney Jackson and bring back to Council. He suggested Council delay this item to allow time for more information to be provided and Council will be able to make an informed decision.

Councilor Woodson withdrew her motion to approve.

Councilor Tucker made a motion to allow NAACP President Wane Hailes to speak on this item, seconded by Councilor Woodson, and carried by a six-to-four vote, with Councilors Barnes, Davis, Garrett, Huff, Tucker, and Woodson voting in favor, and Mayor Pro Tem Allen and Councilors Crabb, House and Thomas voting no.

<u>NAACP President Wane Hailes</u> approached the rostrum to speak in favor of the resolution. He then suggested public hearings be held to inform the public of the information provided by District Attorney Jackson and all other information to allow everyone an understanding of how this would impact Muscogee County.

Mayor Pro Tem Allen made a motion to amend the resolution to request the local legislative delegation to study Muscogee County as a one Judicial Circuit, seconded by Councilor Tucker and carried by an eight-to-two vote, with Mayor Pro Tem Allen and Councilors Barnes, Davis, Garrett, House, Huff, Tucker, and Woodson voting in favor, and Councilor Crabb and Thomas voting in opposition.

Councilor Tucker then made a motion to approve the resolution as amended, seconded by Councilor Woodson and defeated by a three-to-seven vote, with Councilors Barnes, Tucker, and Woodson voting in favor, and Mayor Pro Tem Allen and Councilors Crabb, Davis, Garrett, House, Huff, and Thomas voting in opposition.

Item #2- Casino Gaming Referendum

Page **4** of **10** Council Meeting/Work Session Minutes November 29, 2022 **Resolution** (382-22): A resolution requesting that the Local Legislative Delegation to the Georgia General Assembly introduce or support legislation to authorize a referendum to allow Georgia citizens to vote as to whether casino gaming should be allowed in Georgia for the purpose of Hope Scholarship funding and to provide for a local referendum in Muscogee County in the event that casino gaming is approved in the statewide referendum and a casino is proposed for Columbus. Councilor Garrett made a motion to approve the resolution, seconded by Councilor Tucker and carried by a seven-to-three vote, with Mayor Pro Tem Allen and Councilors Barnes, Garrett, Huff, Thomas, Tucker, and Woodson voting in favor, and Councilors Crabb, Davis and House voting no.

Item #3- Legitimation Procedures

Resolution (383-22): A resolution requesting that the Local Legislative Delegation to the Georgia General Assembly introduce or expressing support for making legitimation procedures more easily accessible to biological fathers. Councilor House made a motion to approve the resolution, seconded by Councilor Woodson and carried unanimously by the ten members of Council.

Item #4- Municipal Court Jurisdiction

Resolution (384-22): A resolution requesting that the Local Legislative Delegation amend an Act establishing the Municipal Court of Columbus, Georgia, approved August 12, 1915 (GA. L. 1915, P. 63), as amended, particularly by an Act approved March 29, 1983 (GA. L. 1983, P. 4443), so as to increase the civil jurisdiction amount of said court to \$50,000; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes. Councilor Garrett made a motion to approve the resolution, seconded by Councilor House and carried unanimously by the ten members of Council.

Item #5- Housing Affordability

<u>Councilor Toyia Tucker</u> requested that the resolution be amended to request enhancing the housing affordability study to include urban, rural and suburban areas.

Item #6- Mayor/Mayor Pro Tem Compensation

<u>City Manager Isaiah Hugley</u> explained that he requested this item since the Columbus Consolidated Government went through a new pay study. He stated those subordinates to the Mayor make significantly more and he believes it is appropriate to address this issue. He explained he is suggesting the Mayor be paid 70% of the City Manager's salary and the salary of the Mayor Pro Tem be set at 35% of the salary of the Mayor.

AN ORDINANCE

NO.

An Ordinance amending Chapter 3 of the Columbus Code pertaining to alcoholic beverages to insert a new code section creating entertainment district(s) in which open containers of alcoholic beverages are permitted in certain circumstances; and for other purposes.

THE COUNCIL OF COLUMBUS, GEORGIA HEREBY ORDAINS:

SECTION 1.

Chapter 3 of the Columbus Code is hereby amended by adding a new code section 3-15.1 which reads as follows:

"Outdoor consumption of alcoholic beverages permitted—Entertainment District. Notwithstanding the provisions of Columbus Code Section 14-5.1 of this Code, the consumption of alcoholic beverages on the streets, sidewalks, and certain other outdoor areas to which the public has access will be allowed in an entertainment district in accordance with the provisions set forth below:

- (1) For the purposes of this chapter only, an entertainment district is defined as follows: A specifically authorized and pedestrian oriented area of the city established by this Ordinance, as it may from time to time be amended, that allows those establishments with valid alcohol licenses within such area to dispense and/or serve an alcoholic beverage for "carry out" purposes provided all other laws, rules and ordinances as well as the requirements of this code section are followed.
- (2) Sales for carry out. Within the entertainment district, any establishment licensed to sell alcoholic beverages is authorized to dispense an alcoholic beverage for removal from the licensed premises, "carry out", so long as the beverage is in a shatter proof container that bears the commercially printed sticker or other method of identification required by the party designated as the responsible party for the entertainment district. No person shall remove more than one (1) such open container per person from the licensed premises at a time. This limitation shall not apply to sales of sealed containers by an establishment holding and off premises license.

- (3) Limited to one open container with maximum of 16 fluid ounces. Within the entertainment district, no container in which an alcoholic beverage is dispensed and removed from the licensed premises and opened shall exceed 16 fluid ounces in size. No person shall hold in possession on the streets and sidewalks, rights-of-way, parking lots or in other public places within an entertainment district any open alcoholic beverage container which exceeds this size limit, nor shall any person be in possession of more than one open container at any time.
- (4) Drinking from shatter proof container. It shall be unlawful within the entertainment district for any person to drink or attempt to drink any alcoholic beverage from a container that may shatter and/or create hazardous by breaking, or to possess or to possess such containers on the streets, sidewalks, rights-of-way, and/or parking lots, whether public or private. Patrons, guests or members of a licensee may not exit the licensed premises with open glass containers of alcoholic beverages. All alcoholic beverages sold for consumption outside the licensed premises shall be contained in shatter resistant containers
- (5) Purchase from licensed premises within the entertainment district only. Alcoholic beverages consumed pursuant to this code section must be purchased from a licensed alcoholic beverage establishment within the entertainment district. Patrons, guests or members of a licensee in the district may exit the licensed premises with open containers of alcoholic beverages and consume alcoholic beverages anywhere within the confines of the district, but may not enter the interior of any business or other establishment open to the public in the district except a licensed on-premise establishment that sold the customer that "carry out" beverage. No alcoholic beverages purchased or brought from outside of the entertainment district shall be allowed in open containers in the entertainment district.
- Consumption limited to certain areas in the entertainment district. No alcoholic beverage purchased pursuant to this code section and opened within the entertainment district may be consumed outside of the entertainment district, and no alcohol taken into the interior of any private business be establishment which is open to the public for business recreational purposes within the entertainment district except those "carry out beverages" which were purchased at the same licensed establishment. Nothing in this ordinance or resolution enacting a entertainment district shall be construed as to allow the possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages upon any sidewalk adjacent to a church or school or in city parks or

recreation buildings unless such areas are the subject of a special event permit approved by the Columbus Consolidated Government.

- (7) Lawful hours for open containers. Unless authorized by a special event permit approved by the Columbus Consolidated Government, no alcoholic beverage purchased within the entertainment district pursuant to this provision shall be consumed within the entertainment district on the streets, sidewalks, rights-of-way, and/or parking lots, whether public or private, prior to 11:00 a.m. or later than 11:00 p.m., Sunday through Saturday.
- (8) Consumption of Alcoholic Beverages in a Motor Vehicle Prohibited. Unless specifically permitted by Columbus Code Section 3-15, it shall be unlawful for any person to consume any alcoholic beverages while in the confines of a motor vehicle while the motor vehicle is located upon any public street, parking lot or other place to which the public has or is permitted to have access within an entertainment district.
- (9) Boundaries of Established Entertainment Districts:
- A) Highside Market Entertainment District- inside the boundaries of Parcel ID 004 004 001, 211 13th Street all as more particularly shown on the map attached below. Highside Cotton, LLC will be the responsible party for the distribution of commercial printed stickers or other means for identifying qualified open containers in this District.



SECTION 2.

All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

AN ORDINANCE

NO.

An Ordinance amending Chapter 3 of the Columbus Code pertaining to alcoholic beverages to define Tour Service Alcohol Permits; to provide conditions for their operation and establish exceptions to the code sections pertaining to open containers and brown bagging of alcoholic beverages, and for other purposes.

THE COUNCIL OF COLUMBUS, GEORGIA HEREBY ORDAINS:

SECTION 1.

Chapter 3 of the Columbus Code is hereby amended by adding a new code section 3-1(pp) which reads as follows:

"Section 3-1 **Definitions**

(pp) *Tour Service Vehicle* is a vehicle owned by a business licensed in Columbus, Georgia which is in the business of carrying passengers for hire or offering to carry passengers for hire through the streets in the Uptown Zoning District designated on the map below, when the primary purpose of such vehicle is not transportation but touring and sight-seeing, whether such vehicle is motorized or not.



The owner of any Tour Service Vehicle may apply for a Tour Service Alcohol Permit which will allow passengers to open and consume sealed alcoholic beverage containers of less that 16oz. in size while on the Tour Service Vehicle as long as the following conditions are met:

- 1) The owner of the Tour Service Vehicle must obtain a permit through the business license office of the Columbus Finance Department paying a regulatory fee of \$1,000 for each calendar year beginning January 1, 2023. The fee will cover all vehicles owned by the licensed business that are operated within the routes specified above.
- 2) At the time of obtaining the permit, the Owner will provide proof of liability insurance in an amount of at least \$500,000 per occurrence.
- 3) The operator of the Tour Service Vehicle will check the identification of all passengers boarding the Tour Service Vehicle with alcohol to ascertain that they are twenty-one years of age if the consumption of alcohol is to be permitted on the trip. When alcohol is to be permitted on a tour, the operator will display an indicator as specified by the Finance Department on the vehicle showing that the tour is one on which alcohol is permitted.
- 4) The operator of the Tour Service Vehicle will be responsible for ensuring that no passenger exits the Tour Service Vehicle with an open container of alcohol unless they are exiting into an area where open containers are permitted.
- 5) The operator of the Tour Service Vehicle will be responsible for ensuring that no passenger exits the vehicle in a drunk and disorderly manner.
- 6) In addition to any immediate action taken for violation for any other ordinance of the consolidated government, if it is established that there are more than five violations of the standards set forth above have occurred in a calendar year, then the Tour Service Alcohol Permit will not be available for renewal for the following calendar year."

SECTION 2.

Columbus Code Section 3-15 is hereby deleted in its entirety and replaced with a new Section 3-15 to read as follows:

"Sec. 3-15. Open containers of alcoholic beverages, consuming alcoholic beverages in motor vehicles.

It shall be unlawful for any person to consume alcoholic beverages or to have in his or her possession any open container or package of alcoholic beverages while aboard any motor vehicle operated or parked on any public street or public property or on any private property open to public access or vehicular traffic unless (i) such person is a passenger in a motor vehicle driven by a hired chauffeur or other driver which is licensed by the city to operate a motor vehicle for hire or is a passenger aboard a chartered carrier or a carrier wherein the possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages is allowed by law, (ii) a person is bringing a sealed container onto a Tour Service Vehicle as defined by Section 3-1 (pp)

when permitted by the driver of that vehicle, or (iii) such open container or package is in the trunk of the motor vehicle or kept in a locked glove compartment or in some other area of the vehicle not normally occupied by the driver or passengers; a container or package shall be deemed open when the original seal is broken, and any receptacle with an open top or with a straw shall be classified as an open container or package. Provided; however, nothing herein shall be construed to prevent the sale of mixed drinks by an on-premises licensee in an approved container for carryout in compliance with the requirements of O.C.G.A. § 3-3-11."

SECTION 3.

Columbus Code Section 3-16 is hereby deleted in its entirety and replaced with a new Section 3-16 to read as follows:

"Sec. 3-16. "Brown-bagging" prohibited.

- (a) No business shall permit persons, other than alcoholic beverage wholesalers or licensed caterers, to carry or bring alcoholic beverages onto its premises. This shall not include alcoholic beverages which are brought in sealed containers onto a Tour Service Vehicle as defined in Columbus Code Section 3-1 (pp)
- (b) Notwithstanding subsection (a), licensees holding a valid brown-bagging permit as of November 1, 2003 shall be entitled to renew such permit by April 1 of each year, but such permits shall not be transferable to any other licensee, person, or business."

SECTION 4.

All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE BUDGETS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 2022 BEGINNING JULY 1, 2021 AND ENDING JUNE 30, 2022, FOR CERTAIN FUNDS OF THE CONSOLIDATED GOVERNMENT OF COLUMBUS, GEORGIA, APPROPRIATING AMOUNTS SHOWN IN EACH FUND FOR VARIOUS ACTIVITIES; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

THE COUNCIL OF COLUMBUS, GEORGIA HEREBY ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1.

- 1. The General Fund expenditure budget in the amount of \$169,274,037 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2022, is hereby increased by \$0 to remain as \$169,274,037 and the revenue budget in amount of \$161,082,401 is hereby increased by \$17,683,000 to \$178,807,966 for the departments listed on the attached chart.
- 2. The Medical Center Fund expenditure and revenue budget in the amount of \$14,808,633 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2022, is hereby increased by \$1,116,367 to \$15,925,000 for the departments listed on the attached chart.

- 18. The Columbus Building Authority Lease Revenue Bonds, Series 2022B Fund expenditure and revenue budget in the amount of \$0 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2022, is hereby increased by \$5,552,648 to \$5,552,648 for the departments listed on the attached chart.

- 19. The General Obligation Sales Tax Bonds, Series 2022 Fund expenditure and revenue budget in the amount of \$0 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2022, is hereby increased by \$150,863,001 to \$150,863,001 for the departments listed on the attached chart.
- 20. Each budget increase provided herein is to be funded with fund balances and various revenue sources of the accounting fund for those funds that are being affected by stated actions.
- 21. Within the overall budget limitations, authority is hereby delegated to the City Manager, or the Finance Director when acting on the authority delegated by the City Manager, to effect such intra-fund transfers of appropriation and revenue anticipation as may be deemed necessary to the effective performance and delivery of services approved herein.
- 22. The minimum budget requirements set forth in O.C.G.A. Title 36, Chapter 81, are hereby adopted.

Staff is requesting a budget amendment to appropriate monies needed for various operational activities. As provided in the charter and state law, only Council has the authority to change spending levels. Adjustments are included in this Ordinance to reflect changes needed to complete organizational objectives. These adjustments are necessary to modify budgets to change the legal level of control at the department level as per O.C.G.A. Chapter 36. Staff is requesting adjustments for operational expenditures like administrative and operating costs for the following funds. In order to keep an accurate record of authorized spending levels and positions, this budget amendment is submitted for Council consideration.

<u>Analysis:</u> The recommended budget adjustments are outlined on the attached summary table immediately following the memorandum identifying the amount to be appropriated in each accounting fund. The appropriation will change the total approved budget of each fund as indicated in the accompanying chart.

<u>Financial Considerations:</u> None, other than as noted in the analysis.

<u>Legal Considerations:</u> Council approval is required to modify spending levels.

Background: The locks, spillways, and associated dams on the ACF are a \$6.2 billion infrastructure investment and give southwest Georgia a comparative economic advantage. Operational and Maintenance repairs on the ACF have been habitually underfunded for the past 25 years. Locks are in a failed state of repair and spillway systems are becoming a major concern. An estimated \$136 million is needed to make repairs on the system and bring it to a functional state. This comparative advantage is crucial in a region where the poverty rate is almost twice the national average.

<u>Financial Considerations:</u> The City is expected to benefit from the economic impact of commercial and recreational vessel navigation on the ACF between Columbus and the Gulf Intracoastal Waterway.





- Firefighters who contract cancer can receive a critical illness (lump sum) benefit in the amount of either \$25,000 or \$6,250, depending on the severity of the cancer. This benefit is payable at the time of the diagnosis.
- Firefighters diagnosed with cancer will also receive a disability benefit equal to 60% of their total salary as a paid firefighter, or \$5,000 a month, whichever is less.
- The disability benefit may last up to 36 months and is subject to a six-month waiting period from the time when it is determined that a firefighter can no longer perform the duties of his position.
- To be eligible for either benefit, the firefighter must have been employed with the department for a minimum of 12 consecutive months prior to the time of diagnosis.

Per Resolution No. 416-17 (December 5, 2017), Council authorized Apex Insurance, with Chubb Accident and Health as the carrier, to provide the legislatively required cancer insurance. The rates were guaranteed for a period of three (3) years; said period ended on December 31, 2020. 

- 3.) Dragonfly Trail







Honorary Naming of City Streets

Council Presentation December 6, 2022







Current Ordinance

• Allows the renaming of existing city streets or any segment thereof in honor or memory of any person living or deceased and shall not change the numbering of buildings or official street addresses.

Current Process

- Request received from Mayor, Council, City or outside organization to the Clerk of Council
- The application is sent to the responsive department to determine if there is a conflict of interest (Engineering, Parks and Rec, etc.)
- Clerk of Council places honorary naming request on her agenda for action by Council
- If Council approves reference Clerk of Council will forward to Honor Board for consideration



Current Process - Continued

- Honor Board meets and agrees upon a recommendation
- Recommendation from Honor Board and corresponding resolution, if applicable, is placed on the Clerk of Council's agenda along with meeting minutes for Council's action.

 Upon the approval of City Council for an honorary street designation, the Traffic Engineer is authorized to erect appropriate signage in a color distinguishable from standard street signage.

Proposed Criteria

- Honorary street names should reflect Columbus values and community interest
- •Honorary streets may be named for an individual, living, or dead, if the individual has provided creditable service to the community and has attained prominence locally based on contributions to the public
- •Honorary streets may be named to recognize a significant historical event or individual
- •Honorary street names do not have any impact on addressing and do not change the official street name.

Proposed Criteria - Continued

- •Only one honorary street name designation sign shall be allowed on a single street sign pole below the City's standard street sign
- •Length of honorary designation shall be for 5 years (can be renewed for two 5-year periods but must go back through the process).
- •Honorary street name designations will be temporarily displayed for a period of five years, unless otherwise approved by City Council (after completing a new renewal process). Upon request at any time, the honorary street name sign may be returned to the applicant or applicant's representative with City Council's concurrence.

In any event, at the end of the five-year period, the city will remove the honorary street name sign and [-Page 164-] it available to the applicant or applicant's representative.



Proposed Criteria - Continued

- •The Honoree must have resided in the City of Columbus/Muscogee County during his or her lifetime, during which time he or she shall have preferably resided adjacent to or was located on the City Street specified for dedication in the application.
- •Cumbersome, corrupted, or modified names, discriminatory or derogatory names, from the point of view of race, sex, color, creed, ethnicity, religious affiliation, political affiliation, or other social factors are not acceptable



Submissions

- If a community member or group suggests names, they will be required to undertake an outreach effort within the community to gather and document support for the name and for the specific corridor/street or location for the honorary street marker/sign
- Each honorary street designation request must be accompanied by a petition with at least 51% of property owners/persons along that street, to include names, addresses, and phone numbers.

Submissions

 A completed application should be submitted to the Clerk of Council outlining the contributions and service of the individual that is being recommended for an honorary designation



Implementation

- Once a name is approved by City Council, the City Manager or his/her designee shall work to implement the approved name to include appropriate signage, plaques, and/or dedication.
- All signage (fabrication and installation fees) to be paid by individuals or organizations submitting nomination. Cost based on material, fabrication and installation.
