14. Consideration of a Resolution to approve the service contract for building inspection and plan checking

City Manager Cain stated this would be a month-to-month contract until the city decides what to do with the Planning Department vacancy. He said the city was looking into a software program that would streamline building permits and code enforcement.

ACTION: Motion was made by Ponciano, seconded by Conrado to adopt **Resolution 22-33** approving the Consulting Services Agreement between the City and Wyatt Paxton Consulting for building and plan inspections. Motion passed by the following roll-call vote:

AYES: Hill, Ponciano, Conrado and Vaca.

15. Consideration of a Resolution in support of a partnership with the Colusa Arts Council to apply for the Levitt AMP Grant

Grant Writer Vanetta reported on the grant requirements and the partnership with the Arts Council. She explained to council the matching funds, which could be considered "in-kind". It does not have to come out of a "cash-match".

PUBLIC COMMENTS: City Treasurer Kelley recommended adding details of the "in-kind" match requirement.

ACTION: Motion was made by Conrado, seconded by Vaca to adopt **Resolution 22-34** to partner with the Colusa Arts Council to apply for the Levitt AMP Grant and to add in-kind funds. Motion passed by the following roll-call vote:

AYES: Hill, Ponciano, Conrado and Vaca.

NOES: None.

ABSENT: Reiche.

16. Consideration of Commission appointments and requirement to reside within the City Limits

City Manager Cain reported this item was requested by a few council members. The code was changed in 2012, mainly because of a Planning Commissioner who lived outside the city limits.

Public Comments: Citizen Joe Taucher expressed his thoughts about working within the city limits.

Devin Kelley commented people who live outside the city may have businesses in the city and shouldn't be excluded.

Editor, Pioneer Review Susan Meeker, commented on the City of Willow's requirements.

Planning Commissioner John Martin requested <u>all</u> commissioners should live within the two-mile radius.

Citizen Sean Amsden questioned the restriction when positions are hard to fill.

City Attorney explained the "Sphere of Influence" could potentially change.

ACTION: No motion was made.

17. Consideration of updating the City of Colusa Public Works standards

City Manager Cain explained the importance of updating the work standards based on today's technology. The last update was in 2007.

ACTION: Motion was made by Ponciano, seconded by Hill to adopt **Resolution 22-35** updating the City of Colusa Public works standards. Motion passed by the following roll-call vote:

AYES: Hill, Ponciano, Conrado and Vaca.

City Manager Cain explained the one percent (1%) sales tax increase with a four-year sunset and to form an advisory committee. He reported the potential city accomplishments with the increased revenue. He reiterated the citizens of Colusa who shop outside the city limits pay a higher tax rate. He discussed how other cities have special use taxes.

PUBLIC COMMENTS: Citizen Sean Amsden expressed his top priority would be street improvements.

Citizen Joe Taucher agreed with having an advisory committee.

Planning Commissioner Duncan provided comments on the sales tax increase.

Citizen John Rogers asked to reconsider a one-percent sales tax increase.for

City Attorney Jones clarified the language adopted in the Resolution and Ordinance would be "as stated" on the ballot.

ACTION: Motion was made by Conrado, seconded by Ponciano to adopt **Resolution 22-36** of the City Council of the City of Colusa submitting a Transactions and Use Tax Measure to the voters at November 8, 2022, General Municipal Election and taking certain related actions and make an amend "one cent" to "one percent" and list the street improvements first. Motion passed by the following roll-call vote:

AYES: Hill, Ponciano, Conrado and Vaca.

NOES: None.

ABSENT: Reiche.

ACTION: Motion by Conrado, seconded by Ponciano to introduce and waive First Reading of **Ordinance 552**- An Ordinance of the City of Colusa California amending Article VIII of Chapter 8 of the Municipal Code to impose a Transactions and Use Tax to be administered by the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration. Motion passed by the following roll-call vote:

AYES: Hill, Ponciano, Conrado and Vaca.

NOES: None.

ABSENT: Reiche.

City Manager Cain reported on the new online platform for city recreation sign-ups. He provided updates on upcoming city events. Council Members Ponciano, Conrado, Hill and Vaca each donated \$300 to have four more "Free Kids Swim Days".

Kristin Amsden shared why she was in favor of staff comments/reports.



Monthly Statistics



- There were 320 calls for service for patrol officers with 33 agency assists. This is a slight decrease from May which was 349. The call volume continues to be lower than 2021. In June 2021, there were 438 calls for service. This is approximately a 20% decline from the prior year.
- During June 2022, there were 14 in-custody arrests. There were 4 citations issued in lieu of subjects being booked in jail. A vast majority of those citations issued were trespassing related offenses and suspended driver's licenses. There were 4 domestic violence related arrest made in June. There were 2 DUI related arrest made. Two additional alcohol related arrests were made. There were 43 reports initiated with 40 being investigations.

- During the month of June, officers initiated 90 traffic enforcement stops. There were 31 citations issued. Several of the citations issued were for cell phone use while driving. There were no reportable traffic collisions.
- The Police Services Manager handled 75 calls for service during the month of June. These calls for service don't include telephone calls fielded by the Police Services Manager. Additionally, she continues to handle a significant number of CCW applications. DOJ clearances for CCW applicants continues to experience delays. Note: The Police Services Technician's calls for service are separate from patrol officers' calls for service.

Items of Interest

• The Colusa Police Department and Colusa County District Attorney's Office continue to investigate the murder of Giovanny Alcaraz. The integrity of Alcaraz's murder investigation is paramount. It is for this reason that specific details surrounding the events that led up to and the murder itself aren't made public. The Colusa Police Department will not engage nor comment on speculation put forth on social media. The United States Marshal Service is attempting to locate the suspect, Christian Suarez. Suarez is 5-09 in height, 120 pounds, with black hair and brown eyes. An arrest warrant has been issued for Suarez who is pictured below. If anyone has any information related to the location of Suarez and/or the murder of Giovanny Alcaraz, please contact the Colusa Police Department.



- The 2022 Colusa County Fair Parade and Fair was successful with no related incidents. The California Highway Patrol Williams office coordinated law enforcement staffing for the fair. The call volume the weekend on the Colusa County Fair remained the same.
- Currently, the Colusa Police Department has two applicants in the background investigation stage of the hiring process. We will continue accepting applications until both open positions are filled.
- On June 10th, the Colusa Police Department held a department meeting. During that meeting, three commendations were awarded. The officers recognized were as follows:
 - -Officer Hogan was recognized for his assistance with a special needs member of the community. He spent time with this special young man and assisted him during a difficult transition. Officer Hogan was patient and compassionate. His actions were

complimented by several various individuals who saw Officer Hogan interacting with the young man. Not only did Officer Hogan represent the Colusa Police Department well, he exemplified a level of humanity that sadly is becoming less frequent in society at large.

-Officer Lee was recognized for his assistance with a pursuit. Officer Lee deployed spike strips which disabled the suspect vehicle. He assisted the pursing agency with taking the suspect into custody without further incident. During the pursuit, Officer Lee took the opportunity to train a junior officer how to coordinate with the pursuing agency and safely deploy a spike strip. Officer Lee a valuable training officer with the Colusa Police Department and continues to mentor other officers after their field training program has concluded. He is an excellent role model.

-Officer Ram was recognized for his interactions with an individual who was 'conducting a first amendment audit'. The individual contacted Colusa County and City of Colusa employees in various facilities. While these contacts are conducted under the guise of being an audit, the 'auditor' will engage various government employees with the intention of being antagonistic to seek an adverse reaction. Officer Ram remained calm and professional. A video was posted on YouTube by the 'auditor'. Both the Chief and Lieutenant received several compliments and other positive feedback from members of the community, other law enforcement officers, and viewers of the YouTube footage from out of the area.

<u>Subject:</u> Approve a resolution of the City Council of Colusa amending the contract for City Project Number 2020-001 the 2020 WASTEWATER IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT to include the text of the Davis Bacon Wage rates.

Recommendation: Approve a Resolution of the City Council of Colusa amending the contract for City Project Number 2020-001 for construction of the 2020 WASTEWATER IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT to include the text of the Davis Bacon wage rates for Colusa County.

BACKGROUND ANALYSIS: The City's long-term goal is to have a wastewater system that produces high quality recycled water that is stored in the winter and then used to irrigate City owned cropland. Once online, the recycled water system will eliminate the City's discharge permit to the Powell Slough and minimize groundwater pumping. The City also has a goal to upgrade and retire two older sewer pump stations and construct new sewers that accommodate planned growth. For the last six years, the City has been maximizing its low interest loans and grant opportunities with the California State Revolving Fund (SRF) to make progress toward these goals.

In 2016, the City received \$10.7 million in loans and grants from the California State Revolving Fund (SRF) which various funded improvements at the WWTP to produce recycled water. Those improvements were completed in 2019. In June of 2020 the City received an additional \$6.1 million in low interest loans and grants from SRF (SRF Loan C06-7896-310). This loan and grant funds the city's purchase of 500 acres of farmland next to the plant and this 2020 Wastewater Improvements Project. Later this year the City will complete various irrigation improvements so that next summer the system will be online and delivering recycled water to its nearby cropland.

In June of 2020, the City of Colusa went out to bid for the 2020 Wastewater Improvements Project. This Project provides several upgrades to the City's WWTP including a new sludge drying pad, a new debris receiving station, a new security gate, a new irrigation system for use of recycled water around the plant, a new influent sewer connection, and enhancements to the seasonal recycled water storage pond.

During review by the SRF staff, they noted that the contract did not include the full text of the Davis Bacon Wage Rates for Colusa County. The Davis Bacon Wage Rates were mentioned by reference in the contract but the SRF staff wants the actual rates included in the contract by amendment. This should have been done during the initial approval process but was overlooked.

BUDGET IMPACT: This project and the SRF loan and grant were all included in the City's June 2018 Sewer Rate Study and adoption. This does not change the terms of contract amount or increase costs.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Approve a Resolution of the City Council of Colusa amending the contract for City Project Number 2020-001 for construction of the 2020 WASTEWATER IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT to include the text of the Davis Bacon wage rates for Colusa County..

Recommendation: Approve a Resolution of the City Council of Colusa accepting the City Project Number 2020-001 2020 WASTEWATER IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT AND authorization of the City Manager to make final payment and release the 5% retention to R & R Horn, Inc. will change the contract amount to \$1,907,518.48 from \$1,904,702.94.

BACKGROUND ANALYSIS: The City's long-term goal is to have a wastewater system that produces high quality recycled water that is stored in the winter and then used to irrigate City owned cropland. Once online, the recycled water system will eliminate the City's discharge permit to the Powell Slough and minimize groundwater pumping. The City also has a goal to upgrade and retire two older sewer pump stations and construct new sewers that accommodate planned growth. For the last six years, the City has been maximizing its low interest loans and grant opportunities with the California State Revolving Fund (SRF) to make progress toward these goals.

In 2016, the City received \$10.7 million in loans and grants from the California State Revolving Fund (SRF) which various funded improvements at the WWTP to produce recycled water. Those improvements were completed in 2019. In June of 2020 the City received an additional \$6.1 million in low interest loans and grants from SRF (SRF Loan C06-7896-310). This loan and grant funds the city's purchase of 500 acres of farmland next to the plant and this 2020 Wastewater Improvements Project. Later this year the City will complete various irrigation improvements so that next summer the system will be online and delivering recycled water to its nearby cropland.

In June of 2020, the City of Colusa went out to bid for the 2020 Wastewater Improvements Project. This Project provides several upgrades to the City's WWTP including a new sludge drying pad, a new debris receiving station, a new security gate, a new irrigation system for use of recycled water around the plant, a new influent sewer connection, and enhancements to the seasonal recycled water storage pond.

During Construction the following unforeseen problems have caused the contractor to perform additional work to meet the goals of the contract. An additional 849.19 tons of rock over the approved 6,000 tons was needed to complete the slope protection and 100 feet of fencing was needed to complete the work. The extra rock was substituted for road base in the contract. The rock has been authorized and paid for but, the 100 feet of fencing slipped through the Change Order process for an additional cost of \$2,815.54. The price for the additional work at the contract price is a good use of Wastewater Enterprise funds.

BUDGET IMPACT: This project and the SRF loan and grant were all included in the City's June 2018 Sewer Rate Study and adoption.

In addition to the SRF loan and grant, the City would utilize about \$600,000 from City Sewer Reserves that have been set aside for this Project.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Approve a Resolution A resolution of the City Council of Colusa Accepting the City Project Number 2020-001 for construction of the 2020 Wastewater Improvements Project and authorization of the City Manager to make final payment and release the 5% retention to R & R Horn, Inc. will change the contract amount to \$1,907,518.48.

Project Completion Report

1.1 PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The project constructs various upgrades at the City of Colusa Wastewater Treatment Plant including: installation of rock slope protection on recycled water seasonal storage basin; replacement of rock slope protection in the emergency storage basin and operational recycled water storage basin; installation of a new manhole and stub out for future sewer mainline; construction of a new Vac-con dump area; installation of recycled water irrigation booster pump stations and irrigation system; automatic chain-link entrance gate, planting irrigated grass and other vegetation as shown on the plans; and other miscellaneous improvements at the Colusa WWTP as shown in Figure 1-1.

1.1.1 Vaccon Drying Bed and Future Sewer Connection Stubout

The Vaccon drying bed was constructed to allow the Vaccon Trucks to be able to discharge contaminated soil and other material onto a concrete surface so liquids can drain into the headworks. Spoils would then dry and be either placed into a dumpster or hauled out in a dump truck. The new manhole and stubout was connected to the existing 18 inch mainline leading into the headworks. A 24 inch mainline was routed outside the plant to the location of a planned mainline. This allows future construction without disturbing the new gate and paving. Figure 1-2 shows the constructed Vaccon Dump Station and drying bed.

The old entrance gate was not secure enough for the WWTP and needed to be replaced. A new section of fencing was installed to transition the new gat to the old fencing. This improves the security of the WWTP. New paving was placed and a stub out for future mainline connection was also installed. The new gate and fencing replaces a manually operated gate and replaces about 100 feet of fencing that was buried by ongoing weed control and disking. This is shown in Figure 1-3

1.1.2 WWTP Entrance Landscaping and Grass Planting

The City of Colusa's largest investment is the WWTP. The entrance was a maintenance issue with weed control and eroding surfaces. It was decided to improve the visual impact of the entrance to show the public the importance of this facility. The grass will reduce weed control needs and be more easily maintained by periodic mowing. The original intent was to connect the front landscaping to the recycled pipeline directly. This did not prove feasible at this time. In the future, the entire plant water system will be connecting to the recycled water system at the MCC #1 building. The connection will be from the new recycled pumping system located near the recycled water operational storage basin. The front irrigation system is now connected to the "2 Water System." The front irrigation system irrigation pump and control system is shown in Figure 1-4.

1.1.3 Biosolids Drying Area and Stock Piling Surface For Seasonal Disposal

The 2007 Project created a pile of excess soil excavated from the old pond bottoms during construction of the advanced treatment facilities. It had been described as bio solids, but after testing the material, it was shown to be soil with less than 4% organic matter. This material had been in place for 18 years. The WWTP needs an area to stockpile solar dried biosolids before placing the material on adjacent city owned farmland. The General Permit allows a disposal rate of 10 tons per acre of class a Biosolids. The certification of Class A can take as long as 8 weeks. In order to bring the SSB back into service the solar dried material will be stockpiled in this are while being tested and the cropland harvested. The biosolids storage

area is shown in Figure 1 - 5.



1.1.4 Slope protection in Ponds and Erosion Control

The new recycled water storage ponds, monthly storage, and new emergency storage ponds needed slope protection to reduce slope erosion and stabilize the slopes. About 7,200 feet of slope protection was places on the side slopes of the ponds. Figure 1-6 shows the slope protection

2.1 ADDRESSING WATER QUALITY

The Stormwater protection was accomplished by not allowing storm runoff to leave the facility.

3.1 AMERICAN IRON AND STEEL - COUNTY OF ORIGIN

All rebar and fittings were certified as meeting the American Iron and Steel Requirements in the contract.

3.2 PROJECT LIKELIHOOD OF SUCCESS

With the addition of slope protection, the recycled storage ponds and secondary treatment ponds the reliability of the system and risk of turbidity problems in the WWTP treatment process and recycled water delivery is significantly reduced. Work remaining includes installing recycled water delivery pump stations, power, and delivery pipelines. This work is in the design stage at this time. This will allow the City of Colusa to be able to provide the capacity for the City's growth within the next 30 years, reduce the overall energy consumption of the WWTP, reduce local groundwater demand, and reduce demand on the City water system.

4.1 COMPLIANCE WITH ENVIRONMENTAL CONDITIONS

The City of Colusa's 2020 WWTP Wastewater Improvement Project claims a mitigated negative declaration with the following environmental factors being potentially affected: Biological Resources and Cultural Resources. For Biological Resources, The proposed project does not have and direct or indirect impacts to any federal or state special-status species. The project will not have a significant effect on GGS because several standard mitigation measures will be implemented to avoid any potential impacts during construction of the WWTP improvements. The new reclamation pipeline will be located within existing farm service roads. No formal consultation with USFWS is needed for this project as numerous preapproved measures in the Section 7 USACE/USFWS Programmatic Agreement with precautions will be in place by the City to avoid potential take of GGS during construction. To address compliance with cultural resources, mitigation measure CUL-1 will be conducted. CUL-1 ensures that impacts on potential cultural material are less than significant. No cultural resources or artifacts are known with the project APE. Standard mitigation measures of stopping work if resources are observed during construction and retaining qualified cultural resources professional to document findings will be done by the City. During construction no cultural resources were discovered by the monitor or construction workers.

Recommendation: Council to approve resolution 22-___ for the city to provide Valley Vision with a letter of support to apply for the CERF planning grant.

BACKGROUND ANALYSIS: The Community Resilience Fund (CERF) is a program being created in the state of California by the Governor's Office of Planning and Research, Go-Biz, and the Labor & Workforce Development Agency.

The CERF was created to promote a sustainable and equitable recovery from the economic distress of COVID-19 by supporting new plans and strategies to diversify local economies and develop sustainable industries that create high-quality, broadly accessible jobs for all Californians.

Specifically, CERF would support communities and regional groups in producing regional roadmaps for economic recovery and transition that prioritize the creation of accessible, high-quality jobs in sustainable industries.

The CERF Leadership team, mentioned in the first paragraph, is tasked with creating program guidelines, evaluation metrics, conducting oversight, and decision making related to the creation and management of the program and competitive grant structures. They are also tasked with the development of geographic boundaries that can administer the program's funding and work.

Colusa County has been placed in the "Sacramento Region," which for the purposes of CERF include Colusa, El Dorado, Nevada, Place, Sacramento, Sutter, Yolo, and Yuba Counties. This is an unusual pairing for Colusa as most of the other counties in this region have much higher population centers as well as diversified industries. Because of the make-up of this region, it is of the utmost importance that Colusa County and the City of Colusa participate in all phases of this program.

Currently the state has opened the processes to the application of planning grants. The applications are for \$5 million dollars per region on a competitive basis. The grant is set up so that a non-profit will apply for the grant funds and then coordinate the planning process with the many regional players.

Valley Vision is the non-profit spearheading the application of the planning grant for the "Sacramento Region." They are pursuing the role of Regional Convener and Fiscal Agent for CERF efforts. Valley vision in a triple-bottom line civic-leadership non-profit.

The deadline for the \$5 million planning grant is July 25, 2022. As part of the pre-planning process the City of Colusa has attended and will attend several meetings to make sure the City has representation in the process.

BUDGET IMPACT: No Impact

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: It is the recommendation of the Grant Writer and the City Manager that Council approves a resolution to support Valley Vision's application for CERF planning grant funds.

ORDINANCE NO. 552

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF COLUSA, CALIFORNIA AMENDING ARTICLE VIII OF CHAPTER 8 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE TO IMPOSE A TRANSACTIONS AND USE TAX TO BE ADMINISTERED BY THE CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF TAX AND FEE ADMINISTRATION

The People and the City Council of the City of Colusa, California, do ordain as follows:

Section 1. CODE AMENDMENT. Article VIII of Chapter 8 of the Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 8-51. Title:

This article shall be known as the City of Colusa Transactions and Use Tax Ordinance. The City of Colusa hereinafter shall be called "City." This ordinance shall be applicable in the incorporated territory of the City.

Section 8-52. Operative Date:

"Operative Date" means the first day of the first calendar quarter commencing more than 110 days after the adoption of this ordinance, the date of such adoption being as set forth below.

Section 8.53. Purpose

This article is adopted to achieve the following, among other purposes, and directs that the provisions hereof be interpreted in order to accomplish those purposes:

- A. To impose a retail transactions and use tax in accordance with the provisions of Part 1.6 (commencing with Section 7251) of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code and Section 7285.9 of Part 1.7 of Division 2 which authorizes the City to adopt this tax ordinance which shall be operative if a majority of the electors voting on the measure vote to approve the imposition of the tax at an election called for that purpose.
- B. To adopt a retail transactions and use tax ordinance that incorporates provisions identical to those of the Sales and Use Tax Law of the State of California insofar as those provisions are not inconsistent with the requirements and limitations contained in Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.
- C. To adopt a retail transactions and use tax ordinance that imposes a tax and provides a measure therefore that can be administered and collected by the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration in a manner that adapts itself as fully as practicable to, and requires the least possible deviation from, the existing statutory and administrative procedures followed by the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration in administering and collecting the California State Sales and Use Taxes.
- D. To adopt a retail transactions and use tax ordinance that can be administered in a manner that will be, to the greatest degree possible, consistent with the provisions of Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, minimize the cost of collecting the

transactions and use taxes, and at the same time, minimize the burden of record keeping upon persons subject to taxation under the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 8.54. Contract With State:

Prior to the operative date, the City shall contract with the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration to perform all functions incident to the administration and operation of this transactions and use tax ordinance; provided, that if the City shall not have contracted with the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration prior to the operative date, it shall nevertheless so contract and in such a case the operative date shall be the first day of the first calendar quarter following the execution of such a contract.

Section 8.55. Transactions Tax Rate:

For the privilege of selling tangible personal property at retail, a tax is hereby imposed upon all retailers in the incorporated territory of the City at the rate of 1.0%_of the gross receipts of any retailer from the sale of all tangible personal property sold at retail in said territory on and after the operative date of this ordinance.

Section 8.56. Place of Sale:

For the purposes of this ordinance, all retail sales are consummated at the place of business of the retailer unless the tangible personal property sold is delivered by the retailer or his agent to an out-of-state destination or to a common carrier for delivery to an out-of-state destination. The gross receipts from such sales shall include delivery charges, when such charges are subject to the state sales and use tax, regardless of the place to which delivery is made. In the event a retailer has no permanent place of business in the State or has more than one place of business, the place or places at which the retail sales are consummated shall be determined under rules and regulations to be prescribed and adopted by the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration.

Section 8.57. Use Tax Rate:

An excise tax is hereby imposed on the storage, use or other consumption in the City of tangible personal property purchased from any retailer on and after the operative date of this ordinance for storage, use or other consumption in said territory at the rate of 1.0% of the sales price of the property. The sales price shall include delivery charges when such charges are subject to state sales or use tax regardless of the place to which delivery is made.

Section 8.58. Adoption of Provisions of State Law.

Except as otherwise provided in this ordinance and except insofar as they are inconsistent with the provisions of Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, all of the provisions of Part 1 (commencing with Section 6001) of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code are hereby adopted and made a part of this ordinance as though fully set forth herein.

Section 8.59. Limitations on Adoption of State Law and Collection of Use Taxes"

In adopting the provisions of Part 1 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code:

- A. Wherever the State of California is named or referred to as the taxing agency, the name of this City shall be substituted therefor. However, the substitution shall not be made when:
- 1. The word "State" is used as a part of the title of the State Controller, State Treasurer, State Treasury, or the Constitution of the State of California.
- 2. The result of that substitution would require action to be taken by or against this City or any agency, officer, or employee thereof rather than by or against the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration, in performing the functions incident to the administration or operation of this Ordinance.
- 3. In those sections, including, but not necessarily limited to sections referring to the exterior boundaries of the State of California, where the result of the substitution would be to:
- a. Provide an exemption from this tax with respect to certain sales, storage, use or other consumption of tangible personal property which would not otherwise be exempt from this tax while such sales, storage, use or other consumption remain subject to tax by the State under the provisions of Part 1 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, or;
- b. Impose this tax with respect to certain sales, storage, use or other consumption of tangible personal property which would not be subject to tax by the state under the said provision of that code.
- 4. In Sections 6701, 6702 (except in the last sentence thereof), 6711, 6715, 6737, 6797 or 6828 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.
- B. The word "City" shall be substituted for the word "State" in the phrase "retailer engaged in business in this State" in Section 6203 and in the definition of that phrase in Section 6203.
- 1. "A retailer engaged in business in the District" shall also include any retailer that, in the preceding calendar year or the current calendar year, has total combined sales of tangible personal property in this state or for delivery in the State by the retailer and all persons related to the retailer that exceeds five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000). For purposes of this section, a person is related to another person if both persons are related to each other pursuant to Section 267(b) of Title 26 of the United States Code and the regulations thereunder.

Section 8.60. Permit Not Required:

If a seller's permit has been issued to a retailer under Section 6067 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, an additional transactor's permit shall not be required by this ordinance.

Section 8.61. Exemptions and Exclusions:

A. There shall be excluded from the measure of the transactions tax and the use tax the amount of any sales tax or use tax imposed by the State of California or by any city,

city and county, or county pursuant to the Bradley-Burns Uniform Local Sales and Use Tax Law or the amount of any state-administered transactions or use tax.

- B. There are exempted from the computation of the amount of transactions tax the gross receipts from:
- 1. Sales of tangible personal property, other than fuel or petroleum products, to operators of aircraft to be used or consumed principally outside the county in which the sale is made and directly and exclusively in the use of such aircraft as common carriers of persons or property under the authority of the laws of this State, the United States, or any foreign government.
- 2. Sales of property to be used outside the City which is shipped to a point outside the City, pursuant to the contract of sale, by delivery to such point by the retailer or his agent, or by delivery by the retailer to a carrier for shipment to a consignee at such point. For the purposes of this paragraph, delivery to a point outside the City shall be satisfied:
- a. With respect to vehicles (other than commercial vehicles) subject to registration pursuant to Chapter 1 (commencing with Section 4000) of Division 3 of the Vehicle Code, aircraft licensed in compliance with Section 21411 of the Public Utilities Code, and undocumented vessels registered under Division 3.5 (commencing with Section 9840) of the Vehicle Code by registration to an out-of-City address and by a declaration under penalty of perjury, signed by the buyer, stating that such address is, in fact, his or her principal place of residence; and
- b. With respect to commercial vehicles, by registration to a place of business out-of-City and declaration under penalty of perjury, signed by the buyer, that the vehicle will be operated from that address.
- 3. The sale of tangible personal property if the seller is obligated to furnish the property for a fixed price pursuant to a contract entered into prior to the operative date of this ordinance.
- 4. A lease of tangible personal property which is a continuing sale of such property, for any period of time for which the lessor is obligated to lease the property for an amount fixed by the lease prior to the operative date of this ordinance.
- 5. For the purposes of subparagraphs (3) and (4) of this section, the sale or lease of tangible personal property shall be deemed not to be obligated pursuant to a contract or lease for any period of time for which any party to the contract or lease has the unconditional right to terminate the contract or lease upon notice, whether or not such right is exercised.
- C. There are exempted from the use tax imposed by this ordinance, the storage, use or other consumption in this City of tangible personal property:
- 1. The gross receipts from the sale of which have been subject to a transactions tax under any state-administered transactions and use tax ordinance.
- 2. Other than fuel or petroleum products purchased by operators of aircraft and used or consumed by such operators directly and exclusively in the use of such aircraft as common carriers of persons or property for hire or compensation under a certificate of public

convenience and necessity issued pursuant to the laws of this State, the United States, or any foreign government. This exemption is in addition to the exemptions provided in Sections 6366 and 6366.1 of the Revenue and Taxation Code of the State of California.

- 3. If the purchaser is obligated to purchase the property for a fixed price pursuant to a contract entered into prior to the operative date of this ordinance.
- 4. If the possession of, or the exercise of any right or power over, the tangible personal property arises under a lease which is a continuing purchase of such property for any period of time for which the lessee is obligated to lease the property for an amount fixed by a lease prior to the operative date of this ordinance.
- 5. For the purposes of subparagraphs (3) and (4) of this section, storage, use, or other consumption, or possession of, or exercise of any right or power over, tangible personal property shall be deemed not to be obligated pursuant to a contract or lease for any period of time for which any party to the contract or lease has the unconditional right to terminate the contract or lease upon notice, whether or not such right is exercised.
- 6. Except as provided in subparagraph (7), a retailer engaged in business in the City shall not be required to collect use tax from the purchaser of tangible personal property, unless the retailer ships or delivers the property into the City or participates within the City in making the sale of the property, including, but not limited to, soliciting or receiving the order, either directly or indirectly, at a place of business of the retailer in the City or through any representative, agent, canvasser, solicitor, subsidiary, or person in the City under the authority of the retailer.
- 7. "A retailer engaged in business in the City" shall also include any retailer of any of the following: vehicles subject to registration pursuant to Chapter 1 (commencing with Section 4000) of Division 3 of the Vehicle Code, aircraft licensed in compliance with Section 21411 of the Public Utilities Code, or undocumented vessels registered under Division 3.5 (commencing with Section 9840) of the Vehicle Code. That retailer shall be required to collect use tax from any purchaser who registers or licenses the vehicle, vessel, or aircraft at an address in the City.
- D. Any person subject to use tax under this ordinance may credit against that tax any transactions tax or reimbursement for transactions tax paid to a district imposing, or retailer liable for a transactions tax pursuant to Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code with respect to the sale to the person of the property the storage, use or other consumption of which is subject to the use tax.

Section 8-62. Amendments:

All amendments subsequent to the effective date of this ordinance to Part 1 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code relating to sales and use taxes and which are not inconsistent with Part 1.6 and Part 1.7 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, and all amendments to Part 1.6 and Part 1.7 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, shall automatically become a part of this ordinance, provided however, that no such amendment shall operate so as to affect the rate of tax imposed by this ordinance.

Section 8-63. Enjoining Collection Forbidden:

No injunction or writ of mandate or other legal or equitable process shall issue in any suit, action or proceeding in any court against the State or the City, or against any officer of the State or the City, to prevent or enjoin the collection under this ordinance, or Part 1.6 of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, of any tax or any amount of tax required to be collected.

Section 8-64. Termination Date:

The authority to levy the tax imposed by this article shall expire at the end of April 30, 2027.

Section 8-65. Use of Proceeds:

The proceeds from the tax imposed by this article shall be deposited in the general fund of the City and available for any lawful municipal purpose.

Section 8-66. Fiscal Accountability:

All revenues generated by the tax imposed pursuant to this article shall be annually audited by an independent accounting firm and included in an annual financial report to the City Council, which may be a part of the City's Consolidated Annual Financial Report.

Section 8-67. Citizen's Oversight Committee

There is hereby created a Citizen's Oversight Committee, which shall have no less than five members. All members of the Committee shall be residents of the City, and shall serve a four year term. The Committee shall review the annual report required by Section 8-66 of this article and may make such recommendations to the City Council as it deems necessary or useful. The Committee may, by a majority vote of its membership, choose to publish a report, in which event such report, if approved by a majority of the members, shall be published on the City's internet page. Members of the Committee shall be appointed by the City Council, and any member may be removed from the Committee prior to the end of his or her term by a two-thirds vote of the Council. In the event the City Council, the Citizen's Oversight Committee, the City, any employee of the City, or any member of the City Council or the Citizen's Oversight Committee fails to take an action required by this Section, any court of competent jurisdiction may order that the action be taken. However, such failure to act shall not invalidate the City's authority to levy any tax or in any way affect the ongoing collection of any tax pursuant to this Ordinance. All meetings of the Committee shall comply with the provisions of the Ralph M. Brown Act (Gov't Code Section 54950, et seq.).

Section 2. SEVERABILITY. If any provision of this ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance and the application of such provision to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

Section 3. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance relates to the levying and collecting of the City transactions and use taxes and shall take effect immediately. However, no tax imposed by this ordinance shall be effective unless that tax has been approved by a majority of the voters of the City as required by Section 2(b) of Article XIII C of the California Constitution and applicable law.

<u>Subject:</u> Consideration of Resolution approving to Authorize placement of solid waste liens from Recology to be placed on the 2021-23 County Property Tax Roll.

Recommendation:

Council to adopt the resolution authorizing delinquent solid waste liens on "Exhibit A" to be placed on the 2022-23 City Property Tax Roll with the County.

BACKGROUND ANALYSIS:

The City's Recology Franchise Agreement and City Ordinance No. 535 require a mandatory solid waste service within the City limits. The agreement authorizes Recology, on an annual basis, to collect outstanding solid waste accounts by placing the delinquent accounts and administration fees on the property owners' tax bill for collection.

Recology is required to send at least two delinquent notices to the customer and property owner prior to proceeding with a public hearing. Both notices were sent to the customer and property owner on record on 4/27/2022 and 7/12/2022. It should be noted, that the addresses used to mail both notices came from the latest Assessor Tax Roll (2020) which may not reflect recent sales or transfers of property. The second notice includes not only the delinquent solid waste account amount but also includes the associated administration fees. "Exhibit A" includes all delinquencies and administration fees.

The City's administration fee is \$45 for each lien placed on the property owner's tax bill.

BUDGET IMPACT:

City Administration Fee Revenue is estimated to be \$5,310 to the General Fund.

The Walnut Ranch Landscape and Lighting District was created in November 2016 for the purpose of providing maintenance, operation and improvement of the streets, utilities, drainage, sidewalks, curbs, gutters, landscaping, and street lighting with the Walnut Ranch development. As outlined on page 7 of the engineer's report, the FY 2022-23 Single Family Equivalent Unit assessment is \$400.

BUDGET IMPACT:

The Walnut Ranch Assessment District will continue to utilize the assessment fund balance until funds are no longer available. Walnut Ranch anticipated fund balance ending 6/30/2022 will be \$0. Please note that the final accounting may modify these final figures.

WHEREAS, the City Council (the "Council") of the City of Colusa (the "City"), County of Colusa, State of California, previously adopted a Resolution to initiate proceedings pursuant to the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972, California Streets and Highways Code Section 22500 et. seq. (the "Act"), to levy and collect assessments for Fiscal Year 2022/2023 for the Walnut Ranch Landscape and Lighting District; and

WHEREAS, the City Engineer has prepared and filed with the City Clerk a report for Fiscal Year 2022/2023 (the "Engineer's Report") in accordance with the Act; and

WHEREAS, the approval of the assessments proposed by this Resolution will be for the purpose of meeting operating expenses and purchasing supplies, equipment or materials necessary to maintain service with the existing service areas.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Colusa as follows:

- 1. <u>Recitals</u>. The above recitals are true and correct and are incorporated herein by reference.
- 2. <u>Description of Improvements</u>. The purpose of the District is generally described as the installation, maintenance and servicing of public facilities, including but not limited to, landscaping, water, sewer, storm drainage, lighting police and fire services, street sweeping, park facilities, landscape corridors, publicly owned trees, street frontages, and turf areas, as applicable, for any property owned or maintained by the City of Colusa (the "Improvements").
- 3. <u>Location of District</u>. The Walnut Ranch Landscape and Lighting District ("District") consists of the lots and parcels shown on the boundary maps of the Assessment District on file with the City, and reference is hereby made to such map for further particulars.
- 4. <u>Declaration of Intention</u>. It is the intention of this Council to levy and collect the continued assessments within the Assessment District for fiscal year 2022-23.
- 5. <u>Approval of Engineer's Report</u>. California Engineering Company Inc., the Engineer of Work, has prepared the Engineer's Reports (the "Report") in accordance with Section 22565, *et seq.*, of the California Streets and Highways Code. The Report has been made, filed with the City Clerk and duly considered by the Council and are hereby deemed sufficient and preliminarily approved. The Report shall stand as the Engineer's Reports for all subsequent proceedings under and pursuant to the foregoing resolution.
- 6. <u>Reference to Engineer's Reports for Particulars</u>. Reference is hereby made to the Report for a full and detailed description of the Improvements, the boundaries of the Assessment District and the proposed assessments upon assessable lots and parcels of land within the Assessment District.
- 7. <u>Amount of Assessment</u>. The Walnut Ranch Landscape and Lighting District assessments for fiscal year 2022-23 are not proposed to increase. The assessment rate for fiscal

year 2022-23 is \$275.13 per single family equivalent benefit unit.

- 8. <u>Notice of Public Hearing</u>. The public hearing shall be held before this Council in the City Council chambers of the City of Colusa, located at 425 Webster Street, Colusa, CA 95932, on <u>July 19th, 2022 at the hour of 6:00 o'clock p.m.</u> for the purpose of allowing public testimony regarding the proposed continuation of assessments and for the City's final action upon the Engineer's Reports and assessments therein.
- 9. <u>Publication of Resolution</u>. The City Clerk shall cause a notice of the hearing to be given by publishing a copy of this Resolution once, at least ten (10) days prior to the date of the hearing above specified, in a newspaper circulated in the City of Colusa.
 - 10. <u>Effective Date</u>. This Resolution shall be effective immediately.

Statement of interest

This is to express my interest in being appointed to serve the Colusa Planning Commission. I have a longtime interest in local planning matters and their importance in supporting the quality of life of communities. This interest is partially demonstrated by my previous service as a Colusa Planning Commissioner from August 2002 to early 2007.

I have a strong personal interest in preserving and enhancing quality of life for me, my family and my neighbors in Colusa and believe we all have a duty to serve our community. As I noted in my original application to serve the Commission in 2002, when evaluating the opportunities each of us have for service to our community, I believe we should carefully weigh our individual interests, temperaments and experience. For example, someone who is experienced at construction contracting might be suited to volunteer time and/or expertise toward improving public recreational facilities. Along these lines, I believe my combination of professional experience, interest and temperament are especially well suited for the Planning Commission. I cite some of this experience below.

Philosophy

I am committed to properly and conscientiously carrying out what I view as the two major responsibilities of a planning commissioner: long-term community planning (general plan) and administration/adjudication of existing ordinances related to planning and building.

With regard to long-term planning, I believe a balanced approach is critical — one that allows for sufficient housing and economic development serving the various income levels in the community, while preserving the community's positive attributes and ensuring compliance with state and federal laws. Further, I believe there is no substitute for diligent and consistent application to the task. As I was during my first term of service on the Planning Commission, I remain committed to devoting the time and effort necessary to understanding the legal framework in which we must operate, to properly and critically reviewing agenda materials, draft documents and other relevant information, to gathering needed information and asking questions where necessary, and otherwise working to meet the community's long-range objectives.

With regard to administration of existing ordinances such as zoning changes and subdivision map hearings, I believe planning decisions must be carefully weighed to consider the individual's right to enjoy and benefit from his or her property, and to balance that important right with the rights of the community and neighbors. In most cases, these objectives are met by careful compliance with ordinances. However, variances and special needs must also be considered from time to time. This requires a willingness to fully understand the issues, to listen to all the facts surrounding a specific matter, and a desire to reach an unbiased conclusion that passes legal muster, protects against unnecessary city liability and offers maximum benefit to all interested parties. I also believe the cumulative benefits – or impacts – of individual projects must be considered. I believe it is the role of

the Commission to make recommendations to the City Council on these matters during General Plan updates, and to advise the council when mid-course corrections are needed. At the same time, it is the duty of all Planning Commissioners to be cognizant of the vision for the city expressed by the majority of its elected leaders.

Education

I graduated from Blair High School in Pasadena, California, in 1981 in the top 10 percent of my class. I was a National Merit Scholar semi-finalist. I attended the University of California at Los Angeles from 1981 to 1985, majoring in history, but left college before graduating to take a job as a newspaper reporter in Gallup, New Mexico.

Experience

My most valuable experience has come from serving nearly five years as a City of Colusa planning commissioner, including work on development of a General Plan. I have also from time to time informally advocated on behalf of issues of local interest, such as the preservation of the local Department of Motor Vehicles office.

As a professional newspaper reporter and editor between 1986 and 1996 (at newspapers including The Signal in Santa Clarita, Los Angeles Daily News, Colusa Sun-Herald and Marysville Appeal-Democrat), I covered a myriad of issues in local government, including city councils, county boards of supervisors, planning commissions, school boards, and similar bodies. <u>Subject:</u> First reading of an Ordinance regarding AB 481- Military Equipment Policy for the Police Department

Recommendation: Hold first reading and read by title only an Ordinance regarding Military Equipment Policy for the Police Department

BACKGROUND ANALYSIS:

Assembly Bill 481 requires a Law Enforcement Agency (LEA) to obtain approval from the applicable governing body, via adoption of a "military equipment" use policy by Ordinance prior to the LEA funding, acquiring, or using military equipment. The policy was previously circulated to the Council.

The Colusa Police Department seeks City Council approval of an Ordinance in order to allow CPD to continue to use the vital equipment specified therein. Items deemed to be "military equipment" by AB 481 are used as a component of overall best practices for LEAs throughout the country. These tools have been tested in the field, and are used by LEAs to enhance citizen safety, officer safety. Loss of these items would jeopardize the welfare of citizens and peace officers within the CPD.

The term "military equipment", as used in AB 481, in fact does not necessarily indicate equipment that has been used by the military. Pursuant to AB 481, items deemed to be "military equipment" include, but are not limited to, unmanned aerial or ground vehicles, armored vehicles, command and control vehicles, pepper balls, less lethal shotguns, less lethal 40mm projectile launchers and flashbangs.

CPD is committed to using the most up to date tools and equipment to safeguard the citizens of Colusa. Many of items deemed to be "military equipment" by AB 481 are in fact employed by CPD, and LEA's across the country, in order to specifically reduce risk to community members. These items provide peace officers with the ability to safely resolve volatile

situations which otherwise might rise to the level of a lethal force encounter. To that end, the items at issue in this report, and accompanying Military Equipment Use Policy, also provide CPD's peace officers with vital tools that facilitate compliance with its stringent use of force policy.

There is significant interest in ensuring that law enforcement continues to have access to equipment that will provide peace officers as many options as possible to safeguard lives, ensure safety, and protect civil liberties. The use of the tools identified below are vital to CPD's mission and will continue to be strictly regulated through internal processes and oversight. The proposed ordinance seeks to approve a policy which constitutes CPD's Military Equipment Use Policy. The policy outlines each item identified in Government Code section 7070, that is currently owned by the City or items that the City may acquire in the future.

The proposed policy provides a maximum number of each type of military equipment that CPD may acquire, use, deploy, and maintain at any given time. The policy does not include the current inventory that CPD maintains as of today. The current inventory will be periodically provided to City Council in the annual report as is required in AB 481.

The proposed policy safeguards the public's welfare, safety, civil rights and civil liberties. The policy ensures that there are safeguards, including transparency, oversight, and accountability measures in place. Violations of the policy will be corrected when discovered. Members of the public will be provided direction per the policy on how to register complaints for violations. All items which result in a use of force will be investigated, as is already required by existing CPD policy. Additionally, there are no reasonable alternatives to the items listed below. CPD has not discovered alternative items that can achieve the same objectives of officer and civilian safety.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLUSA, CALIFORNIA, ADOPTING A MILITARY EQUIPMENT POLICY OF THE CITY OF COLUSA, CALIFORNIA GOVERNING THE USE OF MILITARY EQUIPMENT

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLUSA DOES HEREBY FIND AND RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

WHEREAS, on September 30, 2021, Governor Gavin Newsom signed into law Assembly Bill 481 ("AB 481"), adding Chapter 12.8, "Funding, Acquisition and Use of Military Equipment", to Division 7 of Title 1 of the Government Code (sections 7070 – 7075), relating to the use of military equipment by California law enforcement agencies:

WHEREAS, AB 481 seeks to provide transparency, oversight, and an opportunity for meaningful public input on decisions regarding whether and how military equipment is funded, acquired, or used;

WHEREAS, the Colusa Police Department is in possession of certain items of equipment that qualify as "military equipment" under AB 481 and further intends to acquire other items of military equipment;

WHEREAS, AB 481 requires, inter alia, that a law enforcement agency possessing and using such qualifying equipment must prepare a publicly released, written, military equipment use policy document covering the inventory, description, quantity, purpose, capabilities, use, lifespan, acquisition, maintenance, authorized use, fiscal impacts, procedures, training, oversight, and complaint process, applicable to the Department's use of such equipment;

WHEREAS, the policy must be approved by the City Council by ordinance, and reviewed annually thereafter; and

WHEREAS, the military equipment inventoried and presented to the City Council is necessary because there is no reasonable alternative that can achieve the same objective of officer and civilian safety;

WHEREAS, the proposed Military Equipment Use Policy ("Policy") will safeguard the public's health, welfare, safety, civil rights, and civil liberties;

WHEREAS, the equipment is reasonably cost effective compared to available alternatives that can achieve the same objective of officer and civilian safety;

WHEREAS, prior military equipment use complied with the applicable equipment use policy (which included equipment now defined as military equipment) that was in effect at the time, or if prior uses did not comply with the accompanying military equipment use policy, corrective action has been taken to remedy nonconforming uses and ensure future compliance;

WHEREAS, the Police Department has submitted the proposed Policy to the City Council and thereafter has made those documents available on the Police

Department's website for at least 30 days prior to the public hearing concerning the military equipment at issue;

WHEREAS, the Policy satisfies the requirements of Government Code Section 7070(d):

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Colusa, having received the information required under AB 481 regarding the Colusa Police Department's use of military equipment as defined in said law, deems it to be in the best interest of the City to and hereby does approve the Military Equipment Policy.

WHEREAS, all legal prerequisites prior to the adoption of this Ordinance have occurred.

NOW THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLUSA HERBY ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: Recitals. The City Council finds that all the recitals, facts, findings, and conclusions set forth above in the preamble of this Ordinance are true and correct.

SECTION 2: Approval of Military Equipment Policy.

Military Equipment Policy.

- (a) The Military Equipment Policy shall govern the use of military equipment by the Colusa Police Department.
- (b) The Policy shall be made publicly available on the Police Department's website for as long as the military equipment is available for use or as otherwise ordained by the City Council.
- (c) The Police Department shall submit an annual military equipment report to the City Council containing the information required by Government Code Section 7072 and the City Council shall thereafter determine whether each type of military equipment identified therein complied with the standards for approval set forth in Government Code Section 7071(d).
- (d) The City Council shall on an annual basis and at a regular meeting thereof review this ordinance and vote on whether to renew it pursuant to Government Code Section 7071(e)(2).
- (e) The definitions set forth in Government Code section 7070 shall apply to this ordinance. Any provision of state law referred to herein shall mean and include any amended or successor provision thereof.
- **Section 3:** Compliance with CEQA. Adoption of this Ordinance is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Section 15061 (b)(3) (General Rule) of the CEQA Guidelines because it is not a "project" and because it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the passage of this Ordinance will have a significant effect on the environment.

Section 4: Inconsistencies. Any provision of the Colusa Municipal Code or appendices thereto inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance, to the extent of such inconsistencies and no further, is hereby repealed or modified to that extent necessary to affect the provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 5: Uncodified Ordinance. This Ordinance shall not be codified in the Colusa Municipal Code unless and until the City Council so ordains.

Section 6: Severability. If any chapter, article, section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, word, or portion of this Ordinance, or the application thereof to any person, is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portion of this Ordinance or its application to other persons. The City Council hereby declares that it would have adopted this Ordinance and each chapter, article, section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, word, or portion thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more subsections, subdivisions, sentences, clauses, phrases, or portions of the application thereof to any person, be declared invalid or unconstitutional. No portion of this Ordinance shall supersede any local, state, or federal law, regulation, or codes dealing with life safety factors.

Section 7: Effective Date. This Ordinance shall become effective thirty (30) days following from its adoption.

Section 8: Certification. The City Clerk shall certify the adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause the same to be posted or published in the manner as required by law.

706.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The purpose of this policy is to provide guidelines for the approval, acquisition, and reporting requirements of military equipment (Government Code § 7070; Government Code § 7071; Government Code § 7072).

706.1.1 DEFINITIONS

Definitions related to this policy include (Government Code § 7070):

Governing body – The elected or appointed body that oversees the Department.

Military equipment – Includes but is not limited to the following:

- Unmanned, remotely piloted, powered aerial or ground vehicles.
- Mine-resistant ambush-protected (MRAP) vehicles or armored personnel carriers.
- High mobility multipurpose wheeled vehicles (HMMWV), two-and-one-half-ton trucks, five-ton trucks, or wheeled vehicles that have a breaching or entry apparatus attached.
- Tracked armored vehicles that provide ballistic protection to their occupants.
- Command and control vehicles that are either built or modified to facilitate the operational control and direction of public safety units.
- Weaponized aircraft, vessels, or vehicles of any kind.
- Battering rams, slugs, and breaching apparatuses that are explosive in nature. This does not include a handheld, one-person ram.
- Firearms and ammunition of .50 caliber or greater, excluding standard-issue shotguns and standard-issue shotgun ammunition.
- Specialized firearms and ammunition of less than .50 caliber, including firearms and accessories identified as assault weapons in Penal Code § 30510 and Penal Code § 30515, with the exception of standard-issue handguns.
- Any firearm or firearm accessory that is designed to launch explosive projectiles.
- Noise-flash diversionary devices and explosive breaching tools.
- Munitions containing tear gas or OC, excluding standard, service-issued handheld pepper spray.
- TASER® Shockwave, microwave weapons, water cannons, and long-range acoustic devices (LRADs).
- Kinetic energy weapons and munitions.
- Any other equipment as determined by a governing body or a state agency to require additional oversight.

706.2 POLICY

It is the policy of the Colusa Police Department that members of this department comply with the provisions of Government Code § 7071 with respect to military equipment.

706.3 MILITARY EQUIPMENT COORDINATOR

The Chief of Police should designate a member of this department to act as the military equipment coordinator. The responsibilities of the military equipment coordinator include but are not limited to:

- (a) Acting as liaison to the governing body for matters related to the requirements of this policy.
- (b) Identifying department equipment that qualifies as military equipment in the current possession of the Department, or the equipment the Department intends to acquire that requires approval by the governing body.
- (c) Conducting an inventory of all military equipment at least annually.
- (d) Collaborating with any allied agency that may use military equipment within the jurisdiction of Colusa Police Department (Government Code § 7071).
- (e) Preparing for, scheduling, and coordinating the annual community engagement meeting to include:
 - 1. Publicizing the details of the meeting.
 - 2. Preparing for public questions regarding the department's funding, acquisition, and use of equipment.
- (f) Preparing the annual military equipment report for submission to the Chief of Police and ensuring that the report is made available on the department website (Government Code § 7072).
- (g) Establishing the procedure for a person to register a complaint or concern, or how that person may submit a question about the use of a type of military equipment, and how the Department will respond in a timely manner.

706.4 MILITARY EQUIPMENT INVENTORY

The following constitutes a list of qualifying equipment for the Department:

- Less Lethal Shotgun: Less Lethal Shotgun is used to deploy the less lethal 12-gauge Super-Sock Beanbag Round.
 - a. <u>Description:</u> REMINGTON 870 SHOTGUN. The Remington 870 Shotgun is used to deploy the less lethal 12-gauge Super-Sock Beanbag Round up to a distance of 75 feet. All dedicated less lethal shotguns are distinguished by their gray colored butt stock and fore grip. The is a less lethal force option allowing officers to maintain space between themselves and a suspect reducing the immediacy of the threat, which is a principle of de-escalation.
 - i. Quantity not to exceed: 5
 - ii. Approximate Purchase Cost: \$950 ea.
 - iii. Approximate Annual Maintenance: \$50 ea.

2. Ammunition

- a. 12-GAUGE DEFENSE TECHNOLOGIES DRAG STABILIZED BEAN BAG ROUND, #3027. A less lethal 2.5-inch 12-gauge shotgun round firing a ballistic fiber bag filled with 40 grams of lead shot at a velocity of 270-290 feet per second (FPS). Bean Bag rounds are discharged from a dedicated 12-gauge shotgun that is distinguishable by an painted grey butt stock and fore grip. This round provides accurate and effective performance when fired from the approved distance of not fewer than five (5) feet. The maximum effective range of this munition is up to 75 feet from the target. The Bean Bag round is very accurate. However, effectiveness depends on many variables, such as distance, clothing, stature, and the point where the projectile impacts.
 - i. Quantity not to exceed: 100
 - ii. Approximate Purchase Cost: \$5 ea.
 - iii. Approximate Annual Maintenance: None
- 3. <u>Purpose:</u> To minimize the risks to all parties through pain compliance, temporary discomfort and/or incapacitation of potentially violent or dangerous subjects.
- 4. <u>Authorized Use:</u> Situations for use of the less lethal weapon systems may include, but are not limited to:
 - a. Self-destructive, dangerous and/or combative individuals.
 - b. Riot/crowd control and civil unrest incidents.
 - c. Circumstances where a tactical advantage can be obtained.
 - d. Potentially vicious animals.
 - e. Training exercises or approved demonstrations.

5. Lifespan

- a. Remington 870 Less Lethal Shotgun- approximately 25 years.
- b. Drag Stabilized Bean Bag- No listed expiration date.
- 6. <u>Training:</u> Officers are required to be trained in the 12 gauge less lethal shotgun as a less lethal option before utilizing.
- 7. <u>Legal and Procedural Rules:</u> Use is established under Policy 300 and Policy 303 and shall comply with CPC 835a. It is the policy of the CPD to utilize the less lethal shotgun only for official law enforcement purposes, pursuant to State and Federal law.

706.5 APPROVAL

The Chief of Police or the authorized designee shall obtain approval from the governing body by way of an ordinance adopting the military equipment policy. As part of the approval process, the Chief of Police or the authorized designee shall ensure the proposed military equipment policy is submitted to the governing body and is available on the department website at least 30 days prior to any public hearing concerning the military equipment at issue (Government Code § 7071). The military equipment policy must be approved by the governing body prior to engaging in any of the following (Government Code § 7071):

- (a) Requesting military equipment made available pursuant to 10 USC § 2576a.
- (b) Seeking funds for military equipment, including but not limited to applying for a grant, soliciting or accepting private, local, state, or federal funds, in-kind donations, or other donations or transfers.
- (c) Acquiring military equipment either permanently or temporarily, including by borrowing or leasing.
- (d) Collaborating with another law enforcement agency in the deployment or other use of military equipment within the jurisdiction of this department.
- (e) Using any new or existing military equipment for a purpose, in a manner, or by a person not previously approved by the governing body.
- (f) Soliciting or responding to a proposal for, or entering into an agreement with, any other person or entity to seek funds for, apply to receive, acquire, use, or collaborate in the use of military equipment.
- (g) Acquiring military equipment through any means not provided above.

706.6 COORDINATION WITH OTHER JURISDICTIONS

Military equipment deployed or used by any member of this jurisdiction shall be approved for use and in accordance with this Department policy. Any military equipment that is deployed or used by other jurisdictions that are providing mutual aid to this jurisdiction shall comply with their respective military equipment use policies. Situations may arise where the Department may deploy or use military equipment owned by other law enforcement agencies, in these situations, the Department is authorized to deploy or use a different agency's military equipment as authorized in Section 706.4 of this policy. The Department is also authorized to deploy or use the following non-exhaustive list of military equipment owned by another agency:

- Attachment "A"
 - Equipment list owned by other agencies

The Colusa Police Department hereby adopts the military equipment use policy as is approved, and may be amended from time to time, under Government Code section 7070 et seq., for jurisdictions that the Department may engage with to provide mutual aid. This section is in no way a limitation to the ability of the Department to deploy or use the military equipment of another jurisdiction.

706.7 ANNUAL REPORT

Upon approval of a military equipment policy, the Chief of Police or the authorized designee should submit a military equipment report to the governing body for each type of military equipment approved within one year of approval, and annually thereafter for as long as the military equipment is available for use (Government Code § 7072).

The Chief of Police or the authorized designee should also make each annual military equipment report publicly available on the department website for as long as the military equipment is available for use. The report shall include all information required by Government Code § 7072

for the preceding calendar year for each type of military equipment in department inventory.

706.8 COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Within 30 days of submitting and publicly releasing the annual report, the Department shall hold at least one well-publicized and conveniently located community engagement meeting, at which the Department should discuss the report and respond to public questions regarding the funding, acquisition, or use of military equipment.

706.9 COMPLIANCE PROCEDURE

This procedure is to ensure compliance with the military equipment use policy.

All complaints, concerns, or questions submitted regarding this policy will be handled pursuant to the Department's normal complaint process and be handled in a timely manner.

Section 706.6: Equipment List owned by other Agencies

Less Lethal Shotgun: Less lethal shotgun is used to deploy the less lethal 12-guage Super Sock Beanbag Round.

(a) Description, quantity, capabilities, and purchase cost:

- 1. Remington 870 Less Lethal Shotgun approximate cost: \$950, quantity: 1 (up to 10). The Remington 870 Less Lethal Shotgun is used to deploy the less lethal 12-Guage Super Sock Beanbag Round up to a distance of 75 feet. The range of the weapon system helps to maintain space between officers and a suspect reducing the immediacy of the threat which is a principle of de-escalation.
- 2. 12 Gauge Super Sock Beanbag Round approximate cost: \$5, quantity 11 (up to 100). A less lethal 2.4 inch, 12-gauge shotgun round firing a ballistic fiber bag filled with 40 grams of lead shot at a velocity of 270-290 feet per second (FPS). This round provides accurate and effective performance when fired from the approved distance of not fewer than five (5) feet. The maximum effective range of this munition is up to 5 feet from the target. The model 2581 Super Sock is in its deployed state immediately upon exiting the barrel. It does not require a minimum range to "unfold or "stabilize." The Super Sock is an aerodynamic projectile. However, accuracy is relative to the shotgun, barrel length, environmental conditions, and the operator. The Super Sock is very accurate. However, effectiveness depends on many variables, such as distance, clothing, stature and the point where the projectile impacts.

(b) Purpose

To limit the escalation of conflict where employment of lethal force is prohibited or undesirable.

(c) Authorized Use

Situations for use of the less lethal weapon system may include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Self-destructive, dangerous and/or combative individuals.
- 2. Riot/crowd control and civil unrest incidents.
- 3. Circumstances where a tactical advantage can be obtained.
- 4. Potentially vicious animals.
- 5. Training exercises or approved demonstrations.

(d) <u>Lifespan</u>

Remington 870 Less Lethal Shotgun – 25 years. Super Sock Round – No listed expiration date.

(e) Fiscal Impact

Annual Maintenance is approximately \$50.

(f) Training

Deputies who carry the less lethal shotgun are trained to use it as a less lethal option by in-service training.

(g) Legal and Procedural Rules

It is the policy of the CCSO to utilize the less lethal shotgun only for official law enforcement purposes, and pursuant to State and Federal law, including those regarding the use of force.

Unmanned Aircraft System (UAS): An unmanned aircraft along with the associated equipment necessary to control it remotely.

- (a) Description, quantity, capabilities, and purchase cost of current UAS:
 - 1. DJI Phantom 4 Pro Plus, cost: \$1600 each, quantity: 1. Small UAS that weighs approximately 1375 grams and is able to record video with approximately 30 minutes of flight time.
 - 2. DJI Phantom 3, cost: \$499 each, quantity: 1. Small UAS that weighs approx. 1216 grams, has video recording capabilities, with approximately 25 minutes of flight time.

(b) Purpose

To be deployed when its view would assist officers or incident commanders during major incidents.

(c) Authorized Use

Only assigned operators who have completed the required training shall be permitted to operate any UAS during approved missions. The following situations, which include but are not limited to:

- 1. Missing Persons.
- 2. Any rapidly evolving or developing emergency situation.
- 3. SWAT deployments/tactical situations.
- 4. Crime scene investigations.

(d) Expected Life Span

All UAS equipment, 3-5 years.

(e) Fiscal Impact

Annual maintenance and battery replacement cost is approximately \$1,000.

(f) Training

All Department UAS operators are licensed by the Federal Aviation Administration for UAS operation. In addition, each operator must maintain a minimum of 1 hour of flight time per month as well as quarterly trainings.

(g) Legal and Procedural Rules

Use is established under CCSO Standard Operating Procedure and FAA Regulation 14 CFR Part 107. It is the policy of CCSO to utilize UAS only for official law enforcement purposes, and in a manner that respects the privacy of our community, pursuant to State and Federal law.

Rifles: Firearms that are fired from shoulder level

(a) Description, quantity, capabilities, and purchase cost:

- 1. The Colt 9mm SMG, also known as the Colt Model 635, is a 9×19mm submachine gun manufactured by Colt, based on the M16 rifle. The Colt 9mm SMG is a closed bolt, blowback operated SMG, with a 10.5 in Barrel length. It is accurate up to 300 yards, cost: \$970.00, quantity: 4. These rifles are primarily used by SWAT when dealing with tactical situations.

Use is established under the Standard Operating Procedure. It is the policy of the CCSO to utilize rifles only for official law enforcement purposes, and pursuant to State and Federal law regarding the use of force.

40 MM Launchers and Rounds: 40MM Launchers are utilized by department personnel as a less lethal tool to launch impact rounds and as a method to deploy chemical agents from a safe distance.

- 2. Penn Arms, 40MM launcher, cost: \$1179, quantity: 0. The 40MM Single Launcher is a tactical single shot launcher. It will launch a 40MM less lethal projectiles and 40MM chemical agency projectiles.
- 3. Penn Arms, 40mm multi-launcher, cost: \$3000, quantity: 0. The 40MM Multi-Launcher is a tactical platform capable of holding six projectiles in the launcher. It will launch a 40MM less lethal projectiles and 40MM chemical agency projectiles. This platform is more suitable for deploying multi projectiles in a shorter amount of time. This is effective during less lethal and or chemical agent deployments.
- 4. Federal gas riot 37MM multi-launcher, cost: \$2200, quantity: 1. The 37MM Multi-Launcher is a tactical platform capable of holding six projectiles in the launcher. It will launch a 37MM less lethal projectiles and 37MM chemical agency projectiles. This platform is more suitable for deploying multi projectiles in a shorter amount of time. This is effective during less lethal and/or chemical agent deployments.
- 5. Defense Technology, 40MM exact impact sponge, #6325, cost: \$18, quantity: 0. (Up to 200) A less lethal 40mm lightweight plastic and foam projectile fired from a single or multi-round purpose built 40mm launcher with a rifled barrel at 325 FPS. The 30-gram foam projectile delivers 120 ft/lbs. of energy on impact. The 40mm Exact Impact Sponge Round provides accurate and effective performance when fired from the approved distance of not less than five (5) feet and as far as 131 feet from the target.
- 6. Combined Tactical Solutions (CTS), 40mm CS Liquid Barricade Projectile, cost: \$29.70, quantity: 0. (Up to 75) The 40mm CS Liquid Barricade Projectile is designed specifically for penetrating intermediate barriers, such as single pane exterior windows, vehicle windows, pressed wood particle doors, 1-2 layers of wallboard, and interior hollow core doors, and deliver irritant agents into an adjacent room(s). This launch-able munition is 4.1 in. long and 40mm in diameter and holds approximately 10 gm of active agent.

(b) Purpose

To limit the escalation of conflict where employment of lethal force is prohibited or undesirable.

(c) Authorized Use

Situations for use of the less lethal weapon systems may include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Self-destructive, dangerous and/or combative individuals.
- 2. Riot/crowd control and civil unrest incidents.
- 3. Potentially vicious animals.
- 4. Training exercises or approved demonstrations.
- 5. Barricaded subjects.

(d) Training

Sworn members utilizing 40MM less lethal, chemical agents or impact rounds are trained in their use by POST certified less lethal and chemical agent instructors.

(e) Lifespan

Defense Technology LMT 25 years. Penn Arms #GL1-40- 15 years. Penn Arms GL65-50-15 years. Federal labs 37MM Multi-launcher-10 years. Model 6325 Exact Impact Sponge- 5 years.

(f) Fiscal Impact

Annual maintenance is approximately \$50 for each launcher.

(g) Legal and Procedural Rules

It is the policy of the CCSO to utilize the 40mm or 37MM launchers only when properly trained and for official law enforcement purposes pursuant to State and Federal law, including those regarding the use of force.

Distraction/Diversion Devices: A device used to distract dangerous persons.

- (a) <u>Description</u>, quantity, capabilities, and purchase cost;
 - 1. Distraction Device 12 Gram Reloadable Body 8933, Cost: \$56.85., quantity: 4. A non-bursting, non-fragmenting multi (1)-bang device that produces a thunderous bang with an intense bright light. Ideal for distracting dangerous suspects during assaults, hostage rescue, room entry or other high-risk arrest situations.
 - 2. Distraction Device 12 Gram Reload 8901SC # 25, Cost: \$34.00., quantity: 8. A non-bursting, non-fragmenting multi (1)-bang device that produces a thunderous bang with an intense bright light. Ideal for distracting dangerous suspects during assaults, hostage rescue, room entry or other high-risk arrest situations.
 - 3. Defense Technology Corp. of America by Curtis Blue Line, NO. 25 Distraction Device, cost: \$56.85 ea., quantity: 4. A non-bursting, non-fragmenting multi (1)-bang device that produces a thunderous bang with an intense bright light. Ideal for distracting dangerous suspects during assaults, hostage rescue, room entry or other high-risk arrest situations.
 - 4. Combines Tactical Systems, 7290-2 flash-bang, cost: \$52 ea., quantity: 0. A non-bursting, non-fragmenting multi (2)-bang device that produces a thunderous bang

with an intense bright light. Ideal for distracting dangerous suspects during assaults, hostage rescue, room entry or other high-risk arrest situations.

- 5. Combined Tactical Systems, 7290-9 flash-bang, cost: \$139 ea., quantity:0. A non-bursting, non-fragmenting multi (9)-bang device that produces a thunderous bang with an intense bright light. Ideal for distracting dangerous suspects during assaults, hostage rescue, room entry or other high-risk arrest situations.
- 6. Combined Tactical Systems, ?290M mini flash-bang, cost: \$38 ea., quantity: 0. The 7290M Flash-Bang exhibits all the same attributes of its larger counterpart but in a smaller and lighter package. Weighing in at just 15 ounces the new 290M is approximately 30% lighter than the 7290 but still has the same 175db output of the 7290 and produces 6-8 million candelas of light.

Discharged from a PepperBall Launcher, the projectile has a velocity of 280-350 FPS. The projectile has a direct impact of 60ft and an area of saturation of 150+ft. The projectile contains 0.5% PAVA Powder.
 - 3. PepperBall VKS Carbine, cost: \$1300, quantity 0. The Variable Kinetic System (VKS) is a compressed-air powered launcher designed to fire non-lethal PepperBall projectiles. The PepperBall VKS Carbine features a Dual Feed System that offers the ability to quickly switch between Hopper mode and Magazine mode for optimum versatility.
 - 4. PepperBall live projectile, cost: \$2 per projectile, quantity 50 (up to 100). The basic PepperBall projectile contains 2o/o PAVA pepper powder, and is designed for direct impact and area saturation, especially in confined, interior spaces. Discharged from a PepperBall Launcher, the projectile has a velocity of 280-350 FPS. The projectile has a direct impact of 60ft and an area of saturation of 150+ft. The projectile contains 0.5% PAVA Powder.
 - 5. PepperBall Live-x-projectile, cost: \$3 per projectile, quantity 100 (up to 200). The Live Projectile contains a concentrated amount of PAVA pepper powder. Discharged from a PepperBall Launcher, the projectile has a velocity of 280-350 FPS. The projectile has a direct impact of 60ft and an area of saturation of 150+ft. The projectile contains 5% PAVA Powder.
 - 6. PepperBall VXR inert projectile, cost: \$.80 per projectile, quantity 950 (up to 1500). The VXR Inert Projectile is a non-lethal round. The projectile contains approximately no PAVA powder. This projectile is best for direct impact with no PAVA powder. Discharged from a PepperBall Launcher, the projectile has a velocity of 280-350 FPS. (b) Purpose

Use is established under CCSO policy 308.7.2. It is the policy of the CCSO to utilize PepperBall only for official law enforcement purposes, and pursuant to State and Federal law, including those regarding the use of force.

Mobile Command Trailer: Self-contained Mobile Command Post.

(a) <u>Description</u>, <u>quantity</u>, <u>capabilities</u>, <u>and purchase cost</u>:

1. The CCSO Mobile Command post, approximate purchase cost: \$185,000.00, quantity: 1. The Mobile Command post is Nomand brand custom-built 38-foot trailer with multiple forms of communications built in, including mobile dispatch capabilities.

(b) Purpose

Self-contained Mobile Command Post is designed to provide the Incident Commander with a mobile base of operation.

(c) Authorized Use

The Mobile Command Trailer is to be utilized as an Incident Command Post for planned or unplanned incidents.

(d) Lifespan

No lifespan indicated by manufacturer. Dependent on operational usage and wear.

(e) Fiscal Impact

Annual Maintenance is approximately \$1500.00.

(f) Training

No training requirements for the Mobile Command trailer.

(g) Legal and Procedural Rules

It is the policy of the CCSO to utilize only for official law enforcement purposes, and pursuant to State and Federal law.

<u>Subject:</u> US Department of Transportation (DOT) Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) Planning Grant

Recommendation: Council to approve resolution 22-___ for the City of Colusa to submit grant bid to the DOT for a planning grant for a Comprehensive Safety Action Plan for the City's Transportation Infrastructure and Council to approve resolution 22-___ making a commitment to set a goal for zero fatalities and serious injuries on the roads of the City of Colusa.

BACKGROUND ANALYSIS: The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) established the new Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) discretionary program with \$5 billion in appropriated funds over the next 5 years. In fiscal year 2022 (FY22), up to \$1 billion is available. The SS4A program funds regional, local, and Tribal initiatives through grants to prevent roadway deaths and serious injuries.

The SS4A program supports Secretary of Transportation Pete Buttigieg's National Roadway Safety Strategy and the Department's goal of zero deaths and serious injuries on our nation's roadways.

One of the activities that is eligible for the SS4A program is the development of a comprehensive safety action plan. A comprehensive safety action plan (referred to as Action Plan) is aimed at preventing roadway fatalities and serious injuries in a locality, Tribe, or region. The primary deliverable for an Action Plan Grant is a publicly available Action Plan. The plan shall include the following:

- 1. Leadership Commitment and Goal Setting; The commitment must include a goal and timeline for eliminating roadway fatalities and serious injuries.
- 2. Planning Structure; A committee, task force, implementation group, or similar body charged with oversight of the Action Plan development, implementation, and monitoring.
- 3. Safety Analysis; Analysis of existing conditions and historical trends that provides a baseline level of crashes involving fatalities and serious injuries across a jurisdiction, locality, Tribe, or region. Includes an analysis of locations where there are crashes and the severity of the crashes, as well as contributing factors and crash types by relevant road users (motorists, people walking, transit users, etc.). Analysis of systemic and

- specific safety needs is also performed, as needed (e.g., high-risk road features, specific safety needs of relevant road users, public health approaches, analysis of the built environment, demographic, and structural issues, etc.). To the extent practical, the analysis should include all roadways within the jurisdiction, without regard for ownership. Based on the analysis performed, a geospatial identification of higher-risk locations is developed (a High-Injury Network or equivalent).
- 4. Engagement and Collaboration; Robust engagement with the public and relevant stakeholders, including the private sector and community groups, that allows for both community representation and feedback. Information received from engagement and collaboration is analyzed and incorporated into the Action Plan. Overlapping jurisdictions are included in the process. Plans and processes are coordinated and aligned with other governmental plans and planning processes to the extent practical.
- Equity Considerations; Plan development using inclusive and representative processes.
 Underserved communities are identified through data and other analyses in collaboration with appropriate partners. Analysis includes both population characteristics and initial equity impact assessments of the proposed projects and strategies.
- 6. Policy and Process Changes; Assessment of current policies, plans, guidelines, and/or standards (e.g., manuals) to identify opportunities to improve how processes prioritize transportation safety. The Action Plan discusses implementation through the adoption of revised or new policies, guidelines, and/or standards, as appropriate.
- 7. Strategy and Project Selections; Identification of a comprehensive set of projects and strategies, shaped by data, the best available evidence and noteworthy practices, as well as stakeholder input and equity considerations, that will address the safety problems described in the Action Plan. These strategies and countermeasures focus on a Safe System Approach, effective interventions, and consider multidisciplinary activities. To the extent practical, data limitations are identified and mitigated. Once identified, the list of projects and strategies is prioritized in a list that provides time ranges for when the strategies and countermeasures will be deployed (e.g., short-, mid-, and long-term timeframes). The list should include specific projects and strategies, or descriptions of programs of projects and strategies, and explains prioritization criteria used. The list should contain interventions focused on infrastructure, behavioral, and/or operational safety.
- 8. Progress and Transparency; Method to measure progress over time after an Action Plan is developed or updated, including outcome data. Means to ensure ongoing transparency is established with residents and other relevant stakeholders. Must include, at a minimum, annual public and accessible reporting on progress toward reducing roadway fatalities and serious injuries, and public posting of the Action Plan online.

As a next step and part of the grant application progress, City Staff will public notice and run a meeting to start the process to draft a Request for Proposal (RFP). The RFP will include the criteria above and any additional feedback from the community that would enable the City to deliver a complete Action Plan. Possible partners for the project are local universities and colleges, Caltrans, and/or engineering firms.

The SS4A grant is a federal grant and requires a 20% non-federal dollars match. City Staff would like to apply for up to \$250,000.

BUDGET IMPACT: The 20% match required for this grant would result in a cost to the city of \$50,000 for the project. The project could be scaled back which would result in a reduction in matching funds.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Council to approve resolution 22-___ for the City of Colusa to submit grant bid to the DOT for a planning grant for a Comprehensive Safety Action Plan for the City's Transportation Infrastructure and Council to approve resolution 22-___ making a commitment to set a goal for zero fatalities and serious injuries on the roads of the City of Colusa.

WHEREAS a data-driven safe systems approach is proven to be effective at reducing traffic fatalities and injuries, including through taking into account all aspects of the transportation environment and not requiring a single actor to be responsible for traffic safety.

NOW THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLUSA DOES HEREBY RESOLVE:

- 1. To planning a Comprehensive Safety Action Plan for the City's Transportation System that will advance policies and projects that will lead to zero fatalities and serious injuries by 2030.

- Resolution 22- Proposed Budget for Fiscal Year 2022-2023
- Resolution 22- Establishing the Proposed Budget Appropriation Limit for the fiscal year 2022-2023 and also the correction to 2021-2022 Appropriation

Recommendation:

Council to approve the proposed budget for the fiscal year 2022-2023, the appropriation (GANN) limit for the fiscal year 2022-2023, and the correction factor for the fiscal year 2021-2022.

The Budget was prepared before the completion of the fiscal year 2021-2022 and the annual audit. Therefore, the beginning fund balance contained the budgeted numbers, not the audit numbers. The Mid-year budget will have audited fund balances and the updated operational cost for each department.

BUDGET IMPACT:

The general fund revenue increased by \$219,248 and the expenditure increased by \$281,325 from Mid-Year budget updates. The deficit increased by \$62,077 from Mid-Year. The Strike Team contributed 50K towards the repair and maintenance of the equipment and the SLEFS contributed 60k to the general fund to reduce the budget deficit. The police department agreed to freeze one police officer's position for six months

Water fund revenue increased by 14K but expenditure increased by 141k from the Mid-Year budget. The budgeted fund balance is \$6,302,225.

Sewer Fund revenue increased by \$295,410 with the assumption that the sewer rate will be increased by 9% as suggested in the Sewer and Water Report. The expenditures decreased by \$183,073 from Mid -year budget.




FY 2022-23 Proposed Budget

Salary and Overhead Allocation
















FY 2022-23 Proposed Budget General Fund Ten Years Trend




FY 2022-23 Proposed Budget General Fund 10 years Personnel & Other Cost


