**Analysis**

In the year-to-date 2019 there have been 961 Part 1 crimes reported versus 983 in 2018 which shows an approximate decrease of 2.24%. There have been 7 reported robberies in 2019, which is lower than the 5 year average. There have been 16 reported rapes, which is higher than 2018, but is within the normal range based on previous years.

There have been 80 violent crimes reported 2019 YTD compared to 83 reported violent crimes YTD 2018. Year-to-date property crimes have shown a decrease of approximately 2.11% when compared to 2018 YTD statistics.

Based on the statistics from the previous 5 years, property crime numbers are approximately 12.25% lower than the average for year-to-date statistics in October based on the past five years. Year-to-date violent crime numbers are in the normal range based on the past five years.



SUMMARY OF THE FINANCIAL STATISTICS FOR OCTOBER 2019

The police department budget is on track for FY 2019, and we have expended approximately 80% of our 2019 budget at 87% of the way through the budget cycle. We are currently approximately 7% under budget for the year.

At this time, we believe sufficient funds are available within our existing budget to cover our operating cost for the remainder of the year.

RECOMMENDATION TO TRANSFER CERTAIN CITY PROPERTY

This is a recommendation to transfer 45 Kenwood Portable Radios to Georgia Northwestern Technical College Police Department. The police department has surplus radios remaining in inventory after purchasing new units.

**Recommendation #1**- Georgia Northwestern Technical College Police Department

Georgia Northwestern Technical College Police Department has requested the use of surplus portable radios from the Dalton Police Department. The radios would be transferred with a Memorandum of Understanding between the Dalton Police Department and Georgia Northwestern Technical College Police Department as to the expectations and conditions of the transfer.

PURCHASE OF POLICE VEHICLE

The police department is in the process of ordering a vehicle for the fleet. The vehicle will be paid for from existing money. As it stands we currently have \$17,136.34 from insurance reimbursements and \$19,784.52 left in SPLOST for vehicles to use for this purchase.

## I. Policy

## II. Definitions

- A. *Adverse impact* - A substantially different rate of selection (generally less than 80 percent) that works to the disadvantage of members of a race, sex, or ethnic group; an unfavorable effect.
- B. *Candidates* - Persons seeking promotion who have met or will meet minimum qualifications as set forth in ~~the Career Development~~ directive GO92-3.2, **Career Development Program**, within 12 months of the issue date of the memorandum requesting applications for a promotion process, as verified by their Division Commander. Regardless of being permitted to participate in the assessment, no candidate ~~will~~ **shall** be promoted until he or she meets the minimum qualifications as outlined in directive GO92-3.2, **Career Development Program**.
- C. *Fairness* - Resulting in a minimum adverse impact.
- D. *Job description* - A description of what an employee does, for what purpose, on instructions from whom, when and where, and with what materials and equipment.
- E. *Job-related* - A procedure, test, or requirement, either predictive of job performance or indicative of the work behavior expected or necessary in the position.
- F. *Lateral entry* - A personnel practice that permits employs from within or outside the Agency to be promoted to a position and be exempted from all or part of the Agency's promotion process for that position.
- G. *Minimum adverse impact* - The use of selection components or procedures among all those available that reduce any unfavorable effect, to the greatest extent possible, consistent with validity.

- H. *Probationary period* - A latter phase of the promotion process represented by some form of conditional promotion.
- I. *Skills, knowledge and abilities (SKA)* - Skills are the proficiency with which an individual performs. Knowledge is a body of information or understanding gained through learning, education, experience, or associations. Abilities are processes required to perform the various job responsibilities.

### III. **Authority**

- A. The authority and responsibility for administering the promotional process for the Dalton Police Department is vested in the Chief of Police. Promotions shall be made in accordance with the City of Dalton personnel policies and procedures.
- B. The Chief of Police ~~will~~ shall manage all aspects of the promotion process.
- C. The Chief of Police shall act as the Department's liaison with the City of Dalton Human Resources Director and coordinate those matters relating to the promotion process.
- ~~C.D.~~ The ~~Police~~ Department ~~will~~ shall retain authority and responsibility in the promotion process for the following:
  - 1. Coordinating assessment center exercises. This may include;
    - a. Written examinations
    - b. Oral presentations
    - c. Writing labs
  - 2. The evaluation of all testing and testing procedures
  - 3. Recommendation of selected candidates to the Public Safety Commission for promotion confirmation
  - 4. Records maintenance of all procedures. All records pertaining to promotional exams ~~will~~ shall be maintained by the Chief of Police.

### IV. **Legal Requirements**

- A. All components of the promotional process ~~will~~ shall be developed and maintained by the Chief of Police.
- B. The promotion process is an integral part of an agency's total selection process. The selection of candidates for promotion must meet the legal, professional, and administrative requirements for entry-level employees as outlined in written directive GO91-3.01, Selection.

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V. **Administrative Procedures**

- A. The Chief of Police ~~will~~ shall notify all employees in writing when promotional opportunities become available. Supervisors ~~will~~ shall be periodically reminded of promotional opportunities at staff meetings and conferences, and supervisors ~~will~~ shall verbally remind employees at roll call sessions. The written notification ~~will~~ shall include:
1. Availability of the job description for the position(s) available
  2. Reference to candidacy requirements
  3. A deadline for candidates to reply
- B. Each candidate, as defined in Section II. B. of this directive, interested in entering the promotion process, ~~will~~ shall submit a memorandum, before the deadline, to the Chief of Police indicating ~~their~~ his / her qualifications for the position. Each candidate ~~will~~ shall request a letter of recommendation from a Division Commander as to the candidate's performance and potential for promotion.
- C. A one-year probationary period is required for all employees selected in the promotion process. Employees who have been promoted ~~will~~ shall be closely observed and frequently rated on their performance. Unsatisfactory performance ~~will~~ shall immediately be reported to the probationary employee.
- ~~— The Chief of Police will interview each candidate prior to appointment to probationary status.~~
- D. Employees ~~will be~~ are entitled to file, in writing, a request for review of any part of the promotion process. This request ~~will~~ shall be filed through the chain of command to the Chief of Police. The Chief of Police ~~will~~ shall review the process or part of the process being contested. Any decision made by the Chief of Police concerning the review may be appealed, in writing, to the Public Safety Commission through the chain of command.
- E. If an employee is not selected during the promotion~~d~~ process and the eligibility list has expired, the employee may reapply for the next posted promotion~~d~~ assessment if ~~they~~ he or she meets the qualifications as set forth in [policy](#) GO92-3.2, Career Development Program.

VI. **Assessment Center**

- A. The ~~Police~~ Department ~~will~~ shall utilize assessment center exercises in the promotion process for all positions below the rank of captain.
- B. The assessment center tests are intended to measure dimensions, attributes, characteristics, qualities, skills, abilities, and knowledge, as specified in the written job description for the position being tested.
- C. Assessment center exercises may utilize a variety of techniques to evaluate the dimensions and attributes. These techniques may include role-playing, simulation

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exercises, group activities, and other techniques. ~~for the completion of~~ These pre-tested exercises ~~that shall~~ have been found to be reliable, objective, job-related, and able to provide relevant information, ~~as well as being job-related~~.

VII. **Selection of Candidates**

- A. After completion of the assessment center, a representative from the company completing the assessment shall provide the Chief of Police with an eligibility list of candidates. Each candidate shall be ranked in one of the following categories based on ~~their~~ his / her performance in the assessment:
1. Highly Qualified
  2. Qualified
  3. Not recommended
- B. The eligibility list shall remain valid for two (2) years from the date posted on the eligibility list.
- C. When selecting a candidate for promotion, the Chief of Police shall select a candidate from the Highly Qualified or Qualified category based on his / her discretion of Departmental needs at the time of the promotion.

I. **Policy**

It is the policy of the Dalton Police Department to clearly define its jurisdictional boundaries and to maintain an official map and street guide.

II. **Geographical Boundaries**

An official map of the city limits of Dalton, Georgia is maintained by the Dalton Public Works Department. ~~GIS analyst.~~

III. **Official Street Guide**

The Whitfield County 911 Center ~~will~~ shall maintain an official street guide of all streets, roads, avenues, etc. within ~~it's~~ the Department's jurisdictional boundaries and keep the official street guide up-to-date as changes in jurisdictional boundaries occur.

IV. **Jurisdiction and Interagency Cooperation**

A. The ~~Dalton Police~~ Department has exclusive jurisdiction within the corporate city limits of the City of Dalton as incorporated by the city charter. The ~~Police~~ Department ~~will~~ shall enforce all local ordinances, Georgia state laws, and applicable federal laws.

B. The following agencies have concurrent jurisdiction with the ~~Dalton Police~~ Department within the corporate limits of the City of Dalton:

1. Georgia State Patrol (OCGA 35-2-32)
2. Georgia Bureau of Investigation (OCGA 35-3-4)
3. Whitfield County Sheriff's ~~Department~~ Office (OCGA 36-8-5)
4. Motor Carrier Compliance Division (OCGA 35-2-101)

C. ~~The following agency~~ Dalton State College's Department of Public Safety has limited jurisdiction within the city limits of Dalton.

~~1. Dalton State College Department of Public Safety~~

- D. Each of the agencies described **above** are autonomous and operate within the ~~Dalton Police~~ Department's jurisdiction. Any one of these agencies may at times request assistance from the ~~Dalton Police~~ Department, and **any** assistance ~~provided will~~ **shall** be rendered in compliance with Departmental procedures. Nothing shall prohibit these agencies from taking action on situations that occur within the city and in their presence. The ~~Dalton Police~~ Department may request assistance from the above agencies when the need arises.
- E. When responding at the request of another ~~police~~ **law enforcement** agency, or whenever an emergency ~~police~~ **law enforcement** situation becomes evident in adjacent or concurrent jurisdictions, it shall be the responsibility of the Watch Commander or Unit Supervisor to authorize and limit the extent of the ~~Department's~~ response.

V. **State and Federal Agencies**

- A. Members of the ~~Police~~ Department shall provide or receive assistance in cooperation with all state ~~or~~ **and** federal law enforcement agencies. All members of the ~~Police~~ Department shall extend professional courtesy and assistance to all federal, state, ~~or~~ **and** local law enforcement agencies.
- B. The Chief of Police or his / her designee may request the assistance of one or more federal **and / or state** law enforcement agencies, **if needed**.
- C. Assistance from the National Guard shall be requested by the Chief of Police through the Mayor and Council of the City of Dalton to the Governor of the State of Georgia.

## I. Policy

It is the policy of the City of Dalton to provide workers' compensation to those who are injured on the job.

## II. Procedure

### A. Employee Responsibilities

1. The employee shall report all injuries to a Supervisor immediately, regardless of whether or not medical attention is needed.
2. ~~The~~ An injured employee in need of medical treatment ~~should~~ shall report to one of the physicians listed on the City of Dalton's panel of physicians. ~~This~~ The panel of physicians is posted on several bulletin boards located throughout the Police Services Center. If immediate medical attention is needed, and the offices of the physicians listed on the City of Dalton panel are closed, the employee ~~should~~ shall go to the emergency room at Hamilton Medical Center.
3. The employee may be required to submit to a drug screen pursuant to policy GO97-3.8, Drug Free Workplace Policy and Procedure on Substance Abuse, Contraband Articles, and Employee Assistance; III, I, 5.

### B. Supervisor Responsibilities

1. Determine if medical attention is needed and direct the employee to one of the physicians listed on the panel.
2. When applicable, advise the employee to submit to a drug screen pursuant to policy GO97-3.8, Drug Free Workplace Policy and Procedure on Substance Abuse, Contraband Articles, and Employee Assistance; III, I, 5.
3. ~~Complete~~ Start the workers' compensation form WC-1, Employer's First Report of Injury or Occupational Disease, regardless of whether or not medical attention is needed or received (Appendix A).

D. Return to Duty Procedure

Employees returning to work following a serious health condition or work-related injury shall have the Human Resources FMLA Return to Work Medical Evaluation form completed by their physician (Appendix B). Sworn employees ~~will~~ shall also be required to have the attending physician complete the physical readiness assessment Medical Release Form (Appendix C). The applicable form(s) must be submitted to the employee's Division Commander prior to the employee's return to duty.

Dalton Police Officers are required to perform a variety of essential physically demanding tasks, including the following:

- Walking for extended periods
- Short sprints
- Long pursuits lasting over 2 minutes
- Running up and down stairs
- Pushing heavy objects
- Jumping over and around obstacles
- Lifting and carrying heavy objects, sometimes up and down stairs
- Using hands and feet in use of force situations
- Using force in short and long term (greater than 2 minutes) efforts
- Bending and reaching
- Dragging people and objects

To measure an individual's capability to perform these critical tasks, all applicants and incumbents must undergo a physical readiness assessment consisting of the following items:

1. 1.5 mile run to measure aerobic power
2. 300 meter run to measure anaerobic power
3. Maximum push-ups to measure upper body muscular endurance
4. 1 repetition maximum bench press to measure upper body strength

The Training ~~Coordinator and Professional Standards Unit~~, along with career counselors, shall coordinate the efforts of ~~the all~~ employees ~~along with career counselors~~ to see that every training and prerequisite requirement is obtainable for ~~the employee's~~ long-term personal goals.

V. **Career Development Program**

- A. ~~The~~ Career development options shall be clearly defined and be evident to ~~all the~~ employees from ~~his / her~~ the first day of employment with the ~~Dalton Police~~ Department.

3. Interest and attitude toward their current assignment

- C. ~~Criteria for Selection of Personnel~~ All Patrol Officers ~~will~~ shall be afforded the opportunity to be ~~assigned to the~~ temporarily ~~assigned to CID position~~. The selection of personnel ~~will~~ shall be based on manpower requirements, vacations, training calendars, previous rotation assignments, and any other factor that may ~~effect~~ affect shift manpower requirements.
- D. ~~Selection of Personnel~~ ~~The District Commander assigned to 3<sup>rd</sup> shift shall assign patrol Officers to the temporary CID position based on the established criteria.~~ All District Commanders may assign Officers to CID based on the established criteria. I. **Policy**

It is the policy of the Dalton Police Department that Officers provide escort assistance to the extent that such assistance does not create an undue hardship in responding to calls for service and does not jeopardize the safety of the Officers or citizens in the community.

II. **Types of Police Escorts**

A. Escort of Civilian Vehicles in Medical Emergencies

1. Escorting civilian vehicles under emergency circumstances is an extremely dangerous practice and shall not be permitted in Agency vehicles. In medical emergencies, the patient should be transported by ambulance, whenever possible. When, in the Officer's judgment, the medical emergency is such that waiting on an ambulance would result in loss of life, the Officer is authorized to, and shall, transport the injured or sick party to the ~~hospital~~ **Hamilton Medical Center** emergency room in his / her police vehicle.
  
2. Civilian vehicles traveling under emergency conditions should be stopped and the destination and nature of the emergency determined. Officers ~~will~~ **shall** advise ~~the~~ **Whitfield County 911 Center** of the emergency so that appropriate agencies and facilities can be notified. Again, if the emergency is such that waiting on an appropriate agency to respond would likely result in a loss of life, the Officer is authorized to, and shall, transport the person to the appropriate destination in his / her police vehicle.

B. Business Deposit Escorts

1. The use of on-duty ~~Police~~ **Police** Officers as escorts in making business deposits must be approved by the ~~Supervisor~~ **Watch Commander**. ~~Officers should document requests for such services and submit them through the chain of command.~~ **Requests for such services should be made through the Whitfield County 911 Center and forwarded to the Watch Commander.**

General use of Officers in making business deposits is discouraged.

2. Factors that ~~will~~ shall be considered in reviewing requests for business deposit escorts ~~will~~ include the amount of money involved, frequency of requests, location and incident history, **current manpower level**, etc.

C. Funeral Escorts

1. The use of police escorts during funerals creates a positive image of the police while at the same time assists in the orderly flow of traffic.
2. Supervisors ~~will~~ shall be responsible for evaluating and approving requests for funeral escorts and assigning personnel accordingly. Information should be obtained concerning the location, time of departure, and destination.
3. Officers that assist with funerals at intersections may exit their vehicle and, when traffic has been stopped, may stand at attention with their hat in their right hand covering their heart as a sign of respect to the deceased and the funeral procession. Officers ~~will~~ should remain in this position until time to reenter their police vehicle.

D. Escorting Public Officials and Dignitaries

Public officials of high office may be provided police escorts within the corporate limits of the City of Dalton with approval from the Patrol Division Commander.

E. Escorting House Movers / Oversized Vehicles

1. ~~Supervisors will~~ The Patrol Division Operations Supervisor shall be responsible for evaluating and approving the proposed route after considering the safety concerns.
2. The Whitfield County 911 Center ~~should~~ shall be advised of the proposed route prior to the assignment and then notified upon completion.

F. Parades and Non-funeral Processions occurring on ~~Roadways/City Streets~~ Roadways (other than funeral processions)

1. All parades, processions, First Amendment events, etc. require the event organizer to submit an application ~~to the Special Events Coordinator in accordance with City Ordinance Section 10, Special Events.~~
  - a. ~~4<sup>th</sup>~~ First Amendment events require an application be submitted at least five (5) days in advance of the requested date.
  - b. Recurring, annual, or one-time events require an application be submitted at least 60 days in advance of the requested date.
2. The ~~Special Events Coordinator~~ Patrol Operations Supervisor shall conduct an investigation / evaluation of the application in accordance with

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City Ordinance 114-6 (Parade Permit) and [City Ordinance Section 10 \(Special Events\)](#).

3. Approval of the application shall take into consideration:
  - a. The availability of Department personnel to staff the event
  - b. A route ~~which~~ that provides the highest level of safety ~~to~~ for participants, spectators, and Officers and ~~has~~ the least impact on ~~the~~ free-flow of traffic
- ~~4.e.~~ The ~~Special Events Coordinator~~ Patrol Operations Supervisor ~~will~~ shall be responsible for approving annual, recurring, ~~or one-time~~ events.
- ~~5.d.~~ The Chief of Police ~~will~~ shall be responsible for approving ~~4<sup>st</sup>~~ First Amendment events.
- ~~6.4.~~ ~~The Public Relations Specialist, or designee will provide~~ Advance notice of the event shall be provided to the public via press release and social media.
- ~~7.5.~~ A marked police vehicle ~~will~~ shall be assigned to lead parades and another ~~will~~ shall be assigned to follow at the rear of the parade. The lead vehicle shall be responsible for maintaining an appropriate pace and for following the approved parade route. The vehicle at the rear of the parade shall be responsible for ensuring that spectators and vehicular traffic do not infringe upon elements of the parade.

G. Non-custodial escorts

Officers ~~will~~ may be requested to conduct non-custodial escorts to shelters, hospitals, ~~their~~ residences, etc. Once the Officer determines the escort does not jeopardize the safety of the Officer or create an undue hardship in responding to calls for service, the Officer ~~will~~ shall notify the Whitfield County 911 Center and advise ~~them~~ of the escort.

1. If a male Officer is escorting a female, the Officer ~~will~~ shall call in the mileage to the Whitfield County 911 Center at the beginning and at the end of the escort.
2. If a female Officer is escorting a male, the Officer ~~will~~ shall call in the mileage to the Whitfield County 911 Center at the beginning and at the end of the escort.
3. If any Officer transports a juvenile, the Officer ~~will~~ shall call in the mileage to the Whitfield County 911 Center at the beginning and at the end of the escort.

H. Other Escorts

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The Department shall, from time-to-time, engage in escorts not covered above. An example is an escort of school buses from the high school in connection with sporting and other events. These escorts shall be approved by the Patrol Division Commander or his / her designee. The decision to approve shall be based on the function involved, the need (from a traffic standpoint), the time involved, and the availability of personnel.

### I. Policy

It is the policy of the Dalton Police Department that Officers shall use only that degree of force when, and to the extent that, there is reasonable belief that such force is necessary to defend the Officer or a third party against the other's imminent use of unlawful force.

### II. Definitions

- A. *Deadly force* - Any degree of force ~~which~~ that, by the manner of its application, has the reasonable potential to cause death or serious bodily harm.
- B. *Non-Deadly Force* - Force, other than deadly force, that is not excessive and is reasonable and necessary to effect an arrest and / or to ensure the safety of Officers and others.
- C. *Forcible felony* - Any felony ~~which~~ that involves the use or threat of physical force or violence against any another person.
- D. *Reasonable belief* - The facts and circumstances which would cause an ordinary and prudent person to act or think in a similar way under similar circumstances.
- E. *Serious physical injury* - A bodily injury that creates a substantial risk of death, causes serious permanent disfigurement, or results in long-term loss or impairment of the functioning of any part of the body.

### III. Justification for Use of Force

- A. Preserve the peace
- B. Prevent the commission or attempted commission of a crime
- C. Prevent self-inflicted injury
- D. Make a lawful arrest
- E. Make a lawful search

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- F. Overcome resistance to such lawful arrests and searches
- G. Prevent escapes from custody

IV. **Parameters for Use of Deadly Force**

- A. A Dalton Police Officer is justified in using deadly force:
  - 1. If the Officer reasonably believes that such force is necessary to prevent death ~~and~~ or great bodily injury to the Officer or another person, or
  - 2. To prevent the commission of a forcible felony when such felony is intended or likely to cause death or great bodily harm.
- B. Before using a firearm, law enforcement Officers shall identify themselves and state their intent to shoot, when feasible.
- C. An ~~Dalton Police~~ Officer may also discharge a ~~weapon~~ firearm under the following circumstances:
  - 1. During range practice or competitive sporting events
  - 2. To destroy an animal that represents a danger to public safety or as a humanitarian measure where the animal is seriously injured. Time permitting, Officers should make every attempt to locate the rightful owner and / or request Animal Control authorities before using deadly force against an animal.
- D. ~~Dalton Police~~ Officers shall adhere to the following restrictions when their weapon is exhibited:
  - 1. Officers shall not draw or display their firearms unless there is justification for ~~it's~~ the use to accomplish a proper police purpose. An Officer may draw and display his / her firearm to affect an arrest or investigate a situation that ~~they~~ he / she reasonably believes may develop into a deadly force situation.
  - 2. Warning shots are prohibited.
  - 3. ~~Dalton Police~~ An Officers shall not ~~fire~~ discharge ~~their~~ his / her ~~weapon~~ firearm at or from a moving vehicle unless the Officer reasonably believes that such force is necessary to prevent death or great bodily injury to the Officer or another person.
  - 4. Firearms shall not be discharged when it appears likely that an innocent person may be injured.

V. **Parameters for Use of Non-Deadly Force**

- A. When deadly force is not authorized, Officers ~~should~~ shall assess the incident in order to determine which non-deadly technique or weapon will best de-escalate the incident and bring it under control in a safe manner.

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- B. Neck restraints, or similar weaponless control techniques that have a potential for serious injury, are not authorized.
- C. Officers ~~will~~ shall not intentionally use more force than is necessary and reasonable under the circumstances.
- D. Officers ~~will~~ shall never use force in response to mere verbal provocation or abusive language directed at the Officer.
- E. ~~Dalton Police~~ Officers are authorized to use Department-approved non-deadly force techniques as follows:
  - 1. To prevent themselves or another from physical harm;~~or~~
  - 2. To restrain or subdue a resistant individual;~~or~~
  - 3. When necessary to preserve the peace, prevent the commission of offenses, or prevent suicide or self-inflicting injury;~~or~~
  - 4. When preventing or interrupting a crime or attempted crime against property;~~or~~
  - 5. When making lawful arrests and searches, overcoming resistance to such lawful arrests and searches, and preventing escapes from custody;~~or~~
  - 6. To bring an unlawful situation safely and effectively under control
- F. After force has been applied, and it is safe to do so, Officers shall:
  - 1. Determine the extent of the injuries to the subject(s), if any
  - 2. Administer first aid, if needed
  - 3. Observe the subject(s) for any obvious changes to their condition that may indicate a need for medical care
  - 4. Request emergency medical assistance, if needed

VI. **Use of Force**

- A. Personnel ~~will~~ shall use reasonable force when force is used to accomplish lawful objectives.
- B. The Agency recognizes that in some extreme circumstances the situation may dictate using other implements, devices, or ~~techniques such objects~~ as weapons. The use of such implements, devices, or objects, the degree of exigency present in the situation, and the totality of the circumstances ~~will~~ shall be examined, as in any other use of force incident.
- C. All Officers involved in a situation in which force is used shall document their actions and observations during the incident in an incident or supplemental report.

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## VII. Use of Force Reporting Requirements

### A. Injuries in Arrest Situations

1. The use of any force or accidental injury to a prisoner or other person involved in an arrest situation, which results in **an** injury requiring medical treatment by rescue or hospital personnel, shall be reported immediately to the Officer's Supervisor.
2. The immediate Supervisor shall review the circumstances and report **his / her** findings to the Division Commander.
3. The Division Commander shall review the findings and make recommendations to the Chief of Police.
4. Whenever there are injuries or the possibility of injuries, photographs shall be taken of any possible injury areas on the Officer, **and** the arrestee, **or any other person**.

### B. Situations Requiring **Supervisory Review of Use of Force Review**

1. Any time force is used where the possibility of injury or death exists
2. Any time force is used through the use of a lethal or non-lethal weapon
3. Any time physical force is required to:
  - a. Restrain or gain custody of a subject
  - b. Prevent the escape of a suspect
  - c. Escort an uncooperative, handcuffed or un-handcuffed, suspect
4. Any situation **which that** results in **the an** Officer's being assaulted and force is needed to resist the assault.
5. Any situation where an Officer points his / her firearm at a person. This does not include instances where the firearm is drawn and not pointed directly at a person.
6. Any time an Officer discharges a firearm other than in training or for recreational purposes.

In situations where an Officer draws his / her firearm and holds the firearm in one of many tactical positions (i.e. low ready, SUL, etc.), the Officer **should shall** include the information in an incident **or supplemental** report, ~~if not already included in the Supervisory Use of Force Review.~~

- C. When an incident occurs where a **Supervisory Review of Use of Force Review** is required, the Officer **will shall** notify a Supervisor **as soon as practical**. If available,

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the Supervisor ~~will~~ shall respond to the scene of the incident and ~~should~~ document elements of the scene and attempt to locate witnesses ~~of~~ to the incident.

- D. As soon as practical, the Supervisor shall ~~meet with~~ and interview the Officer(s) involved in the incident.

If the Supervisor was not able to arrive at the scene of the incident, the initial walk through of the incident ~~will~~ shall be conducted as soon as possible with the ~~employee~~ Officer(s) involved.

- E. The Supervisor shall then ~~meet with the employee(s) involved in the incident and~~ complete the Supervisory ~~Review of Use of Force~~ ~~Review~~ report. The Supervisor ~~will~~ shall document the details of the incident and the discussion / interaction with the ~~employee~~ Officer(s) in the report.

- F. The Supervisory ~~Review of Use of Force~~ ~~Review~~ report, along with all incident and supplemental reports, photographs, and videos, shall then be forwarded to the Division Commander for further review ~~within 72 hours~~.

- ~~D.G.~~ The Support Services Division Commander or designee shall be responsible for conducting an annual analysis of all use of force incidents, policies, and practices within the Agency. The analysis ~~will~~ shall be forwarded to the Chief of Police upon completion.

#### VIII. Use of Force (Serious Bodily Injury or Death)

- A. Responsibilities and Duties of Involved Officer(s)

1. When deadly force is used and results in an injury, or when a weapon is discharged in a deadly force encounter, upon first opportunity after the scene is secured, the Officer(s) shall immediately:

- a. ~~When a firearm is involved,~~ Secure or holster any firearms involved ~~the weapon,~~ without unloading or reloading ~~it~~ them
- b. Determine the physical condition of any injured person and render first aid
- c. Request emergency medical aid and a Supervisor
- d. Notify the ~~Communications Center~~ Whitfield County 911 Center of the incident and location; ~~and~~
- e. ~~Detain~~ Identify and secure all witnesses

2. Unless injured, the Officer(s) ~~will~~ shall remain at the scene until the arrival of the appropriate Investigators. However, if the circumstances are such that the continued presence of the Officer(s) at the scene might cause a more hazardous situation to develop (e.g., violent crowd), the ranking commanding Officer at the scene shall have the authority to instruct the Officer(s) to move to another, more appropriate, location.

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3. The Officer(s) shall protect his / her weapon for examination and submit it to the appropriate Investigator.
4. The Officer(s) shall provide a public safety statement of the incident when requested.
5. The Officer(s) shall not discuss the case with anyone except:
  - a. Supervisory and assigned investigative personnel
  - b. The assigned District Attorney
  - c. His / her attorney and / or mental healthcare professional

B. Responsibilities and Duties of First Responding Officer(s) on Scene

1. **Neutralize** **Manage the** scene **to** ensure that **the scene** it has reached a level of control such that there is no longer a threat of harm to citizens, Officers, or suspects.
2. Provide for the immediate medical attention of all persons injured.
3. Secure the scene(s) of the event(s). To the extent possible, use crime scene tape to secure any area that may contain evidence pertinent to the events being investigated. **adding** An additional outer perimeter **may be necessary to secure the scene.**
4. Assign sufficient personnel to prevent improper entry **of beyond** the perimeter.
5. Remove the involved Officer(s) from the center of the scene to a discreet area, such as a police vehicle (do not place the Officer in the backseat).
6. Secure and segregate all witnesses to the event, including involved Officers of **Dalton–Police** **this** Department and other law enforcement agencies.

C. Supervisor's Responsibilities

1. Ensure **the that** Officer(s) and others, if injured, are receiving medical attention.
2. Check on the well-being of involved Officer(s), and summon any necessary support programs, **such as Department Chaplains.**
3. Allow / assist **the** Officer in calling family member(s); ensure notifications are made to the Officer's family.
4. Immediately assume the role of Incident Commander and utilize the Incident Command concept until otherwise relieved of Incident Command. Notify **the** Chief of Police and Command Staff.

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5. Ensure that the first responders have completed the above listed duties.
6. Notify the hospital of any incoming injured.
7. Determine the resources necessary for the circumstances, including a prolonged presence at the scene.
8. Assign a scribe to document all personnel present and the mission of each person entering the scene.
9. Assign Officer(s) to accompany injured Officers, suspects, and / or victims to the hospital.
10. Notify and brief surrounding agencies, if necessary.
11. Brief arriving Investigators and ranking Officers.
12. Ensure all required reports are completed.

D. Investigative Responsibilities

1. Investigative responsibility will be assigned to either the Georgia Bureau of Investigation (G.B.I.) or the Dalton Police Department's Investigation Division (C.I.D.) at the discretion of the Chief of Police or his / her designee. If the Chief of Police or his / her designee requests the G.B.I.'s assistance, then the G.B.I. ~~will~~ shall assume control of the entire investigation and will collect all evidence, conduct all interviews, and coordinate media releases related to the facts of the investigation. If the investigation is assigned to the Department's Criminal Investigations Division, the lead Investigator ~~will~~ shall be responsible for ensuring a thorough investigation occurs, including the collection and securing of all evidence.
2. The Investigator may:
  - ~~1~~.a. Discreetly secure all weapons and replace, if appropriate, with another weapon
  - ~~2~~.b. Be involved in interviews of Departmental personnel and witnesses

E. Interview with Officer(s)

1. After the scene is safe, and if possible, a public safety statement ~~should~~ shall be given by the involved Officer(s) to either a Supervisor or the lead Investigator. Each Officer involved ~~should~~ shall provide a separate statement. The statements may be oral or written and ~~may~~ shall be provided at the scene if exigent circumstances exist. The public safety statement should include:
  - a. Circumstances surrounding the incident
  - b. Any information on outstanding suspects, vehicle descriptions,

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weapons used, etc.

c. Witnesses to the incident

2. If not already done so, the Officer(s) involved should then be escorted from the scene to a safe location as determined by a Supervisor or Investigators. Officers' vehicles and any other equipment deposited or dropped at the scene during the encounter ~~will~~ shall be left in place to aid in the investigation. Officers ~~will~~ shall, however, retain all necessary equipment for their safety.
3. Officers involved in a use of deadly force situation shall be escorted to a Department-approved medical facility and required to submit to a drug screen.
- ~~3.4.~~ A comprehensive or cognitive interview with the involved Officer(s) should be conducted no sooner than 24 to 48 hours after the incident, unless there are extenuating circumstances and authorized by the Chief of Police. During a criminal investigation, the Officer(s)'s participation is voluntary and ~~they he / she~~ may request an attorney ~~if they wish~~. If the G.B.I. is investigating, ~~they may offer~~ the Officer(s) may be offered an interview immediately. The Officer(s) may participate immediately or request the interview after the 24 to 48 hour period, if ~~they he / she~~ wishes to give ~~their his / her~~ statement.
- 4.5. Prior to the comprehensive interview, a walk-through of the crime scene ~~should~~ may take place under similar lighting conditions to those that existed at the time of the incident, if possible, to preserve the environmental context. Video of the event may be used in lieu of or in addition to a walk-through. During the walk-through, conversations with Investigators should be avoided to prevent possible contamination of the involved Officer(s)'s memory record.

F. Media Contact

If the investigation is conducted by the Georgia Bureau of Investigations, ~~they~~ GBI shall ~~will~~ issue media releases and ~~will~~ coordinate such releases with the Chief of Police. If ~~the Dalton Police Department~~ CID Investigators conducts the investigation, then, upon approval of the Chief of Police, comments given to the news media ~~will~~ shall be limited to the basic facts of the incident without speculation or expression of opinion. Efforts ~~will~~ shall be made to protect the identity of the Officer(s) involved pending the investigative results and notification of family members.

G. Treatment of Officer

1. In every instance in which an Officer(~~s~~) uses deadly force, and where such use results in death or serious bodily injury to another person, the Officer(~~s~~) ~~will~~ shall be placed on administrative leave with pay, pending investigation.

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2. The Officer(s) shall ~~be~~ remain available at all times for official interviews and statements regarding the case and shall be subject to recall to normal duty at any time after the preliminary investigation.
3. Assignment to administrative leave with pay shall be non-disciplinary with no loss of pay or benefits.
4. Administrative leave with pay serves two purposes:
  - a. To address the personal and emotional needs of Officers involved in the use of deadly force in which injury or death occurs; ~~and~~
  - b. To assure the community that all the facts surrounding such incidents are fully and professionally explored and verified.
5. The Officer(s) shall undergo an evaluation by ~~the Department designated~~ a mental healthcare professional ~~approved by the Department~~. If recommended by the mental healthcare professional, the ~~employee will~~ Officer(s) shall attend any recommended counseling, ~~or other~~ treatment, or therapy.

IX. **Distribution of Use of Force Policy**

All sworn personnel shall be issued a copy of, and be instructed ~~in~~ on, this policy before being authorized to carry a firearm.

X. **Agency Review**

The Chief of Police shall designate an Agency member to conduct a critical incident review of all intentional firearm discharges, in-custody deaths or serious injuries, or ~~when an injury~~ injuries that results in hospitalization. This review shall result in a written report, ~~and~~ specifically address the following issues, and make a specific determination whether:

- A. The force, control, and / or restraint was consistent with ~~the~~ Agency's policy
- B. There are any issues requiring a re-evaluation of Agency policy and / or procedures
- C. There are any training needs identified
- D. The equipment provided by the Agency was adequate; ~~and~~
- E. Supervisory / Officer(s) involvement was within policy

It is the policy of the Dalton Police Department to allow civilian personnel **that are not members of this** ~~outside the~~ Department to ride as observers in police vehicles upon proper request and authorization.

### II. Guidelines

- A. ~~Non-Department individuals~~ Any person, not a member of this Department, wishing to ride as an observer in a police vehicle ~~must~~ shall complete a ~~waiver~~ ride-along application ~~packet~~ (Appendix A) and submit it to the respective Watch Commander for approval at least twenty-four (24) hours in advance.
- B. ~~All individuals~~ Any person wishing to ride as an observer in a police vehicle must be at least eighteen (18) years of age, unless ~~he / she is~~ a member of the Explorer Program or ~~to meet~~ fulfilling an educational requirements from an approved school curriculum. All Dalton Police Explorers ~~wishing to ride must~~ shall comply with the requirements of ~~policy~~ GO93-4.18, Ride-Along Program - Explorers. ~~All individuals~~ Any person wishing to ride for ~~an~~ educational requirements must receive approval from the Patrol Division Commander or his / her designee at least forty-eight (48) hours in advance.
- C. The following categories of persons ~~will~~ shall not be allowed to ride as observers: persons with known felony convictions; ~~persons with~~ mental incompetencets; persons with medical problems; or other persons disqualified by the Chief of Police. Prospective ride-along observers ~~will~~ shall be the subject of a criminal history check through Department files and NCIC/GCIC. The ride-along file ~~will~~ shall also be checked to determine the number of times an individual has ~~already ridden~~ rode along during the year.
- D. In every case, the needs of the Department and availability of resources ~~will~~ shall determine whether a request to ride as an observer is approved. Priority ~~will~~ shall be given to applicants intended for criminal justice coordination, news media, education research, ~~and~~ or similar purposes.
- E. Only experienced Officers or Supervisors should be selected to escort civilian observers.

- F. If an observer interferes with operations or police actions, the ~~driver~~ Officer shall ~~will~~ return the observer to the place of departure and advise the Supervisor of the circumstances.
- G. All program participants are required to reflect a neat and clean appearance and are expected to pay for their own meals and refreshments.
- H. If an Officer with a civilian observer responds to an emergency call, which has a high probability of being life-threatening to the observer or may expose him / her to undue risk of injury, the Officer is to direct the observer to remain in the patrol ~~unit~~ vehicle. In all other incidents, the observer may exit the patrol unit with the Officer or remain in it at his / her discretion.
- I. Observers are not permitted to carry weapons, including firearms, batons, Taser or stun guns, pepper sprays, or knives, ~~a firearm~~ while riding along, unless they are certified Georgia peace officers in good standing.
- J. Observers are limited to periods of ~~eight (8)~~ four (4) hours per ride-along, unless otherwise authorized by the Patrol Division Commander. ~~and no more than three (3) ride-alongs per year, unless otherwise authorized by the watch commander.~~
- K. Observers are limited to riding along no more than three (3) times per calendar year, unless otherwise authorized by the Patrol Division Commander.
- L. While participating in a ride-along, no observer is allowed to enter into a residence or any other location where a reasonable expectation of privacy exists.
- M. Audio and video recordings shall not be allowed by any observer during a ride along, unless authorized by the Patrol Division Commander. Cameras or video recorders are not to accompany any observer during the ride along, unless authorized by the Patrol Division Commander.

## GEORGIA CRIME INFORMATION CENTER AWARENESS STATEMENT

O.C.G.A. §35-3-38 establishes criminal penalties for specific offenses involving obtaining, using, or disseminating criminal history record information except as permitted by law. The same statute establishes criminal penalties for disclosing or attempting to disclose techniques or methods employed to ensure the security and privacy of information or data contained in Georgia criminal justice information systems.

The Georgia Computer Systems Protection Act (O.C.G.A. §16-9-90 et. seq.) provides for the protection of public and private sector computer systems, including communications links to such computer systems. The Act establishes four criminal offenses, all major felonies, for violations of the Act: Computer Theft, Computer Trespass, Computer Invasion of Privacy, and

Computer Forgery. The criminal penalties for each offense carries maximum sentences of fifteen (15) years in prison and/or fines up to \$50,000.00, as well as possible civil ramifications. The Act also establishes Computer Password Disclosure as a criminal offense with penalties of one (1) year in prison and/or a \$5,000.00 fine.

The Georgia Criminal Justice Information System Network is operated by the Georgia Crime Information Center in compliance with O.C.G.A. §35-3-31. All databases accessible via CJIS Network terminals are protected by the Computer Systems Protection Act. Similar communications and computer systems operated by municipal/county governments are also protected by the Act.

I. **Policy**

It is the policy of the Dalton Police Department that incidents involving emergency evacuations ~~will~~ shall be conducted safely and efficiently to ensure the safety of Officers and citizens.

II. **Definitions**

- A. ~~The~~ Incident Command System (ICS) - A model for the management of critical incidents and other emergencies that provides a common, uniform approach to the command and management of emergencies at the local, county, and state levels. The incident command system will be used for single-agency responses, single-jurisdiction / multi-agency responses, and multi-jurisdiction / multi-agency emergency and disaster responses.
- B. Hazardous material incident - A spill or release into the atmosphere of chemicals of a toxic or volatile nature, which are hazardous to human life or the environment.
- C. Natural disaster - ~~is defined as~~ An event related to some atmospheric or seismic event, such as flooding, tornadoes, high winds, or earthquakes.

III. **Procedure**

- A. The decision to evacuate portions of the city may depend on several variables. The decision ~~should~~ shall be based on the specific incident, the level of perceived danger, and the ability to safely evacuate the area(s) in question. ~~Since~~ Every situation that may require evacuations cannot be identified; therefore, this policy is intended to provide guidance in situations where the need to evacuate an area has been determined, and specifically applies to policy GO92-6.2, Hazardous Materials Incident Response; III, D.
- B. The ~~line~~ Watch Commander or any other Supervisor has the authority to initiate an evacuation. In cases of hazardous material releases, the Supervisor ~~should~~ shall confer with the Incident Commander of the fire department in accordance with policy GO92-6.2, Hazardous Materials Incident Response; III, D, 1-2.

~~B.C.~~ The Incident Command System, or ICS, ~~will~~ shall be used to manage all evacuations. ~~and~~ The type of emergency shall determines which agency is responsible for the Incident Commander. For example, Incident Command for criminal investigations, such as hostage situations or bomb threats, shall be the responsibility of this Agency. However, situations involving fire or hazardous materials shall be the responsibility of the Dalton Fire Department.

~~1. hostage situation or bomb threat, would be the Police Department~~

~~2. fire or hazardous materials spill, would be the Fire Department~~

~~C.D.~~ Duties and Responsibilities

1. Watch Commander or Supervisor:

- a. On the radio, identify that he / she is the Incident Commander. Depending on the scope of the situation, other sections of the Incident Command System should be staffed (Operations, Planning, Finance, Logistics).
- b. Notify the appropriate Division Commander, and give periodic updates of the situation.
- c. Establish a command post in a safe area that will allow monitoring of all operations via sight, radio, or other communication methods. If the incident involves hazardous materials, report to the fire department command post.
- d. Identify the possible area(s) to be evacuated (evacuations caused by hazardous material release will require conference from the fire department incident commander) using the beat and zone designations.
- e. Evaluate the situation to determine whether the Automated Emergency Notification System should be activated. All activations shall be in accordance with policy GO06-6.7, Automated Emergency Notification System.
- f. Determine what additional personnel and resources may be needed, and make the necessary notifications. If other resources are needed, establish a staging area for all reporting resources. This will require that someone be delegated to manage the staging area and any reporting resources.
- g. Immediately, contact another ~~Police~~ Department Supervisor to assume command of all other law enforcement services under ICS during the evacuation procedures.

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- h. Contact the ~~Department Public Relations Specialist~~ City of Dalton Communications Director to ~~act as a liaison with media~~ assume the role of Public Information Officer as outlined in the Incident Command System. If the Communications Director is not available, a Supervisor or Command Staff member shall be designated the Public Information Officer.
  - i. If necessary, request the assistance of other agencies by notifying the Whitfield County Emergency Management Agency (EMA) Director.
  - j. Determine a safe location for evacuees to assemble to await further information and / or receive medical ~~triage~~ treatment.
  - k. ~~Contact the Dalton / Whitfield~~ Request the Whitfield County EMA Director contact the American Red Cross of Northwest Georgia to determine shelter location(s), if needed.
  - l. If the need exists, assemble evacuation teams and assign specific zones within beats that are to be evacuated. If other agencies are involved with evacuations, one ~~Dalton Police~~ Department member should be assigned with other personnel in order to maximize coverage and knowledge of the geographic jurisdiction. A team leader should be assigned.
  - m. Maintain communication with all evacuation team leaders, and note what areas have been cleared using the beat and zone designations.
  - n. After determining it is safe to do so, ~~assign~~ contact the ~~Public Relations Specialist~~ Public Information Officer to ~~contact~~ request all media sources to notify community members that re-entry of the affected area(s) is permissible.
2. ~~Law Enforcement Services~~ Operations Section ~~Chief~~ Commander
- a. Immediately respond and assume command of all law enforcement services, not directly related to the evacuation, until relieved by the Incident Commander.
  - b. Plan for additional resources if necessary.
  - c. Assist the Incident Commander as needed.
3. Evacuation team members / leader
- a. All personnel shall maintain contact with ~~their~~ assigned team members.

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- b. Document the zones visited and cleared, and report the information to the team leader.
  - c. Notify the team leader of any special circumstances, problems encountered, or additional equipment needed.
  - d. Team leaders shall maintain communication with the Incident Commander and give regular updates on the situation.
  - e. Once all team assignments are completed, team members shall report to the staging area, unless dispatched directly to another task / area.
4. Public ~~Relations Specialist~~ Information Officer
- a. Respond immediately to the command post for a briefing by the Incident Commander.
  - b. Gather the necessary information for release to the community via media resources.
  - c. In coordination with the Incident Commander, contact the Whitfield County EMA Director for activation of the emergency broadcast system.
  - d. Establish a media briefing area, and arrange for regular media updates, as necessary.
  - e. Do not release new information without coordination with the Incident Commander.
  - f. If multiple agencies / jurisdictions are involved, coordinate media responses jointly, if necessary.
- ~~D.E.~~ Units ~~will~~ shall patrol the evacuated areas, as safety dictates, to prevent looting or unauthorized re-entry.
- ~~E.F.~~ All personnel authorized to enter the incident area ~~will~~ shall be directed to enter through the staging area as established by the Incident Commander. All personnel must access the incident through the staging area.
- ~~F.G.~~ No law enforcement personnel ~~will~~ shall be assigned or allowed to enter areas determined to be contaminated with hazardous materials without proper personal protective equipment.
- ~~G.H.~~ If necessary, the Incident Commander or his / her designee ~~should~~ shall coordinate with Whitfield County Animal Control ~~Department~~ for evacuation and boarding of pets or other animals.

#### IV. Deactivation

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- A. When the Incident Commander determines that the evacuated areas are safe to enter, he / she ~~will~~ shall coordinate ~~with the Public Relations Specialist to~~ release of that information to the media / public.
- B. All evacuation team members must check out through the staging area in order to achieve accountability of all personnel.
- C. The Incident Commander ~~will~~ shall provide a briefing to his / her Division Commander immediately after completion of the operation. ~~and~~ A written after-action report shall be completed in a timely manner.

I. **Policy**

It is the policy of the Dalton Police Department to provide guidelines for the training and use of a Rapid ID digital fingerprint devices.

II. **Definition**

*Rapid ID Device* – A handheld, wireless, two-fingerprint identification solution that searches against a centralized fingerprint database. The database is populated with arrests made in Georgia. The system enrolls four fingerprints, with two fingerprints being used for an identification match. As part of the identification check, automatic secondary searches of wanted files, watch lists, sex offender registries, and probation / parole lists are also included.

III. **Purpose**

The Dalton Police Department strives to provide its members with the most current, cutting-edge technology in the effort to apprehend criminals and provide the community of Dalton a safe environment.

IV. **Procedure**

A. Training

1. A Rapid ID device ~~will~~ shall only be ~~issued to~~ operated by members that have had documented training on the operation of the unit.
2. Training ~~will~~ shall include, at a minimum:
  - a. Setup and maintenance procedures
  - b. Proper use guidelines
  - c. Legal issues ~~involved with~~ surrounding the use of the Rapid ID devices

- d. Reporting requirements
  - e. The GCIC Terminal Operator Inquiry-level Course
- B. Password Protection

Before being authorized to use a Rapid ID device, users shall obtain a unique username and password.

C. Usage Guidelines

1. A Rapid ID device may be used in situations where the subject to be fingerprinted has given a knowing and willing voluntary consent or permission for the member to use the device. This may include consent given during lawful encounters.
  - a. As with other forms of consent, the consent can be limited or withdrawn at any point by the subject.
  - b. If consent is withdrawn, use of the Rapid ID device is not authorized, and its use must stop immediately. Members shall not force or coerce anyone to submit to the scan.
2. A Rapid ID device may be used in situations where the subject to be printed would otherwise be required to give traditional fingerprints, such as after an arrest for a criminal or traffic offense.
3. Use of the Rapid ID device for random or generalized investigation or intelligence gathering, with no focused case or other legitimate reason, is not authorized.
4. Any specialized, non-standard use of a Rapid ID device shall require notification of and authorization by the ~~member's immediate~~ Watch Commander or other Supervisor. Examples of non-standard use may include:
  - a. A request from an outside agency to fingerprint a suspect in custody. This may be permitted as long as the requesting agency complies with the procedures set forth in this policy.
  - b. A death or homicide investigation in which there is no other identifying paperwork for the victim
  - c. To identify an unconscious or otherwise incapacitated subject who cannot be identified by any other means
5. Guidelines cannot be written to encompass every possible application for the use of a Rapid ID device. Members, therefore, ~~should keep in mind~~ shall consider the guidelines set forth in this policy to assist them in deciding whether the device may be used or not.

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6. Members are expected to be able to justify, based on these guidelines, training, experience, and assessment of the circumstances, how they determined that use of a Rapid ID device was justified.
7. Supervisors ~~must~~ shall directly monitor the usage of a the Rapid ID device.

D. Documentation

Each time the Rapid ID device is utilized, the user shall document the occurrence in an incident report, regardless of whether or not an identification is made of the subject that was scanned. Each report shall include the circumstances leading up to the usage of the device and any actions taken as a result.

### **Overview**
