6. Roberta & Rusty Dutson; Application to Appear, Sewer Back-Up
Action: Discussion/Consideration for Approval

Rusty Dutson addressed the Mayor and City Council. There was a sewer line back-up that occurred on July 2nd and damage was caused to carpet in Roberta Dutson's home. Dutson is requesting reimbursement for the cost to replace the carpet, stating that it is currently around \$3100, but that could increase. Due to the emergency nature of the incident and the Delta City 4th of July Celebration taking place, an outside contractor was hired by Delta City to replace sewer lines to prevent anything further from happening. Attorney Anderson stated that this request by Dutson's could possibly be put through on an insurance claim with Delta City's insurance; Council Member Killpack agreed that it should be addressed with Delta City's Insurance provider and go from there. Mayor Bogue asked Deputy Recorder, Angie Dewsnap, to follow up with the Delta City's insurance.

Council Member Killpack stated that this annexation policy brings a partnership between county and city in preparation for future potential growth. Devan Fowles, with Jones & DeMille, stated that it is much better to proactively plan than to reactively plan and this document is a proactive plan for organized, responsible growth of Delta City. Fowles also stated that the Annexation Policy Plan is considered a living document, as it can be amended as long as it stays within state statute and remains a proactive management of growth.

A copy of the finalized plan will be sent to both Millard County and the State of Utah.

Council Member Taylor MOVED to approve Ordinance 26-337, Annexation Policy Plan, subject to the amendment of paragraph 2 on page 31 in regards to selling vs. acquiring. Council Member Carter SECONDED the motion. Mayor Bogue asked if there were any questions or comments regarding the motion. There being none, he called for a roll call vote.

13. Mayor KC Bogue; Ordinance 26-340, Appeal Authority Assignment

Action: Discussion/Consideration for Approval

Attorney Anderson explained to the Council that Ordinance 26-340 updates the Appeal Authority Appointments to meet state requirements. The City Council cannot act as a municipality's Appeal Authority. This Ordinance gives authority to the Mayor, with the advice and consent of Council, to fill any vacancy for the Appeal Authority. The individual or group of individuals must be appointed through resolution. Attorney Anderson will share some possible recommendations with Mayor Bogue.

Council Member Carter MOVED to approve Ordinance 26-340, Updates to Appeal Authority Appointments. Council Member Killpack SECONDED the motion. Mayor Bogue asked if there were any questions or comments regarding the motion. There being none, he called for a roll call vote.

14. Mayor KC Bogue; Creekstone Energy Proposed MOU

Action: Discussion/Consideration for Approval

Mayor Bogue asked Steve Styler to briefly talk about the MOU that Creekstone Energy is proposing to Delta City. Styler stated that the MOU is nonbinding and is a request for water from Delta City that would be for culinary purposes. The three items that would be binding is the max ceiling of 85 acre

feet, citizens of Delta City have priority, and Creekstone would bear all expense of needed infrastructure. Creekstone is not currently with the geographic water service area for Delta and a possible annexation could be initiated, although there is not currently a plan nor is a petition being initiated tonight. Styler stated that Delta has approximately 2995-acre feet of water and is currently using approximately 1400-acre feet each year; he said that the requested acre feet is a fraction of the existing surplus of water.

Council Member Kelly Carter added that Delta City does have an ordinance that states that Delta City water cannot be used for energy generation. He also stated that annexation is a must as he will never agree to sending Delta City water outside of the city's water service area again. Council Member Killpack agreed, stating that annexation would be necessary for any type of agreement. Council Member Huber questioned the number of personnel, to which Styler stated that they will be starting with a higher number to begin with.

Mayor Bogue opened the meeting for public comment.

Tom Chandler stated concerns with being in a 20-year mega-drought that is getting worse. He commented "if it sounds too good to be true..."

Jason May introduced himself as a Delta City resident for comment. He stated that if there is a cap on what water is agreed on, Delta City then has the power to monitor and control that.

Ray Conley asked citizens to please reach out, as this is just an idea and all questions will be answered before the proposed MOU is agreed on.

Warren Peterson addressed the Mayor and Council about IPP and it having been 94% of the tax base; the tax base is a very important piece of annexation and this MOU. Annexation into Delta City would give all controls and knobs to Delta City rather than Creekstone.

Steve Styler stated that the energy generation identified in the MOU would be specifically for fire suppression.

Debbie Visser introduced herself to the Mayor and Council. She stated that there have been inconsistencies and changes every time Creekstone speaks. She specifically mentioned the promise of Creekstone bringing their own water, no uses of municipal services, and the change of energy details. Visser stated that 85-acre feet of water for the first phase is too high. She shared her calculation that for culinary only water, it would be more like .067 acre feet of water and that the cap should be much lower than the requested 85-acre feet, even accounting for a cushion. Visser reiterated that Creekstone originally promised their own energy and their own water.

Edria Day addressed her concerns with Creekstone having well-water and now back-tracking on that. Ray Conley, with Creekstone, stated that there will be no well if annexation with Delta city occurs. Day expressed concern with connecting to the power grid and the increase in utilities for citizens. Mayor KC Bogue explained that Delta City does not have anything to do with the power grid for Creekstone, this meeting is for input on the proposed MOU and water.

Council Member Kelly Carter explained that no conditional use permit was granted by Delta City; Millard County approved and data centers are coming. Delta City was handed this by the county, and it is the responsibility of the Mayor and Council to do what is best for the City in moving forward.

Cindy Butler introduced herself to the Mayor and Council, she stated that she has timestamps from January 20th showing what was originally stated and that Creekstone changes things every time they address anyone, it is natural, she added that people have a fear of the unknown and this increases every time Creekstone talks and something has changed. Butler added that power generation is not fire suppression, and that yes, Delta City has a water reserve, but that water reserve should be used

for farmers and agriculture. Ray Conley addressed Butler's concern of power generation not being fire suppression and stated that when engine rooms are built there are a variety of procedures, systems, and operations that happen and the entire process is referred to as power generation.

Delta City Attorney, Jessica Anderson, read from the Delta City Code restricting water from being used "...for the purpose of driving motor, siphon, turbine or other wheels, or any hydraulic engines or elevators, or for driving or propelling machinery of any kind whatsoever, nor shall any license be granted or issued for any such purpose except by special permission of the City Council."

Visser reiterated that with her calculations, .5 acre-feet is needed per household and that there are many more uses of culinary water for a household than for a commercial business. Shane Church shared that there is a state required amount of culinary water for commercial buildings.

Deb Christensen addressed the Mayor and Council with concerns that every city near a data center has had significant increases on their utilities and the negative impact this is having on families. Christensen also had questions about the developer that wanted to build near the old cheese plant area.

Council Members Killpack and Carter both added that the developer always pays for impact on the water system and that all infrastructure is also paid by the developer, Delta City does not cover these costs.

Joe Clark took the podium and stated that water cannot be used for power for IPP and also asked Creekstone about approaching land-owners about purchasing water. Mayor Bogue reiterated that this meeting is specifically about the proposed MOU and Delta City, it is not about questions to Creekstone outside of this scope.

Justin Louder shared with the Mayor and Council that every interaction he has had with Creekstone's representatives has been positive. Louder said his questions have been answered with dignity and he pointed out the irony he sees as those who are utilizing Facebook and the Internet to express their opinions is the exact medium that the data centers are needed for. Louder stated that the opportunity for Delta City to annex and capitalize on this would be increasing revenue for Delta City rather than Millard County and to him, it is a no-brainer. Louder added that farmers cannot support their family or make money unless they have other jobs, government support, or generational wealth. He stated that the data centers are coming, they have already been approved, and he encouraged Delta City to capitalize on it.

Matt Ward introduced himself to the Mayor and Council as a resident of Hinckley. Ward stated that it was his understanding that the annexation policy that was adopted tonight is identifying a corridor of future economic activity; Delta City wants to grow residentially to the Northeast and Commercially or Industrially to the Southeast. Ward added that there were recently a couple of local business owners that were right on the border with Delta City and Millard County, but they did not have the money for the infrastructure needed, nor did Delta City. Ward stated that based on the developer covering the infrastructure costs while also creating a substantial tax base, Delta City could be set up for 100 years and he encouraged the Mayor and City Council to give Creekstone serious consideration.

Larry Dutson addressed the Mayor and Council expressing his thoughts on Delta City wanting the tax base. Mayor Bogue added that property taxes are what build Delta City's budget and yes, this would greatly increase Delta City's revenue.

Darlene Webb asked that each member of the City Council share how they feel personally about the proposed MOU with Creekstone. Mayor Bogue stated that each would have an opportunity after hearing all the public comments.

Lori Williams spoke to the Mayor and City Council expressing that she takes her voting rights very seriously and that she puts her trust in the Council as they work through complex issues on behalf of the citizens of Delta City; believing that they want what is best for the future of Delta City.

Council Member Huber asked Creekstone Representatives about their plan to initiate annexation into Delta City. Chase Sheffield stated that Creekstone is willing to immediately file a petition requesting annexation. Steve Styler expressed that annexation is in Creekstone's best interest, as well. Ray Conley addressed the Council stating that if they research and see that this causes rates to go up, then the Council should reject it.

Council Member Stefanoff shared that she is very nervous about the verbiage in this MOU and that she wanted to make it very clear that Delta City is not selling water. Creekstone will get a water and utility bill just like other residents. Stefanoff also stated that if she were to build a home, it is required that she acquire 1-acre foot of water regardless of whether she will actually use it or not, and the same goes for commercial and industrial businesses. Stefanoff stated that annexation would be a necessity if an MOU is put into place. Stefanoff added that the City Council will absolutely do its due-diligence in researching and making a decision that they feel is in the best interests of Delta City.

Council Member Taylor stated that he started out very hard against this whole idea and was disappointed in comments that have been made by citizens on social media. Creekstone has been generous in sponsorships and funds for various events in Delta City and have been open about meeting with citizens to answer any questions. Taylor added that yes, annexation would be crucial in moving forward; and that he sees the possibility of Creekstone being the IPP of this generation.

Council Member Nick Killpack stated that drought and water use is a huge concern with where we live and what is at our disposal. The goal would be to minimize water use and have the ability to regulate that use. Killpack added that Delta City is not selling water and that it is vital that the Council implement due diligence regarding water rights. Killpack stated that the Council's job is to protect Delta City's interests and to make sure water is being used judiciously. He agreed that 85-acre feet is a ton of water; however, he compared the tax base of his business, Service Drug, and the tax base that the data centers would bring relative to the amount of water used and he believes this would be a significant tax base increase relative to water usage. Killpack stated that the structure of any contract or agreement would need to see Delta City and its citizens reap the benefits. He would like the Council to implement due diligence in working with experts in water and legal contracts.

Council Member Brian Huber shared that part of his definition of citizenship is that individuals can govern themselves. He stated that we want to have control of our future. This pairing is not only in the best interest of Creekstone, but also a myriad of future businesses to come. If concerns arise, citizens need to come to the Council with those concerns and trust that the Council will take these concerns seriously and go to the businesses to work together to resolve the issues.

Council Member Kelly Carter stated that we live in an agricultural community; however, industry is what builds tax revenue. Carter added that IPP ran Millard County for 40 years and there needs to be another industry that can support going forward. There will be a huge impact on Delta City's system, and Delta City's water will be used for Delta City 100%; therefore, without annexation this does not happen. Carter stated that citizens complain about roads being rough, drains being rough, the cost of homes being too high and the way to improve these things is through tax revenue.

Mayor KC Bogue addressed the Council and community in attendance sharing that Delta City has been working on a water study for over a year and until that is finalized and studied by the Council, nothing can move forward. This must be navigated based on the findings of that water study.

Ray Conley shared his observation that people have lost a lot of trust in government, and he encouraged individuals to do their own research from a variety of sources. The largest benefit that

comes to a community from these data centers is significantly increased tax revenue and that this should be lowering taxes for every citizen. Conley expressed gratitude for the input and asked that anyone who has any questions at all please bring those questions forward and get them answered.

Council Member Killpack MOVED to table and continue research and discussion regarding the Creekstone Energy Proposed MOU, including public work sessions, as needed and obtaining the findings of the Delta City Water Study. Council Member Carter SECONDED the motion. Mayor Bogue asked if there were any questions or comments regarding the motion. There being none, he called for a vote.

15. Mayor KC Bogue; Employee Personnel Policy, Compensatory (COMP) Time Moratorium & Public Works On-Call Personnel

Action: Discussion/Consideration for Approval

Mayor Bogue presented his request concerning a moratorium on employee compensatory (COMP) time and reducing the number of on-call Public Work Employees. There is a Personnel Policy Committee made up of Delta City Employees Chelsea Hathaway, Rebecca Peterson, and Derek Nielson that have been tasked with going over the Employee Policy Handbook/Personnel Policy. Council Member Nathan Taylor has already been asked to be a part of this and Mayor Bogue asked for a second Council Member who could be involved. Council Member Brian Huber stated that he would be willing to do so, and Mayor Bogue accepted.

Council Member Taylor MOVED to approve a moratorium on compensatory time and a trial period for one, rather than two, Public Works Employees on-call. Council Member Huber SECONDED the motion. Mayor Bogue asked if there were any questions or comments regarding the motion. There being none, he called for a vote.

Motion made by Council Member Taylor, Seconded by Council Member Huber.

16. Council Member Updates

Action: Discussion only

Mayor Bogue thanked the Fire Department and Fire Chief Travis Stanworth on the amazing fireworks show to close out the 4th of July holiday celebrations.
