

Dear U.S. Department of Transportation RAISE Grant Selection Committee,

The Enhancing Multimodal Connections in Dyersville Project is a connectivity-focused project that will build new key multimodal connections, creating a sustainable and resilient transportation network in this rural lowa community. Two new roadway bridge connections will be implemented to reduce the impact of flood and rail blockage events. These new connections will create reliable access for the community – currently lacking – through additional network linkage and eliminating an at-grade rail crossing. New trail segments provide connected bicyclist and pedestrian opportunities and connect to a new Electric Vehicle charging station. This project will reduce emergency response times and support tourism and economic vitality. The City of Dyersville is submitting a RAISE request of \$25 million. Without an investment from the U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT), this generational investment in Dyersville is impossible.

As the USDOT considers applications for RAISE Discretionary Grants, the City of Dyersville wishes to acknowledge a local commitment of \$4,868,500 to deliver this project. These matching funds will include contributions from the City of Dyersville for real property (in-kind), dedicated and experienced project staff to provide oversight and administration of this project (in-kind), General Obligation Bonds (cash), and Tax Increment Financing Funds (cash).

In-kind contributions

\$375,000: The real property contributions to the project have appraised value and will be limited to the property incorporated into the project limits.

\$234,500: The staff in-kind contributions will be limited to the direct contributions of the City and consultant staff to provide administrative oversight to deliver this project.

\$4,250,000: The cash portion of the local match has no restrictions in use or timing and is ready to be committed upon award of an FY2025 RAISE Grant to fund the remainder of the project and cover unanticipated cost overruns.

This local commitment is representative of 84 percent federal/16 percent local cost share and is evidence of our dedication to our community and our planned future through the delivery of the Enhancing Multimodal Connections project.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN CITY OF DYERSVILLE, IA AND DUBUQUE REGIONAL HUMANE SOCIETY

This Agreement, dated for reference purposes the <u>1st</u> day of <u>February</u>, <u>2025</u>, is made and entered into by and between the <u>City of Dyersville</u>, ("City") and the <u>Dubuque Regional Humane Society</u> ("DRHS") located in <u>Dubuque</u>, <u>IA</u>.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS AGREED BETWEEN THE PARTIES HERETO AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. TERM.

The term of this Agreement is from <u>February 1, 2025</u> through and including <u>June 30, 2025</u>.

SECTION 2. SHELTER AND EQUIPMENT.

- **2.1** DRHS must provide the Shelter and all equipment in the Shelter necessary for the operation of an animal shelter in accordance with the terms of this Agreement and the laws and administrative rules of the State of Iowa.
- 2.2 Section 162.2 of the Code of Iowa defines a "Pound" as a facility for the prevention of cruelty to animals operated by the state, a municipal corporation, or other political subdivision of the state for the purpose of impounding or harboring seized stray, homeless, abandoned, or unwanted dogs, cats, or other animals; or a facility operated for such a purpose under a contract with any municipal corporation or incorporated society. Section 162.3 mandates registration for all pounds. The Dubuque Regional Humane Society will maintain current pound registration as required to perform this function.
- 2.3 DRHS must maintain the Shelter in a clean and sanitary manner and must not permit any condition to exist that might constitute a public nuisance.
- **2.4** DRHS must manage and operate the Shelter and provide proper and adequate housing and feeding for all animals, pursuant to this agreement, which come into its custody.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN CITY OF DYERSVILLE, IA AND DUBUOUE REGIONAL HUMANE SOCIETY

SECTION 3. PRIOR TO DELIVERY.

- 3.1 Any stray animal brought in by a City of Dyersville Police Officer will be examined by the officer for any apparent injury or illness. In the event that the officer believes the animal is suffering, then the police officer will ensure that the animal is treated by a veterinarian prior to delivery to the DRHS.
- 3.2 If an animal boarded at the DRHS for the City appears, in the judgement of the DRHS, after arrival, but prior to the time limits established in Section 6 of this contract appears to be suffering excessively from an apparent injury or illness, the DRHS may have the animal examined and treated by a veterinarian. The veterinarian's treatment will be approved by the City prior to being performed. The cost of the examination and treatment will be billed directly to the City of Dyersville by the veterinarian and will be paid in a timely manner.

SECTION 4. MONTHLY FEE.

As compensation to DRHS for providing the services herein specified during the term of this Agreement, City will pay DRHS during the term of this Agreement a monthly fixed fee per animal as provided herein.

- **4.1** The City shall pay \$135 per dog and \$95 per cat to the Dubuque Regional Humane Society for the contracted services provided by the DRHS.
- 4.2 The DRHS shall provide to the City a monthly statement that will include the total number of animals handled by the DRHS that were brought in as strays by law enforcement officers of the City of Dyersville, and also those unvaccinated dogs and cats being confined after biting someone in the City of Dyersville.
- **4.3** If an owner of a City dog or cat claims said animal at the DRHS, the DRHS shall collect an impoundment fee from them on behalf of the City. The impoundment fee will be \$135 for dogs and \$95 for cats. The impoundment fee will then be subtracted from the amount owed by the City on the monthly statement.
- **4.4** The statement balance shall be paid to the DRHS within 30 days of receipt of the statement.

SECTION 5. ADDITIONAL FEES.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN CITY OF DYERSVILLE, IA AND

DUBUQUE REGIONAL HUMANE SOCIETY

- **5.1** DRHS may retain a daily fee charged to an animal owner for keeping animals received from a City of Dyersville police officer, as well as all daily fees charged to an animal owner for services not within the scope of this Agreement per the public fee schedule in place at that time.
- 5.2 If an unvaccinated dog is kept at the DRHS for rabies observation, the City shall pay \$100 per animal for medical examinations plus the current daily care fee. Such fees shall be exclusive of, and in addition to, the compensation provided to the DRHS under section 4 of this agreement.

SECTION 6. HANDLING OF IMPOUNDED ANIMALS.

- **6.1** City of Dyersville Police Department shall be responsible for notifying the owners of registered dogs and cats that are being held at the DRHS.
- 6.2 DRHS may not dispose of any impounded, licensed cat until at least five (5) days after the notice to the owner, and any impounded, licensed dog until at least seven (7) days after the notice to the owner has been made as required by Title 7 of the City of Dubuque Code of Ordinances.
- 6.3 DRHS may not dispose of any impounded, unlicensed dogs or cats until at least three (3) days after the date of the impoundment.
- **6.4** Notwithstanding the foregoing, DRHS may, in its sole discretion, at any time, euthanize vicious dogs or other vicious animals, if DRHS determines such dog or other animal constitutes a danger to the public or to DRHS's employees or staff. Feral cats may be disposed of immediately.

SECTION 7. RELEASING IMPOUNDED ANIMAL.

7.1 In compliance with lowa code which mandates vaccinations and licensing obligations, those animals adopted from the DRHS into lowa or Illinois will not be released until the animals are current on rabies vaccinations or arrangements made to ensure compliance with this requirement.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN CITY OF DYERSVILLE, IA AND DUBUQUE REGIONAL HUMANE SOCIETY

SECTION 8. INSURANCE.

DRHS shall provide the City with a certificate of its liability insurance coverage in an amount of not less than \$1,000,000 with an insurance company licensed to do business in the State of Iowa. The DRHS shall name the City as an additional insured under said policy.

SECTION 9. TERMINATION.

This Agreement may be terminated by either party without cause after providing sixty (60) days written notice to the other party by certified U.S. mail.

SECTION 10. COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS.

DRHS must comply with all applicable laws, ordinances and codes of the Federal Government, the State of Iowa, and the City of Dubuque.



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Rural Dyersville, Iowa, seeks \$25,000,000 in Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development (BUILD) grant funds to implement the Enhancing Multimodal Connections in Dyersville Project. This generational investment in rural Iowa will enhance the quality of life, improve resiliency, and increase safety by building connections for vehicles, pedestrians, cyclists, and emergency response personnel. This project involves three distinct components, including bridges that cross the North Fork Maquoketa River and Bear Creek; an overpass that eliminates an at-grade Canadian National (CN) Railway crossing; and miles of wide, accessible trails that connect neighborhoods and parks with commercial hubs. Each component is described in **Figure 1**.

The project is the culmination of more than 12 years of research, public involvement, and planning, and its components are the foundational elements necessary for the City of Dyersville (City) to provide consistent, reliable, and accessible, multimodal connections and access to services and opportunities. Dyersville, a rural midwestern city of roughly 4,500 people, sits in the heart of northeast lowa along U.S. Highway 20 (US-20). The City is steeped in history and heritage and is most famous as home to the iconic "Field of Dreams" movie site. The City's blend of natural beauty, cultural attractions, and small-town charm make it a baseball tourist mecca, hosting more than 275,000 visitors a year. Dyersville's natural topography includes the convergence of two waterways: Bear Creek and the North Fork Maquoketa River. These waterways overtop routinely and create an isolating natural barrier. Flash flooding is a continual concern, and the City has spent decades trying to manage the flooding impact on the community.

The City requested assistance from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to evaluate flood reduction alternatives. The 2004 "Initial Assessment Report for Flood Damage Reduction" (CWIS No. 179046) recommended Dyersville pursue raising roads, constructing larger drainage structures, implementing a flood-warning system, developing a watershed management plan, encouraging citizens to move out of the floodplain, and using floodplain areas for recreational amenities. Since this report, the City has invested in implementing all these suggestions as flood frequency and severity have continued to increase.

The City's planning efforts have grown beyond flood mitigation and include a hazard mitigation plan (2011), visioning and transportation plans (2011, 2012), regional and local comprehensive plans (2013, 2018), a housing study (2017), a watershed vision plan (2021), a Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities study (2024), and numerous smaller traffic, structural, environmental, economic development, and tourism studies and reports. These plans have identified the critical connectivity components included in this application as top priorities. In addition, these efforts revealed opportunities to support community growth and development. The 2018 Comprehensive Plan was the catalyst for the City's investment in the preliminary design of critical road and bridge projects and the preservation of necessary right-of-way.

The improvements constructed as a part of this project will build resilient, sustainable infrastructure that supports all residents and the additional 275,000 tourists that visit each year. The completed trail network will also connect to the 30-mile regional Heritage Trail. Roadway and pedestrian facility improvements will support tourism related to the "Field of Dreams" movie site. The City is partnering with a non-profit group, currently implementing \$55 million of improvements, including a new professional baseball park to be completed by 2026, which will increase tourism traffic even more. Dyersville Events Inc. baseball officials sponsoring the project noted in a statement that in 2024, 367 baseball teams representing 23 states came to play in tournaments in the Dyersville area, a 240 percent increase over the previous year.¹

Detailed Scope of Work

The Enhancing Multimodal Connections in Dyersville Project involves three components, detailed in **Figure 1**. Completed construction of all components is anticipated by the end of 2028 if funding is awarded.



Existing Transportation Challenges

The CN Railway line creates multiple railroad conflict locations. The nearest grade-separated crossing is 5 miles west of Dyersville. When the railroad blocks primary routes, emergency medical services (EMS) do not have direct secondary routes in the community. Floods and railroad closures force extended detours. Dyersville has experienced six major flood events since 2000, isolating residential neighborhoods and vastly extending EMS response times. Lack of bicycle and pedestrian facilities and connections limit safe multimodal transportation options. Currently, funding to support the implementation of this project is not sufficient.

Proposed Project Component Solutions

Component 1 — North-South Connection (7th Street SW to 1st Avenue W, Beltline Overpass) The new North-South Connection is the first critical flood-resilience project corridor. The corridor would include the following:

- A new bridge, road, and trail over Bear Creek that aligns with the existing 7th Street SW in the form of 518-foot-long, multispan, prestressed concrete beam (PPCB) bridge, which also includes realignment of Bear Creek for conformance with the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) requirements for floodway conveyance, clearance of the paddle trail, and no-rise criteria.
- A new urban roadway and trail overpass that eliminates an at-grade crossing of Beltline Road and the CN Railway. This includes a 32-foot-wide roadway with 10-foot-wide multiuse trail with 1-foot shoulders and a 110-foot-long, single-span, steel girder bridge over the CN Railway.
- New roundabout to raise and realign the intersection of 7th Street SW, 1st Avenue W, and Beltline Road while also reducing vehicle conflict points and crash risk.

In combination, these corridor elements do the following:

- Create a reliable linkage between the southwest and north side neighborhoods and adjacent industrial area, even during flood events
- Establish a secondary north-south route that supports emergency service access in case of accidents or train blockage of US-52
- Provide access to areas of Dyersville that have historically been completely cut off from emergency services and other vital access during flood events
- Create the first, and only, grade-separated railroad crossing within 5 miles of Dyersville
- Connect Dyersville's trail system to the 30-mile-long regional Heritage Trail

Project development of Component 1 is approximately 20 percent complete, including the establishment of the bridge type, size, and location. Active coordination with DNR related to the floodplain accommodations are progressing. It is anticipated that coordination with the Federal Emergency Management Agency on a Conditional Letter of Map Revision (CLOMR) will need to be conducted as well.

Component 2 — East-West Connection (13th Ave SE to 12th Ave SW)

The new East-West Connection is a second critical flood-resilience project identified during planning work and will create a reliable multimodal link and critical EMS connection among the southwest neighborhoods, hospitals, fire, and police. Preliminary design is complete, and the right-of-way is owned by the City.

This new corridor connects 13th Avenue SE and 12th Avenue SW over the North Fork Maquoketa River and includes the following:

 511-foot-long, multispan, PPCB primary bridge and 232-foot-long PPCB secondary bridge to meet the conveyance requirement and no-rise criteria established by Iowa DNR and the height requirements for the established paddle trail. The new roadway elevation is currently





modeled to provide access for emergency services up to the 100-year flood elevation to provide additional local system redundancy during flooding events.

- 34-foot-wide roadway with a protected 10-foot-wide multiuse trail with 1-foot shoulders.
- Roadway lighting.
- New urban curb and gutter roadway section with storm sewer and subdrains.

Environmental field studies have been completed, and the Categorical Exclusion documentation is currently underway, with overall project development progressed to 30 percent complete for Component 2. Concurrence on methodology has also been received from DNR for the hydraulic modeling for conformance to requirements for floodway conveyance, clearance of the paddle trail, and no-rise criteria and is ready to advance to the CLOMR process.

Component 3 — Community Trail Connections (multiple locations)

This project fills major gaps in the City's existing bicycle and pedestrian network. Planning efforts have consistently identified the need for a cohesive multimodal network. In 2018, 52 percent of the Dyersville community identified "improving and increasing active transportation" as a planning priority (2018 Comprehensive Plan). The biggest gaps in the trail network are addressed in this project. The addition of wayfinding signage will encourage these alternate travel methods and allow for accessible, easy-to-navigate transportation options in the City.

An additional 2.5 miles of trails, wide sidewalks, and buffered bike lanes will be added at key areas to complete both north-south and east-west connections across town and include crosswalks, accessible ramps, and some pedestrian signals. This additional 2.5 miles of dedicated path will build out the transportation network, unlocking unrestricted access to an additional 30 miles of regional trails. These areas, outlined in **Figure 1**, include the following:

- 13th Avenue SE between 6th Street SE and the east end of the new East-West Connection.
 Pedestrian traffic control signals at the US-52 intersection will include Americans with Disabilities-compliant ramps.
- Dyersville Park Trail, a new segment from the west end of the East-West Connection bridge along the river, terminating at Candy Cane Park and the existing trail network.
- 12th Avenue SW from the west end of the East-West Connection.
- 7th Street SW, including bike lanes painted between 12th Avenue SW and the south end of the proposed bridge over Bear Creek and sidewalks to fill gaps between 9th Avenue SW and the south end of the Bear Creek bridge.
- Beltline Segment, a new trail along Beltline Road connecting to 2nd Street NE.

The development of Component 3 is 10 percent complete. Cost has been estimated off conceptual plans. PCE is anticipated for National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) decisions.

Project History and Community Engagement

The City has invested heavily in the development of the project components since 2018. In that time, the City has developed conceptual and preliminary design for the project components, conducted public involvement, and initiated NEPA review. Additionally, Dyersville has organized public engagement efforts through presentations and public discussion at public meetings and hearings and interviews with key residential organizations. In addition to traditional input methods, the City contracted with a professional public involvement consultant to conduct demographic analysis and targeted outreach to senior populations and service providers to understand travel patterns and unique challenges to inform the project design. The Demographic Profile and Transportation Access Impacts Report is included as Appendix C.





Project Location and Census Geography

The project is in Dyersville, Iowa, a rural city located in eastern Delaware County and Western Dubuque County, which have a combined population of 116,228. The project has components in both counties. A project location KMZ file is included as a project file attachment.

While many rural communities are shrinking, Dyersville's population grew by 10 percent from 2010 to 2020 (from 4,000 to 4,500 citizens), and nearly 20 percent of the city's population is over the age of 65.

The project location is primarily located in Census Tract 105, with a small portion in Census Tract 9501. This is not an area of persistent poverty, as designated by the U.S. Department of Transportation. While Dyersville is not an area of persistent poverty, there are pockets of the community where poverty is present. The northwest corner has consistently had around 11 percent of households living below the poverty level in the past 12 months. Providing access to community resources, emergency services, housing and job options, schools, recreational activities, and regional trails will allow Dyersville to grow in a manner that supports all groups in the community.

Merit Criteria Narrative

Rural Dyersville has evolved from its farming roots to support a diverse community with expanded industrial, tourism, and outdoor recreation opportunities. The City of Dyersville (City) has repeatedly been impacted by major flooding and has turned that challenge into an opportunity to create a proactive plan for a more resilient and connected future. The Enhancing Multimodal Connections in Dyersville Project incorporates targeted engagement of at-risk road users, such as seniors and children, to inform east-west and north-south multimodal connectivity projects and trail connectivity. These elements are part of a multifaceted approach to ensure a resilient, accessible, and connected Dyersville for future generations.

The existing transportation network in Dyersville has large gaps that increase travel times, restrict access to community services, and inhibit non-vehicular use. The proposed project fills these gaps to create a more complete transportation network that provides reliable access for all residents and visitors while also maintaining connections to all neighborhoods during emergencies and flood events. These new and improved routes through the community will create connections that do not currently exist and strengthen the existing roadway network by adding accessible bicycle and pedestrian facilities and wayfinding enhancements.

Safety

Safety is a primary purpose of the project. This project offers clear, direct, and significant benefits to protect non-motorized travelers and incorporates design-based engineering solutions consistent with the National Roadway Safety Strategy Plan and the Safe Systems Approach. The City, in collaboration with Iowa Department of Transportation's (Iowa DOT) goals in the Strategic Highway Safety Plan, continually strives toward zero deaths on all public roadways.





Vulnerable Roadway Users – The City's existing transportation network is discontinuous for motorists and even more so for pedestrians. Many local roads do not include sidewalks or dedicated bicycle lanes, causing those walking or biking to frequently enter the roadway and increasing the potential for conflict with general traffic and tragic loss of life. The Issues and Concerns section of the City Council's 2020 Goal Setting Report lists "Many streets have no sidewalks – especially needed on major pedestrian routes (6th Street, 8th Avenue SE)" and "Most existing sidewalks are non-compliant with ADA – many are so bad

pedestrians prefer to walk in the street." The Dyersville fire chief noted that the regularity of onstreet pedestrian traffic in these residential areas has affected responder's preferred routes and speeds to areas in town, increasing response times. The addition of wide sidewalks, trails, buffered bike lanes, signage, and Americans with Disabilities (ADA) enhancements will improve safety for people biking, walking, or using other micromobility devices. This affects Dyersville residents,



thousands of tourists who visit the "Field of Dreams" movie site each year, and users of local schools and parks.

A 10-foot-wide side-path trail will be constructed along the north side of 12th Avenue SW, creating a physical separation from vehicles with a curb and grassed setback and concrete barrier on proposed bridges.

Along 7th Street SW, a 6-foot-wide sidewalk will be constructed along the east side of the street, and on-street bike lanes will also be present to fill in sidewalk and bike trail network gaps that currently mix modes of traffic. This will enhance multimodal transportation by creating a safer method of travel through this corridor. Safer travel options for pedestrians and cyclists could result in fewer injuries and fatalities and reduced greenhouse gas emissions in rural lowa.

Crash Reduction – The current roadway system lacks primary and secondary access routes for vehicles to travel safely to and from various City quadrants. As a result, local traffic must often use U.S. Highway 20 (US-20) and lowa Highway 136 (IA-136), which are the principal arterial routes for freight in eastern lowa. This reduces safety and efficiency for all involved. US-20 is a 65-mile-perhour, 4-lane divided highway on the south edge of Dyersville with average daily traffic volumes greater than 15,000 vehicles per day. The lowa DOT Crash Analysis Tool reports that from 2015 to 2020, Dyersville has had 194 crashes, resulting in 46 injuries. Seven crash locations in the city along US-20 and IA-136 are ranked among the top 18 in rural Dubuque County. The proposed enhancements to the local roadway network are expected to avoid approximately 1.37 crashes per year (on average) due to additional vehicle routes and mode-shifting, as documented in the Traffic and Safety Study, attached as Appendix B.

Canadian National (CN) Railway Crossing – The existing at-grade railroad crossings in the City disrupt regular traffic flow and create potential conflicts among vehicles, bicyclists, pedestrians, and trains. On average, there are seven daily train movements that cause a standstill on US-52 for up to 10 minutes. Several instances of extended crossing closures for repairs and stalled trains have caused extensive delays, including a complete closure of seven days in both 2020 and 2021 for crossing maintenance. When a closure or blockage occurs, emergency response access is also blocked without alternate routes. Additionally, 35 percent of freight on CN is chemicals and allied

products (fertilizer), and the crossing elimination reduces risk of railcar spill and/or vehicles carrying hazardous materials crashing.²

The North-South Connection creates the only grade-separated railroad crossing in the City and surrounding area, which will eliminate queuing and delays at the railroad crossing and improve emergency service response times to the north side of the city. In addition, the Crimson Leaf Estates Mobile Home Park neighborhood will no longer be cut off from community services and amenities by the railroad and/or traffic on Beltline Road.

Emergency Response Times – The existing gaps in Dyersville's transportation network are a struggle for the community. These gaps become critical during floods, which have severed access between east and west sides of town and isolated some neighborhoods in the northwest from emergency services, as shown in **Figure 3**. The key gap is the lack of a direct route between the fire and emergency medical services (EMS) station in the southeast and the neighborhoods in northwest Dyersville.

"I walk five miles a day, but I have to plan my path very carefully to make sure I have sidewalks and safe places to cross. I'd walk more places, but things aren't connected."

Southwest Dyersville is home to a disproportionate number of senior residents; 25 percent of Dyersville's residents live here, but more than 42 percent are more than 65 years old. Southwest Dyersville is also the location of the area hospital, MercyOne Medical Center, which is a 20-bed critical

access hospital that serves 17 rural communities in Dubuque County. The City's fire department and EMS provider, Bi-County Ambulance, are 100 percent staffed by volunteers who drive to the station on Dyersville's southeast side before deploying to emergency call sites. In 2023, the fire department and EMS team responded to a total of 212 emergency calls. Of the 112 EMS responses, 94 involved transportation to MercyOne. The average response time to southwest Dyersville is 12.8 minutes. The proposed East-West Connection will reduce this response time by nearly 50 percent and improve response times throughout the community.

The proposed improvements create new and reliable links between neighborhoods while maintaining access during floods. In addition, the new sidewalk and trail routes will reduce pedestrian conflict with emergency service vehicles. The multimodal connectivity components of this project will also increase direct access to the City's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) shelter, located at Dyersville Elementary School.

Environmental Sustainability

Environmental sustainability and resiliency are primary purposes of the project. This project offers clear, direct, and significant benefits of greenhouse gas (GHG) reduction and transportation-related air pollution.

Reduced Travel Time – New roadways and bridges will decrease the average travel time on US-20, IA-136, US-52, and across town on secondary roads, thus reducing fuel consumption and mobile source air toxins and emissions. These traffic flow improvements will minimize the associated stop-start conditions, decrease transportation related air pollution, and decrease GHG by 2,069.3 metric tons by 2049.

Mode Shift to Non-Motorized Travel – The bicycle and pedestrian network contains critical gaps that make walking or biking for daily activities difficult for those with mobility limitations. The addition of sidewalks and bike lanes and closing the critical gaps at the waterways through multimodal bridge infrastructure will remove the barrier to residents' ability to use non-motorized travel more frequently, with an estimated increase of 6.9 percent in non-motorized trips. This shift from single-occupancy vehicles to walking, biking, and electric micromobility devices in the City generates reductions of carbon and other air pollutants and improves health outcomes for users through reduced exposure to elevated levels of air and noise pollution.

Strengthening Community Access – The northwest part of Dyersville is bisected by the railroad, creating limited access to the elementary school, the park system, downtown, and east side commercial areas. The railroad also disconnects many residents from the major employment centers on the north and south side of the community by an at-grade rail crossing and major highway. Westside Park, the main community gathering place for youth sports activities, is not easily accessible from this area on foot due to a lack of sidewalk or trail connectivity from the mobile home park.

The bicycle and pedestrian network contains critical gaps that make walking or biking for daily activities difficult for those with mobility limitations. The addition of sidewalks and bike lanes and closing the critical gaps at the waterways through multimodal bridge infrastructure will remove the barrier to residents' ability to use non-motorized travel more frequently, with an estimated increase

of 6.9 percent in non-motorized trips. This shift from single-occupancy vehicles to walking, biking, and micromobility devices in the City generates reductions of carbon and other air pollutants and improves health outcomes for users through reduced exposure to elevated levels of air and noise pollution.

The proposed North-South Connection would provide a critical link connecting the residential and industrial areas north of the railroad to the residential, educational, and medical areas south of the railroad. Addressing the critical gaps, completing the sidewalk network, and increasing pedestrian paths will improve the quality of life for the residents and visitors in these areas.

Reducing Emissions – With nearly 300,000 annual visitors, Dyersville, like the state of Iowa, is a transportation crossroads. As more travelers use EVs for both intra- and interstate travel, it is crucial to have sufficient charging infrastructure to meet demand. The development of this infrastructure will help Dyersville remain competitive, contribute to reduced future emissions, and spur economic growth. Providing alternative green fueling options with a Direct Current Fast Charging (DCFC) two-port charger will directly align with the U.S. National Blueprint for Transportation Decarbonization and provide proof for rural community use.

Vehicle miles traveled will be reduced by (on average) 814,971 miles per year after the project opens, and transportation-related air pollution and GHG emissions are expected to decrease with this project by 2,070.0 metric tons, primarily in carbon dioxide, by 2049, reducing transportation-related air pollution and GHG emissions in this area with a high concentration of underserved residents. Local traffic along Beltline Road will be reduced as a more direct connection is provided in the community at the East-West Connection. Additionally, the construction of the North-South Connection bridge over the rail crossing and installation of a roundabout and improved traffic flow will reduce noise and air pollution from truck idling.

The reduction in vehicle miles traveled along this roadway combined with reduced idling from the elimination of the at-grade rail crossing and installation of a roundabout at 1st Avenue SW will reduce the exposure to elevated levels of air, water, and noise pollution for residents in this area.

Flooding Resiliency


Dyersville has a mix of land uses, compact and walkable development patterns, accessible green space, and neighborhood centers, but Bear Creek and the North Fork Maquoketa River are natural barriers between these areas. Additionally, Dyersville's expected building loss rate, or economic loss to building value resulting from natural hazards each year, is in the 92nd percentile. Dyersville's expected population loss rate, or fatalities and injuries resulting from natural hazards each year, is in the 91st percentile.

The proposed bridge and trail projects eliminate these barriers while supporting restoration and preservation. In addition, the bridges are designed to be traversable during a 100-year flood event, which creates a critical and reliable connection for the community during a flood event.

According to the FEMA National Risk Index, all census tracts in Dyersville are "Resilience Disadvantaged," indicating that they are vulnerable to hazards caused by climate change. This designation has been warranted, as the City has received six flood-related national disaster



Figure 3. Existing Community Divisions During Flood Events




declarations, approved by the President of the United States, since 2000. These frequent extreme weather events cause water in the North Fork Maguoketa River to rise and overtop its banks, and these types of flood events are expected to increase due to climate change impacts. Flooding washes over roads and creates residential islands. The 1st Avenue W neighborhood is often cut off from the remainder of town for days until the floodwaters recede. Flood-related issues typically last 2 to 4 days, with

floodwaters typically receding between 6 and 24 hours after the event, and cleanup taking an additional 24 to 48 hours after waters recede. Neighborhoods in the southern portion of the City only have US-20 as a viable travel option. In the north side neighborhoods, the only viable route is a 4.75-mile detour along IA-136 to Floyd Road and to Christoph Road. The lack of alternative routes and accessibility alienates segments of the community, creates unnecessary hazards, and extends emergency response times considerably.

The proposed improvements will provide additional resilient routes to sustain Dyersville's connectivity. Flooding impedes the flow of traffic, erodes soils, and weakens asphalt. Rising temperatures also soften asphalt, creating ruts and potholes. These impacts reduce the life cycle of local roadways. The City plans to build resilience with construction materials and design approaches that can physically withstand impacts from increased extreme weather events.

Dyersville is in the process of implementing a Comprehensive Flood Mitigation Plan that includes climate change-related flood mitigation measures, including stream realignment, wetland restoration, native riparian buffers, and in-stream practices in Bear Creek and the North Fork Maquoketa

River. The City recently received funding from FEMA's Building Resilient Infrastructure for Communities program to continue its significant and extensive mitigation work on these tributaries. The project will complement this work and provide resilience through connectivity.

As flooding is expected to increase, in addition to mitigation efforts, Dyersville has planned for adaptation measures, including bridge installations where floodwaters have previously impeded emergency response access. The flood mitigation and adaptation work are uniquely connected to the project because the proposed bridges will travel over the floodplains, ensuring transportation connectivity during flooding events and protecting the recently restored wetland habitats.

Native Habitat

Dyersville plans to incorporate native vegetation and educational opportunities into the completed project. Following recommendations from the <u>lowa Living Roadways</u> program, the finished projects plan to include vegetation to re-establish native prairie plants and other similar vegetation along new roadways. The project will also provide access to wetlands and other environmental areas through the multiuse trails. As part of the prairie habitat restoration, the City will incorporate this information into the environmental education programs that are under development for the adjacent wetlands.

Quality of Life

Quality of life is a primary purpose of the project. This project offers clear, direct, and significant benefits to increase affordable transportation choices through the expansion of active transportation options and access to daily destinations.

Transportation Options

The project includes pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure enhancements that provide opportunities to use alternative modes of transportation safely for both recreational and transportation purposes. The trails, wide sidewalks, and on-street bicycle infrastructure provide improved opportunities for commuters to safely and comfortably walk and bike or use emerging micromobility modes. In the downtown district, ADA-compliant ramps will be added to enable equitable access to businesses.

The community's largest senior and assisted living housing, Ellen Kennedy Living Center (EKLC), is located on Dyersville's southwest side. This area makes up just 25 percent of the population but is home to 42 percent of its residents over 65 years old. During a workshop to address transportation access challenges with EKLC residents, 50 percent of the attendees reported they can no longer drive but continue to walk at least 2 miles daily for personal wellness. During a similar workshop with attendees of a senior exercise class at the James Kennedy Library, all attendees were able to drive, and 63 percent of attendees reported they currently walk for exercise or to their daily destinations. All the attendees at both events cited a desire to walk for more of their daily activities, but gaps in pedestrian infrastructure pose challenges for seniors with and without vehicles. Concerns were related to lack of sidewalk connectivity, crossing distances, insufficient sidewalks widths for multiple users (cyclists and pedestrians), and high speeds combined with low visibility at specific intersections.

By expanding freedom to make transportation decisions, more Dyersville households may be able to forego car ownership or maintain one vehicle rather than two or more. According to the Center for Neighborhood Technology, creators of the Housing + Transportation Index, the Regional Typical



Household in Dyersville owns 2.11 cars and drives them 23,485 miles per year. Transportation costs are considered affordable if they are 15 percent or less of household income, or \$9,455/year for the regional typical household. In this location, estimated driving costs for a household are \$16,599/year, or 176 percent above what is considered affordable. Low- and moderate-income residents are acutely impacted by these high transportation costs and have a greater financial incentive to use non-car modes when they are present.

While Dyersville is not an area of persistent poverty, there are pockets of the community where poverty is present. The northwest corner of the community consistently has approximately 11 percent of households living below the poverty level in the past 12 months. To understand some of the challenges facing these residents in accessing community services, the Dyersville Rural Food Pantry shared data for summer and fall of 2023 related to transportation barriers. In a review of the summer and fall client list and schedules, more than 30 percent of the clients served reported they either had to find a ride to the pantry or have someone else pick up food for them. In 2023, the Dyersville Rural Food Pantry moved to a larger location in an industrial area, across the train tracks from most residential areas. Prior to the move, there had been clients who walked to pick up their food. The current location of the pantry highlights the lack of transportation access and the barrier to new community residents who need access to services. The proposed 7th Street SW connection would provide a critical link connecting the residential areas south of the train tracks to the new food pantry location and directly benefit residents in need of food pantry services without vehicle access.

Further, the ability to safely and comfortably bike and walk promotes community cohesion and a sense of pride as neighbors meet each other along the trails and sidewalks on their way to school, to work, to visit a friend, or to the park.

Access to Daily Destinations

The project improves transportation options and expands access to essential services by creating a secondary, local route for both motorized and active transportation modes to meet daily needs.

The East-West Connection and additional trails and bikeways provide connections among the commercial retail development along US-52, residential areas on both sides of the North Fork Maquoketa River, Candy Cane Park, existing trails, MercyOne Medical Center, EKLC, and Dyersville Elementary School. The proposed trail to Candy Cane Park will connect to an existing trail system that leads across the North Fork Maquoketa River to Westside Park and downtown Dyersville.

The biking and walking improvements along 7th Street SW and the bridge over Bear Creek also connect Dyersville Elementary School and EKLC with additional residential areas, on both the south and north sides of Bear Creek.

The Beltline Overpass over the CN Railway will provide access to the north side industrial area and residential neighborhood along with a second route for local traffic through the City.

The proposed project will enhance a sense of community by building structures that create new connections between neighborhoods and maintain connectivity during extreme weather events. This enhanced connectivity will also help promote neighborhood development by leveraging opportunities for mixed-use developments. The proposed improvements will help to move traffic



more efficiently across town, providing greater opportunity to enjoy leisure activities and reducing stress during commute times.

Improves Mobility and Community Connectivity

The project has primary purposes of significantly increasing mobility and expanding connectivity for all users in Dyersville by creating new system-wide multimodal connections across the North Fork Maquoketa River, Bear Creek, and the CN Railway and by enhancing existing roadways with trails, sidewalks, bikeways, and ADA-compliant access to

businesses. Two-thirds of the senior residents over 80 years old interviewed during the Dyersville Transportation Access Study reported that they were limited in their ability to drive alone, making improvements to pedestrian infrastructure especially beneficial for this segment of the community. Senior residents are disproportionately located in the southwest neighborhoods of Dyersville. From this area, access to downtown is limited to those able, comfortable, and willing to drive on the highway to reach many community amenities. EKLC residents noted pedestrian challenges at intersections along 12th Avenue that will be addressed by the East-West Connection. The completion and upgrade of the incomplete sidewalk network to a 10-foot separated path will address a critical gap for pedestrian access.

When paired with the proposed increase in other pedestrian paths and wayfinding, these connections will improve quality of life for the concentration of senior residents in this area. This complete street approach to transportation improvements is consistent with the Dyersville Comprehensive Plan and advances the City's goals of ADA compliance and accessibility, particularly on community corridors, through universal design principles of equitable use and hazard minimization. This approach accommodates all users while creating a safe and interconnected walking and biking network that links community destinations. A robust, well-connected multimodal network encourages users to move freely throughout town.

These connections would create a regional connection to both the "Field of Dreams" movie site and the Heritage Trail system. The Heritage Trail covers nearly 30 miles from the Mississippi River town of Dubuque to Dyersville. The trail passes through the deeply carved valley of the Little Maquoketa River, historical sites, and small farming and former mining communities, providing a central element of travel through the region.

Economic Competitiveness and Opportunity

Economic competitiveness and opportunity are primary purposes of the project. This project offers clear, direct, and significant benefits to increase transportation reliability, facilitate tourism, and promote locally inclusive opportunities for economic development.

Transportation Reliability

The proposed projects will provide opportunities for local traffic to move more efficiently on new roadways. Key infrastructure in Dyersville is already stressed with the increasing traffic volumes associated with regional population growth. That traffic has continued to grow with the recent



rerouting of US-52 onto IA-136 through Dyersville. Transportation models indicate that these roads will operate at level of service (LOS) D by 2040 without the recommended improvements to provide local trips with high-quality local roads. LOS D indicates that traffic is approaching unstable flow levels, increasing the likelihood of traffic incidents and associated delays. Like driving through an urban highway during commuting hours, this LOS is not acceptable for roadways in a small, rural town such as Dyersville. The construction of the new east-west and north-south connections will provide alternate options for local travel, remove congestion from US-20 and US-52, allow goods and people to move more efficiently, and improve efficiency for regional and national shippers.

Enhancing Tourism

"Field of Dreams" Movie Site – In 1988, the fantasy sports movie "Field of Dreams" was filmed in Dyersville on the century-old Lansing family farm. The movie, centered around redemption for baseball players banned from the Chicago White Sox after the 1919 World Series scandal,

transformed the farm's cornfield into an iconic baseball diamond, now a renowned pop culture destination.

Despite being 35 years since the movie's release, the site still attracts more than 250,000 visitors annually.

Capitalizing on this cultural legacy, Major League Baseball (MLB) inaugurated the "MLB at Field of Dreams" baseball game in 2021, with the first game between the Chicago White Sox and New York Yankees. The event continued in 2022 with a game between the Cincinnati Reds and Chicago Cubs.

Dyersville is the home of the "Field of Dreams" movie site and an economic hub in eastern lowa.

In 2021, Dyersville hosted the first Major League Baseball game in Iowa and will continue to host professional games on a recurring basis.

This MLB event drew more than 275,000 visitors in 2021 alone, and it offers significant economic opportunities for Dyersville, prompting the City to focus on downtown revitalization efforts. Projections indicate that the annual event will generate more than \$10.45 million in direct spending and support 81.6 full-time equivalent jobs annually, benefiting hotels and restaurants across eastern lowa. A non-profit group has finished the design of a \$60 million professional

ballpark to be constructed in 2024 and completed in 2026 to host annual MLB ball games. To further enhance the site's appeal, an \$80 million youth baseball-softball complex is under construction, featuring nine fields, dormitories, and a hotel, with completion slated for 2027. Additional amenities, including a year-round indoor field house, recreational vehicle park, inclusive playground, and jogging trails, are expected to be completed by 2029. These enhancements aim to attract more families to the region, generating more than \$32 million in direct spending annually and supporting more than 250 jobs. As tourism in Dyersville expands, the proposed mobility improvements will address increased traffic demands during both special events and the tourism season, facilitating active transportation connections.

Heritage Trail – The Heritage Trail is a 29.4-mile-long recreational trail connecting Dyersville to Dubuque. The trail attracts tourists who enjoy the scenic views and natural experiences along farms, small towns, and greenways. Because the west end of the trail is in Dyersville, the City often serves as a trailhead for the start or end point of the trail experiences. Users venture into town to eat and rest and rely on the City's biking and walking infrastructure to complete those trips. Expanding the trail system in Dyersville will enable tourists and residents to access and explore more of the City's treasures.

Economic Development and Private Investment


In addition to their functionality in moving people safely and efficiently during big events, new roads, bridges, and trails are critical for this major economic activity center. Enhancing access to and mobility through the City will help improve safety and spur further growth. Additionally, the project provides more efficient rail freight movement through the area by eliminating an at-grade rail crossing and the need for trains to slow down. Infrastructure investment and increased accessibility opens vacant land for economic growth. The North-South Connection's Beltline Overpass, connecting to a light industrial park in Dyersville, is expected to unlock 375 acres for development and create approximately 188 new jobs.

State of Good Repair

State of good repair is a primary purpose of the project. This project offers clear, direct, and significant benefits to create new resilient infrastructure in a rural community that will be maintained in a state of good repair through the existing asset management system.

The project components are part of an ongoing City commitment to maintain the existing infrastructure and minimize local roadway deterioration. The City uses Cartegraph as its enterprise asset management software and works with a third-party consultant to collect pavement condition data and develop the pavement management plan. Using pavement data collected by lowa DOT and processed by the lowa Pavement Management Program, this project will evaluate and combine the two datasets to develop an updated, more comprehensive pavement management plan.





By using Iowa DOT data, the City can have peace of mind knowing the roadway infrastructure is inspected and maintained following industry best practices. Generally, the roadway network is in good condition with a network average City Pavement Condition Index of 70. However, based on historic data, regular maintenance is the most cost-effective way to preserve a roadway network. In addition to the project components, the City will evaluate and improve the existing pavement management program and apply those practices to the new and upgraded infrastructure, including

pavement, bridges, and other assets (e.g., lighting, sidewalks). This includes evaluating deterioration curves for bridge assets and pavement assets in conjunction with lowa DOT and



preparing a comprehensive pavement management program that identifies approved surface treatments and current maintenance capabilities as well as funding availability.

Long-standing agreements will remain in place between Iowa DOT and Dyersville regarding shared maintenance. Specifically, Iowa DOT will maintain US-20 and US-52, and Dyersville will assume responsibility for the new 13th Avenue SE Connection, 7th Street SW Extension, and Beltline Overpass and has committed to maintaining these assets to a state of good repair.

Partnership and Collaboration

Dyersville has worked with many key partners and the public to develop the project, and that input directly informed design. The proposed East-West and North-South Connections are the result of a comprehensive planning effort involving public and private partners. Community participation has included numerous public meetings and interviews with stakeholders.

The City-led project team has made extensive public outreach efforts in developing the proposed scope of work, including at the Dyersville Elementary School, EKLC, James Kennedy Public Library, and Rural Community Food Pantry. The community has hosted numerous public meetings to gather input on ways to improve accessibility. Local leaders, businesses, and residents attended planning workshops and provided feedback on proposed transportation solutions. The City implemented hired a professional public involvement consultant to conduct demographics analysis and target outreach to understand travel patterns and unique challenges to inform project design. The Demographic Profile and Transportation Access Impacts Report is included as Appendix C. The contacts made through this process will ensure ongoing communication throughout the project.

A key element of the Beltline Overpass is that it crosses the CN Railway tracks. The City discussed this project with CN Railway, including sharing preliminary design concepts. CN Railway has agreed in principle to the proposed plans, as noted in the letter of support in Appendix D.

Workforce Development Partnership: Opportunity Dubuque

Dyersville is a member of the Greater Dubuque Development Corporation (GDDC), a regional economic development organization supporting Clayton, Delaware, Dubuque, Jones, Jackson, Grant (Wisconsin), and Jo Daviess (Illinois) Counties. GDDC works to provide workforce solutions to businesses, support existing industry, and attract new businesses to the greater Dubuque region. The GDDC Workforce Solutions team analyzes data and takes the pulse of the regional workforce to create innovative solutions for both employers and job seekers. Opportunity Dubuque is a nationally recognized, collaborative job-training effort through Northeast Iowa Community College for groups who are underrepresented in transportation infrastructure jobs in response to local employer needs for a skilled workforce. Promotion of the Opportunity Dubuque will be implemented during the development of the Enhancing Multimodal Connections in Dyersville Project.



73 percent of enrolled participants completed the semitruck driving certificate.

87.5 percent of enrolled participants completed the building construction and equipment operator certificate.

The Opportunity Dubuque program benefits workers and employers. Participants receive tuition and child-care assistance to complete industry-driven certifications, and employers who sponsor these programs have direct access to hiring the graduates. Opportunity Dubuque supports the following training programs that are relevant to the transportation infrastructure trades: Semitruck Driving (CDL-A) and Construction Equipment Operator certificates. **Table 2** identifies project partners and parties who have been involved in the planning process and are crucial to the proposed project's successful implementation.

As a component of Dyersville's innovative communications strategy scope of work, the communications contractor will coordinate with GDDC to host pre-bid informational sessions in Dyersville featuring Opportunity Dubuque programs related to apprenticeships, CDL-A, and Construction Equipment Operator programs.

A partnership between Dyersville and Iowa DOT will be instrumental in successful project implementation and grant management.

The project has strong cross-jurisdictional support from Iowa Governor Kim Reynolds, Iowa DOT Director Scott Marler, Dyersville Mayor Jeff Jacque, the City Council, Dubuque County Board of Supervisors, Iowa State Representative Shannon Lundgren, Iowa State Senator Carrie Koelker, Iowa Representative Ashley Hinson, and Iowa Senators Charles Grassley and Joni Ernst, among others. Letters of support that the City received directly are included as Appendix D.



In addition to the direct support for these improvements in downtown Dyersville, there is a strong partnership and investment in the "Field of Dreams" movie site, which relies on a robust transportation network in the City to succeed. This development is a collaboration between multiple public and private party investments, including Dyersville Events Inc.; Dubuque County; Travel Dubuque; the Dyersville Economic Development Corporation; the cities of Dyersville and Dubuque; and the State of Iowa. These partners are coming together to establish a vision for a robust future tourism center around the "Field of Dreams" site that will capitalize on continued interest in the area, bringing economic interest and vitality to the region.

Innovation

This project involves several innovative new-to-the-area design ideas and delivery approaches.

Innovative Technologies

Intersection Design – The City's project design includes the implementation of a roundabout as part of the North-South Connection. This will be the first roundabout constructed in Dyersville and will serve as an example for future intersection improvements. The 7th Street SW Extension is close to several residential properties. One design consideration is to incorporate a roundabout in this area to connect 7th Street SW with 1st Avenue W (Main Street) and Beltline Road to reduce delay and improve traffic flow in the area while also improving bicycle and pedestrian safety. This recommendation is the preferred alternative to progress through design.

Innovative Project Delivery

The City will phase this project for delivery, which will include a project bundle for the development and delivery of the trail segments that are not directly within the project limits of the East-West or North-South Connections. These five trail segments have logical independence but are a similar work type, and it will save time and money to bundle them for development and delivery. Project bundling is new to the City, but in this instance, it makes sense and is consistent with the project bundling initiative promoted by the Federal Highway Administration under Everyday Counts – Round 5.

Innovative Community Communications

The City will seek a full-service communications individual or firm for internal and external communications related to the project. The goals of the communications strategy are to ensure the following:

- 1. Intensive outreach to vulnerable road users, including seniors and children
- 2. Timely, accurate, and complete information related to multimodal detours, resident safety, and project progress using multiple platforms
- 3. Clear communication and messaging of resident value and community impact
- 4. Coordinate with GDDC to host pre-bid informational sessions in Dyersville featuring Opportunity Dubuque programs related to apprenticeships, CDL-A, and Construction Equipment Operator programs
- 5. Education and outreach related to safe human-powered transportation, including driver behaviors and bicycle and pedestrian safety
- 6. Bidirectional communication at key project points
- 7. Acknowledgement and celebration of project wins






Costs to complete the following scope of work are included in the project budget and will include planning and strategy, content marketing and management, project management and coordination with construction teams, community and media relations, and creative services for traditional and social media.

Innovative Financing

The City has not had the flexibility to use in-kind match previously, which is what has always kept a project of this scale out of reach. This project budget proposes recognizing three matching elements to this project:

- 1. Cash in the form general obligation bonds
- 2. In-kind real property that will be incorporated into the project limits
- 3. In-kind contributions to the project from City staff

Dyersville is a rural community with limited resources, but the City is dedicated to its portion of the contributions and to the overall success of this project through innovative financing. The City will work in partnership with the U.S. Department of Transportation and the existing guidance on match flexibilities to make this project a reality.

Enhancing Multimodal Connections in Dyersville | Project Readiness

Project Readiness and Risk

The Enhancing Multimodal Connections in Dyersville Project will improve connectivity throughout the city. The project will be delivered in three separate components with logical termini and independent utility and in all likelihood managed under four separate contracts and four separate National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) decisions. These actions have been bundled for resource and delivery efficiency and are expected to be delivered as follows.

Component 1, the North-South Connection, includes the 7th Street SW construction of a new roadway, multiuse trail, and bridge over Bear Creek; construction of a roundabout connecting the Beltline Overpass, 7th Street SW, and 1st Avenue W; and the Beltline Overpass (which involves the construction of a new bridge and multiuse trail over the Canadian National [CN] Railway). Public involvement, NEPA review, and design for Component 1 are currently underway. The next steps include NEPA approval, final design, ROW acquisition, and additional public involvement. This project component is anticipated to let in 2027 as a single contract package.

Component 2, the East-West Connection, includes the construction of a roadway, multiuse trail, and bridge over the Maquoketa River's North Fork. Public involvement, NEPA review, and design for Component 2 are currently underway. The next steps include NEPA approval, final design, ROW acquisition, and additional public involvement. This project component is anticipated to let in March 2027, assuming an agreement can be executed, and final design begins in August 2025.

Component 3, Community Trail Connections, includes additional trails, wide sidewalks, and buffered bike lanes to fill gaps and create a cohesive, connected, accessible, and safe pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure network. Directional wayfinding will also be incorporated to guide users to parks, business districts, the larger regional trail system, and the iconic "Field of Dreams" movie site. Planning and public involvement for Component 3 are currently underway. The next steps include preliminary design, NEPA review, ROW verification and acquisition, and additional public involvement. This project component bundles five trail segments into a single project package for design, NEPA review, ROW verification and acquisition, and delivery. This contract package is anticipated to let for construction in 2027.

Environmental Risk

Detailed Project Schedule

The City of Dyersville (City) is committed to meeting the June 30, 2029, statutory deadline for funding obligation, as well as the September 30, 2034, expenditure deadline. The proposed project can begin quickly upon award of BUILD grant funding, as indicated in **Table 1**. The project includes flexibility to allow unexpected delays of up to 11 months without putting the funding at risk.

The City has sought community input through a presentation and public discussion at a December 21, 2020, City Council meeting and two public meeting presentations and hearings on March 15 and September 22, 2021. The City Council invited the public to attend the public meetings and hearings and offered an opportunity for the public to provide comments on the project, which would be integrated in further design documents. Agendas for these meetings and hearings can be found in the document center on the City's website, located here.

In addition to traditional input methods, the City contracted with a professional public involvement consultant to conduct demographic analysis and targeted outreach to understand travel patterns and unique challenges to inform the project design. communication with residents is maintained throughout the project. There is broad public backing for this project to move forward, as demonstrated by the letters of support.

Required Approvals

The City is in the process of obtaining all required approvals. Though not all documentation is complete, all permitting processes can be accommodated within the project schedule.

Environmental Permits and Reviews

The improvements planned as part of the project will not affect wetlands or habitats and will not impose adverse impacts on environmental or historic resources. The project poses no risk to cultural resources and no federal- or state-listed plant or animal species has been observed along any of the project corridors.

The 13th Avenue SE connection requires a more thorough environmental analysis because channel realignment will be required. The NEPA process is underway and anticipated to be completed in 2027. Before Iowa DOT issues a NEPA CE, the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) must formally confirm that historic resources will not be affected, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) needs to concur that no rare or endangered species will be harmed. It is expected that SHPO and USFWS reviews will be completed in 2025. A CE is also anticipated for the Community Trail Connections. **Table 2** summarizes all permits and reviews and their anticipated timelines.

State and Local Approvals

The proposed improvements are consistent with local and regional plans to maintain transportation facilities and systems in a state of good repair, including the Dyersville Comprehensive Plan and Regional Planning Affiliation 8's 2040 Long-Range Transportation Plan. While the City has been planning these projects for several years, no state or federal funding was originally anticipated. Given the project's high-priority status and anticipated regional impact, it was incorporated into the federal fiscal Year 2022–2025 Transportation Involvement Plan (TIP) and Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) and will be updated to include BUILD funding upon award notification. No additional state or local approvals are required for construction.

Federal Transportation Requirements Affecting State and Local Planning

The project is currently listed in TIP and STIP. The project design is compliant with all lowa DOT standards and all FHWA requirements. There are no additional state or local planning requirements for the project to progress.

Railroad Coordination

The City has received approval from CN Railway to build the Beltline Overpass, which is part of the North-South Connection, across its tracks, creating a grade separation.

Assessment of Project Risks and Mitigation Strategies

The Enhancing Multimodal Connections in Dyersville Project is both timely and low risk; however, no project is risk free. As such, the City has identified several potential risks that could hinder project progress and has developed associated mitigation strategies to minimize any potential impacts, including the following:

- NEPA process delays: Based on progress to date and the anticipated level of environmental reviews to be completed, the risk to schedule delays due to the NEPA review process is considered minimal because time has been built into the schedule to accommodate delays based on experiences with similar projects.
 - Component 1 Dyersville anticipates a CE for Component 1, North-South Connections.
 - Component 2 Completion of the CE document is pending SHPO documentation that historic resources will not be affected and USFWS confirmation that no rare or endangered species will be harmed. Determinations from these two resource agencies are anticipated within a reasonable time, allowing for completion of the NEPA review process in 2027.
 - Component 3 The NEPA process is anticipated to be completed as a CE, allowing for a timely completion of the NEPA review in 2027.
- Political or public opposition: The project is widely popular and has received strong votes of approval from the Dyersville City Council. Despite this commitment, it is always possible that conditions may change. As such, the project team is committed to continued communications with the public and local officials as the project progresses. City project communications are led by an executive committee, which is comprised of the mayor, City Council members, city administrator, and public works director/city engineer. The City's project manager also engages with residents, business owners, other stakeholders, and design teams and communicates the project's intent to the public in public meetings specific to the project, through required public hearings for matters regarding the project, and by including public comment items on the biweekly council agenda.

- Delays in procurement: The contract will require that materials be secured within 4 months of the
 contract being executed with the contractor to avoid delays when obtaining construction materials.

 A bid item will be created for stored materials so that all materials that tend to have a long delay
 can be purchased soon after the execution of a contract and stored on or near the project site(s).


 Additionally, once selected, the contractor will be required to show material source locations and
 provide accurate material lead times. The construction administration team will also track material
 lead times.
- Lack of affordable bids: Per lowa DOT bidding guidelines, if no affordable bids are received, an
 engineering evaluation will be performed, plan adjustments will be made (as necessary), and the
 project will be rebid along with sending a notice of bid opportunity to a larger area to draw
 additional interest from outside the regional area.
- **Cost overruns:** Appropriate contingency costs have been built into the budget. The City has also committed to covering cost overruns as deemed appropriate.
- Construction delays: The project is scheduled to be fully constructed by 2029. If delays in funding obligation or labor or materials shortages impact the construction schedule, the overall delivery schedule includes adequate schedule contingency or float to accommodate unanticipated delays. The City is confident that there will be no issues meeting the June 30, 2029, funding obligation date or the September 30, 2034, expenditure deadline.

Technical Capacity

Through past transportation network improvement projects, the City has worked with residents to garner community support and to acquire ROW when necessary. City Administrator Mick Michel is a professional administrator with more than 28 years of experience administering grant funds and will serve as "in responsible charge" of the project. City Public Works Director/City Engineer John Wandsnider is also a licensed engineer and will offer his expertise during project construction and subsequent asset management and maintenance of this critical transportation infrastructure for years to come.

The City is a certified Local Public Agency and will choose to administer this project through Iowa DOT's Local Systems Bureau. The City will follow Iowa DOT's Instructional Memorandums to ensure regulatory compliance with all four project components, including but not limited to Buy America provisions, Americans with Disabilities Act regulations, Civil Rights requirements, procurement, Davis-Bacon Act, NEPA, and the Uniform Act.

The City has completed a \$13.5 million water and sewer project and is partnering with a non for profit organization to construct a \$55 million professional baseball park at the "Field of Dreams" movie site. Both projects are anticipated to be delivered on time and on budget. The City is also in the process of administering a Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities grant-funded project. In anticipation of the Enhancing Multimodal Connections in Dyersville Project, the City Council has approved matching funds and additional staff resources to support the successful delivery of this critical infrastructure.

The Enhancing Multimodal Connections in Dyersville Project is a \$29,181,500 connectivity-focused project that will build new, key multimodal connections and create a sustainable and resilient transportation network in this rural community. To reduce the impact from both flood and rail blockage events, two

new roadway bridge connections will be implemented to create reliable access for the community that does not exist currently by adding network linkage and eliminating an at-grade rail crossing. Five new trail segments will provide connected bicycle and pedestrian opportunities for all users. This project will reduce emergency response times and support tourism and economic vitality.

The City of Dyersville (City) is submitting a BUILD grant request for \$25,000,000. This generational investment in Dyersville is not possible without an investment from the U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT). Dyersville has secured and committed \$4,181,500 in match, representing 14 percent of the total project cost. The match includes in-kind contributions of right-of-way (ROW) already owned by the City that will be incorporated into the project limits, in-kind project staff for administrative activities, and \$3,563,000 in bond-secured cash. This funding commitment is not subject to restrictions and is documented and included in Appendix A.

Project Costs

Tables 1 and 2 provide a breakdown of project costs by component and the source of matching funds for the primary components: North-South Connection, East-West Connection, and Community Trail Connections. This budget was informed by cost estimates prepared by registered engineering staff in January 2024 and updated for this application in January 2025. Since cost estimates were updated within the last year. annual inflation was not applied, per the BUILD NOFO. The cost estimate assumptions for contingency vary by each components design status and are reflected in **Table 1**. This rate is informed by both the construction cost index and current bonding rates.

All local matching funds are committed and ready to spend as soon as grant funds are obligated. The matching funds come from the City budget through General Obligation Bonds and Tax Increment Financing funds, are not allocated to any specific project element, and do not carry any use restrictions. Funding commitment documentation is attached in Appendix A. Dyersville will request in-kind

match as part of this project because funds are greatly restricted in this rural community. The details of the in-kind match will be proposed to USDOT during the agreement development to recognize the City's administrative activities related to the administration of this award and the value of the real property owned by the City that is being incorporated into the project. The City may also request an Advance Construction Agreement from the lowa Department of Transportation and USDOT to avoid delaying project advancement during the period that will lapse between grant announcement and grant obligation.

Preconstruction Activity Completed to Date

The total cost for this project is \$30,402,000, including previous and future expenses. The City anticipates spending \$1,220,500 before the grant agreement, including public engagement, functional design concept, preliminary engineering, and environmental studies for both the East-West Connection and North-South Connection. Dyersville has a policy to purchase property identified in the comprehensive plan as it becomes available on the real estate market as a land preservation acquisition. These are voluntary, willing buyer/willing seller sales. As part of this policy, the City owns property for Components 2 and 3, which are anticipated to be incorporated into the project's ROW limits. The rest of the property will become park space connecting to an extensive water trail system in a complementary project.

Contingency Amounts

The project cost estimate includes contingency to account for unknown cost escalation. Registered professional engineers developed cost estimates informed by historic bid

prices in the lowa market and cost estimating standards. Contingency varies across components and is informed by the current design percent complete and anticipated letting date. Additional detail is available in **Table 4**.

- Component 1 North-South Connection (7th Street) is currently at 20 percent design. This component includes a new roadway with a river crossing, an intersection improvement, a rail crossing, and bike and pedestrian facilities. The project is anticipated to be let in 2028. A 20 percent contingency was applied to this component.
- Component 2 East-West Connection (12th Avenue) is currently at 30 percent design. This component includes a new roadway with a river crossing and bike and pedestrian facilities. The project is anticipated to be let in 2028. A 10 percent contingency was applied to this component.
- Component 3 Community Trail Connections is currently at 10 percent design.
 This component includes a roadway modification project that creates safe bike
 and pedestrian facilities and crossings throughout Dyersville. The project is
 anticipated to be let in 2027. A 15 percent contingency was applied to this
 component.

Despite the inclusion of such contingencies, circumstances may arise that cause project costs to increase above the stated amounts. The City will secure General Obligation Bonds and Tax Increment Financing funds to cover cost overruns for the project, should they occur.

Benefit-Cost Analysis

Dyersville, Iowa is requesting \$25 million in US Department of Transportation (USDOT) Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development (BUILD) Grant funds to enhance connectivity with the construction of a \$29.52 million (undiscounted 2023 dollars) project to build new key roadway and bridge connections, on- and off-street bicycle facilities, and Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant sidewalk connections in this rural city. This request accounts for 86 percent of future eligible project costs. Dyersville is burdened with disconnected roads, trails, and sidewalks, along with physical barriers during flood events and train activity which cut off critical access for emergency and city services. These missing connections also hinder growth of community connectivity in the city. USDOT resources will help Dyersville establish a complete transportation network to improve access throughout the community, eliminate a hazardous at-grade rail crossing, reduce emergency response times, and promote economic development.

A significant transportation concern is discontinuity among the community due to the existing design of the local roadway network, which is further exacerbated during flooding events that cut off several neighborhoods. Dyersville's disconnected road network causes numerous access problems, isolates neighborhoods, and creates challenges for emergency vehicles trying to reach flooded neighborhoods. The proposed bridges over the creek and floodplains would alleviate this issue.

The City of Dyersville's economy relies heavily on agriculture, manufacturing, and tourism, which draws more than 250,000 tourists annually. This influx of people to the small, rural, lowan town places additional strain on local infrastructure. Additionally, 18% of Dyersville's population is 65 years old or older. The project elements will improve all transportation access throughout the city for this population. In seeking to address safety and EMS response times during rail crossing closures and delays, flood events isolating neighborhoods, and increasing traffic volumes, Dyersville has proposed the construction of new east-west and north-south connections through town. The Enhancing Multimodal Connections in Dyersville project consists of three primary components:

- 1. **North-South Connection:** 7th Street SW connection to 1st Avenue W over Bear Creek and Beltline Road Overpass to provide a grade-separated crossing of the CN railway on the north edge of town.
- 2. **East-West Connection:** 13th Avenue SE connection to 12th Avenue SW over North Fork Maquoketa River to provide an essential connection for emergency services and between residents to the east and west of the river.
- 3. **Community Trail Connection:** A six-foot wide paved path along the east side of 7th Street SW combined with painted bike lanes will complete the trail

network, promoting connectivity. Marked crosswalks and MUTCD-compliant signage will raise awareness of the presence of vulnerable road users.

The proposed project improves the transportation network to more efficiently move people and goods. The construction of bridges over the creek and floodplains specifically addresses the need to improve safety and explicitly addresses climate change through infrastructure that enhances connectivity for all communities at all times, but particularly during the frequent flood events.

The period of analysis used in the estimation of benefits and costs runs from 2020 through 2049, which includes 9 years of project development (ROW, design, and construction) and 20 years of operations. In constant 2023 dollars, total undiscounted project capital costs are \$29.52 million, and discounted costs (using a 3.1% discount rate) are \$24.99 million (see Table 2).²

Per USDOT Guidance, incremental operations and maintenance (O&M) costs due to the project are classified as disbenefits, rather than an increase in cost.

A summary of the relevant data and calculations used to derive the benefits and costs (in dollars of 2023) of the project are shown in the Benefit-Cost Analysis (BCA) model Microsoft Excel file also submitted with this application package. Based on the analysis presented in the rest of this document, the project is expected to generate \$35.95 million in total discounted benefits and \$24.99 million in discounted capital costs, using a 3.1 percent real discount rate generally and a 2 percent real discount rate for carbon

dioxide emissions. Therefore, the project is expected to generate a Net Present Value (NPV) of \$10.96 million and a benefit-cost ratio (BCR) of 1.44.

In addition to the monetized benefits, the project will generate many benefits that are difficult to quantify and monetize in a BCA. These non-monetized benefits – which include increased jobs and economic development, expanded infrastructure to handle future Major League Baseball (MLB) games, increased infrastructure resiliency, decreased flooding impacts across Dyersville, and avoided delay at railroad grade crossings – are further discussed in the project description and merit criteria sections.

Introduction

This document provides detailed technical information on the economic analyses conducted in support of the grant application for Enhancing Multimodal Connections in Dyersville.

- Section 2, Methodological Framework, introduces the conceptual framework used in the BCA;
- Section 3, Project Overview, provides an overview of the project, including a brief
 description of existing conditions and proposed alternatives, a summary of cost
 estimates and schedule, and a description of the types of effects that the project
 is expected to generate;
- Section 4, General Assumptions, discusses the general assumptions used in the estimation of project costs and benefits;
- Section 5, Demand Projections, provides estimates of travel demand and traffic growth;
- Section 6, Benefits Measurement, Data and Assumptions, provides specific data elements and assumptions pertaining to the long-term outcome selection criteria, along with associated benefit estimates;
- Section 7, Summary of Findings and BCA Outcomes, presents estimates of the projects NPV, its BCR, and other project evaluation metrics; and
- Section 8, BCA Sensitivity Analysis, provides the outcomes of the sensitivity analysis.

Additional data tables are provided within the separately uploaded BCA model file, including annual estimates of benefits and costs, to assist the U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) in its review of the application.³

2. Methodological Framework

The BCA conducted for this project includes the monetized benefits and costs measured using USDOT guidance, as well as the quantitative and qualitative merits of the project. A BCA provides estimates of the benefits that are expected to accrue from a project over a specified period and compares them to the anticipated costs of the project. Project costs include the resources required to develop the project. Estimated

benefits are based on the projected impacts of the project on both users and non-users of the facility, valued in monetary terms. Costs of maintaining the new or improved asset over time are included as disbenefits.⁴

While BCA is just one of many tools that can be used in making decisions about infrastructure investments, USDOT believes that it provides a useful benchmark from which to evaluate and compare potential transportation investments.⁵

The specific methodology employed in this application was developed using the USDOT's *Benefit-Cost Analysis Guidance for Discretionary Grant Programs* (November 2024) and is consistent with BUILD program guidelines. In particular, the methodology involves:

- Establishing existing and future conditions under the Build and No-Build scenarios;
- Assessing benefits with respect to each of the merit criteria identified in the Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO);
- Measuring benefits in dollar terms, whenever possible, and expressing benefits and costs in a common unit of measurement;
- Using USDOT guidance for the valuation of travel time improvements, safety benefits, reductions in air emissions and residual infrastructure value while relying on industry best practice for the valuation of other effects;
- Discounting future benefits and costs with the real discount rates recommended by USDOT (3.1 percent generally and 2.0 percent for carbon dioxide emissions); and
- Conducting a sensitivity analysis to assess the impacts of changes in key estimating assumptions.

3. Project Overview

The Enhancing Multimodal Connections project will improve connectivity, emergency response times (especially in times of flooding), better handle increasing traffic volumes, improve the level of service, provide additional direct connections across Dyersville, reduce auto accidents, avoid rail conflicts, improve the pedestrian and bicycling environment, and promote economic development in Dyersville.

The City of Dyersville, Iowa seeks Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development (BUILD) Grant funds to support the Enhancing Multimodal Connections in Dyersville project. The proposed project creates sustainable, new multimodal transportation connections through key infrastructure additions that create alternative access across the North Fork of the Maquoketa River, Bear Creek, and the Canadian National (CN) Railway, connecting neighborhoods, modes, and economies within this rural town. These connectivity enhancements include a new bridge crossing across the North Fork, a new bridge connection across the Maquoketa River, new trail connectivity,

wider sidewalks and bike lanes. The improvements will create resilient, sustainable, future-proof infrastructure connections to support quality of life and economic prosperity.

3.1 Base Case and Alternatives

Estimates of baseline conditions (the "No-Build" scenario) were forecasted over the analysis period and then compared to the alternative conditions of the Build scenario in the benefit-cost analysis. The Full Build scenario assumes the creation of two key bridge connections and one additional element as described below:

- 1. North-South Connection: 7th Street SW connection to 1st Avenue W over Bear Creek and Beltline Road Overpass to provide a grade-separated crossing of the CN railway on the north edge of town.
- 2. East-West Connection: 13th Avenue SE connection to 12th Avenue SW over North Fork Maquoketa River to provide an essential connection for emergency services and between residents to the east and west of the river.
- **3. Community Trail Connection:** A six-foot wide paved path along the east side of 7th Street SW combined with painted bike lanes will complete the trail network, promoting connectivity. Marked crosswalks and MUTCD-compliant signage will raise awareness of the presence of vulnerable road users.

The two primary bridge connection elements (the "East-West" and the "North-South") are also evaluated independently in this BCA, though the discussion primarily focuses on the Full Build scenario, where all project elements are constructed.

3.2 Types of Impacts

The BCA measures impacts on residents and workers in Dyersville, as well as on visitors and society at large. These impacts include direct traffic impacts, vehicle emissions, infrastructure maintenance, vehicle safety, emergency response, and quality of life / health impacts.

3.3 Project Cost and Schedule

The total capital cost of the full project, including costs to date, is estimated to be \$29.52 million (undiscounted) in 2023 dollars. The project team has prepared a schedule of planning, construction and implementation, available in the main application. Future capital expenditure is scheduled to begin in 2026 and conclude in 2029.

3.4 Effects on Selection Criteria

The main benefit categories associated with the project are mapped into the seven selection criteria set forth for the BUILD program in the table below.

4. General Assumptions

The BCA measures benefits against costs throughout a period of analysis beginning in 2020 and ending in 2049, which includes 9 years of project spending and 20 years of operations.

The monetized benefits and costs are estimated in 2023 dollars with future dollars discounted in compliance with BUILD requirements using a 3.1 percent real discount rate generally and a 2.0 percent rate applied to carbon dioxide emissions.



The methodology makes several important assumptions and seeks to avoid overestimation of benefits and underestimation of costs. Specifically:

- Input prices are expressed in 2023 dollars;
- The period of analysis begins in 2020 and ends in 2049. It includes permitting, design, and public engagement (2020 2023, 2026 2029), and construction (2026 2029), and 20 years of full operations (2030 2049);
- A constant 3.1 percent real discount rate is applied throughout the period of analysis generally, while a 2.0 percent real discount rate is applied to carbon dioxide emissions;
- The project will be substantially complete by the end of 2029, the first year of benefits are quantified in 2030; and
- The results shown in this document correspond to the effects of the Full Build alternative and includes the defined East-West component and North-South component.

5. Demand Projections

Multiple categories of benefits generated by the Enhancing Multimodal Connections project result directly from its implementation. These benefits include travel time savings, vehicle operating cost savings, pavement maintenance savings, safety benefits, emissions reductions, emergency services benefits, new cyclist and pedestrian health benefits, facility amenity benefits to existing and new cyclists and pedestrians, and residual infrastructure value. These benefits are generated primarily from the alleviation of congestion in the project area and use of affordable transportation options that is expected due to the connectivity improvements. The monetization of these benefit categories depends on projections of future vehicle, truck and cyclist and pedestrian activity in the Build scenario, and a comparison to how this behavior differs from the No Build scenario.

This section of the narrative presents the vehicular, pedestrian and cyclist travel projections utilized in the BCA and details the methodological approach used to estimate this activity.

5.1 Methodology

Vehicle traffic activity in the Full Build, East-West component and North-South component were provided via Traffic Model data from the City of Dyersville which are representative of weekday traffic. The projections include daily savings in VHT and VMT in the project area for 2025 and 2054. Demand was interpolated from 2026 through 2053 using a linear growth rate to estimate future daily VHT and VMT savings. Daily VHT and VMT savings values were annualized using a factor of 260 which represents the number of business days per year. The traffic analyses (for all build and no build scenarios in 2025 and 2054) were performed using procedures outlined in the Highway



Capacity Manual 6th Edition, and the model was generated in Synchro Studio 11 with SimTraffic 11. Additional information about the traffic modeling procedures are fully described in the Traffic Study Memorandum attached as Appendix B.⁶

Average annual bike and walk activity was estimated using American Community Survey (ACS) population and commuter data in the project area and supplemented with information from a survey of residents and Replica network linkage data. Daily cyclist and pedestrian traffic volumes were annualized by a factor of 120 for trips to school, 173 for trips to work and 104 trips to services. ACS data indicates that 3.0 percent of residents walk to work and 0.3 percent bike to work across lowa, but rates of walking and biking are lower in Dyersville. Replica network linkage data suggests current Dyersville travel patterns have 3.8% of residents walk to work and 0 percent of residents bike to work. This analysis assumes that the rate of walking and biking in Dversville will reach the state-wide rates when existing levels are below the statewide average as a result of the new North-South and East-West bridge connections. Statewide rates are collected from the 2022 National Household Transportation Survey. Specifically, the share of work-related cycling trips will rise from 0 percent to 0.3 percent, the share of school-based walking trips will increase from 24.5 percent to 36.8 percent, and the share of school-related cycling trips will increase from 0.8 percent to 1.2 percent. A survey of the local elementary school indicated that there are approximately 15-20 students who currently bike in milder weather and 10 students who walk regardless of weather conditions. Based on observed data that the number of students walking or biking to school roughly doubled upon completion of a new nearby pedestrian bridge in 2020, it is assumed that an additional 50-percent increase of walking trips would be expected because of project improvements.⁷ The average walking trip distance is assumed to be 0.86 miles and the average bike trip distance is assumed to be 2.38 miles, in accordance with USDOT BCA guidance.

6. Benefits Measurement, Data and Assumptions

This section lists the BUILD merit criteria and describes the methodology, assumptions, and results for the benefits corresponding to each criteria. Note that the project is also expected to generate additional O&M costs due to the new construction. This disbenefit is included in the summary of BCA results in Section 8.

6.1 Safety

The project generates safety benefits in two ways. First by reducing the number of anticipated crashes in the project study area due to the reduction in vehicle miles traveled. Second, by improving connectivity in the study area the project will improve travel time for emergency response services during major flooding events. The Federal

Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) provides guidance for monetizing improved emergency vehicle response for BCA's.⁸ These benefits were estimated both fire and EMS response.

6.1.1 Methodology

Crashes per 100 million vehicle miles travelled (MVMT) are provided from 2015 through 2020. The average of which is used to calculate the number of crashes avoided due to reduced VMT brought about by new connections. Historical crashes in the study area were retrieved using the Iowa DOT Crash Analysis Tool and used to procure the number of vehicles involved per crash, the number of occupants per crash, and the distribution of injury severity per person involved in crashes in Dyersville.

Safety benefits are calculated by applying the crashes per MVMT rate to the VMT reduction described in the Demand Projections. Total crashes avoided are applied to the vehicles per crash rate to estimate the amount of property damage avoided. Crashes avoided are also applied to the number of vehicle occupants per crash then the distribution of injury severities to estimate the number of KABCO events avoided.

The second element of safety benefits is avoided additional emergency response time during flooding events. These benefits were calculated using the FEMA methodology noted above. The potentially impacted population was estimated based on Census population data for areas impacted by the east-west and north-south connections. During major flooding events in existing conditions, emergency responders must travel longer distances to access populations impacted by either fires or cardiac events. The probability of these events was generated in accordance with the FEMA methodology. These additional delays only occur during flooding events, which may not happen every year. To determine the expected frequency of these events (and associated annual probability of occurrence), historic major flood events were identified. Data collected as part of a BRIC scoping study indicates that 7 such events occurred from June 2002 to June 2024 (resulting in a 31.8% annual probability of an event occurring).

The magnitude of anticipated crash reduction brought about by the Enhancing Multimodal Connections in Dyersville project was then monetized according to crash valuation parameters by severity, per USDOT BCA Guidance.

6.1.2 Assumptions

The assumptions used in the estimation of safety benefits are summarized in the table below.

6.1.3 Benefit Estimates

Safety benefits resulting the construction of new bridges to divert traffic along safer routes, reducing VMT and the statistical probability of crashes, is valued at \$7.65 million over the 20-year period of analysis, when discounted at 3.1 percent. Additionally, the project will generate significant savings in emergency services costs from faster response times, accounting for \$4.29 million when discounted at 3.1 percent. Total safety benefits of the project are \$13.94 million.

6.2 Environmental Sustainability

The project will contribute to environmental sustainability by reducing vehicle emissions. This comes from creating connections that result in more direct travel, and also inducing



some drivers to travel by non-automotive modes on these new connections. Additionally, the project enhances infrastructure resiliency by providing vehicular bridges elevated above the 100-year flood plain to avoid impacts of flood events on roadways, though this benefit is not monetized.

6.2.1 Methodology

Reduced vehicle miles travelled as a result of the new affordable transportation connections and more direct car routes was also calculated from the demand forecasts previously discussed in Section 5. These projections of reduced VMT in the Build scenario were combined with emissions rates for vehicles, in grams per mile, sourced from the EPA MOVES model to calculate total reduced emissions. Total quantities of reduced emissions from both sources, by pollutant, were further monetized according to USDOT BCA Guidance.

6.2.2 Assumptions

The assumptions used in the estimation of environmental sustainability benefits are summarized in the table below.

Note that emissions rates sourced from the EPA MOVES database are time series data. The values represented in the table below correspond with emissions rates as of 2030, which are generally representative for summary purposes of the more detailed time series emissions rates employed in the BCA model.

6.2.3 Benefit Estimates

The project improvements are estimated to decrease air contaminant emissions over the study period, as drivers divert to biking and walking trips. This minor monetized benefit is estimated to total \$0.41 million over twenty years when discounted by 3.1 percent, with a 2.0 percent discount rate applied to carbon dioxide emissions.

6.3 Quality of Life

The project will generate quality of life benefits by encouraging new pedestrians and cyclists to use the improved sidewalk facilities. These new pedestrians and cyclists will enjoy increased health benefits from the additional exercise.

In terms of monetized quality of life benefits, the proposed project is expected to generate health benefits for these cyclists and pedestrians. Health benefits are monetized as reduced mortality risk, per USDOT BCA Guidance.

6.3.1 Methodology

Pedestrian and cyclist trips in the project study area are estimated based on local population statistics and the portion of residents who walk and cycle to school and to work as described in Section 5. The project improvements are expected to generate new pedestrian and cyclist trips, who will benefit from reduced mortality risk. These additional trips are monetized based on USDOT BCA guidance. Health benefits are not monetized for school-based trips that shift from vehicles to walking or cycling as primary school students will not fall in the USDOT age ranges.

6.3.2 Assumptions

The assumptions and parameters used in the estimation of quality of life benefits are summarized in the table below.

6.3.3 Benefit Estimates

Quality of life benefits achieved through improved active transportation infrastructure are estimated to total \$0.08 million over 20 years of project operations, discounted at 3.1 percent.

6.4 Mobility and Community Connectivity

The focus of this project is to improve mobility in the city of Dyersville by constructing new east-west and north-south connections through town. This improves mobility for vehicles (as captured through reduced travel time, vehicle operating costs, and emissions) as well as for pedestrians and cyclists. These benefits are discussed in this section and are monetized through the facility amenity benefits as per USDOT BCA Guidance.

6.4.1 Methodology

As discussed in Sections 5 and 6.3, pedestrian and cyclist trips in the project study area are estimated based on local population statistics and the portion of residents who walk and cycle to school and to work. Both existing and new pedestrians and cyclists will enjoy benefits from the sidewalks as part of the new east-west and north-south



connections. Benefits are calculated based on the length of the facility improvements, and monetization values provided in USDOT BCA guidance. In particular, if the length of the facility improvement is greater than the average trip distance advised in the USDOT BCA guidance, then the improved facility length is capped by the average trip length.

6.4.2 Assumptions

The assumptions and parameters used in the estimation of mobility and community connectivity benefits are summarized in the table below.

6.5 Economic Competitiveness and Opportunity

The Enhancing Multimodal Connections in Dyersville project will contribute to enhancing economic competitiveness and opportunity through increased access to jobs and vehicle operating cost savings for travelers in the study area. The project is expected to result in travel time savings for all users on the roads of Dyersville.

6.5.1 Methodology

As discussed in Section 5, projections of daily vehicle hours and vehicle miles saved for autos and trucks were estimated in the Full Build, East-West and North-South component as part of the Traffic Model data from the City of Dyersville. Savings were interpolated between the base and forecast year and monetized based on USDOT BCA guidance.

For pedestrians and cyclists, the travel distance avoided due to the project east-west and north-south connections was multiplied by existing trips to estimate the avoided miles traveled. This was applied to an average speed of travel for pedestrians and



cyclists to get person-hours saved due to the project. Avoided travel time was monetized based on USDOT BCA Guidance.

Economic competitiveness benefits of the project are estimated to be \$16.60 million over 20 years of project operations, discounted at 3.1 percent.

6.6 State of Good Repair

The project will contribute to the state of good repair by reducing the vehicle miles traveled both through the reduced trip lengths due to the new connections. The project will also generate residual value benefits from the new bridges constructed, which will each have a useful life longer than the 20-year operations period used in the BCA.

6.6.1 Methodology

To estimate the reduced pavement maintenance costs, total reduced VMT was calculated. As discussed during Section 6.5, vehicle miles saved for autos and trucks was estimated in the Full Build, East-West and North-South component as part of the Traffic Model data from the City of Dyersville. These reduced miles were monetized based on the marginal external costs of pavement damage by vehicle class, as estimated by the 1997 Federal Highway Cost Allocation Study (inflated to 2023 dollars per USDOT Guidance).

The residual value of investment was calculated by applying straight line depreciation to the capital value of structure items constructed across the Enhancing Multimodal Connections in Dyersville project area according to the minimum years of service life for these infrastructure assets and the analysis period of the BCA.

6.6.2 Assumptions

The assumptions used in the estimation of state of good repair benefits are summarized in the table below.

7 Summary of Findings and BCA Outcomes

The table below summarizes the BCA findings. Annual costs and benefits are computed over the lifecycle of the project and as stated earlier, construction is expected to be completed in 2029, with a first full year of benefits in 2030. Benefits accrue during the full operation of the project, for twenty years through 2049.

Additionally, results of considering the North-South and East-West components separately are provided. These components have their own independent utility, and the



outcomes from analyzing them apart from the Full Build overall results are shown for brevity.

Considering all monetized benefits and costs, the estimated internal rate of return of the project is 6.5 percent. With a 3.1 percent real discount rate (and a 2.0 percent rate applied to carbon dioxide emissions), the investment would result in a \$10.96 million

Considering monetized benefits and costs associated with the North-South components of the project, discounted costs are expected to outweigh benefits. This is associated



with a negative internal rate of return (-1.2 percent), a negative net present value of -\$6.52 million, and a benefit-cost ratio of 0.51.

Considering monetized benefits and costs associated with the North-South components of the project, the estimated internal rate of return is 13.2 percent. With a 3.1 percent real discount rate (and a 2.0 percent rate applied to carbon dioxide emissions), the



\$8.87 million investment would result in \$22.03 million in benefits. These results lead to a Net Present Value of \$13.16 million and a benefit-cost ratio of 2.48.

8 BCA Sensitivity Analysis

The BCA outcomes presented in the previous sections rely on a large number of assumptions and long-term projections, both of which are subject to considerable uncertainty.

The primary purpose of the sensitivity analysis is to help identify the variables and model parameters whose variations have the greatest impact on the BCA outcomes: the "critical variables."

The sensitivity analysis can also be used to:

- Evaluate the impact of changes in individual critical variables how much the final results would vary with reasonable departures from the "preferred" or most likely value for the variable; and
- Assess the robustness of the BCA and evaluate, in particular, whether the
 conclusions reached under the "preferred" set of input values are significantly
 altered by reasonable departures from those values.

The BCA results of the Full Build scenario as described throughout this report are compared in the table below to various sensitivity testing scenarios. The table provides the percentage changes in project NPV associated with variations in variables or parameters or calculations (listed in row), as indicated in the column headers.

Dubuque County Secures Over \$1.9 Million from State Child Care Business Incentive Grant Program

Continued efforts to address child care shortages in Dubuque County have received another significant boost, with the Bright Minds Campus securing \$845,000 through the Child Care Business Incentives funding program, bringing the initiative's total support from this state program to \$3,000,000. The phase 2 funds will add 100 new child care slots to the already innovative workforce child care facility, further enhancing support for area families and regional employers.






General Fund Expenditures


General Fund Expenditures 2024




General Fund Expenditures 2023









Report on Matters Identified as a Result of the Audit of the Basic Financial Statements

Honorable Mayor, Members of the City Council and Management City of Dyersville Dyersville, Iowa

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of the governmental activities, business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the City of Dyersville, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2024, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, we considered the City's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the basic financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the City's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the City's internal control over financial reporting.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraph and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies and, therefore, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that have not been identified. In addition, because of inherent limitations in internal control, including the possibility of management override of controls, misstatements due to error, or fraud may occur and not be detected by such controls. However, as discussed below, we identified certain deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control over financial reporting, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the City's basic financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. A reasonable possibility exists when the likelihood of an event occurring is either reasonably possible or probable as defined as follows:

- Reasonably possible. The chance of the future event or events occurring is more than remote but less than likely.
- Probable. The future event or events are likely to occur.

The material weakness identified is stated within this letter.

A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control over financial reporting that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

The accompanying memorandum also includes financial analysis provided as a basis for discussion. The matters discussed herein were considered by us during our audit and they do not modify the opinion expressed in our Independent Auditor's Report dated January 20, 2025, on such statements.

This communication, which is an integral part of our audit, is intended solely for the information and use of the Members of the City Council and management and others within the City and state oversight agencies and is not intended to be, and should not be, used by anyone other than these specified parties.

City of Dyersville Material Weakness

Material Audit Adjustments and Prior Period Adjustment

During the course of our audit, we proposed material audit adjustments that would not have been identified as a result of the City's internal controls, and therefore, could have resulted in a material misstatement of the City's financial statements. In order to ensure the financial statements and Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards were free from material misstatement, audit adjustments were required to adjust capital contributions, federal expenditures, and debt. An error in the prior period financial statements was not identified by the City's internal controls to ensure correction in the proper period, and therefore, resulted in a prior period adjustment. In order to ensure financial statements were free from material misstatement, a prior period adjustment was required to adjust capital contribution allocation to the proper fund.

We have audited the basic financial statements of the governmental activities, business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the City as of and for the year ended June 30, 2024. Professional standards require that we advise you of the following matters related to our audit.

Our Responsibility in Relation to the Financial Statement Audit

As communicated in our engagement letter, our responsibility, as described by professional standards, is to form and express opinions about whether the basic financial statements prepared by management with your oversight are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our audit of the basic financial statements does not relieve you or management of its respective responsibilities.

Our responsibility, as prescribed by professional standards, is to plan and perform our audit to obtain reasonable, rather than absolute, assurance about whether the basic financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit of the basic financial statements includes consideration of internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the City's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, as part of our audit, we considered the internal control of the City solely for the purpose of determining our audit procedures and not to provide any assurance concerning such internal control.

We are also responsible for communicating significant matters related to the audit that are, in our professional judgement, relevant to your responsibilities in overseeing the financial reporting process. However, we are not required to design procedures for the purpose of identifying other matters to communicate to you.

Generally accepted accounting principles provide for certain Required Supplementary Information (RSI) to supplement the basic financial statements. Our responsibility with respect to the RSI, which supplements the basic audit financial statements, is to apply certain limited procedures in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. However, the RSI was not audited and, because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance, we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the RSI.

Our responsibility for the supplementary information accompanying the basic financial statements, as described by professional standards, is to evaluate the presentation of the supplementary information in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole and to report on whether the supplementary information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

Our responsibility with respect to the other information in documents containing the audited basic financial statements and auditor's report does not extend beyond the basic financial information identified in the report. We have no responsibility for determining whether this other information is properly stated. This other information was not audited, and we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on it.

Our Responsibility in Relation to Government Auditing Standards

As communicated in our engagement letter, part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the basic financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of the City's compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of basic financial statement amounts. However, the objective of our tests was not to provide an opinion on compliance with such provisions.

Our Responsibility in Relation to Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards (Uniform Guidance)

As communicated in our engagement letter, in accordance with the Uniform Guidance, we examined on a test basis, evidence about the City's compliance with the types of compliance requirements described in the U.S. Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Compliance Supplement applicable to each of its major federal programs for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the City's compliance with those requirements. While our audit provided a reasonable basis for our opinion, it did not provide a legal determination on the City's compliance with those requirements.

In planning and performing our audit of compliance, we considered the City's internal control over compliance with the types of requirements that could have a direct and material effect on each major federal program to determine the auditing procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing an opinion on compliance for each major federal program and to test and report on internal control over compliance in accordance with the Uniform Guidance, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of internal control over compliance.

Planned Scope and Timing of the Audit

We conducted our audit consistent with the planned scope and timing we previously communicated to you.

Compliance with All Ethics Requirements Regarding Independence

The engagement team, others in our firm, as appropriate, our firm, and our network firms have complied with all relevant ethical requirements regarding independence.

Significant Risks Identified

We have identified the following significant risks of material misstatement:

- Management Override of Controls Overall Financial Statements Management override of internal control is considered a risk in substantially all engagements as management may be incentivized to produce better results.
- Improper Revenue Recognition Revenue recognition is considered a fraud risk on substantially all engagements as it generally has a significant impact on the results of the governments operations. In addition, complexities exist surrounding the calculation and recording of various revenue sources including property taxes and state aid.
- Risk of Misappropriation of Assets If accounting duties cannot be appropriately segregated, there is a risk of unauthorized disbursements being made from the City.

Significant Risks Identified (Continued)

- Pension Valuation Net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources related to pensions, and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions are generally material to the financial statements and involve significant estimates.
- Lease Valuation Lease liability and right-to-use assets are material to the financial statements and involve significant estimates.

Qualitative Aspects of the City's Significant Accounting Practices

Significant Accounting Policies

Management has the responsibility to select and use appropriate accounting policies. A summary of the significant accounting policies adopted by the City is included in the notes to the basic financial statements. There have been no initial selection of accounting policies and no changes to significant accounting policies or their application during 2024. No matters have come to our attention that would require us, under professional standards, to inform you about (1) the methods used to account for significant unusual transactions and (2) the effect of significant accounting policies in controversial or emerging areas for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus.

Significant Accounting Estimates and Related Disclosures

Accounting estimates and related disclosures are an integral part of the basic financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's current judgements. Those judgements are normally based on knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the basic financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ markedly from management's current judgements. The most sensitive estimates affecting the basic financial statements are:

Net Pension Liability, Deferred Outflows of Resources Relating to Pensions and Deferred Inflows of Resources Relating to Pensions - These balances are based on an allocation by the pension plans using estimates based on contributions.

Lease Liability and Right-to-Use Lease Assets - These balances are based on estimates and judgments determined by the City related to the discount rate, lease term, and lease payments.

We evaluated the key factors and assumptions used to develop the accounting estimates and determined that they are reasonable in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole and in relation to the applicable opinion units.

Financial Statement Disclosures

Certain basic financial statement disclosures involve significant judgment and are particularly sensitive because of their significance to financial statement users. The basic financial statement disclosures are neutral, consistent, and clear.

Significant Difficulties Encountered during the Audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management relating to the performance of the audit.

Uncorrected and Corrected Misstatements

For the purposes of this communication, professional standards require us to accumulate all known and likely misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that we believe are trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. Further, professional standards require us to also communicate the effects of uncorrected misstatements related to prior periods on the relevant classes of transactions, account balances or disclosures, and the basic financial statements taken as a whole and each applicable opinion unit. Management did not identify, and we did not notify them of any uncorrected basic financial statement misstatements.

In addition, professional standards require us to communicate to you all material, corrected misstatements that were brought to the attention of management as a result of our audit procedures. The following prior period adjustment and material audit adjustments were identified and brought to the attention of and corrected by management.

- Capital contributions were overstated in the Sewer Utility Fund and understated in the Water Fund.
- Capital contributions were overstated in the Water Funds and debt was understated in the Water and Sewer Funds.
- Federal expenditures were understated

Disagreements with Management

For purposes of this letter, professional standards define a disagreement with management as a matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, concerning a financial accounting, reporting, or auditing matter, which could be significant to the City's basic financial statements or the auditor's report. No such disagreements arose during the course of our audit.

Representations Requested from Management

We have requested certain written representations from management, which are included in the management representation letter.

Management's Consultations with Other Accountants

In some cases, management may decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters. Management has informed us that, and to our knowledge, there were no consultations with other accountants regarding auditing and accounting matters.

Other Significant Matters, Findings, or Issues

In the normal course of our professional association with the City, we generally discuss a variety of matters, including the application of accounting principles and auditing standards, significant events or transactions that occurred during the year, operating and regulatory conditions affecting the City, and operational plans and strategies that may affect the risks of material misstatement. None of the matters discussed resulted in a condition to our retention as the City's auditor.

Noncompliance with Laws and Regulations, Violations of Contract Provisions or Grant Agreements

- A number of funds have a deficit fund balance at year end.
- Disbursements exceeded budgeted amounts for certain functions.

Other Information Included in Annual Reports

Pursuant to professional standards, our responsibility as auditors for other information, whether financial or nonfinancial, included in the City's annual reports, does not extend beyond the information identified in the audit report, and we are not required to perform any procedures to corroborate such other information.

We applied certain limited procedures to the RSI that supplements the basic financial statements. Our procedures consisted of inquiries of management regarding the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We did not audit the RSI and do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the RSI.

With respect to the supplementary information accompanying the financial statements, we made certain inquiries of management and evaluated the form, content and methods of preparing the information to determine that the information complies with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the method of preparing it has not changed from the prior period, and the information is appropriate and complete in relation to our audit of the financial statements. We compared and reconciled the supplementary information to the underlying accounting records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves.

Our responsibility also includes communicating to you any information which we believe is a material misstatement of fact. Nothing came to our attention that caused us to believe that such information, or its manner of presentation, is materially inconsistent with the information, or manner of its presentation, appearing in the basic financial statements.

The following pages provide graphic representation of select data pertaining to the financial position and operations of the City for the past five years. Our analysis of each graph is presented to provide a basis for discussion of past performance and how implementing certain changes may enhance future performance. A subsequent discussion of this information should be useful for planning purposes.


General Fund

Total fund balance in the General Fund decreased 11.1% in 2024 to \$628,356, the lowest level in the five years presented. General Fund expenditures and other financing uses exceeded revenues and other financing sources by \$78,350 during 2024. A more detailed analysis of the General Fund revenue and expenditure components are presented on the following pages.

The current General Fund unassigned fund balance represents 14.2% of 2024 General Fund expenditures, or one and a half months of expenditures at 2024 levels.

A five year history of General Fund balance is shown below.


General Fund Balance





General Fund Revenues 2024






General Fund Revenues




General Fund Expenditures

General Fund Expenditures 2024





Five year trend information for General Fund expenditures by function is shown below. From 2023 to 2024 expenditures increased \$1,726. Community and economic development increased by \$73,136 due to expending a catalyst grant in 2024. Public works increased by \$87,680 due hiring an additional employee. These increases were offset by a decrease in culture and recreation expenditures of \$116,927 due to fewer capital projects compared to prior year. General government decreased \$44,961 due to cost savings from efficiencies, contract changes, and efforts to stay under budget. Other functions had minor variances from the prior year.

General Fund Expenditures




Water Fund

Five year trend information for the Water Fund is shown below. Revenues have exceeded expenses, including depreciation, for three of five years presented. In 2024, there was a loss of \$90,704. Expenses increased \$116,599, or 11.2% due to the increased water main repairs, increased chemical and meter costs, and increased depreciation expense. Operating revenues increased by \$36,581 or 3.5% from 2023 to 2024 due to increased usage. This fund has had negative unrestricted net position in all five-years presented. There was a correction of a prior period error that decreased beginning net position by \$681,201.


Sewer Fund operating results over the last five years are presented below. Revenues have exceeded expenses in all five years presented. Revenues increased \$59,731 or 4.3%, due to increased usage. Expenses decreased \$31,481 due to decreased salary and benefit costs. The fund has had negative unrestricted net position in all five-year presented with the largest deficit occurring in 2023 due to significant capital related activity. There was a correction of a prior period error that increased beginning net position by \$601,608.



Tax Capacity, Levy, and Rates



Executive Summary

The following is an executive summary of financial related updates to assist you in staying current on emerging issues in accounting and finance. This summary will give you a preview of the new standards that have been recently issued and what is on the horizon for the near future. The most recent and significant updates include:

- Accounting Standard Update GASB Statement No. 101 Compensated Absences GASB has issued GASB Statement No. 101 relating to accounting and financial reporting for compensated absences. The unified recognition and measurement model in this Statement will result in a liability for compensated absences that more appropriately reflects when a government incurs an obligation. In addition, the model can be applied consistently to any type of compensated absence and will eliminate potential comparability issues between governments that offer different types of leave.
- Accounting Standard Update GASB Statement No. 102 Certain Risk Disclosures GASB has issued GASB Statement No. 102 relating to risk disclosures. The disclosures will provide users with timely information regarding certain concentrations or constraints and related events that have occurred or have begun to occur that make a government vulnerable to a substantial impact.
- Accounting Standard Update GASB Statement No. 103 Financial Reporting Model Improvements
 GASB has issued GASB Statement No. 103 relating to changes in financial reporting requirements. The changes provide clarity, enhance the relevance of information, provide more useful information for decision-making, and provide for greater comparability amongst government entities.

The following is an extensive summary of the current updates. As your continued business partner, we are committed to keeping you informed of new and emerging issues. We are happy to discuss these issues with you further and their applicability to your City.

Accounting Standard Update - GASB Statement No. 101 - Compensated Absences

The objective of this Statement is to better meet the information needs of financial statement users by updating the recognition and measurement guidance for compensated absences. That objective is achieved by aligning the recognition and measurement guidance under a unified model and by amending certain previously required disclosures.

This Statement requires that liabilities for compensated absences be recognized for (1) leave that has not been used and (2) leave that has been used but not yet paid in cash or settled through noncash means. A liability should be recognized for leave that has not been used if (a) the leave is attributable to services already rendered, (b) the leave accumulates, and (c) the leave is more likely than not to be used for time off or otherwise paid in cash or settled through noncash means. Leave is attributable to services already rendered when an employee has performed the services required to earn the leave. Leave that accumulates is carried forward from the reporting period in which it is earned to a future reporting period during which it may be used for time off or otherwise paid or settled. In estimating the leave that is more likely than not to be used or otherwise paid or settled, a government should consider relevant factors such as employment policies related to compensated absences and historical information about the use or payment of compensated absences. However, leave that is more likely than not to be settled through conversion to defined benefit postemployment benefits should not be included in a liability for compensated absences.

This Statement requires that a liability for certain types of compensated absences - including parental leave, military leave, and jury duty leave - not be recognized until the leave commences. This Statement also requires that a liability for specific types of compensated absences not be recognized until the leave is used.

This Statement also establishes guidance for measuring a liability for leave that has not been used, generally using an employee's pay rate as of the date of the financial statements. A liability for leave that has been used but not yet paid or settled should be measured at the amount of the cash payment or noncash settlement to be made. Certain salary-related payments that are directly and incrementally associated with payments for leave also should be included in the measurement of the liabilities.

With respect to financial statements prepared using the current financial resources measurement focus, this Statement requires that expenditures be recognized for the amount that normally would be liquidated with expendable available financial resources.

This Statement amends the existing requirement to disclose the gross increases and decreases in a liability for compensated absences to allow governments to disclose only the net change in the liability (as long as they identify it as a net change). In addition, governments are no longer required to disclose which governmental funds typically have been used to liquidate the liability for compensated absences.

GASB Statement No. 101 is effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2023. Earlier application is encouraged.

Accounting Standard Update - GASB Statement No. 102 - Certain Risk Disclosures

The objective of this Statement is to provide users of government financial statements with information about risks related to a government's vulnerabilities due to certain concentrations or constraints that is essential to their analyses for making decisions or assessing accountability.

This Statement provides definitions for concentration and constraint. A concentration as a lack of diversity related to an aspect of a significant inflow of resources or outflow of resources. A constraint is a limitation imposed on a government by an external party or by formal action of the government's highest level of decision-making authority.

This Statement requires a government to assess whether a concentration or constraint could present a risk of financial difficulty. The District will need to make a disclosure in the notes to the financial statements if all three of the following criteria are true:

- The District knows about the concentration or constraint prior to financial statement issuance.
- The concentration or constraint makes the District vulnerable to risk of a substantial impact.
- An event or events associated with the concentration or constraint that could cause a substantial impact have either (1) happened; (2) started to happen; or (3) are more likely than not to start happening within 12 months of the financial statements being issued.

If a government determines the above criteria for disclosure have been met, it should disclose information in notes to financial statements in sufficient detail to enable users of financial statements to understand the nature of the circumstances disclosed and the government's vulnerability to the risk of a substantial impact. Disclosures are required for the government as a whole as well as any opinion unit in the financial statements that includes outstanding revenue debt. Disclosures can be combined to avoid unnecessary duplication (e.g., a subsequent event footnote).

GASB Statement No. 102 is effective for fiscal years beginning after June 15, 2024. Earlier application is encouraged.

Accounting Standard Update - GASB Statement No. 103 - Financial Reporting Model Improvements

The objective of this Statement is to improve key components of the financial reporting model to enhance its effectiveness in providing information that is essential for decision making and assessing a government's accountability. This Statement also addresses certain application issues.

This Statement addresses 5 areas of the financial statements (1) Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A), (2) Unusual or Infrequent Items, (3) Presentation of the Proprietary Fund Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Fund Net Position, (4) Major Component Unit Information, and (5) Budgetary Comparison Information.

This Statement continues the requirement that the MD&A precede the basic financial statements as part of the Required Supplementary Information (RSI). This Statement requires that the information presented in MD&A be limited to the related topics discussed in five sections: (1) Overview of the Financial Statements, (2) Financial Summary, (3) Detailed Analyses, (4) Significant Capital Asset and Long-Term Financing Activity, and (5) Currently Known Facts, Decisions, or Conditions. The Statement stresses that detailed analyses should explain why balances and results of operations changed, rather than stating amounts and "boilerplate" discussions.

This Statement describes unusual or infrequent items as transactions and other events that are either unusual in nature or infrequent in occurrence. Furthermore, governments are required to display the inflows and outflows related to each unusual or infrequent item separately as the last presented flow(s) of resources prior to the net change in resource flows in the government-wide, governmental fund, and proprietary fund statements of resource flows.

This Statement requires that the proprietary fund statement of revenues, expenses, and changes in fund net position continue to distinguish between operating and nonoperating revenues and expenses. The Statement provides clarification regarding operating and nonoperating revenues and expenses. Also, this Statement requires that a subtotal for operating income (loss) and noncapital subsidies be presented before reporting other nonoperating revenues and expenses.

This Statement requires governments to present each major component unit separately in the reporting entity's statement of net position and statement of activities if it does not reduce the readability of the statements. If the readability of those statements would be reduced, combining statements of major component units should be presented after the fund financial statements.

This Statement requires governments to present budgetary comparison information using a single method of communication - RSI. Governments also are required to present (1) variances between original and final budget amounts and (2) variances between final budget and actual amounts. An explanation of significant variances is required to be presented in notes to RSI.

GASB Statement No. 103 is effective for fiscal years beginning after June 15, 2025. Earlier application is encouraged.

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinions

We have audited the accompanying basic financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the City of Dyersville, Iowa, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2024, and the related notes to the basic financial statements, which collectively comprise the City's basic financial statements as listed in the Table of Contents.

In our opinion, the basic financial statements referred to in the first paragraph present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the City of Dyersville, lowa, as of June 30, 2024, and the respective changes in financial position and where applicable, cash flows thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinions

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS) and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. Audit Finding 2024-001

Criteria:

Internal control that supports the City's ability to initiate, record, process and report financial data requires controls to ensure all required adjustments to the financial statements are properly recorded.

Condition:

During the course of our audit, we proposed material audit adjustments that would not have been identified as a result of the City's internal controls, and therefore, could have resulted in a material misstatement of the City's financial statements. In order to ensure the financial statements and Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards were free from material misstatement, audit adjustments were required to adjust capital contributions, federal expenditures, and debt. An error in the prior period financial statements was not identified by the City's internal controls to ensure correction in the proper period, and therefore, resulted in a prior period adjustment. In order to ensure financial statements were free from material misstatement, a prior period adjustment was required to adjust capital contribution allocation to the proper fund.

Context:

This finding impacts the internal control over financial reporting.

Effect or Potential Effect:

Internal controls that fail to identify necessary adjustments timely could result in material misstatements to the financial statements.

Cause:

There are a limited number of office employees to identify all necessary adjustments.

Recommendation:

Review City activity and ensure all necessary adjustments to financial data are recorded.

Views of Responsible Officials:

The City will thoroughly review activity throughout the year and ensure all necessary adjustments to financial data are recorded.

We recommend that the amount of coverage continue to be reviewed annually to ensure that the coverage is adequate for current operations.
- **24-IV-G** Council Minutes No transactions were found that we believe should have been approved in the Council minutes but were not.

The following contract provisions will be made a part of any resulting contract(s) that arise from this Proposal.

Domestic Preferences for Procurement

As appropriate and to the extent consistent with law, the Contractor, to the greatest extent practicable, shall provide a preference for the purchase, acquisition, or use of goods, products, or materials produced in the United States (50% US or more) as noted in 2 CFR § 200.322, including but not limited to iron, aluminum, steel, cement, and other manufactured products. The requirement of this section must be included in all subawards per §200.322 including all contracts and purchase orders for work or products under ARPA.

- A. "Produced in the United States" means, for iron and steel products, that all manufacturing processes, from the initial melting stage through the application of coatings, occurred in the United States.

Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act





VICINITY MAP - DUBUQUE COUNTY

- OFF-SITE VEHICLE TRACKING OF SEDIMENTS SHALL BE MINIMIZED. ROADWAYS ADJACENT TO THE PROJECT SITE SHALL BE CLEANED OF SEDIMENT DAILY.
- STABILIZATION PRACTICES, INCLUDING TEMPORARY OR PERMANENT SEEDING AND/OR MULCHING SHALL BE INITIATED IMMEDIATELY ON ALL DISTURBED AREAS IF CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITY WILL NOT RESUME IN THOSE AREAS WITHIN 14-DAYS.
- CONTRACTOR DISPOSAL OF UNUSED CONSTRUCTION MATERIALS AND CONSTRUCTION MATERIAL WASTES SHALL COMPLY WITH APPLICABLE STATE AND LOCAL WASTE DISPOSAL, SANITARY SEWER OR SEPTIC SYSTEM REGULATIONS.
- STOCKPILE AREAS WHICH REMAIN FOR MORE THAN 7 DAYS SHALL BE SEEDED. MULCHED AND ENCLOSED BY SILT FENCE.
- 8. SLOPES STEEPER THAN 10:1 AND LONGER THAN 20 FEET SHALL BE PROTECTED BY A SHORT TERM EROSION CONTROL BLANKET
- DUST CONTROL MEASURES SHALL BE EMPLOYED IF DUST IS CREATED AND THERE IS POTENTIAL FOR AIR AND/OR WATER POLLUTION FROM DUST TRANSPORTED BY WINDS. DUST CONTROL MEASURES SUCH AS SPRINKLING/IRRIGATION, MULCHING, OR OTHER APPROPRIATE MEASURES SHALL BE EMPLOYED AS NECESSARY.
- THE CONTRACTOR SHALL PLACE ANY OTHER CONTROLS CONSISTENT WITH CURRENT BMP'S AS DEEMED NECESSARY TO CONTROL RUNOFF FROM EXPOSED SITES.

MAINTENANCE

CLEANING OF SILT CONTROL DEVICES SHALL BEGIN WHEN THE FEATURES HAVE LOST 50% OF THEIR CAPACITY OR WHEN THE SEDIMENT LEVEL REACHES 1/3 OF THE BARRIER HEIGHT.

INSPECTIONS

- THE CONTRACTOR SHALL IMMEDIATELY BEGIN CORRECTIVE ACTION ON ALL DEFICIENCIES FOUND.
- 4. THIS INSPECTION MAY REQUIRE REVISIONS TO THE DESCRIPTION OF POTENTIAL POLLUTANT SOURCES AND POLLUTION PREVENTION MEASURES IDENTIFIED IN THE PLAN. THE CONTRACTOR SHALL IMPLEMENT ALL REVISIONS TO THE PLAN DEEMED NECESSARY AND COMPLETE SUCH CHANGES TO THE PLAN WITHIN 7 CALENDAR DAYS OF THE INSPECTION.
- A WRITTEN REPORT SUMMARIZING THE SCOPE OF THE INSPECTION, THE NAMES AND QUALIFICATIONS OF THE INSPECTORS, THE DATE, AND THE OBSERVATIONS MADE AND ACTIONS TAKEN SHALL BE MADE AND RETAINED AS PART OF THE SWPPP. THE REPORT SHALL BE SIGNED IN ACCORDANCE WITH PART VI.G OF THE PERMIT.

MASTER EQUIPMENT LEASE/PURCHASE AGREEMENT NO. 6074

This Master Equipment Lease/Purchase Agreement dated as of 02/18/2025, and entered into between BB Community Leasing Services, Inc., a Wisconsin corporation ("Lessor"), and City of Dyersville ("Lessee"), a body corporate and politic existing under the laws of the State of Iowa.

- 1. <u>Agreement.</u> Lessee agrees to lease from Lessor certain "Equipment" as described in each Equipment Schedule (Exhibit A), which together with a Rental Payment Schedule (Exhibit A-1) constitute a "Schedule", subject to the terms and conditions of and for the purposes set forth in each Lease. Items of equipment may be added to the Equipment from time to time by execution of additional Schedules by the parties hereto and as otherwise provided herein. Each Schedule and the terms and provisions of this Agreement (which includes all exhibits hereto, together with any amendments and modifications pursuant thereto) which are incorporated by reference into such Schedule shall constitute a separate and independent lease and installment purchase of the Equipment therein described and are referred to herein as a "Lease".

 2. <u>Term.</u> The "Commencement Date" for each Lease is the date when interest commences to accrue under such Lease which date shall be the earlier of (i) the date on

The "Lease Term" for each Lease means the Original Term and all Renewal Terms therein provided and for this Agreement means the period from the date hereof until this agreement is terminated. The "Original Term" means the period from the Commencement Date for each Lease until the end of Lessee's fiscal year or biennium (as the case may be) (the "Fiscal Period") in effect at such Commencement Date. The "Renewal Term" for each Lease is each term having a duration that is coextensive with the Fiscal Period.
- 3. Representations and Covenants of Lessee. Lessee represents, covenants and warrants for the benefit of Lessor on the date hereof and as of the Commencement Date of each Lease as follows: (a) Lessee is a public body corporate and politic duly organized and existing under the constitution and laws of the State with full power and authority under the constitution and laws of the state where the Lessee is located ("State") to enter into this Agreement and each Lease and the transactions contemplated hereby and to perform all of its obligations hereunder and under each Lease; (b) Lessee has duly authorized the execution and delivery of this Agreement and each Lease by proper action of its governing body at a meeting duly called and held in accordance with State law, or by other appropriate official approval, and all requirements have been met and procedures have occurred to ensure the validity and enforceability of this Agreement and each Lease; (c) Lessee will do or cause to be done all things necessary to preserve and keep in full force and effect its existence as a body corporate and politic; (d) Lessee has complied with such public bidding requirements as may be applicable to this Agreement and each Lease and the acquisition by Lessee of the Equipment as provided in each Lease; (e) during the Lease Term, the Equipment will be used by Lessee solely and exclusively for the purpose of performing essential governmental or proprietary functions of Lessee consistent with the permissible scope of Lessee's authority; (f) Lessee will annually provide Lessor with current financial statements, budgets, proof of appropriation for the ensuing Fiscal Period, and such other financial information relating to the ability of Lessee to continue each Lease as may be requested by Lessor; and (g) Lessee has an immediate need for the Equipment listed on each Schedule.

 4. Tax and Arbitrage Representations. Lessee hereby represents as follows: (a) the estimated total cost of the Equipment listed in each Schedule will not be less than the total principal portion of the rental payments listed in such rental Payment Schedule; (b) the Equipment listed in each Schedule has been ordered or is expected to be ordered within 6 months of the Commencement Date, and all amounts deposited in escrow to pay for the Equipment, and interest earnings, will be expended on costs of the Equipment and the financing within 3 years of Commencement Date; (c) no proceeds of any Lease will be used to reimburse Lessee for expenditures made more than 60 days prior to the Commencement Date or, if earlier, more than 60 days prior to any official action taken to evidence an intent to finance; (d) Lessee has not created or established, and does not expect to create or establish, any sinking fund or similar fund (i) that is reasonably expected to be used to pay the Rental Payments, or (ii) that may be used solely to prevent a default in the payment of the Rental Payments; (e) the Equipment listed in each Schedule has not been and is not expected to be sold or otherwise disposed of by Lessee, either in whole or in part, prior to the last maturity of Rental Payments; (f) Lessee will comply with all applicable provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended ("Code"), including without limitation Sections 103 and 148 thereof, and the applicable regulations of the Treasury Department to maintain the exclusion of the interest components of Rental Payments from gross income for purposes of federal income taxation; and (g) Lessee intends that each Lease does not constitute a "true" lease for federal income tax purposes.
- 5. Lease of Equipment. Upon the execution of each Lease, Lessor demises, leases, transfers, and lets to Lessee, and Lessee acquires, rents, leases and hires from Lessor, the Equipment in accordance with the terms thereof. The Lease Term for each Lease may be continued, solely at the option of Lessee, at the end of the Original Term or any Renewal term for the next succeeding Renewal Term up to the maximum Lease Term set forth in such Lease. At the end of the Original Term and at the end of each Renewal Term the Lease Term shall be automatically extended upon the successive appropriation by Lessee's governing body of amounts sufficient to pay Rental Payments and other amounts payable under the related Lease during the next succeeding Fiscal Period until all Rental Payments payable under such Lease have been paid in full, unless Lessee shall have terminated such Lease pursuant to Section 7 or Section 22. The terms and conditions during any Renewal Term shall be the same as the terms and conditions during the Original Term, except that the Rental Payments shall be as provided in the applicable Lease.
- 6. Continuation of Lease Term. Lessee currently intends, subject to Section 7, to continue the Lease Term of each Lease through the Original Term and all Renewal Terms and to pay the Rental Payments thereunder. Lessee reasonably believes that legally available funds in an amount sufficient to make all Rental Payments during the maximum Lease Term of each Lease can be obtained. Lessee currently intends to do all things lawfully within its power to obtain and maintain funds from which the Rental Payments may be made, including making provision for such payment to the extent necessary in each budget or appropriation request submitted and adopted in accordance with applicable provisions of law. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the decision whether or not to budget and appropriate funds or to extend the applicable schedule for any Renewal Term is within the discretion of the governing body of Lessee.
- 7. Nonappropriation. Lessee is obligated only to pay such Rental Payments under each Lease as may lawfully be made from funds budgeted and appropriated for that purpose. Should Lessee fail to budget, appropriate or otherwise make available funds to pay Rental Payments under any Lease following the then current Original Term or Renewal Term, such Lease or Leases shall be deemed terminated at the end of the then current Original Term or Renewal Term. Lessee agrees to deliver notice to Lessor of such termination at least 60 days prior to the end of the then current Original Term or Renewal Term, but failure to give such notice shall not extend the term beyond such Original Term or Renewal Term. If any Lease is terminated in accordance with this Section, Lessee shall, at its sole expense, both restore the equipment to its original condition, allowing for reasonable wear and tear, and agrees to peaceably deliver the Equipment to Lessor at the location(s) to be specified by Lessor.
- 8. Conditions to Lessor's Performance. This Agreement is not a commitment by Lessor to enter into any Lease not currently in existence, and nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to impose any obligation upon Lessor to enter into any proposed Lease, it being understood that whether Lessor enters into any proposed Lease shall be a decision solely within the Lessor's discretion. Lessee will cooperate with Lessor in Lessor's review of any proposed Lease. Lessee understands that Lessor requires certain documentation and information necessary to enter into any Lease and Lessee agrees to provide Lessor with any documentation or information Lessor may request in connection with Lessor's review of any proposed Lease. Such documentation may include without limitation, documentation concerning the Equipment and its contemplated use and location and documentation or information concerning the financial status of Lessee and other matters related to Lessee.
- 9. Rental Payments. Lessee shall promptly pay "Rental Payments" as described in Exhibit A-1 to each Lease, exclusively from legally available funds, to Lessor on the dates and in such amounts as provided in each Lease. To the extent permitted by law, Lessee shall pay Lessor a charge on any Rental Payment not paid on the date such payment is due at the maximum rate permitted by law, from such date until paid. Rental Payments consist of principle and interest portions. Lessor and Lessee understand and intend that the obligation of Lessee to pay Rental Payments under each Lease shall constitute a current expense of Lessee and shall not in any way be construed to be a debt of Lessee in contravention of any applicable constitutional or statutory limitation or requirement concerning the creation of indebtedness by
- Lessee, nor shall anything contained herein or in a Lease constitute a pledge of the general tax revenues, funds or monies of Lessee.

 10. Rental Payments To Be Unconditional. EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN SECTION 7, THE OBLIGATIONS OF LESSEE TO MAKE RENTAL PAYMENTS AND TO PERFORM AND OBSERVE THE OTHER COVENANTS AND AGREEMENTS CONTAINED IN EACH LEASE SHALL BE ABSOLUTE AND UNCONDITIONAL IN ALL EVENTS WITHOUT ABATEMENT, DIMINUTION, DEDUCTION, SET-OFF OR DEFENSE, FOR ANY REASON, INCLUDING WITHOUT LIMITATION ANY FAILURE OF THE EQUIPMENT TO BE DELIVERED OR INSTALLED, ANY DEFECTS, MALFUNCTIONS, BREAKDOWNS OR INFIRMITIES IN THE EQUIPMENT OR ANY ACCIDENT, CONDEMNATION OR UNFORSEEN CIRCUMSTANCES.
- 11. <u>Delivery: Installation; Acceptance.</u> Lessee shall order the Equipment, cause the Equipment to be delivered and installed at the location specified in each Lesse and pay any and all delivery and installation costs in connection therewith. When the Equipment listed in any Lease has been delivered and installed, Lessee shall immediately accept such Equipment and evidence said acceptance by executing and delivering to Lessor an Acceptance Certificate (Exhibit B). Lessor shall provide Lessee with quiet use and enjoyment of the Equipment during the Lease Term.
- 12. <u>Location; Inspection.</u> Once installed, no item of the Equipment will be moved from the location specified for it in the Lease on which such item is listed without Lessor's consent, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld. Lessor shall have the right at all reasonable times during regular business hours to enter into and upon the property of Lessee for the purpose of inspecting the Equipment.
- 13. Use; Maintenance. Lessee will not install, use, operate or maintain the Equipment improperly, carelessly, in violation of any applicable law or in a manner contrary to that contemplated by the related Lease. Lessee shall provide all permits and licenses, if any, necessary for the installation and operation of the Equipment. In addition, Lessee agrees to comply in all respects with all applicable laws, regulations and rulings of any legislative, executive, administrative or judicial body. Lessee agrees that it will, at Lessee's own cost and expense maintain, preserve and keep the Equipment in good repair and working order. Lessee will enter into a maintenance contract for the Equipment that is acceptable to Lessor.
- 14. <u>Title.</u> Upon acceptance of the Equipment under a Lease by Lessee, title to the Equipment shall vest in Lessee subject to Lessor's rights under the Lease; provided that title shall thereafter immediately and without any action by Lessee vest in Lessor, and Lessee shall immediately surrender possession of the Equipment to Lessor, upon (a) any termination of the applicable Lease other than termination pursuant to section 22 or (b) the occurrence of an Event of Default. Transfer of title to Lessor pursuant to this Section shall occur automatically without the necessity of any bill of sale, certificate of title or other instrument of conveyance. Lessee shall, nevertheless, execute and deliver any such instruments as Lessor may request to evidence such transfer.
- 15. Security Interest. To secure the payment of all of Lessee's obligations under each Lease, upon the execution of such Lease, Lessee grants to Lessor a security interest constituting a first and exclusive lien on all equipment and fixtures that the Lessee leases/purchases from the Lessor, now existing or hereafter acquired, and (i) all accounts instruments, documents, general intangibles, security deposits, or reserves; (ii) all spares, repairs, accessories, additions, attachments, replacements, substitutions, or accessions; and (iii) all insurance and other proceeds or products, all as may directly or indirectly arise out of or be related to the foregoing equipment and fixtures, wherever located. Lessee authorizes Lessor to file or record UCC financing statements to perfect Lessor's security interest in the collateral granted

preceding sentence. If Lessor shall so request, Lessee shall execute and deliver to Lessor such documents as Lessor shall deem necessary or desirable for p recording or filing to protect the interest of Lessor including, but not limited to, a UCC financing statement. Lessee acknowledges and agrees that the Equipment shall at all times be and remain, personal property notwithstanding that the Equipment or any part thereof may now be or hereafter become in any manner affixed or attached to, imbedded in, or permanently resting upon real property or any building thereon, or attached in any manner to what is permanent as by means of cement, plaster, nails, bolts, screws or otherwise.

- 16. <u>Liens, Taxes, Other Governmental Charges and Utility Charges.</u> Lessee shall keep the Equipment free of all levies, liens and encumbrances except those created by each Lease. The parties to this Agreement contemplate that the Equipment will be used for governmental or proprietary purposes of Lessee and that the Equipment will therefore be exempt from all property taxes. If the use, possession or acquisition of any Equipment is nevertheless determined to be subject to taxation, Lessee shall pay when due all taxes and governmental charges lawfully assessed or levied against or with respect to such Equipment. Lessee shall pay all utility and other charges incurred in the use and maintenance of the Equipment. Lessee shall pay such taxes or charges as the same may become due.

 17. <u>Insurance.</u> At its own expense, Lessee shall during each Lease Term maintain (a) casualty insurance insuring the Equipment against loss or damage by fire and all
- other risks covered by the standard extended coverage endorsement then in use in the State and any other risks reasonably required by Lessor, in an amount at least equal to the then applicable "Purchase Price" of the Equipment as described in Exhibit A-1 of each Lease; (b) liability insurance that protects Lessee from liability in all events in form and amount satisfactory to Lessor; and (c) workers' compensation coverage as required by the laws of the State; provided that, with Lessor's prior written consent, Lessee may self-insure against the risks described in clauses (a) and (b). Lessee shall furnish to Lessor evidence of such insurance or self-insurance coverage throughout each Lease Term. Lessee shall not materially modify or cancel such insurance or self-insurance coverage without first giving written notice thereof to Lessor at least 30 days in advance of such cancellation or modification. All such insurance described in clauses (a) and (b) above shall contain a provision naming Lessor as a loss payee and additional insured. If you do not give evidence of insurance acceptable to us, we have the right, but not the obligation, to obtain insurance covering our interest in the Equipment for the term of this Lease, including any renewal or extensions, from an insurer of our choice, including an insurer that is our affiliate. We may add the costs of acquiring and maintaining such insurance, and our fees for our service in placing and maintaining such insurance (collectively, "Insurance Charge") to the amounts due from you under this Lease.
- 18. Advances. In case of failure of Lessee to keep the Equipment in good repair and working order, to procure or maintain said insurance or to pay fees, assessments, charges and taxes, all as specified in this Lease, Lessor shall have the right, but shall not be obligated, to maintain and repair the Equipment and pay the cost thereof, to affect such insurance, or pay such fees, assignments, charges and taxes, as the case may be. All amounts so advanced by Lessor shall constitute additional rent for the then current Original Term or Renewal Term and Lessee agrees to pay such amounts so advanced by Lessor with interest thereon from the advance date until paid at the maximum rate permitted by law.
- 19. <u>Damage</u>. <u>Destruction and Condemnation</u>. If (a) the Equipment or any portion thereof is destroyed, in whole or in part, or is damaged by fire or other casualty or (b) title to, or the temporary use of, the Equipment or any part thereof shall be taken under the exercise or threat of the power of eminent domain by any governmental body or by any person, firm or corporation acting pursuant to governmental authority, Lessee and Lessor will cause the Net Proceeds to be applied to the prompt replacement, repair, restoration modification or improvement of the Equipment to substantially the same condition as existed prior to the event causing such damage, destruction, or condemnation, unless Lessee shall have exercised its option to purchase the Equipment pursuant to Section 22. Any balance of the Net Proceeds remaining after such work has been completed shall be paid to Lessee. For purposes of this Section, the term "Net Proceeds" shall mean (y) the amount of insurance proceeds received by Lessee for replacing, repairing, restoring, modifying, or improving damaged or destroyed Equipment, or (z) the amount remaining from the gross proceeds of any condemnation award or sale under threat of condemnation after deducting all expenses, including attorneys' fees, incurred in the collection thereof. If the Net Proceeds are insufficient to pay in the full cost of any replacement, repair, restoration, modification or improvement referred to herein, Lessee shall either (a) complete such replacement, repair, restoration, modification or improvement and pay any cost thereof in excess of the amount of the Net Proceeds, or (b) pursuant to Section 22 purchase Lessor's interest in the Equipment and in any other equipment listed in the same Lease. The amount of the Net Proceeds, if any, remaining after completing such replacement, repair, restoration, modification or improvement or after purchasing Lessor's interest in the Equipment and such other Equipment shall be retained by Lessee.
