The FY 2025 award may be used for National Institute of Justice (NIJ) compliant armored vests which were ordered after April 1, 2025. The deadline to request payments from the FY 2025 award is August 31, 2027 or until all available funds have been requested. Awards will not be extended past that date, and any unused funds will be forfeited.

As a reminder, body armor vests purchased with BVP funds must have been tested through the NIJ [Compliance Testing Program](#) and found to comply with the most current NIJ body armor standards, appear on the [NIJ Compliant Products List](#) as of the date the body armor was ordered, be uniquely fitted, and be made in the United States. In addition, a written mandatory wear policy for uniformed patrol officers must have been in place at the time of application.

The federal portion of the costs for body armor vests purchased under the BVP Program may not exceed 50 percent. However, jurisdictions may request a financial or natural disaster hardship waiver during the payment request process and receive up to 100 percent of the cost of each body armor vest submitted for reimbursement. Baseball/Softball:

Highlights from the Librarian's Report to the Board of Trustees for May 2026 are:

- 6,967 items were checked out. This is an 11% decrease from May 2025. Fiscal year to date, circulation is down 2.5%.
- 32 library cards were issued to new patrons. Fiscal year to date, 276 new library cards have been issued.
- 94 programs were offered in person, virtually, remotely, and as activity kits. 3,604 people engaged with these activities. Year to date, program attendance is up 22.6%.
- Four public access computers and three children's computers were available and were used for 165 hours and 362 sessions. Year to date computers were used for 2,279 hours and 4,752 sessions.
- WiFi Use: 889 sessions, 799 visits, and 338 unique users. Year to date WiFi use included 11,474 sessions, 9,792 visits, and 2,102 unique users.
- There were 5,018 library visits. Year to date visits are up 0.4%.

Upcoming Events:

Enclosed please find a copy of the June events schedule, as well as a preliminary schedule of activities planned for July. Some of the programs scheduled include a musician, a laser show, a program on pollinators, programs presented by Dubuque County Conservation, bubbles and butterflies at the Downtown Markets, a program on Hospice, and the annual Summer Tea. The JKPL Book Bike will be visiting various locations and the Pop-up Library will be at the Farmer's Market and Downtown Market. Summer Reading Programs for all ages continue through July with the theme: Plant a Seed - Read. The Friends of the JKPL Used Book Sale is July 17 – 20.

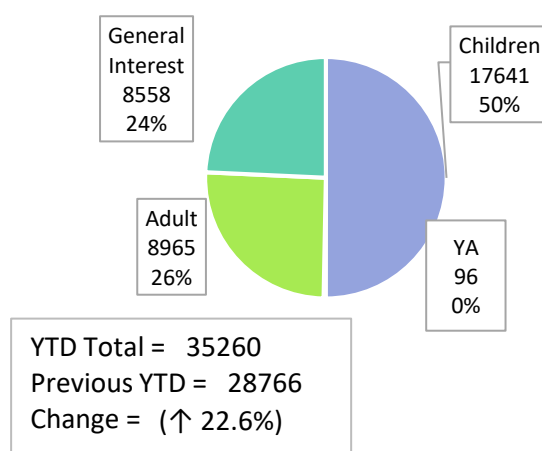

Subject: Public Works Report: May 13 – June 10, 2026

Things have been operating well over the last month or so in Public Works.

Operation and Maintenance of Fleet, Highways, Streets, Alleys, Parks, Trails, Rivers, Creeks, etc.

The streets and fleets arm of Public Works is doing an excellent job with the operations and maintenance of Dyersville’s street systems and equipment. We have been busy this month updating and installing signs, spraying weeds, sweeping streets, filling pot-holes, managing flags, and lots of odds-and-ends.

In order to keep our streets clean, we need to run the sweeper at least 1 full week out of every month. We have once-again hired a part-time CDL-holding operator to help with this. Also, the City’s contract pavement marking work is in-process. It should be done by the end of next week.

Public Works staff has been helping Parks and Rec. with a number of maintenance and improvement projects as well as other items to prepare for tournaments and get other facilities ready. Parks and FEMA Buyout properties were sprayed for weeds. The weeds along the creeks and rivers will be safely sprayed by the licensed and certified specialist that we contract with. This is required at least twice a year to stay ahead of the weeds.

Operation and Maintenance of Drinking Water Delivery and Wastewater Disposal Systems

The drinking water source, storage, treatment, and distribution systems are serving the city well. The wastewater collection, pumping, treatment, and disposal systems are also operating well. Dyersville’s Water and Wastewater operators are doing an excellent job keeping everything functioning smoothly. Please refer to the Water report for May and the Wastewater reports for April, below.

Improvement and Expansion Projects (new information in bold)

US-52 / 12th Avenue SE Traffic Signal (added 4/26)

All the new pavements are in and grass is growing on most of the disturbed areas. Traffic signal poles and mast-arms are being assembled and made ready for installation. The project appears to be on schedule for the end-of-June completion.

Kwik Star Development (added 4/26)

Work is progressing on the development for Kwik Star.

Stonegate Appartements – Formerly Cardinal Lounge Property (added 4/26)

Work is progressing.

Olde Castle Road Utilities Extension (added 12/25)

Easement instruments are ready for execution and are being reviewed by the private property owners. Construction plans are included in this Council Packet for approval. Once approved, they will go out for quotes and for a construction permit from the Iowa DNR.

Westlinden Lift Station (added 7/25)

Design is moving forward.

1st Street SW Rehabilitation (added 6/25)

On-hold for the moment.

3rd Avenue SW Bridge Replacement (added 2/25)

Work has begun on the Design.

Castle Hill – 4th Addition (added 7/24)

Work continues on the rest of the 4th Addition.

1st Avenue West - Old Highway Road - Improvement (Added 2/24)

Construction began around April 1. Construction is substantially complete.

Downtown Streetscape Rehabilitation (Added 4/23)

We are getting quotes for some street pavement repairs/replacements for next FY.

Downtown Businesses Accessibility – (Added June, 2021)

A ramp on 2nd Avenue NE is under design.

Field of Dreams Stormwater Wetland and Mitigation (Added to list in April, 2020)

A map showing areas requiring attention has been prepared by the engineer. Work is expected soon. A live streaming camera of the site is available for viewing at: <https://video.nest.com/live/G4AGPm8tkR>

It was a busy month with issues coming into the plant. We have been working on a plan to resolve the issue as in the additional report. And it was discovered while looking into the issues at the plant that we were taking in a lot of extra infiltration with the wet weather. After watching the weekly lift station check reports it had shown that the Goldsmith lift station was running excessively more than it normally should. We start checking manholes coming into that lift station. It was discovered that most of the manholes along Dyersville East Rd headed out the Field of Dream Lift station were either leaking or a couple of them had been damaged by being hit with farm equipment. We did meet with the Engineering company and contractor, and they are going to be out in the next few weeks to look at repairs.

We have been working through getting the west plant up and working now that the clarifiers rehab projects are finished. With the tanks all full we were able to let all the components operate as they should and now, we are starting to see the age of the plant show. We are getting repair/replace quotes for the aging equipment, so when we want to put the plant back into service it is 100% ready to run 24/7/365.

Then Sewer Jetting 2026 has been on hold due to rental truck not being available due to repairs. The truck was supposed to arrive in the first part of May. With the delay we are looking into the option of renting the truck for additional time. We had it scheduled for May and June, so we would have been before Ragbri, MLB game and the Velocity Music Festival prep and events.

I am pleased to present the monthly report outlining progress on ongoing commitments, priority projects, and initiatives aligned with the goals outlined in our 2026–2027 agenda.

1. **Field of Dreams:** MLB Coordination and Event Preparation: Coordination activities with Major League Baseball, BAAM Productions, and Dyersville Events, Inc. continue to progress well. Event preparations are advancing on schedule. The City's updated Clean Zone Ordinance is on the agenda for City Council consideration at this meeting. Staff remains actively engaged in coordination efforts to support infrastructure, public safety planning, and overall event readiness.
2. **Professional Ballpark Project:** Construction of the professional ballpark project is progressing toward substantial completion. The Field of Dreams Movie Site will be hosting several high school games in mid-June, marking an early milestone for the facility. Staff continues to coordinate with the Field of Dreams members, contractors, and all parties to support the final stages of construction.
3. **Grants and Funding Activity (BRIC Hazard Mitigation Grant):** Work on the City's Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) Hazard Mitigation Grant Phase I application continues to move forward. I have been actively assisting with benefit-cost analysis (BCA) calculations and continue to gather supporting information for the application. Staff is working closely with Eocene Environmental Group as this effort advances.
4. **Residential Developments:** Pavement work in the Castle Hill development is now complete. Work on the Southwest Stormwater Improvement project continues in coordination with Eocene Environmental Group. The concept plan and professional services agreement for the Southwest Stormwater Improvement project are on the agenda for City Council review and consideration at this meeting.

5. **Sidewalk Program and Street Infrastructure:** Following Council approval of the City's Sidewalk Policy in May, staff continues implementation efforts. Sidewalk needs and related infrastructure priorities will be evaluated on an ongoing basis as part of the City's broader infrastructure planning.
6. **Public Works – Westlinden Lift Station Replacement:** City staff met with engineers from Origin Design Company to answer design questions and work on refining the project location and design standards. Preliminary design work continues to progress.
7. **Parks and Recreation:** The Parks and Recreation Department continues with seasonal operations and programming. Staff remain focused on maintaining facilities and delivering quality recreational services to the community.
8. **Urban Renewal and Development Activity:** The City Council approved all four development agreements presented in May, representing over \$28 million in new construction activity within the community. I am currently working on an additional TIF (tax increment financing) development agreement that will be brought to the City Council for consideration in the near future.
9. **Finance – Moody's Credit Review:** Moody's Investors Service has issued its credit report on the City's outstanding general obligation bond issues. I will be forwarding the report to the Policy and Administration Committee for review and evaluation of the findings.

School Districts Receive \$1.25 MM

Thanks to a recent Iowa Department of Education 21st Century Community Learning Center (21CCLC) grant award, Andrew and Easton Vally Community School Districts (CSD) are expanding their successful out-of-school program to include Delwood CSD.

Andrew CSD has successfully operated a 21CCLC program for 10 consecutive years, branded the Leader Education After School Program (LEAP). Easton Valley joined LEAP in 2021–22 and this recent application expands the program to Delwood Elementary.

LEAP provides free before-school, after-school, and summer programming at all three sites, including academic support, enrichment, leadership development, USDA-approved snacks, physical activities, family literacy events, and transportation in summer. Community partners provide experiences like going to museums, hiking at and learning about nearby nature areas, cooking classes, simple banking lessons, and other various field trips or community partner visits.

Affordable school-age childcare is extremely limited. Brandon Kirchhoff, Andrew Principal said, “LEAP provides students with many opportunities they would not experience otherwise. Without the program, many students would go home and play video games and wait for their parents to get home from work. The LEAP program provides students a safe place to explore new activities, learning, experiences, and places. A huge program success is relationships with peers. Especially for some of our students who have autism. They have been able to experience some things and learn how to behave in groups at different places. This has opened the door to the parents being willing to take their children to more places outside of their home, knowing they now know how to act in these social environments.”

The 21st Century Community Learning Centers grant provides Title IV, Part B funds to start or expand quality out-of-school time programs offered before school, after school and during academic breaks. School districts must have a free and reduced lunch rate of 40% or more to be eligible.

Tipton Receives \$1.5+MM Grant

The City of Tipton is getting a Department of Energy award through the Iowa Economic Development Authority (IEDA) that will strengthen the city's grid and recovery time when dealing with weather related outages. The \$1,529,427 IEDA Iowa Grid Resilience Fund award will help pay for the following:

- Converting 4,300 feet of overhead (OH) electric distribution lines to underground (UG) in a tree-populated area prone to weather-related outages.
- Automating and upgrading Generator #1, including improvements to its cooling system, fuel system, and electrical panel.

The total project cost is \$1,897,827. The project team is meeting and hopes to begin construction in late 2026, early 2027.

West Branch Partners with UI on 17 Projects

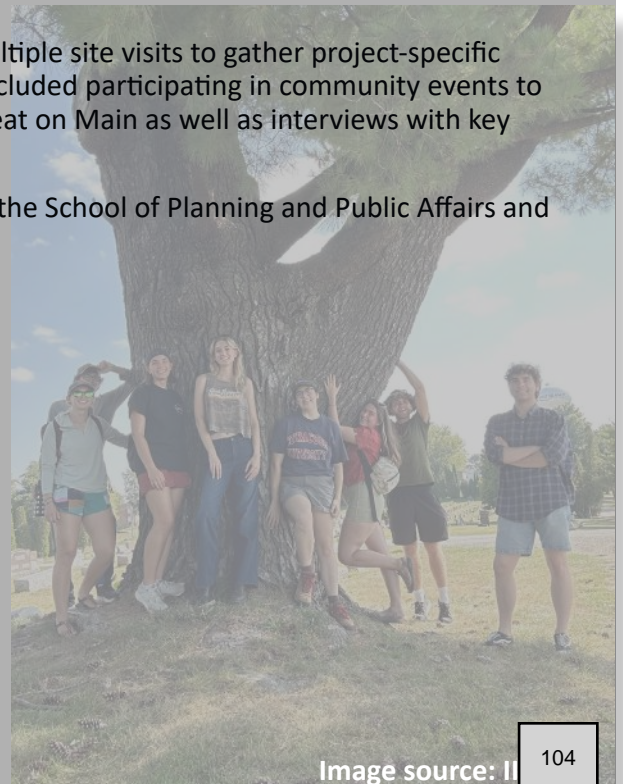

A Message from Homes for Iowa

Item 25.

Homes for Iowa (HFI) is a 501c3 nonprofit organization that has been working to train offenders, reduce recidivism, and benefit lowans since 2019. HFI trains offenders in building trades by giving them practical experience in building houses. Each house is built at the Newton Correctional Release Facility (NCRF) and delivered directly onto the foundation of the buyer's lot. The money from each sale pays for the training.

The HFI board reviews pricing each June and in past years there has typically been a modest increase. Orders placed before July 1 will lock in current pricing. Securing pricing now can help provide greater certainty for your project budgeting.

Current pricing from HFI website:

- Three-bedroom (1200 SF): \$108,000
- Two-bedroom (1200 SF): \$108,000
- Two-bedroom one bath (1000 SF): \$98,000

Each plan requires a deposit of 10%. Plan availability differs based on house model.

Submitting an order in the coming weeks helps secure your place in the 2026 production schedule.

With a typical build timeline of approximately six months, this is less about year-end delivery and more about ensuring alignment with your broader project timeline and planning needs.

HFI is expanding its building site, with work slated to be completed this summer, which will nearly double capacity from 24 homes built in a year to 45. This expansion will position HFI to meet the growing housing demand across the state.

The impact behind Homes for Iowa speaks volumes; nearly 700 trainees having come through the program and 159 homes delivered since 2020. Does your community need housing and have lots available?

MH: Spending more time with family and friends, and in a new part time role with Clarity Clinic.

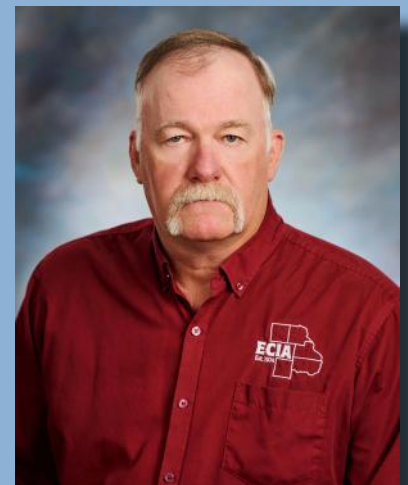
Where is the first place you want to travel?

Following are the construction plans and specification for the Olde Castle Road Sanitary Sewer Extension 2026 project. This project will extend an 8-inch sanitary sewer from the existing sewer in the Castle Hill Estates subdivision, across Olde Castle Road, to a manhole in the public right-of-way on the south side of the road, located in front of the residence at 31600 Olde Castle Road, Dyersville, Iowa. The improvement will provide for future sewer extensions to be able to serve neighboring residences to the east, west, and south.

Once approved, the City Engineer will solicit competitive quotes from at least 3 qualified contractors. The plans will also be sent to the Iowa DNR for a construction permit.

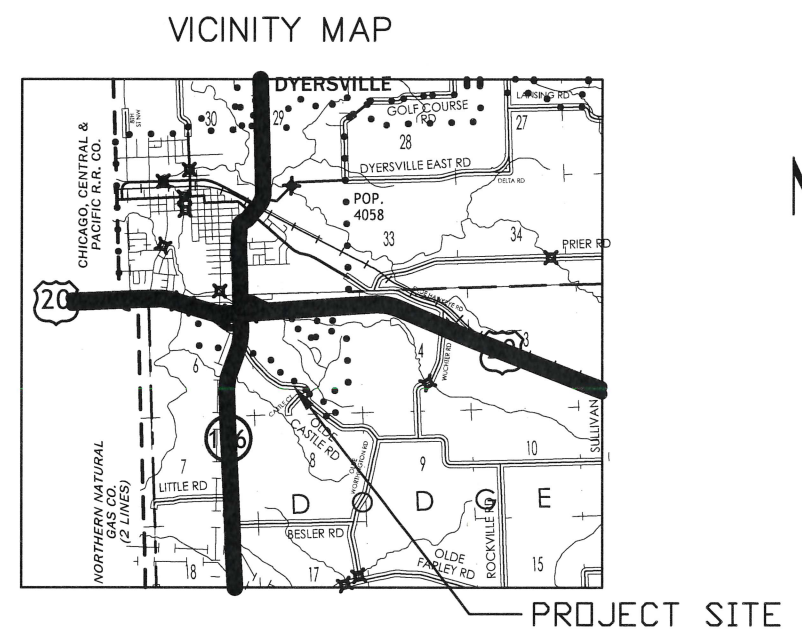
The cost for this improvement is expected to be in the range of \$65,000 and \$85,000, depending on the amount of rock excavation needed.

ORDINANCE NO. 879

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DYERSVILLE, IOWA, DESIGNATING THE CITY OF DYERSVILLE AS A “CLEAN ZONE”, PROVIDING FOR THE SAFE AND ORDERLY USE OF CITY STREETS AND SIDEWALKS BY SIDEWALK VENDORS AND PEDESTRIANS DURING THE 2026 MAJOR LEAGUE BASEBALL AT THE FIELD OF DREAMS EVENT [HEREINAFTER “EVENT”]; ESTABLISHING TERMS AND CONDITIONS FOR HOST COMMITTEES; REGULATING COMMERCIAL ACTIVITIES DURING THE EVENT; PROVIDING FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF PUBLIC PARTICIPATION AREAS; TO PROVIDE FOR FINES AND PENALTIES; AND TO ESTABLISH A CLEAN ZONE, EFFECTIVE 12:01 A.M. MONDAY, AUGUST 10, 2026, AND ENDING AT 11:59 P.M. ON SATURDAY, AUGUST 15, 2026; PROVIDED FOR THIS ORDINANCE IS CUMULATIVE OF ALL ORDINANCES; PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION.

AN ORDINANCE to provide for the designation of public property within the City of Dyersville (the “City”) as a “Clean Zone” during the time period beginning at 12:01 a.m. on Monday, August 10, 2026, and ending at 11:59 p.m. on Saturday, August 15, 2026, relative to the use of these areas in conjunction with the Major League Baseball Properties, Inc., (“MLB”) game between the Philadelphia Phillies and the Minnesota Twins to be held at a ballpark near the Field of Dreams Movie Site on Thursday, August 13, 2026, (or Friday, August 14, 2026, if there is inclement weather) (referred to herein as “the Game”); to provide for the temporary suspension of certain permits in the Clean Zone area, to provide for the temporary prohibition of the transaction of certain business and/or commercial activity in the Clean Zone area; to provide for the establishment of public participation areas; to provide for the establishment of fines and penalties for violations of this ordinance; to establish the Clean Zone; and to otherwise provide with respect thereto;

WHEREAS, the City anticipates that the Game and all of the related events will contribute substantially to the general welfare of the City; and

WHEREAS, the City anticipates that the Game will lead to a substantial increase in tourism to the City during the week of the Game; and

WHEREAS, the City anticipates that the Game will generate substantial economic benefit to the City and surrounding Dubuque County; and

WHEREAS, the City anticipates that the Game will generate substantial goodwill and enhanced prestige for the City; and

WHEREAS, the City anticipates that the Game will lead to the creation of numerous temporary job opportunities for area residents; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to encourage similar events in the future; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to enact this Ordinance to ensure the safety and comfort of patrons

who are attending the Game and related events, as well as the citizens of the City generally during the week of the Game; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to enact this Ordinance to promote and protect good order and aesthetic quality in the City during the week of the Game; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to enact this Ordinance to protect the safety and convenience of drivers and pedestrians in and around the City during the week of the Game.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DYERSVILLE, IOWA:

Section 1. There is hereby established a Clean Zone within the jurisdictional limits of the City of Dyersville.

Section 2. The Clean Zone defined in Section 1 shall have a duration beginning at 12:01 a.m. on Monday, August 10, 2026, and ending at 11:59 p.m. on Saturday, August 15, 2026.

Section 3. Within the Clean Zone, the activities described below, conducted by any person or entity except those approved by the City, shall be regulated as follows:

- a. The sale of merchandise and/or the transaction of business by any competitor of a sponsor of Major League Baseball, other than a competitor existing as of the date of the adoption of this Ordinance with its primary place of business located within the City of Dyersville, is prohibited on public streets, sidewalks, or right of ways, outside of an enclosed building, or from any temporary structure. A list of the sponsors of Major League Baseball is available at <https://www.mlb.com/sponsorship/official-sponsors> or at City Hall.
- b. Sale of tickets to the Game is prohibited.
- c. The distribution of free samples by any person or business, other than a business existing as of the date of the adoption of this Ordinance with its principal place of business in the City of Dyersville, is prohibited on public streets, sidewalks, or right of ways, outside of an enclosed building, or from any temporary outdoor structure.
- d. The sale or distribution of goods or merchandise bearing any MLB intellectual property is prohibited other than by a business existing at the time of the adoption of this Ordinance with its principal place of business within the City of Dyersville that sells or distributes Major League Baseball licensed products in its regular course of business.
- e. The construction, placement, occupation, or use of any temporary structure (including, but not limited to, temporary location of tents, canopies, and air-supported, air-inflated, and/or tensioned membranes) shall be prohibited.
- f. Crop dusting or other disbursement of agricultural chemicals, whether by aircraft or by a ground-based spray, is prohibited.

Section 4. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed as a repeal or suspension of any existing laws prohibiting or governing the issuance of permits outside of "Clean Zone" geographical boundaries.

Section 5. One or more Public Participation Areas shall be established within or around the Clean Zone. Each Public Participation Area shall allow for the reasonable expression by the public in a manner that shall not be disruptive to the Game and related activities and events. Public Participation Areas shall be provided for during such reasonable times, and in such reasonable locations or proximity in and/or around the Clean Zone as to allow for meaningful and effective expression by the public.

Section 6. The violation of any provision of this ordinance shall be punishable by a fine not exceeding \$500, or by imprisonment for not more than six (6) months, or both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 7. If any of the provisions of this ordinance are for any reason held to be unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions, and those remaining portions shall be and remain in full force and effect.

Section 8. This ordinance shall be in effect after its final passage, approval, and publication, as provided by law.

RESOLUTION NO. 54-26

A RESOLUTION APPROVING THE DYERSVILLE SOUTHWEST STORMWATER IMPROVEMENTS CONCEPT DESIGN PREPARED BY EOCENE ENVIRONMENTAL GROUP

WHEREAS, the City of Dyersville is experiencing residential growth in the southwest area of the community, and the City has determined that the existing stormwater infrastructure in that area must be improved to manage water quantity, protect water quality, provide ecological benefits, and prepare the area for continued development; and,

WHEREAS, the City engaged Eocene Environmental Group of Coralville, Iowa, to evaluate existing conditions and prepare a concept design for stormwater improvements in the southwest area of Dyersville; and,

WHEREAS, Eocene Environmental Group has completed the Dyersville SW Stormwater Improvements Concept Design, dated June 5, 2026, which identifies four stormwater management practices: (A) an Enhanced Drainage Basin, (B) Drainageway Improvements and Connection to Tegeler Pond, (C) Drainageway Abandonment, and (D) a Tegeler Pond Outfall and Vegetated Swale; and,

WHEREAS, the concept design covers approximately 14.5 acres of previously disturbed land adjacent to 12th Avenue SW, 6th Avenue SW, and Tegeler Pond, and includes a conceptual opinion of probable cost of \$692,000 for the combined construction of all four practices; and,

WHEREAS, Eocene Environmental Group recommends constructing the four practices as a single combined project to balance earthwork across the sites, reduce mobilization costs, and minimize construction disruption to the area; and,

WHEREAS, approval of the concept design authorizes the City to proceed to final engineering design and does not commit the City to a specific funding source or construction contract, which will require separate Council action.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DYERSVILLE, IOWA, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Approval of Concept Design. The Dyersville SW Stormwater Improvements Concept Design prepared by Eocene Environmental Group, dated June 5, 2026, is hereby approved.

SECTION 2. Authorization to Proceed. The City Administrator is authorized and directed to work with Eocene Environmental Group and City staff to advance the project to final engineering design.

SECTION 3. Future Council Action Required. Any contract for final design services or construction shall be brought to the City Council for approval prior to execution.

SECTION 4. Conflicting Provisions. All resolutions or parts of resolutions in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

DYERSVILLE SW STORMWATER IMPROVEMENTS CONCEPT DESIGN

OVERVIEW

Description

This project is a combination of four stormwater management practices in southwest Dyersville, in an area of the community experiencing residential growth and planning for continued development. The four proposed practices are:

- A. Enhanced Drainage Basin
- B. Drainageway Improvements and Connection to Tegeler Pond
- C. Drainageway Abandonment
- D. Tegeler Pond Outfall & Vegetated Swale

The goals of these stormwater improvements are to manage water quantity, add water quality benefits, add ecological benefits, increase accessibility and aesthetic appeal, and prepare for future development of the area. Additionally, the practices will provide a buffer between current residential development and future industrial development.

A conceptual design was created for the four stormwater management practices, and the design was used to prepare a conceptual opinion of probable cost. The conceptual design is based on aerial imagery, in-person site evaluation, LiDAR surface data, StreamStats data, typical sections, and standard sizing calculations. The attached plan sheets provide an overview of the conceptual design. Comprehensive design will include more detailed data collection and analysis, which will be used to refine the design and cost opinions.

Project Site

The project site is adjacent to 12th Avenue SW, 6th Avenue SW, and Tegeler Pond in an area experiencing rapid residential development. The proposed project area covers approximately 14.5 acres of previously disturbed land. Upstream of Tegeler Pond, the existing site is an open area containing a realigned and channelized drainageway. Tegeler Pond is manmade for use as a sand quarry, and it outlets to Bear Creek through two corrugated metal pipes and an eroded drainageway. The portion of this project that is downstream of Tegeler Pond is in the FEMA floodplain. Upon preliminary review, no wetlands appear to be present at the project site.

Construction Considerations

Constructing the practices in a single phase versus separate projects or phases will impact the construction cost. The construction costs are generally cumulative; however, combining construction has the potential to lower unit costs or lump sums of some items, such as mobilization. Most significantly, earthwork can be balanced across the cumulative projects (practices), whereas standalone projects involve extensive cut or fill (import/export of fill material). Table 1 summarizes the conceptual project cost with adjustments for the combined construction scenario. Details on each stormwater management practice, including individual opinions of probable cost, are described in the following sections.

ENHANCED DRAINAGE BASIN

Design Data

- Drainage Area = 90 acres
- Existing Basin Area (from CAD) = 3.12 acres
- Existing Low Elevation = 955
- Proposed Low Elevation = 953 (middle pool)
- Existing Basin Volume (from LiDAR and CAD) = 7,895 yd³, all one pool
- Proposed Storage Volume = 8,186 yd³, split into three pools
- Net Earthwork = 97 CY fill (1.35 fill factor)

Concept Design

The proposed drainage basin is designed to match or exceed the storage capacity of the existing drainage basin while providing enhanced functionality. Using LiDAR surface data and CAD, the existing storage capacity was estimated to be 7,895 cubic yards. This volume is held entirely in one large pool with an approximate rim elevation of 959 and floor elevation of 955. The existing pool is entirely filled in with cattails, and there is some woody brush growing along the downstream rim. Proposed grading was created in CAD to reconfigure the pool within the existing footprint, making it more accessible and aesthetically pleasing. The proposed drainage basin has a storage capacity of 8,186 cubic yards, divided between three pools. The north and south pools have the same floor elevation of 955; the middle pool is proposed to be excavated an additional two feet to a floor elevation of 953. Not only does this extra depth increase storage, but it also allows for more variety in vegetation because plants that can tolerate extended inundation can be planted in the deeper areas. The proposed grading incorporates shallow side slopes, 10-foot-wide berms, and flat benches for access and easy maintenance. The concept design also includes native vegetation and trees for shade, biodiversity, and aesthetic value.

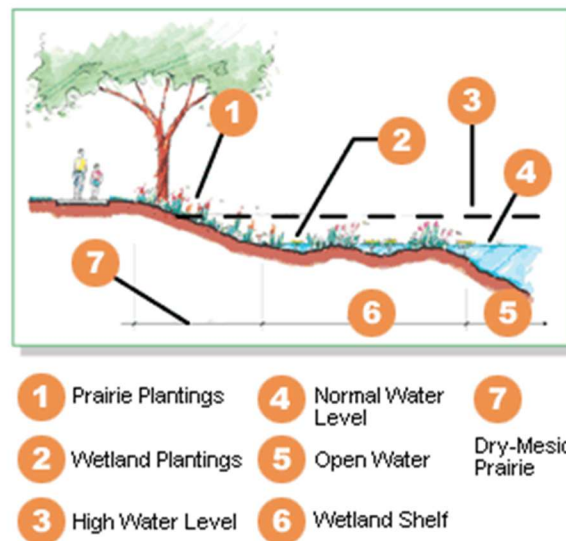


Figure 1: Schematic of a Naturalized Detention Basin with Varied Pool Elevations and Plantings

Conceptual Cost Information

Construction of the enhanced drainage basin primarily involves earthwork and vegetation establishment, along with the installation of stoplog structures and the associated pipe. The stoplog structures allow for temporary dewatering for vegetation management. Earthwork within the project site is nearly balanced, which helps with the construction cost since minimal hauling or excess fill material is needed. Table 2 details the quantities and costs for the proposed enhanced drainage basin.

Maintenance costs for this project primarily address vegetation establishment and adaptive management. These costs can include general maintenance, prescribed fire, mowing, tree establishment, and invasive species monitoring and maintenance. Keeping cattail growth under control will require diligence. Typically, maintenance is more intensive during the initial years of growth, and it becomes more self-sustaining as vegetation establishment progresses.

Additional Amenities

Amenities associated with the enhanced drainage basin may include a walking trail; benches; bird blinds; bird and/or plant identification signage; large stones for crossing, climbing, and sitting; and access points for exploration.

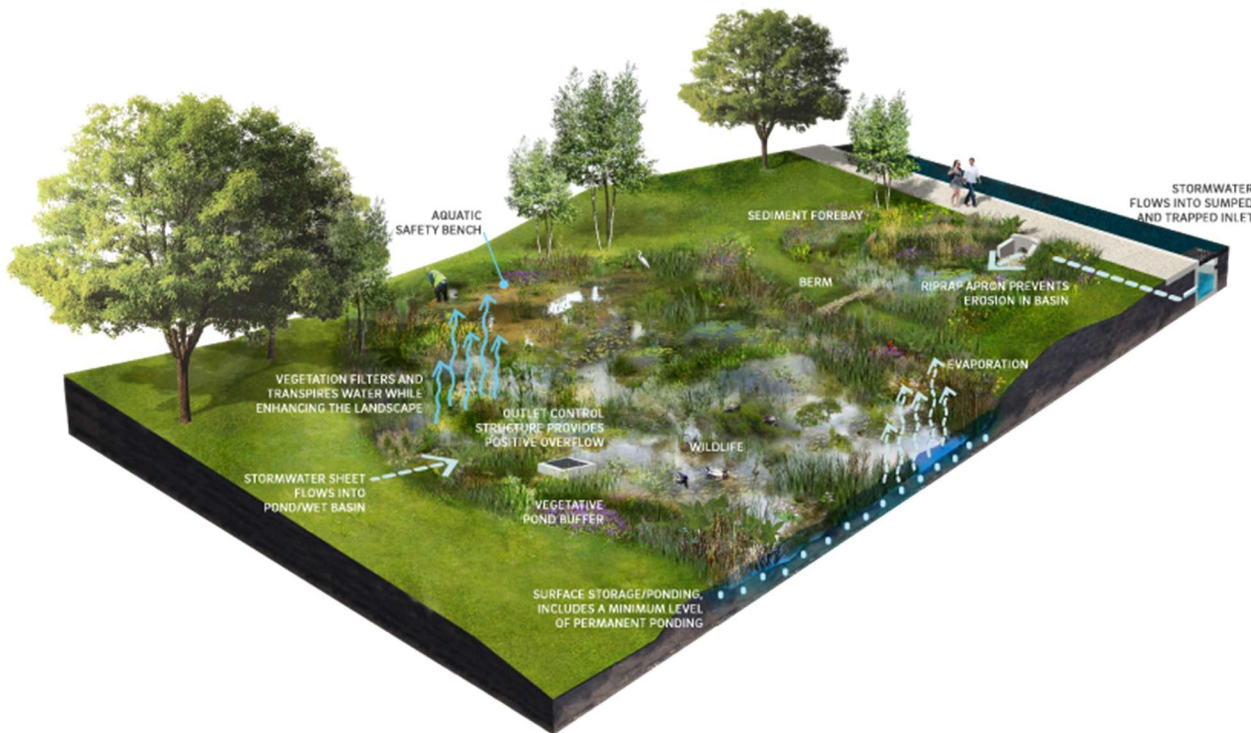


Figure 2: Examples of Retrofitted Stormwater Detention Basins

DRAINAGEWAY IMPROVEMENTS AND CONNECTION TO TEGELER POND

Design Data

- Drainage Area = 250 ac
- $Q_{\text{peak}} = 490$ cfs (from Iowa Runoff Chart)

Concept Design

The proposed drainageway improvements involve reconfiguring the existing drainageway into a two-stage ditch. This includes realigning the channel to provide more natural sinuosity, widening the bankfull bench for additional floodplain storage, and incorporating check dams to create pools and add habitat complexity throughout the drainageway. The drainageway is designed to safely convey the 100-year flow, which was determined using a simplified version of the Rational Method. The Iowa Bankfull Regional Curves were then used to develop the hydraulic geometry, i.e. cross-sectional area, width, and depth. Shallow side slopes aid in erosion control and vegetation establishment during construction, and they allow easy access for recreation and exploration post-construction. The pools created by the check dams will create more habitat for aquatic vertebrates and invertebrates, which are present in the existing stream, and the proposed 6-inch check dam height will allow fish passage. For conceptual design purposes, the check dams are all assumed to be rock; however, they can be a mix of rock, tree, and earthen berms for added variety. The drainageway improvements also include tree plantings to provide shade and protection to the stream, stability for the banks, and a visual buffer between the residential and industrial areas. The conceptual design places the planted trees along the east edge of the drainageway to act as a screen while also being accessible from the residential area.

In preparation for future development, the City of Dyersville wishes to connect the drainageway to Tegeler Pond instead of routing it east and north to Bear Creek. There is development in progress along 6th Avenue, including new roads, utility installations, and house foundations. Sanitary sewer is also installed extending east from 6th Avenue, and further construction and residential development is planned. To connect to the pond, the stormwater will need to be conveyed under the existing road and adjacent to the foundations. The conceptual design proposes connecting the drainageway to the existing storm sewer intakes via an intake structure, piping the water under the road and past the foundation, and providing a stable outlet at the pond. Manning's equation was used to determine the pipe configuration that meets capacity requirements, and the outlet protection was designed according to SUDAS Chapter 7 – Erosion and Sediment Control Section 7E-10 – Rip Rap. Two parallel 36-inch pipes at 2.9% slope were selected for the conceptual design. The configuration may be modified during the design process to best accommodate the surrounding development.

Note: Eocene reached out to the developer's engineer but was unable to acquire any information on the current or proposed construction. Design elevations and slopes will need to be confirmed during the design process.

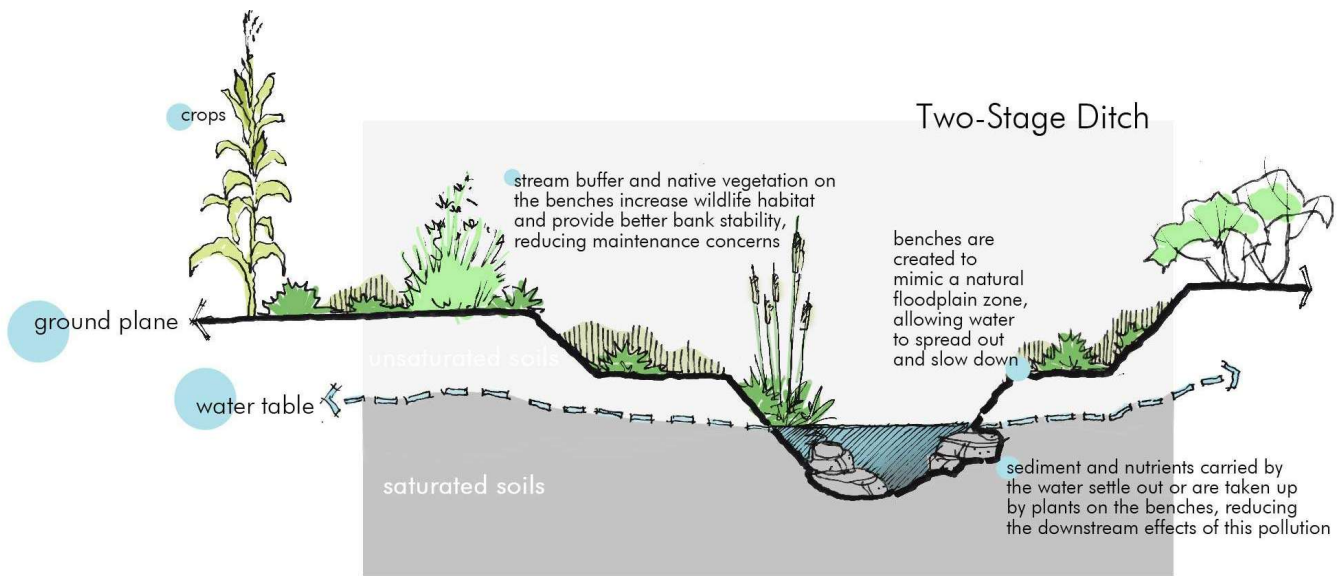


Figure 3: Schematic of a Two-Stage Ditch

Conceptual Cost Information

Construction of the drainageway improvements primarily involves earthwork, check dam installation, pipe installation, and vegetation establishment. Realigning the channel and widening the bankfull bench entails a large amount of excavation. The cost for excavating and hauling material can be managed by including some earthen berms, incorporating excess material into other proposed practices as part of the larger project, or coordinating with future development. Depending on availability, using tree material for some of the check dams may also reduce cost. Table 3 details the quantities and costs for the proposed drainageway improvements and connection to Tegeler Pond.

Maintenance costs for this project primarily address vegetation establishment and adaptive management. These costs can include general maintenance, prescribed fire, mowing, tree establishment, and invasive species monitoring and maintenance. Typically, maintenance is more intensive during the initial years of growth, and it becomes more self-sustaining as vegetation establishment progresses.

Additional Amenities

Amenities associated with the drainageway improvements may include a walking trail; benches; bird blinds; bird and/or plant identification signage; large stones for crossing, climbing, and sitting; and access points for exploration.

Concept Design

Once the drainageway is routed to Tegeler Pond, the section extending east and then north to Bear Creek can be removed. Removing the ditch will allow the area to be graded in preparation for future development or restoration. The proposed design is not complex; it involves grading the ditch to a flat surface and reseeding with a lawn seed mix. It is recommended to construct this project in conjunction with the drainageway improvements project to balance the earthwork.

Conceptual Cost Information

The drainageway abandonment primarily involves earthwork and vegetation establishment. The cost for fill material can be managed by coordinating construction with other proposed practices as part of the larger project. Table 4 details the quantities and costs for the proposed drainageway abandonment.

Maintenance costs for this project primarily address vegetation establishment and adaptive management. At most, these costs can include general maintenance, prescribed fire, mowing, tree establishment, and invasive species monitoring and maintenance. Typically, maintenance is more intensive during the initial years of growth, and it becomes more self-sustaining as vegetation establishment progresses. If lawn seeding is selected instead of native seeding, the up-front costs of maintenance during the first few years of establishment will likely be less than native seeding. However, over the long-term, a native planting will require less cost than traditional lawn.

TEGELER POND OUTFALL & VEGETATED SWALE

Design Data

- Drainage Area = 552 ac
- $Q_{design} = 42.26$ cfs per pipe culvert (100-year cumulative storm for Delaware County, Iowa, with a total rainfall amount of 7.51 in using a SCS Type II 24-hr storm distribution)
- $L = 555$ ft
- $\Delta E = 5$ ft
- Net Earthwork = 1,470 CY cut (1.35 fill factor)

Concept Design

The proposed pond outfall and vegetated swale system is designed to safely convey storm sewer flow from the residential development and overflow from the principal spillway of Tegeler Pond to Bear Creek. The system is sized to manage the 100-year flow from the entire watershed, quantified using a simplified Rational Method and conceptualized using Autodesk’s Storm and Sanitary Analysis (SSA) software. The conceptual design is divided into two components: outfall pipes and a vegetated swale.

The concept plan includes lowering and upsizing the existing outfall pipes. The existing pipes are perched at an elevation of 936, well above the pond’s normal pool elevation. The proposed pipes will be lowered to an elevation of 933, which is approximately one foot above normal pool elevation as determined by DEM elevation and water elevations collected on September 23rd, 2025. Additionally, the current 24-inch corrugated metal outfall pipes will be increased in size and upgraded to concrete. Two parallel 36-inch pipes at 1.1% slope were selected for the conceptual design, sized using preliminary modeling in SSA. Each pipe is capable of independently handling flow from a 100-year storm event, but, following standard spillway design guidance, a second pipe is included to provide system redundancy in case one pipe fails. During rain events, overflow from Tegeler Pond will discharge through these pipes.

The outfall pipes spill onto a flat, armored area. This armored section is designed to dissipate energy and prevent scouring as the flow enters the vegetated swale. Water will then flow through a meandering channel lined with vegetation to control flow, promote infiltration, and prevent erosion. The conceptual design creates a 555-foot-long swale, including a 10-foot-wide channel bottom, a 1.1% longitudinal slope, and 10:1 side slopes, emptying into Bear Creek. The proposed vegetated swale generally follows the existing drainageway alignment, but it creates a more stable connection between the upland and lowland areas by evenly traversing the elevation change and introducing more manageable side slopes. The shallow side slopes allow easy access for maintenance and future construction. While no formal construction entrance is proposed, both sides of the swale will be easily accessible because of the shallow side slopes and smooth transitions.

Conceptual Cost Information

Construction of the outfall and vegetated swale system primarily involves earthwork, rip rap placement, and vegetation establishment. Constructing the vegetated swale requires a significant amount of excavation. The cost for excavating and hauling material can be managed by incorporating excess material into other proposed practices as part of the larger project or coordinating with future development. Table 5 details the quantities and costs for the proposed outfall updates and vegetated swale.

Maintenance costs for this project primarily address vegetation establishment and adaptive management. These costs can include general maintenance, prescribed fire, mowing, tree establishment, and invasive species monitoring and maintenance. In the early stages of vegetation establishment. Typically, maintenance is more intensive during the initial years of growth, and it becomes more self-sustaining as vegetation establishment progresses.

Additional Amenities

Amenities associated with the outfall and vegetation swale may include a grassed access path; benches; bird blinds; bird and/or plant identification signage; large stones for crossing, climbing, and sitting; and access points for exploration.

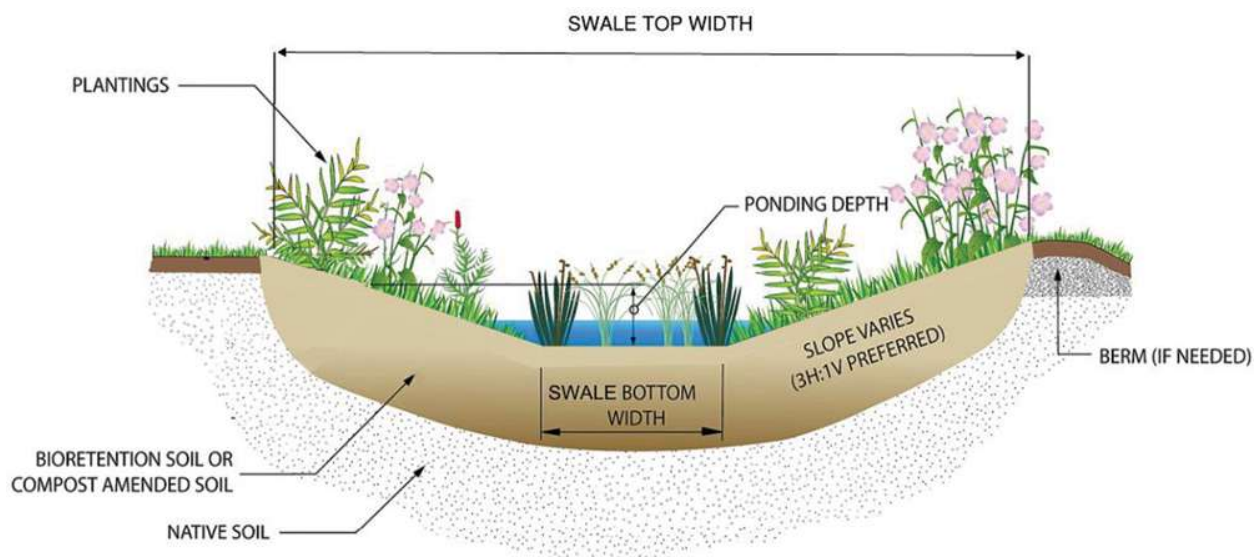


Figure 8: Cross-Section of a wet swale

CONCLUSION

Constructing the proposed practices as a combined project offers the most economical approach to the Dyersville SW Stormwater Improvements. This approach minimizes mobilization for the contractor, decreases ongoing disruptions from construction, and allows the earthwork to be balanced across the project sites, which greatly reduces cost. Totaling the individual projects leads to an overall conceptual construction cost of \$890,000. Combining the construction into one phase and adjusting the earthwork and mobilization bid items reduces the total by \$198,000 to a conceptual construction cost of \$692,000 (shown in Table 1). This reduction is primarily because excess excavation from the drainageway improvements and vegetated swale can be used as fill material for the drainageway abandonment, eliminating the need to haul excess material offsite and purchase fill separately.

The Dyersville SW Stormwater Improvements Concept Design presents a comprehensive and forward-thinking approach to managing stormwater in a growing urban area. By integrating enhanced drainage basins, naturalized drainageway improvements, strategic abandonment of outdated infrastructure, and a vegetated swale system, the project aims to significantly improve water quality, manage stormwater runoff, enhance ecological function, and provide meaningful public amenities. The proposed solutions balance engineering precision with environmental sensitivity and aesthetic value. As the project advances into final design and implementation, coordination with ongoing and future developments will be critical to achieving cost efficiency and ensuring long-term success. Together, these practices offer a resilient and sustainable model for stormwater management in Dyersville and beyond.

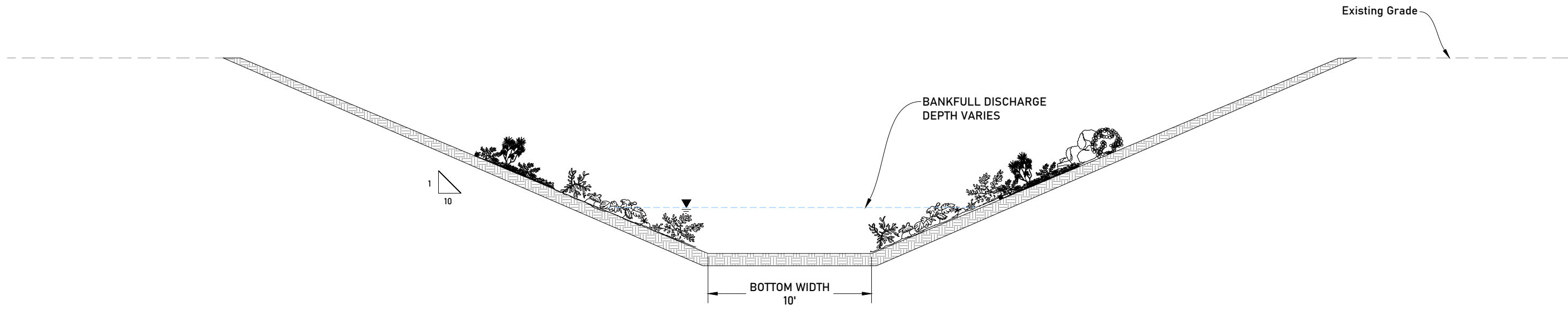

A RESOLUTION APPROVING A PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT WITH EOCENE ENVIRONMENTAL GROUP INC. FOR FINAL DESIGN, ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT, PERMITTING, AND BID LETTING ASSISTANCE FOR THE SOUTHWEST DYERSVILLE STORMWATER IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT

WHEREAS, the City of Dyersville has identified a need for stormwater improvements in southwest Dyersville, adjacent to 12th Avenue SW, west of 11th Street SW, and southeast of Tegeler Pond, to manage water quantity, improve water quality, provide ecological benefits, enhance accessibility and aesthetic appeal, and prepare the area for future development; and

WHEREAS, the City Council previously approved a concept design for the Southwest Dyersville Stormwater Improvements project by Resolution No. 54-26, identifying four proposed practices: an Enhanced Drainage Basin, Drainageway Improvements and Connection to Tegeler Pond, Drainageway Abandonment, and a Tegeler Pond Outfall and Vegetated Swale; and

WHEREAS, Eocene Environmental Group Inc., of Coralville, Iowa, has submitted a Professional Services Agreement to provide surveying, engineering, design, environmental assessment, permitting, public engagement, grant assistance, and bid letting assistance necessary to advance the project to construction, for a lump sum fee of \$165,000 and a target bid opening in early 2027; and

WHEREAS, the City Administrator has reviewed the proposed Professional Services Agreement and finds that the scope of services, fee, and schedule are appropriate and in the best interest of the City of Dyersville.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DYERSVILLE, IOWA, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Approval of Professional Services Agreement. AGREEMENT made this June 15th, 2026, by and between the service provider, Eocene Environmental Group Inc. (Eocene) and the City of Dyersville (Client).

WHEREAS the client intends to engage the services of Eocene to: conduct environmental assessments of the project site, complete final design and permitting of the designated stormwater improvements, and assist with the bid letting process.

WHEREAS, Eocene agrees to provide said services pursuant to the terms of this Agreement.

NOW THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

1. Project

Eocene will provide surveying, engineering, design, and environmental services for the development of a series of four stormwater improvements in southwest Dyersville. The four proposed practices are:

1. Enhanced Drainage Basin
2. Drainageway Improvements and Connection to Tegeler Pond
3. Drainageway Abandonment
4. Tegeler Pond Outfall & Vegetated Swale

The goals of these stormwater improvements are to manage water quantity, add water quality benefits, add ecological benefits, increase accessibility and aesthetic appeal, and prepare for future development of the area. Additionally, the practices will provide a buffer between current residential development and future industrial development. The deliverable for this project will be a set of construction plans and specifications to be used for construction of the stormwater improvements, as well as all applicable design and permitting documentation.

2. Scope of Services

The scope of services includes project management, survey and data processing, environmental assessment and permitting assistance, public engagement, engineering design, grant assistance, and bid letting assistance as detailed below.

Task 1 – Project Management

Eocene will provide overall project management for successful project delivery within the established budget, schedule, and regulatory framework. Services will include development and maintenance of the project schedule, coordination of internal and external project team activities, and facilitation of regular progress meetings. Project management services will also include preparation of required documentation, tracking of deliverables, and oversight of quality assurance/quality control (QA/QC) procedures across all project components.

Eocene will manage administrative support tasks, in-person and virtual coordination meetings, and incidental project expenses to maintain continuity, communication, and compliance throughout the project lifecycle. To support project communication and understanding, this task includes in-person attendance at up to two (2) council meetings; and coordination and attendance of up to six (6) virtual Client meetings. Eocene will provide ongoing coordination with the City, regulatory agencies, and funding partners, and other stakeholders, ensuring alignment with City requirements and grant obligations.

All services will be performed in accordance with applicable federal, state, and local requirements and are structured to deliver a fully coordinated, regulatory-compliant design within the established lump sum budget and project schedule.

Task 2 – Survey and Data Processing

Eocene will complete detailed desktop review and onsite survey to collect site-specific data for use in design. Survey will include topographic survey using GNSS-enabled equipment, One Call data information requests and utility locates, control point establishment, and data processing. Eocene will also compile and assess available watershed, soil, and site data. This information will be used to establish base mapping, develop CAD drawings, and define key design inputs supporting design development.

Task 3 – Environmental Assessment and Permitting

Eocene will provide comprehensive permitting and regulatory coordination services to support environmental compliance for the project. Eocene will prepare, coordinate, and manage all required environmental permits for the stormwater improvement project. This includes, as applicable, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) Nationwide Permit authorization and supporting documentation under Sections 401 and 404 of the Clean Water Act, as well as coordination and permitting with the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) for floodplain development. Eocene will oversee agency coordination to ensure timely and compliant permit approvals.

Assessment work to support environmental permitting includes, but is not limited to:

- Wetland delineations and impact assessments
- Threatened and Endangered Species review, including informal Section 7 coordination with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service
- Biological resource evaluations and impact analysis
- Section 106 compliance for cultural, archaeological, and historic resources, including coordination with the State Historic Preservation Office
- FEMA no-rise review and modeling

Upon award of the construction contract and ahead of construction commencing, Eocene will prepare a final Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) in accordance with NPDES General Permit No. 2 requirements, including erosion and sediment control design, inspection forms, and documentation. Eocene will prepare and submit the Notice of Intent (NOI) prior to construction and coordinate with the Contractor on their anticipated start date.

This scope and fee of the environmental assessments are based on project design, activity, and footprint that has been characterized via written or email communications by the Client or Client's representative. Any change in project design, activity, or footprint that will have bearing on the proposed services in this PSA will be communicated to Eocene in a timely manner and may result in need for altered or additional services beyond the scope of this PSA; additional costs may apply. If a National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) Categorical Exclusion or Environmental Assessment (EA) is required and requested by the Client, a supplemental scope, fee, and schedule will be prepared and presented to the Client.

Cultural Resources Assessment:

Eocene uses standard methods to conduct cultural resource investigations that meet or exceed the Association of Iowa Archaeologists *Guidelines for Archaeological Investigations in Iowa* (2023), which are designed to ensure identification of historic properties for federal undertakings as outlined in Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA). To meet the standards, Records Research and Intensive Archaeological Field Survey (Phase I) will be conducted.

Eocene will complete a Phase I Archaeological Survey for the proposed project area. It is understood that the project area is approximately 14.1 acres in area, approximately 9.6 of which have previously been surveyed adequate to modern standards. The strategy for completing these projects is to rely on a mixture of background research, geologic investigations, and archaeological field investigations to identify cultural resources within the project area.

Eocene archaeologist(s) will conduct background research to determine if any prior inventory work has been conducted overlapping with the current project area and if any previously identified cultural resources are present within the project area. This will be accomplished by utilizing the I-Sites Pro database of cultural resource sites and surveys available through the Office of the State Archaeologist. Additionally, historic aerial maps, historical plat maps, and other historical documentation will be utilized to identify historical cultural resources that may be located within the proposed project area.

The Phase I survey will be conducted to identify new cultural resources within the proposed project area and to revisit previously recorded resources. Documentation of the inventory and identified resources will follow all agency, SHPO reporting, and submission guidelines and manuals. If cultural resources are encountered during the field inventory, they will be recorded to SHPO standards using a GNSS receiver with sub-meter accuracy, paired with the ESRI Field Maps mobile application. Geomorphological investigation of the project area will be conducted via hand sampling methods. Archaeological field investigations will include pedestrian survey and systematic subsurface testing of areas with high archaeological potential or <25% ground surface visibility. Based on the known project, it is assumed no more than four (4) soil probes/profile descriptions will be needed for the geomorphological investigation. For the Phase I survey, the following assumptions are made:

- No more than 54 auger tests to a depth of no more than 50 cm, and no more than 20 auger tests to a depth of up to 2 meters, will be required
- No more than two new or previously recorded cultural resources are assumed to be encountered during the survey, and these resources are assumed to be not eligible for the NRHP.
- No cultural materials will be collected

Fieldwork will be conducted subject to standard seasonal limitations, including suitable soil conditions for subsurface testing and accessibility of the project area. This scope assumes full site access and is based on the currently defined project footprint; changes to design or limits of disturbance may necessitate modification of the archaeological scope.

The results of the records research and Phase I archaeological survey fieldwork will be presented in a report that details background research, survey field methods, results of the fieldwork, and a summary with management recommendations. If new sites are identified or previously recorded sites are relocated during the field inventory, archaeological site forms will be completed following agency and SHPO guidelines. The sites will also receive a preliminary evaluation recommendation as to their eligibility for inclusion on the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP). If significant cultural resources are identified, Eocene will promptly notify the City and coordinate next steps; however, advanced evaluation (Phase II testing), data recovery, or curation services are not included in this scope and will require additional authorization.

The deliverables for the cultural resources assessment will include:

- One (1) draft and one (1) final cultural resources inventory report
- Draft and final archaeological site forms, up to 2 archaeological site forms (new or updated).

Natural Resources Assessment:

Eocene will complete comprehensive natural resource investigations to identify jurisdictional features, ecological constraints, and regulatory considerations within the approximately 14-acre project area. This work will support project design, permitting, and environmental compliance under applicable state and federal regulations.

A full aquatic resources delineation will be conducted during the growing season in accordance with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Wetland Delineation Manual and applicable regional supplements. Field investigations will document the presence or absence of wetlands and other waters of the United States and/or State, including streams, tributaries, and other conveyances. Delineation efforts will include identification and characterization of hydric soils, hydrophytic vegetation, and wetland hydrology indicators using standard onsite determination methods.

Wetland boundaries will be located using sub-meter accuracy GPS equipment and incorporated into a GIS-based mapping system. The investigation will also include rapid stream assessment, as appropriate, to document stream classification, functional condition, and indicators of jurisdiction such as the Ordinary High Water Mark. All identified resources will be mapped and documented in digital formats, including shapefiles and georeferenced CAD data, to support integration with engineering design and permitting documentation.

A formal wetland delineation report will be prepared, including a description of field methods, findings, and mapped resource boundaries relative to the proposed project. The report will include delineation data sheets, figures, and supporting documentation formatted for use in regulatory coordination and permitting under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act and related state requirements.

In parallel with aquatic resource investigations, Eocene will complete a preliminary review for threatened and endangered (T&E) species in compliance with the Endangered Species Act. This effort will include desktop research, including generation of an official IPaC species list and coordination with the Iowa Department of Natural Resources for environmental review, followed by a field-based habitat assessment to evaluate the potential presence of listed species or suitable habitat within the project area.

Findings will be documented in a technical memorandum that includes a description of site conditions, identified habitats, and a listing and evaluation of federal and state-listed species with potential to occur in the project vicinity. Eocene will prepare a Determination of Effect (DOE) for federally protected species and provide recommendations for impact avoidance, minimization measures, or additional survey needs if warranted.

If sensitive species or habitats are identified, Eocene will coordinate with the City to evaluate project implications and provide guidance on next steps; however, advanced coordination such as Biological Assessments, incidental take permitting, or mitigation design is not included in this scope and may require additional authorization.

Fieldwork will be conducted subject to seasonal and site access conditions, including growing season requirements for vegetation identification, suitable soil conditions for probing, and accessibility of the site. This scope assumes the project area is accessible and that site conditions are appropriate for data collection; deviations from these assumptions may require adjustments to scope, schedule, or level of effort.

Task 4 – Public Engagement

This task includes creating visuals and informational material ahead of public engagement events, facilitating up to two (2) individual/small group stakeholder meetings, and hosting one (1) informational public open house.

The stakeholder meetings will occur during the design process, and they will be between the design team and the surrounding landowners. The intention of these meetings is to keep these stakeholders informed of the general design and invested in the project. It is assumed these meetings will take place onsite or at City Hall.

Eocene will also support public engagement for the project through coordination, preparation, and facilitation of one (1) informational public open house intended to present design information to the general community, keep

surrounding property owners and interested stakeholders informed, and gather final public feedback on the proposed improvements. Services will include coordination with the City and project team to confirm the event purpose, schedule, venue, materials, and event logistics; preparation of presentation materials, including display boards and supporting visual content to communicate the project background, purpose, and conceptual design elements to the public; and attendance at and facilitation of the open house, including setup support, presentation of project information, coordination with the project team in responding to questions, collection of public comments, and documentation of key feedback received during the event. It is assumed the City will provide a venue, such as City Hall or the public library, at no cost, and that standard presentation equipment available to the project team will be used for the event.

Following the open house, Eocene will compile and summarize public input for use by the project team in final consideration of the conceptual design. This summary will document the general themes and comments received through the engagement effort and identify feedback to be considered, as appropriate, in final project development.

Public engagement services do not include attendance at additional public meetings, hearings, or engagement events beyond the meetings described in this contract; development of a project website, online survey, or social media campaign; direct mailings, postage, or mailed notices; or formal tracking to meet funding requirements. Substantial revisions to the project design based on public comment are also not part of this contract. These services can be added by contract amendment if deemed necessary.

Task 5 – Engineering Design

Eocene will complete detailed engineering design for the proposed stormwater improvements. A concept design has been submitted to the City, and the engineering design will build upon this concept to develop a construction-ready project. The engineering design will incorporate review comments, refined modeling results and calculations, and increased levels of detail, with continued coordination as the design progresses. The design will utilize hydrologic and hydraulic modeling and site-specific data, and it will incorporate detailed grading design for compliance with necessary storage volumes, flow targets, and performance criteria. The design will also consider drainage area characteristics, flow paths, soil conditions, constructability, long-term maintenance, and regulatory requirements throughout the process.

Eocene will prepare a comprehensive set of design deliverables to support bidding and construction. These deliverables will include:

- Detailed construction plans
- Technical specifications
- Tabulations of quantities
- Engineer's opinion of probable construction cost

Task 6 – Grant Assistance

This task includes researching applicable funding opportunities as well as identifying pertinent project information to be used in up to two (2) grant funding applications to support design and/or construction costs for this project. Full grant application is not included in this task; these services will be added for an additional fee upon client request.

Task 7 – Bid Letting Assistance

Eocene will support the City through the public bid process, including coordinating and conducting one (1) Pre-Bid Meeting, responding to bidder questions, reviewing bids after the bid opening, and providing an Engineer's Letter of Recommendation. If a second bid letting is required, supplemental scope, fee, and schedule will be proposed for additional services. Eocene's work under this task will continue through the Pre-Construction Meeting with the contractor and City.

3. Eocene Responsibilities

Eocene Hereby agrees to:

- I. Provide the professional services as set forth in this Agreement; and
- II. Perform said services in a manner consistent with that degree of care and skill ordinarily exercised by members of the same profession currently practicing at the same time and in the same or similar locality.

4. Client Responsibilities

Client hereby agrees to:

- I. Provide a knowledgeable representative of the Property, who will be available to coordinate all on-site work; and
- II. Provide unrestricted access to the Property for Eocene to perform the services; and
- III. Provide copies of any previously completed reports that may be pertinent to this Project.

5. Schedule

The Project will commence immediately upon receipt of the executed Professional Services Agreement (PSA) from the Client. The design project will have a 6-month duration with a target bid opening in early 2027. Project sequencing will begin with data collection and environmental assessment, proceed through detailed design and permitting, then end with the bid letting and preconstruction meeting. The project schedule assumes timely reviews, responses, and approvals by the Client and applicable agencies, and does not account for delays resulting from agency review durations, Client-directed changes, seasonal restrictions, unforeseen site conditions, or other circumstances beyond the Consultant's control. Should such delays occur, the project schedule shall be revised and the Consultant's time for performance equitably extended as necessary.

6. Project Cost, Payment, and Termination

The Client shall pay Eocene the Lump Sum Cost as specified below for the performance of this Agreement. Direct costs such as communications, postage, routine printing and copying are not invoiced separately, but are included with the Lump Sum to streamline the accounting process and reduce overhead costs.

Invoices for Eocene's services will be submitted every 30 days or upon project completion if project completion is less than 30 days. Invoices shall be due and payable upon receipt. If any invoice is not paid within 30 days, Eocene may, without waiving any claim or right against the Client, and without liability whatsoever to the Client, suspend or terminate the performance of services.

7. Work Product

All field notes, laboratory test data, calculations, estimates and other documents including all documents on electronic media prepared by Eocene as instruments of service and/or used in the preparation of the final project deliverables shall remain the property of Eocene.

All project documents including, but not limited to, plans and specifications furnished by Eocene under this project are intended for use on this project only. Any reuse, without specific written verification or adoption by Eocene, shall be at the Client's sole risk, and Client shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless Eocene from all claims, damages and expenses including attorney's fees arising out of or resulting therefrom.

Under no circumstances shall delivery of electronic files for use by the Client be deemed a sale by Eocene, and Eocene makes no warranties, either express or implied, of merchantability and fitness for any particular purpose. In no event shall Eocene be liable for indirect or consequential damages as a result of the Client's use or reuse of the electronic files.

Because electronic file information can be easily altered, corrupted, or modified by other parties, either intentionally or inadvertently, without notice or indication, Eocene reserves the right to remove itself from its ownership and/or involvement in the material from each electronic medium not held in its possession. Client shall retain copies of the work performed by Eocene in electronic form only for information and use by Client for the specific purpose for which Eocene was engaged. Said material shall not be used by Client or transferred to any other party, for use in other projects, additions to this project, or any other purpose for which the material was not strictly intended by Eocene without Eocene's expressed written permission. Any unauthorized use or reuse or modifications of this material shall be at Client's sole risk. Furthermore, the Client agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold Eocene harmless from all claims, injuries, damages, losses, expenses, and attorney's fees arising out of the modification or reuse of these materials.

8. Project Site

The Client agrees to use good faith efforts to maintain a safe Project site for Eocene staff and, as applicable, subcontractors and assigns. Such good faith efforts shall include, but not exhaustive, ensuring that Project site is free and clear of any imminent hazards that pose a direct and immediate danger to any such individual potentially affected.

9. Claims and Disputes

Nothing contained in this Agreement shall create a contractual relationship with or a cause of action in favor of a third party against either the Client or Eocene. Eocene's services under this Agreement are being performed solely for the Client's benefit, and no other party or entity shall have any claim against Eocene because of this Agreement or the performance or nonperformance of services hereunder. The Client and Eocene agree to require a similar provision in all contracts with contractors, subcontractors, subconsultants, vendors and other entities involved in this Project to carry out the intent of this provision.

The Client shall make no claim for professional negligence, either directly or in a third party claim, against Eocene unless the Client has first provided Eocene with a written certification executed by an independent professional currently practicing in the same discipline as Eocene and licensed in the State in which the claim arises.

10. Limited Liability

The Client agrees, to the fullest extent permitted by law, to limit the liability of Eocene and Eocene's officers, directors, partners, employees, shareholders, owners and subconsultants to the Client for any and all claims, losses, costs, damages of any nature whatsoever or claims expenses from any cause or causes, including attorneys' fees and costs and expert witness fees and costs, so that the total aggregate liability of Eocene and its officers, directors, partners, employees, shareholders, owners and subconsultants to all those named shall not exceed \$50,000. It is intended that this limitation apply to any and all liability or cause of action however alleged or arising, unless otherwise prohibited by law.

11. Mediation

In an effort to resolve any conflicts that arise during the project or following the completion of the project, the Client and Eocene agree that all disputes between them arising out of or relating to this Agreement shall be submitted to non-binding mediation unless the parties mutually agree otherwise. The Client and Eocene further

agree to include a similar mediation provision in all agreements with independent contractors and consultants retained for the Project and to require all independent contractors and consultants also to include a similar mediation provision in all agreements with subcontractors, sub-consultants, suppliers or fabricators so retained, thereby providing for mediation as the primary method for dispute resolution between the parties to those agreements.

12. Attorney's Fees

If litigation arises for purposes of collecting fees or expenses due under this Agreement, the Court in such litigation shall award reasonable costs and expenses, including attorney fees, to the prevailing party. In awarding attorney fees, the Court shall not be bound by any Court fee schedule, but shall, in the interest of justice, award the full amount of costs, expenses, and attorney fees paid or incurred in good faith.

13. Controlling Law

This Agreement shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the state of Iowa.

14. Assignment

Neither the Agreement nor any of the rights or obligations arising under the Agreement may be assigned without prior written consent.

This agreement is approved and accepted by the Client and Eocene upon both parties signing and dating the agreement. The effective date of the agreement shall be the last date entered below.
