

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

Dyersville Police Department Monthly Report

July 15th – August 15th, 2023

New Vehicle -

The marked 2019 Dodge Charger was taken out of service and will be replaced with a new Charger. Currently, the 2019 is at Racom being disassembled. We will then take the new Charger in and have the old equipment reinstalled. Upon completion, the car will go to Manchester to have decals applied before being put back in service.

This will be the last year for the Charger, so we will begin looking at what type of vehicle we will be moving forward with in the future. Whatever vehicle is chosen, we will have to replace a lot of the vehicle specific equipment in the car (cage, console, etc.) which will add to the expense of the replacement vehicle.

Update – Racom encountered a problem when reassembling the equipment in the new Charger. The old console will not properly fit into the new squad. The retired squad had a large video screen in the dashboard, which Dodge discontinued unbeknownst to the dealer or the department. A new console (which holds our radio and other equipment) had to be reordered. This change affected several departments across the nation, and the supplier of the needed console was not prepared for the increased demand. The console is on backorder and will not arrive until approximately September 5th. This pushes delivery of the new car back. We have arranged to take the squad (which is completed except for the console) to the decal installers while we wait for the part to arrive. All of this is unfortunate, but we have become accustomed to supply chain issues over the past few years and have plans in place to work around the delay.

Speed Feedback Sign Program -

The police department has begun working with the IDOT's new Speed Feedback Sign Program. I have attached information about the program with this report. We have applied to have these signs installed on Highway 52. The south location will be in front of Tomy, where the speed limit slows to 35 mph. The north location will be at Dyersville East Road, where the speed limit slows to 25 mph.

No Update

In Car Video -

We're still working with Axon to set up a date for the install of the new in-car video systems. Racom was going to install the first one, however we discovered having them do the install would void the warranty, as they are not factory authorized installers. We are confident that the installation will take place very soon.

Update – Because of the delay in the part that was backordered for the new squad car, we have moved the date of the installation back to 9/29. AXON representatives will be here in Dyersville to install the cameras in all of our squad cars at one time.

Veteran's Motorcycle Ride -

Assisted with a motorcycle ride out of Cedar Rapids on behalf of Veterans. The group traveled through Dyersville, stopping at the Social Center for a lunch put on by the VFW. (July 22)

Police Department Tours -

Asst. Chief Dupont gave tours of the PD to four daycare groups from here in Dyersville.

Field of Dreams Movie Site -

Officers provided security and public relations during the Field of Dreams events sponsored by beyond the game. Fans were able to watch several games, a homerun derby and cornhole games. Several former MLB players were on site to interact with the numerous fans in attendance over the three days. (August 11 - 13)

Dyersville Fire Department 125th Anniversary -







Field of Dreams Tournaments:

The summer staff and myself groomed diamonds over 180 times and hosted approximately 650 games. The FoD staff was more organized this year and had some great interns that helped us out with field maintenance. The partnership is working great. Special thanks to Connor Grover for the last two years of getting up at 530am on the weekends and keeping our parks/fields immaculate. He will be missed next summer.

Aquatic Center:

The Aquatic Center last day was Sunday, August 13 and ended with our annual Doggy Dip with pets allowed to enjoy the pool. Overall, the pool season was a success. The two new managers (Lainey Link and Lexi Kramer) did a great job navigating lifeguarding and managing duties. They are both planning to come back next summer and have some good ideas for improvement. 





Subject: Public Works Report: July 12 – August 15, 2023

Things have been operating well, for the most part, over the last month or so in the Public Works Department.

Operation and Maintenance of Fleet, Highways, Streets, Alleys, Parks, Trails, Rivers, Creeks, etc.

Mike Maahs and TJ Vorwald, along with part-time summer help, have continued to do an excellent job with normal summertime and regular activities on the streets, parks and trails. This is the last week for Ben, Connor left last week, and Padraig was done a couple weeks ago – we will miss them all.

We took delivery on two vehicles over the last month. One of our long-awaited material-spreading dump trucks finally made it through manufacturing and arrived last week. In addition, a new ³/₄-ton pick-up for the Street's department was delivered a few weeks ago. It is very important that we keep up with our vehicles and equipment replacement plan that was begun by the Mayor/City Council, the City Administrator, and my predecessor years ago. This program helps to allows us to have the reliability needed to perform our operations and maintenance responsibilities at optimum efficiency and effectiveness. On behalf of Public Works (and the Citizens of Dyersville), thank you for supporting this program.

As was mentioned at a previous meeting, many wayfinding signs have been installed around town -17, to be exact. These are the 3-foot wide signs designed for placement along low-speed streets. We have taken delivery of another 7 signs (4-foot width, higher speed roads). We are awaiting the final 6, larger signs for along US 52. Once received, we plan to complete the installation process. We have also been freshening up the pavement marking all around town.

Operation and Maintenance of Drinking Water and Wastewater Disposal Systems, and the Aquatic Center

The <u>Drinking Water</u> source, storage, treatment, and distribution systems are serving the City well, thanks to the excellent work of Terry Recker and Joe Reicher, along with part-time summer help. They have been working to maintain the system, including flushing fire hydrants and exercising water valves. Swimming pool maintenance has also been a continual effort, and now we are in the process of preparing it for the off-season. Please refer to the below report from Water Operations.

The <u>Wastewater</u> collection, pumping, treatment, and disposal systems are operating well, thanks to the excellent work of Tim Herbers, with help from Joe (JoAnn left the City earlier this month. We are working toward replacing her soon). Please refer to the below report for last month from Wastewater Operations.

<u>Status of Improvement Projects - 'In-House Design'</u>

Downtown Streetscape Rehabilitation (Added 4/23)

We intend to perform the rehabilitation out of our operations budget, and phase it over about 5 years. I will be meeting with a contractor next week concerning the first phase of the project – the 3rd and the 4th Street intersections of the streetscape portion (behind the curb to the building line). All 6 limestone medallions will be reset, this time on concrete, and the cracked and deteriorating buff-colored handicap panels will be replaced with black powder-coated cast-iron panels.

The contractor plans to begin work after Labor Day, to avoid the heavier tourist traffic.

Wayfinding Signs Project (Added 12/22, though in-progress for years)

Discussed above.

Hwy 52 Manhole Replacement at 2nd Avenue (Added 11/21)

We had pavement cores taken around the manhole and determined that there exists concrete pavement under the asphalt. This requires that we patch the pavement in two steps, which will take several days. The Iowa DOT has suggested that we close the road and detour traffic while this work is being done. This prompted us to look into the possibility of a manhole rehabilitation. So we met with a specialist and are awaiting costs for this. We are also evaluating the reliability of the process with other communities that have used it for decades.

Downtown Businesses Accessibility – (Added June, 2021)

Working toward including recommendations into the sidewalk program.

<u>Legacy Square – Stage (Added Spring 2021)</u>

This project is nearly complete. Lights have yet to be installed.

<u> Status of Improvement Projects – 'Outside Design'</u>

20 West Industrial Park, Phase III Rise Grant App. (Added August, 2022)

Contract A including sanitary sewer and water has been completed. Contract B that includes grading and erosion control is substantially complete. Contract C (RISE eligible) will include a double box culvert and is planned to be bid in August with 2023 construction. Contract D (also RISE eligible) including roadway storm sewer, concrete paving, and lighting will be bid this year and should be substantially complete by June 30, 2024. Origin will provide and administer construction admin and observation as required during construction.

1st Avenue W. Bridge Over Bear Creek (Added May, 2022)

Contract documents are in the mail. Taylor has not indicated a start-date as yet, but we expect it will be soon - utility locates have already been requested.

3rd Avenue SW Bridge (Added to list in February, 2022)

Awaiting further evaluation

Field of Dreams Stormwater Wetland and Mitigation (Added to list in April, 2020)

Project substantially complete. Temporary erosion control seeding has been placed. Permanent bluegrass seeding has been completed both north and south of Beltline Rd. Native seeding was performed in late November 2022. A live streaming camera of the site is available for viewing at: https://video.nest.com/live/G4AGPm8tkR

Dyersville East Road Water and Sewer Extension 2020 (Added to list March, 2020)

Most of the linear projects are nearly finished. Work continues on the wastewater lift station and the water booster station.

Bear Creek Restoration (SRF Sponsored Project)

Construction for this project is complete. The contractor will perform mowing and vegetation management in 2023 for maintenance on the wetland prairie. Typical prairie seeding takes 3 years to be fully established with intended growth of flowers and grasses. The project performed well to capture sediment without significant channel erosion in the 2023 spring flood. A video camera is mounted near 3rd St. with a public video link for anyone to monitor. https://www.senserasystems.com/public/embed/M78018326A93

Date: August 18, 2023

Below is an update of top priority projects that the City Council has determined at its last strategic planning and goal-setting session held on January 24, 2022.

Initiatives or Programs:

- 1. Hire Public Works crew member to replace an employee that left. We will be advertising for this position in September 2023.
- 2. Bring all four water & wastewater Public Works staff up to Grade 2 water & wastewater operator licensure. Water and Sewer employees are continuing to take their tests to get licensed. Terry Recker is now fully licensed in water and wastewater.
- 3. Review and update SOP & SOG's at Fire Department. Nothing has been done at this time.
- 4. Continue implementation of nutrient reduction improvements through minor operation changes at the wastewater treatment plant. The Public Works Department is meeting the State's suggested guidelines. I reviewed the last two wastewater reports, and the city is well below the suggested guidelines. The previous changes to the plant are working.
- 5. Replace 8 brick manholes. This is on the public works department schedule. The public works department replaced several brick manholes in FY22. Public Works Department is moving forward with this project as time and budget dollars allow. I have placed in FY24 budget the same dollars as in FY23 to replace brick manholes. We will be replacing the more difficult ones in FY24 and beyond. I recently spoke with the public works director regarding the manhole on HWY 52. After careful consideration, it seems that we have found a solution that won't involve removing the manhole. We are currently in the process of obtaining quotes from a regional contractor.

- 6. *Upgrade building-entry keypads across Public Works Department*. Nothing has been done at this time.
- 7. Develop plan for replacing failing fire hydrants and valves. I will follow up with the public works department.
- 8. *Integrate Wincan camera data with Cartegraph data management system.* I will follow up with the public works department.
- 9. Continue to evaluate how we can get more done, be more efficient, be more effective, under the budget that we have. I have been looking at ways to trim costs with the limited staff.
- 10. Continue residential building projects/housing. Several permits have been approved by a Developer to build some apartments on some infill lots. I have been continuing to work with DEDC and a developer about bringing more workforce housing in the area. The City is looking at modifying the Urban Revitalization Plan to meet modified State requirements. I had a conversation with Dorsey and Whitney and the plan update is not feasible at this time due to how the Iowa Code is written. I will be having a conversation with our State elected officials on possible revisions to the Code.
- 11. Plan to extend water & infrastructure to Field of Dreams Movie Site. The City has four contracts approved. EDA approved the City's request to modify our sewer grant. Construction has been going well at the lift station, and the sewer main installation projects. Sewer EDA project has been going well with little disruptions to local traffic. The inside FoD work should begin sometime in Spring 2023. I have been working with City Attorney to close on the Lumber Specialties property; we hope to have this done by the end of August 2023.
- 12. Support recreation opportunities. Score boards have been completed at Candy Cane Park and Commercial Club Park. Pickleball Courts are being used at Candy Cane Park. Finally, pool features designs have been submitted to the City and we are waiting for State of Iowa signoff on them. State signed off on the slide. Adam and the vendor are working on getting the slide manufacturer. We will be installing it in Spring 2023.
- 13. Amendment of policies for development agreements—length and amount of tax abatements. Nothing has been done at this time.
- 14. Work with Dubuque County to pave Heritage Trail. Dubuque County Conservation has been working on funding for this project. Conservation board turned down a grant submittal request from ECIA. I'm waiting to see if the board would still like to move ahead with the paving of the trail. I sent the letter approved by the city council. I'm waiting to be added to the Board agenda.

- 15. Continue implementation of wage & benefits study for all departments. I prepared the FY23 wage schedule during the budget process and we are looking at implementing it on July 1, 2022. City Clerk has been monitoring the changes to the City health insurance program. Salaries Resolution has been prepared for FY23 budget. The City Council approved Medical Associates Health Plan renewal for 2023. Public Safety Committee met and they wanted me to work with GOV HR USA to prepare an agreement. The city council approved the agreement with GOV HR USA. I have a scheduled meeting with them in late August 2023.
- 16. Increase general fund revenues. This is an ongoing process through economic development opportunities. The State of Iowa passed a new property tax reform bill. I talked with the State officials about the possible side effects of the new legislation, but I'm still waiting on the Iowa League of Cities breakdown on the new law.
- 17. Create five-year plan for street construction/refurbishment. Nothing has been done at this time. Public Works Director gave me a couple of budget estimates on several large projects street projects. I'm working with him on getting the project detail and trying to find outside funding. Public Works Director has submitted the RCTP grant. No update on the grant. Dubuque County has approved the RCTP grant and the grant agreement. The contractor will begin work sometime in September 2023.
- 18. City Square development and completion. The sidewalk portion of the project has been completed. City Engineer has submitted the plans and specifications for the stage project. Mayor is working on getting sponsors for the stage. I'm working with Public Works Department on lighting design, and I had a conversation with contractor on the stage construction. The stage improvements are complete, and the lights will be installed sometime in July 2023. The LED lights and controller will be installed in September 2023.
- 19. *Pickleball courts*. Park and Recreation Manager has worked on a local grant. He has also worked with our vendors on the fence and painting of the courts. We will also maintain pickleball painting lines at the tennis court. Pickleball court has been painted. The lights will be installed sometime in the fall 2022. Light bases are installed, the concrete edge has been installed, and we are in the process of order seating with shades. This project has been completed.
- 20. Completion of Heritage Trail upgrade and connection to Trail System. City was approved to modify our grant from the RPA8 Council. Origin Design has been working on draft plans and submitting them to the IADOT for their review and consideration. Plans and specs have been approved by the Council. I have submitted the IADOT agreement for Council review and consideration. Council has approved the plans and they have been submitted to the State. We are working on the construction documents. The contractor is substantially complete,

- and the engineer and the city had a project inspection. The project closeout will be at the end of June 2023. This project has been completed.
- 21. Continue to pursue install of three new bridges: 12th to 13th Ave; 7th Street; and, Beltline Road Railroad Overpass. City submitted an updated RAISE grant to USDOT for their review and consideration. Fingers crossed. We were not awarded the RAISE grant for this year. RAISE grant has been submitted. WHKS and I will be working with our federal officials to push this grant out of review and into the consideration category. We were not awarded the RAISE grant this year. We will be working with USDOT on a debrief meeting to see how we can improve the grant application for next year.
- 22. Budget and plan for sidewalk replacement program, new sidewalk construction, and trail connection. Nothing has been done at this time.
- 23. Support EMT's: Ambulance service to investigate full-time paramedic availability. I attended a 28E Board meeting to discuss this matter and City will be looking more into this matter. I have been assisting Bi-County Ambulance on creating a job description and other necessary information for the creation of a full-time position. I have prepared a job description and other necessary information to advertise for a full-time paramedic. No further action at this time.
- 24. *UTV Ordinance*. Task is completed and no further action.
- 25. Review costs for municipal fines and fees. Nothing has been done at this time.
- 26. Improvements to the creeks and rivers through town for appearance and recreation. City has submitted EDA grant for recreation opportunities, but we didn't make the cut this year. City has resubmitted a BRIC planning grant and we hope to hear by the end of August 2022. City has been awarded the BRIC planning grant. Grant agreements has been submitted. RFQ is completed and Impact 7G was awarded the project. I am working with Impact 7G on the project.
- 27. *Purchase small sewer jetter trailer*. City Council has approved the purchase of sewer jetter trailer. I'm working with the lease company and our supplier to finalize the necessary paperwork. City purchased the jetter, and the lease agreements have been implemented. Task is completed and no further action.
- 28. *New brick Westside Park ball field dugouts*. Contractor has started to install four dugouts this year. This project is complete.
- 29. Concession Stand/Restroom Facility for Commercial Club fields. We added this project to the FY23 budget. City will need to upgrade our lease agreement with Commercial Club Board prior to moving this project forward. I had a meeting

- with several Commercial Club Board members, and they have submitted a proposal. Staff is evaluating the proposal.
- 30. Replace two 2014 snowplows and material spreaders. City Council approved the purchase of one snowplow. City Council has approved moving forward with another snowplow. The financing agreement is completed on the first snowplow. The second snowplow is still being manufactured. The City Clerk and I will start with the financing process with Fidelity Bank for the second snowplow.
- 31. Rehab 1st Avenue West Bridge over Bear Creek. City Council has approved WHKS agreement and they are working on their assessment report. Assessment report is complete, and we forward the matter to the City Council for their review and consideration. WHKS is working on option 6 cost estimates for a replacement of the bridge without trail. Delaware County engineer's office reviewed the plans and found that the selected city council option is appropriate. The City Council will consider bonding this project at a future date. Funds are in place, and WHKS is working on designs and construction documents. Bid documents are complete, and the City Council is reviewing the materials. Bid was opened and the City Council is reviewing and considering awarding the project to Taylor Construction. WHKS, Public Works Director, and I found a solution to the price overrun. The contractor will be issuing a change order showing that price reduction.
- 32. Complete SCADA system for all water and wastewater facilities. Public Works Department and I have been working with Origin Design and our supplier on making sure we right size the project and that it ties in with the Field of Dreams projects. SCADA quote has been approved as part of the Field of Dreams project and the City is moving forward with getting the necessary software to complete this task.
- 33. Continue economic development programs. Twin Steeples project is moving along very well and it is really reshaping our downtown area. DEDC and I are working on some business relocation activities at our industrial parks. These relocations will allow for more jobs in our area. I'm still devoting a considerable amount of time working with Go the Distance management team on their proposed project, along with This is Iowa Ballpark on the construction of a permanent stadium. The State of Iowa awarded a \$12.5 million Destination Iowa Grant to City of Dyersville and This is Iowa Ballpark towards the construction of a stadium. City of Dyersville was award a \$12 million Enhance Iowa grant for the ballpark project. Finally, DEDC and I are working with several developers on bringing a business to the City.
- 34. *Annexation study*. City held an informational meeting at the Social Center and the draft plan will be considered by the Planning and Zoning Commission and then to the City Council for review and consideration.

- 35. *Update Subdivision Ordinance*. RDG has the first draft done and I'm working on getting that completed by the end of <u>December</u> 2021 due to other priority projects. I have submitted the draft ordinance to planning and zoning, and they are recommending that the Council and Commission meet to make sure everyone is on the same page.
- 36. Review water and sewer rates. I have been working with Lori Panton on this project and we are gathering data. However Covid-19 issues have delayed the completion of the study. We will forward our findings to the Water & Sewer Committee.
- 37. Continue with the development of City Asset System. I have continued to work with the Public Works Department on their database software; pavement inspection data from Cyclomedia, pavement marking, street sign data are currently being worked on. I have been working with the Public Works Department on helping them get the Water and Sewer plant data added to the management software. Also, we are updating sign, pavement marking data to it. Finally, road condition data will be updated in the system. We are reviewing the data to help develop a proposed action plan based on sidewalk data to propose to the City Council. Street pavement collection data was entered into OMS from 2019, and 2022.
- 38. *Reconstruct 16th Avenue SE at the shopping mall.* No action has been done at this time.
- 39. Splash Pad and other toddler opportunities at the Aquatic Center. City Council has approved the quote and action plan for this project. The project is being engineered and product has been ordered. The installation should be in late August 2022. This project is completed.
- 40. Additional/improved Westside Park lighting. We ordered lights and we are waiting to free up some staff time to install the project. Public Works and I had a meeting to discuss location and site plans to development this project. Public Works will be working with lighting consultant on location placement of lights. I had a meeting with the public works department staff and we have a plan to install the lights in June/July 2023.

ORDINANCE NO. 855

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES FOR THE CITY OF DYERSVILLE CHAPTER 127 – ADULT ENTERTAINMENT FACILITIES

SECTION 1. AMENDMENT OF ORDINANCE. Chapter 127 of the municipal ordinances of the City of Dyersville, Iowa, is hereby amended as follows. Section 127.02 is hereby deleted, and the below is substituted in its place.

127.02 DEFINITIONS.

The following words, terms, and phrases, when used in this chapter, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

- 1. "Adult Amusement or Entertainment" means a live performance of amusement or entertainment distinguished or characterized by an emphasis on acts or material depicting, describing, or relating to sex acts or specified anatomical areas.
- 2. "Adult entertainment facilities" includes but is not limited to the following:
 - A. Adult bookstore means an establishment having as the primary portion of its stock in trade, books, magazines, and other periodicals which are substantially devoted to the depiction of specified sexual activities and specified anatomical areas.
 - B. Adult business means any business or establishment where a specified sexual activity or specified anatomical area is displayed.
 - C. Adult motel means a motel or similar establishment offering public accommodations for any form of consideration which provides patrons with closed-circuit television transmissions, films, motion pictures, video cassettes, slides, or other photographic reproductions which are characterized by an emphasis upon the depiction or description of specified sexual activities or specified anatomical areas.
 - D. Adult movie theatre means any theatre, arcade, or similar establishment where an enclosed building or open-air facility is used for presenting material in the form of motion picture film, videotape, or similar means which is substantially devoted to the depiction of specified sexual activities and specified anatomical areas, for observation by persons therein.
 - E. Adult news rack means any coin-operated machine or device which dispenses material substantially devoted to the depiction of specified sexual activities and specified anatomical areas.

- F. Adult nightclub means any club, cabaret, nightclub, bar, restaurant, or similar establishment where an enclosed building at which Adult amusement or entertainment is provided or performed.
- G. Adult entertainment cabaret means a public or private establishment that is licensed to serve food and/or alcoholic beverages, at which Adult amusement or entertainment is provided or performed.
- H. Body shop or model studio means any public or private establishment which describes itself as a body shop or model studio; or where, for any form of consideration or gratuity, figure models who display specified anatomical areas are provided to be observed, sketched, drawn, painted, sculptured, photographed, or similarly depicted by persons paying such consideration or gratuity, or where for any form of consideration or gratuity, nude and seminude dancing, readings, counseling sessions, body painting, and other activities that present materials distinguished or characterized by an emphasis on matter depicting, describing or relating to specified sexual activities or specified anatomical areas are provided for observation by or communication to persons paying such consideration or gratuity.
- 3. "Specified anatomical area" means less than completely and opaquely covered human genitalia, mature human buttocks, and a mature human breast below a point immediately above the top of the areola; and human male genitals in a discernibly turgid state, even if completely and opaquely covered.
- 4. "Specified sexual activities" means any of the following conditions:
 - A. Human genitals in a state of sexual stimulation or arousal.
 - B. Acts or representations of acts of human masturbation, sexual intercourse or sodomy, bestiality, oral copulation, or flagellation.
 - C. Fondling or erotic touching of human genitals, pubic region, buttock, or female breast.
 - D. Minors engaged in a prohibited sexual act or simulation of a prohibited sexual act.
 - E. Excretory functions as part of or in connection with any activities set forth in Paragraphs A through D of this subsection.

SECTION 2. SEVERABILITY CLAUSE. If any section, provision, or part of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any section, provision, or part thereof not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 3. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its final

passage, approval, and publication as provided by law.

Dear Members of the Dyersville, Iowa City Council:

We have been asked to provide our opinion and recommendation regarding the letter received by the City of Dyersville from the American Civil Liberties Union ("ACLU") dated June 20, 2023 (the "Letter"), regarding § 127.02(1)(G) of the Ordinances of the City of Dyersville (the "Ordinance"), specifically the reference therein to "male or female impersonators, or similar entertainers." We have reviewed the letter from the ACLU, the referenced Ordinance, and the relevant cases and statutes and herein provide our opinion and recommendation.

The Letter raises three ways in which the ACLU seeks to challenge § 127.02(1)(G): as an unconstitutional content-based restriction, as overbroad, and as a violation of equal protection and targeted attack on the LGBTQ community. This opinion will address all three alleged issues.

Content-Based Restriction

The ACLU's claim that the Ordinance in question is unconstitutional because it is content-based and not narrowly tailored to further a compelling government interest is incorrect. The Ordinance at issue in this matter is not complete prohibition of adult entertainment facilities, but rather a "time, place, and manner" restriction. It does not

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prohibit the referenced facilities from existing within the city, it merely sets certain limitations as to where such an establishment can be located. It is a longstanding principal in US courts that this type of restriction can be permissible. See City of Renton v. Playtime Theatres, Inc. 475 US 41 (1986). After determining that the ordinance constitutes a time, place, and manner restriction, as defined by the Court in Renton, we must determine whether the Ordinance is content-neutral. Here, the courts have consistently held that similar ordinances, focused on the secondary effects of adult entertainment venues, are content-neutral because they do not target the content of speech, but rather they target those secondary effects. This is clearly the purpose of the City of Dyersville Ordinance, as stated in §127.01 Purpose, stating:

It is recognized that adult entertainment facilities have certain objectionable side effects which render these facilities incompatible with residential and family-oriented uses, when the adult facilities are located directly adjacent to such uses. This chapter seeks to ensure that residential and family-oriented uses and adult entertainment facilities will be located in separate and compatible locations.

Because the object of the Ordinance is to combat the side effects of adult entertainment facilities and not to simply prohibit the existence of such facilities, the Ordinance is a content-neutral time, place, and manner restriction.

The ACLU cites as support for its position a Tennessee District Court case that is not controlling on any Iowa state or federal courts or indeed any courts within the Eight Circuit. Additionally, the statute challenged in the Tennessee court is substantially different that the Ordinance at issue here; the Tennessee statute included language directly referencing the content of the behavior it sought to limit within the text of the statute ("Adult cabaret entertainment"... Means adult-oriented performances that are harmful to minors..."). Because the case itself is not controlling and the laws referenced therein are substantially different than the Ordinance, this argument should be disregarded.

Applying the standards set out by the US Supreme Court in Renton and consistently upheld, it is clear that the Ordinance is a permissible content-neutral time, place, and manner restriction.

Overbreadth

The ACLU next asserts that the Ordinance is unconstitutional because it is overbroad. Here, the ACLU may be correct and we recommend an amendment to the

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Ordinance to ensure it cannot be challenged on constitutional grounds. As stated in the Letter, the Ordinance targets any establishment that "is licensed to serve food and/or alcoholic beverages, which features . . . male or female impersonators, or similar entertainers." Because the Ordinance does not make reference to the type of performance, limiting such performances to explicit or obscene material, and targets any business that is licensed to serve food or alcohol, this language could be found to be overbroad.

In order to protect against this challenge, we recommend amending the Ordinance to include a definition of "Adult Content" and to reference such definition as applicable. We have enclosed herewith a red-lined draft of a proposed amendment for your review.

Violations of Equal Protection

The Letter alleges that the Ordinance violates both the Iowa and U.S. Constitutions because it targets the LGBTQ community and was enacted with animus toward such community. This allegation does not survive initial review. The Ordinance does not seek to place any burden on any person as a result of such person's sex or gender, and nothing contained in the Ordinance or any records surrounding the adoption of the Ordinance suggests any animus toward any group as a fueling factor for the Ordinance.

The ACLU cites numerous cases in support of this allegation, however almost none of those cases are controlling in any state or federal court in Iowa. Further, many of the cases cited by the ACLU reference transgender or gender-nonconforming persons and discrimination against such persons. The only Iowa cases cited by the ACLU revolve around treatment of transgender persons. These factors are irrelevant to this matter. The Ordinance does not make reference to nor does it target transgender or gender-nonconforming persons.

Conclusion

Two out of the three challenges raised by the ACLU to the Ordinance are wholly inaccurate. The Ordinance is a permissible, content-neutral time, place, and manner restriction on certain types of businesses and does not prohibit such businesses from existing anywhere within the city, but rather limits available locations of businesses that the city has determined are incompatible with family-oriented activity. The Ordinance does not violate equal protections of LGBTQ persons and there is no indication that the Ordinance was motivated by animus toward any group.

We do recommend that the Ordinance by amended as it could be construed by a

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court as overbroad. We have enclosed herewith a proposed red-lined amendment to the Ordinance.

RE: Dyersville Ordinance § 127.02(1)(G)

Dear Councilpersons:

I am writing on behalf of the ACLU of Iowa regarding the City of Dyersville ("the City") Ordinance § 127.02(1)(G) ("the Ordinance").

This Ordinance regulates any "adult entertainment cabaret" which includes "a public or private establishment that is licensed to serve food and/or alcoholic beverages, which features topless dancers, strippers, male or female impersonators, or similar entertainers." Dyersville, Ia. Mun. Code § 127.02(1)(G) (2022). It is unlawful for any person to engage in, conduct or carry on, or to permit to be engaged in, conducted or carried on, in or upon any premises in the City, the operation of an adult entertainment facility, without first having obtained a separate license from the City. Dyersville, Ia. Mun. Code § 127.12(1) (2022). "Any person, including but not limited to a licensee and a performer, who actually engages in the providing of goods or services to the public in connection with the adult entertainment facility must file an application for an adult entertainment employee permit with the police department upon a form provided by the police department and shall tender the correct permit fee, as provided in Section 127.11 to the City Clerk who shall issue a receipt which shall be attached to the application filed with the police department." Dyersville, Ia. Mun. Code § 127.13(1)(A) (2022). Individual business owners who violate this prohibition are subject to a penalty for a zoning violation, including the loss of permits. Dyersville, Ia. Mun. Code § 165.12 (2022).

The Ordinance states that the City Council's legislative purpose is "to ensure that residential and family-oriented uses and adult entertainment facilities will be located in separate and compatible locations" because, "adult entertainment facilities have certain objectionable side effects which render these facilities incompatible with residential and family-oriented uses, when the adult facilities are located directly adjacent to such uses." Dyersville, Ia. Mun. Code § 127.01 (2022).

The Ordinance is unconstitutional under the U.S. and Iowa Constitutions for at least three reasons, as explained in detail below. First, the Ordinance is an unconstitutional government infringement on speech protected by the First Amendment to the United States Constitution and the Iowa Constitution, because it is a content-based restriction and is not narrowly tailored to serve a compelling government interest. Second, the Ordinance is overbroad because it encompasses all "male or female impersonators, or similar entertainers" under prohibited adult cabaret, regardless of whether the expression is sexually explicit or not. Third, it violates equal protection because it targets the LGBTQ community on the basis of sex and gender expression and is motivated by animus toward the LGBTQ community. The City should promptly amend the Ordinance to remove any reference to "male or female impersonators, or similar entertainers".

At least one other city has already repealed a similarly unconstitutional ordinance, and three other cities we've contacted are in the process of doing the same. Following a notification letter from the ACLU of Iowa, Eagle Grove amended its ordinance to remove "female and male impersonators" from the definition of adult entertainment. (See Ex. 1). Like the ordinance in Eagle Grove, the City's Ordinance raises serious freedom of speech concerns and attempts to regulate protected activities of residents in the City, which concerns ultimately prove fatal to the constitutionality of the Ordinance. This City should follow the example of Eagle Grove and amend the Ordinance at once.

I. The Ordinance is unconstitutional because it is a content-based restriction and is not narrowly tailored to further a compelling government interest.

The Ordinance violates free speech under the First Amendment and Iowa Constitution because it is a content-based restriction on protected expression and is not narrowly tailored. It restricts protected speech of a particular subject matter. The prohibited conduct cannot be defined without referencing the content of the speech.

Courts have reviewed challenges to the constitutionality of local regulations of sexual or adult-oriented businesses. See Richland Bookmart. Inc. v. Knox County, 555 F.3d 512, 520 (6th Cir. 2009); Deja Vu of Nashville, Inc. v. Metro. Gov't of Nashville & Davidson County, 274 F.3d 377, 396 (6th Cir. 2001). While such speech is protected as free speech and expression by the First Amendment, the Supreme Court has held that governments may regulate sexual or erotic speech and expression if those regulations are intended to address the "adverse secondary effects of such expression, so long as the restrictions placed on expression survive intermediate scrutiny." Entertainment Productions, Inc. v. Shelby County, 588 F.3d 372, 378 (6th Cir. 2009) (citing United States v. O'Brien, 391 U.S. 367, 377 (1968); City of Renton v. Playtime Theatres, 475 U.S. 41, 47 (1986)). However, a federal court has recently recognized this doctrine did not apply to a similar anti-drag law. Friends of Georges, Inc. v. Mulroy, 2023 WL 3790583, at *26 (W.D. Tenn. June 2,

2023). The secondary effects doctrine did not save the law because the court found that the "predominate concerns involved the suppression of unpopular views of those who wish to impersonate a gender that is different from the one with which they were born." *Id.*

The Iowa Supreme Court has recognized that the right to free speech under article I, section 7 of the Iowa Constitution, while interpreted independently, is at least coextensive with the analogous federal constitutional right. *City of West Des Moines v. Engler*, 641 N.W.2d 803, 805 (Iowa 2002); *Bierman v. Weier*, 826 N.W.2d 436, 451 (Iowa 2013) (holding article I, section 7 "generally imposes the same restrictions on the regulation of speech as does the federal constitution") (quoting *State v. Milner*, 571 N.W.2d 7, 12 (Iowa 1997)); *Iowans for Tax Relief v. Campaign Fin. Disclosure Comm'n*, 331 N.W.2d 862, 868 (Iowa 1983) (stating that "the applicable [F]irst [A]mendment standard" was "the same" as that for article I, section 7).

Content-based laws, which target speech based on its communicative content, are subject to strict scrutiny: they are presumptively unconstitutional and may be justified only if the government proves that they are narrowly tailored to serve a compelling state interest. *Reed v. Town of Gilbert*, 576 U.S. 155, 171 (2015); *City of Los Angeles v. Alameda Books*, 535 U.S. 425, 434 (2002); *R.A.V. v. City of St. Paul*, 505 U.S. 377, 382 (1992). By contrast, "[t]he principal inquiry in determining content neutrality ... is whether the government has adopted a regulation of speech because of disagreement with the message it conveys." *Ward v. Rock Against Racism*, 491 U.S. 781, 791 (1989) (citing *Clark v. Community for Creative Non-Violence*, 468 U.S. 288, 295 (1984)). Regulation of expressive activity is content-neutral if it is "justified without reference to the content of the regulated speech." *Clark*, 468 U.S. at 293.

"[E]ven a regulation neutral on its face may be content based if its manifest purpose is to regulate speech because of the message it conveys." Turner Broad. Sys., Inc. v. FCC, 512 U.S. 622, 645 (1994). The Court has recognized a category of laws that, though facially seemingly content-neutral, will be considered content-based regulations of speech: laws that cannot be "justified without reference to the content of the regulated speech" or that were adopted by the government "because of disagreement with the message [the speech] conveys," Ward, 491 U.S. at 791. Those laws, like laws that are content-based on their face, must also satisfy strict scrutiny. Reed, 135 S. Ct. at 2227. The courts have clarified that they don't rest on the government's assertion of a facially content-neutral purpose: "[E]ven when a government supplies a contentneutral justification for the regulation, that justification is not given controlling weight without further inquiry." Whitton v. City of Gladstone, 54 F.3d 1400, 1406 (8th Cir. 1995) (finding durational limits governing political signs but not commercial signs to be content-based, despite the city's assertion of a facially content-neutral purpose "in maintaining traffic safely and preserving aesthetic beauty") (citing City of Cincinnati v. Discovery Network, Inc., 507 U.S. 410, 430 (1993) (rejecting city's argument that a restriction on the use of newsracks selling commercial handbills but not newspapers could be justified by a facially content-neutral purpose "to limit the total number of newsracks" for "safety and esthetics").

Recently a federal district court found a similar law was a facially content-based restriction and unconstitutional under a strict scrutiny analysis. *Friends of George's*, 2023 WL 3790583, at *1(granting a permanent injunction). Tennessee passed a law criminalizing the performance of "adult cabaret entertainment" in any location where the adult cabaret entertainment could be viewed by a person who is not an adult, and defining "adult cabaret entertainment" to include

"female and male impersonators". T.C.A. § 7-51-1401. The Court found that while the state has a compelling state interest in protecting the physical and psychological well-being of minors, the law was not narrowly tailored or the least restrictive means to serve its compelling interest. *Friends of Georges*, 2023 WL 3790583, at *28.

Like the law in *Friends of George's*, this Ordinance is a content-based restriction because it targets the speech of "male or female impersonators" (or "similar performers") based on its communicative content: the same speech or expression, if performed or expressed by non "male or female impersonators", is not prohibited. This Ordinance effectively prohibits all drag performances in the City. The inclusion of impersonators in the definition is not aimed at regulating sexually explicit or obscene expression, but rather to regulate expression by "impersonators" or "similar performers" only. By doing so, it targets only certain types of obscenity, as well as altogether non-obscene expression, and thus is a content-based restriction that warrants strict scrutiny.

Because the Ordinance is content-based and warrants strict scrutiny, it is the City's burden to demonstrate that the Ordinance furthers a compelling governmental interest and is narrowly tailored to that end. The City cannot do so. The Ordinance "seeks to ensure that residential and family-oriented uses and adult entertainment facilities will be located in separate and compatible locations." Dyersville, Ia. Mun. Code § 127.01 (2022). However, there are already laws regulate obscenity and sexually explicit conduct and materials. Lawmakers have not identified any other compelling interest in enacting this Ordinance. There is no justification for the law's treatment of "male and female impersonators" as "objectionable" without reference to the content of the speech being regulated. The motivation for this ordinance was plainly to further the City's desire to restrict "male or female impersonators" from performing because of a disagreement with the message they convey and regulate them entirely out of existence within the City.

Further, even if the City could identify a compelling governmental interest in prohibiting non-obscene expression by "male or female impersonators", the law fails strict scrutiny because it is not narrowly tailored. Instead of enforcing existing laws prohibiting obscenity or indecent exposure in front of minors, the City seeks to prevent any drag entertainment from being performed because of the content. Drag shows are predominantly not obscene. In fact they generally are characterized by clothed performers singing, dancing, and performing comedy.

Failing both prongs of strict scrutiny analysis, the Ordinance violates the free speech and expression guarantees of the U.S. and Iowa Constitutions.

II. The Ordinance is unconstitutionally overboard.

The Ordinance is also unconstitutionally overbroad, because artistic expression is not sexual or erotic in nature simply because it involves "male or female impersonators, or similar entertainers". A law is unconstitutionally overbroad if it sweeps in more speech than is necessary to satisfy the government's interest, regulating both protected and unprotected speech. *See Broadrick v. Oklahoma*, 413 U.S. 601,610 (1973). "Adult entertainment cabaret" is defined as "a public or private establishment that is licensed to serve food and/or alcoholic beverages, which features topless dancers, strippers, male or female impersonators, or similar entertainers." Dyersville, Ia. Mun. Code § 127.02(1)(G) (2022). In a recent case a court granted a permanent

injunction finding a similar law unconstitutionally overbroad. Friends of George's, 2023 WL 3790583, at *31-32.

Undoubtedly, the City may regulate businesses that regularly purvey "sexually explicit but non-obscene speech, such as adult publications and adult videos, and second, 'symbolic speech' or 'expressive conduct,' such as nude dancing" through zoning restrictions. *Richland Bookmart*, Inc., 555 F.3d at 520. However, the plain language of the Ordinance regulates speech and expression beyond that which could reasonably be considered "sexually explicit" expression.

The Ordinance regulates any production that includes "male or female impersonators" as a prohibited "adult cabaret", without regard for whether any such speech or expression has a "sexually explicit" component. It prohibits adult cabaret entertainment without any exceptions, sweeping broadly, without any narrowing language. An underlying issue with the Ordinance is that drag performances are not inherently sexually explicit by nature; they typically feature fully-clothed performers singing, dancing, and performing comedy bits. For example, in Des Moines drag performances have become a part of the annual *CelebrAsian* festival, which is a family friendly drag event that celebrates Asian cultures. At this festival the performance by "male or female impersonators" is catered to people of all ages and is used to showcase culture and tradition. Additionally, expression by "male or female impersonators" is a time-honored tradition in artistic works, going back millennia. Drag has been present in western culture dating back to Ancient Greek theatrical productions, and the earliest productions of William Shakespeare's plays. Speech by "male or female impersonators" is a form of artistic expression long protected by the First Amendment and the Iowa Constitution.

Because the Ordinance sweeps in far more protected speech than is necessary to satisfy the government's interest, it is unconstitutionally overbroad.

III. The Ordinance violates equal protection because it targets LGBTQ people based on sex and gender and is motivated by animus.

Finally, the Ordinance violates the both the U.S. and Iowa Constitution's equal protection guarantees because: (1) it facially discriminates against the LGBTQ community on the basis of sex and/or gender by regulating drag performances out of existence within the City and (2) was motivated by animus toward this group.

Because sex-based classifications are quasi-suspect, they are subject to a form of heightened scrutiny. G.G. ex rel Grimm v. Gloucester Cty. Sch. Bd., 654 F. App'x 606, 607 (4th Cir. 2016); City of Cleburne v. Cleburne Living Ctr., 473 U.S. 432, 440-441 (1985). Specifically, they are subject to intermediate scrutiny "with teeth", meaning that they "fail[] unless [they are] substantially related to a sufficiently important governmental interest." See Id. at 441. In addition, to survive intermediate scrutiny, the state must provide an "exceedingly persuasive justification" for its classification. See United States v. Virginia, 518 U.S. 515, 534 (1996). Federal courts across the country have recognized claims of sex discrimination brought under the Fourteenth Amendment by individuals, who, by definition, do not adhere to the stereotypes associated with their sex assigned at birth. Grimm v. Gloucester Cnty. Sch. Bd., 972 F.3d 586, 612 (4th Cir. 2020), cert. denied sub nom. Gloucester Cnty. Sch. Bd. v. Grimm, No. 20–116, 2021 WL 2637992 (U.S. June 28, 2021) (declining certiorari in a case in which the Fourth Circuit expressly held that

"transgender people constitute a discrete group with immutable characteristics" subject to heightened scrutiny under Fourteenth Amendment equal protection); *Bd. of Educ. of the Highland Local Sch. Dist. v. United States Dep't of Educ.*, 208 F. Supp. 3d 850, 874 (S.D. Ohio 2016), *stay denied*, 845 F.3d 217, 222 (6th Cir. 2016); *Evancho v. Pine–Richland Sch. Dist.*, 237 F. Supp. 3d 267, 288 (W.D. Pa. 2017); *A.H. v. Minersville Area Sch. Dist.*, 290 F. Supp. 3d 321, 331 (M.D. Pa. 2017); *M.A.B. v. Bd. of Educ. of Talbot Cnty.*, 286 F. Supp. 3d 704, 718–22 (D. Md. 2018); *F.V. v. 81 F.V. v. Barron*, 286 F. Supp. 3d 1131, 1142–45 (D. Idaho 2018) and *decision clarified sub nom. F.V. v. Jeppesen*, 477 F. Supp. 3d 1144 (D. Idaho 2020); *Karnoski v. Trump*, 926 F.3d 1180, 1200–01 (9th Cir. 2019); *Stone v. Trump*, 400 F. Supp. 3d 317, 355 (D. Md. 2019); *Ray v. McCloud*, No. 2:18–CV–272, 2020 WL 8172750, at *8–9 (S.D. Ohio Dec. 16, 2020).

Applying a similar analysis, the U.S. Supreme Court and numerous federal circuit courts of appeal have recognized that discrimination against someone because they are transgender is sex discrimination under Title VII and Title IX. *Bostock v. Clayton Cty., Georgia*, 140 S. Ct. 1731, 1739 (2020) ("holding that discrimination against someone because they are transgender is sex discrimination"). While these cases are often brought by transgender people, courts have used transgender status as an umbrella to also include drag queens and kings, and "male or female impersonators". *Oiler v. Winn–Dixie La., Inc.*, No. 00–3114, 2002 WL 31098541 (E.D. La. Sept. 16, 2002).

The Iowa Constitution's equal protection guarantee, found in Art. I, sections 1 and 6, is at least as protective as its federal counterpart found in the Fourteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution. *Varnum v. Brien*, 763 N.W.2d 862, 896 (Iowa 2009) ("legislative classifications based on sexual orientation must be examined under a heightened level of scrutiny under the Iowa Constitution."). Iowa's constitutional promise of equal protection is essentially a direction that all persons similarly situated should be treated alike under the law. *Gartner v. Iowa Dep't of Pub. Health*, 830 N.W.2d 335, 351 (Iowa 2013). More precisely, the equal protection guarantee requires "that laws treat alike all people who are similarly situated with respect to the legitimate purposes of the law." *Varnum*, 763 N.W.2d at 882 (quotation marks omitted); *Bowers v. Polk County Bd. of Supervisors*, 638 N.W.2d 682, 689 (Iowa 2002).

In two separate cases we've litigated, Iowa district courts have recognized that under the test set out by the Iowa Supreme Court in Varnum, classifications based on transgender status demand heightened scrutiny. Vasquez et al. v. Iowa Dep't of Hum. Servs., No. CVCV061729 at Dist. Ct. Nov. 19, 2021), available https://www.aclu-Co. at ia.org/sites/default/files/vasquez covington order.pdf, appeal dismissed, N.W.2d. , 2023 WL 3397460 (Iowa May 12, 2023) (leaving district court decision undisturbed); Good et. al v. Iowa Dep't of Hum. Servs., Nos. CVCV054956, CVCV055470 (consolidated) at *26 (Polk Co. Dist. Ct. Jun. 6, 2018), available at https://www.aclu.org/cases/good-v-iowa-dept-humanservices?document=good-v-iowa-department-human-services-ruling-petitions-judicial-review, aff'd 924 N.W.2d 853, 862-63 (Iowa 2019) (affirming on state statutory civil rights grounds without reaching constitutional question). Applying a similar analysis under the Iowa Civil Rights Act as applied under equal protection, the Iowa Supreme Court has also found that discrimination against transgender employee in employer-provided healthcare benefits and use of restroom and locker room facilities at work was prohibited gender identity discrimination. Vroegh v. Iowa Dep't of Corr., 972 N.W.2d 686, 704 (Iowa 2022) (upholding jury verdict and \$120,000 damages award).

In sum, because the Ordinance facially classifies on the basis of sex, gender, and sex- and gender-based stereotypes, it violates federal and state constitutional guarantees of equal protection.

This Ordinance also violates equal protection for a second, independent reason: it targets a disadvantaged group, LGBTQ drag performers, based purely on animus toward that group as undesirable. Even absent a suspect classification, a statute that targets a disadvantaged group based purely on animus toward that group is categorically prohibited under equal protection. The U.S. Supreme Court has long recognized that a law is irrational, and categorically violates equal protection, if its purpose is to target a disadvantaged group. See United States v. Windsor, 570 U.S. 744, 770 (2013) ("[A] bare [legislative] desire to harm a politically unpopular group cannot' justify disparate treatment of that group.") (quoting U. S. Dep't of Agric. v. Moreno, 413 U.S. 528, 534-535 (1973); Cleburne, 473 U.S. at 448 ("[M]ere negative attitudes, or fear . . . are not permissible bases for [a statutory classification]."); Romer v. Evans, 517 U.S. 620, 632 (1996) (amendment that was "inexplicable by anything but animus toward the class it affect[ed] . . . lack[ed] a rational relationship to legitimate state interests").

Here, on its face the Ordinance targets LGBTQ drag performers based on dislike for the group. Drag has become specifically linked with the LGBTQ community, and drag performers often perform in bars and spaces that specifically cater to the community. The City Council's express purpose passing the Ordinance to ensure that residential and family-oriented uses and adult entertainment facilities will be located in separate and compatible locations." Dyersville, Ia. Mun. Code § 127.01 (2022). As already discussed, there is nothing inherently obscene or even sexually explicit about "male or female imperson[ation]"—and nothing "objectionable" about "male or female impersonators"—including everything from drag comedy acts to Shakespearean productions, that the youth need to be protected from. The Ordinance simply perpetuates a history of animus against the LGBTO community as demonstrated by the pretextual nature of the asserted motives for the Ordinance. There are already laws prohibiting obscenity and this Ordinance does not generally prohibit obscenity but rather targets only by LGBTO drag performers. Thus, there is no reason offered for the facially discriminatory classification but bare animus, and the Ordinance cannot pass constitutional muster.

The City should promptly remove all references to "male or female impersonators" from the Ordinance.

This City should follow the recent example of Eagle Grove, Iowa. After the ACLU learned that the City was enforcing the unconstitutional ordinance, we contacted legal counsel for the city, which, to its great credit, agreed to repeal the unconstitutional ordinance to avoid future violations. (See Ex. 1). We have also reached out to three other cities that are currently in the process of repealing their own anti-drag ordinances. Had these cities not taken the step to amend the ordinances, they risked liability for officials that enforced them without realizing they were unconstitutional. The City faces similar risks here.

We encourage you not to allow the Ordinance to stay on the books with the intention not to enforce it. It is important to remove the unconstitutional ordinance from the municipal code to protect residents from constitutional violations, and to protect the city and its officers from liability.

For these reasons, we urge the City to, at minimum, remove all references to "male or female impersonators and similar entertainers" from the Ordinance. A court would likely find that the restriction of these performances under the Ordinance is content-based and overbroad in violation of free speech, and violates equal protection.

Thank you for your attention to this important matter. I ask that you inform me within 14 days of the date of this letter that you agree not to enforce the ordinance as written, and that you will promptly take the necessary action to amend the ordinance as requested.

CHAPTER 124

ADULT ENTERTAINMENT BUSINESSES

124.01 Location Restricted

124.02 Definitions

124.03 Establishment of Adult Entertainment Businesses 124.04 Violations

124.01 LOCATION RESTRICTED.

Any adult entertainment business which is distinguished or characterized by an emphasis on sex acts or specified anatomical areas shall not be established in any district zoned for residential use or within 1,000 feet of another business, school, church, public park, day care center, nursery school, or any type of dwelling.

124.02 DEFINITIONS.

- 1. Definitions of adult entertainment businesses include the following:
- A. "Adult amusement or entertainment" means an amusement or entertainment which is distinguished or characterized by an emphasis on acts or material depicting, describing or relating to sex acts or specified anatomical areas, including, but not limited to, topless or bottomless dancers, exotic dancers, strippers, male or female impersonators, or similar entertainment.
- B. "Adult bookstore" means an establishment having as a significant portion of its stock in trade books, magazines, and other periodicals or goods and items held for sale which are distinguished or characterized by their emphasis on matters depicting or describing sex acts or specified anatomical areas.
- C. "Adult hotel or motel" means any building or vehicle with accommodations used for the temporary occupancy of one or more individuals and is an establishment where material is presented that is distinguished or characterized by an emphasis on depicting or describing sex acts or specified anatomical areas for observation by the accommodated individuals.
- D. "Adult motion picture arcade" means any building or vehicle to which the public is permitted or invited where coin or slug-operated or electronically, electrically, or mechanically controlled still or motion picture machines, projectors, or other image-producing devices are maintained to show images to five or fewer persons per machine at any one time, and where the images so displayed are distinguished or characterized by an emphasis on matter depicting or describing sex acts or specified anatomical areas.
- E. "Adult motion picture theater" means an enclosed building or vehicle used for presenting material distinguished or characterized by an emphasis on matter depicting or describing sex acts or specified anatomical areas.
- F. "Adult photo studio" means an establishment which, upon payment of a fee, provides photographic equipment and/or models for the purpose of photographing specified anatomical areas or sex acts.
- G. "Massage parlor" means any building, room, place, vehicle, or establishment, where manipulated massage or manipulated exercise is practiced for pay upon the human body with an emphasis on sex acts or specified anatomical areas by anyone not a duly licensed physician, osteopath, chiropractor, registered nurse or practical nurse operating under a physician's direction, physical therapist, podiatrist, registered speech pathologist, or physical or occupational therapist who treats only patients recommended by a licensed physician and operates only under such physician's direction, whether with or without the use of mechanical, therapeutic, or bathing devices. The term does not include regular licensed medical clinics, nursing homes, beauty parlors, or barber shops.

H. "Sexual encounter center" means any business, agency, or persons who for any form of consideration gratuity provides a place where three or more persons may congregate, assemble or associate for the purple engaging in sex acts or exposing specified anatomical areas.

Item 23.

- 2. Definitions of sex acts and specified anatomical areas are as follows:
- A. "Sex act" means any sexual contact, actual or simulated, either natural or deviate, between two or more persons, or between a person and an animal, by penetration of the penis into the vagina or anus, or by contact between the mouth or tongue and genitalia or anus, or by contact between a finger or hand of one person and the genitalia of another, or by the use of artificial or substitute sexual organs in contact with the genitalia or anus.
- B. "Specified anatomical areas" include human genitals, pubic region, buttocks, and the female breast below a point immediately above the top of the areola.

124.03 ESTABLISHMENT OF ADULT ENTERTAINMENT BUSINESSES.

- 1. The establishment of an adult entertainment business shall include the opening of such business as a new business, the relocation of such business, or the conversion of an existing business location to any of the uses described as an adult entertainment business.
- 2. Measurement of the 1,000-foot restriction shall be taken on a direct line from the property line of such adult entertainment business to the point on the property line of another business, school, church, public park, day care center, nursery school, or any type of dwelling.
- 3. All adult entertainment businesses shall have their openings, entries, windows, etc., constructed, located, covered, or screened in such a manner as to prevent a view into the interior of such building from any pedestrian sidewalk, walkway, street, or other public or semi-public area. Advertisements, displays, or other promotional materials shall not be shown or exhibited so as to be visible to the public from the pedestrian sidewalks, walkways, or other public or semi-public area.
- 4. No alcohol shall be permitted in any adult entertainment business, unless specifically authorized by Iowa law. This prohibition applies equally to the proprietor and the patrons of the business.
- 5. No minors shall be permitted in any entertainment business.

124.04 VIOLATIONS.

Each day that a person is in violation of this chapter shall be considered a separate violation.

ORDINANCE NO. 2021-

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF EAGLE GROVE, IOWA BY AMENDING PROVISIONS PERTAINING TO THE ADULT ENTERTAINMENT BUSINESSES

BE IT ENACTED by the City Council of the City of Eagle Grove, Iowa:

SECTION 1. SECTIONS MODIFIED. Sections 124.01, 124.02(1)(A), and 124.03 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Eagle Grove, Iowa, is repealed and the following adopted in lieu thereof:

124.01 LOCATION RESTRICTED.

Any adult entertainment business shall not be established in any district zoned for residential use or within 1,000 feet of another business, school, church, public park, day care center, nursery school, or any type of dwelling.

124.02 DEFINITIONS.

- 1. Definitions of adult entertainment businesses include the following:
- A. "Adult amusement or entertainment" means an amusement or entertainment which is distinguished or characterized by an emphasis on acts or material depicting, describing or relating to sex acts or specified anatomical areas, including, without limitation, topless or bottomless dancers, exotic dancers, strippers, or similar entertainment.

124.03 ESTABLISHMENT OF ADULT ENTERTAINMENT BUSINESSES.

 The establishment of an adult entertainment business shall include the opening of such business as a new business, the relocation of such business, or the conversion of an existing business location to any of the uses described as an adult entertainment business. The conversion of an existing business location to an adult entertainment business shall include the isolated, intermittent, temporary, or sporadic use of an existing business location, in whole or in part, for any of the uses described as an adult entertainment business.

SECTION 2. REPEALER. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY CLAUSE. If any section, provision, or part of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any section, provision, or part thereof not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

Section 2. The City Administrator is hereby approved as the authorized representative for the City of Dyersville.
