Mayor addressed council to deicide how they would like to fund golf course. Dan Olin wanted \$80K along with a helper. This lead to the discussion of a Parks employee starting at \$40k a year. The creek is asking for \$132K and would provide his own team and materials. While discussing the budget, Council Member Hall suggested to leave administration wage budget as is. Priscilla stated she will be doing a wage review city wide. Further discussion about the budget, Mayor suggest \$30k for code enforcement position to the council with further research on the position full time verse part time. Council also must take into consideration the training the position requires and the cost of training. Laura Beeson suggested a community wide clean up until the position is filled. Council Member Rodgers suggested having the dump open for a week every quarter.

Motion to add \$50k to the Golf course funding and \$30K to the code enforcement position funding to be pulled out of account 156291 infrastructure account.

David Hutchings-We are still checking size and type of pipe on the city's side and customer side, also type of meter. Daily readings at the water and sewer plants. Water leak on Concho Street, patching potholes all over town, four sewer stop ups, several animal control calls, mowed and used the weed eater at the water plant, sewer plant, wells, city hall, bar ditches and fire station, pulled sewer pumps at the plant due to trash, meter readings and cutoffs, installed several 5/8 meters, cut down several trees at Pfluger park and hauled off the limbs, pulling sprinkler heads out at the golf course to clean and flush out lines, put new water tap at golf course for a water station, trimmed trees at road ways and signs, filled in several holes on school grounds

Priscilla Aguirre- just a couple of updates, still waiting on contractors for the water plant and well #3 generator project, the project was originally expected to be completed at the end of May or first of June, Our previous deadline for TCEQ was end of June, unfortunately due to the delay of receiving the generators, Lucy with EHT requested an extension, TCEQ has approved the extension; project completion date is December 31, 2023,

we should be receiving the generators at the end of August, Well three has been serviced and is working appropriately, there was no indication that the well was struck by lighting the servicing company stated there was water present in the cable the pump had holes and was worn, the motor was initially installed March of 2021 unfortunately the motor was only covered by a one year warranty with the manufacturer, TWDB contacted us July 31, 2023 stating our application for funding for the drinking water state revolving fund is under technical review, the TWDB is projecting 2.4 million dollars in loan forgiveness and 1.3 million in a zero interest loan, until the project receives a funding commitment from the TWDB budgeted amounts are subject to change, I spoke with Sage earlier this week he did suggest two options for this project; elevated tank storage at the high tower because it is barely meeting TCEQ standards, second is building a common ground storage and second clear well, on August 2, Sage notified us that we were eighth on the drinking water state revolving fund led service line replacement project which potentially qualifies us for \$230,000.00, TCEQ requires a service line inventory for both utility owned and customer service lines with this project and the project must be completed by October 31, 2024, Public works is diligently working on this project and is near completely done, update on USDA, Sage said contracts have been set out, G-works software update, we had our kick off call July 21, and this week we provided them with the number of PC's requiring software installation, they have also tasked us with 6 questionnaires for each software module which we are working on completing, on July 24, I scheduled a health benefits orientation with our TX Health Benefits and requested health benefit plans and options for staff our renewal is coming up August 31, so we should be receiving that soon, also an update to the golf course, the staff has been working at the golf course for the last 3 weeks picking up sprinklers and cleaning out sprinkler heads and basically figuring out which ones are allowing water to come through, so they will continue with that as well

Consideration and Possible Action On:

A. Discussion, updates, and possible action regarding maintenance and management of Concho Springs Golf Course.

Ronnie reported that they got most of the water going out there, but not all the sprinklers work properly. There are quite a few that do not rotate so not all the greens are being watered correctly. Harold reported that he is watering all day, three greens at a time. All the greens have been well soaked. He is having a problem with the sprinkler heads stopping up; so, they must monitor closely. Charles said once the greens are in, they will need to be watered for 15 to 20 minutes three times a day for a while. Harold is using around 18,000 gallons per 3 greens per day. The mayor stated he wanted to get a good estimation on the water usage for the golf course. Ronnie said the average daily flow into the sewer plant is around 130,000 gallons. Charles stated once the greens are established, they will need around 400 to 450 gallons per day. Priscilla asked if the greens are growing on their own why do we need to replace them? Charles replied that they are growing in patches and the places that are not growing will never come in and that is why they need to be replaced. Charles said it will take 2 to 3 weeks to get the greens in and then in about 4 to 5 weeks you could play on them. They will not be perfect but playable. Priscilla asks about how much of a risk it is to put them in this late in the year; and Charles replied, "none at all". If the ground temperature stays above 64 degrees, the grass will grow. This type of hybrid sod (grass) is built for cold weather. Harold says the fairways and Tboxes are not playable, they need water. Dan said they can seed the bare spots but mainly they need water and should be playable in the spring. Bradley said the Golf Association wants to pay for eleven sprinkler inserts. Ed Medders will pay for the 11th sprinkler insert himself. The cost of the refurbished inserts is \$97.00 each. So, for the remaining 39 sprinklers, the cost will be \$3783.00. They have found shrimp in the sprinklers clogging them up. Charles said that copper sulfate will kill the shrimp and will not harm the greens. Prissy presented pictures of the sewer lift out at the golf course, to show the rusted equipment and broken concrete. The invoice from Sportsturf in the amount of \$677.00 was

brought up to Dan, he said it was tools to work on the sprinkler heads. Dan said the golf course did not have the necessary tools to take apart the sprinkler heads. Mayor asked Dan if he ordered those himself and Dan said yes. Mayor asked Dan if he asked permission from anybody or if he just ordered them, Dan said he just ordered them because they had to have them. Mayor said the problem was it was billed to the city, Dan said that is fine. Mayor said no it is not because it is taking liberties with the City's money. Dan said he did not mean for it to go to the city, he has been waiting for the bill to come to him. Mayor said we have had problems with things like this in past and he was not going to let it happen again. Dan said that was not his intention for the city to pay for it. Dan's wife said he did not mean for it to come to the city, mayor told her she could speak when he pointed to her. Dan's wife stood up to leave and Dan stood up and said good luck and they left. Mayor said if that was Dan walking out on the contract, then council will have to find someone else. There was no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

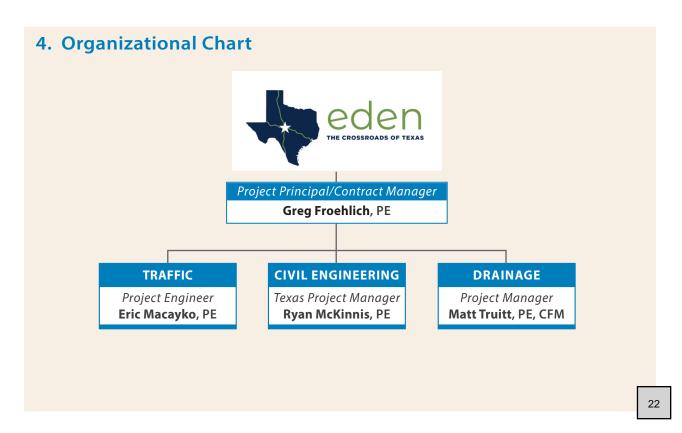
