This year, EPL strengthened its commitment to supporting Escondido's diverse community by investing in workforce development, cultural outreach, STEAM education, and wellness programs while enhancing operational efficiency and sustainability.

I am happy to report that all key metrics, such as checkouts, library visits, programs, and attendance, increased compared to the 2022-2023 fiscal year.

This report details EPL's progress across its four strategic goals: 1) Community Hub/Cultural Connector, 2) Embrace Emerging Services, 3) Support the Escondido Economy, and 4) Resilience with a look towards the future. Throughout the report, readers will see library statistics, patron quotes, and essential data that provide context for the value and continued relevance of EPL in the community. ## LIBRARY STRATEGIC PLAN

In January 2018, Library Systems & Services (LS&S) began operating the Escondido Public Library with the goals of connecting to the community, helping it grow, and inspiring innovation through access and service. To do this successfully, the Library needed a metrics system in place. With heavy input from the community, a five-year strategic plan was created.

# COMMUNITY HUB & CULTURAL CONNECTOR

EPL will provide experiences that bring the community together, embrace the diversity of a dynamic and growing community, and be a hub for local information.





## **Partnership Development**

Building partnerships with local organizations was one of EPL's main strategies for expanding its reach and offering more diverse programming. In the 2023-2024 fiscal year, EPL partnered with 35+ organizations, including the San Diego Air & Space Museum and US Navy Naval Aviation volunteers, to engage patrons of all ages, focusing on pre-k and children's programs and events.

Partnerships like this have been shown to significantly increase participation in library programming, particularly when linked to early childhood education, which remains a top priority for many libraries.

## **Cultural Events & Celebrations**

Cultural programming at EPL thrived in 2023-2024. EPL's collaboration with the **Persian Cultural Center** for the **Nowruz Celebration** drew 180 attendees, providing a vibrant showcase of Persian food, music, and dance. This event exemplified how partnerships can enhance cultural programming and allow for cultural exchange.

Another hallmark event was the **Día de los Muertos** celebration, which attracted 160 attendees from across Escondido. The event included traditional Mexican elements such as *folklorico* (folk) dance, storytelling, and an *ofrenda* (offering), where families could place photos of loved ones. The success of this event reflects the growing demand for culturally relevant programming that acknowledges the heritage of Escondido's diverse populations. Such events build community and foster cross-cultural understanding.

## **Diversity Outreach**

In recognition of Escondido's cultural and linguistic diversity, EPL prioritized expanding its bilingual and multilingual programming in the 2023-2024 fiscal year. Through targeted outreach, EPL launched **Bilingual Storytimes**, offered 33 times throughout the year, where Spanish- and English-speaking families could engage in literacy-building activities.

EPL's efforts extended beyond programming to include more diverse marketing strategies. By conducting research to identify the most effective ways to reach Escondido's underserved communities, EPL expanded its social media presence and increased its outreach through email newsletters and physical flyers distributed in areas with high concentrations of non-English-speaking residents.

## **Community Information Hub**

EPL continued to strengthen its role as a community information hub, providing vital information on local services, such as the **Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP)**, which helps low-income households access broadband services. EPL's role as an information hub is particularly important in bridging the digital divide: the gap between people who have access to digital technology and those who do not. By enhancing both its physical and digital platforms, EPL was reached more residents than ever before. **Outreach events at schools, parks, and community centers** helped extend EPL's reach to underserved areas, bringing library services directly to the community.

**EPL** provides experiences that reveal the Library is more than a place for books and is the center for lifelong learning in Escondido.




## **Technology Adoptions**

To meet the demands of a tech-savvy population and

bridge the digital divide, EPL expanded its offerings of **public computers** and **laptops** for in-library use. By making technology accessible to patrons who may not have reliable internet or devices at home, EPL supports the mission to ensure equitable access to digital tools.

EPL grew its use of **Link+**, a consortium that allows patrons to borrow materials from over 70 libraries across California and Nevada. This collaboration increased the number of available materials by over **6.5 million titles**, expanding EPL's collection without requiring physical space for additional books. Such resource-sharing systems are considered best practice, as they allow libraries to provide a wider range of materials at a lower cost.



### **Mobile & Off-Site Services**

EPL recognized that not all patrons could visit the Library's physical location, particularly those with transportation challenges or time constraints. To address this issue, EPL expanded its mobile and off-site services, bringing programs and materials directly to the community. Through pop-up storytimes and outreach book giveaways, held at public parks and recreational centers, EPL provided access to its resources to underserved neighborhoods.

## **Innovative Programs & Events**

From digital literacy workshops, financial education sessions, and hybrid book clubs to creative arts programs like the **Teen Art Studio** and hands-on **STEAM** activities, EPL provided diverse opportunities for patrons to explore new skills and interests. The Library also hosted themed events, celebrating the joy of reading, and wellness programs such as the Healthy You Series, promoting mindfulness and mental well-being. By embracing emerging services, EPL fostered a dynamic learning environment that met the evolving needs of the Escondido community.

Star Wars Reads Day, held on October 14, 2023, welcomed 50+ visitors to enjoy Star Wars-themed books, special quest appearances, and photo opportunities, with many participants dressing up as their favorite characters. The festivities continued later in the year with Star Wars Week, where the community celebrated literacy through the beloved Star Wars universe. The popular Build Your Own **Droid** event on April 29, 2024, had 120 children and families create custom droids from upcycled materials. The week culminated on May 4, 2024, with a Star Wars Week Finale and Free Comic Book Day.

Overall, EPL's programming reflected the strategic focus on embracing emerging services, empowering patrons through

EPL offers materials, technology, programs, and spaces to support local businesses and for residents to learn, connect and have fun.


## **Business & Workforce Support**

EPL played a significant role in workforce development by hosting the **2nd Annual Career Fair**, which connected 35 employers with 200+ job seekers. The event featured a wide range of industries, offering opportunities for both entry-level and experienced workers. EPL's career fair provided a vital platform for local businesses to find qualified candidates and for residents to explore job opportunities in fields such as healthcare, education, technology, and the trades.

In addition to the career fair, EPL hosted **resume writing workshops** throughout the year, offering personalized assistance to attendees. These workshops were designed to help job seekers create polished, professional resumes that reflected their skills and experiences.

## **Entrepreneurial Support Services**

EPL continued to support local entrepreneurs and small business owners through its range of business resources and services. By offering access to databases such as **AtoZ Databases**, the Library provided detailed information on potential clients, competitors, and market trends. At least 545 local entrepreneurs used these resources to conduct market research and grow their businesses.

# SUMMER READING CHALLENGE



The 2023 Summer Reading Challenge (SRC) at Escondido Public Library, themed "All Together Now," focused on building community and promoting teamwork through a variety of engaging programs for all ages. Running from June 12 to July 30, the program featured activities such as crafting "Love Bugs" with kind messages, learning about global animal habitats with "Wild Wonders," and creating pinch pots inspired by different cultural techniques.

These free programs emphasized the Library's commitment to community engagement and lifelong learning, aligning with the strategic plan to provide diverse, inclusive experiences that foster a sense of belonging and mutual support. The SRC encouraged families to connect, explore new skills, and celebrate togetherness.



## **Sustainability Initiatives**

EPL's commitment to sustainability was evident in its waste reduction and recycling programs, implemented in partnership with the **City of Escondido's Recycling Division**. EPL hosted two public meetings with city officials to explore best practices in waste management and determine how the Library could model sustainable behavior for the broader community. As a result of these discussions, EPL introduced a **composting workshop** that taught participants how to reduce household waste and improve soil health through composting.

Additionally, EPL hosted **succulent swaps**, where attendees traded plant clippings and learned about low-water-use gardening techniques. These events were part of EPL's effort to promote environmentally friendly practices in a region where water conservation is critical.

### **Volunteers**

Library volunteers were invaluable to the Escondido Public Library's mission, embodying the spirit of community engagement and service. Volunteers contributed their time and talents in a variety of roles, from assisting with **program facilitation** to **supporting library events** and **daily operations**. Their dedication not only enhanced the library's ability to offer a broader range of services but also fostered a sense of community ownership and connection. This collaborative effort reflects the library's commitment to building a resilient and connected Escondido, where neighbors come together to support each other and share resources that benefit everyone.









## **STEAM Forward: Inspiring Children**

EPL's commitment to STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics) education has played a crucial role in equipping Escondido's youth and adults for success in a rapidly evolving economy. Through after-school STEAM programs in collaboration with California State University San Marcos (CSUSM), elementary and middle school students participated in hands-on activities like coding, robotics, and engineering. These programs were designed to engage students in practical problem-solving and ignite interest in fields that are projected to be among the fastest-growing sectors in the coming years.

The **Storytime Engineers!** program, developed in partnership with the **San Diego Air & Space Museum**, offered young learners a unique introduction to engineering principles through creative storytelling. By blending narratives with technical concepts, the program captivated and educated children, sparking curiosity and encouraging future exploration of STEAM topics.

EPL's efforts in promoting STEAM education are not just preparing students for individual success but are also building a foundation for a vibrant, innovative future for the entire Escondido community.

## PIONEER ROOM

Operated by the Escondido Public Library, the Pioneer Room was established in 1992 with a bequest from historian Frances Beven Ryan. A valuable space, the Pioneer Room houses the Library's collection of local history and genealogy research materials.



### **Archival Collection Additions**

EPL expanded the Pioneer Room local history archives with the addition of eight new archival collections. These included two **Patio Playhouse** collections, as well as significant photo collections from **Lorna Underwood** and the **Melbourne-Hayden** family. Manuscript collections from **Janis Bittner** and **George Marabotto** were also incorporated, enriching the archive's resources and preserving the community's cultural heritage.


## **Pioneer Room Outreach and Programs**

EPL participated in several engaging events and programs that highlighted local history and fostered community connections. At **Grape Day 2023**, the Library's booth attracted 535 visitors, offering educational resources about Escondido's history, distributing free books and promotional items, and generating increased interest in the Pioneer Room archives. The **Beginning Genealogy Workshop**, provided attendees with valuable genealogy research skills and access to the Ancestry.com database, celebrating National Archives Month.

Additionally, the Pioneer Room hosted its first-ever scout badge workshop, where **Girl Scout Troop 2700** earned their **Book Artist Badge** by learning bookbinding and repair techniques from Archivist Ashley Hays and Assistant Archivist Abril Ruiz Erives.

These events effectively showcased the Library's dedication to preserving local heritage and engaging the community in meaningful ways.

## LITERACY SERVICES



**Literacy Programs for Escondido** 

Escondido Public Library's Literacy Services has been a cornerstone of the community since 1991, providing essential support to adults seeking to improve their reading, writing, and comprehension skills. The program offers a variety of free and confidential services, including English as a Second Language (ESL) classes, one-onone adult literacy tutoring, and the Families for Literacy (FFL) program.

These services empower adults to achieve personal goals such as securing employment, managing finances, and supporting their children's education. By enhancing literacy skills, the program significantly improves the quality of life for participants and their families. Each program is tailored to meet individual needs, offering flexible schedules and personalized instruction. Literacy Services is an integral part of EPL's mission to foster lifelong learning and community engagement, helping to build a more informed and capable community.



## LITERACY FUNDING

## **Literacy Learners' Stories**

This course has been an *extraordinary tool to increase* job opportunities, to communicate effectively in English, and to help people contribute with their children's homework and education. -Benedito Benedito, originally from Brazil, moved to the U.S. ten years ago and struggled to find an English language course that met his needs. After nearly a year of searching, he discovered the English as a Second Language program offered by the Library. This program significantly enhanced his language skills in speaking, listening, writing, and reading, increasing his confidence and improving his ability to support his children's education. Grateful for the support he received, Benedito now feels inspired to give back to the community, finding personal fulfillment in contributing to the city that has provided him with such invaluable resources.

Before, I didn't speak English. I communicate in Spanish. My English improved a lot since I began to have classes. My life changed. Today I speak with my doctor. -Angelica

Angelica, originally from Mexico and a resident of Escondido since 2011, began taking ESL classes at the Library in 2023. Before joining the program, she communicated only in Spanish. Since starting the classes, her English has improved significantly, transforming her daily life. She now confidently communicates with her doctor, manages appointments, and handles tasks at the post office in English. Angelica is proud of her progress and is motivated to continue her studies to further enhance her language skills.

This course has been key in our adaptation to life in this country. It has empowered us to communicate effectively and connect with others.

Abigail, who moved to the U.S. from Mexico in January 2024, joined the Library's ESL program to improve her English and find better job opportunities. Initially feeling nervous and unsure of her language skills in a new city, she soon found support and encouragement from her teacher, Ilana, and her classmates. The course not only enhanced her communication abilities but also helped her adapt to American customs while sharing her own cultural experiences. Grateful for the free classes and the support she received, Abigail is committed to continuing her language learning and making the most of the opportunities available to her and other immigrants in Escondido.

## LIBRARY SUPPORT

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### LIBRARY DIRECTOR'S REPORT

### Sales Tax "Measure I"

As of November 10, 2024, the City of Escondido one-cent sales tax ballot measure I received a majority of votes to pass with approximately 60% voting for "yes."

As reported in news and by City staff, the measure will provide funding for essential services in Escondido. Measure I will assist in addressing City Council and resident-identified City service priorities, including repairing and maintaining local streets, sidewalks, and infrastructure; keeping parks and public facilities safe, clean, and well maintained; providing quick responses to 9-1-1 emergencies; providing fire protection and paramedic services; and cleaning up trash and litter on streets, sidewalks and public areas.

Measure I does not specifically mention funding for the library. However, as Measure I provides unrestricted revenue for the City General Fund, which has been the primary source of library funding in the past, the added funds are expected allow for the ongoing operations of the library following the end of one-time ARPA funds in fiscal year 2025-2026.

### **Update: Play for All Grant**

The library has purchased most of the Play for All furniture, including new seating, wall manipulatives, and climbing structures. Staff expect delivery in early December 2024, with installation finalized by the end of December. A grand opening is being considered for early January 2024, pending any delays in delivery and installation. Additional technology elements, such as new in-library circulating educational tablets and a augmented reality overlay and app for the children's mural are yet to be purchased, but are expected to be ready by the end of December 2024.

**Grant Background**: The Escondido Library was awarded a \$19,710 California State Library LSTA grant to transform the Children's Area through the *Little Explorers Safari* project, aimed at enhancing early childhood learning and play experiences. Funds must be spent by June 30, 2025. A matching \$20k from the Library Trust set aside for the Children's Library was allocated to purchase furniture not covered by the grant.

### **Staff Changes**

A Library Associate 2 (PT30) position in the library Youth Services Department opened following an internal transfer. Screening and interviews began the first week of November.

### October 12, 2024: 2nd Saturday Concert - Dmitry Kirichenko

We were delighted to welcome back Dmitry Kirichenko, a cherished performer in our 2nd Saturday Concert series. Our quarterly Artsy Adults program offered a seasonal treat with a fall-themed stitching craft. Participants enjoyed embroidering festive designs using felt cut-outs, trinkets, and buttons framed in embroidery hoops. The event attracted a great turnout, with **8 patrons** actively participating. Feedback was excellent, with attendees appreciating the interactive, hands-on nature of the activity and expressing interest in more such craft events in the future.

### October 29, 2024: Horror Jeoparty – Trivia Terror at the Library

In celebration of Halloween, we hosted our first "Jeoparty" trivia event, featuring a horror movie theme to capture the spirit of the season. **Sixteen participants were divided into four teams**, each seated in a semi-circle around the host. Players took turns in the "hot seat" to answer questions, while other attendees enjoyed the game as a live audience. The event drew **25 enthusiastic attendees**, including both staff and patrons, who enjoyed the interactive format, fun prizes, and vibrant atmosphere.
