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## ISSUE DESCRIPTION:

The City's response to the COVID-19 virus disaster continues, with continuous Emergency Operations Center (EOC) operations to monitor evolving conditions, coordinate with the Weld County Department of Public Health and Environment, and plan the City's operational response. The structure of the EOC, along with staffing roles, is attached to this report. Response strategies are consistent with the City's Emergency Operations Plan (EOP), which is intended to serve as a high-level guide for all emergencies.

In addition to the broader EOP, staff has developed specific responses to the pandemic conditions presented by COVID-19, which are shown in the attached "Pandemic Response Plan." At the March 17, 2020 staff described the "Operational Response Progression" and noted that at that time, the City was in Phase 3 response. At this time, the City remains in Phase 3, as most City services remain operational, due to capabilities for remote work and social distancing strategies. The remainder of this report provides an update since the July 7<sup>th</sup> work session on the most significant of the City's response strategies and impacts.

At the work session, the City Manager will provide current updates on public health statistics, the Greeley Area Recovery Fund business response, "Safer and Home" compliance, and City Facility reopening.

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## **ISSUE DESCRIPTION:**

Each year the Police Department fields scores of complaints of illegal fireworks. This year, as in prior years, an emphasis was placed on communication to residents about legal and illegal fireworks. The primary strategy used this year was distributing information about fireworks, applicable City ordinances, and possible fines. Social and printed media was used as were some electronic sign boards. A zero-tolerance approach was encouraged for officers when probable cause could be established.

All leave requests were denied for officers working the night shifts on July 4<sup>th</sup> which maximized our staffing levels. Specific firework patrols were deployed from July 1<sup>st</sup> through July 5<sup>th</sup>. Officers were assigned two to a car and they used unmarked cars. Officers responded to all fireworks complaints. In all, officers responded to 117 calls of illegal fireworks during that time, issuing nine summonses, and one warning. 170 illegal fireworks were confiscated.

Illegal fireworks calls were higher this year (117 calls) compared to 2019 (99 calls). A review of the past three years showed relatively similar numbers of calls since 2016.

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## **FINANCIAL SUMMARY:**

Costs relating to education and information strategies totaled about \$1,500 including \$911 for Water Billing inserts. An additional \$2628.96 was spent in overtime compensation.








# FIREWORKS CALLS REMAIN STEADY

# CITATIONS UP IN 2019



**SUBJECT:** Regulation of the Recreational Operation of Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS), also Known as Drones  
**NAME & TITLE:** James L. Becklenberg, City Manager

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**ISSUE DESCRIPTION:**

At its June 2, 2020 work session, the City Council considered amending the Evans Municipal Code to regulate the recreational use of Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS), also known as drones. During the work session, the Council provided direction to staff regarding desired policy issues that an ordinance should address. The purpose of this work session is to review draft policy provisions and provide further direction to staff, as necessary, in anticipation of considering an ordinance regulating UAS at a subsequent meeting.

The potential ordinance would incorporate direction from Council from the June 2<sup>nd</sup> work session to add an entirely new chapter to the Evans Municipal Code that includes the following prohibitions on recreational UAS:

- (A) No person shall operate a UAS to endanger or harm the life or property of any person nor shall any person operate a UAS in a reckless or careless manner.
- (B) No person shall operate a UAS who is under the influence of alcohol, marijuana, or one (1) or more controlled substances as defined in Article 18 of Title 18 of the Colorado Revised Statutes.
- (C) No person shall operate a UAS if he or she knows or has reason to know of any physical or mental condition that would interfere with the safe operation of a UAS, or if he or she knows or has reason to know that UAS equipment is not in proper working order.
- (D) No person shall operate a UAS near any person, pedestrian, bicyclist, motorist without the consent of such person, pedestrian, bicyclist, or motorist.
- (E) No person shall operate a UAS near any animal in a manner that causes movement of the animal.

(F) No person shall knowingly enter, hover, land or otherwise operate an unmanned aircraft system on or over another person's private property without the prior consent of the property owner. Such unauthorized entry onto another's property shall be deemed a trespass.

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**FINANCIAL SUMMARY:**

**CITY OF EVANS, COLORADO**

**ORDINANCE NO. XXX-XX**

**AN ORDINANCE ADDING CHAPTER 9.29 TO TITLE 9 OF THE EVANS MUNICIPAL CODE TO REGULATE UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEMS IN THE CITY OF EVANS**

**WHEREAS**, the City of Evans is a Colorado home rule municipal corporation duly organized and existing under laws of the State of Colorado and the Evans Home Rule Charter; and

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to its home rule authority, the City may exercise any power and perform any function relating to its government and affairs, including the power to regulate for the protection of the public health, safety, and welfare; and

**WHEREAS**, the use of UAS is no longer limited to military and government uses and there is evolving a wide range of civilian, commercial, and recreational uses; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council recognizes there is a strong market growth predicted for the use of UAS by hobbyists for recreational purposes as well as by commercial operators; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council acknowledges that the Federal Aviation Administration (“FAA”) has exclusive sovereignty of navigable airspace of the United States; and

**WHEREAS**, the pursuant to the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2018 the FAA has adopted and updated regulations of UAS within navigable airspace; and

**WHEREAS**, currently, no federal law expressly prohibits or preempts municipalities from establishing laws concerning the recreational use of UAS in a manner that causes nuisance and trespass issues within municipalities’ specific borders; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council has determined that the improper use of unmanned aircraft systems (“UAS”), commonly known as drones, within the City is detrimental to the rights of private property owners and welfare of the inhabitants; and

**WHEREAS**, the improper use of UAS in the City is the cause of nuisances to wildlife, livestock, and domesticated animals; and

**WHEREAS**, City Council finds it necessary to regulate the improper use of recreational UAS by adding to Title 9, which governs public peace, morals and welfare in the City, Chapter 9.29 to regulate the recreational use of UAS in the City of Evans for the limited purpose of preventing the intentional trespass over private property or intentional nuisance to wildlife, livestock and domesticated animals.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EVANS, COLORADO:**

**Section 1.** The foregoing recitals are hereby affirmed and incorporated herein by this reference as findings of the City Council.

**Section 2.** Title 9, Chapter 9.29 of the Evans Municipal Code is hereby by the added to read in its entirety as follows:

**Title 9, Chapter 9.29  
Regulation of Unmanned Aircraft Systems**

Sec. 9.29.010	Purpose and Intent
Sec. 9.29.020	Definitions
Sec. 9.29.030	Prohibited Acts
Sec. 9.29.040	Enforcement and Penalties

**Sec. 9.29.010 Purpose and Intent.**

The purpose of this Chapter is to establish regulations to prohibit certain uses of unmanned aircraft systems operating within the jurisdictional borders of the City of Evans. It is the intent of this Chapter to be interpreted in conformity with any existing or future federal or state laws or regulations that address the operation of unmanned aircraft systems.

**Sec. 9.29.020 Definitions.**

As used in this Chapter, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

*Aircraft* means any contrivance invented, used, or designed to navigate or fly in the air.

*Animal* shall have the same meaning as set forth in Section 6.04.010 of this Code.

*Model aircraft* means an unmanned aircraft that is: (a) capable of sustained flight in the atmosphere; (b) flown within visual line of sight of the person operating the aircraft; and (c) flown for hobby or recreational purposes.

*Operate* means to fly, use, launch, land, employ or navigate an unmanned aircraft system.

*City airspace* means and includes all airspace above the jurisdictional boundaries of the City, to the full extent such airspace can legally be regulated by the City.

*Unmanned aircraft system* or *UAS* means an aircraft, powered aerial vehicle, or other device without a human pilot on board, the flight of which is controlled either autonomously by on board computers or by remote control of a pilot operator on the ground or in another vehicle or aircraft, and all associated equipment and

apparatus. It includes model aircrafts and drones.

**Sec. 9.29.030 Prohibited Acts.**

The following acts are prohibited in the operation of an unmanned aircraft system anywhere in the City or City airspace:

(A) No person shall operate a UAS to endanger or harm the life or property of any person nor shall any person operate a UAS in a reckless or careless manner.

(B) No person shall operate a UAS who is under the influence of alcohol, marijuana, or one (1) or more controlled substances as defined in Article 18 of Title 18 of the Colorado Revised Statutes.

(C) No person shall operate a UAS if he or she knows or has reason to know of any physical or mental condition that would interfere with the safe operation of a UAS, or if he or she knows or has reason to know that UAS equipment is not in proper working order.

(D) No person shall operate a UAS near any person, pedestrians, bicyclists, motorists without the consent of such person, pedestrian, bicyclist, or motorist.

(E) No person shall operate a UAS near any animal in manner that causes movement of the animal.

(F) No person shall knowingly enter, hover, land or otherwise operate an unmanned aircraft system on or over another person's private property without the prior consent of the property owner. Such unauthorized entry onto another's property shall be deemed a trespass.

**Sec. 9.29.040 Enforcement and Penalties.**

Any person who violates any of the provisions of this Chapter shall be punished as provided in Chapter 1.16 of this Code.

**Section 3.** Severability. If any article, section, paragraph, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance is held to be unconstitutional or invalid for any reason such decision shall not affect the validity or constitutionality of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed this ordinance and each part or parts thereof irrespective of the fact that any one part or parts be declared unconstitutional or invalid.

**Section 4.** Repeal. Existing ordinances or parts of ordinances covering the same matters embraced in this ordinance are hereby repealed and all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent

with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed except that this repeal shall not affect or prevent the prosecution or punishment of any person for any act done or committed in violation of any ordinance hereby repealed prior to the effective date of this ordinance.

**Section 5.** This Ordinance, after its passage on final reading, shall be numbered, recorded, published, and posted as required by the City Charter and the adoption, posting, and publication shall be authenticated by the signature of the Mayor and City Clerk, and by the Certificate of Publication. This Ordinance shall become effective upon final passage.

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## ISSUE DESCRIPTION:

City staff continues to gather input from Evans Residents on topics for the Master Plan update. In June, the topic of discussion was water conservation. In July, the topic of conversation is Natural Resources, and then Trails/Transportation will be highlighted in August.

Attached you will find a summary of the June results on water conservation. Each month, you will receive results of the previous month's outreach via email. Results will be posted for the public on the Master Plan page of the City website as well. Throughout the Master Planning process, key findings and results will be presented to City Council, Planning Commission and the Master Plan Steering Committee.

In all, 74 Evans residents responded to the June survey. Key take-aways from the June survey include the following:

- Nearly 77% of respondents were at least somewhat aware of water-related issues in Evans.
- More than 82% of respondents indicated that conserving water is very important to their household and nearly 18% of respondents do not feel as if conserving water is important to their household.
- Most respondents deploy some water conservation techniques at home including drip irrigation systems, drought-tolerant landscaping and installing water conserving appliances.
- Respondents were supportive of various future ideas to conserve water including incentives to help homeowners install water-efficient irrigation systems, supporting conversion of high-water landscapes to water-efficient landscapes, expansion of the City's non-potable system, for example.
- The respondents are concerned about the future price and availability of water.


