### Background & History:

It is proposed that the City adopt an ordinance and policy with respect to granting permits for the purpose of filming by television companies, movie companies, or other media in the City. This ordinance provides guidelines for the issuance, approval, and fees associated with obtaining a film permit from the City. The City has permitted filming for a number of years as a Special Event, however the proposed ordinance will allow for a more streamlined and efficient permitting process.

In September 2020, all filming operations for the City of Forest Park were transferred from the Finance Department to the Economic Development Department. Since then, the Economic Development Department has been focused on improving film permit process to better serve television and film companies.

<u>4.</u> **Discussion to approve surplus vehicle/equipment for auction on Public Surplus** – Public Works Director, Bobby Jinks

### **Background and Summary:**

We have a list of vehicles and equipment that has been sent to the appropriate departments for Director's approval to surplus. The vehicles/equipment has outlasted the life of them, and the cost of repairs will be more the value of the vehicle/equipment. See attached document of the entire list to be surplus.

5. Support for the Restoring Neighborhoods and Strengthening Communities Act - Dr. Cooper, City Manager

### **Background/History:**

The Office Congresswoman Nikema Williams is seeking the support of this City Council for legislation introduced by her called (H.R. 2859) the "Restoring Neighborhoods and Strengthening Communities Act". This legislation is being presented in the Transportation and Infrastructure Committee and seeks to undo the damage of "urban renewal" projects that displaced communities of color after the enactment of the Federal Aid Highway Act.

### 6. Council Discussion on GEMA Grants - Fire & EMA Departments

### Background/History:

In 2018, the EMA Director applied for a grant available through the Georgia Emergency Management Agency and Homeland Security office, named the "State Homeland Security Program" or SHSP for short. The Forest Park Fire & Emergency Services department was awarded a total of \$54,700 for two separate projects. One project, "HazMat", was awarded \$30,500 and the other project, "GSAR", was awarded \$24,200. Prior to the State's approval and being awarded the grant, the department had to specify the exact item(s), quantity needed, and cost of items requested. The items requested are necessary to the safe functioning of our Hazardous Materials Team and Special Operations Response Team (SORT), as most, if not all, the equipment is expired. The grant period for using the funds was previously missed because prior to applying for the Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG) for fiscal year 2020 in March 2021, our department was unaware of its existence. Since its discovery, the EMA office has worked with GEMA to obtain an extension on the awarded projects, with a deadline of July 31st, 2021. Along with the project extension, we have amended the GSAR budget by changing the items previously requested, to items the department's technical rescue team requires for safe operations. As of now, GEMA still considers the City

of Forest Park as a Regional HazMat Team, however until this equipment is obtained, we do not have the proper personal protective equipment or detection tools to safely respond to such an incident. Attached, you will find the original grant applications, signed award letters, cost item details, and GEMA approved project extensions and budget amendment. This grant is 100% reimbursed by the State and will assist the department in obtaining a portion of the necessary and required equipment for safe operations in these areas.

Cost \$54,689 and it was not budget.

Financial Impact: The City will provide initial cost until reimbursement from the State. These Grants are 100% reimbursed by the State. No long-term financial impact to the City.

### 7. Bulletproof Vests Partnership Program - Police Department and Grants Management

### Background/History:

The Bureau of Justice Assistance solicits participation in its bulletproof vests program periodically as funding is available. This BJA program has a 2-year performance period of which police departments purchase vests as needed over this time period and is reimbursed 50% of the cost of each vest, based on the data submitted to the awarding agency. The Forest Park Police Department has been a participant of this program for several years, most recently in 2019.

Cost \$18,625.00 and it was budgeted for.

Financial Impact: If selected to participate in the program, the city would be reimbursed \$9,312.50 or 50% of the cost for 25 vests.



## What are the City's Options?

- 1. Do nothing and continue to cycle of occasional volunteer clean-up and maintenance.
- 2. Take over the cemeteries and maintain/operate.
- 3. Take control of the cemetery, but contract/partner with an entity to manage on behalf of the City.

# Option 1 – Pros and Cons

Pros:

- No up-front cost to the City
- No long-term financial liability or cost

Cons:

- Problem continues to fester
- Periodic one-time cleanup costs
- Community concerns unaddressed

# Option 2 – Pros and Cons

Pros:

- Restoration of an African-American cemetery with history
- Resolution of community concerns
- Beautification of the City

Cons:

- Long-term (forever) financial commitment
- Up front costs (clean-up, condemnation cost, infrastructure)
- Management issues (only if you allow additional interments)

Chapter 72 - Abandoned Cemeteries and Burial Grounds § 36-72-3. Authority of counties and municipalities to preserve abandoned cemeteries

Counties, anywhere within the county boundaries, and municipalities, anywhere within the municipal boundaries, are authorized, jointly and severally, to preserve and protect any abandoned cemetery or any burial ground which the county or municipality determines has been abandoned or is not being maintained by the person who is legally responsible for its upkeep, whether or not that person is financially capable of doing so, to expend public money in connection therewith, to provide for reimbursement of such funds by billing any legally responsible person or levying upon any of his property as authorized by local ordinance, and to exercise the power of eminent domain to acquire any interest in land necessary for that purpose.

### Background & History:

It is proposed that the City adopt an ordinance and policy with respect to granting permits for the purpose of filming by television companies, movie companies, or other media in the City. This ordinance provides guidelines for the issuance, approval, and fees associated with obtaining a film permit from the City. The City has permitted filming for a number of years as a Special Event, however the proposed ordinance will allow for a more streamlined and efficient permitting process.

In September 2020, all filming operations for the City of Forest Park were transferred from the Finance Department to the Economic Development Department. Since then, the Economic Development Department has been focused on improving film permit process to better serve television and film companies.



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### **Application for Film Permit**

To obtain a film permit, please complete this application and submit the application and required application fee to the Film Permits Specialist at least five (5) business days prior to the anticipated prep/shoot date.

Every permit shall require the applicant to obtain and maintain Commercial General Liability insurance with limits not less than \$1,000,000 per person and \$1,000,000 per occurrence covering claims arising from bodily injury, including death and \$1,000,000 per occurrence for property damage alleged to have been caused or contributed to due to the film permit. The insurance policy shall be endorsed to include City of Forest Park as additional insured. The City of Forest Park's City Manager may require increased coverage limits and other types of insurance based upon the nature of the film permit If intending to film on property owned by the City of Forest Park or its authorities, prior authorization to film at the location is required before the permit application can be processed.

### Nonrefundable Application Fee: (Per Event Day)

Up to 500 attendees -\$50.00 501-2500 attendees - \$100.00 2501 and above - \$175.00

**Note:** This is an application **ONLY** and does not serve as permission to conduct special activity on City of Forest Park property or within city limits. The information provided will be used to determine whether a permit will be issued and if any revisions to your proposal will be required.

This application must be signed by the responsible person/party\* and returned to City of Forest Park for approval. If your request is approved, a permit containing applicable terms and conditions will be sent to the person designated on the application.

\*Responsible party is defined as the person/company who is legally authorized to bind insurance coverage for this film project

### **ORDINANCE NO.**

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR A FILM ORDINANCE FOR THE CITY OF FOREST PARK; TO PROVIDE FOR SEVERABILITY; TO REPEAL CONFLICTING ORDINANCES; TO PROVIDE AN EFFECTIVE DATE; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

WHEREAS, the governing authority of the City of Forest Park is the Mayor and Council thereof;

**WHEREAS**, the governing authority of the City of Forest Park, Georgia desires to adopt a film ordinance for the City; and,

**WHEREAS**, the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of Forest Park, Georgia, will be positively impacted by the adoption of this Ordinance.

NOW THEREFORE, THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FOREST PARK HEREBY ORDAINS:

<u>Section 1.</u> That Title 9 of the Code of Ordinances, City of Forest Park, Georgia is hereby amended by creating new Chapter 16 attached hereto as Exhibit A.

Section 2. The film locations and fee schedules shown on Exhibit B, Exhibit C and Exhibit D attached hereto are hereby approved.

<u>Section 3.</u> The preamble of this Ordinance shall be considered to be and is hereby incorporated by reference as if fully set out herein.

<u>Section 4.</u> (a) It is hereby declared to be the intention of the Mayor and Council that all sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses and phrases of this Ordinance are or were, upon their enactment, believed by the Mayor and Council to be fully valid, enforceable and constitutional.

(b) It is hereby declared to be the intention of the Mayor and Council that, to the greatest extent allowed by law, each and every section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is severable from every other section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance. It is hereby further declared to be the intention of the Mayor and Council that, to the greatest extent allowed by law, no section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is mutually dependent upon any other section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance.

(c) In the event that any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or section of this Ordinance shall, for any reason whatsoever, be declared invalid, unconstitutional or otherwise unenforceable by the valid judgment or decree of any court of competent jurisdiction, it is the express intent of the Mayor and Council that such invalidity, unconstitutionality or unenforceability shall, to the greatest extent allowed by law, not render invalid, unconstitutional or otherwise unenforceable any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs or sections of the Ordinance and that, to the greatest extent allowed by law, all remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs and sections of the Ordinance shall remain valid, constitutional, enforceable, and of full force and effect.

Section 5. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed.

<u>Section 6.</u> Penalties in effect for violations of the City of Forest Park at the time of the effective date of this Ordinance shall be and are hereby made applicable to this Ordinance and shall remain in full force and effect.

<u>Section 7.</u> The effective date of this Ordinance shall be the date of its enactment.

### **EXHIBIT** A

#### **Chapter 16 - Forest Park Film Ordinance**

#### Section 9-16-1. - Purpose.

The purpose of this ordinance is to provide guidelines for the issuance, approval, and fees associated with the granting of permits for filming by television companies, movie companies, or other media in the city.

#### Section 9-16-2. - Permit required.

- (A) A film permit shall be obtained by any person working on behalf of television companies, movie companies, nonprofit or educational organization, or other media, company filming on city-owned property. For purposes of this ordinance, "city-owned property" includes, but is not limited to parks, streets, alleys, sidewalks, rights-of-way, vacant lots, or buildings owned by the City or any governmental entity operating on behalf of or for the benefit of the City. Any person or organization planning a filming shoot on private property which could impact public safety and/or disrupt city business is required to obtain a film permit. Failure to obtain a film permit shall be a violation of this section. Each day a film permit is not obtained shall be a separate violation.
- (B) Any person or filming for the purpose of spontaneous, unplanned news reporting by journalists, reporters, photographers, or camera operators shall not be required to obtain a permit.

#### Section 9-16-3. - Procedure for issuance of permits.

(A) Application.

- 1. Applicant must request permission to use city-owned property for a film production prior to submission of the application.
- 2. An application for a film permit must be submitted 5 business days prior to production. If a permit is requested within less than 5 business days of production, the application will incur an expedition fee. However, if the timeframe for which the film permit is needed is not deemed reasonable by the city for processing, the City of Forest Park reserves the right to reject an application for a film permit immediately upon receipt. Road closure and traffic plan requests shall be included with the application and will be routed through the Police Department prior to City Manager approval. Road closure requests shall be submitted without change no less than 10 days in advance of date of closure.
- 3. An application for a film permit shall be accompanied by a copy of a certificate of liability insurance for the person, company, organization, or agency filming, with at least \$1,000,000 of coverage. The certificate of liability shall list the "City of Forest Park" as an additional insured. If requesting to film on property owned by the Development Authority of the City of Forest Park, Downtown Development Authority of the City of Forest Park, or Urban Redevelopment Agency of the City of Forest Park, the applicable entity must also be listed as an additional insured.
- 4. Upon request by the administrator, a copy of the portion of the script of the scene that will be filmed on city-owned property shall be included with the film permit application.

- 5. The applicant shall include in the application evidence that it has notified and, if necessary, negotiated reasonable impact fees with all potentially impacted businesses and residents.
- (B) *Application review.* 
  - The Economic Development Department or a designee will coordinate with all necessary department heads including the Forest Park Police and Fire and Emergency Services in a joint effort to determine if a film permit should be approved or denied.
  - 2. The city reserves the right to deny a film permit based on the expected disruption to business/operations in the area and in cases deemed to be detrimental to the city's best interests. The city further reserves the right to deny a film permit based on the script of the scene to be filmed on city-owned property.
  - 3. The City Manager and all affected departments shall determine whether a film permit should be approved or denied.
  - 4. The Economic Development Department or a designee will contact the requesting party or their agent to communicate the outcome of their application.
- (C) Public Safety & Public Works
  - 1. On-site security is required for all filming projects. Off-Duty City of Forest Park police officers may be hired and compensated at a minimum of 4 hours per day. If planning to utilize a private security firm or off-duty officers from another jurisdiction, the applicant must provide contact information for the security personnel.

- 2. Removal, cutting or trimming of vegetation in the public right-of-way is prohibited unless specifically approved by the permit.
- 3. No film activity which involves the use of explosives, pyrotechnics, fire, smokemaking machines, or other special effects may be undertaken unless specifically approved by the City of Forest Park Fire Department.
- Tents or temporary membrane structures require an inspection by the City of Forest Park Fire Marshal. Please refer to the fee schedule for tent or temporary membrane structure fees.
- 5. Emergency vehicle access shall be maintained at all times. Productions with stunts being performed are required to have a private medic or EMT on-site. The applicant must provide contact information for emergency medical personnel.
- 6. The City of Forest Park Fire Marshal shall have full access to any film production to ensure safety for crew members, the public, and surrounding properties.
- (D) Permit Issuance
  - 1. If permission is granted by the City, a written permit will be issued including time, date, and location of filming and acceptable activities within the scope of the permit.
  - 2. The producer and/or applicant that receives a permit is considered the "responsible party" and is responsible for knowing and complying with this ordinance and all other laws, including other ordinances and regulations that establish prerequisites, authorizations, and other required permissions applicable to the filming.
  - 3. Upon receipt of the permit, the production company must notify affected businesses and property owners within 500 feet of production.

- 4. The City shall require the production company to have the permit on site at all times.
- 5. Any producer that performs filming without receiving a permit, violates the material terms of a permit, or is otherwise in violation of this ordinance, shall be subject to the provisions of Section 1-1-8 the Code of Ordinances, City of Forest Park, Georgia.
- (E) Film Production Wrap Up

Upon completion of work, all materials and debris shall be entirely removed. The property and the right-of-way shall be left in the same condition it was in immediately prior to filming. Any costs for clean-up by the City will be charged to the permit holder who will be invoiced by the City for such costs. Invoices for such costs must be paid in full within thirty (30) days from the date of issuance by the City.

- (F) Content
  - 1. The City of Forest Park logo, its buildings, or the name the City may not be included in the film or its marketing and advertising without written permission.
  - 2. Where permitted filming includes advertising signs or other displays of commercial speech, the signs and/or displays must be removed upon the expiration of the permit.
  - 3. The film project and its content, whether whole or in-part, shall not contain any obscene, profane, or otherwise objectionable content that would poorly reflect on any locations in which it is filmed namely within the City of Forest Park and/or deter from the locations vision to serve its residents, citizens, visitors, and businesses in a professional and ethically sound manner.

#### (G) Indemnification

- 1. The producer must sign an indemnification provision on the permit whereby the producer agrees to indemnify the City and its officials and employees from all claims, losses and expenses, including attorneys' fees and costs, that may arise from the permit and any of the activities performed pursuant to the permit by, on behalf of, or at the direction of the producer, except to the extent that claims, losses and/or expenses are caused by the gross negligence or intentional misconduct of the City, its officials and or employees.
- 2. For use of properties owned by the Development Authority of the City of Forest Park, Downtown Development Authority of the City of Forest Park, or Urban Redevelopment Agency of the City of Forest Park, an indemnification provision must be signed by the producer whereby the producer agrees to indemnify the applicable entity and its officials from all claims, losses and expenses, including attorneys' fees and costs, that may arise from the permit and any of the activities performed pursuant to the permit by, on behalf of, or at the direction of the producer, except to the extent that claims, losses and/or expenses are caused by the gross negligence or intentional misconduct of that authority, and its officials.
- (H) Records retention. At the conclusion of the application process and granting of a film permit. A copy of the approved permit, along with any supporting documentation, shall be kept on file in the Economic Development office for one year after the expiration of the permit. Electronic copies of these documents shall be archived.
- Permit & Location Fees. The fee schedule for obtaining a permit and filming on cityowned property shall be maintained on file with the Department of Economic Development. This schedule may be adjusted from time-to-time by resolution of the City

Council. Fees related to special requests (e.g., making drastic changes to a facility or use of city-owned equipment as props) shall be determined by the Department of Economic Development. All revenues from permit and location fees shall be added to the general fund.

## H.R. 2859: Restoring Neighborhoods and Strengthening Communities Act

After the enactment of the Federal Aid Highway Act in 1956, many city planners built highways through the middle of cities to connect White families that were moving to the suburbs with the downtown of cities. Unfortunately, many of these urban renewal projects were intentionally chosen to segregate and displace people of color.

**Summary:** This bill would reconnect impacted neighborhoods, reduce climate pollution by increasing access to modes of transportation like biking and walking, create more open spaces and improve the air quality and health outcomes for residents. Specifically, the bill would:

- Establish the Restoring Neighborhoods and Strengthening Communities Program at the Department of Transportation that will help communities identify infrastructural barriers within the community that have created obstacles for mobility and economic development.
- Allow the Secretary to award grants to redesign or deconstruct the outdated infrastructure that has hindered the growth of low-income and minority communities. The Secretary shall award the following grants under the program:
  - Community Engagement, Education, and Capacity Building Grants.
  - Planning and Feasibility Study Grants.
  - Capitol Construction Grants.
- Establish community land trusts to help generate wealth for the communities that already reside in these neighborhoods.
- Update federal transportation modeling tools so that decision-makers and communities can see how these infrastructure projects really impact traffic patterns today.
- Require the Secretary to conduct a study and issue a report to Congress identifying the communities with infrastructure barriers, measuring the degree of harm to that community.
- Authorize \$15 billion to carry out the program and require that at least 40 percent of the funds are directed towards environmental justice communities.

#### 6. Council Discussion on GEMA Grants - Fire & EMA Departments

**Background/History:** In 2018, the EMA Director applied for a grant available through the Georgia Emergency Management Agency and Homeland Security office, named the "State Homeland Security Program" or SHSP for short. The Forest Park Fire & Emergency Services department was awarded a total of \$54,700 for two separate projects. One project, "HazMat", was awarded \$30,500 and the other project, "GSAR", was awarded \$24,200. Prior to the State's approval and being awarded the grant, the department had to specify the exact item(s), quantity needed, and cost of items requested. The items requested are necessary to the safe functioning of our Hazardous Materials Team and Special Operations Response Team (SORT), as most, if not all, the equipment is expired. The grant period for using the funds was previously missed because prior to applying for the Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG) for fiscal year 2020 in March 2021, our department was unaware of its existence. Since its discovery, the EMA office has worked with GEMA to obtain an extension on the awarded projects, with a deadline of July 31st, 2021. Along with the project extension, we have amended the GSAR budget by changing the items previously requested, to items the department's technical rescue team requires for safe operations. As of now, GEMA still considers the City of Forest Park as a Regional HazMat Team, however until this equipment is obtained, we do not have the proper personal protective equipment or detection tools to safely respond to such an incident. Attached, you will find the original grant applications, signed award letters, cost item details, and GEMA approved project extensions and budget amendment. This grant is 100% reimbursed by the State and will assist the department in obtaining a portion of the necessary and required equipment for safe operations in these areas.

Cost \$54,689 and it was not budget.

Financial Impact: The City will provide initial cost until reimbursement from the State. These Grants are 100% reimbursed by the State. No long-term financial impact to the City.

Any modification to the Budget Worksheet must be requested in writing by the Subrecipient and must be approved by the Program Manager prior to the execution of that modification.

Any modification to the Budget Worksheet must be requested in writing by the Subrecipient and must be approved by the Program Manager prior to the execution of that modification.

- **D.** Non-Availability of Funding: Notwithstanding any other provision of this agreement, in the event that either of the sources of funding for reimbursement under this agreement (appropriations from the General Assembly of the State of Georgia or the Congress of the United States of America) no longer exist, in the event the sum of all obligations of GEMA/HS incurred under this and all other agreements entered into for this program exceeds the balance of such funding, then this agreement shall immediately terminate without further obligation of GEMA/HS. The certification by the Director of GEMA/HS of the occurrence of either of the events stated above shall be conclusive.
