My name is Cynthia Duncan, and I am a resident as well as a member of the GV skateboarding community. Although I am a novice skateboarder, my husband, Rocky, is quite proficient. He helped build our skate park and taught his younger brother and nephew how to skate there. Currently, I'm focused on learning to roll in the bowls at our existing park. However, the proposed new design will severely hinder my progress, and the progress of others who are developing their skills.

Beyond the challenges for less experienced skaters, I also have serious safety concerns. The new design is far too small, significantly increasing the risk of collisions. This is a major issue that impacts everyone, regardless of their skill level.

In June 2024, my husband, Rocky, and I took action. We started a petition to preserve and enhance the GV skatepark, with the core principle that this should be done *without* closing it. Around the same time, I reached out to the GV City Council to voice these concerns directly. I was informed by the city manager that, due to the park's foundation, demolition was already underway, and the contract with Grindline was in progress. Initially, while I was actively promoting the petition, some members of our community were hesitant. They believed, based on hearsay, that they would be getting a better park. There was also a sense of powerlessness, a feeling that they couldn't change the direction of this project. It wasn't until people realized their voices were unheard that they began to sign the petition seriously.

I want to address the fact that I did not attend the initial meetings. At that time, I was working the graveyard shift as a registered nurse. I have since transitioned to the swing shift, and have been able to switch days to make myself available to attend these important meetings and advocate for our community.

The skateboarding community is deeply invested in preserving our skatepark. This passion has led to the formation of a new nonprofit organization: The Skatepark Coalition. This coalition is supported by over 1,700 petition signatories, all of whom are committed to fighting for our park. The GV Skatepark Coalition has also launched a GoFundMe campaign to help offset any additional costs that may arise from pursuing a dual park approach. We are not simply complaining; we are actively working towards a solution.

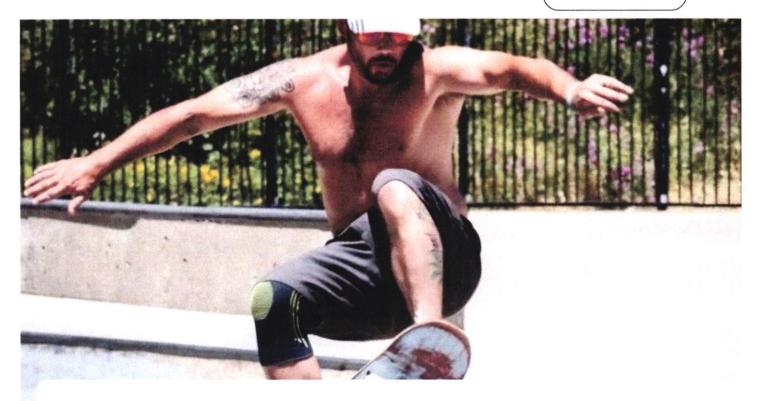
Therefore, I stand before you today to ask you to reconsider this plan. I urge you not to tear down our beloved skatepark to replace it with a smaller, less functional one. This plan does not serve the best interests of the community as a whole. We know we can do better. We *must* do better. Thank you."

The Issue

I Rocky Duncan have spent a major part of my life at the Grass Valley Skate Park. Even before it officially opened, I was there, dedicating countless hours to shaping not only my love for skateboarding, but also to the building and improvement of this park. This park is more than concrete, ramps, and rails to the skateboarding community. It serves as a second home to us, a sanctuary giving us peace and reprieve. It's the lifeblood of the skateboarding community in Grass Valley, California.

The proposed destruction of the existing park as part of new construction plans would drastically impact our lives. It's not just about the inconvenience of closing the park for the duration of the construction process - it's about preservation. Additionally, agreed-upon repairs, such as fixing the cracked cement, the fence, and the water fountain, should be upheld to maintain the safe use of the park. Future enhancements including the addition of lights and bathrooms would also greatly benefit the users.

The skate park represents the heartbeat of the vibrant and active skateboarding community in Grass Valley. It is a testament to the resilience, creativity, and passion of us skateboarders, and it is as much a part of our stories as we are of its. Preserve the Grass Valley Skate Park and enable us to continue creating memories, sharing experiences, and furthering the culture of skateboarding in our beloved city.

Dear Grass Valley City Council,

I would like to begin by thanking you for considering the skateboarders in this community.

With that being said, I am here to speak in regards to the new skate park that is to be built in place of the existing one. Over 400 people have signed a petition asking for the city of Grass Valley to preserve and enhance the skatepark - signifying that many members of this skate community do not agree with or like the changes that are to come.

I, along with hundreds of other community members, believe that there should be at minimum, another community discussion regarding the future of the skatepark. As someone who skates the park almost daily and as someone who came to the three community meetings that were held last year, I can attest to the fact that the amount of people who were able to attend them did not accurately represent the number of skaters that are in this community.

Things could have been done to make these meetings and people's voices more accessible. First off, there could have been more than three meetings considering the fact that many youth and adults will be displaced by this change. There also could have been a vote regarding what the new park would look like. What I mean by this is that Grindline could have taken community input through in person discussions or online surveys (multiple), and then created at least two different renderings for the community to discuss and vote on.

Ground has not been broken - They could still do something like this. I feel that something such as this would help this community to feel more at ease with the changes that are to come. I, along with the 400+ people who have signed the petition, are asking that the city at least hold another community discussion with a community survey that could be distributed either online or on paper, to determine what the best possible outcome for our future park is. Much of this community is not happy with the design of the new skatepark. By holding another meeting and potentially a vote, the city would be helping this community to feel like they do have a voice and a part in determining the future of their skatepark.

On another note, The new skatepark that is to come is not only supposed to be significantly smaller than the existing one, but it is also significantly limited in terms of opportunities for growth. As someone who works with youth in this community, I believe that we should not only be expanding the physical recreation areas that youth use, but that we should also be enhancing them.

If this city must demolish and rebuild the skatepark, then we should be considering how to make the new one better and more opportunistic for youth. We should be looking at how to expand upon what's in place, even if the whole thing is to be new. We as a community, and you as a city, should not be limiting the opportunities of

skating youth but making them bigger and better, especially in a time where skateboarding is more popular than ever.

The current park is about 21 thousand square feet and gets filled to capacity on any given day. A smaller park will inevitably call for more collisions between riders and potential serious injuries, which could be a liability for the city. If this is occurring, less youth and adults alike will want to skate here. Again, we should be expanding and enhancing opportunities. It doesn't make sense to build something that will limit them.

In regards to the cracks within the current skate park that have been deemed 'hazardous' - these are much less hazardous than the increased potential of collisions and serious injuries that are to come with a smaller skatepark. Also, all skateparks have imperfections such as these. If these cracks are truly hazardous, there should be other sources saying so. This could be a third party who has nothing to do with Grass Valley or the building process in this city, who is asked to come and evaluate our current park. This would eliminate any bias that may have arisen during the evaluation process.

Lastly, while in the meetings last year, it was said that the gravel lot above the skatepark would be paved and available for the skating community to set up ramps and other obstacles. However, that lot has not been paved. Is this still supposed to happen? If so, when? Construction on the skatepark is said to start on the 28th and many skaters will be displaced by this if there is not a substitute place to skate.

Thank you for your time. I hope that you will consider this skateboarding community and the large changes that are to come to it. Overall, I hope that you, Grass Valley City Council, will allow this community to have another discussion and be heard one more time.

The Grass Valley Skatepark Coalition requests immediate halt to skatepark demolition.

Grass Valley, Ca., May 10, 2025 – Grass Valley Skatepark Coalition (GVSC) pursues cooperation with the City of Grass Valley, Grindline, and Nevada County Skate to advocate for the most efficient use of grant funding to create additional facilities for the skatepark community.

The GVSC represents a significant portion of the skatepark community who support a dual-park approach: building a new Grindline skatepark, while simultaneously repairing and preserving the existing skatepark. The GVSC is in early talks with the City of Grass Valley and Grindline advocating that the proposed demolition of the existing skatepark, on May 19, 2025, be halted immediately on behalf of over 1,600 signatories between two petitions.

Those petitions request that the dual-park approach be pursued, that the contract with Grindline be amended to place the new park adjacent to the existing one, and that construction of the new park be completed in the summer of 2026.

Demolishing the existing skatepark to replace it with a skatepark that's over 7000 sq. ft. smaller greatly reduces available skateable space in our community. That reduction conflicts with the notion of this new park being a destination skatepark, because it severely limits the number of participants who can safely access it.

Preparation to build the new skatepark on the land adjacent to the existing skatepark is projected to cost an estimated additional \$80k, but will be offset the \$60k saved by avoiding demolition costs – in addition to saving the existing facility.

It's the GVSC's firmly held belief that it is not in the public's best interest to spend grant funding to destroy existing infrastructure, and that funding would better serve the community by expanding the footprint of skatable space for all to enjoy for generations to come.

GVSC is committed to collaborating with all parties for the best possible collective outcome for the community, and the local economy, while maintaining fiscal responsibility by generating the greatest possible impact from the funding available.

<u>Background Information</u>: Grass Valley City Hall has two sets of exterior stairs that require repair. One staircase provides access to the break room at the rear of the building. The second staircase allows access to and from the City Hall upper and lower parking lots. The stairs are constructed using concrete treads and landings supported by metal pans underneath. The metal pan supports are deteriorating due to water intrusion resulting in significant rusting. Additionally, the nosing on the concrete treads is brittle and crumbling. Left unaddressed, the stairs will become a hazard and require closure, resulting in the loss of a building egress point and travel route for the public.

Staff recently solicited several contractors to inspect the stairs and provide recommendations for repair. A bid from Lester Enterprises Northstate, LLC was identified to provide the most cost effective solution and will modify the design to avoid future water intrusion issues. The contractor will remove the existing concrete and metal pans and fabricate and install steel and diamond plate treads allowing for proper drainage. The contractor will utilize the existing steel stringers, post, balusters and handrails in the repair.

<u>Council Goals/Objectives</u>: Repair of City Hall exterior stairs fulfill Public Safety objectives outlined in the adopted Grass Valley Strategic Plan.

INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR SERVICES AGREEMENT

This agreement is entered into by and between the City of Grass Valley ("City") and Lester Enterprises Northstate, Inc ("Contractor").

- 1. Contractor represents that he or she is fully qualified to perform the requested services and is willing to accept responsibility for performing such services in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in this agreement.
- The services to be performed are described as follows: Repair two sets of exterior stairs at Grass Valley City Hall. Demo existing concrete treads and landings. Fabricate and install steel diamond plate treads and landings.
- 3. Contractor's compensation shall be \$48,476 plus authorized incurred expenses. In no event shall the total payment for services and expenses under this Agreement exceed \$50,899.80.
- 4. The agreement commences 5/14/25 and expires 9/14/2025 unless City terminates the agreement earlier. No cause or notice is required to terminate this agreement.
- Contractor shall provide only the services described herein. Any change in the services of Contractor requires an express amendment to the agreement signed by Contractor and City.
- 6. Contractor shall perform the requested services in a safe and professional manner. In performing this agreement, Contractor shall comply with all City, county, state, or federal laws, rules, regulations, policies, or ordinances, including, but not limited to, any that pertains to workplace safety, grooming and professionalism, and the prohibition of discrimination, harassment, workplace violence, or misuse of City property.
- 7. Contractor is, and shall at all times remain as to City, a wholly independent contractor. Contractor shall have no power to incur any debt, obligation, or liability on behalf of City or otherwise act as agent on behalf of City. City and its agents shall have no control over the conduct of Contractor except as set forth in this agreement. Contractor shall not represent that he or she is in any manner an employee of City. Any business cards issued to contractor are for the purpose of identification only.
- 8. All data, documents, discussion, or other information developed or received by Contractor or provided for performance of this agreement are deemed confidential and shall not be disclosed by Contractor without City's prior written consent. City shall grant such consent if disclosure is legally required. Upon request, all City data shall be returned to City upon the termination or expiration of the agreement.
- 9. To the fullest extent permitted by law, Contractor shall indemnify, hold harmless, and defend City, its officers, agents, employees, and volunteers, from and against any and all claims, losses, costs, and expenses due to the death or injury to any person and injury to any property which actually or allegedly arise out of or are in connection with any intentional, reckless,

negligent, or otherwise wrongful acts, errors, or omissions in the performance of land-agreement by Contractor, any subcontractor, anyone directly or indirectly employed by any of them or anyone for whose acts any of them may be liable, except where caused by active negligence, sole negligence, or willful misconduct of City, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers. Such costs and expenses include reasonable attorney's fees incurred by counsel of City's choice.

The provisions of this indemnity provision are intended by the parties to be interpreted and construed to provide City with the fullest protection possible under the law. Contractor acknowledges that City would not enter into this agreement in the absence of Contractor's commitment to indemnify and protect City as set forth herein.

- 10. Contractor shall maintain insurance as required in Attachment A. These are minimum insurance required and do not in any way represent or imply that such coverage is sufficient to adequately cover the Contractor's liability under this agreement. The full coverage and limits afforded under Contractor's policies of Insurance shall be available to City and these Insurance Requirements shall not in any way act to reduce coverage that is broader or includes higher limits than those required. The Insurance obligations under this agreement shall be: 1—all the Insurance coverage and limits carried by or available to the Contractor; or 2—the minimum Insurance requirements shown in this agreement, whichever is greater. Any insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits and coverage required, which are applicable to a given loss, shall be available to City.
- 11. Contractor shall obtain, at its sole cost and expense, all permits and regulatory approvals necessary in the performance of this agreement.

Attachment A, Contract Insurance Requirements

Contractor shall procure and maintain for the duration of the contract, and for one year thereafter, insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder by the Contractor, his agents, representatives, employees, or subcontractors.

MINIMUM SCOPE AND LIMIT OF INSURANCE

Coverage shall be at least as broad as:

- 1. Commercial General Liability (CGL): Insurance Services Office (ISO) Form CG 00 01 covering CGL on an "occurrence" basis, including products and completed operations, property damage, bodily injury and personal & advertising injury with limits no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence. If a general aggregate limit applies, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to this project/location (ISO CG 25 03 or 25 04) or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit.
- 2. Automobile Liability: Insurance Services Office Form CA 0001 covering Code 1 (any auto), with limits no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- 3. Workers' Compensation insurance as required by the State of California, with Statutory Limits, and Employers' Liability insurance with a limit of no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease.

Self-Insured Retentions

Self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the City. At the option of the City, either: the contractor shall cause the insurer shall to reduce or eliminate such self-insured retentions as respects the City, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers; or the Contractor shall provide a financial guarantee satisfactory to the City guaranteeing payment of losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses. The policy language shall provide, or be endorsed to provide, that the self-insured retention may be satisfied by either the named insured or City.

Other Insurance Provisions:

Additional Insured

The City, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers are to be covered as additional insureds on the CGL policy with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of the Contractor including materials, parts, or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations and automobiles owned, leased, hired, or borrowed by or on behalf of the Contractor. General liability coverage can be provided in the form of an endorsement to the Contractor's insurance (at least as broad as ISO Form CG 20 10 11 85 or both CG 20 10, CG 20 26, CG 20 33, or CG 20 38; and CG 20 37 forms if later revisions used).]

Primary Insurance

For any claims related to this project, the Contractor's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance coverage at least as broad as ISO CG 20 01 04 13 as respects the City, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the City, its officers, officials, employees, or volunteers shall be excess of the Contractor's insurance and shall not contribute with it.

Notice of Cancellation

Contractor shall provide immediate written notice if (1) any of the required insurance policies is terminated; (2) the limits of any of the required polices are reduced; (3) or the deductible or self-insured retention is increased. In the event of any cancellation or reduction in coverage or limits of any insurance, Contractor shall forthwith obtain and submit proof of substitute insurance.

Acceptability of Insurers

Insurance is to be placed with insurers authorized to conduct business in the state with a current A.M. Best rating of no less than A: VII, unless otherwise acceptable to the Entity.

Waiver of Subrogation

Contractor hereby agrees to waive rights of subrogation which any insurer of Contractor may acquire from Contractor by virtue of the payment of any loss. Contractor agrees to obtain any endorsement that may be necessary to affect this waiver of subrogation. The Workers' Compensation policy shall be endorsed with a waiver of subrogation in favor of the Entity for all work performed by the Contractor, its employees, agents and subcontractors.

Verification of Coverage

Contractor shall furnish the City with original Certificates of Insurance including all required amendatory endorsements (or copies of the applicable policy language effecting coverage required by this clause) and a copy of the Declarations and Endorsement Page of the CGL policy listing all policy endorsements to City before work begins. However, failure to obtain the required documents prior to the work beginning shall not waive the Contractor's obligation to provide them. The City reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements, required by these specifications, at any time.

Subcontractors

Contractor shall require and verify that all subcontractors maintain insurance meeting all the requirements stated herein, and Contractor shall ensure that City is an additional insured on insurance required from subcontractors. For CGL coverage subcontractors shall provide coverage with a form at least as broad as CG 20 38 04 13.

Special Risks or Circumstances

Entity reserves the right to modify these requirements, including limits, based on the nature of the risk, prior experience, insurer, coverage, or other circumstances.

Background Information:

On March 11, 2025, the City Council received a detailed report and presentation regarding the new LRA Fire Hazard Severity Zone maps prepared by the Office of the State Fire Marshal (OSFM). The City actively sought and incorporated public feedback through its website, emails, and in-person comments during the City Council meeting.

On May 13th the Council held the first hearing of Ordinance 835 with no additional public comment noted.

Ordinance 835 adopts the LRA Fire Hazard Severity Zone maps in alignment with requirements for local agencies and will be submitted to the Board of Forestry and Fire Protection.

This report outlines the requirements established under existing state law regarding the designation of fire hazard severity zones in LRA as mandated by OSFM.

According to Government Code Sections 51177 to 51179, the OSFM must prepare, and release recommended maps delineating fire hazard severity zones. Local agencies within the designated areas are obligated to follow specific procedures to ensure

compliance and public involvement.

Requirements for Local Agencies

Upon receiving the recommended maps, local agencies must undertake the following actions:

• Public Review and Comment (Within 30 Days)

Local agencies are required to make the recommended maps available for public review and comment within 30 days of receipt. This ensures that community members have an opportunity to engage with and provide feedback on the fire hazard severity designations.

- Adoption of Recommended Maps (Within 120 Days)
- Local agencies must adopt the recommended fire hazard severity map by local ordinance within 120 days. This process formalizes the designation and allows local governance to address fire safety measures appropriately.
 - Submission of Documents (Within 30 Days of Adoption)

Following the adoption of the ordinance, local agencies must submit the ordinance and any other required documentation to the Board of Forestry and Fire Protection within 30 days. This step is essential for maintaining state oversight and ensuring compliance with fire safety regulations.

Limitations on Fire Hazard Severity Designations

It is crucial to note that local agencies may only increase the level of fire hazard severity as identified by the OSFM. They are prohibited from decreasing the severity level in any designated area.

Criteria for Designation

The OSFM categorizes areas into moderate, high, and very high fire hazard severity zones based on several factors, including:

- Fuel loading
- Slope
- Fire weather conditions
- Wind patterns identified as significant contributors to wildfire spread

The updated fire hazard severity zone mapping significantly expands the areas designated as high and very high fire hazard severity zones within the City compared to the 2008 mapping. Additionally, new areas have been identified and classified as high and moderate severity zones. These updates reflect changes in risk assessment due to factors such as evolving wildfire behavior, climate conditions, and urban growth.

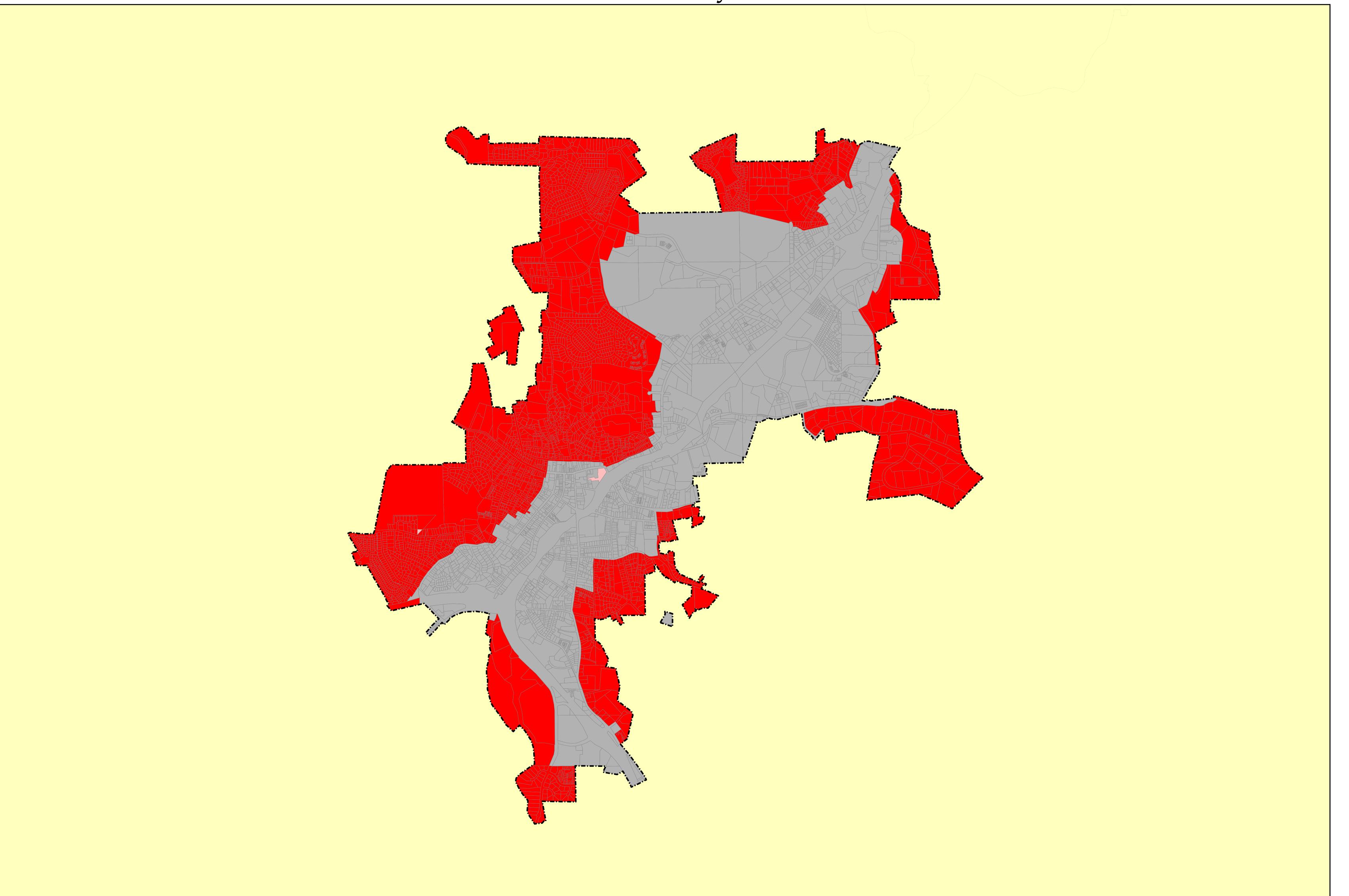

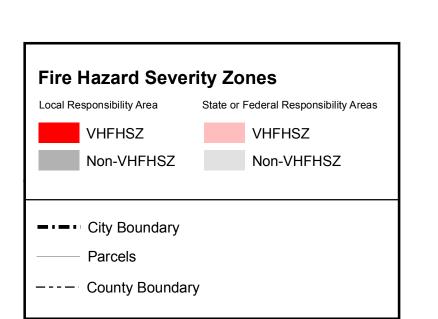

Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones in LRA As Recommended by CAL FIRE





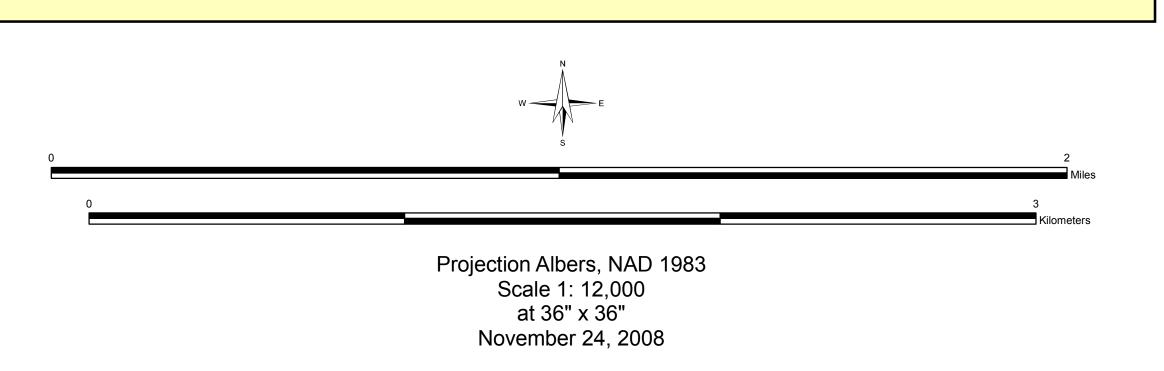
Government Code 51175-89 directs the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CAL FIRE) to identify areas of very high fire hazard severity zones within Local Responsibility Areas (LRA). Mapping of the areas, referred to as Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones (VHFHSZ), is based on data and models of, **potential** fuels over a 30-50 year time horizon and their associated expected fire behavior, and expected burn probabilities to quantify the likelihood and nature of vegetation fire exposure (including firebrands) to buildings. Details on the project and specific modeling methodology can be found at http://frap.cdf.ca.gov/projects/hazard/methods.htm. Local Responsibility Area VHFHSZ maps were initially developed in the mid-1990s and are now being updated based on improved science, mapping techniques, and data.

In late 2005 to be effective in 2008, the California Building Commission adopted California Building Code Chapter 7A requiring new buildings in VH FHSZs to use ignition resistant construction methods and materials. These new codes include provisions to improve the ignition resistance of buildings, especially from firebrands. The updated very high fire hazard severity zones will be used by building officials for new building permits in LRA. The updated zones will also be used to identify property whose owners must comply with natural hazards disclosure requirements at time of property sale and 100 foot defensible space clearance. It is likely that the fire hazard severity zones will be used for updates to

the safety element of general plans.

This specific map is based on a geographic information system dataset that depicts final CAL FIRE recommendations for Very High FHSZs within the local jurisdiction. The process of finalizing these boundaries involved an extensive local review process, the details of which are available at http://frap.cdf.ca.gov/projects/hazard/btnet/ (click on "Continue as guest without logging in"). Local government has 120 days to designate, by ordinance, very high fire hazard severity zones within its jurisdiction after receiving the recommendation. Local government can add additional VHFHSZs. There is no requirement for local government to report their final action to CAL FIRE when the recommended zones are adopted. Consequently, users are directed to the appropriate local entity (county, city, fire department, or Fire Protection District) to determine the status of the local fire hazard severity zone ordinance.

This map was developed using data products such as parcel and city boundaries provided by local government agencies. In certain cases, this includes copyrighted geographic information. The maps are for display purposes only - questions and requests related to parcel or city boundary data should be directed to the appropriate local government entity.

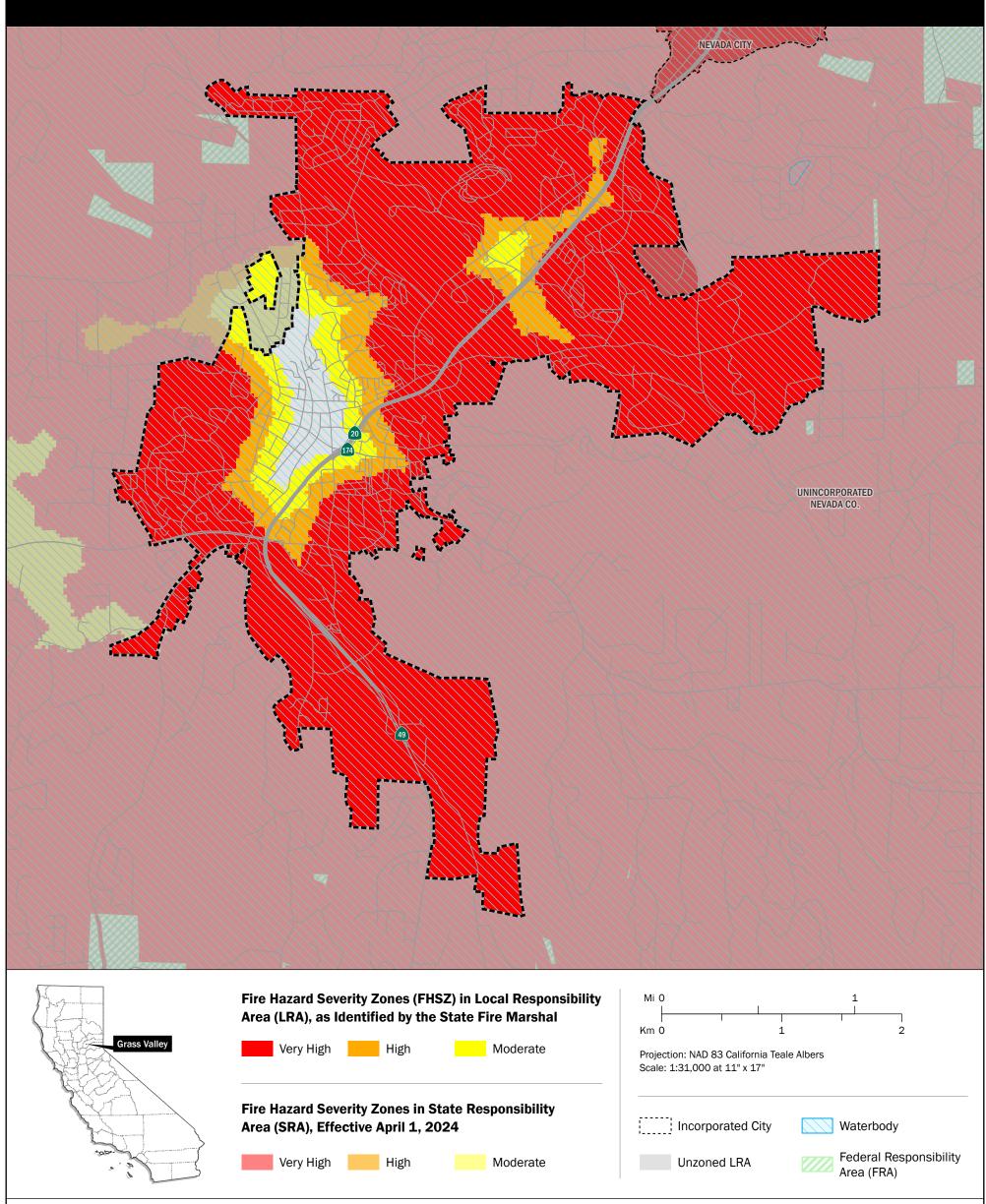

Background Information:

The downtown landscape in the location of the Highway 49 underpass, at the intersections of South Auburn and Neal Streets, is visually appealing from multiple directions; however, the industrial appearance of the overpass in that area isn't consistent with downtown's charm. Staff examined how this could be addressed and identified that the overpass and its abutments are an ideal location for a "Transportation Art" project. Police Department staff spearheaded the idea and solicited mural concepts for the overpass abutments from local artists.

At their November 12, 2024 regular meeting, City Council directed staff to proceed with the process of a transportation art project application and directed staff to put the renderings and application through the City's mural process.

Project Description:

This art project seeks to have murals painted on the overpass abutments and, in some areas, the underside of the Hwy 49 overpass. Each abutment would be painted by a different artist, each of whom is a local artist who resides and works in western Nevada County. Details of the proposed art can be found in the attached document, along with a bio of each artist.

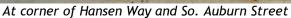
Caltrans Regulatory framework: The Caltrans Art Program includes the following guidelines to ensure safety and function:

- Must celebrate community identity,
- Must be scaled appropriately, and allow safe maintenance per Caltrans rules.
- Cannot include text, mimic traffic devices or use reflective/glaring finishes.
- Cannot include moving elements, simulated motion, or symbols like flags and logos (beyond limited sponsor recognition)
- Cannot include designs impacting structures, drainage, or sightlines.
- Must be durable and low-maintenance.
- Must be fully funded by sponsors for their lifecycle.
- Painting on structures needs Division of Maintenance approval to avoid hiding cracks or stressing bridges.

City regulatory framework: Mural regulations are outlined in the Sign Ordinance, in section 17.38.080 (F) of the City Municipal Code. Murals that illustrate the local setting, history, or cultural significance are encouraged. The review authority must find that the "colors, placement, and size of the mural are visually compatible with the structure's architecture, and that the mural will serve to enhance the aesthetics of the city"

City Approval: The mural proposal followed the City's adopted process for murals as outlined in section 17.38.080(F) of the municipal code. The Development Review Committee reviewed the project on May 13, 2025 with a recommendation to approve the project. The planning commission approved the project as presented at their May 20, 2025 regular meeting, and made a recommendation that the two pillars with veteran plaques affixed to them be reserved for mural work that honors veteran service.

BACKGROUND:

Downtown Grass Valley, a historical treasure in California's Gold Rush country, radiates charm through the downtown business district. The area hums with a lively mix of past and present, where iconic landmarks like the Del Oro Theatre share the stage with modern shops and public spaces. This fusion of heritage and vitality make the area a cultural cornerstone, recognized as a California designated "Cultural District"; a distinction shared with only a dozen other locations in the state. Downtown Grass Valley draws people into its welcoming embrace as they visit Mill Street Plaza, attend a show at the Center for the Arts, or gather for special events hosted throughout the year by the chamber of commerce.

The heartbeat of this downtown lies at the busy crossroads of South Auburn Street, Neal Street, and State Highway 174. Here, the main routes converge, funneling travelers and locals alike into the bustling core of Grass Valley. Yet, just beyond this inviting gateway looms the Highway 49 overpass—a jarring counterpoint to the area's warmth. Spatially creating the eastern edge of downtown, its stark, utilitarian bulk casts a shadow over the quaint streets below, clashing with the historical elegance that defines the district. The cold, imposing presence, disrupts the visual harmony of Grass Valley, serving as a blunt reminder of the industrial world encroaching on nostalgic charm. For years, it stood as a functional necessity but an aesthetic misfit.



In 2021, a Grass Valley police officer reimagined the overpass not as a blight, but as a blank slate ready for transformation. He envisioned a mural that could breathe life into the concrete, turning a dreary structure into a striking centerpiece. This bold idea aimed to weave art into the urban fabric, bridging the gap between the city's storied past and its creative future. His proposal struck a chord, swiftly earning enthusiastic backing from

city administration and the City Council, all of whom saw its potential to elevate the area's spirit and pride.

With approval, the mural stands poised to redefine the overpass, splashing its drab surface with color and meaning. More than a beautification effort, it embodies Grass Valley's ability to harmonize its rich history with a vibrant, modern vision. By turning a utilitarian structure into a canvas of community appreciation, the city not only enhances its downtown appeal but also cements its legacy as a place where creativity thrives. This project promises to inspire all who encounter it, ensuring Grass Valley's unique character endures as a source of wonder for years to come.

The proposed project is fully feasible under the Caltrans Transportation Art Program guidelines, which encourage artistic enhancements to transportation infrastructure while supporting community identity. This mural aims to beautify the space and highlight the natural world surrounding our area, showcasing the Sierra Nevada foothills' rugged landscapes, native flora, and wildlife. A project of this scale and ambition is unique to the region, with no comparable transportation art example currently existing in the foothills, marking it as a pioneering effort to blend cultural expression with functional infrastructure in Nevada County.

SUMMARY OF TRANSPORTATION ART REQUIREMENTS:

The Caltrans Transportation Art Program, launched in 1977 by the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans), integrates art into the state's transportation infrastructure, enhancing highways and public spaces with community-driven works. Partnering with public agencies—cities, counties, towns, tribal governments, and nonfederally recognized tribes—it allows for the installation of graphic or sculptural art in state rights-of-way, either freestanding or on features like noise barriers, retaining walls, or bridges. These pieces aim to beautify, reflect local history or character, and boost pride.

Strict guidelines ensure safety and function. Art must celebrate community identity, be scaled appropriately, and allow safe maintenance per Caltrans rules. It must not include text, mimic traffic devices (per the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices), or use reflective/glaring finishes. Moving elements, simulated motion, or symbols like flags and logos (beyond limited sponsor recognition) are banned, as are designs impacting structures, drainage, or sightlines. Artworks require durability, low maintenance, and full funding by sponsors for their lifecycle. Painting on structures—latex on concrete or any on steel—needs Division of Maintenance approval to avoid hiding cracks or stressing bridges. Proposals progress through concept, preliminary, qualified, and final reviews by District Coordinators, ensuring compliance. Artists work via agencies, submitting plans and agreements like the Local Agency Agreement and Copyright License and Waiver of Moral Rights in Artwork (CLAW).

The renderings for Grass Valley's transportation art project, detailed in later pages, are designed to meet these criteria while fulfilling the city's beautification goals. We expect to transform a utilitarian space—the Highway 49 overpass—into a vibrant showcase of local heritage. These designs promise to enhance the downtown gateway, blending seamlessly with its Victorian charm and fostering community pride.

SUMMARY OF PARTNERSHIPS AND FUNDING:

In the early planning stages of Grass Valley's transportation art project, Councilwoman Haven Caravelli recognized the importance of partnering with local artists to achieve the goal. Under her leadership, the vision of incorporating many different artists into one project was born. Additionally, rather than the City trying to coordinate with individual artists, Councilwoman Caravelli suggested partnering with The Chambers Project whom she'd worked with in the past on various mural projects in other parts of downtown. Through her experience, she knew The Chambers Project had the network and expertise to bring the artists together.

The Chambers Project, an art studio and gallery in Grass Valley, helmed by Owner/Director Brian Chambers, is known for its focus on psychedelic art. Its role in Nevada County's creative scene made collaborating with the gallery a natural fit. Chambers eagerly agreed to join the effort, seeing it as a way to connect his gallery's work with a public project that could improve Grass Valley.

The Chambers Project put out a call-to-action within their network and brought in nine Nevada County artists to contribute to the project. Many had shown their work at the gallery and were willing to meet Caltrans' standards while capturing the area's history and spirit. Each artist was assigned one, and in some cases two, of the overpass's 11 support pillars where the art will ultimately be applied.

As planning moved forward, the project's cost estimate was created; \$250,000-\$300,000. These costs cover the artist fees, materials, and installation. Caltrans requires the sponsoring agency to fully fund any transportation art project, which was a challenge for City organizers. The Chambers Project came through again, connecting with a donor who agreed to cover the entire amount after learning about the project's purpose and impact.

The donor, a private individual interested in art and community improvement, committed to providing the full \$250,000-\$300,000, removing any immediate financial pressure from the City. Said donor has asked to remain anonymous, preferring attention stay on the artwork's benefit to Grass Valley.

With funding secured, this project can proceed without posing an immediate financial burden. The City will be responsible for upkeep, as required by Caltrans. Maintenance costs—such as repairs and cleaning—are expected to increase over time but should be minimal for the first few years after installation. This gives Grass Valley time to plan for future expenses while benefiting from the mural's presence.

Artist: Alida Frey

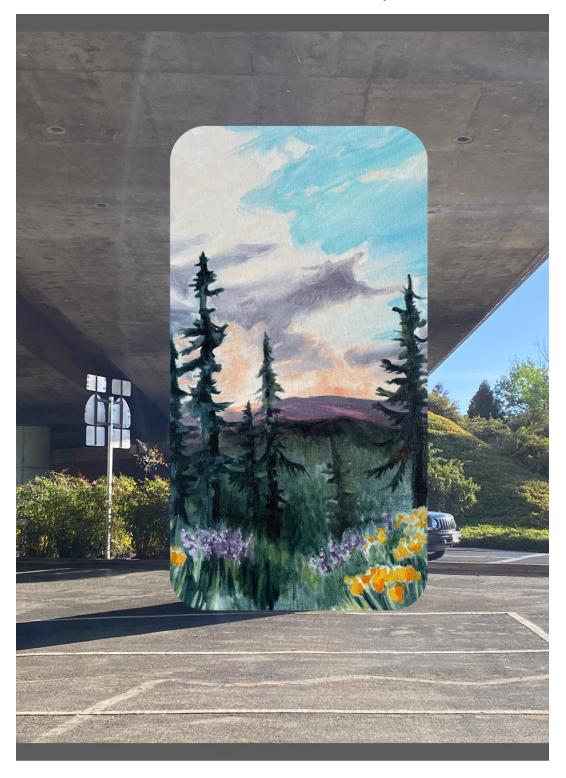
Stated Theme: "Splendor in the Grass Valley"

Statement:

I make paintings about the mystery of the wilderness and its ability to capture or free one's psyche. Since moving to Nevada County in 2020, the flora and fauna of the Sierra foothills have presented me with endless artistic inspiration-meadows of blooming wildflowers, towering pines that seem to possess individual personalities, sprawling oak trees of many varieties.

My proposal for the Grass Valley underpass mural is a landscape depicting natural elements known and loved by locals and visitors. In the foreground is a meadow including California poppies, white linen poppies, lupines, and yarrow. Beyond the meadow is a canopy of pines including Ponderosa, Doug Fir, Sugar Pine, and Cedar. The mountains recede into the distance where they meet a Sierra sunset. My aim in this painting is that driving through the underpass might feel as though the driver is atop their favorite local vista at sunset.

Artist: California Heritage: Indigenous Research Project (CHIRP)

Stated Theme: The Marysville Buttes

Statement:

California Heritage: Indigenous Research Project (CHIRP) is a Tribally-guided nonprofit dedicated to Preserving, Protecting, and Perpetuating Nisenan Culture.

Due to its illegal federal termination in 1964, the Nevada City Rancheria (NCR) Nisenan Tribe is barred from accessing federal programming and services that support Tribal communities. To address the legal vacuum created by the Tribe's federal disbandment, CHIRP acts as proxy for the NCR Nisenan Tribe and its approximately 140 members.

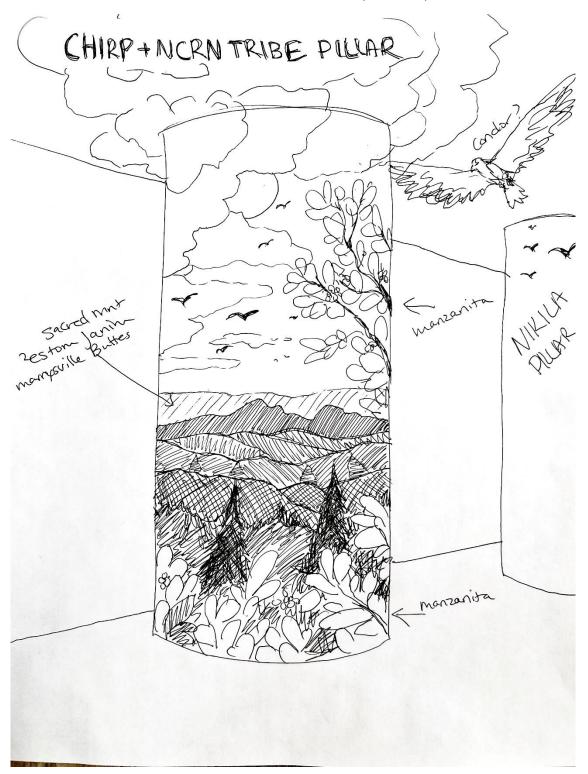
Together, CHIRP and the NCR Tribal Council work to identify, fund, and implement programs and projects to address and mitigate the ongoing social, environmental and racial injustices brought to the Tribe's Homelands in 1848, until the time when the Tribe's federal recognition and sovereignty is restored.

CHIRP and the Nevada City Rancheria Nisenan Tribe's mural pillar draws deeply from the natural landscape and cultural heritage that defines the Nisenan experience in this region. Central to the design is ⁹estom janim (the Marysville Buttes), a sacred mountain range in Nisenan cosmology that holds profound spiritual significance to the Tribe and is visible from several lookout points throughout Nevada County. This sacred landmark connects past and present, grounding the mural in the rich legacy of the Nisenan people. The surrounding imagery features local plants and animals that are essential to Nisenan life and traditions, including oak trees, manzanita, and birds such as condors and flickers. These elements reflect the interconnectedness of the Nisenan people with the land, embodying their culture's enduring presence. The mural not only honors the history of this area but also celebrates its vibrant, ongoing connection to the natural world that sustains and inspires all of us.

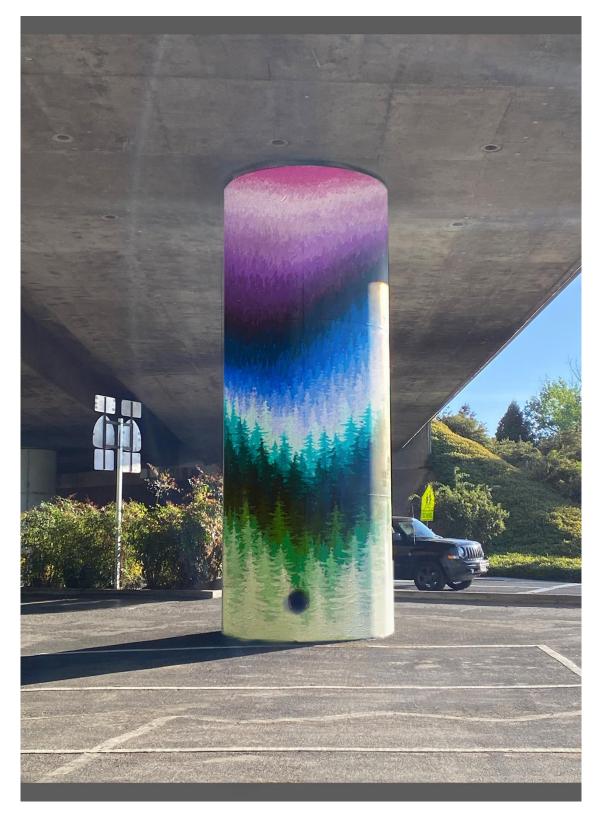
Stated Theme: Yuba Vista

Statement:

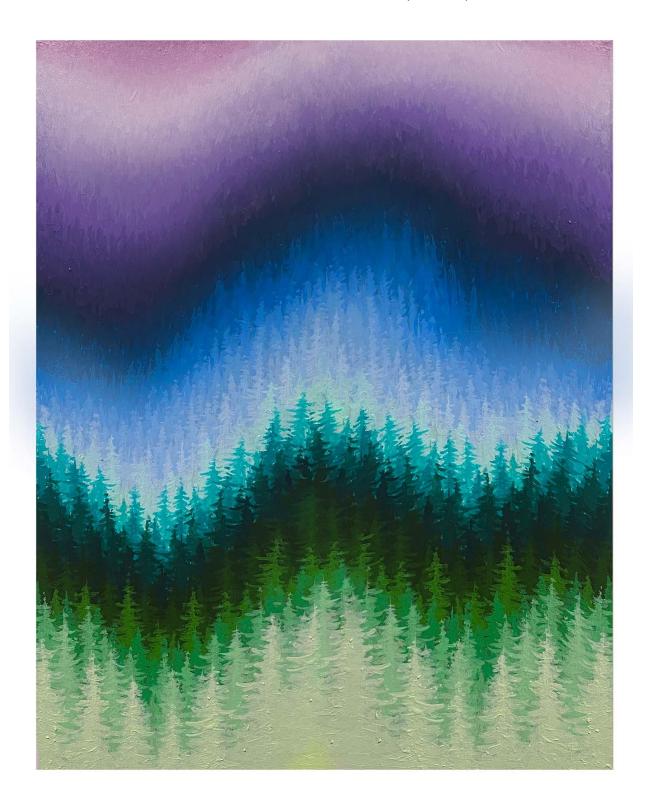
Colin Prahl is a painter and illustrator currently living and working in Grass Valley, California. Born and raised in Potsdam, New York he studied illustration at universities on the east coast from 2008-2012 and lived in NYC for eight years before moving to California in 2020. Influenced by architectural renderings, psychedelia, optical illusions, scientific and futuristic illustration, he has had two solo shows at The Chambers Project in Grass Valley; Geodaesia in 2019 and Limit Sequence in 2022.

Yuba Vista is a proposed mural inspired by the light cascades within the river valleys of the Sierra Nevada. The curving and steep channels cut by local rivers are a favorite destination for locals and travelers to experience the natural wonder of the Sierra foothills with their dense vegetation and shifting illumination through the passing day Color selection is built on the early morning and late evening light effects bringing purples, blues and reds into the greenery of the trees as sun and shadow mix with mist and moisture. The column structure to be painted provides a circular composition for this illusion of distant space to repeat back on itself creating an inside out panoramic view of an idealized local river valley.

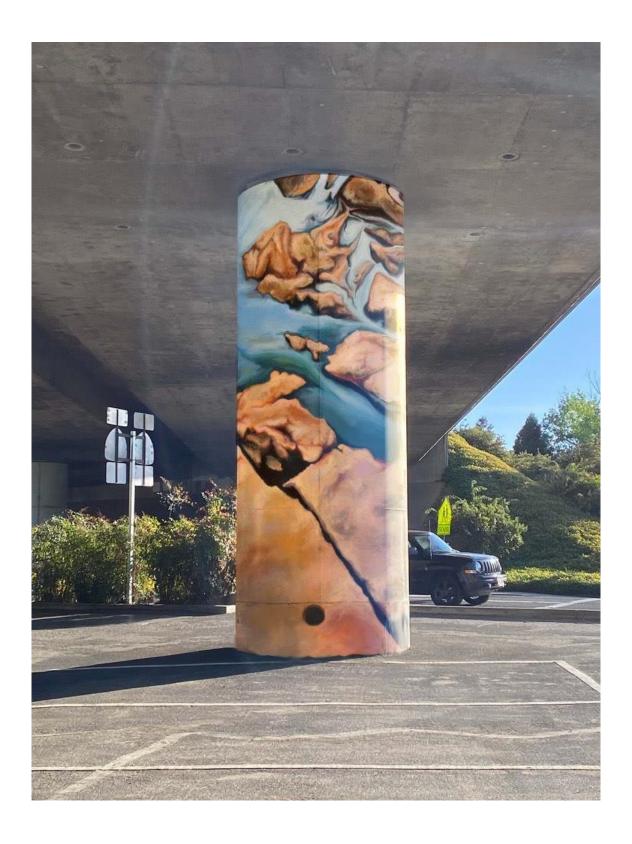
Stated Theme- Yuba

Statement:

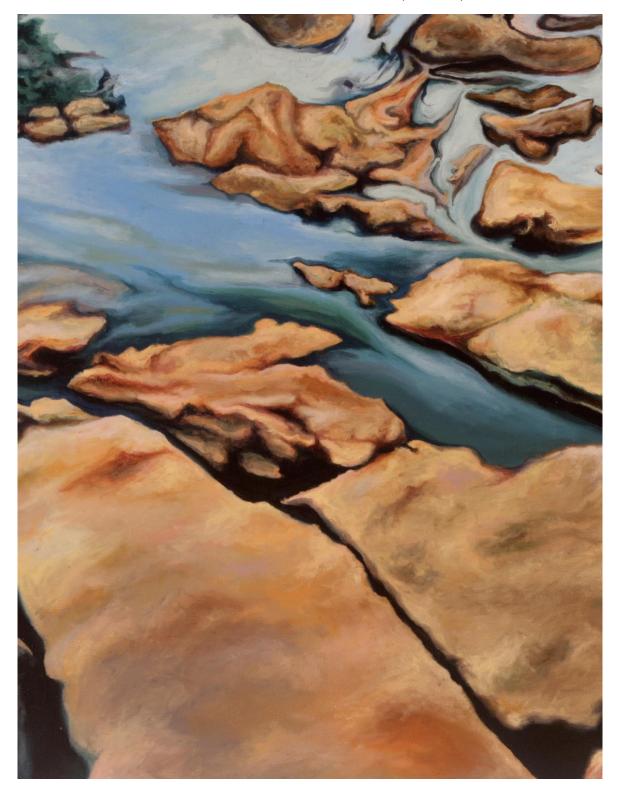

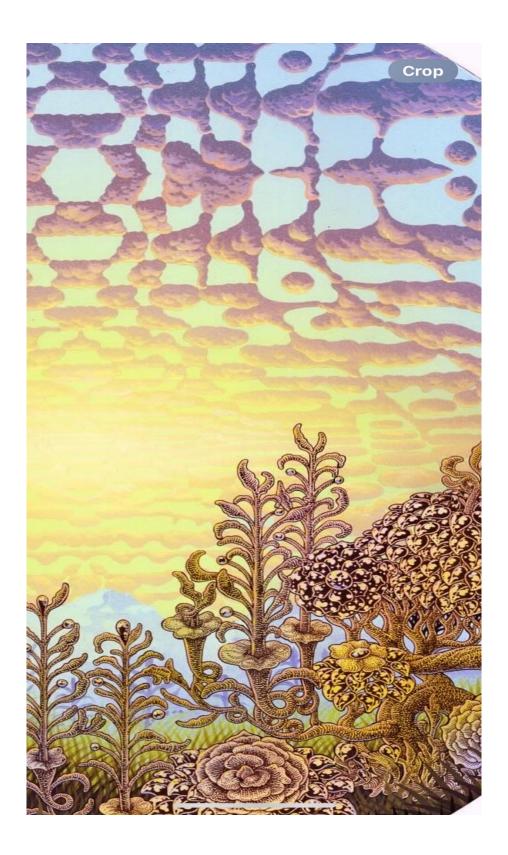

Stated Theme: Returning Home

Statement:

Born in the Hawaiian Islands and raised between Oahu and the Bay Area, Nikila is a Cultural Community Artist working under the alias "MamaWisdom1". Self-taught in the multidisciplinary arts as a muralist, designer, performer, and arts educator, she has dedicated her skills to serving cultural and community projects for over 25 years. Her work as an advocate and grassroots organizer for youth, indigenous, and environmental movements has played an influential role within shaping her creative path, utilizing the arts as a tool for decolonization, educational reform, and building cultural relations.

"Returning Home" honors the northern flicker, a sacred bird to the Nisenan and many California tribes, whose feathers have been used for centuries in traditional headdresses. A member of the woodpecker family, the flicker's distinct triangular markings reflect patterns found in Indigenous art around the world. As a symbol of renewal, the flickers in this design spread their wings to open the path for the return of the Chinook salmon, once abundant in Northern California's waterways. Salmon hold deep cultural and spiritual significance for native California tribes, appearing at the heart of creation stories as a teacher and elder guiding the human race. Historically thriving in the South Yuba River, giant salmon sustained indigenous communities through winter, but habitat destruction, dams, and environmental changes have pushed Chinook salmon to endangered levels throughout California. In August 2024, a historic initiative reintroduced Chinook salmon into the Yuba River, marking a crucial step in restoring balance to the ecosystem and honoring the Indigenous tribes who have long advocated for their return as part of a larger commitment to environmental stewardship, resilience, and the interwoven balance of land, water, and life.

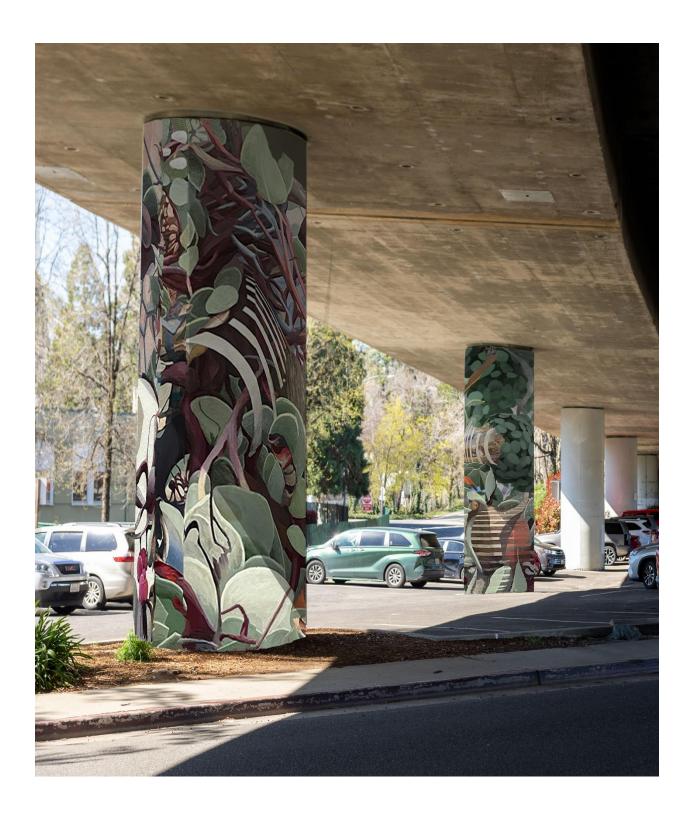
Stated Theme: Manzanita

Statement:

I moved from the East Coast to California in 2010. Where I come from in upstate New York, Manzanita Trees do not exist. After moving here I was seduced by their ubiquitous beauty. The deep red color of the trunks and branches are like wine, and when the rain comes the color only intensifies into saturated glossy radiance. Stated Theme: Calm, Peaceful Feelings

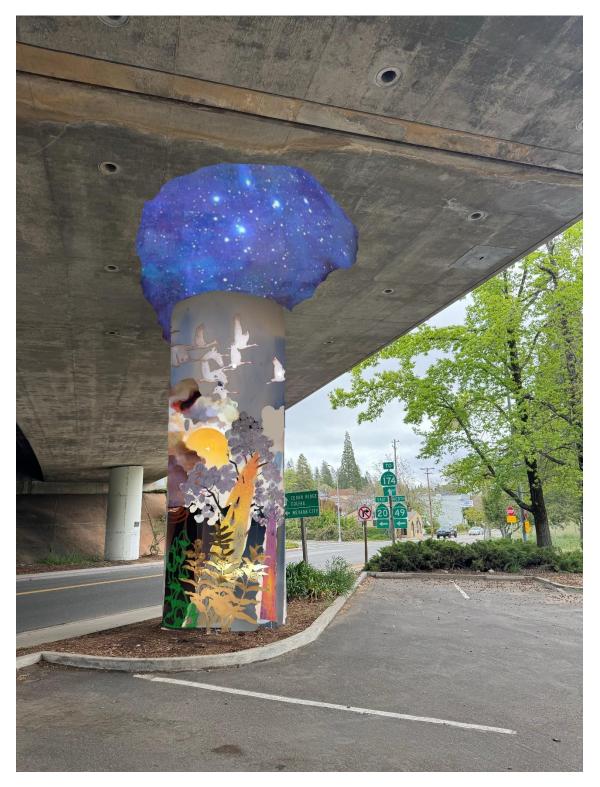
Statement:

Ursula Xanthe Young is a artist and muralist, local to the area for 15+ years, and has created a plethora of large scale murals in the local area, around the US and beyond. Recently she has been working with school kids on several large scale school mural projects in Nevada County.

Our local ecosystem is fragile, and non-native species threaten the ones that have been here for centuries. The projected mural on one of the underpass posts will be a celebration of the flora and fauna that are native to Nevada County. Ursula's vision for this artwork will be to create a landscape built up of layers of silhouetted Sierra mountain ranges as the background layer, the mid-ground will be of a ponderosa pine forest featuring local birds: hawks, stellar jay and more. The foreground will be full of her signature bright orange California poppies, and other local wildflowers, such as lupine & yarrow. She plans to include local butterfly and moth species into the final design, creating a mural that contrasts bright colored and rendered florals against the shades of mountain backgrounds - that will be easily identifiable to passers-by.

<u>Agenda</u>: Public Hearing <u>Background Information</u>:

In 2009 the City Council adopted Resolution 2009-82 and Ordinance 710 to re-designate the subject property from a residential general plan designation to a commercial designation, and rezone the property from Single-Family Residential (R-1) zoning to Central Business District (C-2). The General Plan and zoning amendment applications were made in order to accommodate a treatment/social service facility by the applicant at that time, Community Recover Resources. In 2011 the treatment facility was constructed in three buildings, known as "Center for Hope" for which each building

was designed to accommodate different stages of treatment: Service Center, Residential Treatment, and Transitional Housing according to the building permit.

The current owner, Granite Wellness, approached Planning staff in December 2024 indicating their desire to provide in-patient treatment at the site to convert some of their facility space from "Recovery Residence" services to a Withdrawal Management facility. At that time, staff verified that the in-patient services being offered were medical in nature and therefore was categorized as a "Medical Use Extended Care" facility, which is not permitted in the C-2 zoning designation, but could be permitted in the C-1 designation with a Use Permit.

At their meeting held April 15, 2025, the planning commission reviewed the proposed rezone and use permit and recommended approval as presented with 3 yeas, 1 abstention, and 1 absent.

Project Description: This application entails a rezone and use permit application by Granite Wellness to change the zoning of a portion of a 3.31-acre parcel, APN 035-330-021, from Central Business District (C-2) to the Community Business District (C-1) zoning designation to accommodate a Withdrawal Management Facility through a Conditional Use Permit. The current facility is authorized to provide recovery care. Granite Wellness is proposing to change the use of the building to a withdrawal management facility with inpatient care (extended care). Medical Use Extended Care is defined in the municipal code as "residential facilities providing nursing and health-related care as a primary use with in-patient beds." Overall, the C-1 zoning designation allows fewer and less intense uses than C-2, so the rezone request is considered a "downzone" from the current zoning designation. Both the C-1 and C-2 zoning designations are consistent with the commercial general plan designation so no amendment is required. No physical changes to the site are being requested as a result of this zoning map amendment and use permit. The zoning amendment allows the existing operation to allow inpatient medical care through the use permit process.

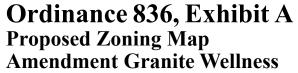

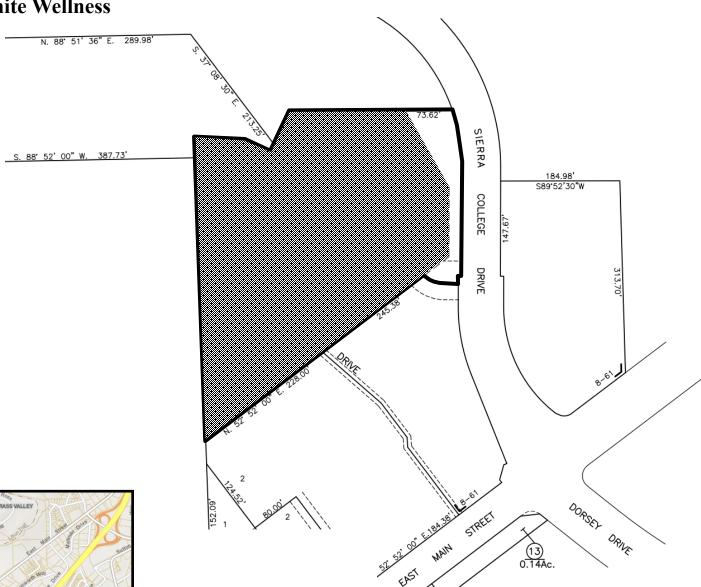

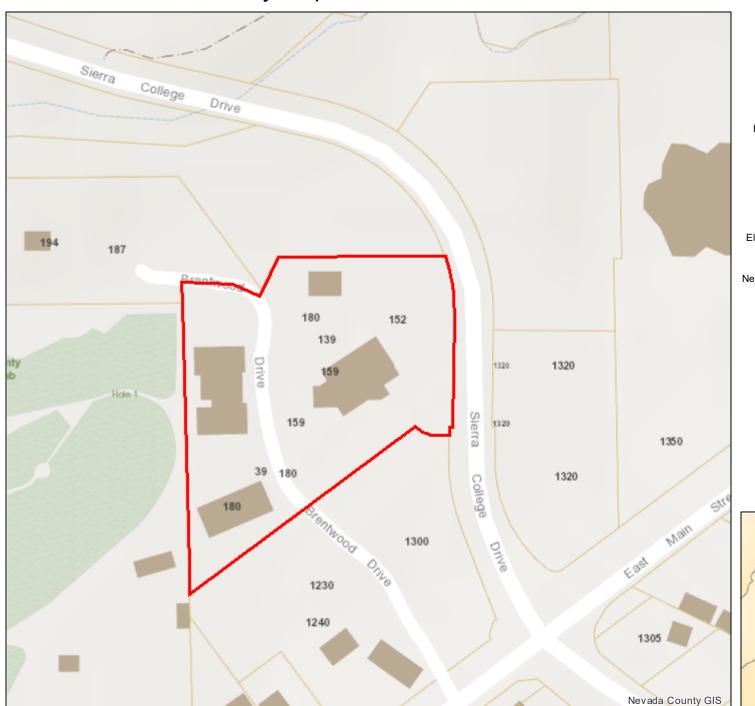

Justification Statement for Rezoning Request

The purpose of this rezoning request is to transition our current Recovery Residence facility into a Withdrawal Management facility. Our Grass Valley Substance Use Disorder Treatment campus currently comprises one Outpatient facility, two Residential Treatment facilities, and four Recovery Residence facilities on a 3.31 acre lot.

This change will allow our organization to meet the increased need for detoxification services in the greater Northern California region. Clients will be encouraged to continue on to Residential or Outpatient services once they have completed Withdrawal Management successfully.

- A. The first step of SUD treatment services is Withdrawal Management, and greater accessibility to SUD treatment services is shown to have the following positive impact on the surrounding community:

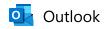

Good afternoon Amy,

I hope you are having a good Wednesday. I wanted to provide a little summary before answering the questions below as it seems you may have some inaccurate information on our rezoning request. GWC has been providing services to the NC community and surrounding counties for 51 years. Our campus located at 180 Sierra College in Grass Valley has been operational since 2012. This location provides residential care that includes withdrawal management and current has capacity for 40 adults and 12 children, (20 men and 20 women separate living quarters). On this campus we also have 6 recovery residences which are transitional houses that individuals can live in for up to 6 months, most of the time following their stay in residential but at times come directly from the community if they have sufficient clean time and certain stability factors, they must be attending outpatient services and remain clean and sober while living here. We also have an outpatient building on this campus that provides outpatient, intensive outpatient, DUI and other specialized programs. We are the largest SUD provider in Nevada County and the only DUI provider in NC. We are also very unique in being able to offer the full spectrum of care under one roof, we provide perinatal treatment for pregnant woman who have SUD disorders, allowing them to keep their children while in care, we have a home dedicated to single fathers reuniting with their children and work really hard to meet the needs of the community from a SUD perspective.

The rezoning is to turn two of our recovery residence homes, located on the campus about 200 feet from the residential building into increased residential bed space. Allowing us to serve an additional 16 individuals. The space is not specifically allocated for withdrawal management, as we monitor those numbers very closely and ensure we balance withdrawal management intakes, they require round the clock medical care. We currently have the ability to bring in as many WM individuals as we desire within our current 40 bed capacity but bring in 2/3 per side (each side operates independently of each other). We have medical staff on every shift that monitor our WM clients, overseen by a medical manager, an addiction specialist MD and 2 Physicians Assistants.

I also want to ensure public safety is one of our upmost priorities, it is something we look at in our processes and operations to ensure our practices do not pull-on law enforcement resources and on the contrary, we want to support and take on what we can from our law enforcement partners. I am a previous law enforcement officer, 10 years with Yolo County Probation and on our Board of Directors is the Placer County Undersheriff and we used to have a Nevada County Probation Officer on our board but she left due to family needs. Responses to your questions are below.

Per our discussion earlier, the chief is not available, but he did provide a list of questions for me to ask. Please provide responses to the following:

Item # 8.

- 1. What happens when/if patients do not complete treatment, particularly if they leave the facility prior to completion? our rates of leaving before graduation are very low, 98% of our clients maintain recovery while in residential, meaning our relapse rates are very low. Our overall post discharge recovery from all of our programs is 80% (a year post completion). Last year (FY 23/24) across all of our locations (4 total, this is the only one in NC) we served 4009 individuals. If they do choose to leave, we cannot force them to stay, we work with them to get safely to their destination. They usually contact a family member to pick them up. We do everything we can to get them stay, many clients struggle in the first few days. We notify the referring county after discharge.
- 2. How far away do patients travel to participate in the withdrawal management facility? Are patients are primarily from the Grass Valley community, or are they from farther away? We are not a standalone WM as indicated our facility has 3 levels of care, WM being one of them. We have contracts with 11 counties, NC makes up 61% of the clients we serve. We serve the surrounding counties, Alpine, Eldo, Sutter, Yuba, Yolo, Placer, Plumas, Del Norte, Colusa, Sierra. We also take all private insurance and serve anyone who has private insurance and have stand-alone agreements with other non-medical agencies.
- 3. What transportation plans are in place in/out of the facility, particularly for withdrawal management clients? Clients must have transportation to get to the facility, they are transported either by family or the referring county. The same transportation is in place when they leave, we do have a transport vehicle used on occasion to support transport for those who need assistance.
- 4. Are patients there of their own volition or are they generally there as a result of court orders or other mandates? Most are their on their own, some have requirements to complete treatment in order to have their children returned or as part of a condition of probation. It varies.

Please let me know if you have any further questions. Also feel free to give the Chief my cell if he wants to give me a call and ask any questions or for anything else that may come up 530-867-6287. Would love to give you guys a tour.

<u>Recommendation</u>: It is recommended that the City Council 1) approve the FY 2025-26 Preliminary Budget and provide further Director to staff as it relates to the preparation of the 2025-26 Final Budget and 2) set June 24, 2025, as the date for the public hearing for the FY 2025-26 Final Budget.

<u>Discussion:</u> In accordance with the City of Grass Valley Charter, a Preliminary Budget must be submitted to the City Council no later than June 1 each year for the upcoming fiscal year. The Charter also requires the City Council to schedule a public hearing to consider adoption of the Final Budget prior to the start of the new fiscal year.

Staff will present a brief overview of the recommended FY 2025-26 Preliminary Budget, with a primary focus on the key funds that support the majority of citywide operations:

General Fund
Measure E Fund
Measure B Fund
Water and Sewer Enterprise Funds
Gas Tax Fund
Traffic Safety Fund
Development Impact Fee Fund
Capital Projects Fund
Special Projects Fund

The Preliminary Budget has been developed and updated in alignment with the information shared during the FY 2024-25 Mid-Year Budget Update presented to the City Council on March 25, 2025. As discussed at that time, City management continues to monitor several key factors influencing the local economy and, by extension, the City's current and future financial outlook.

While the economic impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic have largely subsided, the FY 2025-26 Preliminary Budget reflects continued fiscal pressure from inflationary increases in utility and operating costs, volatility in CalPERS investment returns and the associated rise in unfunded liability amortization payments, as well as increasing citywide insurance premiums.

Given these ongoing challenges, staff will provide periodic updates to the adopted budget throughout the fiscal year. At a minimum, quarterly reports on fiscal activity in the City's major funds will be presented.

General Fund

FY 2025-26 General Fund Preliminary Budget:

The FY 2025-26 Preliminary General Fund Budget includes projected revenues of \$18,988,615 and expenditures totaling \$19,034,095. This results in expenditures exceeding revenues by \$49,479, primarily due to anticipated increases in insurance costs - including liability, property, and workers' compensation - as well as unfunded liability amortization expenses. Key revenue and expenditure impacts to the City's General Fund for FY 2025-26 are outlined below.

The FY 2025-26 budgeted revenue of \$18,988,615 represents an increase of approximately \$165,500 over the projected revenue for FY 2024-25, primarily due to:

- Projected 3.0% increase in property tax revenues, reflecting ongoing strength in the housing market and an increase in the State's Consumer Price Index (CPI).
- Higher franchise fee revenues, primarily driven by increased electricity fee collections resulting from rate adjustments.
- Stabilization of interest earnings, supported by the City's continued active participation in the investment market and sustained favorable interest rates.
- Creation of a new revenue account to track reimbursements for strike team deployments, improving transparency. A corresponding expenditure account has also been established.
- Minor reductions in reimbursement and refund accounts, due to the elimination of one-time reimbursements recorded in the prior year.
- Decreases in grant revenues, reflecting the conclusion of one-time funding received in FY 2024-25, including a UC Davis animal shelter grant and a NAAQMD grant for the purchase of a utility tractor.

The FY 2025-26 budgeted expenditures total \$19,034,095, reflecting an increase of approximately \$9,204 over projected FY 2024-25 expenditures. This modest increase is primarily due to the following factors:

- Funding for approved labor costs increases.
- Operating materials budgets for many departments are held at FY 2024-25 levels to support budget stability.
- Increased costs for fuel and electricity.
- A higher contract amount with the Nevada County Sheriff's Office for continued dispatch services.

- Rising expenses for workers' compensation and general liability insurance.
- Salary savings are anticipated due to a frozen position in the Finance Department and the conversion full-time positions in the Parks Department and the Building Department/Front Counter.
- A \$50,000 reduction in the Appropriation for Contingencies, decreasing from \$150,000 to \$100,000.

As part of the FY 2025-26 budget development process, it is important to note that the City maintains several key contingency reserves within the General Fund:

- CalPERS Pension Stabilization Reserve \$1,500,000
- Other Post-Employment Benefits (OPEB) Reserve \$500,000
- Capital and Deferred Maintenance Reserve \$1,000,000
- Economic Contingency Reserve \$2,500,000

These Assigned Reserves are intended to provide financial flexibility and stability in the following areas:

- Absorbing unexpected increases in pension or health benefit costs.
- Reducing the need to rely on General Fund discretionary revenues for urgent capital improvements and deferred maintenance; and
- Mitigating the impact of potential service level reductions during economic downturns.

As of the end of FY 2025-26, total General Fund reserves are estimated to be approximately \$8.11 million. Projected reserve balances as of June 30, 2026, are expected to include the following:

- \$ 5,936,452 Designated Reserves (See Attachment A for list)
- \$ 2,176,452 Undesignated Reserves
- \$ 8,112,817 Total General Fund Reserves

Measure E Fund

The Measure E Fund accounts for the City's voter-approved 1-cent transactions and use tax, a general-purpose tax that supports police and fire services as well as streets and parks projects.

FY 2025-26, budgeted revenue is projected at \$7,489,000, representing an increase of approximately \$99,500 over the FY 2024-25 estimated revenues of \$7,389,569. This increase is primarily due to the establishment of a new revenue account to track reimbursements for strike team deployments, enhancing financial transparency. A

corresponding expenditure account has also been created to accurately reflect related costs.

FY 2025-26 budgeted expenditures of \$10,256,313 represent an approximate \$4.08 million increase over estimated FY 2024-25 expenditures. This increase is primarily driven by the planned use of prior years' carryover fund balance to support various street and parks projects. In addition to the delivery and payment for a new fire truck - originally authorized in a prior fiscal year - Measure E funds are anticipated to support several key projects in the current year, including the Condon Parking Lot Restrooms, Loma Rica Trail Improvements, Magenta Drain Restoration (with multiple funding sources), South Auburn Street Renovation (also with multiple funding sources), and \$1.20 million allocated to Street Pavement Rehabilitation.

The Measure E Fund provides funding for 19.5 full-time equivalent (FTE) positions - 10.5 FTE in the Police Department and 9 FTE in the Fire Department. All Measure E funded positions are fully budgeted and assumed to be filled for the entire FY 2025-26 period.

City staff will meet with the Measure E Oversight Committee to review key elements of the FY 2025-26 budget prior to its final adoption in June.

As of June 30, 2026, the Measure E Fund is projected to have an estimated fund balance of \$2,131,000. These remaining funds may be appropriated in future fiscal years to support any Measure E related purposes.

<u>Measure B</u>

The Measure B Fund accounts for the City's voter-approved 3/8-cent transactions and use tax, a general-purpose tax dedicated to reducing the risk of catastrophic wildfire and extreme weather. This is achieved through funding for additional firefighters, vegetation management, and emergency evacuation planning.

For FY 2025-26, projected revenue is \$2,631,000, while budgeted expenditures total \$3,401,078. As tax collection began in October 2024, FY 2025-26 will be the first full year of Measure B fund utilization. With programs just beginning in the prior fiscal year, approximately \$1.1 million in carryover fund balance is available to support current-year projects. These include a fuel reduction project in the Loma Rica area, the launch of a grant program to assist businesses and residents with fuel reduction efforts, the purchase of additional equipment to enhance project flexibility, and multiple fuel reduction initiatives to be identified throughout the year.

The Measure B Fund provides 11 full-time equivalent (FTE) positions - 2 in Risk Reduction and 9 in the Fire Department. All positions are fully budgeted and assumed to be filled for the entire FY 2025-26 period.

City staff has met with the Measure B Oversight Committee to review key elements of the FY 2025-26 budget prior to its anticipated adoption in June.

As of June 30, 2026, the Measure B Fund is projected to have an estimated fund balance of \$386,000, which may be appropriated in future fiscal years to support any Measure B related initiatives.

Water Fund

FY 2025-26 Water Fund revenues are projected to be slightly higher than the prior year's budget, primarily due to the approved increase in water rates as outlined in the adopted Water Rate Study. Expenditures for FY 2025-26 are recommended to be approximately \$685,500 higher than the previous year, mainly due to ongoing maintenance needs at the water treatment plant and a capital project to replace the water main as part of the South Auburn Street renovation.

This fiscal year also marks the final lease payment - totaling \$161,188 - for the automated meter reading equipment purchased in 2011.

The Water Fund is projected to end FY 2025-26 with a fund balance of approximately \$1.32 million. Of this amount, roughly \$1.21 million is reserved for specific purposes, leaving an unreserved balance of around \$110,000. This projection assumes completion of all planned maintenance and capital projects by year-end.

Sewer Fund

FY 2025-26 Sewer Fund revenues are projected to be slightly higher than those budgeted in FY 2024-25, primarily due to the approved sewer rate increase as outlined in the adopted Sewer Rate Study. Expenditures for FY 2025-26 are recommended to increase by approximately \$5.07 million over the prior year, largely due to the carryover of several major capital projects, including Annual Wastewater Treatment Plant Upgrades, the Slate Creek Lift Station, and the Taylorville Lift Station.

This fiscal year also marks the final lease payment of \$52,307 for the automated meter reading equipment purchased in 2011, as well as the final payment of \$566,794 on the 2011 Wastewater Refunding Bonds, originally issued on August 1, 2011.

The Sewer Fund is anticipated to end FY 2025-26 with a fund balance of approximately \$4.61 million. Of this amount, \$4.38 million is reserved for specific purposes, leaving an unreserved balance of about \$227,000. This projection assumes that all planned capital projects are completed by the end of the fiscal year.

Gas Tax Fund

The Gas Tax Fund accounts for revenues received from the Highway User Tax Account (HUTA), SB-1 Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Account (RMRA), and pass-through funding from the Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC). These revenues are restricted for eligible transportation-related expenditures.

For FY 2025-26, Gas Tax revenues are projected to be approximately \$13,500 higher than those anticipated in FY 2024-25, due to scheduled rate increases outlined in SB-1. Appropriations from the Gas Tax Fund are expected to increase by approximately \$1.05 million in the upcoming fiscal year, driven by planned investments in street maintenance, sidewalk repairs, and partial funding of the South Auburn Street Renovation Project, which is supported by multiple funding sources.

The Gas Tax Fund is projected to end FY 2025-26 with a remaining fund balance of approximately \$3,550.

Traffic Safety Fund

The Traffic Safety Fund accounts for revenues from parking citations and transfers from the Gas Tax Fund, which are used to cover streetlight utility costs. Revenues for FY 2025-26 are expected to remain relatively consistent with those anticipated in FY 2024-25. Similarly, appropriations are projected to remain largely unchanged from the prior year.

It is expected that the Traffic Safety Fund will have no remaining fund balance at the end of FY 2025-26, as incoming revenues are fully allocated to support the fund's required expenditures.

Development Impact Fee Fund

The Development Impact Fee Fund accounts for the receipt AB-1600 Development Impact Fees, which are designated for nexus-based future projects that mitigate the impacts of new development.

Development Impact Fee Fund revenues for FY 2025-26 are expected to include only interest earnings, estimated at \$75,000. Given the unpredictable nature of development activity and fee collections, the budget may be updated periodically throughout the fiscal year as new information becomes available.

At this time, the following projects are planned to be funded by development impact fees during FY 2025-26: the Storm Drain Master Plan, the Bennett & Ophir Circulation Project, and the Centennial Drive Realignment. If any of these projects are not completed within the fiscal year, the associated appropriations will likely be carried forward into FY 2026-27.

The Development Impact Fee Fund is projected to have approximately \$1.92 million available for specific projects at the end of FY 2025-26.

The Capital Projects Fund accounts for most non-enterprise capital projects citywide. Some projects are fully funded through the General Fund or the Measure E Fund and, as such, are not included in the Capital Projects Fund. Capital projects are typically supported by non-discretionary revenue sources such as grants and fees, as well as transfers in from other City funds.

For FY 2025-26, Capital Projects Fund revenues and expenditures are both estimated at \$14.91 million. Project budgets have been updated to reflect the most current cost estimates and available funding.

New and continuing projects included in the Capital Projects Fund for FY 2025-26 include the Wolf Creek Trail Study, Condon Parking Lot Restrooms, Loma Rica Trail Improvements, Magenta Drain Restoration, McCourtney Road Pedestrian Improvements, South Auburn Street Renovation, and the South Auburn & Colfax Roundabout.

These projects are funded through a combination of specific grant sources - such as CMAQ, ATP, and ECRG - and transfers from other City funds, including the General Fund, Measure E, Gas Tax Fund, Traffic Safety Fund, Developer Impact Fee Fund, Water Fund, and Special Projects Fund.

The Special Projects Fund accounts for capital projects that are supported by designated revenue sources outside of the City's primary operating funds. For FY 2025-26, anticipated revenues include interest earnings and Regional Transportation

Mitigation (RTMF) fees received from the County of Nevada.

In FY 2021-22, the City issued \$6 million in debt specifically for future park improvements. Of that amount, approximately \$3 million has already been used. For FY 2025-26, it is recommended that the remaining \$3 million be allocated toward the Centerville Bike Park, Lyman Gilmore Lighting and Improvements, and Condon Park Baseball Improvement Projects.

The Special Projects Fund is projected to have a remaining fund balance of approximately \$2.64 million as of June 30, 2026, which may be used to support future capital projects.

FY 2025-26 Final Budget Development

Staff will incorporate any additional direction from the City Council, based on the presentation of the FY 2025-26 Preliminary Budget, into the Final Budget. In addition, staff are expected to meet with the Measure E Oversight Committee to review the Preliminary Budget for the Measure E Fund before the Final Budget is presented in June and has already met with the Measure B Oversight Committee.

<u>Council Goals/Objectives</u>: The Fiscal Year 2025-26 Preliminary Budget executes portions of the work tasks towards achieving / maintaining the Strategic Plan goal to maintain a High-Performance Government and Quality Service.

<u>Fiscal Impact</u>: The recommended Preliminary Budget for Fiscal Year 2025-26 is balanced, with projected expenditures fully supported by anticipated revenues and available carryover funds in the applicable budgeted funds.

<u>Background Information</u>: At a recent Special Meeting, the City Council directed staff to return with an item to establish a committee to explore the potential expansion of the current Skatepark Project.

On November 21, 2023, the City of Grass Valley issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) for Design-Build services for the Condon Park Skatepark Project. Following a competitive selection process, the City Council awarded a Design-Build contract to Grindline Skateparks, Inc. on February 13, 2024, in the amount of \$1,500,000, funded through a Proposition 64 Health and Safety Grant.

As part of the project's initial phase, Grindline conducted a site visit to assess the condition of the existing skatepark. Their evaluation revealed several critical issues, including extensive cracking, signs of structural settlement, and drainage deficiencies. Based on these findings, Grindline determined that the existing facility posed potential safety hazards and could not be feasibly repaired.

From April through September 2024, the City partnered with Grindline to host a series of community engagement meetings to gather public input and collaboratively develop a new skatepark design. The resulting final conceptual design reflects the community's priorities and emphasizes inclusivity, durability, and suitability for all skill levels.

Following two additional Special City Council Meetings, direction was given to proceed with construction to ensure the City does not risk forfeiting the \$1,500,000 in grant funding allocated for the project.

Most recently, the City Council requested that staff return with an agenda item to establish an Ad Hoc Committee comprised of two Council Members. This committee will work closely with the broader skateboarding community to explore options for expanding the Grindline Skatepark design, including potential locations, design enhancements, and additional funding opportunities.

<u>Council Goals/Objectives</u>: This item executes portions of work tasks towards achieving/maintaining the Strategic Plan - Parks and Recreation.

Fiscal Impact: The Grindline Skatepark project is currently funded through a Proposition 64 Health and Safety Grant in the amount of \$1,500,000. These funds fully support the initial phase of the project. At this time, funding for subsequent phases has not yet been identified. Staff will explore additional grant opportunities, public-private partnerships, and other potential funding sources to support future development and completion of the project.
