She reminded the public about the upcoming Wildfire Evacuation Meeting at Sierra College on 8/23 and the downtown LOVE walk. She also addressed the relocation of the plaque in Christophers Alley.

Dear City Council,



Background Information:

The school resource officer (SRO) position is an effective community policing asset. The SRO presence on campus provides an additional layer of campus security and enhances police-student relationships. The Grass Valley Police Department has partnered with NJUHSD since 2017 to provide School Resource Officer services. This partnership began as a one-year contract and has since undergone one, five-year, contract extension, approved by Council in 2018. Both entities desire to continue the program.

A contract extension between the City of Grass Valley and Nevada Joint Union High School District (NJUHSD) was approved by the District on August 23, 2023, to provide School Resource Officer services for NJUHSD, specifically at the Silver Springs High School site. The previous agreement expired on June 30, 2023, and can be extended by mutual written consent. It is recommended that City Council approve a four-year extension of the agreement through June 30, 2027 (see attached).



AGREEMENT WITH NEVADA JOINT UNION HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT FOR SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT is dated this 21st DAY OF July, 2023, between the CITY OF GRASS VALLEY, a municipal corporation, having a principal place of business at 125 East Main Street, Grass Valley, California; 95945, hereinafter referred to as "CITY," and NEVADA JOINT UNION HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT, whose business address is, 11761 Ridge Road, Grass Valley, California 95945 hereinafter referred to as "NJUHSD."

WHEREAS, NJUHSD wishes to obtain the services of a sworn police officer to serve as its school resource officer on its campus; and

WHEREAS, CITY is willing to contract with NJUHSD for such services.

NOW, **THEREFORE**, for and in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants herein contained, it is agreed by and between the parties hereto as follows:

1. SCOPE OF SERVICES AND TERM

- A. CITY agrees to provide and dedicate to NJUHSD a sworn uniformed police officer to serve as the School Resource Officer for NJUHSD on NJUHSD campus. The officer, shall serve 50% of his/her time on NJUHSD campus, except during critical incidents or other emergencies, which may arise, which may require his/her presence elsewhere in the city.
- B. Representatives of the CITY and NJUHSD shall make recommendations for the SRO position to the CITY Chief of Police who shall assign such officer.
- C. The term of the Agreement shall commence July 1, 2023 and conclude June 30, 2027, unless extended by mutual written consent. If the parties find it mutually desirable to extend this Agreement, additional extensions may be negotiated. Notice of intent to negotiate an additional extension shall be given by the party desiring such extension no later than March 1st of each year.

2. RESPONSIBILITY OF CITY: OFFICER'S DUTIES

A. CITY shall administer this contract and provide school resource officer (SRO) services as set forth in **Attachment A** at those times when appropriate or at those times designated therein. Services shall include, but not be limited to the enforcement of all state and local criminal laws and coordination with other enforcement details targeting truancy, violence, gangs, and drug activity as well as campus safety. The allocation of the officer's time will be mutually agreed upon between a representative of NJUHSD and the Chief of Police or his designee. It is the intent of both parties that the SRO's duty hours on NJUHSD campus shall conform to the hours of the school day.

- B. CITY shall control and determine the performance of CITY personnel serving under this Agreement, including, but not limited to the standards of personnel performance and discipline.
- C. CITY shall provide and supervise all personnel, furnish all equipment including vehicles, if any, and provide all supplies necessary to perform its duties as provided herein.

3. <u>COMPENSATION</u>

- A. As consideration for providing the services outlined above during the term of this Agreement, NJUHSD shall reimburse CITY up to \$60,000 per year as set forth herein:
 - 1. CITY shall submit a quarterly invoice to NJUHSD for the cost of providing the services for the previous quarter. Such invoice will be based on the direct salary and benefit costs of City of Grass Valley Police Officer position.
 - a. The CITY will invoice NJUHSD no more than \$15,000 per quarter.
 - 2. NJUHSD shall pay such invoice to the City within thirty (30) days of receipt of said invoice.

4. STATUS OF PERSONNEL UTILIZED

- A. All personnel furnished by CITY shall at all times remain employees of CITY and be considered as such for all purposes. They shall not have, nor acquire, any benefits or rights NJUHSD may confer on NJUHSD employees.
- B. NJUHSD shall not be liable for the payment of any salaries, wages, overtime, vacation or other benefits or compensation to any CITY personnel performing duties under this Agreement. CITY shall retain the right to exercise its professional control over the manner in which it renders services, except as otherwise set forth in this Agreement.
- C. NJUHSD shall have the right to reject for reasonable cause any employee of CITY assigned by the CITY to perform duties or services for NJUHSD.

5. INDEMNITY

To the furthest extent allowed by law, each Party (the "Indemnifying Party") shall indemnify, hold harmless and defend the other Party (the "Indemnified Party") and each of its officers, officials, employees, and agents from any and all loss, liability, fines, penalties, forfeitures, costs, and damages (whether in contract, tort or strict liability, including, but not limited to, personal injury, death at any time and property damage), and from any and all claims, demands and actions in law or equity (including reasonable attorneys' fees and litigation expenses) that arise out of or pertain to the negligence, recklessness, or willful misconduct of the

Indemnifying party, its principals, officers, employees, or agents. The provisions of this Section shall survive termination or suspension of this Agreement.

6. WORKERS COMPENSATION INSURANCE

CITY is aware of the provisions of Section 3700 of the Labor Code which require every employer to be insured against liability for workers' compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of that code, and will comply with such provisions before commencing the performance of the work of this contract.

6. GOVERNING LAW

This Contract shall be subject to and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of California.

7. <u>SEVERABILITY</u>

If any provision, or any portion of any provision hereof, is held to be unconstitutional, invalid, or unenforceable, the remainder of this Agreement, or portion thereof, shall be deemed severable, shall not be affected, and shall remain in full force and effect.

8. COMPLETE CONTRACT: MODIFICATIONS

This Agreement is to be read as a whole. This is an integrated agreement that contains all of the terms, considerations, understanding and promises of the parties as well as the fees, charges, and authorized expenses to be paid under the terms of this Agreement. No purported modifications of this Agreement shall be effective unless reduced to writing and mutually signed by authorized representative of the CITY and NJUHSD.

ATTACHMENT A

AGREEMENT WITH NEVADA JOINT UNION HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT FOR SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER SERVICES

GENERAL:

Under the direction of an assigned supervisor, perform law enforcement services, youth crime prevention programs, intervention in juvenile delinquency and welfare issues, and relationship building and education within the community and on campus.

DISTINGUISHING CHARACTERISTICS:

The School Resource Officer is an experienced level classification in the police officer rank. Officers involved in these programs do not typically participate in enforcement activities while in the schools, except in case of life threatening emergency or at the discretion of the supervisor in coordination with the school/District.

SUPERVISION RECEIVED AND EXERCISED BY:

Direct supervision is provided by a police sergeant, with general supervision provided by a police department manager.

REPRESENTATIVE ESSENTIAL DUTIES:

Be an extension of the principal's office for assignments consistent with this Agreement.

Be a visible, active law enforcement figure on campus dealing with law enforcement matters and school code violations originating on the assigned campus. As to school code violations, the SRO will take the student to the principal's office for discipline to be meted out by the school officials.

Act as the designee of the campus administrator in maintaining the physical plant of the assigned campus to provide a safe environment. This includes building(s), grounds, parking lot(s), lockers and other public school property.

Share information with the administrator about persons and conditions that pertain to campus safety concerns. The SRO and the principal will develop plans and strategies to prevent and/or minimize dangerous situations.

Report all crimes originating on campus. Information on cases that are worked off-campus by the Police Department or other agencies involving students on a campus served by an SRO will be provided to the SRO.

Be involved in school discipline, when it pertains to preventing a disruption that would, if ignored, place students, faculty and staff at risk of harm. The SRO will resolve the problem to preserve the school climate. As to school code violations, the SRO will take the student to the principal's office for discipline to be meted out by school officials.

Be familiar with helpful community agencies, such as mental health and drug treatment resources among others. Referrals will be made when necessary.

Participate as a member of a multi-agency or community task group, which supports delinquency prevention and campus safety activities as assigned.

Deliver classroom instruction appropriate to their respective positions and training while providing guidance on ethical issues in the classroom setting.

Be a resource to students, their families and school district personnel in the form of an information source, problem-solving assistance, and/or referral to appropriate personnel or agencies.

Make appearances before site councils, parent groups, and other groups associated with the campus as a speaker on a variety of requested topics, particularly drug, alcohol abuse, and campus safety.

Provide career information and experience opportunities, and promote an accurate and positive image of law enforcement in modern society.

In the case of incidents requiring enforcement action or official investigation, make referrals to the appropriate police division (Patrol/Investigations) or juvenile or social service agency.

Under the direction of the Chief of Police, create and maintain effective working relationships with the community, school district personnel, other law enforcement agencies, and juvenile and social service agencies. The SRO will act as a department liaison with other groups as needed in the course of their duties, or as designated by the Chief of Police because of the nature of their duties.

Wear approved department uniform, formal business attire or business casual with appropriate logos and name badges depending on the time of school year, the type of school activity or program, and the requests of the school and/or police department. The Chief of Police and the principal shall jointly set expectations and resolve any disputes in this area.

Wear their department authorized duty weapon(s) in accordance with department policy.

KNOWLEDGE, ABILITIES, SKILLS AND QUALIFICATIONS:

The Grass Valley Police Department shall work in collaboration with NJUHSD for the continued implementation of youth crime prevention programs.

As communities become increasingly divided over political or cultural lines and continue to grapple with the pandemic's economic impacts, there is a growing call to keep conversations respectful and professional. For this reason, the Municipal Association of South Carolina, and the Illinois Municipal League amongst others, have developed Civility Pledges to engage in civil behavior with each other as well as with residents and meeting attendees. Civility Pledges focuses on the idea that all people have the right to be treated with respect, courtesy, and openness. We value all input. We commit to conduct ourselves at all times with civility and courtesy to each other. Some cities also have a civility pledge that can be published or recited at meetings.

<u>Background Information</u>: The City of Grass Valley maintains approximately sixty-eight centerline miles of roadway. Roadway widths vary from one lane alleys and minor roads such as Clipper Lane and Finnie Street, to five lane arterials such as Brunswick and Nevada City Highway. For maintenance purposes a common measurement of the total expanse of the road network is to consider lane miles; calculated by multiplying the centerline mileage of a road by the number of lanes it has. With recent annexations it is estimated that the City of Grass Valley maintains approximately 132 lane miles of roadway.

In 2023, the average estimated cost for a full rehabilitation of one lane mile of roadway is between \$800,000 to \$1,000,000. Costs can vary widely for City projects due to associated work often required in a "Street" project including drainage improvements, subgrade restoration, roadway widening, and complete streets components such as bicycle lanes, sidewalks, and curb ramps.

Twenty years ago, the primary, and mostly solitary, source of dedicated street maintenance funding was motor vehicle fuel taxes, or "Gas Tax", made up of State and Federal taxes on gasoline sales. The Gas Tax revenue received by the City averages around \$300,000 annually for the ten years between 2003-2013. This amount fell well below what would have been required to suitably maintain the roadway network and led to years of gradually deteriorating pavement conditions.

Fortunately, added revenue streams were since implemented to fund street rehabilitation projects, including Senate Bill 1 of 2017, establishing the Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Account, which nearly doubled the available street maintenance funds. Additionally, the City adopted Measure N in 2013 and subsequently Measure E in 2018, which identified significant funding for street improvements projects. The current portion of Measure E revenue allocated to street projects is approximately \$1.2 million. Added with the estimated gas tax revenues, the City has approximately \$1.85 million available for street rehabilitation work in FY2023-24.

Considering a 20-25-year pavement life, the number of lane miles of roadway in the City, and the current high costs of street rehabilitation work described above, available funding still falls short of that required to fully maintain the transportation system and to make up for years of

deferred maintenance. However, thanks predominantly to Measure E, more recent funding levels for street improvements at least allow the City to execute one to two major street rehabilitation annually and gradually chip away at improving roadway surfacing throughout the City. Engineering staff typically attempt to split these projects up between high volume roadways and residential neighborhoods as much as possible.

A summary of the major street improvements projects completed over the last 20 years is attached. Staff will present Council with an update of past street improvements expenditures and discuss projects in the budget and under development.

<u>Background Information</u>: The purpose of this gathering is to discuss Fire and Vegetation Mitigation and managing the risks that Grass Valley may face due to extreme weather events and wildfires.

First for the Council to even put a proposed general sales tax on the March 2024 Election, it must declare a fiscal emergency and adopt the proposed resolution by a unanimous vote of the City Council. Without the unanimous vote from the Council, the Council would have to wait until the November 2024 Election to place something on the ballot for consideration. Thus, staff will be asking the Council to vote on declaring a Fiscal Emergency as stated in Resolution 2023-57.

Next, the staff will provide a summary of the comments received so far and suggest gathering more feedback from the public at the meeting regarding Fire, Vegetation Management, and a possible expenditure plan for a sales tax. After hopefully receiving additional input and more comments, the staff will talk about potential next steps, including scheduling more meetings and setting decision points for the City Council to meet the deadline for putting something on the ballot in March 2024. The staff will present this information for consideration at the Council Meeting.

<u>Council Goals/Objectives</u>: The execution of this action attempts to achieve Strategic Goal #5 - High Performance Government and Quality Service.

<u>Fiscal Impact</u>: At this point, there is very little fiscal impact. The Fiscal Impact would come about if the Council decides to move forward with a Special Election in March 2024, which could easily exceed \$100,000, but there are sufficient funds in City reserves if the City Council deems this issue to be a fiscal emergency.

RESOLUTION No. 2023-57

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GRASS VALLEY DECLARING A FISCAL EMERGENCY DUE TO LACK OF FUNDS FOR FIRE PERSONNEL AND LAND MANAGEMENT REQUIRED TO COMBAT WILDFIRES AND EXTREME WEATHER CONDITIONS

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to submit a general transactions and use tax ordinance for voter approval; and

WHEREAS, for the Council to call a special election on the proposed general sales tax for March 2024, it must declare the fiscal emergency and adopt the proposed resolution by a unanimous vote of the City Councilmembers present.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GRASS VALLEY AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. **FISCAL EMERGENCY.** The Council finds that unless it takes urgent action by placing this general tax measure on the ballot at the March 5, 2023 special election, the Grass Valley Fire Department will lack necessary funding for fire personnel and land management required to combat wildfires and extreme weather conditions and to fund other City services. Accordingly, the City Council hereby declares an emergency pursuant to the California Constitution, article XIII C, section 2, subdivision (b).
- 2. **CEQA**. The adoption of this Resolution is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (Public Resources Code §§ 21000 et seq. ("CEQA") and 14 Cal. Code Reg. §§ 15000 et seq. ("CEQA Guidelines"). The calling of a Special Municipal Election is not a project within the meaning of CEQA Guidelines section 15378, subsection (b)(4) [funding of unspecified projects] and section 15061, subsection (b)(3) [common sense exemption]. While some expenditures of the proceeds of the tax might have impacts on the environment, it would be unduly speculative to identify and evaluate those impacts now. That analysis will be more usefully done when the projects to be funded are selected and defined.
- 3. **CERTIFICATION**. The City Clerk of the City of Grass Valley shall certify to the passage and adoption of this resolution and its approval by the City Council and shall cause the same to be listed in the records of the City.
- 4. **SEVERABILITY**. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this Resolution or its application to any person or circumstance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Resolution or its application to other persons and circumstances. The City Council of the City of Grass Valley hereby declares that it would have adopted this Resolution and each section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, phrases, or portions be

declared invalid or unconstitutional and, to that end, the provisions hereof are hereby declared to be severable.

5. **EFFECTIVE DATE**. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption as a measure affecting an election.





<u>Background Information</u>: The city recently completed the pedestrian improvements and renovation of Mill Street which is stimulating a revitalization of downtown. Staff have received inquiries from property owners about the possibility of converting upperlevel offices to residential use along the Mill Street pedestrian corridor. However, while the TC zone allows 20 dwelling units per acre, most of the buildings in this zone sit on very small lots, prohibiting them from taking advantage of the generous density allowance. Many of the buildings are large in size, and with the demise of office space interest in favor of home-office use, much of the non-ground level space is underutilized. An ordinance to incentivize the non-ground floor uses for residential use will provide the following benefits:

- Add to the revitalization effort of downtown
- Encourage housing close to employment opportunities and close to the Tinloy Transit Station
- Encourage investment in older buildings
- Further the goals of the General Plan:
 - Land Use- 9-LUP: Provide for higher residential densities on infill sites and in the Downtown area.
 - Land Use- 23-LUP: Encourage mixed-use developments incorporating a variety of densities on infill sites and in areas proposed for annexation.

 Housing- HE Goal D, POLICY 1: The City shall encourage private reinvestment in older residential neighborhoods and private rehabilitation of housing. (While the TC zone is not considered a residential neighborhood, but the program encourages reinvestment in older buildings for the purpose of housing.)

Staff anticipates that the ordinance will include parameters for the following:

- Maximum density limit within the Town Core
- A provision to allow or not allow dwelling units to be used as short-term rentals
- Off-street parking requirement for residential units
- Level of permit review (administrative vs discretionary)
- Restriction on expansion of existing buildings

At least two special studies will be necessary to consider consistency with the general plan and compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). A feasibility study will be used to determine the number of dwelling units the adopted general plan anticipated within the TC zone so that staff can recommend a density limit that is consistent. The city will also need to rely on a traffic study based on Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT), which is the metric used for determining impacts under CEQA, and also based on Level of Service (LOS), which is the metric used in the city's general plan.

<u>Council Goals/Objectives</u>: Direction to pursue this ordinance supports the 2022 Strategic Plan Update, Goal #1: The City of Grass Vally is dedicated to promoting programs and projects that improve livability and enhance the character and charm of Grass Valley.

<u>Fiscal Impact</u>: Development of the ordinance will require staff time and will require a consultant-prepared feasibility study and a traffic study, the cost of which will be better understood with responses to an RFP.
