Background:

- PLHA: created by the 2017 Building Homes and Jobs Act – a.k.a SB2
- SB2 established a \$75 recording fee on certain real estate documents
- These funds provided a permanent source of funding to all local governments to help cities and counties implement plans to increase affordable housing stock
- 2020- Western Nevada County Regional Housing Trust Fund (WNCRHTF) formed to increase impact of PLHA funds with County a lead agency.





Background (cont.):

- Coordinate funding to make greater impact
- Increase the supply of housing for households at or below 60% of area median income (80% for OOC Projects)
- Increase assistance to affordable owner-occupied workforce housing
- Assist persons experiencing or at risk of homelessness

- Nevada City: \$136,870
- Nevada Co: <u>\$566,474</u>

To whom it may concern,

You don't often get email from

My name is Aria Griffis and I'm writing you today regarding the parklet at 114 West Main Street. I have some major concerns about the complete closure of the public city sidewalk on the uphill side.

My business, Make Local Habit resides at 112 West Main Street next door. When coming to work on October 10th I looked up the sidewalk to see it completely blocked off by a large planter that looked to be an accident, like it got pushed into the way unintentionally. Come to find out, it was not and it is subject to stay this way. Since this incident, I have remained close to the front door to observe the confusion and safety risks this is causing. It also forces people to walk directly around my store and bypass looking in my window. Similar to putting in a highway next to a small town that you used to have to drive though.

The design of this parklet does not put public safety as a top priority. The space is inadequate to let the normal flow of traffic pass by each other. Now that the public is being forced to walk right to the edge of vehicle traffic, you can't step off the side walk to let a wheel chair, stroller, dog on a leash, or child holding a hand. Day after day, I am witness to the general public wondering how they are allowed to just close the public side walk. As a business owner in downtown, not so much of an A-frame sign can be placed on the sidewalk in front of my business. But you can infact choose to block the entire city sidewalk and cause an inconvenience for the general public? When reading over the information in the hand book for the city planning. I found many statements to be questioned as how the plan for this parklet came about.

The concerns I have for the lack of foot traffic since this debacle are very worrisome. I have had my business downtown for 14 years and I come to know my numbers. This is devastating to my business. Our busiest time of year is quickly approaching and those tables will be sitting out there empty, due to weather. While I stand in my store watching the people walk around my front door. Being a small business in today's world and economy is tuff and added hurdles like these are detrimental.

When a project like this is in the planning phase and will have direct affects on surrounding properties, it should involve these parties. As stated by the handbook. My landlord or myself heard nothing of this in the planning phase. There is even a very large planter encroaching under our awning, also not to be mentioned it was coming.

My hope is to have the city sidewalk open to the general public once again. For many reasons this sidewalk closure is unnecessary and brings more inconvenience and safety risks than before.

Thank you for considering my concerns.

Dear City Council Members -

I am a tenant at 112 W. Main St, where I do my remote work for FREED. My family also own this property.

I am writing to express concerns about the barricade of the west side of the parklet at 114 W. Main St. and the second planter blocking portions of the sidewalk extension around the parklet on the east side.

After several inquiries to City of Grass Valley staff I have heard multiple conflicting reports -

First that such a barricade would not be allowed, as there should be pedestrian traffic flow on both sides of the parklet.

Second that this barricade was placed there because ABC rules require an "enclosed patio" which is why the city placed the barricade. I spoke to an ABC employee working on the license for this property, and they had no knowledge of said parklet or it's enclosure status. I have requested further inquiry from ABC as to their requirements for this parklet.

Finally, Tim Kiser reported to my father, Dave Williams, that the barricade was placed there due to the historic path of travel on the city sidewalk being non-ADA compliant. Apparently, the barricade is the solution that the city thinks will force the path of travel to the newly constructed, ADA compliant sidewalk. If the city was aware of this non-compliant area of sidewalk, that should have been corrected during the construction of the parklet.

I met with City of Grass Valley Fire Inspector, Rob Arnad, regarding the barricade being a potential fire code violation, as it blocks the means of egress from the building to the public sidewalk. Although the barricade itself is not a violation, the second planter on the east side of the parklet does partially block the newly constructed path of travel, which is an issue because it needs to have the full width available if it is going to remain in compliance.

A few issues here -

--The barricade planter may solve an issue with ADA accessibility on the sidewalk for those with mobility disabilities, but placing a large barricade in an historic path of travel with no indication for blind or visually disabled pedestrians of the new path of travel certainly is NOT accessible.

--The newly constructed path of travel may be technically accessible, but it creates a situation where pedestrians have to funnel from the much wider sidewalk east and west of the parklet to travel around it. For anyone with small children, pets, mobility aids, or service animals, this makes travel more difficult. It also feels quite unsafe to be walking so close to traffic with no barriers between the traffic and the sidewalk. Of course, there was no barrier on the historic path of travel, but with the much wider sidewalk, and a parking space between pedestrians and traffic, it did not feel unsafe to walk along the path.

Thank you for considering alternative solutions to this issue that will create true accessibility and protect the safety of pedestrians with and without disabilities in our community.

Mesa Management, Inc., and McKnight Crossing Shopping Center express gratitude to City staff for working with us on our Re-Imagine project to create a warm, inviting, destination so that people can enjoy an enhanced lifestyle experience.

There are two items we wish to share with the City Council.

1) We believe the new proposed tax increase will be an additional burden on local Grass Valley consumers and retail businesses at a time when local retail businesses and consumers are under extraordinary pressure due to inflation and the diminishing spending power of the dollar.

We believe that the added tax, although intended to raise revenue, will lead to higher prices in Grass Valley compared to surrounding communities, less sales due to the higher prices, and more retail sales leakage as customers flee Grass Valley to take their business to more lucrative surrounding communities.

2) We have evidence that in the past six months with the opening of just Target here at McKnight Crossing in Grass Vally, that Grass Valley has seen a projected increase in annual retail sales of just over \$13 million. This was leakage that had left Grass Valley and the surrounding communities for Auburn. See attached chart data from Placer.ai Labs.

In summary, we believe by keeping taxes low, by encouraging redevelopment, by reducing costly regulations, dynamic retail businesses will come to Grass Valley and attract consumers from all over to travel to Grass Valley to enjoy the enhanced lifestyle while spending their money. This will increase the tax revenues to the City while benefiting all.

FOURTH AMENDED EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT BETWEEN CITY OF GRASS VALLEY AND TIM KISER

This Fourth Amended Employment Agreement ("Agreement") is effective as of ______ 2023 by and between the City of Grass Valley ("City") and Tim Kiser ("City Manager" or "Employee") (collectively, the "Parties").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the City and Employee entered into an Employment Agreement (the "Original Agreement") for his service in the position of City Manager effective September 12, 2017 and amended that Original Agreement effective September 1, 2020 ("First Amendment"), effective September 1, 2021 ("Second Amendment"), and effective June 26, 2022 ("Third Amendment"); and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to extend Employee's employment beyond the original expiration date in the Original Agreement and to convert the term of his at-will employment to an indefinite term; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to provide Employee with a Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) retroactively and also prospectively while Employee continues to remain employed with the City; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to increase the City Manager's retirement medical coverage premium allowance from \$500 to \$800 as of the effective date of this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Parties may modify the Original Agreement or Amendments thereto upon mutual written agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements set forth herein the adequacy of which is hereby acknowledged by the Parties to be sufficient, the Parties agree as follows:

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. Section 3 (Term of Employment) of the Original Agreement is hereby amended and replaced by the following to read as follows:

"3. Term of Employment

Pursuant to the provisions of the Grass Valley City Charter, and City Municipal Code, City Manager serves at the pleasure of the City Council on an "at will" basis and has no vested right to his employment during the term of this Agreement, subject to the terms and provision of this Agreement as set forth below. City Manager's employment with the City shall continue for an indefinite and unspecified period, until terminated by either Party under this Agreement."

2. Section 5.A. (Compensation) of the Original Agreement as amended by the First, Second, and Third Amendments is hereby further amended and replaced with the following to read as follows:

"5. Compensation

A. The City Manager's annual salary shall be \$237,228 effective September 12, 2023 (to reflect a COLA of 3% from City Manager's previous \$\$230,318 annual salary). Any COLA earned from September 12, 2023 to date shall be paid to City Manager at the next regular scheduled pay date. For each subsequent calendar year starting January 1, 2024, City Manager's annual salary is subject to the same COLA adjustments for the same effective dates as applied to the annual salaries of the City's executive team (Directors, Fire Chief, Police Chief, etc.)."

3. Section 13.C.1. (Retirement Program and Deferred Compensation) of the Original Agreement is hereby amended and replaced with the following to read as follows:

"1. Employees who become subject to this Plan on or before July 1, 2011, who retire from the City in good standing, who have at least five years of Grass Valley service, who elect to retain CALPERs medical coverage and who are of full retirement age shall be entitled to payment of up to \$800 towards the CALPERS premium for a single party until such time as the Employee is eligible to receive Medicare or is hired and has healthcare coverage available from the new employment."

4. All other terms, conditions, and provisions of the Original Agreement, and Amendments thereto, to the extent not modified by this Agreement, shall remain in full force and effect.

TO EFFECTUATE THIS AGREEMENT, the Parties have caused their duly authorized representatives to execute this Agreement on the dates set forth below.
