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PROCLAMATION

NATIONAL HOSPICE MONTH NOVEMBER 2022

Whereas, hospice and palliative care is a specialized form of healthcare for people with serious and life-limiting illnesses. Provided by an interdisciplinary team of physicians, nurses, social workers, pharmacists, allied therapists, psychological and spiritual counselors, and trained community volunteers, hospice and palliative care is person-centered, individualized treatment to accommodate the needs and wishes of a patient and their family. At the center of hospice and palliative care is the belief that each of us has the right to live and die pain-free and with dignity, and that our families will receive the necessary support to allow us to do so.

Whereas, the Medicare Hospice Benefit was signed into law in 1982, and now almost 1.5 million Americans are served by hospice annually. Hospices operate in all 50 states, and there are over 4,500 Medicare-certified hospices nationwide. Perhaps most importantly, hospice care is available to all Medicare Beneficiaries in their homes or place of residence, and provides care not only for the patient, but also for their families during the illness and after, helping them cope with the grief of losing a loved one.

Whereas, palliative care is specialized medical care for people with serious illness, focusing on providing relief from the symptoms and stress of a serious illness and to improve the quality of life for both the patient and the family. It is similar to hospice care, in that it is a person-centered, interdisciplinary approach to treating serious illness. But there remains a great need to increase public awareness about the benefits of hospice and palliative care, and to assure access to all Americans regardless of their diagnosis, prognosis, or place of residence.

Whereas, all American patients and their caregivers deserve access to the important care and support that hospice and palliative care provide. Unfortunately, just as the baby boomer generation is reaching their senior years, the hospice and palliative care workforce is struggling to keep up with demand. If action is not taken, there will be only one physician for every 26,000 seriously ill patients by 2030.

Whereas, during this National Hospice and Palliative Care Month, the National Hospice and Palliative Care Organization urges all Americans to not only explore the benefits of hospice and palliative care for themselves and their families, but also to salute the important work that hospice and palliative care providers and volunteers do to protect the dignity of human life, support the courageous caregivers, and help grieving Americans cope with the loss of a loved one.

Whereas, the members of the National Hospice and Palliative Care Organization urge Congress to ensure a strong American healthcare workforce to address the needs of aging baby boomers and Americans facing serious illness and the end of life.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Directors of the National Hospice and Palliative Care Organization so hereby proclaim November 2022 as National Hospice and Palliative Care Month. NHPCO urges all government agencies, the healthcare community, appropriate private organizations, and the people of the United States to observe the month of November with appropriate programs and activities to raise awareness, recognize, and support hospice and palliative care.

RESOLUTION NO. 2022-81

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GRASS VALLEY RECOGNIZING THE IMPORTANCE OF PRESERVING AND PROTECTING THE CULTURAL AND HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE, AS WELL AS SUPPORTING THE PETITION FOR FEDERAL RECOGNITION OF THE NEVADA CITY RANCHERIA NISENAN TRIBE

WHEREAS, Chief Charley Cully of the Nisenan Tribe obtained the 75.48-acre parcel on Cement Hill in Nevada City, California as Sacramento Indian Allotment No. 1; and

WHEREAS, by Executive Order 1772 issued by President Woodrow Wilson, the Nevada City Rancheria was established in 1913; and

WHEREAS, the Nevada City Rancheria Nisenan Tribe, along with forty other California Indian Rancherias, was removed from Federal trust status on August 18, 1958, under the California Indian Rancheria Termination Act; and

WHEREAS, despite most California Indian Rancherias having been restored to Federal status, the Nevada City Nisenan Tribe has been unable to regain its Federal status, therefore has not been able to benefit from beneficial Federal Indian Programs; and

WHEREAS, on December 15, 2020, the Nevada County Board of Supervisors adopted Resolution 20-533 recognizing the historical significance of the Nisenan Tribe to Nevada County and the state of California as well as supporting the restoration of the Tribe's Federal recognition; and

WHEREAS, the Nevada County Historical Society adopted Resolution 2020-01 supporting the restoration of the Tribe's Federal recognition on May 8, 2019; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Nevada City adopted Resolution 2020-72 supporting the restoration of Federal recognition to the Nevada City Rancheria Nisenan Tribe on September 23, 2020; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Grass Valley acknowledges the continuous existence of the Nevada City Rancheria Nisenan Tribe and supports the restoration of its Federal recognition.

As you may know, the cannabis industry is burdened with over-regulation and tax liability, which is hindering legal operators and giving black-market operators the fuel they need to not only survive, but THRIVE.

California regulators have taken note of these burdens and are now implementing and pushing for cannabis tax reforms to mitigate the damages caused by over-taxation on the industry as a whole.

The City of Grass Valley's retail tax, which states "For every person who operates a dispensary or delivery business: four percent (4%) of gross receipts" is absolutely fair and reasonable. However, the additional taxes imposed on cannabis business operators which states "An additional tax of up to one percent (1%) of the gross receipts from high potency cannabis and each high potency cannabis product cultivated, manufactured or sold by the taxpayer, multiplied by the percent of tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) content of the product above 17%" so encumberson that many businesses will not be able to operate, and if they do operate their sales will be so little that the revenue generated by the City will be so dimal that the cannabis program is overall pointless. Additionally, this tax opens the door for black-market activities to thrive in the City of Grass Valley.

Almost every product at a cannabis dispensary is over 17%. Most cannabis flowers are between 25-35%, Edibles and drinks can be between 10-20% depending on concentration but are usually measured in MG not %, vape cartridges and concentrates are usually between 70-99%.

What I purpose is repealing the High THC tax in the City of Grass Valley.

If you'd like the photo, advise how I can send it) At this location (in afore mentioned photo) I witnessed a toddler slip as the asphalt was so wet it was draining off the sidewalk. Luckily her father was right there. I counted at least 30 spots throughout the main project area where a potential trip and/or fall could occur. We are coming up on the holidays, during which I hope for the businesses sake, there will be an influx of visitors. If just one trips and/or falls there could be a lawsuit. On the advice of a friend in the legal field, even though the project is within the jurisdiction of the City of Grass Valley, I'm forwarding this to the NCBOS to advise of my concerns over liability, as a lawsuit will list many parties and could include them. There were many other issues of concern, however, this one, maybe due to my career, stuck out and led me to want to report it to you with the hopes the "decision makers", which includes the city manager, will make " better " decisions with the constituency in mind. A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GRASS VALLEY AUTHORIZING REMOTE TELECONFERENCE MEETINGS OF THE CITY COUNCIL AND OTHER LEGISLATIVE BODIES OF THE CITY PURSUANT TO GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 54953(e)

WHEREAS, Government Code section 54953(e), as amended by Assembly Bill No. 361, allows legislative bodies to hold open meetings by teleconference without reference to otherwise applicable requirements in Government Code section 54953(b)(3), so long as the legislative body complies with certain requirements, there exists a declared state of emergency, and one of the following circumstances is met:

- 1. State or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing.
- 2. The legislative body is holding the meeting for the purpose of determining, by majority vote, whether meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees.
- 3. The legislative body has determined, by majority vote, that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees.

WHEREAS, the Governor of California proclaimed a state of emergency pursuant to Government Code section 8625 on March 4, 2020; and

WHEREAS, the City Council previously adopted Resolution No. 59 on October 26, 2021 finding that the requisite conditions exist for the City Council and other legislative bodies of the City, including the Planning Commission, Development Review Commission, and Historical Commission to conduct teleconference meetings under California Government Code section 54953(e); and

WHEREAS, Government Code section 54953(e)(3) requires the legislative body adopt certain findings by majority vote within 30 days of holding a meeting by teleconference under Government Code section 54953(e), and then adopt such findings every 30 days thereafter; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to continue holding its public meetings by teleconference consistent with Government Code section 54953(e), and to authorize other legislative bodies of the City, including the Planning Commission, Development Review Commission, and Historical Commission to do the same.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GRASS VALLEY DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. <u>Recitals</u>. The Recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated into this Resolution by this reference.

Section 2. <u>Conditions are Met</u>. The City Council hereby finds and declares the following, as required by Government Code section 54953(e)(3):

- 1. The City Council has reconsidered the circumstances of the state of emergency declared by the Governor pursuant to his or her authority under Government Code section 8625; and
- 2. The state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of members of the City Council and other legislative bodies of the City to meet safely in person.

Section 3. <u>Meeting Requirements</u>. All meetings held pursuant to Government Code section 54953(e) shall comply with the requirements of that section and all other applicable provisions of the Ralph M. Brown Act (Government Code section 54950 et seq.).

Section 4. <u>Regular Findings</u>. Pursuant to Government Code section 54953(e)(3), if the Town Council desires to continue holding its public meetings by teleconference consistently with Government Code section 54953(e), it shall make findings not later than 30 days after the meeting at which this Resolution was adopted, and every 30 days thereafter, as required by that section.

Section 5. <u>Effective Date</u>. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

Background Information: On May 10, 2021, Governor Newsom modified a State of Emergency Proclamation that declared that a State of Emergency to exist in California due to severe drought conditions to include 41 counties, including Nevada County. The Proclamation directed state agencies to partner with local water suppliers to promote conservation through the Save Our Water campaign, a critical resource used by Californians during the 2012-2016 drought. Some municipalities have already adopted mandatory local water-saving requirements, and many more have called for voluntary water use reductions.

Nevada Irrigation District (NID) declared a drought emergency throughout the District's service area on April 28, 2021, which includes portions of the City of Grass Valley, and requested that customers conserve 10 percent of their normal water usage. Both NID and Nevada City have now mandated at least 20% conservation requirements.

On June 22, 2021, City Council approved Resolutions No. 2021-41 declaring a local emergency due to drought conditions and No.2021-42 mandating water conservation. All treated Water Customers are required to reduce water use by 20%.

<u>Council Goals/Objectives</u>: This resolution executes portions of work tasks towards achieving/maintaining Strategic Plan - Water and Wastewater Systems and Underground Infrastructure. The City of Grass Valley is devoted to providing a safe Place to Live, Work and Play.

<u>Fiscal Impact</u>: The Fiscal Impact to the Water Fund should be minor, but if the drought continues for several years the impact could be more significant.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GRASS VALLEY AMENDING THE WHISPERING PINES SPECIFIC PLAN.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GRASS VALLEY AS FOLLOWS:

<u>SECTION 1.</u> The Whispering Pines Specific Plan is hereby amended as shown in **Exhibit "A**". Bold text represents new text of the SP - 1A.1 Zone, which is to be added to the SP - 1A Zone.

<u>SECTION 2.</u> In compliance with Whispering Pines Specific Plan, the City Council adopts the following findings in support of the Whispering Pines Specific Plan Amendments:

1. The proposed amendments are consistent with the General Plan. *Rationale: The* 2020 General Plan acknowledges the previously adopted Whispering Pines Specific Plan and identifies policies reflected in the Whispering Pines Specific Plan. The proposed amendments allow for a site-specific use that is compatible with adjoining uses in the SP – 1A Zone.

2. Changes in the community have occurred since the adoption of the Specific Plan warranting an amendment as requested. *Rationale: The Whispering Pines Specific Plan was adopted in 1984 with a range of uses that were common 40 years ago but are less common today. The proposed amendments would permit a site-specific public assembly use in the existing 41,600 square foot building with approval of a Use Permit by the City Council. The site-specific use is not anticipated to have any negative impacts on adjoining land uses in the Whispering Pines Specific Plan area as outlined in the Initial Study/Mitigated Negative Declaration prepared for the project.*

3. The change will benefit the Whispering Pines Specific Plan area. *Rationale:* Occupancy of the existing 41,600 square foot building with a use that primary operates during off hours from adjoining uses will benefit the Specific Plan area. From an Air Quality and Vehicle Miles Traveled standpoint, the site-specific use is anticipated to be less impactful than the current office uses formally occurring in the building. 4. The change is in conformance with the adopted Whispering Pines Specific Plan. *Rationale: The Whispering Pines Specific Plan includes policies, goals, and objectives to reduce land use conflicts and environmental impacts. The site-specific use is compatible with adjoining land uses in the Whispering Pines Specific Plan area.*

5. The change will not adversely affect adjacent properties and can be properly serviced. *Rationale: The amendments permit use of the exiting 41,600 square foot building for public assembly use. The InConcert Sierra public assembly uses have been evaluated and have been determined to be compatible with adjoining uses.*

6. The physical constraints of the property are such that the Whispering Pines Specific Plan Amendment is warranted. *Rationale: There are no physical constraints associated with the property. The 41,500 square foot building is appropriate for the contemplated public assembly use and will not have negative impacts on adjoining uses.*

7. The project is consistent with the applicable sections and development standards in the Development Code. *Rationale: The project is consistent with the Development Standards in the Development Code.*

8. The proposed amendments would not be detrimental to the public interest, health, safety, convenience, or welfare of the City. *Rationale: The proposed amendments and project have been evaluated and do not result in any significant changes that could be detrimental to the public interest, health, safety, convenience, or welfare.*

9. On September 20, 2022, the Grass Valley Planning Commission conducted a public hearing on the proposed Whispering Pines Specific Plan amendments and provided a recommendation of approval of the Whispering Pines Specific Plan Amendments noted in **Exhibit "A"**.

10. The Community Development Department prepared an Initial Study/Mitigated

Negative Declaration as the appropriate level of environmental review for the project. The environmental review was circulated for public review commencing on August 26, 2022, and ending close of business on September 14, 2022.

11. The City Council concurs with the recommendations of the Planning Commission and determines the Initial Study/Mitigated Negative Declaration is the appropriate level of environmental review for the proposed amendments to the Whispering Pines Specific Plan.

<u>SECTION 3.</u> The City Council amends the Whispering Pines Specific Plan through its approval of this ordinance as referenced and noted in **Exhibit "A".**

<u>SECTION 4.</u> This ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days from and after the date of its adoption and a summary of said ordinance shall be published once within fifteen (15) days upon its passage and adoption in The Union, a newspaper of general circulation printed and published in the Grass Valley Area.

Title: Colfax Avenue Repaving Project - Authorization to Award Contract

<u>Recommendation</u>: That Council authorize the City Engineer to execute a construction contract with Hansen Bros. Enterprises for the repaying of Colfax Avenue and Central Avenue, for an amount not to exceed \$150,000.

Background Information: Colfax Avenue between Ophir Street and Hansen Way is an arterial roadway that has experienced a steady decline in its pavement condition for the past several years. This year the deterioration accelerated with the development of numerous potholes, pavement cracking and a small sinkhole due to erosion from a compromised underground drainage culvert.

Up until a few weeks ago Caltrans owned the right of way of Colfax Ave, otherwise known as Highway 174, which the City has since acquired through a long relinquishment process. Caltrans has contracted with Hansen Bros. Enterprises over the past several months to perform substantial culvert remediation, consisting of injection grouting, joint repair and invert paving of the large concrete culvert under Colfax Avenue that carries Little Wolf Creek. The final step in their rehabilitation project is the replacement of the pavement roadway surface, currently planned for only those areas overlying the repaired culvert.

In order to avoid a patchwork of newly replaced pavement areas and older, deteriorating roadway, the City discussed the possibility of partnering with Caltrans to see the entire section of Colfax Ave repaved. The opportunity exists in the next few weeks to utilize Hansen Bros Enterprises paving crews already on site, to complete this work for the City if given the go ahead. The work would include cold planning of the entire road cross section and placement of a new 2.5" Hot Mix Asphalt pavement section, as well as new painted pavement markings and striping. The City has requested to include a similar treatment on the adjacent Central Ave to Memorial Park, which is also greatly in need of rehabilitation.

Hansen Bros Enterprises has proposed to execute this work at an very reasonable price, as compared to recent similar paving contracts. Also considering they will already be mobilized for paving operations and all the work could be performed more efficiently at one time, rather than stopping and starting in different areas, the cost borne by the City is lowest by piggybacking onto the Caltrans contract with Hansen Bros Enterprises

at this time. The total cost will be based upon the final limits of street section replaced,^L estimated at \$150,000. Funds identified for annual street maintenance projects are available in the current budget to fund this work. It is requested that Council authorize the City Engineer to execute a construction contract with Hansen Bros. Enterprises, for an amount not to exceed \$150,000.

Background Information: Annually, the City of Grass Valley and the Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC) evaluates the Impact Fee Programs and the Engineering News Record Construction Cost Index (ENR-CCI) for San Francisco to determine if applying an inflation increase as described in the programs is applicable.

On April 26, 2022, the City Council adopted Resolution 2022-19 approving an inflation adjustment for the Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee (RTMF) program to reflect the increase adopted by the NCTC. The fees from the previous fee schedule were increased by the approved 8% inflation adjustment.

Subsequent to this adjustment, Staff was notified by NCTC that the current fee schedule did not match the RTMF fees as adopted by NCTC. It was determined that a prior inflation adjustment was approved in one year, but did not carry over in the next year's adjustment calculations.

Staff proposes to increase the RTMF by the amounts necessary to correct the prior miscalculation, to properly match the fees currently approved by NCTC. The attached Resolution includes an exhibit of the proposed fees and the increases required to affect these changes.

<u>Council Goals/Objectives</u>: An increase in impact fees executes portions of work tasks towards achieving/maintaining Strategic Plan - Economic Development and City Infrastructure Investment.

Fiscal Impact: The adjusted fee schedule results in slightly higher development impact fees to be paid by developers.
