Public Comment for the City of Grass Valley's October 14th City Council Meeting: Public Hearing for the Memorial Park Magenta Drain Restoration Project

Sent to: public@cityofgrassvalley.com

As Programs Director of Wolf Creek Community Alliance, I am writing to encourage the City to consider recent arsenic discharges from Empire Mine into Magenta Drain and Memorial Park, before completing their plans to take down the fencing and encourage public access to the creek. Low levels of arsenic are continually present in this stream, and higher levels in violation of the State Park's NPDES permit occurred in March and April 2023 and June 2024. Twenty discharge violations for excess manganese and/or iron also occurred in 2023-24.

It is unclear to us at this time whether these concentrations of arsenic were high enough to be of potential health concern if they were to recur in the future after the fences are removed and toddlers are invited to splash in the creek. Our hope is that they would not be, but we have engaged a toxicologist to review the data and provide objective third-party expertise. We hope to have their review available before the City plans to finalize the restoration plan and design in Feb/March 2026 and put the construction out for bid.

These discharges appear to have occurred as a result of circumstances outside the State Park's control, and corrective actions undertaken by the State Park last winter appear to have improved the discharge conditions considerably. Additional actions are still needed, however, and are planned for upcoming seasons including summer 2026. We encourage the City to be in communication with the State Park regarding these additional clean-out actions within the Magenta Drain Passive Treatment System, and to consider the timing of these actions when making decisions relative to the Memorial Park project and its construction/public access timeline.

The State Park is implementing additional plans for preventing future discharge recurrences to the extent feasible. As the Magenta Drain Passive Treatment System will need to be maintained in perpetuity, however, there will also need to be communication protocols in place between the State Park, City, and Memorial Park visitors for the potentiality of future discharges if public access to the creek is restored. It may also be helpful for the restoration project design to consider the potential for rare, temporary closures to public access if/when problematic discharges recur.

We plan to launch a community engagement project in relation to the Empire Mine cleanups later this season. We would love to collaborate with the City as part of this work, in service of the community.

In general, Wolf Creek Community Alliance is very much in favor of restoration projects such as this. Before the recent arsenic discharges, we have advocated for this very project of Magenta Drain restoration within Memorial Park. It may still be a wonderful project for the community, but must be planned with nuance given the information upstream, for the best interests of community environmental health.

Thank you for the opportunity to express these concerns.

<u>Background Information</u>: On September 18, 2025, Staff issued a Requests for Proposals for Residential and Commercial Landscaping and Lighting District - Landscape Maintenance Services. The City of Grass Valley is responsible for the management of numerous Landscaping and Lighting (L&L) Districts citywide, including six (6) Residential and two (2) Commercial Zones, as well as three (3) Business Assessment Districts (BAD). L&L and BAD Districts are funding mechanisms used to pay for landscaping, lighting and other improvements and services in public areas. As a form of benefit assessment, they are funded by levies placed on the property tax bills each year in a defined area of benefit and collected by the City to pay for improvements and services in those areas.

Although many firms expressed interest in the RFP, only one consultant ultimately submitted a proposal by the deadline, Weiss Landscaping, Inc. The proposal was reviewed by Staff and deemed responsive, and Weiss has a history of successful contract on other landscape installation and maintenance work for the City.

The initial contract term will be a three-year agreement and the contract amount for base landscape maintenance services proposed by Weiss is \$10,610 monthly or \$127,320.00 annually. Additionally, variable added work is often required in L&L and BAD zones throughout the year; either unexpected repair work, plant and facility replacements or other one-time improvements proposed by the Engineer's Report prepared for each District annually.

Staff requests that Council authorize the City Engineer to execute a contract with Weiss Landscaping Inc., for landscaping maintenance services for an initial annual amount of \$127,320.00 and authorize the City Engineer to approve contract change orders up to 10% of the contract amount.

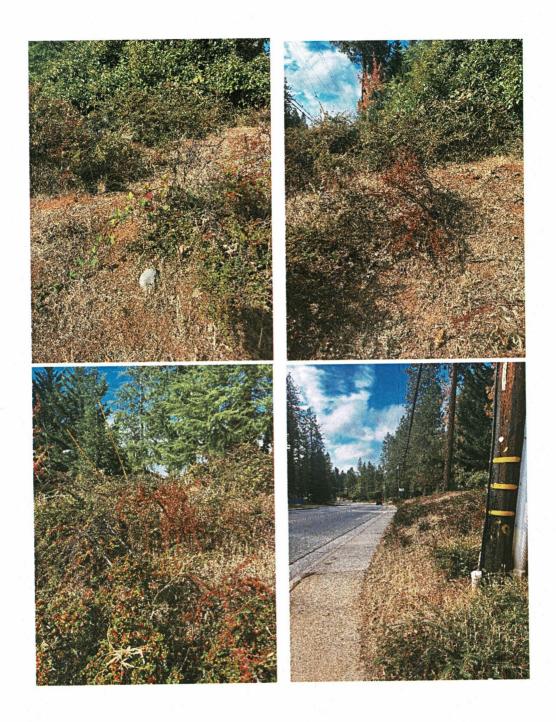

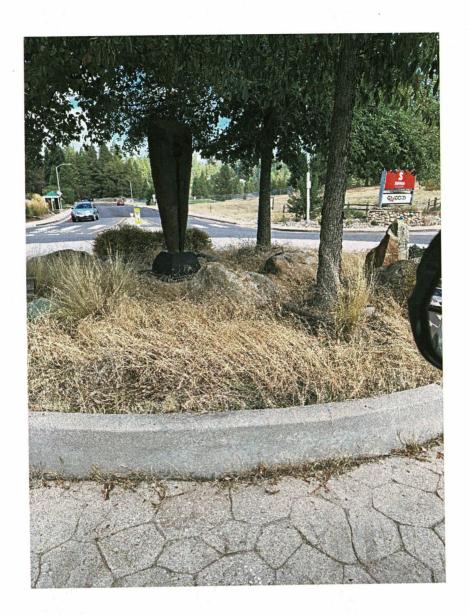

<u>Background Information</u>: The Slate Creek Lift Station Pump Replacement Project involves upgrades and modernization work to the existing lift station in accordance with current design standards and the City's Wastewater Master Plan. <u>Background Information</u>: The deputy police chief is eligible to retire under the City's contracted CalPERS public safety retirement plan. Retirement of the deputy police chief is in the financial interest of the City in that it will create both near-term and long-term budgetary savings. There is existing language within labor contracts of the City that allow for enhanced retiree health plan benefits not currently offered to the deputy police chief, who has served well over 25 years with the City. The proposed amendment to the deputy police chief's employment agreement would be consistent with those benefits provided to Unit 8 of the City's labor units. To accomplish this change, the City will need to execute the Agreement (attached), and if approved, the Agreement will become effective upon approval.

As and added benefit to the City's police department, the deputy police chief would be eligible to return to limited duration/limited assignment specialty roles as a PERS annuitant, the cost of which would be borne by the police department personnel budget savings.

<u>Council Goals/Objectives</u>: This proposed action executes portions of the work tasks towards achieving / maintaining the Strategic Plan goal to maintain a Productive and Efficient Workforce.

<u>Fiscal Impact</u>: Cost differential savings will be realized through the under-filling of the deputy police chief position with the rank of Captain. Vacancy savings, during the vacancy period will result in police department salary budget savings, off-set by unbudgeted cashout payments for vested leaves. The estimated incremental annual costs differential savings is \$74,000+/-, diminishing over time. Any annuitant work

completed post-retirement by the deputy police chief will be covered by vacancy savings in the Police budget.

FOURTH AMENDED EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT BETWEEN CITY OF GRASS VALLEY AND STEVE JOHNSON

This Fourth Amended Employment Agreement ("Agreement") is effective as of the 28th day of October 2025 by and between the City of Grass Valley ("City") and Steve Johnson ("Deputy Police Chief" or "Employee") (collectively, the "Parties").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the City and Employee entered into an Employment Agreement (the "Original Agreement") for their service in the position of Deputy Police Chief effective 2/20/2022; and amended that Original Agreement effective June 26, 2022 ("First Amendment"); and amended the Second Amendment Agreement Effective June 25, 2023 ("Second Amendment"); and amended the Third Amendment Agreement Effective October 8, 2024 ("Third Amendment")

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to provide the Employee with modified retiree health plan benefits in recognition of exemplary service to the City, to retain long-serving employees with more than twenty (20) years of service; and

WHEREAS, parties may modify the Agreement upon mutual written agreement.

NOW, **THEREFORE**, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements set forth herein the adequacy of which is hereby acknowledged by the PARTIES to be sufficient, the PARTIES agree as follows:

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- 1. Remove and replace Item E. of *Appendix A Compensation and Benefits* related to Life Insurance and Long-Term Disability, EAP, Retiree Health Plan, other Benefits, and Special Provisions section, with the attached *Appendix A Compensation and Benefits* dated October 28, 2025, reflecting a change in retiree health plan benefits.
- 2. All other terms, conditions, and provisions of the Original Agreement, First Amendment, Second Amendment, and Third Amendment to the extent not modified by this Agreement, shall remain in full force and effect.

Appendix A - Compensation and Benefits

Life Insurance and Long-Term Disability, EAP, Retiree Health Plan, other Benefits, and Special Provisions

A. EMPLOYEE CONTRIBUTIONS

Employee contributions towards health benefits are on a pre-tax basis and subject to IRS rules.

B. LIFE INSURANCE

The City shall provide term Life insurance benefits for the Employee, without cost to the Employee, of 1.5 times their annual salary up to two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) for the Employee, five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for the Employee's spouse and fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500) for eligible dependent children without cost to the employee.

C. SHORT TERM/LONG TERM DISABILITY INSURANCE

Short Term – There is no short-term disability coverage however employee may elect to pay into State Disability Insurance (SDI) at no cost to the City, or they may use any leave bank to cover short term disability exceeding 10 workdays and with a doctor's note.

Long Term - The City shall provide without cost to the Employee an income protection insurance program that shall insure an Employee's income to a maximum of sixty-six and two thirds percent ($66\ 2/3\%$) of monthly earnings with a ceiling of six thousand dollars (6000) in calculated base. Conditions of coverage shall be controlled by the master agreement with the insurance company.

D. EMPLOYEE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

The City has an established Employee Assistance Program. This program provides confidential counseling help for employees and their families. The Employee Assistance program provides for up to 3 visits.

E. RETIREE HEALTH PLAN BENEFIT

Employees who retire from the City in good standing, who have at least twenty years of Grass Valley service, who are of full retirement age shall be eligible for the following retiree health insurance benefit:

- a. The City will pay the statutory administrative fee for PERS coverage.
- b. The City will pay 50% of the cost for health coverage for the employee or employee plus 1. The amount will not exceed 50% of the lowest cost available PERS insurance plan for Nevada County of the medical plans offered by the City to active employees through PERS, regardless of the plan selected by the employee.

Appendix A - Compensation and Benefits

If the Employee so desires, his/her spouse or family member(s) may be added at the additional cost difference and the Employee pays the difference. If the Employee retiree selects a health plan that costs less than the City's contribution, they will not be eligible to receive the cash difference from the City.

Employees waiving health care coverage shall receive two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) per month less the cost of any elected dental or vision insurance per month until eligible for Medicare or is hired and has healthcare coverage available from the new employment. Employees waiving health care coverage must produce evidence of insurance through another source. Any payment due Employees for waiving medical insurance coverage shall be paid in a lump sum per month.

Personal Leave

The purpose of Personal Leave is to provide Employees the ability to accrue time for vacation, sick leave and personal leave situations.

Employees shall accrue Personal Leave hours at a rate of no less than 256 hours and no more than 328 hours per year based on years of service as set forth below. One twenty-sixth (1/26) of such Personal Leave amount shall accrue each pay period.

No Employee may carry a balance of more than 520 hours of their Personal Leave. Employees who have accumulated 520 hours of Personal Leave will accrue no further Personal Leave until they have used Personal Leave in an amount sufficient to bring their accumulated Personal Leave balance below 520 hours. Employees may convert up to 160 hours of accrued Personal Leave to salary compensation once each year. Personal Leave conversion of a maximum of 160 hours to salary must be submitted by December 20th of each year. 100% of Personal Leave hours in excess of the maximum accrual amount may be converted to banked PERS service credit in accordance with CalPERS regulations.

Employees who become subject to this Plan after July 1, 2011, must convert all accumulated Vacation Leave, Sick Leave to "Personal Leave". Those hours of Sick Leave or Vacation Leave combined in excess of 520 hours will be placed in a Sick Leave and Vacation Leave bank account to be utilized by the Employee, or paid out upon separation from service as set forth herein, or converted to banked PERS service credit in accordance with CalPERS regulations. Upon separation from service, the City shall pay employee a one-time lump sum calculated on Fifty (50%) Percent of the employee's banked unused Sick Leave and one hundred (100%) percent of the employee's banked Vacation Leave. (For example, if an employee is compensated for 450 hours of sick leave at the 50% rate, the uncompensated 225 hours would go to PERS service credit as allowed by PERS.)

Employees will accrue Personal Leave time at the following rates:

1 to 2 years of city service = 256 hours 2 plus years to 5 years = 272 hours (10.46 hours biweekly) 5 plus years to 10 years = 296 hours (11.38 hours biweekly) 10 plus years to 20 years = 316 hours (12.15 hours biweekly) 20 plus years = 328 hours (12.62 hours biweekly)

After 2 plus years of city service, credit for prior public service may be included for purposes of calculating annual time subject to the City Manager approval. Prior public service shall be similar in nature to the duties being performed by the Employee for City to be eligible for this benefit.

Certifications

The City shall pay the costs associated with obtaining and maintaining special certificates that are required by the State of California, the City of Grass Valley or any governmental agency to obtain and maintain as a condition of employment.

Holidays

Employees are entitled to 12 paid holidays as listed below. Recognized Holidays shall include:

New Year's EveNew Year's DayPresidents DayVeterans DayMartin Luther King DayThanksgiving Day

Memorial Day The Day After Thanksgiving

July 4thChristmas EveLabor DayChristmas Day

A paid holiday is equivalent to eight hours, for a total of 96 hours per year. Holiday hours are accrued outside of Personal Leave, must be used within the calendar year accrued. Unused holiday hours may not be carried over into any subsequent calendar year or "cashed out."

Appendix A - Compensation and Benefits

Special Provisions

A. PUBLIC SAFETY ALLOWANCE

The Police Chief, Deputy Police Chief, and Fire Chief shall be provided a uniform and cleaning allowance. The amount of the benefit will be the same as established under Unit 6 for the Police Chief & Deputy Police Chief and under Unit 8 for the Fire Chief.

The Police Chief & Deputy Police Chief shall receive an annual stipend of \$1,000 for attending community events.

B. VEHICLE ALLOWANCE

The Police Chief, Deputy Police Chief, Fire Chief and Public Works Director shall be provided a vehicle. Other Employees may be granted a car allowance subject to the City Manager's approval and in accordance with City adopted policies. Employees will have access to City "Pool" vehicles for conducting City business or will be eligible for mileage reimbursement for personal vehicle use when conducting City business in accordance with City adopted policies.

C. TRAINING/MEMBERSHIPS

Employees shall be entitled to training, travel, workshops, and professional memberships, for the purpose of personal growth and enrichment subject to the annual amounts budgeted each year in the respective department for this purpose. City agrees to reimburse Employee for reasonable expenses for training, travel, workshops and professional memberships which have been authorized by the City Budget and approved in advance by the City Manager. Employee must submit expense receipts, statements or personal affidavits, and audit thereof in like manner as other demands against the City.

D. PUBLIC EMPLOYEES RETIREMENT SYSTEM

All Employees will be members of the California Public Employees Retirement System as provided by the terms of the contracts between the City of Grass Valley and the California Public Employees Retirement System.

Howard and Peggy Levine played indispensable roles in helping to establish the Grass Valley we know today and will know into the future.

In 1975, Peggy and Howard along with their young family moved to Grass Valley where they purchased the old Jones Hospital which they converted to a bed and breakfast named the Swan Levine House. Both became active in a range of local issues, including arts, politics, education and the environment.

From 2000-2012, Howard served as the director for the Grass Valley Downtown Association. In 2012, he was elected to the Grass Valley City Council and served a term as Major. In 2018, Howard was awarded the prestigious Lambert Award for his outstanding community service.

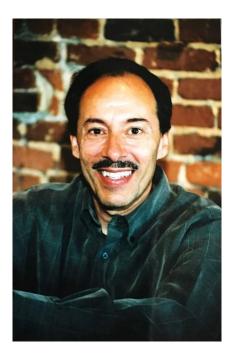

Gerard Tassone passed away on March 20, 2020, at the age of 67, after fighting a courageous battle with pancreatic cancer. Gerard was born in 1952 in Grass Valley, was the youngest of 12 children, and graduated from Mount Saint Mary's School and Nevada Union High School. He attended Santa Clara University where he studied Music and Humanities and attended Sacramento State University where he studied Communications.

Gerard was a dedicated community servant. He was a volunteer Fire Chief and Fire Ground Commander for the Ophir Hill Fire District. Soon after his service with the Department, he was encouraged to become involved with local politics. <u>Background Information</u>: This appeal was heard by City Council at their regular meeting held on October 14, 2025, but due to technical difficulties, the applicant was unable to participate. Council continued the item so that the applicant had a chance to provide comment and present their appeal. The subject gas station was constructed around 1980 when the property was in the jurisdiction of Nevada County. The monument sign appears to have been installed around 1990. Most recently, the site has been operated by the gas company, Speedway. The property owner has decided to rebrand as a Shell station. In the process of this rebranding, and in reviewing the proposed signage, staff determined that several proposed sig nage features, all having to do with lighting, were in conflict with the signage code.

Applicant Sal Pablo, on behalf of SEI Fuel Services, applied for a sign exception permit in August 2025. The application included the following three sign exception requests to allow for the following sign features:

- A light bar proposed around the perimeter of the two pump canopies;
- An internally illuminated price sign; and
- An internally illuminated "Shell" symbol on the two canopies at three locations, as well as on the monument sign.

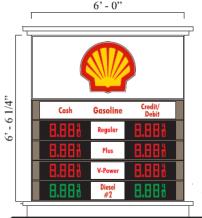
The Development Review Committee reviewed the sign exception at their meeting on September 9, 2025, and unanimously recommended that the Planning Commission approve the internally illuminated price signage, as well as the internally illuminated "Shell" symbol signage. However, they recommended against approving the light bar proposed around the canopy structures citing that they could not make the required finding that the feature "enhances the building architecture."

The planning commission reviewed the sign exception at their meeting on September 16, 2025 and they approved only the price sign illumination and denied both the illuminated logos and the illuminated light bars around the canopies with 3 ayes (McDonald, Wich, and Brouillette), 1 noe

(Gross), and 1 absent (Speights). Commissioner Gross voted no to the motion because he was in favor of allowing the illuminated "Shell" symbol signage.

The applicant filed an appeal of the decision to deny the illuminated "Shell" signs only. Their appeal form and correspondence to staff have indicated they are only seeking overturning of the decision to deny the illuminated "Shell" signage at three locations on the two canopies and on the monument sign. They have indicated that they are open to reducing light levels during nighttime hours as may be specified by City Council.

Existing Site

<u>Regulatory Authority:</u> Section 17.38.050 of the City Municipal Code prohibits internally illuminated signage "except where authorized by a sign exception permit and determined by the review authority to constitute a design element that is integrated with and enhances building architecture."

Pursuant to Table 3-9 GVMC, a sign exception permit may be granted by the planning commission, with a recommendation by the Development Review Committee, when a sign "exceeds standards specified in the sign ordinance." In this case, the proposed signage exceeds the standard of prohibiting internally illuminated signage and explicitly states that it can only be allowed with a sign exception permit.

Environmental Determination: The proposed project qualifies for a Categorical Exemption pursuant to Section 15301, Class 1, of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and Guidelines.

Class 1 Categorical Exemption consists of the operation, repair, maintenance, permitting, leasing, licensing, or minor alternation of existing public or private structures, facilities, mechanical equipment, or topographical features, involving negligible or no expansion of use beyond that existing at the time of the lead agency's determination. The proposed sign exception is intended to aid in navigation to the business and will not result in an expansion of use of the commercial property on which it will be located.

<u>Council Goals/Objectives</u>: This appeal is not in support of a specified strategic goal but is a required step in the applicant's due process for a sign exception application.

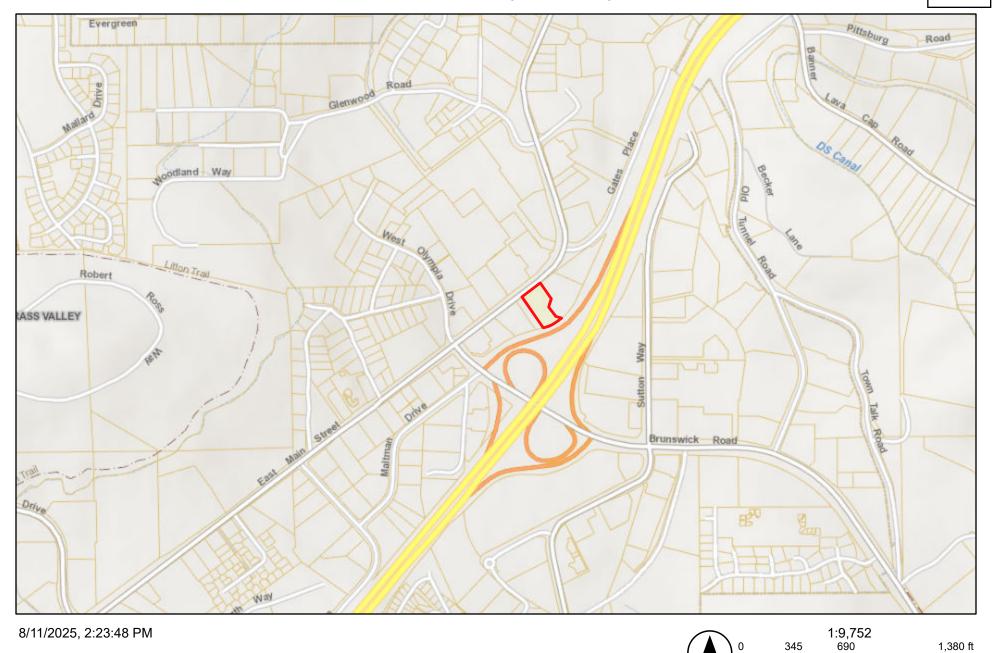

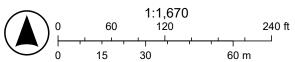

This fee is required for Notices of Determination recorded after January 1, 1991. A Notice of Determination cannot be filed and any approval of the project shall not be operative, vested, or final until the required fee is paid. This shall mean that building, public works and other development permits cannot be approved until this fee is paid. These fees are accurate at the time of printing, but **increase the subsequent January 1**st of each year.

This fee is <u>not</u> a Grass Valley fee; it is required to be collected by the County pursuant to State law for transmission to the Department of Fish and Game. This fee was enacted by the State Legislature in September 1990, to be effective January 1, 1991.

*If the City finds that the project will not have an impact on wildlife resources, through a De Minimus Impact Finding, the City will issue certificate of fee exemption. Therefore, this fee will not be required to be paid at the time an applicant files the Notice of Determination with the County Recorder. The County's posting and filing fees will still be required.

<u>Summary</u>: This report provides a financial overview of the City's General Fund, Measure E Sales Tax Fund, Measure B Sales Tax Fund, Water Enterprise Fund, and Sewer Enterprise Fund through the first quarter ending September 30, 2025.

At the end of the first quarter, Citywide revenues total approximately 6-21% of budgeted amounts, which is consistent with the normal timing of when the City receives and records its major revenues. Expenditures across all major funds average approximately 13-27% of annual budgets, aligning with the expected pace for this point in the fiscal year.

It is important to note that sales tax revenues received during the first quarter only reflect one month of activity (July) due to state reporting and payment lags. This timing difference occurs each year and is normal and expected. Full quarterly sales tax receipts will be reflected in the second quarter's report.

No fiscal concerns are noted at this time.

<u>Background</u>: The City prepares quarterly financial reports to provide transparency regarding the City's fiscal condition and budget performance.

Revenue is recorded as the City earns income from sources such as taxes, service charges, and investment earnings. Because property tax and certain state revenues are received later in the fiscal year, first-quarter revenues appear low relative to the annual budget. Sales tax receipts also lag by approximately two months due to state reporting timelines.

<u>Analysis</u>: The City's overall financial condition remains stable through the first quarter of FY 2025-26. Revenue and expenditure activity in each major fund is generally tracking with expectations. A summary of each major fund follows.

General Fund (Fund 100)

• Total Budgeted Revenues: \$19,029,615

• Actual Revenues to Date: \$1,089,634 (5.7% of budget)

• Total Budgeted Expenditures: \$19,029,418

• Actual Expenditures to Date: \$4,843,879 (25.4% of budget)

Analysis: Revenues are below the pro-rated target as property tax and franchise revenues will be received later in the fiscal year. Sales tax revenues reflected in the General Fund also include only one month (July) due to the standard state reporting delay. Additional sales tax receipts for August and September will be recognized in the second quarter. Charges for services and investment income are within expected levels. Expenditures aligned with expected spending patterns, as both the annual liability insurance premium and CalPERS unfunded liability were paid in the first quarter, and no budgetary concerns have been identified.

Measure E Sales Tax Fund (Fund 200)

• Total Budgeted Revenues: \$7,489,000

• Actual Revenues to Date: \$581,600 (7.8% of budget)

• Total Budgeted Expenditures: \$10,226,599

• Actual Expenditures to Date: \$1,324,954 (13.0% of budget)

Analysis: Revenues reflect the first allocation of local sales tax received for July only. Because of the two-month delay in state reporting, August and September receipts will appear in the second quarter. This pattern is normal and occurs every fiscal year. Expenditure primarily represents personnel costs for public safety operations and annual liability insurance payments. Fund performance is consistent with expectations.

Measure B Sales Tax Fund (Fund 207)

• Total Budgeted Revenues: \$2,631,000

• Actual Revenues to Date: \$215,577 (8.2% of budget)

Total Budgeted Expenditures: \$3,401,254

• Actual Expenditures to Date: \$551,985 (16.2% of budget)

Analysis: Measure B revenues reflect July sales tax collections only, with subsequent months to be received and recorded in the next quarter due to normal state reporting timelines. Expenditures remain low as mitigation project activity typically accelerates later in the fiscal year. No concerns are noted.

Water Enterprise Fund (Fund 500)

• Total Budgeted Revenues: \$2,688,200

• Actual Revenues to Date: \$551,806 (20.5% of budget)

• Total Budgeted Expenditures: \$3,708,777

• Actual Expenditures to Date: \$1,010,686 (27.3% of budget)

Analysis: Water Fund revenues are consistent with the quarterly billing cycle and seasonal consumption patterns. Expenditures are within expected levels and reflect regular operations, maintenance activities, and scheduled semi-annual loan payments. The fund remains in a stable financial position.

Sewer Enterprise Fund (Fund 510)

• Total Budgeted Revenues: \$5,641,000

• Actual Revenues to Date: \$1,208,254 (21.4% of budget)

• Total Budgeted Expenditures: \$10,431,097

• Actual Expenditures to Date: \$1,762,845 (16.9% of budget)

Analysis: Revenues are tracking above 20% due to steady quarterly billing activity and investment earnings. Expenditures are proportionate with operations and maintenance costs. No fiscal issues are identified.

Across all major funds, expenditures are pacing slightly ahead of revenues due to the normal timing of when the City receives property tax and sales tax revenues. This is typical for the first quarter of the fiscal year and expected to balance out in the coming quarters as additional revenues are received.

Staff will continue to monitor results and report any material variances to the City Council.

<u>Council Goals/Objectives</u>: This action is consistent the City's Strategic Plan by advancing the goal of maintaining a High-Performance Government and delivering Quality Service to the community.

<u>Fiscal Impact</u>: There is no direct fiscal impact from this report. The City's financial condition remains stable, and expenditures are within adopted budget parameters.
