LinkNoCo Project Update and Discussion

Background:

At the request of the North Front Range Metropolitan Planning Organization (NFRMPO) Planning Council, the development of a North Front Range Premium Transit Analysis was made in February 2020 to identify and prioritize regional transit corridors for investment. NFRMPO staff and HDR, the selected consultant, began the project by reviewing the corridors and recommendations included in the adopted 2045 Regional Transit Element. This analysis included analyzing the corridors for cost-effectiveness, potential ridership, and community support, and narrowed the priorities to three corridors.

In addition to MPO and HDR staff, two key committees have also helped guide the project thus far. The Guidance Committee is made up of transit and planning staff, engineers, community members, and other stakeholders analyzing the project at the ground level. The other is the LinkNoCo Governance and Finance Policy Advisory Committee (GFPAC), made up of elected officials, the Chambers of Commerce, and other high-level policymakers, guiding the project's focus on corridors, governance, and implementation. Together, these groups have provided feedback along the way and will review recommendations prior to their discussion at the NFRMPO's Planning Council meeting later this summer/early fall.

Prior to moving forward to adoption of the plan by the NFRMPO Planning Council, and at the request of Councilmember Olson at the April 5th, 2022 City Council meeting, Public Works and NFRMPO staff will provide an overview on the project. Additionally, will ask for feedback on the process, corridors and governance possibilities to ensure the final recommendation reflects our community. 

16th Street Enhancement Project Update and Discussion

Background:

In 2021, the Colorado Department of Transportation selected sixteen transportation projects worth approximately \$22 million as awardees for the Revitalizing Main Streets Grant opportunity. As a part of this process, the City of Greeley's 16th Street Corridor Enhancement Project was among the selected projects and was awarded two million dollars.

The project extends from 7th Avenue to 11th Avenue on 16th Street and is intended to create a safer, more inviting atmosphere on a vital corridor which serves as the gateway between UNC and Downtown through improved streetscape elements and safety measures.

This project was identified as a top priority by UNC and Downtown Districts. The enhancements will promote a more welcoming environment to pedestrian and bicycle traffic and support the local business community by creating opportunities to expand outdoor dining space for restaurants and coffee shops.

The project has completed is concept design and PW Staff will present an overview of the outreach efforts and the preferred design based on input from the Stakeholder group, businesses, public and Citizen Transportation Advisory Board. The project will next move to final design process and is slated for construction in 2024.







<u>Title:</u>

"Speak Up Greeley" Community Engagement Platform

Background

As part of the City's commitment to develop and embed best practices for transparent community engagement into our standard operating procedures, the communication and engagement department has implemented an online platform that will enhance Greeley's ability to foster two-way communication and increase opportunities for public participation.

Working with Bang The Table, the industry leader for online engagement, the City built and launched Speak Up Greeley. Speak Up Greeley (www.speakupgreeley.com) will be an important tool for city staff as they execute priority projects for which public input or community collaboration are necessary or expected components. We recognize that no matter how well the city designs in-person opportunities for people to engage, bringing the conversation online gives many more people access to the information and allows them to have a voice in the process. Based on feedback from the 2021 engagement survey, nearly all respondents from all Wards indicated a lack of time as a barrier to participation/involvement and also indicated online communication as their preferred method of communication. Speak Up Greeley dramatically enhances our ability to engage online. This robust tool has the potential to transform the City's approach to public engagement. It will be a go-to website for community members to:

- Provide input and feedback on City initiatives and projects
- Ask questions in a moderated environment
- Interact with each other and see the range of perspectives represented
- View outcomes of an engagement process

Through this website, the City can more effectively broaden its reach in community engagement efforts, improve transparency and trust, build social capital and the community's sense of shared responsibility for the City's future, and reduce the spread of misinformation about key issues.

The site will feature projects that are a priority for the City – whether that's a master plan, a park redevelopment, or a streets improvement project – the focus of the site will be to genuinely engage with the community and understand where there is consensus or divergence in perspectives. Projects added to the *Speak Up Greeley* site expands our ability to integrate community feedback into the decisions and outcomes of strategic projects.
