

Council Initiative - Background

City Council tasked staff to research traffic technology through Public Works and the Police Department

This presentation will include research into:

- 1) Photo Radar (AVIS)
- 2) Red Light Cameras
- 3) Photo Noise Enforcement
- 4) Noise Monitoring Sensors

Photo Radar

- Colorado State Law allows municipalities to adopt an ordinance authorizing the use of an Automated Vehicle Identification Systems (AVIS), also known as photo radar. AVIS key points:

- Permitted Locations
- Staffing
- Historical Data

Photo Radar: Status and Cost

- Benefits of AVIS:
- Cost of the unit would typically be covered by the revenue generated over time

Red Light Cameras

Red Light Cameras are a tool utilized at intersections experiencing a high number of right-angle crashes.

- Evidence of red-light cameras
- Federal Highway Administration guidelines
- Public Works views Red Light Cameras as a safety tool





Photo Noise Enforcement

Photo noise enforcement technology is in the early stages of development.

Key points:

- Jurisdiction noise ordinance
- Employee requirements
- Challenges
- Providers



Noise Monitoring Sensors

- Noise monitoring sensors can be installed in the community either on city buildings and/or other infrastructure like traffic signals and streetlights.
- Utilization
- Public Works Priorities

Estimated Costs

- Photo Radar (Speed Vans)
- 3 Employees (\$67K/year = \$201,000/year)
- 2 Vehicles (5,300/month = \$127,200/Year)
- Red Light Cameras Mobile
- One Camera System (\$5,800/month = \$69,600/year)
- Could be maintained by photo radar employees

Hillside/Farr Park Neighborhoods -15th Avenue Court Underpass of US 34 Bypass

Background:

On November 1, 2022, City Council Initiative 16-2022 was created by Councilmember Clark to review safety issues of the 15th Avenue Court underpass of US 34 Bypass. Staff held a neighborhood meeting on January 25, 2023, to seek input on safety concerns and use of the underpass. The neighborhood residents strongly supported keeping the underpass for connectivity and requested staff review opportunities to improve the underpass for pedestrians, bicyclists, accessibility, and safety. Staff will present and seek feedback on a draft plan for replacement the existing underpass.



Figure 2: ProjectLocationMap






