Title:

Tax Revenue Initiative Polling Options

Summary:

As a follow up to a discussion in May 2021 among City Council about polling for potential ballot initiatives in November 2021, a request was made to update City Council about the option to conduct polling for a potential tax initiative poll/ survey among Greeley residents. The request is associated with conducting polling for a new tax on the November 2022 ballot.

Information provided to City Council in May 2021 specifically regarding the request to conduct additional polling on a new sales tax for open space and natural areas is attached. At the time, there was a consensus among City Council to forego any polling or new sales tax ballot initiative in November 2021, but to conduct polling in 2022 associated with the ongoing effort to 'bucketize' citywide needs and align them with funding sources.

It was the intention of staff to conduct polling as a part of the 'bucketization' effort in 2022 to help identify support for priorities and needs identified by the City Council. Due to the number of unanticipated challenges such as ERP, no additional progress has been made in the 'bucketization' effort. However, the Finance Department has been able to commit resources to the effort that recently restarted with a plan to be completed for presentation to City Council in the first quarter of 2023. Staff has developed a Request for Proposals to secure polling/ surveying services to assist through the remainder of the 'bucketization' effort as needed.

Timing and Cost of Polling

Since 2019, the City has utilized Strategies360 for polling/surveying and communication services associated with tax renewals and potential tax initiatives. In the event City Council directs that a poll be conducted in anticipation of a potential ballot initiative,

staff could secure Strategies360 polling services through a bid exception. The following timeline and costs have been identified by Alex Dunn of Strategies360:

OPTION A: Brief, single issue poll focused solely on electorate existing attitudes about open space funding

- Timeline: 3-5 weeks (mainly depending on how much time is required by the City to provide feedback on the draft polling language)
 - If polling question approved in 3 days, could get data by end of week of June 6. Otherwise, week of June 20.
- Scope: Sample size of 500 (same sample size City has used in past two renewal polls), 10 minute call
 - o Cost: \$28,268

OPTION B: Standard version, qualitative poll: requires additional time to draft, would look more like what City did for Food Tax/KGM (including more contextual questions and arguments), designed to look at public support and simulate a debate to stress test the concept and see how attitudes shift

- Timeline: Data by week of June 20
- Scope: Sample size of 500, 15 minute call
- Cost: \$34,473

Alex Dunn will be available virtually during the May 24 Work Session presentation to present the options and address any questions.



RE: November 2021 Ballot Initiatives – Request for Additional Polling

During the May 25, 2021 Work Session regarding the reauthorization of the Keep Greeley Moving sales tax as a part of the November 2021 ballot, there was a consensus of the City Council to request that staff research the cost, timeline and any other pertinent information for conducting a poll to gauge support for an open space/ natural trails and areas tax. This information is presented in response to that request.

Background and Information:

During its May 14, 2019 work session, City Council received a presentation on the City's Natural Areas and Trails funding strategy which identified the potential for a new 0.25 sales tax for open space. As a part of the presentation, the Culture Parks and Recreation Department highlighted the following results of a community survey completed in 2018. (Note: The community survey is not the equivalent of a poll of registered voters.)

Question: There are many ways that the city could generate additional funding to address three different areas, although it does not have enough funding to do it now. The following is a list of several potential sources for additional funding. For each one, indicate if you had the opportunity to vote on a measure to increase funding for some of the specific projects, would you vote Yes in favor or No against that proposal:

After consideration of the information presented, the City Council determined that it was not time to move forward with a tax increase primarily because a specific plan was not in place that outlined the financial needs for and uses of an open space tax.

In June 2020, the City conducted polling relative to a reauthorization of both the Food Sales Tax and Keep Greeley Moving Sales Tax. At the time, the poll also included the following question regarding support for a natural areas and trails/ open space tax:

"Finally, let's assume for a moment that in addition to the two tax renewals we've been talking about, you were also considering a third proposal. This proposal would create a new, dedicated sales tax of one quarter of one percent (0.25%) on all purchases in order to fund the acquisition and maintenance of natural areas and trails around Greeley. If you had to decide today, would you support or oppose this proposal?"

The polling results were presented to City Council during its June 23, 2020 Work Session. The specific polling results regarding the natural areas and trails/ open space are listed below:

At that time, it was the consensus of City Council to not move forward with a natural areas and trails/ open space sales tax initiative.

The cost to conduct a poll through the services contracted through a competitive process with Strategies360 ranges from \$19,000 - \$33,000 depending upon the number of questions asked and duration of the poll. Strategies360 has developed a tentative timeframe to complete the poll which is provided below – including an anticipated date for presentation of results to City Council:

As discussed during the May 25, 2021 work session, moving a new sales tax item forward on the November 2021 ballot poses challenges such as the following:

- Cause potentially negative impacts on the Keep Greeley Moving renewal effort;
- A new sales tax would typically move through a body such as the Citizen Budget Advisory Committee for its recommendation. Such a referral could still happen with compressed timeframes for analysis and discussion; and
- The success of any tax initiative is positively correlated to the existence of and support from a citizen support committee. At this time, no committee is in place for this specific issue and the time to effectively communicate is very short.

In addition, it is important to note that during the February 2020 City Council retreat, the Council established a strategic work program item "Create comprehensive City services funding

strategy". This effort is intended to engage in analysis and planning for all needs, and align the short and long term needs with the appropriate revenue sources (align specific tax with for specific services such as KGM for roads). Conducting additional polling focused on this concept and that includes questions about all needs such as open space, roads, facilities, public safety, etc. If this concept is supported by Council, staff's recommendation is to complete this survey in 2022 as was originally contemplated.

Title:

Greeley on the Go Transportation Master Plan

Background:

The vision for the Greeley 2045 Transportation Master Plan, Greeley on the Go, was developed through coordination between city staff and community members. As a growing community in the Colorado Front Range, the City seeking to ensure all community members can comfortably travel using a variety of modes and that the future transportation network supports a strong local economy and helps foster a high quality of life. The vision for transportation in Greeley is for:

An ample, easy, and connected transportation system providing seamless mobility to enrich lives and promote economic vitality.

Greeley on the Go emphasizes investments in priority areas and corridors through near-term (10-year) and long-term (20-year) enhancements that will promote travel mode options connectivity in key locations.

After initial outreach to gain feedback on the goals for the plan, staff began developing transportation scenario alternatives. Each alternative represents different levels of investment across different modes. After review with the Stakeholder team and CTAB on the alternatives, it became clear a blended approach to the transportation scenarios and priorities was best. The Transportation Investment for Quality of Life scenario blends priorities from all three original alternatives and sets the stage for transportation investments that are context sensitive and improve quality of life for Greeley residents.

The strategy for investment under Transportation for Quality of Life will involve a variety of project categories:

- STREETS- Preservation, safety improvements, traffic calming, new development and connections
- PLACEMAKING- Entryways, enhanced street and intersection design to enable growth/value of surrounding land
- EMERGING TECHNOLOGY- Smart signal technology, fiber, electric vehicle charging options, data sharing

- MOBILITY/TRANSIT- Shared mobility, mobility hubs, flex & fixed route optimization, traveler information for on-demand and improved travel time
- ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION- New/improved sidewalks, ADA upgrades, pedestrian safety measures, shared streets, bikes lanes, trails, neighborhood trail connections, education programs

Different project categories would be applied based on the context, need, and goals for the area or corridor.

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
