City Council Minutes January 29, 2025

CALL TO ORDER AND ROLL CALL by Mayor, Robert Duncan at the hour of 6:30pm

CONCERNED CITIZEN(S) IN THE AUDIENCE: All in attendance were there for items on the agenda.

THE MATTER OF MEETING WITH A MEMBER REPRESENTATIVE FROM LCSO IF ONE IS AVAILABLE: Sergeant Frambes reviewed the December report. Some of the highlights included:

- No property or person crimes occurred in December which is impressive for the holidays.
- LCSO is having extra patrols late at night and early mornings by the school district and business areas.
- On page 26, a person was arrested for giving a false name to police and for several outstanding warrants for other cities.
- Seven of the 15 citations issued were for Driving While Suspended resulting in some of the vehicles being towed.

 Klemm asked if there was any new information about the Harrisburg Pharmacy breakin. Sergeant Frambes replied that several other agencies are working on the case, but he would keep Council posted if there was any new information or an arrest.

THE MATTER OF MEETING WITH A MEMBER REPRESENTATIVE FROM COBURG POLICE DEPARTMENT IF ONE IS AVAILABLE: Chief Larson reviewed the 2024 4th Quarter Report, and the 2024 Stats Report as shown in Exhibits A & B. He added that one of the speeding citations issued this last quarter was for going 67mph in a 35mph speed zone.

 Klemm asked about the drug incident on page 38 that took place on the corner of 1st and Smith St. Chief Larson replied that it was during the 4th of July, and nothing became of it.

THE MATTER OF REVIEWING THE 2024 4th QUARTER CRIME RESULTS FOR THE CITY OF HARRISBURG: Eldridge reviewed the report. Some of the highlights included:

- Person crimes are at the lowest rate for 2024.
- Property crimes are also down as well as drug/alcohol crimes.
- The YTD total is lower at this time than last year.

THE MATTER OF A REQUEST FOR \$1,000 FOR THE 2025 EDUCATION EXPO, 'THE HISTORY OF HARRISBURG', FROM DAVID RAMSDELL: David Ramsdell from Harrisburg Middle School approached Council. Ramsdell informed Council about the Education Expo that was held last year by the 5th, 6th and 7th graders. This year's theme is "History of Harrisburg". Ramsdell informed Council the 5th graders will be focusing on early history of settlers; the 6th graders the history of agricultural and the 7th graders history of education. 8th graders will also be participating by displaying their college/career projects. Ramsdell stated the \$1,000 donation would be used towards needed supplies.

- Henry asked if this was budgeted by the School District. Ramsdell replied it was funded last year by grant money which has since been depleted. He commented that the School District did allow him \$500 instead of the \$1,500 he originally requested.
- Downey likes the idea of the Expo but wanted Ramsdell to be aware that the City cannot commit to annual funding.
- Eldridge asked Ramsdell about the City placing their timeline projects on our City website in the future for Harrisburg's 160th Celebration.
- Mayor Duncan suggested interviewing resident's in town with historic homes and suggested the Bess Tweed books for more information.
- Knox thinks it's a great way for the students to get invested in our community.
- Malpass added that he really enjoyed the Expo last year.
 - Downey motioned to approve the request for \$1,000 for the 2025 Education Expo and was seconded by Klemm.

City Council challenged the School District to match their funding. Ramsdell commented that he would approach the Board at the meeting in February and ask for match funding.

 The City Council then voted unanimously to approve the motion by a vote of 4-0. (Yes: Downey, Klemm, Knox, and Henry. Malpass also voted in favor. No: None.)

THE MATTER OF REVIEWING THE REQUEST FOR FUNDING FOR PROPERTY IN THE COMMERCIAL DISTRICT UNDER THE COMMUNITY AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

GRANT: Eldridge reminded Council this is a Property Improvement Grant request from the Community and Economic Development Fund instead of an HRA Grant. The request amount from the applicant has increased to \$30,852.50 from \$30,702.50 as indicated in the staff report. Eldridge reviewed the work being done and added they meet all the requirements for the grant which are the

same as an HRA Grant except for the boundary location. Eldridge then reviewed the Conditions of Approval and referred to two additional estimates as shown in **Addendum 1**. Eldridge informed Council the HRA will now be receiving the missing funds by the end of this fiscal year, therefore, this request could be referred to the HRA meeting tonight, for an HRA Grant if Council prefers. Eldridge added that the City would not require a new application for the request.

- Downey would like the request to come from the HRA fund and to save these funds for another request located outside of the HRA District.
- The Freeman's voiced their appreciation to the City for the HRA Grant Funds and informed Council they were able to contact Rick Wagoner and local agencies to receive memorabilia keepsakes that were left behind by the VFW. The Freeman's also recently acquired Dennis Watson's Quonset Hut across the street.
- Henry inquired about when the HRA Funds would be replenished. Eldridge replied that since this is a reimbursement grant, it would most likely be paid after the funds are received from the County.
- Klemm wanted confirmation this request won't put the Water Bond Project in jeopardy.
 Nelson replied that these funds are designated for grants only.
 - Downey motioned to transfer this request to the HRA Meeting and was seconded by Klemm. The motion passed unanimously by a vote of 4-0. (Yes: Downey, Klemm, Knox and Henry. Malpass also voted in favor. No: None.)

THE MATTER OF THE MAYOR APPOINTING A CITY COUNCIL MEMBER TO THE PERSONNEL COMMITTEE: No discussion.

 Mayor Duncan appointed Randy Klemm to serve on the Personnel Committee.

OTHERS:

 Eldridge informed Council that Henry has requested a keyboard for her tablet provided by the City. She informed Council that the cost would be \$20-\$40 each. Both Knox and Henry would like one. Staff to check with Caughey and Thomas.
