

Harrisburg City Council Minutes October 22, 2024

CALL TO ORDER AND ROLL CALL by Mayor, Robert Duncan at the hour of 6:35pm

CONCERNED CITIZEN(S) IN THE AUDIENCE: All in attendance were there for items on the agenda.

THE MATTER OF MEETING WITH A MEMBER REPRESENTATIVE FROM LCSO IF ONE IS AVAILABLE: Sergeant Frambes reviewed the LCSO Report for September 2024. Some of the highlights included:

- DHS investigations have increased at Harrisburg Elementary, Middle and High School due to the start of the school year.
- Burglary of a vacant home. Home owner did not press charges.
- Knox commented about some young boys continually playing games with the railroad crossings and asked what's the appropriate way to report it. Sergeant Frambes replied to contact LCSO immediately, if it's not an emergency call dispatch. He believes that educating the boys and speaking with the parents is important.

• Mayor Duncan would like for Coburg to be notified as well.

THE MATTER OF MEETING WITH A MEMBER REPRESENTATIVE FROM THE COBURG POLICE DEPARTMENT IF ONE IS AVAILABLE: Chief Larson reviewed the 2024 3rd Quarter Report as shown in Exhibit A. No comments or concerns.

 Mayor Duncan recommended speaking of track safety at the Skatepark After Dark Event.

THE MATTER OF REVIEWING THE 2024 3RD QUARTER CRIME RESULTS FOR THE CITY OF HARRISBURG: Eldridge reviewed the 2024 3rd Quarter Crime Report. Some of the highlights included:

- Person crimes have gone down, but property crimes have increased which include charges for vehicle theft, identity theft, and fraud.
- Citations have increased from 32 to 38.
- YTD crimes are still lower as shown on page 51.
- Harrisburg is still lower than Mill City and Millersburg on YTD crime which speaks wonders for our law enforcement.

THE MATTER OF DISCUSSION WITH SMALL MUNICIPALITY ADVOCACY COALITION (SMAC) LOBBYIST SEAN TATE, OF TATE PUBLIC AFFAIRS: Sean Tate reviewed his presentation as shown in Addendum 1. Some of those highlights included:

- Tate felt they did a good job introducing SMAC. He commented that City Administrators are under resourced and it's challenging to get responses in a timely manner.
- His biggest disappointment is not achieving 10 SMAC members by June 2024, and he feels the upcoming Election has something to do with the hesitation. He has been invited to present to Creswell, Cottage Grove and has heard from Lakeview and Gold Hill. He continues to pursue Ecko; Elgin and Scappoose and would like to continue to work on the Southeast and Northeast portions of the state.
- Thomas asked how many members SMAC currently has. Tate replied seven.
- Downey likes the idea of increasing the number of members to allow for a bigger voice.
- SMAC is currently working on three bills including a grant matching adjustment percentage bill, establishing a revolving loan fund for assisting with engineering cost and recreational immunity. Tate is also addressing some of the challenges with the difficult Wastewater Certification process.
- Tatum asked if SMAC has considered testifying for or against bills in the future and Tate responded that he has and it's a big part of how they will grow and get the visibility they need.
- Eldridge added that she would like to look at revisions to BOLI prevailing wage requirements for smaller cities. Tate replied that he would love to look into that goal.
- Klemm asked Tate about the road blocks he's running into. Tate responded that his biggest challenge has been running up against this election cycle and nobody wanting to make time to introduce something politically challenging.

THE MATTER OF REVIEWING A PERMIT FOR THE 2024 LIGHT PARADE: Eldridge reviewed

this year's application. Some of the highlights included:

- This year's theme is "The Grinch that Stole Christmas" and will be held on December 7th.
- The parade will start and finish at the Elementary School this year instead of starting at the High School.

- Conditions of Approval are the same as last year.
- Eldridge reminded Council that once again, Santa will be at the Museum where free cookies, cider and hot chocolate will be available.
 - Caughey motioned to approve the 2024 Light Parade Permit, subject to the Conditions of Approval and was seconded by Thomas. The motion passed unanimously by a vote of 5-0. Youth Advisor Tatum also voted in favor. (Yes: Caughey, Thomas, Klemm, Downey, and Knox. No: None.)

Others:

- Eldridge noted that changes are coming from the Supreme Court in relation to homelessness. Attorney Sean Kidd didn't see any changes needed to our code, except for the reference of the ORS. Eldridge doesn't feel we need to make that change at this time.
- Eldridge noted the Scarecrow Contest has been extended to the 28th and noted we are getting more participation.
- Eldridge met today with the Willamette River Keepers, where Eagle Park was discussed. Eldridge feels we are getting the word out about the park and people are starting to pay attention to our efforts.
- The Preliminary Plat for Sommerville Meadows was approved last Tuesday. She noted that three lots are located on already developed streets therefore, construction can begin as long as they record the Final Plat with the County; the Development Agreement for Shadowood has been completed by both parties and signed and the Civil Engineering has been completed and approved.
- Smoke testing will take place November 12 through the 15th.
- Eldridge informed Council that Troy Jones, with Friends of Gap Road, dropped off a letter of support (Addendum 2) and asked Council to sign as individual people. Eldridge modified the letter some and stated it's available tonight if anyone would like to sign it. Downey noted for the record that she won't be participating due to two conflicts of interest she has.
- Eldridge referred to **Addendum 3**, a flyer from the Linn County Conservative Alliance and asked Klemm, and write in candidate, Dana Henry, if they were contacted to be placed on the flyer. Klemm responded no and Henry stated they did reach out to her; however, they did not quote her, but instead wrote their own piece. Mayor Duncan referred to the back of the flyer, under "Harrisburg Talking" and noted it was not a quote from himself or the City Council. Caughey thought it was paraphrasing from several different audience participants from previous meetings. Eldridge to place something on Facebook stating these comments are not from City Council or the City of Harrisburg.

With no further business, the City Council Work Session adjourned at the hour of 7:43pm.


