

City Council Business Meeting Minutes October 11, 2022

CALL TO ORDER AND ROLL CALL by Mayor, Robert Duncan at the hour of 6:35pm.

CONCERNED CITIZEN(S) IN THE AUDIENCE: All present tonight were there for items on the agenda.

THE MATTER OF REVIEWING THE DRAFT PARKS MASTER PLAN

STAFF REPORT: Eldridge reviewed the Staff Report and the exhibits included. She stressed her appreciation to both Colin McArthur and Kelsey Zlevor for their dedication to this plan while dealing with COVID and staffing issues.

Colin McArthur, with Cameron McCarthy, reviewed the presentation as shown in **Addendum 1** and stated he hopes to get some recommendations on changes that need to be made and then bring it back to Council for adoption. He commented this process typically takes 9 to 12 months to complete, and we are now at 11 months.

- Caughey asked if Cameron McCarthy was going to provide the cost of making the suggested changes and is particularly interested in Eagle Park. McArthur responded that he does have the breakdown in the Feasibility Study, and he will figure out a way to include it in the Parks System Plan with 2022 dollars.
- Thomas commented the plan looks nice but agreed with Caughey about the cost associated.
- Downey commented she likes the idea of the dog park.
- Scholz stated that once the plan is adopted, we can do preliminary engineering for the cost and begin to work on grant funding.

- Eldridge commented she would like to get some information posted about asking for volunteers to help with removing some of the overgrown foliage at Eagle Park.
- McArthur stated that he was clear on the final changes needed and The Parks Master Plan will be brought back for adoption at the next City Council meeting. He thanked the City for their patience.

THE MATTER OF A LETTER TO THE LEAGUE OF OREGON CITIES ASKING FOR MORE ADVOCACY FOR SMALL CITIES UNDER 5,000 IN POPULATION

STAFF REPORT: Eldridge reminded Council of the July meeting where it was decided to write a letter to League of Oregon Cities requesting advocacy for small cities. She noted that the Cities of Halsey, Scio, Sodaville and Brownsville will also be supported in this letter and referred to Exhibit A. Eldridge stated she was contacted by Patty Mulvihill, with LOC, and will be meeting with her next month.

 Caughey motioned to authorize the Mayor to sign the advocacy letter on behalf of the City of Harrisburg and was seconded by Thomas. The motioned was approved by a vote of 4-0. (Yes: Caughey, Downey, Keaton, and Thomas; No: None.)

THE MATTER OF REVIEWING A FIRST DRAFT OF THE PRESS RELEASE IN RELATION TO THE DELAY OF THE WATER BOND PROJECTS

STAFF REPORT: Eldridge stated Exhibit A is the formal press release that will be included in the Utility Bills and on Social Media and asked if there were any objections. None noted. Consensus was to send the letter.

THE MATTER OF APPROVING THE 4TH QUARTER 2021/2022 EXPENSE REPORT

STAFF REPORT: Nelson informed Council this is for the last three months of the previous fiscal year, and she is pleased with how it turned out. She pointed out that Investment Revenue is the only red shown and in the Street Fund Intergovernmental Revenue there is a shortage due to the City not receiving grants that were budgeted in. Nelson noted that the Building Permit and Electrical Permit Funds will mature as we get more real numbers and commented that last year was based on projections due to it being our first year with Junction City.

 Downey motioned to approve the 4th Quarter 2021/2022 Expense Report and was seconded by Caughey. The motioned was approved by a vote of 4-0. (Yes: Caughey, Downey, Keaton, and Thomas; No: None.)

- 2. Eldridge stated that Andrea and Arielle Freytag contacted her about the food pantry idea, but they never reached out to be placed on the agenda.
- 3. Eldridge informed Council that a resident was trespassed from Riverfront Park for 120 days. The resident did contact the City about appealing, but never submitted the formal request. In the future, an appeal would go before Judge Larry Blake, Jr and not City Council.
- 4. Eldridge thanked Keaton for attending the LOC Conference. Keaton commented that Albany also received the Excellence and Best Practices Award from CIS. He mentioned one of the trainings was on methods for getting kids involved with City Council. Thomas commented that the High School is having a career day and she thought it would be great to get the City involved. Thomas commented that Bryan Starr, the Superintendent, will be retiring at the end of the school year.
- 5. Nelson stated that interest rates are up to 2.2% and that she budgeted for .6%.

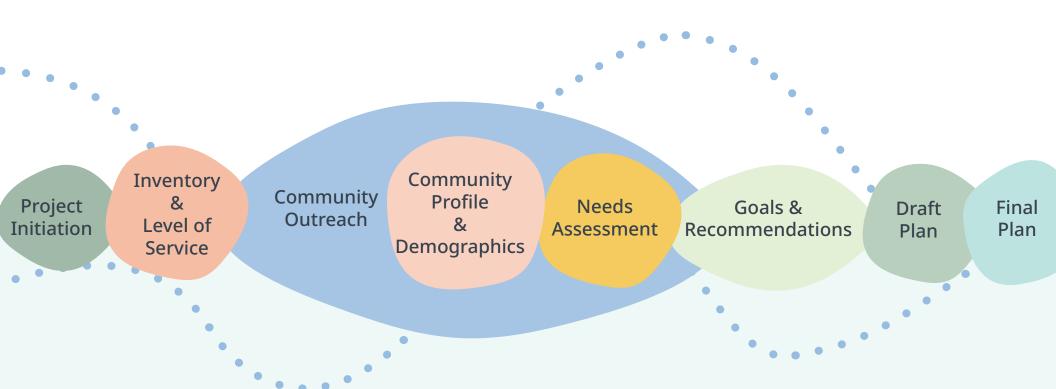

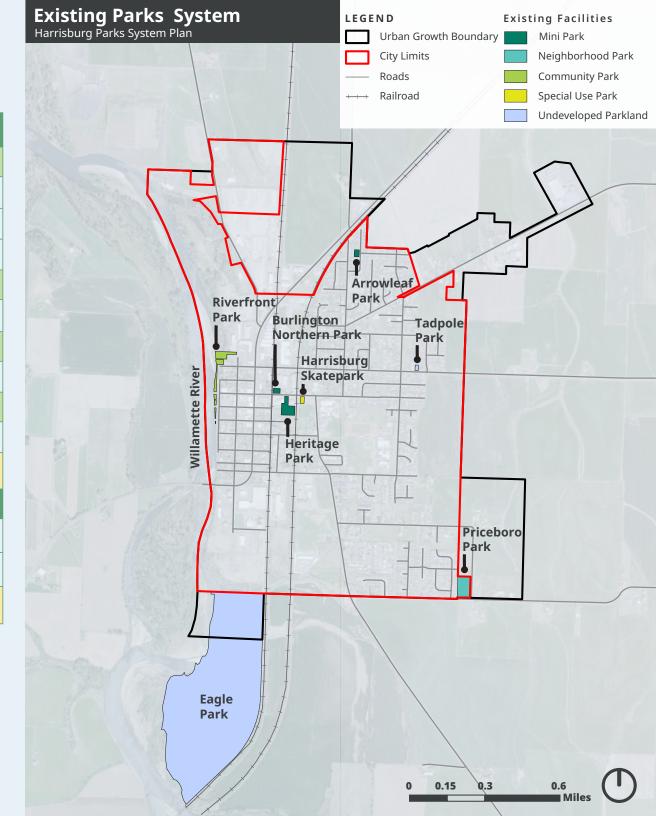

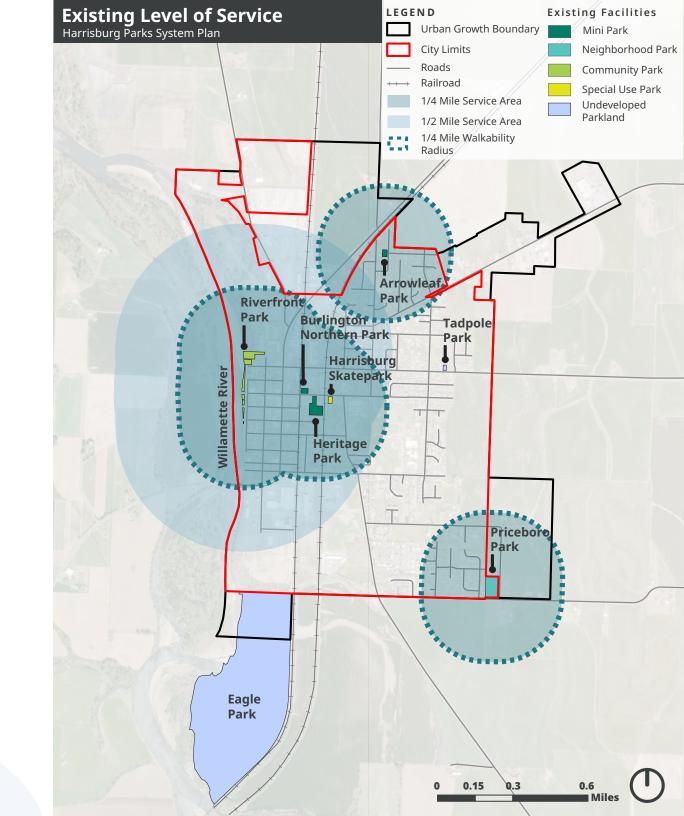

Key Findings

- Majority of respondents reported being "satisfied" with the availability and conditions of existing park amenities and facilities.
- Lowest levels of satisfaction were reported for bathrooms, parking, and benches/ tables.
- Most respondents reported being satisfied or somewhat satisfied with the quality of facilities/structures at all parks.
- Burlington Northern Park and Heritage Park were the only parks where respondents reported a higher rate of being dissatisfied.



Needs Assessment

Facility Needs

- Additional facilities for multi-generational play and gathering, such as picnic shelters and pavilions.
- Additional special use facilities.
- Expanded trail facilities and connections from Eagle Park to Riverfront Park.
- Improved accessibility of trails, bathrooms, and play structures.
- Age-appropriate play structures and recreation facilities.
- Experiential learning and education opportunities.
- Upgrades for the community center.
- Improved and additional park amenities.
- Emergency river access points for safety vehicles.
