ORDINANCE O-22-12

ORDINANCE REMOVING RESTRICTED PARKING SPACE IN FRONT OF RESIDENCE OCCUPIED BY PERSON WITH DISABILITIES

WHEREAS, <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 39:4-197.6 provides that any municipality may, by ordinance, establish a restricted parking in front of a residence occupied by a person with a disability provided such parking is not otherwise prohibited and the permitting thereof would not interfere with the normal flow of traffic or provide for the removal thereof if no longer necessary.

WHEREAS, Ordinance 18-03 governs applications for restricted parking in front of residences occupied by persons with disabilities; and

WHEREAS, the Borough of Highlands previously designated a space for resident parking for persons with disabilities on 10A Prospect Street; and

WHEREAS, the Borough has been notified of the vacation of the premises by said persons with disabilities at 10A Prospect Street, therefore, the space is no longer needed; and

WHEREAS, the governing body of the Borough of Highlands wishes to remove the previously designated space for persons with disabilities pursuant to the recommendation of the Chief of Police.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the governing body of the Borough of Highlands as follows:

SECTION 1.

A previously-designated parking space for resident parking for persons with disabilities in front of 10A Prospect Street is no longer necessary and shall be removed. Any sign which was installed to identify the parking space in accordance with Ordinance 18-03 shall be removed.

SECTION II. <u>SEVERABILITY</u>. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or invalid, such decision shall not affect the remaining portions of this Ordinance, which shall otherwise remain in full force and effect.

SECTION III. <u>REPEALER.</u> All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

SECTION IV. <u>EFFECTIVE DATE.</u> This Ordinance shall take effect upon adoption and publication according to law.

RESOLUTION 22-134

APPROVING CLOSE OUT CHANGE ORDER AND DECLARING ACCEPTANCE OF THE CONTRACT FOR DRAINAGE IMPROVEMENTS TO BARBERIE AVENUE

WHEREAS, by way of Resolution 22-049 duly adopted on January 19, 2022 Compass Construction was awarded a contract associated with drainage improvements to Barberie Avenue; and

WHEREAS, the contract awarded to Compass Construction was in the amount of \$35,275.00; and

WHEREAS, the Project Engineer, CME Associates, has advised that the project is complete at this time. The change order reflects increases and decreases in original contract quantities required to complete the project; and

WHEREAS, CME Associates has advised that the Closeout Change Order results in a decrease in the project cost from the original amount of \$35,275.00 to an adjusted total of \$34,400.00, for a decrease of \$875.00, as specifically set forth in their correspondence dated May 23, 2022; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the requirements of the aforesaid contract, Compass Construction has submitted a two (2) year Maintenance Bond in the amount of \$5,160.00, which represents fifteen (15) percent of the final Contract Amount; and

WHEREAS, the Project Engineer, CME Associates, has recommended authorizing the aforesaid Change Order, releasing the Performance Bond and accepting the project.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Governing Body of the Borough of Highlands, that based on the above recommendations from the Project Engineer, CME Associates, that the Closeout Change Order changing the original contract amount to \$34,400.00, for a decrease of \$875.00, be and is hereby approved.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the governing body of the Borough of Highlands, that it hereby acknowledges that this project has been satisfactorily completed and accepts same.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the governing body of the Borough of Highlands that it authorizes the acceptance of the two (2) year Maintenance Bond No. B 1256932 in the sum of \$5,160.00 issued by Selective Insurance Company.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that any lien claims filed more than sixty (60) days after the adoption of this Resolution shall be ineffective pursuant to N.J.S.A. 2A:44-132.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that upon expiration of said sixty (60) day period, if no lien claim notices have been filed, the Borough of Highlands shall release Performance Bond No. 1256932 issued by Selective Insurance Company in the amount of \$35,275.00.

RESOLUTION 22-136

APPROVING CANNABIS ESTABLISHMENT

WHEREAS, on January 18, 2010, Governor Jon Corzine signed the New Jersey Compassionate Use Medical Marijuana Act, <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 24:61-1 et seq., which provided for the legalization of medical marijuana and creation of a program to allow persons suffering from qualifying debilitating medical conditions to obtain medical marijuana in a safe, timely and compassionate manner; and

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Wildlife Action plan is a comprehensive action agenda for the conservation of native wildlife, the restoration of important lands and water, and public education targeting the needs of rare wildlife in New Jersey,

Because habitat integrity is critical to healthy biodiversity we will manage publicly owned lands in accordance with wildlife management actions laid out in the New Jersey Wildlife Action Plan and will promote the management of all protected lands to promote biodiversity.

We will protect wildlife habitats and maintain connectivity of habitat when formulating an open space acquisition strategy, open space stewardship plans and through the municipal master plan including planning and zoning ordinances.

We will seek to minimize disturbance of critical wildlife populations and their habitats from human activities, subsidized predators and invasive species.

When possible and appropriate, we will work with neighboring municipalities to implement the principles across municipal boundaries.

When possible and appropriate, we will strive to monitor and implement appropriate management of municipal easements to ensure native vegetation and wildlife takes precedence over invasive and/or exotic species.

RECOGNIZING that cats and dogs are an integral and valuable part of all communities, and contribute to the well-being of humans, whether as companions, service animals, or therapy pets, and

UNDERSTANDING that municipalities have an important role in ensuring the well-being of animals while balancing the needs of pet owners and non-pet owners.

WHEREAS, legislators and municipal officials report that the number of calls from citizens about animal related issues rival any other issue(s);

WHEREAS, there are approximately 2.2 million owned dogs and 2.5 million owned cats in New Jersey;

WHEREAS, State responsibility for promoting responsible pet care and ensuring that pets do not suffer due to abuse, neglect, or lack of proper care in kennels, pet shops, shelters, and pounds (animal facilities) is vested in the Office of Animal Welfare within the New Jersey Department of Health and Senior Services;

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Society to Prevent Cruelty to Animals (NJSPCA) and municipal Animal Cruelty Investigators (ACIs) are responsible for investigating and acting as officers for the detection, apprehension, and arrest of offenders against the animal cruelty laws;

WHEREAS, New Jersey mandates training requirements for animal control officers and Animal Cruelty Investigators;

WHEREAS, New Jersey impounds over 100,000 animals per year in animal shelters and impoundment facilities;

WHEREAS, approximately 37% of the animals that enter New Jersey's impoundment facilities are euthanized, at a rate of around 3000 every month;

WHEREAS, free-roaming unvaccinated cats and dogs present a potential health threat to humans through the spread of such zoonotic diseases as rabies, leptospirosis, toxoplasmosis, roundworms, animal bites, and environmental contamination from animal feces;

WHEREAS, stray and unwanted pets place an enormous financial burden on municipalities and non-profit humane agencies organized to care for these animals;

WHEREAS, it is more humane and cost-effective to reduce the number of unwanted animals than it is to impound and euthanize unwanted or unclaimed dogs and cats;

WHEREAS, all dogs are required to be licensed in the municipality where they are housed and the majority of municipalities also require licensure of cats;

WHEREAS, all municipalities are required to canvass their residents to locate unlicensed dogs;

NOW THEREFORE, we the municipality of the Borough of Highlands resolve to take the following steps with regard to our municipal responsibilities with the intent of making the Borough of Highlands a truly sustainable community.

It is our intent to do our utmost, within the bounds of our jurisdiction, to ensure that companion animals are treated humanely, respectfully, and responsibly through public education and through exercise of powers vested within New Jersey municipalities as follows:

The Municipality pledges to:

- Enforce all animal and rabies control statutes and regulations, including the requirement to pick up and impound all stray dogs and cats, excepting stray and feral cats in managed TNR programs.
- Work to improve the enforcement of animal cruelty statutes.
- Educate our community, including school children, about their responsibilities towards the pet animals they chose to keep.
- Institute, as appropriate, cat licensing ordinances and increase the percentage of licensed dogs and cats through ease of licensing and licensing enforcement measures.
- Identify and work to implement best practices to prevent unwanted breeding through effective animal control, availability of low-cost pet spaying and neutering services, public education, and pet-friendly rental and senior housing.
- Identify alternatives to euthanasia of adoptable companion animals, including utilizing foster homes, adoption networks and providing remedial behavior training services to existing and future owners.
- Assist in identifying resources to improve the conditions and increase the capacity of animal shelters and impoundment facilities and animal control services.

OUR ACCREDITATION AND POLICY TEAM

Frank E. Rodgers retired as the Deputy Superintendent of the New Jersey State Police at the rank of Lt. Colonel after twenty-five years of service. While serving in the second highest ranking position in the largest police department in the State of New Jersey, he led the Investigations Branch which consisted of in excess of 900 detectives, analysts and scientists assigned to 57 different Units, Bureaus and Sections. A strong advocate of police professionalism, strategic planning, and accountability, he initiated and directed a complete restructuring of the organization's investigative assets predicated on the principles of "Intelligence Led Policing". During his tenure as the Deputy Superintendent of Investigations, he directed the development of the "Practical Guide to Intelligence Led Policing" which was published by the Center for Policing and Terrorism at the Manhattan Institute and was adopted in February 2009 by the U.S. Department of Justice as a national model for conducting law enforcement operations.

Following his career with the State Police, he was appointed as the first Police Director of the newly formed New Jersey State Park Police in the Department of Environmental Protection. During his tenure in that position, he developed the force of 120 officers who are responsible for protecting the eighteen (18) million annual visitors to the state's fifty-one (51) parks into a CALEA (Commission on the Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies) nationally recognized and New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police Accredited agency.

In 2008, Rodgers formed his own private consulting company. He was immediately contracted to serve as Team Leader of the baseline capabilities assessment of the national network of seventy-two (72) intelligence fusion centers commissioned by the Office of the Director of National Intelligence. To date, the company has been contracted to develop policy and provide customized training services to in excess of three hundred public safety agencies. In 2008, he was certified as an Assessor for the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) and the New Jersey Law Enforcement Accreditation Program. He is recognized by the United States Department of Justice, the United States District Court, and the Superior Court of the State of New Jersey as an expert in law enforcement procedures, policy, training and supervision. In 2011, he founded and continues to lead the Center for Public Safety & Security at Stockton University in New Jersey.

Rodgers holds a Master of Arts Degree in Education from Seton Hall University and is a graduate of the FBI National Academy. He is the co-author of a comprehensive published history of the New Jersey State Police and the Internal Affairs Investigations Manual for Investigators. He was also the recipient of the New Jersey State Police's highest award when he was named the 1990 Trooper of the Year.

<u>Vance J. Mattis</u> is the Vice-President of Accreditation at Lexipol. Mr. Mattis retired from the New Jersey State Police at the rank of Lieutenant after twenty years of service. Immediately

prior to his retirement he commanded the New Jersey State Police Academy's Law Enforcement Science Unit. Prior to his assignment to the Academy, he spent fifteen years within NJSP Field Operations Branch which culminated with his position as a Tactical Patrol Supervisor on the New Jersey Turnpike.

Mr. Mattis has extensive experience in teaching, training development, conducting needs assessments, leadership development, strategic planning, measurement of training, and the principles of return on investment. He was personally responsible for the development of the New Jersey State Police Strategic Planning Model and its implementation organization wide. During his tenure within the Executive Development Training Unit, Mr. Mattis developed and delivered rank specific supervisory training for the ranks of Sergeant through Lieutenant Colonel.

Mr. Mattis is one of the founding members of the Stockton University Center for Public Safety and Security (CPSS), an academic initiative in partnership with our State's public safety and security sectors. In the role as a Consultant to the Center, he serves as the class coordinator and lead instructor for both the NJSACOP Front Line Supervision and Middle Management Leadership programs.

From 2011 to 2017, Mr. Mattis developed training products, and served as both a proctor and as an instructor for the New Jersey Regional Intelligence Academy (RIA). During this same period, he authored multiple strategic plans and organizational assessments for municipal, county, state, and private institutions.

Mr. Mattis holds a Master's degree of administrative science from Fairleigh Dickinson University, a Bachelor of Arts degree in criminal justice from Seton Hall University, and an Associate's degree in law enforcement science from Mercer County Community College. The Long Hill Township Police Department was the first Nationally Accredited Law Enforcement Agency in New Jersey designated by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) in 1985. During his tenure with the Long Hill Township Police Department Chief Peoples served as the Accreditation Manager and subsequently guided the department through several re-accreditation on site assessments.

Chief Peoples (Ret.) served in every position and command of the Long Hill Township Police Department, prior to his appointment as Chief of Police, which includes Police Officer, Detective, Patrol Sergeant, Detective Sergeant, Lieutenant Division Commander and Executive Officer Captain responsible for inspectional services, internal affairs, and National Accreditation. Chief Peoples is a member of the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police and the Morris County Police Chiefs Association and has served on the Executive Board.

Chief Peoples is an original Commissioner member of the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police Accreditation Commission formed in 2003. In 2005, he was appointed Commission Chair for the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police Accreditation Commission. Chief Peoples has served as an Assessor and Team Leader for the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies between 2002 and 2010. He has conducted numerous on-site assessments for the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police and the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies in the State of New Jersey and nationwide.

Chief Peoples has served as the Director of the Morris County, New Jersey Emergency Communications Center, in the Morris County Department of Public Safety, which is the largest regional Communications Center in New Jersey. The Morris County Emergency Communications Center achieved National CALEA Communications Accreditation in 2015 and were re-accredited in 2018. In 2020, the Morris County Communications Center was awarded APCO 33 Training Certification, one of only 15 Emergency Communications Centers nationwide to hold both CALEA Accreditation and APCO 33 Certification. He served as the Accreditation Manager for the Morris County Emergency Communications Center for the first CALEA Communications Accreditation Award.

Chief Peoples holds a Master of Administrative Science from Fairleigh Dickinson University, a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice from Thomas Edison State College and an Associate Degree in Criminal Justice from Thomas Edison State College. He is a graduate of the 218th Class of the F.B.I. National Academy. Chief Peoples holds the Emergency Number Professional (ENP) certification from the National Emergency Number Association (NENA).

Theodore "Ted" Bremer Jr. began his public safety career in 1988 as a volunteer firefighter, EMT, and rescue diver with the Denville (NJ) Fire Department. In 1991, Ted became a dispatcher and then a Class II Special Law Enforcement Officer with the Denville Township Police Department. He served in that capacity until the Long Hill Township Police Department hired him as a police officer in 1994.

During his employment with the Long Hill Township Police Department, Ted served in many capacities, most notably as the department's Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) accreditation manager, training officer, policy writer, and patrol supervisor. As the department's accreditation manager, Ted led the department through its initial CALEA accreditation self-assessment phase and three reaccreditations. In 1999, Ted was one of only seven accreditation managers the New Jersey.

In 2001, Ted formed the New Jersey Public Safety Accreditation Coalition (PAC), an IRS-certified non-profit corporation. His vision was to create an organization of accreditation managers who would support one another and each other's departments in their pursuit of accreditation. Over the years, Ted grew the PAC's membership to over 140 Public Safety agencies. During this time, as the PAC's Chief Executive Officer, he began consulting work with diverse and complex

organizations regarding accreditation implementation. In 2006, Ted's consulting work resulted in the New York City Police Department's (NYPD) Police Academy becoming CALEA accredited for the first time. Following the success of the NYPD, the New Jersey State Police became accredited through his consulting work in 2007. In 2005, Ted created the Excellence in Policing and Accreditation Conference and partnered with Princeton University to host it annually. These conferences trained over a thousand accreditation managers. Ted retired from the PAC in 2019 after 18 years of distinguished service.

Ted has been an original founding member of the Rodgers Group since 2008. He is one of only four principal compliance policy writers for the team. Ted has also served in the capacity of project manager, most notably with the Camden County Police Department (CCPD). As the CCPD project manager, Ted personally led the department through to successful CALEA accreditation in 2019. In addition, as a principal policy writer, Ted has authored thousands of custom policies for hundreds of different types of law enforcement and public safety agencies in several other states. Most notably, Ted is responsible for over 170 New Jersey law enforcement agencies' regulatory compliance with the state's municipal detention facility standards (N.J.S.A. 10A) and applicable juvenile standards (N.J.S.A. 2A).

Ted holds a Bachelor of Science in Human Services, focusing on the Administration of Justice, from Thomas Edison State University. Ted is currently a graduate student at the University of Central Florida pursuing his M.S./Ph.D. degrees in Criminology and Police Leadership.

Dan Walsh retired from the New Jersey State Police at the rank of Lieutenant in 2008 after a distinguished career spanning 29 years. He began his law enforcement career as a general patrol trooper in Southern New Jersey and served many years in several specialized investigative units tasked with protecting the New Jersey gaming industry in Atlantic City.

Upon his promotion to lieutenant, he was transferred to the organizations Office of Professional Standards where he served as a Staff Inspector and Investigator. During this time, he was responsible for conducting internal investigations into allegations of misconduct, specifically excessive use of force and false arrest allegations. He was also responsible for conducting facility and personnel inspections to ensure compliance with Federal and State policies, Division S.O.P.'s and Rules and Regulations.

In 2006, Lt. Walsh was assigned as a core group member of the Division's CALEA National Accreditation project. During his tenure in this assignment, he was responsible for researching, writing and revising all of the Division's policy to meet the criteria mandated by the C.A.L.E.A. standards. During the next 19 years, Deputy Chief Hishmeh played an integral role with his agency's subsequent re-accreditation efforts and written directive system development. Sam had the privilege of serving in many diverse roles within the department and ascended to the rank of Deputy Chief of Police.

During his twenty-five-year career, he managed many functions such as personnel management, fiscal management, evidence management, records management, training coordination, inspectional services, internal affairs, and national accreditation.

While assigned to the Detective Bureau, Sam received a letter of commendation from then Morris County Prosecutor Michael Murphy for his investigative work on a homicide investigation as well as a letter of commendation from the FBI SAC of the Rutland Vermont Field Office, for his investigative assistance in the identification of a serial rapist.

Deputy Chief Hishmeh is a CALEA certified assessor and team leader for the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police. Additionally, he has maintained a high degree of education in the accreditation process by attending numerous CALEA training seminars.

During the past 14 years, Sam has developed written directives for over 150 law enforcement agencies, ranging in size from, small to large metropolitan police departments, county prosecutor's offices and county sheriff's offices. He had served in every division of the department. Following his retirement from the West Orange Police Department, Mr. Rogers became the assistant business administrator for the township and served in that capacity from 2006 to 2010 until co-founding the Rodgers Group, LLC. He has been a managing consultant and policy writer since its inception.
