






* Have you served or are you serving on a town board? Which ones and when?

* Why do you want to serve on a town board? What would you specifically like to accomplish?

I would like to serve on a town board to fulfill my duty as a citizen. An important aspect of the US is being an active citizen and service to the town strengthens democracy. Hillsborough is an amazing town with many great goals that are outlined in town documents such as, the UDO, Comprehensive Sustainability Plan, Future Land Use Map, etc. My goal for serving on a board is to listen to community members, appointed board members, town staff and elected officials to recommend policies that align with town values, value stewardship of the Eno River, promote sustainable town growth, provide universal access, and show Hillsborough as a good neighbor. My specific goals beyond representing the voices of my neighbors include for the Parks Board, implementing green infrastructure in the parks for demonstrating and educating visitors, and ensuring all parks are universally accessible and safe. The parks are a public space where all visitors feel welcome and have their needs met. I would also like to investigate recreational opportunities for middle and high school aged children. The Skate Spot is a great starting point for teen spaces. On the Planning Board, I would recommend town growth that provides commercial and residential opportunities for the diversity of interests. As well as look for ways to keep Hillsborough affordable. On the Board of Adjustments, I want to listen to hearings and follow town ordinances, maps and other guiding documents when hearing cases. It is important to uphold the town ordinances.

* Do you have relevant work, volunteer or educational experience for the boards you selected?

For the past two years, I have prepared minutes for the Board of Adjustments, Planning Board, Parks and Recreation Board, and Tree Board. Thus, I am familiar with board proceedings, staff, and decorum relevant to any of the boards I selected to serve on. This also means I have insight on decisions that form the trajectory of the town. Gaining insight over the past two years from multiple boards also gives me a comprehensive perspective for how one particular board's vote affects others and the decisions of the town commissioners. Ending my minutes preparer work, in the fall, I will begin teaching math at Cedar Ridge High School after earning my Master's of Arts in Teaching from NCSU. At the school, I hear from students, staff, and parents about their views of the town as many of them are residents or live in the surrounding communities. My teaching education has given me the tools to communicate ideas, research, and productively engage in conflict of ideas that will aid my role on the boards. Also, I have worked in the service industry as staff, an artist, and a small business owner so I can empathize with the industry present in town and promote policies effective for business owners and residents. A few attributes of Hillsborough is the myriad of small businesses and the art scene, which need town policies to sustain them. One area I would like to continue work on, is keeping housing prices lower so service industry workers can live in town. An aspect of these experiences that is important for a board member is speaking to people with a variety of ideas. Finally, over the years, I have volunteered for numerous museums and parks like Olympic Sculpture Park in Seattle, the Museum of Natural History in Raleigh, and the North Carolina Museum of Art. Each place has shaped my views on public spaces and their important role in the cities. I also attended Hillsborough University's, Government 101 that gave me an overview of town operations.

* How are you connected to Hillsborough?

I grew up in Raleigh, NC, moved to Asheville, NC; Seattle, WA; BC, Canada; Dresden, Germany, and finally to Hillsborough in 2017. Since moving here, my family (2 adults, 3 kids, and a dog) have owned property in the Fairview neighborhood for 7 years and prior to that rented in West Hillsborough for 1.5 years. I will be teaching at a local high school, Cedar Ridge, and have been employed by the town for two years. My children attend Hillsborough Elementary School and play at the town parks. My husband plays soccer at Gold Park every Saturday and Cates Creek every Thursday. In general, my family eats at the local restaurants, traverses the streets, and volunteers for a non-profit in town, Ears Eyes Nose Paws.

* Have you reviewed town plans and other documents available on the town website?

During my time as board meeting minutes preparer, I viewed many presentations by town staff explaining town plans and documents, such as the UDO, Comprehensive Sustainability Plan and Future Land Use Map. They have explained how to find town information on the website, although I am still getting used to it. As the minutes preparer, I often consult the town website for specific names, job titles, ordinances, and the like.

* What challenges facing the town could be addressed by the board or boards on which you wish to serve?

Of the challenges facing the town, three that can be addressed by the board are affordability, sustainability, and pedestrian access. The Planning Board can address affordability for business owners and residents through development incentives and land use. The Planning Board can also incentivize green infrastructure and pedestrian access to developers. Sustainability can also be addressed by zoning, like ensuring the flood zone is respected, the town does not grow beyond their utility capacity, and the town maintains a healthy commercial to residential ratio. Pedestrian access is also promoted by the board through developer incentives and zoning. The Parks and Recreation Board can support those of lower Socioeconomic Status with free Wi-Fi, a healthy, safe place for all people to recreate, and a cool space in the hot summer. The board can also recommend amenities and design that promote sustainability like green infrastructure and durable materials. Sustainability for the town also means pedestrian access to reduce reliance on vehicles and promote healthy habits for its residents through greenways, crosswalks and designated bike lanes. Finally, the Board of Adjustments can alleviate these challenges by maintaining the essence of the UDO. The Board of Adjustments has an important place in interpreting town code for the betterment of the town towards through sustainability and affordability.

Summary:

Per the resolution of intent to close this unimproved, unopened right-of-way, staff posted public notices at the right-of-way, mailed certified letters to impacted property owners, and published legal notices as prescribed by state law. The public hearing is to be held at the meeting tonight.

There is a recorded right-of-way designated as a portion of South Hassel Street between 233 and 301 W. Margaret Lane that runs from West Margaret Lane south to the Eno River, that the town nor a developer have ever paved or dedicated for public maintenance. The right-of-way is not planned for a bridge over the river for vehicular access to the other side, or to provide future public river access. There have been various levels of town maintenance of this right-of-way over the years. At one point neighbors report that the entire right of way was maintained by being graveled by the town annually, however the right of way is almost exclusively used by the neighbors on either side as their driveways/parking areas and not by the general traveling public. The shared driveway terminates about 100 feet into the full length of the right-of-way. Currently the town only maintains the first few feet of this apron onto West Margaret Lane for a smooth transition to the roadway.

Additionally, a neighbor has placed a greenhouse structure and at one point a dock into the river and other miscellaneous items in the right-of-way since it functions more like private property than a street. Since this right-of-way acts as a shared driveway and it is not planned to be improved or maintained in full by the town in the future, staff recommends closing it and allowing the property owners to instead record a shared driveway access easement and public utility easement so that there may be better utilization of the land. There is a sewer line that runs partially down the right-of-way and both neighbors use the driveway to access their lots.

Financial impacts:

Low/none

Staff recommendation and comments:

If there is no public comment indicating reasoning contrary to closure, staff recommends the board adopt the order to close the right-of-way.

Next steps would be for the petitioner to prepare a plat map that abandons the right-of-way along with the order to close the right-of-way and record both of those at the Orange County register of deeds.




Vicinity Map





Summary:

Funding for the Communities on the Move program was cut by Congress earlier this year. The program is provided through UNC Chapel Hill's Food, Fitness & Opportunity Research Collaborative (UNC FFORC) that has provided the following five programs in Hillsborough and to the Fairview Community: The Fairview Youth in Action Internship, Active Living Support & Technical Assistance, the Fairview Community Garden, and Women on the Move. Funding ends for these programs on Oct. 1. The organization is requesting \$68,836 so these programs can continue through the end of the fiscal year. This would essentially be "bridge" funding to provide time to explore ways to fund these programs starting in Fiscal Year 2026 (July 1, 2025) and beyond. UNC FFORC has submitted several grant applications to find alternative funding but has not yet had a response. They have also reached out to Orange County government. Hillsborough's town manager and assistant manager are meeting with Orange County's manager and assistant manager on Thursday, Sept. 18 to discuss this matter. As of today, there is no funding source to continue these programs.

Financial impacts:

The total Community Reinvestment budget for Fiscal Year 2026 is \$45,800. The following table shows the funded items:

Paying for the request would likely have to come from town savings (fund balance) since the contingency has likely been spent after the damages from Tropical Storm Chantal. The other option is cutting existing expenses from departments.

If the town were to fully fund this program annually starting in Fiscal Year 2027 (July), assuming FFORC is not able to get financial support from other sources, that would add about \$91,781 to the town's annual budget or the equivalent of 0.417 cents on the tax rate, just under half a cent. An increase of this size in spending will likely

create financial pressure for a tax increase at some point in the future to cover the cost. Or corresponding cuts to future departmental requests would need to be made.

Staff recommendation and comments:

This is a policy decision to be made by the town board. A few quick comments to consider as the town board weighs this decision:

- The Communities on the Move programs appear to be widely used and supported in the neighborhood.
- The program has partnered with the Fairview Community Watch to engage the town on a variety of community safety improvements. This has improved communication, interaction, and problem-solving capabilities between all parties and several town departments (e.g., police, public works, community services, public space and sustainability, and administration).
- <u>Short-term option</u>: provide "bridge" funding for the next 2 quarters (6 months or through the end of March 2026). This allows time for FFORC to find other funding sources.
 - Having temporary funding in place from the town may also help them in acquiring other resources.
 - If at the end of the next quarter or two additional funding is needed, FFORC can make a follow-up request with a progress update in March to fill in whatever gap may remain in the final quarter of this fiscal year).
 - Additionally, this gives FFORC time to search for longer term funding options for Fiscal Year 2027 and beyond. This allows them to submit a community reinvestment request as part of the town's Fiscal Year 2027-29 budget process. Being a new request this would likely go on the unfunded list as is the case with items not already in the multi-year budget, and thus compete with departmental needs, other community reinvestment requests, and all other General Fund items.
 - It's important to note that the town has raised property taxes for two consecutive years, going through a costly year after the impacts of Tropical Storm Chantal, and the current budget has no new positions added despite growing workloads, thus, the Fiscal Year 2027-29 budget process is anticipated to be very challenging.
- <u>Source of "bridge" funding</u>: If the town board would like to provide funding, for some or all the request being made, the recommendation is to direct the town manager to 1) have staff prepare a budget amendment for the Oct. 13 board meeting, and 2) have an agreement prepared similar to those that are signed with non-profits receiving funding support with the town.

INTRODUCTION

The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill's Food, Fitness & Opportunity Research Collaborative (UNC FFORC, pronounced 'fork') is writing to request funding to sustain the Communities on the Move (COTM) initiative. This initiative encompasses several separate but complementary programs, including The Fairview Youth in Action Internship, Active Living Support & Technical Assistance, the Fairview Community Garden, and Women on the Move. These programs mobilize residents to address barriers to active living by building residents' capacity to become leaders and change agents and creating opportunities for healthy eating and physical activity.

Earlier this year, Congress passed the federal budget that eliminated the national SNAP-Ed program almost immediately (October 1, 2025, end date). This is the main source of support UNC FFORC has used to run these programs and, as a result, these programs will not continue past October 1, 2025, without support. We are therefore requesting direct funding to ensure their continuation for the remainder of FY26 (we are proposing an October 1, 2025 to June 30, 2026 contract period to follow the municipal fiscal calendar year and anticipating a subsequent request for FY 2027.

ABOUT UNC FFORC

The Food, Fitness & Opportunity Research Collaborative (FFORC) is a research group based at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, led by Dr. Molly De Marco, a Nutrition professor in the Gillings School of Global Public Health. Our mission is to improve health equity and outcomes for North Carolina communities and beyond (read about our values here). In 2010, FFORC received a grant to start a community-academic partnership to pilot a study of the impact of community gardens at Black churches on youth and adults. This work has expanded to supporting 33 gardens across North Carolina. Recognizing that healthy living requires more than just nutritious food, in 2018, we launched an active living study in partnership with organizations like Habitat for Humanity. Our active living work includes running a youth internship program, where we work with youth of color in rural communities to identify barriers to active living and healthy eating and then support them in developing strategies to ameliorate those barriers. Through our activities, we have altered the community landscape by expanding access to healthy foods and reducing barriers to active living through the building of infrastructure like covered bus stops, stop signs and bike racks. PROGRAM IMPACTS

UNC FFORC's Communities on the Move (COTM) initiative encompasses several separate but complementary programs, including: The Fairview Youth in Action Internship, Active Living Support & Technical Assistance, the Fairview Community Garden, and Women on the Move

Fairview Youth in Action

Fairview Youth in Action (FYIA) is a paid summer internship that equips high school students in Hillsborough's Fairview neighborhood to shape the future of their community. Each year, the interns are provided with both hands-on and didactic training in social determinants of health, city planning principles and advocacy. The interns then design research projects that respond to real neighborhood priorities, such as improving parks and green spaces, creating engaging public places, making streets safer for walking and rolling, and increasing access to healthy foods. Projects are shared with neighbors, partners, and policymakers during Walk Fairview Day. FFORC team members, community members and the interns continue during the school year to turn ideas into action.

In the 2024-2025 school year, eight interns and two youth coordinators—both alumni of the program – created and advocated for three research projects, including improving street safety, creating more vibrant public spaces, and more inclusive parks. As a result of their efforts, the Town of Hillsborough installed speed bumps and stop signs on Rainey Avenue, a key collector street in the neighborhood, to calm traffic. Several improvements were made to the Dorothy N. Johnson Community Center, including a new bus shelter, community kitchen, native landscaping, and a little free library. Additionally, we developed partnerships with Orange County government to advocate for trail improvements and a proposed soccer field at Fairview Park.

Active Living Support & Technical Assistance

Through FFORC's Active Living Support and Technical Assistance, we provide the staffing and expertise needed to turn resident ideas into action. Through this role, residents receive hands-on support to plan and carry out projects identified in the Activate! Plan and by *Youth in Action* interns. Activities include guiding walk audits, supporting traffic calming workshops, coordinating active living events, and providing technical expertise on design and implementation of neighborhood improvements.

Fairview Community Garden

The Fairview Community Garden has significantly expanded access to healthy, affordable produce in Fairview. Each season, dozens of residents rely on the garden as both a food source and a gathering place. It not only provides fresh fruits and vegetables but also fosters community connection, skill sharing, and opportunities for neighbors to work together toward healthier lifestyles.

UNC FFORC supports the garden by providing technical assistance, monitoring and evaluation, sharing best practices, and connecting Fairview to a statewide network of community gardens.

Women on the Move

Women on the Move (WOTM) is a community-rooted initiative designed to promote physical activity and social connection among women living in or closely connected to the Fairview neighborhood. Over the past 3 years, through weekly two-hour exercise classes, about 50 participants not only have engaged in consistent physical activity, but also built relationships, strengthened community ties, and gained tools to support healthier lifestyles. The program is made possible through dedicated funding that supports three community coordinators and two experienced fitness instructors. This staffing structure ensures culturally responsive outreach, consistent engagement, and high-quality instruction tailored to the needs and interests of participants. By combining health education with culturally relevant movement and peer connection, WOTM continues to be an opportunity to lead more active, connected lives.



FUNDING CHALLENGE AND REQUEST

Over the 12-month 2025 fiscal year, UNC FFORC contributed \$184,506 to fund these programs. With the elimination of SNAP-Ed, these resources are no longer available, creating a substantial funding gap. The programs will also lose administrative and program support and nutrition and active living expertise from UNC FFORC staff.

These programs are proven, community-driven, and highly valued. Continued support will allow participants to maintain access to physical activity, healthy food, and strong community connections, while we work to identify sustainable, long-term funding solutions. We are actively pursuing additional funding opportunities through state and foundation sources. We strive to be good financial stewards and are committed to providing regular updates on any changing needs or additional capacities that emerge from these efforts. We are respectfully requesting the provision of direct funding of \$68,836 over 9 months in FY26, as detailed in the table below.
