Rika Mouw, city resident, commented in opposition to Ordinance 25-27 noting recent purchases of land for the peatland project, flooding issues, impacts to the neighboring properties, and wildlife.

Kirsten Styvaar, city resident, commented in opposition to Ordinance 25-27 citing impacts to the wetlands, erosion issues, claiming it was spot zoning and illegal and did not want to live next to a fish processing business.

Chris Long, city resident, commented on Ordinance 25-07 encouraging the City Council to support the recommendation proposed by the City Manager in Memorandum CC-25-088.

Kim McNett, city resident, commented in opposition of Ordinance 25-27 citing observations regarding stormwater runoff, wildlife impacts, green infrastructure, stating reports show that the peat is 15 feet of more in the proposed area that a fish processing business is being planned for and the permit for fill is not for the proposed project.

Ken Castner, city resident, commented in opposition of Ordinance 25-27 citing that the rezone was not allowable due to spot zoning and that it should have never been approved by Commission or presented by the staff.

Penelope Haas, commenting as President of Kachemak Bay Conservation Society, in opposition of Ordinance 25-27 citing peat depth, impacts to altering the retention of water and potential for damage and who would bear that cost.

Annette Koth, city resident, commented in opposition of Ordinance 25-27 citing industrial operations in residential neighborhoods, impacts to the road and increased traffic, safety hazards to a Tsunami Route and impacts to wildlife.

Heather Kallevig, resident, commented in opposition of Ordinance 25-27 supporting all the other comments and encouraged Council to deny the rezone.

Mayor Lord asked for discussion on the substituted ordinance.

Council discussed the following concerns:

- Design and permitting costs
- Increased size in the match requirement
- Intent is to have 100% design to enable higher probability of award for federal funding
- Will replace floats and ramps to bring to industry standards and covered ramps
 - This project has not changed since originally presented
- Total Grant amount for PIDP was \$48 Million that included environmental permitting, water and sewer, total project costs are \$60 million
- Documentation of how the \$2.2 million is being spent
 - o 5% of the budget
 - o Peltola had included \$285,000
- If the City does not accept this grant we are responsible for entire costs of the project
- The ramps and floats are beyond their life span approximately 30-50 years old
- Clarification provided that having 100% design and permitting would provide better guidance on actual cost estimates.
 - Each year everything goes up in costs

City Clerk Krause commented it was a great meeting and announced the vacancies on the ADA Advisory Board and Economic Development Advisory Commission along with the opportunity for a Student Commissioner on the Economic Development Advisory Commission.

COMMENTS OF THE CITY MANAGER

City Manager Jacobsen commented it was a good meeting and she will have a packet put together to include the signed resolution, minutes and what is submitted to AMCO for the Legislators.

COMMENTS OF THE MAYOR

Mayor Lord reminded everyone about the opportunities to provide comments on various topics, information and links can be found in her newsletter in the Mayor's webpage on the City website. She then commented on the recent local event, Snow Rondy at Chapman School in Anchor Point and the Chess tournament that was attended by 70 people, the event was promoted by Andy Haas and Franco Venuti donated a chess set that he made out of clay 50 years ago.

Councilmember Venuti commented that the young man who won the chess set came by their house to express his appreciation for the set on Saturday. She noted that this was a good meeting and expressed appreciation for the public participation and believes it really is a force in their little hamlet by the sea. Ms. Venuti then announced the Peony Celebration and encouraged everyone to save the date starting July 1st through August 17th, Amber Baldus was recognized by Anchor Point as leading Citizen and expressed her thanks for the City Manager providing homemade soup tonight, it was delicious.

Councilmember Parsons expressed his appreciation for the Clerk keeping them on track and rolling, the City Manager for providing all the information seems there is something new each meeting and expressed a special thank you to everyone who came or attended the meeting and submitted comments noting it was very helpful and powerful in a positive way.

Councilmember Aderhold expressed comments on why they are here as they represent the residents of the Community and the more input from the public the better decisions the Council can make, if there are issues that is what council is here for. It is wonderful to have two people like them volunteer in our community. She announced the Snomads Fun Run will be with ATV this weekend due to the low snow winter and the Fundraiser for the Watermelon trail easement noting the public can find more information on their website.

Councilmember Hansen commented that Dr. Bell reminded her to announce the extra softball practices during spring break and reported that he was an amazing employer and she could not do this service on the Council without his encouragement and allowing her to have the time off to also spend time with her kids doing sports events and the like. She then provided input that her first visit to Juneau for AML and Lobbying was really interesting and recounted attending her first meetings in Anchorage were very helpful. Ms. Hansen appreciated having the City Attorney in person at the meetings and putting a face to the voice.

Deb Curtis is appointed to the seat held by Kate Finn who did not seek re-appointment on the Library Advisory Board. Her term to expire on April 1, 2028.


Deborah Isaak is reappointed to the Economic Development Advisory Commission for a term to expire on April 1, 2028.

Summary:

Return a portion of funds appropriated for construction of the water main replacement portion of the Ohlson Lane and Bunnell Avenue Roadway and Water Improvement Project. This is not an increase in the anticipated project cost, but rather a correction in the funding sources used.

Background:

This project began with a design and study by Nelson Engineering in 2023 which recommended that Public Works Department reconstruct the subgrade for Ohlson Lane and West Bunnell Avenue. According to the 100% cost estimate, the total cost will be approximately \$2,559,149.

The project additionally replaces the water main on the affected roads as well as construct storm sewer in conjunction with the new curb to alleviate local stormwater issues. As stated in previous legislation, the water main is being replaced because it is an approximately 60-year old cast iron pipe that is near the end of its service life and is prone to failure. Approximately 10-years ago a cost estimate was developed for the replacement of this water main prior to the conception of the roadway reconstruction project, but the project was shelved for a later date. The roadway reconstruction offers a unique opportunity to replace the aging infrastructure as part of one effort, thereby avoiding digging up the newly constructed road to make future repairs or replace the pipe. The storm sewer portion of the project will replace some aging drainage piping and improve storm drainage issues in this neighborhood as well as to accommodate the projects new street design.

Public Works Department submitted questionnaires to the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation (ADEC) in 2023 to apply for loans to cover both the water main replacement and storm drain portions of the construction project from the Alaska Drinking Water Fund and Alaska Clean Water Fund respectively. The ADEC added both the water main replacement and storm drain to their project priority list and both projects scored high and were granted 100% principal forgiveness subsidy in the following amounts:

Ohlson & Bunnell Water Main Replacement: \$491,400

Ohlson & Bunnell Storm Drain Construction: \$324,000

The principle forgiveness between the two loans totals to \$851,400 in loan subsidy which will cover a portion of the construction costs for the subject project. Ordinance 24-61 was passed on January 28, 2025 which obligated \$2,000,000 from HART Roads to supplement the two ADEC loans in order to obligate money towards the construction effort for a total of \$2,851,000, which is greater than the estimated project cost of \$2,559,149.

The updated construction cost estimate by Nelson Engineering was provided to the City around the same time as the passage of Ordinance 24-61. The cost estimate shows the water portion of the construction project is estimated to cost \$790,450. At this point, we looked into why there was such a large discrepancy between the loan application's cost estimate and the new Engineer's Estimate. This is when it was identified that the approximately 10-year old engineer's estimate was used at the time of the ADEC application because there was no better data available at the time.

For the water main replacement portion of the project, the original plan was to use an appropriation (Ordinance 23-23 (A-3)) of \$90,000 from the Water CARMA to cover design related costs, and the ADEC Loan of \$491,400 (with principle forgiveness) to cover the construction costs. The design by Nelson Engineering cost \$55,867, Alaska DOT permits cost \$2,600, and ADEC review cost \$1,088 leaving a balance of \$30,445 from the original \$90,000 Water CARMA appropriation.

Therefore, the appropriation of \$2,000,000 via Ordinance 24-61 from HART Roads actually overstated the HART Roads portion of the project cost. This proposed ordinance for supplemental appropriation is intended to fund the balance of the water portion of the construction project from Water CARMA as it originally should have been.

Estimated Construction Cost - \$790,405

Less the Anticipated remaining balance from Ordinance 23-23 (A-3) - \$30,445

Less the ADEC Loan (with principle forgiveness) - \$491,400

For a total balance of - \$268,605

The overall anticipated cost of the project has not increased, but rather the HART Roads portion of the funding via Ordinance 24-61 was mistakenly overstated. This Ordinance will remove \$268,605 of the previously appropriated \$2,000,000 HART Roads funding obligated via Ordinance 24-61 towards the Project to be returned to HART Roads balance.

Recommendation:

Public Works recommends that Ordinance 25-28 be adopted.

Issue: Construction funds needed for the Ohlson Lane and West Bunnell Avenue Road Reconstruction Project.

Background:

This project began with a design and study by Nelson Engineering in 2023 which recommended that Public Works Department reconstruct the subgrade for Ohlson Lane and West Bunnell Avenue. On January 3, 2024, Nelson Engineering completed a 95% design for the subject project. Public Works expecting to receive the 100% design drawings in approximately one month. According to the cost estimate attached to the 95% design, the project will cost a total of \$2,370,409 to construct.

In addition to needed road improvement, this project will:

- Replace the 59-year-old cast iron pipe that is near the end of its service life and is prone to failure. This is an opportunity to replace the aging infrastructure to avoid having to dig up the newly constructed road in the near future to either repair or replace the pipe.
- Construct storm sewer in conjunction with the new curb for the street. The storm drain is being built to improve storm drainage issues in this neighborhood as well as to accommodate the projects new curb, curb bulb-outs for traffic calming and street parking.

Public Works submitted questionnaires to the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation (ADEC) to apply for loans to cover both the water main replacement and storm drain portions of the construction project from the Alaska Drinking Water Fund and Alaska Clean Water Fund respectively. The ADEC added both the water main replacement and storm drain to their project priority list and both projects are 100% covered by principal forgiveness subsidy in the following amounts:

Ohlson & Bunnell Water Main Replacement: \$491,400

Ohlson & Bunnell Storm Drain Construction: \$324,000

The loan forgiveness totals to \$815,400 in loan subsidy which will cover a portion of the construction costs for the subject project. There are currently no other funds allocated for this construction project, meaning that to date, the City will be responsible for funding the balance of approximately \$1,555,009. That amount is expected to increase based on the 100% design, and current trends of cost increases.

Recommendation:





The purpose of this Memorandum is to recommend that Public Works proceed with award of a Task Order to RESPEC Company, LLC under the 2022-2025 City engineering term contract to provide a biddable design for the Highland Drive Culvert Replacement Project.

Through adoption of Ordinance 25-25, the FY25 Capital Budget includes \$71,000 from the HART Roads Fund to complete this design.

The winter of 2024/2025 has been unusually warm and wet, resulting in numerous slope instabilities around the City. Highland Drive at the crossing with Bidarki Creek was observed to have major slope instability resulting in sloughing soils continuously eroding, sloughing and encroaching upon the road. It is estimated that the Bidarki Creek culvert on Highland Drive is at least 30-years old and is beyond its expected life. The sloughed soils are nearly blocking the culvert on the downstream side and the culvert replacement and road reconstruction is complicated and requires detailed design plans.

Recommendation:

That the City Council review and approve the Resolution 25-022 to award a Task Order to RESPEC Company, LLC in the Not to Exceed amount of \$71,000 for engineering design services for the Highland Drive Culvert Replacement Project.

Background

Easy Street is a half mile long road that begins within Homer City limits, and travels from Skyline Drive north into the Bridge Creek Watershed Protection District. (See map next page). It was originally built 87 years ago to access the Broderson homestead. The City maintains the portion within City Limits, and the Kenai Peninsula Borough has maintained that portion of the road within the unincorporated Borough for 40 years. This street provides access to several private land owners and City properties. This is the only road (and Bridge Creek crossing) that provides access to the neighborhood.


The north 444 feet of this road travels over land that is a Native Allotment, and is therefore subject to management by the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA). The BIA regulates lands under their purview and has alleged that the portion of Easy Street on the allotment is an unauthorized use (trespass). Area property owners have been working to resolve the issue for decades; the City and another private land owner have granted public access easements for all the other sections of Easy St. in the last few years. To completely resolve the issue on this last section of Easy St., an entity is needed to apply to BIA for a public easement across the Native Allotment property (see red line on map). To date, the Kenai Peninsula Borough has declined to apply for an access easement, and understandably, as the Borough likely has many instances of roads across Native Allotments Borough wide. Working with BIA on access issues is a time intensive undertaking, and can be expensive in terms of legal fees.

Fortunately, area property owners including Jay Farmwald (retired professional engineer) have spent years navigating these regulations and have arrived at a solution with BIA, the Allottee (Roehl), and the neighborhood. To resolve this issue the City can partner in this effort by being the entity that applies for the access easement. Mr. Farmwald has and is willing to continue to do the majority of the coordination work for the project. This partnership would enable the City to resolve an access problem effecting City lands and for area property owners.

On March 14, 2025 President Trump issued an executive order that severely impacts the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), which supports library operations nationwide by distributing grants to states. In FY 2025, Alaska received \$1.27 million, which flowed to consortia and individual libraries.

If IMLS funding disappears completely, numerous statewide projects will feel the effects. Such as:

- Interlibrary loan service will be curtailed.
- Public programs will vanish, including Alaska Reads, Battle of the Books and the statewide summer reading program.
- **Services to specific patron groups** will be eliminated, particularly for blind patrons and those living in the bush.
- The Alaska Digital Library (aka Libby or OverDrive) will see major reductions in new materials.
- The SLED databases will cancel all commercial offerings, effective in December.

On a local level, the Homer Public Library has used past IMLS grants for installing outdoor Wi-Fi, upgrading the interior network, purchasing hotspots, setting up the little free libraries in City parks, training staff and buying some materials.

Recommendation:

Adopt Resolution 25-024 expressing support for the IMLS and maintaining its current services.

CONTINUING THE REDUCTION OF THE FEDERAL BUREAUCRACY

The White House March 14, 2025

By the authority vested in me as President by the Constitution and the laws of the United States of America, it is hereby ordered:

<u>Section 1</u>. <u>Purpose</u>. This order continues the reduction in the elements of the Federal bureaucracy that the President has determined are unnecessary.

Sec. 2. Reducing the Scope of the Federal Bureaucracy.

- (a) Except as provided in subsection (b) of this section, the nonstatutory components and functions of the following governmental entities shall be eliminated to the maximum extent consistent with applicable law, and such entities shall reduce the performance of their statutory functions and associated personnel to the minimum presence and function required by law:
- (i) the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service;
- (ii) the United States Agency for Global Media;
- (iii) the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars in the Smithsonian Institution;
- (iv) the Institute of Museum and Library Services;
- (v) the United States Interagency Council on Homelessness;
- (vi) the Community Development Financial Institutions Fund; and
- (vii) the Minority Business Development Agency.
- (b) Within 7 days of the date of this order, the head of each governmental entity listed in subsection (a) of this section shall submit a report to the Director of the Office of Management and Budget confirming full compliance with this order and explaining

- which components or functions of the governmental entity, if any, are statutorily required and to what extent.
- (c) In reviewing budget requests submitted by the governmental entities listed in subsection (a) of this section, the Director of the Office of Management and Budget or the head of any executive department or agency charged with reviewing grant requests by such entities shall, to the extent consistent with applicable law and except insofar as necessary to effectuate an expected termination, reject funding requests for such governmental entities to the extent they are inconsistent with this order.
- <u>Sec. 3. General Provisions.</u> (a) Nothing in this order shall be construed to impair or otherwise affect:
- (i) the authority granted by law to an executive department, agency, or the head thereof; or
- (ii) the functions of the Director of the Office of Management and Budget relating to budgetary, administrative, or legislative proposals.
- (b) This order shall be implemented consistent with applicable law and subject to the availability of appropriations.
- (c) This order is not intended to, and does not, create any right or benefit, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law or in equity by any party against the United States, its departments, agencies, or entities, its officers, employees, or agents, or any other person.

- An <u>independent agency</u> established in 1996 that is the main source of federal support
 for libraries and museums within the U.S., having the mission to "advance, support, and
 empower America's museums, libraries, and related organizations through grantmaking,
 research, and policy development."
- President Trump issued <u>an executive order on Friday, March 14, to eliminate IMLS</u> "to the maximum extent consistent with applicable law", along with several other agencies.
- U.S. federal agencies <u>exist outside the federal executive departments</u> (those headed by a Cabinet secretary) and the Executive Office of the President. In a narrower sense, the term refers only to those independent agencies that, while considered part of the executive branch, <u>have regulatory or rulemaking authority and are insulated from presidential control</u>, usually because the president's power to dismiss the agency head or a member is limited.
- Established through separate statutes passed by Congress, each respective statutory grant of authority defines the goals the agency must work towards, as well as what substantive areas, if any, over which it may have the power of rulemaking. These agency rules (or regulations), when in force, have the power of federal law.
- IMLS and the director are advised by the National Museum and Library Services Board, a <u>24-member advisory body</u> that includes the IMLS director, the deputy director for the Office of Library Services, the deputy director for the Office of Museum Services, the general counsel, and 20 presidentially appointed individuals.
- IMLS was established by the Museum and Library Services Act (MLSA) on September 30, 1996, as a result of the Museum and Library Services Act and the reauthorization and extension of that act in 2003, 2010, and 2018. Its basic function has existed under various names and organizational structures since 1937.
- IMLS receives its funding through the annual appropriations process. It is one of several independent agencies whose spending limits each year are established in the Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act.
- The FY 2025 IMLS budget request, submitted to Congress in March 2024, is \$280,000,000, including \$271,900,000 for programs and administrative costs authorized by the Museum and Library Services Act (MLSA), which includes the Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) and the Museum Services Act (MSA); \$4,200,000 for a grants program authorized by the African American History and Culture Act (AAHCA); and \$3,900,000 for a grants program authorized by the National Museum of the American Latino Act (NMALA).

- Bill Clinton signed the Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) on October 1, 1996. LSTA is a
 United States federal library grant program. Its roots come from the Library Services Act, first
 enacted in 1956. LSTA replaced the Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA), first enacted in
 1962.
- Alaska Congressman Don Young consistently demonstrated his support for America's libraries,
 most notably as a lead sponsor of reauthorizations of the Library Services and Technology Act
 (LSTA). He championed legislation supporting libraries, including the Build America's Libraries Act
 (2021), the Library Stabilization Fund Act (2020) and the Museum and Library Services Act
 (2018).
- In the past three years, Alaska has received more than \$3.6 million in LSAT allotments, most recently \$1,276,792 in 2024. Funds support various grant programs around the state and in Homer, including Interlibrary Cooperation grants, Continuing Education grants and the Statewide Library Electronic Doorway (SLED) databases that connect Alaskans to nearly 60 databases for homework help, lifelong learning and small business development.
- In Alaska, the <u>Alaska State Library administers the LSTA funds with assistance of the Governor's Advisory Council in Libraries (GAC)</u>. This board advises the State Library on the development of the Library Services and Technology Act Alaska State Plan and on the development of specific programs. Federal funds are used to support regional services grants, the 800#/ILL backup grant, interlibrary cooperation grants, and continuing education grants.
- Alaska's plan for LSTA funds for the most recent five-year period, 2023-2027 is available from the Alaska State Library. It focuses on three goals Goal 1: Alaska libraries will support <u>lifelong</u> <u>learning</u> opportunities for all Alaskans; Goal 2: Alaska libraries will provide access to content and materials in <u>various formats</u> for all Alaskans; Goal 3: Alaska libraries will explore <u>evolving roles as anchor institutions</u> that benefit and engage their communities.

The Alaska State Library, in partnership with the Anchorage Public Library, provided interlibrary loans and backup reference services free to libraries across the state, including rural, public, school, and tribal libraries. Many of these libraries cannot afford the proprietary software needed to obtain materials outside of their own collections, and the **800# Service** allows them to access materials and assistance they would not be able to get otherwise. Virtual Tours

The Alaska State Library, Archive and Museum provided CARES Act stimulus funds to the University of Alaska's Museum of the North to offer virtual tours of the Museum and their special exhibits when the state was locked down due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The modest amount of funds, which went mostly toward the acquisition and use of 360-degree cameras, made the Museum's unique collections accessible to Alaska and the world. Among other items, the cameras captured videos related to Bus 142, from the book and movie Into the Wild, which are now accessible to a wider audience as a result of these funds. IMLS Funds: \$1,350

Continuing Education Grants

Alaska is one of few states without an accredited graduate library school, and many Alaska librarians work in isolation with limited access to library management training. These professionals need to be exposed to new ideas and emerging trends in library service for patrons of all types. To support this need, the Alaska State Library regularly allocates funds to each library outlet so staff can pursue in-person and virtual training opportunities. Alaskan library patrons are extremely diverse, with many Alaska Native patrons in the rural communities and many English as a Second Language patrons in Anchorage, Fairbanks, and Juneau. Denim Day History





I. Issue: The purpose of this Memorandum is to request \$71,000 for the engineering work associated with the Highland Drive Culvert Replacement Project.

II. Background:

Public Works staff was made aware of the side slope of Highland Drive sluffing in Mid-January due to the wet winter. This location is where Highland Drive crosses the headwaters of Bidarki Creek. Bidarki Creek flows through a culvert located at the base of the canyon crossing with side slopes approaching a 1:1 slope. The upstream side of the road crossing is approximately 15-feet to the stream bed elevation and the downstream side of the road crossing is approximately 30-feet to the stream elevation. The age of the culvert is estimated to be approximately 30-years old and is well past its expected life.

The Public Works Department is closely monitoring the conditions on Highland Drive because the erosion, or sloughing, is continuing to occur and is working its way towards the road. This action has already exposed approximately 5-feet of road bed fabric. As of February 17, 2025, the erosion is within approximately 5-feet of the guardrail along the road edge. As this erosion progresses, the Public Works Department anticipates the road will have to be closed for safety pending the repair. All residents will have access to their properties during the anticipated road closure, however some residents may be temporarily inconvenienced by having to access the Sterling Highway by traveling west to Roger's Loop instead of east to West Hill Road.

The complexity of the repair work requires detailed design plans due to the nature of the site, depth of the crossing of Bidarki Creek, and the continuous flow of Bidarki Creek. The Public Works Department reached out to three qualified Term Contractors for a bid and selected the lowest responsive bidder. The design work is anticipated to take approximately 60 to 90-days

to complete. Every effort will be made to expedite this process so repair work occurs as close to spring break-up as possible.

Once the design is completed, an ordinance will be brought forward requesting funding to replace the culvert and restore the road. The repair work is beyond the capacity of the Public Works Department's staffing level and equipment available, and must be hired out.

III. RECOMMENDATIONS:

City Council appropriates \$71,000 towards the engineering design of the Highland Drive Culvert Replacement Project.

Tackle Shack Co, LLC, ('Tackle Shack') has a lease with the City for a property located at 3815 Homer Spit Road. First American Title, in conjunction with the City, reviewed the property records for the parcel. The title agent identified that the Tackle Shack property has previous leases that have not been formally terminated but should be so that the transactional record is corrected. A summary of the lease background is presented below along with the typical approach to processing assignment requests from lessees.

BACKGROUND AND APPROACH

A lease for this property was originally awarded by Council in 2009 to Homer Enterprises, LLC. Since that time, that same lease for this property has been assigned three times. Each assignment has been approved by City Council via resolution. The internal process for assignment of leases at the time was to secure approval from Council for the assignment, then to execute a 'clean copy' of the City's base lease with the new tenant.

The typical procedure is to execute an Assignment of Lease document, which together with the original lease document will constitute the full agreement between the City and the new tenant. After reviewing the facts, the recommendation of the City Attorney was to bring an Ordinance to City Council affirming the validity of the current lease with Tackle Shack and authorizing the City Manager to sign Termination of Lease documents to formally terminate the copies of the lease signed by previous leaseholders.

• February 23, 2009 Resolution 09-25(s) awards lease to Homer Enterprises, LLC

- January 14, 2019 <u>Resolution 19-001</u> authorizes lease assignment from Homer Enterprises, LLC to AKSNOWGRL RENTALS, LLC
- July 10, 2020 City receives letter from AKSNOWGRL RENTALS, LLC to City requesting to assign lease back to Homer Enterprises, LLC
- September 14, 2020 <u>Resolution 20-081</u> authorizes lease assignment from AKSNOWGRL to Homer Enterprises, LLC
- May 24, 2021 <u>Resolution 21-035</u> authorizes lease assignment from Homer Enterprises to Tackle Shack Co., LLC



Issue:

The purpose of this Memorandum is to recommend appropriating an additional \$3,200 via Change Order No. 1 to Task Order 24-01 for Kinney Engineering to complete the Preliminary Design of Non-Motorized Trails and Trailhead Connecting City of Homer Diamond Creek Property to the Proposed Highway Underpass.

Background:

The City of Homer passed Ordinance 24-06(A) amending the FY24 Capital Budget by appropriating \$25,000 from the HART Trails Fund to contract engineering services with Kinney Engineering for the Preliminary Design of Non-Motorized Trails and Trailhead Connecting the City of Homer Diamond Creek Property to the Proposed Highway Underpass. Task Order 24-01 was issued to Kinney Engineering to perform this work through our Term Contracts.

The City additionally issued a Task Order 24-02 to Kinney Engineering for the purposes of hiring a subconsultant, Happy Trails. The Task Order 24-02 was issued for \$2,000 and was intended to pass through to the sub-consultant costs as Happy Trails is not currently a Term Contractor with the City. Task Order 24-02 was mistakenly issued to Kinney Engineering through the City's Operating Budget and should have been a Change Order to the existing contract with Kinney Engineering under Task Order 24-01.

Kinney Engineering submitted an invoice for additional costs incurred beyond the contracted \$2,000 related to the proposed Diamond Creek Recreation Trail, for work relating to coordination between Happy Trails work and Kinney Engineering's work. The total invoiced to Task Order 24-02 was \$3,145.

As a housekeeping measure, the Public Works Department would like to issue a Change Order to Kinney Engineering's Task Order 24-01 in the amount of \$3,145 in order to cover the costs of the work performed under Task Order 24-02 so the payment for this work is coming from HART Trails and not the General Fund.

The Public Works Department will then close out Task Order 24-02 with no charges against the Task Order.

Recommendation:

The Public Works Department recommends that the City Council appropriate the additional \$3,200 to cover expenses associated with the proposed Diamond Creek Recreation Area Trail.

Planning Technician Steffy provided the pages related to Recreation Objectives and map that are attached.

Strategies

Monitor forest health, in partnership with the Kenai Peninsula Borough and the DNR, Division of Forestry. Include the DCRA within any local wildfire risk assessments.

Where appropriate, route non-motorized public access through forested areas so as to promote strategic firebreaks (motorized vehicles are restricted except for maintenance and grooming unless approved by the City).

Conservation Objective 2:

Preserve and protect wetlands and riparian zones within the DCRA.

Strategies:

Plan new routes for public access through the DCRA in a manner and location that minimizes impact(s) to wetlands.

Seek funding for bridge upgrades and maintenance at trail-stream crossings, and for proper trail-hardening through wet areas.

Regulate and minimize non-winter motorized travel through the DCRA except for city-approved management activities.

Conservation Objective 3:

Preserve the natural scenic qualities of the DCRA.

Strategies:

Design and install signage so as not to detract from local scenery with sign height, color, material, or placement.

Provide maps of the area near trailheads, so they are not necessary along public-access routes. Use as few trail markers as necessary.

Encourage users to pack out trash.

Prohibit overnight camping.

Identify and maintain functional landscape and ecological linkages between the DCRA, the HDF, and surrounding lands that have been protected through conservation easements or other mechanisms.

Ensure that the DCRA remains a viable wildlife corridor by protecting important habitat features and avoiding obstructions to wildlife movement.

Recreation

Recreational development within the DCRA should be focused primarily on summer use at this time, since winter access is already well-established. However, certain recreational objectives detailed here will benefit users on a year-round basis. Care should be exercised during all phases of recreational development to protect the environmental attributes of the DCRA, as well as the interests of surrounding landowners.

Recreational Objective 1:

Improve controlled, non-motorized recreational access to the DCRA.

Strategies:

Support efforts to enlarge the parking area at the Rogers Loop trailhead.

Work with the Kenai Peninsula Borough's Land Management Division to formalize year-round access from the DOT trailhead to the DCRA.

Provide a parking area and trailhead facilities at the western border of the DCRA.

Develop a preliminary plan with the AK-DOT, and seek funding, for a non-motorized route across the Sterling Highway near MP 168, in order to extend the recreational corridor to the Diamond Creek State Recreation Site on the south side of the Sterling Highway. (A pedestrian underpass at this location associated with an improved road-stream crossing should be investigated.)

Recreational Objective 2:

Construct summer-use trails within the DCRA.

Strategies:

Develop a summer trail system through and connecting upland areas ("forest islands") within the DCRA, including a route paralleling Diamond Creek (Map 1). Extend DCRA trails to the Sterling Highway and current HDF trails as shown on Map 1.

Develop summer access from the Sterling Highway-DOT trailhead to the DCRA, with trail-hardening through wet areas.

Plan and develop multi-use "loops" or trails, to include bicycling and equestrian users, where soils and slopes are suitable.

Education

Educational Objective 1:


Encourage area schools, local organizations, and area visitors to use the DCRA in sustainable ways that promote education.

Strategies:

Identify areas for observing scenery and wildlife and provide minimal-disturbance facilities (such as widened trail segments, lookouts, benches, or informational signage) to enhance visitor experiences.

Help to organize and promote educational events on significant dates, or during appropriate community events, to enhance public knowledge of forest and wetland ecology.

City of Homer FY25 RAISE Grant Update

On March 11, 2025, the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) directed Federal Department of Transportation agencies to conduct a review of all competitive grant programs and awards, including a project-by-project review of competitive award selections made in FY 2022 – FY 2025 without grant agreements or partially obligated grant agreements. This impacts the City's FY25 RAISE grant award which has not been obligated.

Under the directive, agencies will identify programs with priorities counter to the Trump Administration's Executive Orders and likely deny awards to projects that are solely focused on any of the following elements: "equity activities, Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) activities, climate change activities, environmental justice (EJ) activities, gender-specific activities, when the primary purpose is bicycle infrastructure (i.e., recreational trails and shared-use paths, etc.), electric vehicles (EV), and EV charging infrastructure." View the DOT Guidance here.

Projects with elements of these activities in the scope will be flagged for potential removal, including:

• project activities such as equity analysis, green infrastructure, bicycle infrastructure, EV and/or EV charging infrastructure.

Based on their review, agencies must recommend to the Office of the Secretary which project selections should:

- continue in their current form with no change;
- be revised with a reduced or modified scope; or
- be canceled entirely.

The scope of the City's unobligated FY25 RAISE grant award primarily addresses planning and design for sidewalks to promote pedestrian safety on Homer's heavily-traveled streets currently lacking sidewalk facilities. However, it includes an equity analysis, mentions the potential for shared bicycle-pedestrian pathways and mentions the equity and climate benefits of not needing to be reliant on vehicles for safe travel.

Staff is consulting with HDR to more fully understand the Federal process; we are prepared to advocate for these important funds by emphasizing the benefits of the project, and stand ready to revise the project's scope should we get the opportunity.

HVFD Worksession

City Council held a worksession on March 17th at the request of the City Manager to address some matters that had been raised by the public, look at positive steps in process and looking ahead. Priorities of the Fire Chief that he hoped to share but ran out of time during comments include:

- Complete the independent assessment of the services provided
- Develop a 5-10 year strategic plan
- Develop a volunteer recruitment and retention plan
- Complete New Member Task Book (already in process)
- Take steps to replace aged and obsolete fleet, including a financial plan for the future
- Work with the City Manager on sustainable budgeting
- Station Replacement Plan (current budget request)
- Update Fire Department Disaster Preparedness and Response Plans

Staff is working to compile some historical information, including a structural analysis that was completed in 2014/15 for the building, and independent studies done on volunteerism. I will also prepare a memo with some next steps for the April 14th City Manager's report.

Attention: Heads of Secretarial Offices and Operating Administrations (OA)

Overview: The Office of the Assistant Secretary for Transportation Policy (OST-P) is providing guidance on competitive award selections made after January 20, 2021, that do NOT have fully obligated grant agreements or cooperative agreements in place.

Projects with executed grant agreements in place that are fully obligated are not subject to the guidance below. For selections with partially obligated grant agreements, the same review should take place before awarding subsequent phases or adding additional funds to an existing grant agreement. Additional guidance will be provided regarding revisions to standard terms and conditions appearing in draft grant agreements or templates.

Summary: All competitive grant and cooperative agreement award selections must comply with current Administration priorities and Executive Orders (EO) that address energy, climate change, diversity and gender, and economic analysis, and other priorities. Applicable Executive Orders and Memoranda include:

- Executive Order 14148, Initial Rescissions of Harmful Executive Orders and Actions;
- Executive Order 14154, <u>Unleashing American Energy</u>
- Executive Order 14151, Ending Radical and Wasteful Government DEI Programs and Preferencing
- Executive Order 14168, <u>Defending Women from Gender Ideology Extremism and</u> Restoring Biological Truth to the Federal Government
- Secretarial Order 2100.7, Ensuring Reliance Upon Sound Economic Analysis in Department of Transportation Policies, Programs, and Activities
- Secretarial Memorandum on Implementation of Executive Orders Addressing Energy, Climate Change, Diversity, and Gender

This guidance provides direction for identifying award selections without fully obligated grant agreements that do not comply with these priorities.

ACTION: For projects announced from FY 2022 through FY 2025, review all <u>award</u> <u>selections without grant agreements and partially obligated grant agreements</u>. The focus of this review is to identify project scope and activities that are allocating funding to advance climate, equity, and other priorities counter to the Administration's Executive Orders.

Step 1: Program Identification. Identify Programs for which award selections may have included any of the following elements: equity activities, Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) activities, climate change activities, environmental justice (EJ) activities, gender-

specific activities, when the primary purpose is bicycle infrastructure (i.e., recreational trails and shared-use paths, etc.), electric vehicles (EV), and EV charging infrastructure. Additionally, project-by-project review of selections to identify any project scope elements for potential removal are required for any Programs that meet the criteria below:

- Statutory language includes equity requirements, climate considerations, or bicycle infrastructure.
- NOFO mandatory evaluation criteria includes equity and/or climate requirements.
- Eligible activities included bicycle infrastructure, EV and/or EV charging infrastructure.

Programs that do not meet the criteria above should be shared with the OA Administrator or equivalent OST leadership for concurrence/confirmation. Following OA Administrator or equivalent OST leadership concurrence, the OST Office of Policy (OST-P) and Office of the General Counsel (OGC) will provide final confirmation on whether a program is required to conduct a project-by-project review. If OST-P and OGC confirm that a project-by-project review is not required, offices may proceed with negotiating and finalizing grant agreements. If OST-P and OGC confirm that project-by-project review is required, offices should proceed to Step 2. Please submit review requests to the OST Policy Board at OSTPolicyBoard@dot.gov.

Step 2: Project-by Project Review. Programs that require further review shall have Program Teams examine each individual project to identify those award selections that have project scopes that include any of the project elements listed in Step 1 (i.e. equity activities, DEI activities climate change activities, etc.). Those Teams should document their project-by-project examination and flag any project scope elements or activities for potential removal, including:

- Project activities such as equity analysis, green infrastructure, bicycle infrastructure, EV and/or EV charging infrastructure.
- Project purpose or primary project benefits include equity and/or climate such asprojects that purposefully improve the condition for EJ communities or actively reduce GHG emissions.

Note: If project scope elements are based in statute, program offices should consult with applicable legal counsel, and following legal concurrence, raise any proposed scope changes to OA leadership.

OA leadership shall review the findings from the Team review, and recommend to OST-P and OGC which project selections should:

- a. Continue in their current form with no change;
- b. Be revised with a reduced or modified scope; or
- c. Be canceled entirely.

Step 3: Project Scope Revision. Award selections identified in Step 2.b must update project scopes to eliminate flagged activities, and where possible replace identified elements with relevant elements that align with program statute, the scope of the application submission, and current Administration EOs.

Where the scope of the project includes elements noted above, Teams should negotiate with project sponsors to update project scopes to eliminate and, where possible, replace those identified elements with relevant elements that align with the program statute, the original scope of the application submission, and current Administration EOs.

- a. If the project sponsor agrees to proceed with scope changes, proceed to grant agreement formulation and execution. The project sponsor may propose alternative project elements to substitute for the redline elements that should be removed as long as they 1) align with the program statute, 2) are consistent with the purposes of the original scope of the application submission, and 3) align with current Administration EOs.
- b. If the project sponsor does not agree to remove project elements noted in Step 2 and replace with acceptable alternative scope, then the Team should proceed with a reduced award that removes the flagged scope and activities.

Chris Long and I met this morning to discuss the E-One lift station matter on his property.

The cost to the City to purchase and install the lift stations was \$12,400 per property on 11 properties. Mr. Long provided invoices to the City in the total of \$17,951.68 as shown on his invoices included in the back up materials to Ordinance 25-07. The difference between the two costs is \$5,551.68.

At this meeting Council can determine if they prefer to

- Reimburse the portion of the assessment that Mr. Long paid for the lift station installation for the other 11 properties, \$2,648.71.
- Reimburse Mr. Long for the amount of the contractors cost to the City to purchase and install the lift stations on properties with a residence, \$12,400.
- Reimburse Mr. Long for the \$12,400, plus roughly the difference of his cost, for a total of \$14,000.
- Determine another amount for reimbursement.

Depending what action the Council decides, a brief at-ease will be requested to draft appropriate amendments to Ordinance 25-07.

When the Bunnell Ave/Charles Way Special Assessment District (SAD) was formed in March, 2022, there had been a lot of going back and forth between the City and the residents in the district to come up with an assessment methodology to get the SAD to pass. The City had strong interest in the district to get water and sewer to the City property at Bishops Beach and the methodology was adjusted to a benefited area method considering developable land per lot, with the intent of putting the most cost of the assessment district on the City's parcel, thereby creating smaller assessments for the other property owners.

The properties in this district are lower than the gravity sewer line that services the area, so each residence needs a lift station to pump the sewage up to the gravity sewer line and on to the sewer treatment plant. Property owners in the district were notified by mail in November, 2021 that properties with a residence would have a lift station purchased and installed so the cost could be financed through the SAD. It wasn't feasible to install lift stations on the vacant lots because it's harmful to the unit for it to sit in the ground unused and freeze/thaw through the winter months. Also a site plan is necessary for development on a property to determine where the lift station needs to be placed in relation to the structure.

When this district was created, Mr. Long was part owner of one lot that already has sewer and did not receive a sewer assessment. According to KPB ownership history he acquired the vacant lot in question in March, 2024 with intent to develop it and raised the issue to Public Works of having to purchase his own lift station, when they were provided to others in the district.

From the administration's perspective, it's clear that lift stations could not be installed on vacant lots in the district, and that they had to be installed for the 11 developed lots to be able to connect to the system as required. The City attempted to assist property owners by including the purchase and installation of the lift stations for those required to have them to connect. However, the City erred in

mistakenly distributing the cost district wide instead of charging the full cost of the lift stations and installation to the benefitted property owners only. From our perspective, we are responsible to pay back property owners that were incorrectly assessed for a benefit they did not receive.

I will be meeting with Mr. Long prior to the March 10th Council meeting and will provide follow up information in the supplemental packet.

Recommendation: A recommendation will be developed and provided in the March 10^{th} supplemental packet.

At the January 27, 2025 meeting Council requested information explaining the assessment methodology used to assess property owners in the Charles Way/Bunnell Ave Special Assessment District (SAD).

The benefitted area methodology was initially proposed in Resolution 21-057 by former Public Works Director Keiser for this SAD and at the December 13, 2021 regular council meeting property owners in the district spoke out against the methodology. After substitutions and several postponements, Resolution 21-057(S-2) failed on March 14, 2022.

In the time between December 13, 2021 and March 14, 2022 meetings, Ms. Keiser proposed a hybrid methodology that would use both equal shares and benefitted methods for assessing this SAD. Council adopted Ordinance 22-11(S)(A) and amended Title 17 to include a definition of hybrid methodology to make this a legal option. "Hybrid method" means an assessment method allocating costs between lots in a district using a combination of methods defined in this chapter.

In addition, there is language in Title 17 definitions defining developable land. Developable land is "land that, in the discretion of the Public Works Director, can be reasonably developed for uses permitted within the property's zoning district". Using this language, Ms. Keiser created a developable area of the benefitted area methodology, and notified property owners in the SAD that this developable land methodology would be used to assess properties in the district. A chart in the attachments shows the breakdown of developable land computations.

Resolution 22-017(A) was adopted on March 14, 2022 and approved the hybrid methodology using equal shares and benefitted area methods, and limiting the benefitted area to the developable area.

Backup Memorandum City Council January 30, 2025 CC-25-059

Following that, Resolution 22-023, correcting dollar amounts, was adopted March 29, 2023 and superseded Resolution 22-017(A).

The reimbursements identified in Ordinance 25-07 uses the methodology described above to calculate the amounts for the reimbursements to property owners.

There is the question of whether this is an appropriate way to "make it right" for those properties who did not receive the benefit of the E-One lift stations. Staff struggled with the notion of what's fair and equitable because there doesn't seem to be an easy answer. The lift stations couldn't be installed on properties without structures because that would limit future ability to improve the property and the lift stations shouldn't sit unused over the winter months.

RECOMMENDATION: Options Council could consider-

- Adopt Ordinance 25-07 as is.
- Remove the City's reimbursement amount and disperse it among the other owners who did not receive the lift stations.
- Postpone Ordinance 25-07 and
 - Ask staff to recalculate a more equitable reimbursement based on the actual benefit other property owners received, and
 - Determine a timeline and method for holding these reimbursement funds, and criteria to reimburse property owners when they develop their property.

The Charles Way/Bunnell Avenue Water and Sewer Special Assessment District (SAD) has been amended to use a Developable Area methodology and reduce the size of the improvement district.

Enclosed with this letter you will find a memorandum from Public Works Director Jan Keiser explaining the changes, an updated Estimated Project Costs for both the water and sewer, and an updated preliminary assessment roll.

A resolution to acknowledge the sufficiency of the Charles Way/Bunnell Avenue Water and Sewer SAD and approving the improvement plan, estimated cost of improvement, and assessment methodology will be before Council at their regular meeting on January 24, 2022. The meeting begins at 6:00 p.m. and will be conducted in person at the City Hall Cowles Council Chambers located at 491 E. Pioneer Avenue, Homer, Alaska, and virtually by Zoom Webinar ID: 205 093 973 and Passcode: 610853.

A notice of public hearing and right to object was mailed to property owners in the Charles Way/Bunnell Avenue Water and Sewer SAD on June 3, 2021 and a public hearing was held on August 9, 2021. City Council postponed action on this matter to allow Public Works to address the concerns raised by property owners, postponed a second time to allow for noticing property owners of the updated district boundaries, methodology, and estimated assessment amounts and then postponed a third time at the request of the Public Works Director (Memorandum 21-190) to allow additional time for further review of the proposed project.

If the proposed methodology is accepted by City Council at their January 24, 2022 Regular Meeting a Notice of Objection packet will be distributed to all property owners on the amended Preliminary Assessment Roll.

The City Council Agenda Packet and copies of the resolution and supporting documents will be posted on the City of Homer website by the end of day, Thursday, January 20, 2022.

SUBJECT: Update – Charles Way /Bunnell Ave Water & Sewer Special Assessment Districts

Purpose of Memorandum: The City Council, at their regular meeting of December 13, 2021, postponed action on Resolution 21-057(S), acknowledging the sufficiency of the Bunnell Avenue/Charles Way Water and Sewer Improvement Special Assessment Districts. This was done at my request so we could re-evaluate the method of assessment. The purpose of this Memorandum is to report on the re-evaluation.

Method of Assessment. I looked for a better way of spreading the assessments around the neighborhood. My first strategy was to look at what it would cost if we brought the water and sewer lines to Bishop's Beach Park as a capital project and then allowed property owners, on their own, to connect to the new mains after they were installed. This is actually the cheapest option for the City, because, under this option, the City is responsible for the least amount of pipe, etc. The estimated cost of this option, to the City, is \$126,000. The City's involvement as a property owner participant, under the Benefited Area method, including both the City's share of the assessment and the contribution through HAWSP, is \$317,634. If you include the ADEC grant of \$225,690, the City's monetary contribution is even higher – \$543,324. So, using the Special Assessment District process and including the City as a property owner participant is the most economical way, from the perspective of the private land owners, to bring City water and sewer to the neighborhood.

Further, since Bishop's Beach Park is the largest parcel in the neighborhood, the "Benefitted Area" method of assessment is the best way to assess the Park for the full value of benefit received; that is, the Benefitted Area of the Park is the full acreage of the Park.

My second strategy was to consider only the "Developable Area" of the Benefitted Area. This is a method of computation allowed under the Homer City Code, which I overlooked in my earlier research until it was brought to my attention by Mr. & Mrs. Vann. For the 7500 SF lots, for all practical purposes, the Developable Area is the same as the lot size, so the proposed assessment doesn't change much. For the City, the Developable Area of Bishop's Beach Park is the entire parcel, so the proposed assessment increases.

The City's GIS Technician computed the Developable Area of the lot owned by the Vann Revocable Trust at 19,970 SF, considering the current location of the bluff and the 20 foot building setback on Charles Way. This is less than the Developable Area computed by the Vanns' surveyor – 22,149 SF. This significantly reduces the Vann's assessment to a number that is less than the number originally proposed in early 2021.

The new assessment computations are based on the Developable Area.

WHEREAS, Action on this matter was further postponed to provide written public notice on different iterations of assessment methodologies for property owner consideration; and

WHEREAS, On February 10, 2022 the City Clerk's Office mailed notice to property owners in the Bunnell Avenue/Charles Way SAD of a proposed hybrid method of assessment, an informational memorandum from the Public Works Director, preliminary assessment roll, and a statement of objection to special assessment district with a deadline of 5:00 p.m. March 14, 2022 to object; and

WHEREAS, One objection was received; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 21-057(S-2) proposing a benefitted method of assessment was voted down on March 14, 2022 to take up this resolution recommending the hybrid method of assessment.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of Homer, Alaska acknowledges the sufficiency of the Bunnell Avenue/Charles Way SAD and the petition bears sufficient support that the improvements are necessary and benefit the properties included in attachment A.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Council hereby approves the improvement plan, estimated costs of improvement as follows:

- The estimated cost of the sewer improvements is \$418,221 with property owners paying 75% (\$313,666) and the Homer Accelerated Water and Sewer Program (HAWSP) paying 25% (\$104,555) of the costs; and
- The estimated cost of the water improvements, including the \$225,690 Principal Forgiveness Subsidy, is \$299,947, with property owners paying 75% (\$224,960) and the Homer Accelerated Water and Sewer Program (HAWSP) paying 25% (\$74,987) of the costs.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED the assessment method will be a hybrid method based on the following findings of the Public Work Director:

Finding #1 – The Hybrid Method results in the fairest distribution of costs among the private property owners. We did some sensitivity analysis to find the fairest distribution of costs. We computed what the assessments would be using Equal Share Method and the Benefitted Area Method, limiting the application of the Benefitted Area Method to the Developable Area, as provided in HCC 17.01.010. Then, we created a Proposed Assessment Roll, which applies the lesser computation for a particular property. For

the smaller lots, the lesser computation is the Benefitted Area Method. For the larger 83 lots, the lesser computation is the Equal Share Method. From 2021-2024 the City worked with property owners to create and complete the Charles Way/Bunnell Avenue water and sewer special assessment district (SAD).

Lift stations are necessary for sewer in the area. In 2021 when the district was being negotiated, a memorandum dated November 15, 2021 to property owners in the district stated "we will be installing E-One lift stations for existing homes as part of the project, which would make the costs eligible for the long term financing". Water and sewer SADs are financed through Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation (ADEC) Clean Water and Drinking Water loans which provides the opportunity for property owners to pay their assessments over time with a low interest rate.

When the district was approved and constructed the City purchased and installed E-One lift stations on 11 of the 18 lots in the district. The cost of purchase and installation was \$12,400 per unit, \$136,400 total, and was distributed among all the property owners in the district.

This came to the attention of the current administration in late August or early September when Public Works staff was contacted by Chris Long, a property owner in the SAD, who is seeking relief from the cost of having to install an E-One lift station on a lot he owns that was vacant when the SAD was built out.

Mr. Long owns 261 E. Bunnell Ave and the lot next door that was vacant when the district was developed and built out. Mr. Long contacted Public Works with a complaint that his empty lot is being assessed at the same rate as his two neighbors who were provided a lift station. When developing is vacant lot he had to purchase and install his own E-One lift station at the cost of \$17,951.68. He has requested to be reimbursed for the invoices he provided.

City Council January 27, 2025

Because the cost of the E-One lift stations was distributed among the entire district, staff believes the property owners who did not receive the benefit of the lift stations should be reimbursed their portion of the assessment from the Homer Accelerated Water and Sewer Program (HAWSP) fund. A "hybrid assessment methodology" of benefitted area for some parcels and equal shares for others was used to create this district, the reimbursements are based on the methodology used for each parcel. The City is a property owner in the district that was assessed using the benefitted area methodology and will also receive this reimbursement.

I appreciate Mr. Long's patience while I worked with Public Works staff and Finance staff on the necessary research to unravel this matter.

RECOMMENDATION: Adopt an ordinance to appropriate HAWSP funds for the purpose of reimbursing a portion of the sewer assessment to property owners in the Charles Way/Bunnell Ave who did not receive the benefit of an E-One lift station.






Update – Charles Way /Bunnell Ave Water & Sewer Special Assessment Districts

Purpose of Memorandum: On May 10, 2021, the City Council adopted Resolution 21-030 initiating the process for creating Special Assessment Districts to bring City water and sewer to this neighborhood. The project is challenging because of the neighborhood's geography - flat ground. high water table and surrounding wetlands. Plus, it is a mixed-use neighborhood, with seasonal homes, full-time residents, multiple businesses, undeveloped areas and a popular City park. We've held multiple neighborhood meetings, met with individual property owners, and held at least one public hearing to better understand the neighborhood's needs and concerns. We've also conducted preliminary engineering to better understand the neighborhood's technical constraints. This work has led us to adopt new strategies that will reduce minimize costs and adverse environmental impact.

- a. Boundaries of the District. We have shrunk the size of the District by only including properties, which would benefit from City water and sewer. Primarily, we have excluded properties, which are already served by City water and sewer via a "spaghetti line", which were permitted and inspected by the City.
- b. Spaghetti Lines. We plan to re-purpose the existing "spaghetti lines" by connecting the new main extensions to them, thereby reducing costs and reducing environmental impact.
- c. Disruption to Wetlands. Multiple residents expressed concern that construction would adversely affect the neighborhood's extensive wetlands. We have re-aligned the water/sewer main routes to avoid the most sensitive part of the wetlands, next to Beluga Slough. Further, we plan to use "directional drilling" rather than open trenching to install most of the water/sewer main extensions. These strategies will minimize environmental impact.
- d. Method of Assessment. We have, in a separate memorandum, recommended adoption of the "Benefited Area" method of assessment. This strategy allocates a more equitable share of the assessments to the larger properties, such as Bishop's Beach Park.
- e. Financing has been extended. We will be installing the E-One units for existing homes as part of the project, which should make the costs eligible for the long term financing.

Several questions came up during the second reading of Ordinance 25-17(S) regarding the Homer Harbor Critical Float Systems 4 & 1 Replacement Project. A vote on the Ordinance was postponed pending additional information coming forward from staff. This memo addresses those questions.

A question was posed about if the project scope had changed, and cited the need for City staff to keep City Council updated on projects.

City prioritization of the need to replace Float System 4 first appeared in the City's 2013-2018 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). After a Comprehensive Condition Assessment and Report was completed in 2022 identifying Float System 4 and 1 in critical to serious condition, the scope of the project grew in the 2023-2028 CIP to include Float Systems 4 and 1, and City Council promoted the project as a Legislative Priority project in the City's 2023-2028 CIP. The Critical Float System Replacement Project scope has not changed since the project was ratified by City Council for inclusion in the 2023-2028 CIP on October 10, 2022. Staff has since been seeking to leverage funds from various sources to replace this important infrastructure and has provided information about the project and staff efforts to that end through the following project updates to City Council:

Throughout all these communications, the scope of the project has not changed. Funding requests in the PIDP grant application was for Design/Permitting and Construction of Systems 4 & 1 at a total cost of \$60,240,898 based on a coastal engineer estimate in 2024. Of that amount, we estimate \$2,205,000 for the design and permitting work, about \$6.7M is for Mobilization/Demobilization, and the rest for construction and related construction costs to rebuild the two float systems.

A project overview, relevant documents and periodic updates can be found on the City's website https://www.cityofhomer-ak.gov/port/homer-harbor-critical-float-system-replacement-project.

A question was posed as to why we needed to fund a study when what we need is to replace float systems.

The Denali Commission Transportation Program Grant is not for a study. It is providing subsidy funding to complete engineering design specifications, environmental review and permitting. Engineered designs ensure structural integrity, proper load ratings, and compliance with safety standards, protecting both users and the municipality from liability. It also helps with infrastructure longevity and resilience to withstand the specific environmental conditions of the harbor's location including tidal variations, storm events, and seasonal weather patterns, as well as functional compatibility with shore connections and the operational needs of various vessel types. Completing environmental assessment and obtaining required permit approvals ensures regulatory compliance and addresses any potential impacts of the project to key resources, including avoidance, minimization, and mitigation measures that might be needed during construction.

Getting to construction in a phased process has advantages. The benefits of completing design and environmental permitting for a municipal project that relies on grant funding include:

- Grant readiness The Alaska Municipal Harbor Grant Program requires "shovel-ready" projects with completed designs and permits. Having these in place makes the City's FY25 (or beyond) Federal grant applications more competitive and increases chances of securing funding.
- Accurate cost estimates Completed designs provide detailed cost projections, allowing for more precise grant requests and reducing the risk of funding shortfalls.

- Reduced timeline uncertainties Environmental permitting often has unpredictable timelines. Completing this work in advance prevents delays once funding is secured.
- Demonstrated commitment Shows granting agencies your municipality has already invested resources, indicating project viability and local support.
- Risk mitigation Identifies potential environmental issues early, allowing time to address them before construction rather than facing costly surprises later.
- Sequential funding opportunities Enables applications for design/permitting grants first, then implementation grants, removing the need to ask for design/permitting funding in the construction grant application.

City Council questioned what is included in the project scope and asked for a budget

The project scope consists of environmental and engineering services to complete 100% design of Systems 4 and 1 ADA-compliant replacement floats, including:

- Connector floats A & AAA lengthened to widen narrow fairways to reduce vessel collisions;
- Replacement of corroded and undersized pilings to meet load demands on the systems;
- Four 100-foot, covered gangways to replace 73-foot gangways number 1, 2, 4, and 6;
- Code-compliant fire response, potable water and electrical supply systems.

The scope also includes completing environmental review and permitting which will be required to adequately address potential impacts of float construction activities to key resources and detail avoidance, minimization, and mitigation measures during construction. See Float System Replacement diagram, attached.

The initial plan is to retain a coastal engineer from the City's competitively procured Term Contractors) to bring designs to 35%, initiate long-lead time environmental and permitting activities and assist with developing a bid document to competitively procure a contractor to complete engineered design sets, field investigations, environmental and permitting under a Design-Build contract.

Staff obtained an engineers' cost estimate for the work to inform the City's 2024 Port Infrastructure Development Program grant application and is broken down as follows: Field Investigations \$250,000; Design Drawings and Specifications \$1,220,000; Environmental Review \$400,000; Permitting \$335,000. Tasks to be performed under these budget categories include:

- 1. Enter into Federal Award Agreement
 - Approve Award Agreement via a Homer City Council Ordinance
 - Execute and return Federal Award Agreement to the Denali Commission
- 2. Issue Task Order to Competitively Procured Engineering Design Consultant
 - Complete 35% Design
 - Initiate long-lead time Permit activities
 - Complete Design-Build RFP to include project description, preliminary design, scope and specifications, terms and conditions and timeline.
- 3. Advertise for & Select Design-Build Contractor
 - Competitively procure design-build contractor
 - Issue Notice of Award and Execute Contract

4. Field Investigations

Contractor services include mobilization of equipment, limited drilling and logging boreholes, geophysical bottom survey, topographic survey and reporting. Includes labor, equipment and travel costs.

5. Design Drawings

Contractor services include development of reports, design plans, specifications and cost estimates at stages listed below, review meetings and revisions to design to address review comments.

- 65% design drawings, with specifications and cost estimate for construction
- 95% design drawings, with specifications and cost estimate for construction
- 100% design drawings, with specifications and cost estimate for construction
- Design tasks include, but are not limited to: 1) Adherence to current codes and applicable standards. 2) Design for overall system loads under full occupancy with consideration for shielding factors and deflections of the system and its effects on pile loads, and that all design forces and loads shall be borne by the float structure and transmitted to the piles through an adequate load path. 3) System design that compensates for the effects of tidal elevations, current, wind loads, and waves using US Army Corps of Engineering method, considering protection offered by breakwaters as well as locally generated waves to minimize effect on pile collars and float systems, minimize pounding and ensure long service life. 4) Calculation of dead loads, and snow load for proper float buoyancy design, insuring gangway performance and that floats have proper freeboard under live loads, proper float level under dead loads and that decks are within tolerances of being level. 5) System layout including fairways, aisle clearances, and float widths in conformance with ASCE 50 and UFC 4-152-07 to accommodate design vessels. 6) Accessible routes and minimum number and size of accessible slips in accordance with ADA 1003. 7) Design drawings for any utility attachments or appurtenance attachments such as ladders, HDPE potable water piping, fire extinguisher cabinets, power pedestals, etc. as required to function with the final geometry of the float system. 8) That length and position of the floats shall not encroach on the fairway 9) final pile design including cathodic protection and determining lateral loads acting on design vessels and floating docks and applied to piles as well as embedment required to achieve fixity 10) BABA compliance (Build American-Buy American)

6. Environmental Review and Permitting

The City will retain an environmental consultant with NEPA and permitting experience in Alaskan harbor and dock projects needing Incidental Harassment Authorizations (IHAs) and information to support federal agencies' permit decisions. The contractor will provide assurance that design supports National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) requirements and is properly permitted. Budget anticipates that the impacts and level of controversy are not significant; an environmental assessment is anticipated to adequately address potential impacts to key resources and detail avoidance, minimization, and mitigation measures.

- Contractor completes environmental narrative, public and regulatory agency outreach and scoping, conducts outreach to regulatory agencies and the public, develops draft Environmental Assessment report, conducts public and agency comment period, and completes final environmental assessment compliant with US Department of Transportation Maritime Administration requirements.
- Contractor secures construction permits, including an Endangered Species Act and Incidental Harassment Authorization (IHA) permits.
- The project will require the following standard State environmental permits and approvals:

- Alaska Department of Fish and Game Fish Habitat Permit
- Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation Stormwater Treatment & Runoff Design Review; Water & Sewer Utilities; Multi Sector General Permit; Operational SWPPP for Boatyards; permit applications to comply with Sections 401 and 404 of the Clean Water Act and Section 10 of the Rivers and Harbors Act
- Alaska State Historic Preservation Office Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act review
- Federal environmental permits required include:
 - IHAs under the Marine Mammal Protection Act: NMFS whales, porpoises, seals, and Steller sea lions; U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service northern sea otters
 - Biological Assessment in compliance with the Endangered Species Act for marine mammals and the sunflower sea star
 - U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Section 10 and Section 404 Authorizations

A question was posed about utilizing Port & Harbor Match Reserves for float system construction, rather than applying it toward a grant match.

Cost estimates for upgrading System 4 and replacing the gangway with a 100' covered ADA ramp is about \$12 million. By the end of this fiscal year, we're expecting a balance of about \$3.6 million combined total in the Harbor Match and Port and Harbor Reserve Fund 456. At our current rate of adding about \$800K a year to the Harbor Match Reserves and Harbor General Reserves, it would take us around ten years to save up for a \$12 million project—assuming we don't need to spend too much on capital projects maintaining the old infrastructure. For instance, we will be coming to City Council for an appropriation in the next month for approximately \$25,000 to refloat DD Float on System 4, which has almost no remaining freeboard. I'm very concerned that if we don't get adequate floatation under DD and we have another hard winter, we will likely need to condemn DD (36 stalls).

The Port and Harbor has an ongoing bond payment for the 2013 Harbor Float Replacement Project, which was refinanced in 2022. Currently, our annual payment is \$300,000, and the last payment is scheduled for 2033. Once that bond is paid off, we'll have more flexibility in our budget to take on additional debt for future projects and potentially replacement timeline.

Historically, the Port and Harbor has counted on state and federal grants to cover about 50% of the costs for float replacement projects. In 2015, the City Council and Port Commission approved a 10-year moorage rate plan for the harbor, assuming grants would offset a significant portion of the costs. That plan had a \$62 per foot cap plus inflation, and we kept the increases to 3.2% per year over 10 years instead of implementing a massive fee jump all at once. We were at \$32 per foot when the public education on these rates first started. All to say that in 2025 we are currently half way to where we should have been in 2015 when it comes to sustainable moorage rates.

At least for the near future, it seems we can't rely as heavily on grant funds. We may have to rethink how we approach funding these projects moving forward. However, while the Federal grant landscape will be changing under the policies of the new Administration, there are still federal subsidy grants available for the City to pursue that were previously enacted by Congress. Presently this includes:

- Rural and Tribal Assistance Pilot Program grant which staff submitted on 3/18/2025 for \$735,000 to help fund environmental review and permitting activities (no match funds required);
- 2025 Port Infrastructure Development Program grant for construction subsidy (20% match required for competitiveness). Through Ordinance 25-09, Homer City Council appropriated Port and Harbor Reserve Funds to obtain professional grant writing services to assist with the grant, but staff is still waiting for the Notice of Funding to make its way through review for conformance to the new Presidential Executive Orders and be published before working on an application;
- Possibly a 2025 BUILD (formerly RAISE) grant; and
- Accepting the Denali Commission Transportation Program Grant.

Shovel-Ready Plans: A Path Forward


With that in mind, accepting the Denali Commission grant leverages one known subsidy opportunity to get shovel-ready plans in place. We'll need them no matter what we do next, and it's an opportunity to cover half the cost through a grant than to pay for everything out of the enterprise account.

Recommendation:

3. Homer Harbor Critical Float System Replacement: Float Systems 4 & 1

Project Description & Benefit: The project replaces Systems 1 and 4 and their adjoining gangways in Homer Harbor. These float systems were constructed by the State of Alaska in 1964 for the original Homer Harbor and transferred to City ownership in 1999 with extensive deferred maintenance. Despite having completed major upgrades to harbor assets in the past ten years and increased maintenance expenditures, the City has been unable to keep pace with infrastructure deterioration.

Systems 1 and 4 range in age from 37 to 60 years old, are in serious to critical condition, do not meet current design or safety standards and will soon face load restrictions or decommissioning. Demand for moorage and regional freight movement has increased such that the harbor already cannot meet demand. Together, these float systems moor 503 of the 920 vessels the Harbor accommodates and they offer 4,100 linear feet of transient moorage for vessels up to 75 feet long. Decommissioning will displace vessels and create hardship for regional transportation networks that depend on safe and efficient operations at the Harbor, including the Seldovia Fast Ferry Kachemak Explorer for passenger and freight loading, 130 remote worksites and non-road connected communities throughout southcentral and western Alaska, and the commercial fishing fleet.

Major maintenance (added flotation to the main and stall floats and replacing timber piles and decking) has allowed continued use of these floats. But at over thirty years beyond their engineered life expectancy, the systems exhibit critical loss of structural capacity. A 2022 Harbor Condition Survey rated the systems in serious and critical condition, non-compliant with design, fire protection and safety standards and will soon face load restrictions or decommissioning.

Demand for moorage and regional freight movement has increased such that the harbor already cannot meet system demands. The loss of floats in Systems 1 and 4 will have a ripple effect, slow the entire harbor operations, and contribute to delayed shipments. Closing even one finger on a float, either for additional repairs or permanently, means that affected vessels have to raft, hot-berth, move to transient moorage, or most likely be displaced entirely from the facility. System-wide closure would affect 336 vessels for System 1 and 167 vessels for System 4, over half of the harbor's stall capacity. Decommissioning an entire system would increase harbor congestion and operational delays related to rafting and tidal draft constraints, cost the harbor and vessel operators time and fuel. A sudden float system failure that causes vessel damage is a life/safety concern and would likely cost a fisherman an entire season, disrupt freight delivery schedules, and block access to critical floats and services.

Plans & Progress: R&M Engineers provided a harbor-wide condition report and cost estimate for float replacement in 2023 that identified critical float replacement needs including upgrades to shore power, fire suppression and potable water systems. Alaska Harbors Consulting provided 30% design drawings and a cost estimate in 2024. Phase 1 is design, engineering and permitting to bring the project to construction ready status. Phase 2 is Construction estimated at \$58,035,898.

Partial Phase 1 funding has been secured through a 2024 Denali Commission grant. A FY25 Community Project Funding request forwarded by Representative Peltola is slated to secure \$250,000 from the Transportation, Housing and Urban Development Appropriations Subcommittee as well. The City has a grant application pending with the FY24 Port Infrastructure Development Program for both design and construction, and proposes to meet 20.5% match through a revenue bond or TIFIA loan.

Phase 1: Design, engineering & permits \$ 2,205,000




Schematic of Homer Harbor Float Systems 1 and 4 Replacement Project







- Replace System 4, including floats CC, DD, EE, and GG and connector float AAA.
- Replace System 1, including floats Q, P, N, M, L, K, D, C, and B and connector float A.
- Lengthen connector float AAA to increase spacing between floats CC, DD, EE, and GG for greater maneuverability, which will
 - (i) reduce the likelihood of collisions, particularly during low tide times, and
 - (ii) allow for larger vessels to use the slips on those floats, which in turn would increase the Port's capacity to handle larger vessels.
- Replace 73-foot gangways (1, 2, 4, and 6) with covered 100-foot gangways, reducing ice and snow cover and gangway slope during low tides of 30-foot fluctuations or more to improve gangway ease of use and safety.
- Meet Americans with Disabilities Act accessibility requirements for the systems and bring the fire suppression system up to code.







The City of Homer has been awarded an FY24 Transportation Program Grant from the Denali Commission in the amount of 1,100,000. As described by the Commission, this grant program "addresses planning, design and construction of ports, harbors, and other rural waterfront needs such as barge landings and docking facilities."

It has been clarified that the required local match is to be \$1,105,000. The \$855,000 figure in the original ordinance assumes we get the Designated Legislative Grant in the amount of \$250,000 which is included in the draft Federal FY25 budget as a part of the Transportation, Housing and Urban Development Appropriations Bill.

Completing design and permitting for Homer Harbor Critical Float System Replacement will not only increase the number of grant programs for which the project is eligible, it will decrease the amount of risk and uncertainty in the project budget, making it a more competitive applicant for all available funding.

RECOMMENDATION: Substitute Ordinance 25-17(S) for 25-17 and adopt Ordinance 25-17(S) to ensure we have appropriated the necessary match funding in the event we don't receive funding to offset the cost through grants.

The City of Homer has been awarded an FY24 Transportation Program Grant from the Denali Commission in the amount of 1,100,000. As described by the Commission, this grant program "addresses planning, design and construction of ports, harbors, and other rural waterfront needs such as barge landings and docking facilities."

This funding will support the completion of field investigations and geotechnical investigation inside the harbor basin where the existing float systems are, 100% design drawings for the project—which is currently at 30% design—and the required environmental review and permitting.

Financial Assistance Award Terms and Conditions Between the Denali Commission and City of Homer For Homer Port FREIGHT (Freight Resiliency & Efficiency – Improving Greater Homer-area Transportation) – Phase 1 Design & Permitting Award No.

1. Project Summary

- a. <u>Scope of Work</u>: Complete design, environmental review and permitting for the Float System 4 & 1 Replacement project which will help safeguard Homer's critical marine transportation infrastructure
- b. Deliverables: See Attachment A: Scope of Work.
- c. <u>Budget</u>: The Commission makes \$1,100,000 available for the project via this Financial Assistance Award (FAA) and is designated as a non-federal match to other federal funds. This amount includes all direct, indirect, and pre-award costs (if any) authorized pursuant to <u>2 CFR 200.458</u>. Other partners on the project include City of Homer, who in total is contributing an additional \$855,000. All Commission funding shall be used for the scope of work identified in this FAA only. Any funds remaining after the full scope of work has been completed shall be returned to the Denali Commission consistent with <u>2 CFR 200.345</u>.
- d. <u>Delivery Method</u>: The City of Homer will oversee all tasks and contracts and competitively procure a contractor to achieve 35% design, initiate long-lead time permit activities, and develop the request for proposals, followed by procuring a design-build team to complete the design.
- e. <u>Performance Period</u>: The Period of Performance for this FAA is 6 January 2025 through 31 July 2026. In accordance with <u>2 CFR 200.309</u> Recipients can only incur obligations or costs against this FAA during the Period of Performance, unless specifically authorized in the Special Provisions. If a project cannot be completed within the approved Period of Performance, an extension request must be made in accordance with the Commission's <u>Recipient Guidelines and Requirements</u> (RGR).
- f. <u>Place of Performance and Beneficiaries</u>: The place of performance is Homer, a small, rural, first-class city in Census Tract 10, approximately 220 miles south of Anchorage, Alaska on the southern end of the Kenai Peninsula. The community has a population of 5,522 people, 7.6% of whom identify as American Indian or Alaska Native.

Homer is:

- not identified as a distressed community in the Commission's <u>2023</u> <u>Distressed Communities Report</u>
- not identified as an Environmentally Threatened Community in the Commission's <u>2019 Statewide Threat Assessment</u>

 not identified as disadvantaged per the Council on Environmental Quality's <u>Climate and Economic Justice Screening Tool</u>

2. Project Reporting and Commission Site Visits

Progress reports and a closeout report are required under this FAA. Progress Reports shall be submitted at the frequency stipulated in the Special Provisions.

The Closeout Report shall be completed within 90 days of the end of the Period of Performance. All reports must be submitted using the Denali Commission's online Project Database System, available at <u>Denali Commission Project Database</u>.

Commission staff or agents of the Commission may visit the project site or home office to monitor progress during or after the Period of Performance. The Recipient shall coordinate and make information available to facilitate such site visits.

Refer to the <u>Recipient Guidelines and Requirements</u> document for further information related to reports and site visits.

3. Payments

The Commission shall make payments under this FAA per 2 CFR 200.305 by electronic transfer in response to a Standard Form 270 (SF-270) "Request for Advance or Reimbursement", submitted by the Recipient. At a minimum, all SF-270s must include summary cost information on labor, materials, contracts/consultants, and indirect costs. Detailed documentation is required for any single expenditure greater than \$50,000. The Special Provisions will indicate if Pre-award Costs and/or Advance Payments are authorized under this FAA. Requests for reimbursements may be made as needed. Refer to the Recipient Guidelines and Requirements document for further information about submitting SF-270s.

4. Modifications
