CITY OF HOMER 1 2 HOMER, ALASKA 3 Aderhold 4 RESOLUTION 24-079(S)(A) 5 6 A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF HOMER, ALASKA 7 PROVIDING COMMENTS TO THE ALASKA STATE LEGISLATURE 8 REGARDING THE IMPACT OF TAX EXEMPTIONS 9 MUNICIPALITIES 10 11 WHEREAS, The Alaska Legislature regularly proposes various exemptions on municipal 12 property and sales taxes and evaluates proposals for statewide sales taxes to generate new 13 state revenues; and 14 15 WHEREAS, Article 10 of Alaska's constitution states that "The purpose of this article is to provide for maximum local self-government with a minimum of local government units, and 16 17 to prevent duplication of tax-levying jurisdictions. A liberal construction shall be given to the powers of local government units."; and 18 19 20 WHEREAS, The City of Homer relies predominantly on sales and property taxes to fund 21 general services to our residents and visitors; and 22 23 WHEREAS, Sales taxes represent 57% of Homer's general fund; and 24 25 WHEREAS, Real property taxes represent 23% of Homer's general fund, based on a mil rate of 4.5 mils; and 26 27 28 WHEREAS, An example of a tax exemption that the Alaska Legislature has imposed on 29 municipalities is the \$150,000 senior property tax exemption for primary residences, an 30 exemption that in the past was reimbursed by the State but is now an unfunded mandate; and 31 WHEREAS, For the City of Homer, the senior property tax exemption represents a 10% 32 reduction in our annual budget, or the portion of revenues that are transferred to other 33 34 property taxpayers; and 35 WHEREAS, Homer's sales tax rate is 4.85%, divided among the following specified 36 budget purposes: 37 38 • 3.0% for the general fund 39 • 0.75% dedicated to a program to help expand the city's water and sewer lines 0.75% to pave and repair roads and expand sidewalks, and maintain and expand 40 trails 41 42 • 0.30% to pay down the bond debt needed to build a police station

0.05% to maintain the police station long-term; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of Homer, Alaska, provides the following comments to the Alaska State Legislature regarding mandating real property and sales tax exemptions and the imposition of a statewide sales tax:

through increased state services that benefit our local citizens.

WHEREAS, A statewide sales tax may cause the City of Homer to reduce its sales tax.

may force the City to reduce its sales tax with no guarantee of reduced expenses

- We ask that the Legislature Honor Title 10 of Alaska's constitution and allow for the maintenance of local government control.
- The Legislature and local governments should work as a partnership, and we believe
 the Legislature should consult with the Alaska Municipal League and municipalities
 regarding any bills that propose property or sales tax exemptions to understand how
 those exemptions would impact the ability of municipalities to provide critical public
 services to residents and visitors, including, but not limited to, providing police and fire
 services, maintaining local public infrastructure, managing zoning codes, conducting
 local elections, and responding to public needs.
- We ask that the Legislature recognize that implementing a statewide sales tax would likely force the City of Homer to reduce its sales tax, which would hinder our ability to provide the public services listed above; expand water and sewer infrastructure; maintain, improve, and expand roads, sidewalks, and trails; and pay down bond debt.
- Property tax exemptions on specified classes of property owners shift the burden of funding municipal services on other classes of property owners in ways that may not be fair or equitable.
- The cumulative impacts of multiple Legislatively imposed property tax exemptions and implementation of a statewide sales tax is detrimental to the ability of local governments to provide critical public services.

1 CITY OF HOMER 2 HOMER, ALASKA 3 City Manager/ 4 Library Director 5 **RESOLUTION 24-103** 7 A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF HOMER, ALASKA, 8 URGING THE STATE OF ALASKA LEGISLATURE TO MAINTAIN 9 FUNDING FOR THE PUBLIC LIBRARIES ASSISTANCE (PLA) GRANTS 10 AND THE STATEWIDE LIBRARY ELECTRONIC DOORWAY (SLED) AT 11 FY 2024 LEVELS. 12 WHEREAS, For decades the Public Libraries Assistance (PLA) grants have supported 13 14 libraries across Alaska with \$6,000 to \$7,000 in annual funding, and the Homer Public Library 15 has received many such grants; and 16 WHEREAS, The Statewide Library Electronic Doorway (SLED) has provided Alaskans 17 with access to online resources that would otherwise be unaffordable for their local libraries, 18 19 including 60 of the 68 subscription databases currently offered to patrons of the Homer Public 20 Library; and 21 22 WHEREAS, The budget for the Division of Libraries, Archives and Museums reduced all 23 PLA grants to \$1,829 before reversing those cuts, while SLED funding has been reduced from \$500,000 to \$369,514; and 24 25 26 WHEREAS, Cuts to the PLA grants would force the Homer Public Library to reduce its 27 purchases of new materials, particularly picture books, foreign languages and medical texts; 28 and 29 30 WHEREAS, The Seldovia Library would have to decrease materials purchases and service hours; and 31 32 33 WHEREAS, The Ninilchik Community Library would be forced to close over winter; and 34 35 WHEREAS, The reduced PLA grant would only support Anchor Point Public Library's 36 operations for one month; and 37 38 WHEREAS, Loss of SLED funding means all public libraries in the state will have to 39 eliminate significant online resources. 40

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15	WHEREAS, The Homer Spit is a 4.5-mile-long glacial sand and gravel spit extending into
16	Kachemak Bay and the Spit road is a State highway that serves as a critical infrastructure
17	corridor supporting Homer Port and Harbor, a multimodal transportation hub, and essential
18	recreational, commercial, industrial, and residential activities, as well as valuable State of
19	Alaska and Federal assets; and
20	WILEDEAG THE LITTURE CONTROL OF THE LITTURE C
21	WHEREAS, The Homer Spit is experiencing accelerated erosion due to changing storm
22	patterns that have disrupted historical sediment movement patterns along the spit, resulting
23	in severe coastal degradation; and
24 25	WHEREAS, Previous mitigation efforts, including the United States Army Corps of
26	Engineers' 1992 installation of 1,000 feet of rock revetment and 1998 extension of 3,700 feet,
27	proved insufficient without the recommended beach renourishment, leading to beach
28	lowering and increased erosion south of the protected area; and
29	towering and increased erosion south of the protected area, and
30	WHEREAS, Despite emergency revetment projects by the Alaska Department of
31	Transportation and Public Facilities, unchecked erosion continues to actively undermine the
32	State-owned Sterling Highway, the sole transportation lifeline connecting the Homer Spit to
33	the Kenai Peninsula mainland and a tsunami evacuation route; and

35	WHEREAS, The City has been monitoring and reporting the intensified erosional
36	damage on the Homer Spit to the State of Alaska through the Alaska Department of
37	Transportation and Public Facilities (ADOT&PF) and the federal government through the
38	United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), the two parties responsible for the funding,

approval and implementation of State road maintenance, erosion mitigation measures and a

long-term maintenance plan to stabilize erosion conditions on the Homer Spit; and

WHEREAS, An October 16, 2024 storm with southwest winds of approximately 25 miles per hour and a 22-foot tide caused significant damage to the road bed in the unprotected section of the road, brought erosion to within two feet of the edge of the pavement and created an immediate public safety concern; and

WHEREAS, Any additional moderate wind and high tide events now threaten to compromise the outbound lane of the Spit Road, risking partial or complete closure of this vital transportation corridor; and

WHEREAS, Multiple technical studies, including the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' 2017 Dredged Material Management Guidance Manual, their 1989 *Storm Damage Reduction Final Interim Feasibility Report with Engineering Design and Environmental Assessment* report, and HDR, Inc.'s 2019 Coastal Erosion Assessment, have provided detailed erosion management strategies, with the HDR report recommending a traditional revetment coupled with a beach renourishment program and sediment management plan for long term viability of the Spit and maintenance of the Spit Road.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, The City of Homer urgently calls upon the ADOT&PF and the USACE to:

1. Immediately implement emergency erosion mitigation measures to protect the threatened Homer Spit Road from imminent failure; and

2. Simultaneously develop and execute a comprehensive, long-term erosion mitigation and stabilization strategy that includes both hardened protection strategies (including perched bench, groin field, offshore breakwater) and sediment management for improving resilience of existing roadway embankment.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, The City of Homer implores the Alaska State Legislature to prioritize this critical infrastructure project by:

1. Allocating necessary state funding to protect this vital transportation and economic corridor; and

2. Advocating for and supporting a long-term Homer Spit erosion mitigation and stabilization project in partnership with the USACE; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, The City of Homer calls upon Alaska's federal delegation to:

1. Champion the Homer Spit protection project at the federal level; and

2. Secure federal funding required for both immediate emergency measures and long-term stabilization efforts through the USACE.

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CITY OF HOMER 1 2 **HOMER, ALASKA** City Manager/ 3 Port Director 4 5 **RESOLUTION 24-120** 6 7 A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF HOMER, ALASKA URGING THE GOVERNOR AND ALASKA STATE LEGISLATORS TO 8 FULLY FUND THE STATE OF ALASKA MUNICIPAL HARBOR FACILITY 9 GRANT PROGRAM IN THE FY 2026 STATE CAPITAL BUDGET IN 10 11 ORDER TO ENSURE ENHANCED SAFETY AND ECONOMIC PROSPERITY AMONG ALASKAN COASTAL COMMUNITIES. 12 13 WHEREAS, The majority of the public boat harbors in Alaska were constructed by the 14 State during the 1960s and 1970s; and 15 16 WHEREAS, These harbor facilities represent critical transportation links and are the 17 transportation hubs for waterfront commerce and economic development in Alaskan coastal 18 19 communities; and 20 WHEREAS, The harbor facilities in Alaska are ports of refuge for ocean going vessels, 21 serve as essential transportation hubs to coastal Alaskan communities for supplies, trade in 22 goods and services, and as connections to the world market for our exports and imports; and 23 24 WHEREAS, The State of Alaska over the past nearly 30 years has transferred ownership 25 of most of these State-owned harbors, many of which were at, or near the end of their service 26 life at the time of transfer, to local municipalities; and 27 28 WHEREAS, Municipalities took over this important responsibility even though they 29 30 knew that these same harbor facilities were in poor condition at the time of transfer due to the state's failure to keep up with deferred maintenance; and 31 32 33 WHEREAS, Consequently, when local municipal harbormasters formulated their annual harbor facility budgets, they inherited a major financial burden that their local municipal 34 governments could not afford; and 35 36 37 WHEREAS, In response to this financial burden, the Governor and the Alaska Legislature passed legislation in 2006, supported by the Alaska Association of Harbormasters and Port 38 Administrators, to create the Municipal Harbor Facility Grant program via Alaska Statute 39 29.60.800; and 40 41 WHEREAS, The Alaska Department of Transportation and Public Facilities (AKDOT/PF) 42 utilizes a beneficial administrative process to review, score and rank applicants to the 43 44 Municipal Harbor Facility Grant Program, since state funds may be limited; and

CITY OF HOMER 45 WHEREAS, For each harbor facility grant application, municipalities have committed to 46 invest 100% of the design and permitting costs and 50% of the construction cost; and 47 48 WHEREAS, The municipalities of Unalaska, Sitka and Juneau have committed to contribute half of their project cost in local match funding for FY2025 towards harbor projects 49 of significant importance locally as required by the Municipal Harbor Facility Grant Program; 50 and 51 52 53 WHEREAS, Completion of these harbor facility projects is dependent on the 50% match from the State of Alaska's Municipal Harbor Facility Grant Program; and 54 55 56 WHEREAS, During the last fifteen years the Municipal Harbor Facility Grant Program has only been fully funded twice; and 57 58 WHEREAS, A survey done by the Alaska Municipal League of Alaska's ports and harbors 59 60 found that, from the respondents, the backlog of projects necessary to repair and replace former State-owned harbors has increased to at least \$500,000,000; and 61 62 WHEREAS, Given that Alaska is a maritime state and that our harbors are foundational 63 64 to both our way of life and the economy of this great State, it is in the public's best interest to maintain this critical infrastructure by using State, Local and Federal funds to recapitalize the 65 crucial harbor moorage infrastructure statewide. 66 67 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of Homer, Alaska hereby urges 68 the Governor and the Alaska Legislature fully fund the State of Alaska's Municipal Harbor 69 70 Facility Grant Program in the FY 2026 State Capital Budget in order to ensure enhanced safety and economic prosperity among Alaskan coastal communities. 71 72 PASSED AND ADOPTED by the Homer City Council this 25th day of November, 2024. 73 74 CITY OF HOMER 75

CITY OF HOMER 1 2 HOMER, ALASKA City Manager/ 3 Port Director 4 5 **RESOLUTION 24-121** 6 A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF HOMER, ALASKA 7 EXPRESSING SUPPORT FOR RAISING THE MAXIMUM AVAILABLE 8 9 MUNICIPAL HARBOR FACILITY GRANT TO \$7,500,000 FOR 10 ELIGIBLE PROJECTS ON AN ANNUAL BASIS. 11 12 WHEREAS, Senate Bill 291 established the Municipal Harbor Facility Grant Program on July 1, 2006, in which the total amount of grant money made available to a municipality was 13 limited to not exceed \$5,000,000 in a fiscal year; and 14 15 WHEREAS, The Municipal Harbor Facility Grant is the single most significant funding 16 17 tool available to Alaskan Harbormasters to plan, maintain and recapitalize port and harbor infrastructure; and 18 19 WHEREAS, Testimony from a legislator advocate stated "SB291 would establish the 20 21 municipal harbor facility grant fund to which the Legislature would make an annual appropriation from the watercraft fuel tax account and from the state portion of the fisheries 22 business tax. Both sources come from the marine industry, so harbor users would generate the 23 revenue for the program"; and 24 25 26 WHEREAS, Senate Bill 291 was envisioned to cap the funds that can be used per community per year at \$5 million so that a large community could not take all the available 27 funds in any given year; and 28 29 WHEREAS, The expectation is that communities would establish, maintain, and run an 30 enterprise fund into perpetuity; and 31 32 WHEREAS, The State of Alaska over the past nearly 30 years has transferred ownership 33 of most of these State-owned harbors, many of which were at or near the end of their service 34 life at the time of transfer, to local municipalities; and 35 36 WHEREAS, These harbor facilities continue to require substantial municipal financial 37 investment to maintain; and 38 39 WHEREAS, Construction, shipping and mobilization costs to remote portions of Alaska 40 have outpaced the national consumer price index since the pandemic; and 41 42

WHEREAS, The United States Bureau of Labor Statistics Consumer Price Index calculator indicates that \$5 million in July 2006 when Senate Bill 291 was enacted would be inflated to \$7,511,000 as of July 2023. WHEREAS, The City of Homer urges the Governor and Alaska Legislature to Amend Alaska Statutes 29.60.800 raising the maximum Harbor Facility Grant Fund Award to \$7,500,000 per eligible project. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of Homer, Alaska supports raising the maximum available Municipal Harbor Facility Grant to \$7,500,000 for eligible projects on an annual basis.
