PUBLIC COMMENT ON MATTERS ALREADY ON THE AGENDA

Mark Zeiset, city resident and member of the Port and Harbor Advisory Commission and the Homer Marine Trades Board, commented in support of Resolution 23-130 and continuation of the Homer Harbor Expansion General Investigation Study. The geophysical information that will come from the study will belong to the City and will be beneficial for future work in the harbor, it will help ensure work is done correctly, and backing out now would have negative impact on Homer.

Dave Mastolier, city resident, commented in support of Resolution 23-130 and continuation of the Homer Harbor Expansion General Investigation Study. He echoes Mr. Zeiset's comments, and added that we need to know the science and answers to move forward if it's feasible.

Bruce Friend, city resident and member of the Port and Harbor Advisory Commission and member of the Homer Marine Trades, commented in support of Resolution 23-130 and continuation of the Homer Harbor Expansion General Investigation Study. He shared his perspective that the money invested in the study has the potential to stay in Homer by using local contractors.

Jared Bradshaw, city resident, commented in support of Resolution 23-130 and continuation of the Homer Harbor Expansion General Investigation Study. The harbor is pivotal for the economic growth and development of Homer. He understands we've exceeded the capacity at the harbor and we need to continue to find solutions, and the information we receive from the study will benefit us for future projects.

Robert Archibald, city resident, commented in support of Resolution 23-130 and continuation of the Homer Harbor Expansion General Investigation Study. We won't know the cost of improvements until the geophysical study is completed, so it's a good step forward.

Lloyd Moore, city resident and contractor for the City, commented in opposition to the adoption of Resolution 23-127 and approving the solid waste contract to Alaska Waste. He's been providing this service for the City and shared how the rates he bid would be less costly to the city.

VISITORS

a. South Peninsula Hospital Annual Report - Ryan Smith, CEO (10 minutes)

Ryan Smith, South Peninsula Hospital CEO, presented on the hospitals financials from 2014 to date. He reviewed major projects in progress, legislative priority projects, and capital and program grant projects, and highlighted new providers coming onboard.

b. Cook Inlet Regional Citizens Advisory Council (CIRCAC) - Shaylon Cochran and Sue Saupe (10 Minutes)

Shaylon Cochran, Communications Director and Public Outreach Coordinator, provided an overview of the history and makeup of CIRCAC, and their areas of operation. He reviewed the roles of CIRCAC committees that ensure they're meeting the requirements of the Oil Pollution Act of 1990 (OPA 90), including Environmental Monitoring Committee, Prevention Response Operations and Safety Committee, and Protocol Control Committee. He highlighted some of their key projects including geographic response strategies, ongoing risk assessments, environmental monitoring, ice camera network, and atmospheric and ocean observing and modeling, and oil discharge and contingency plans.

Sue Saupe, Director of Science and Research, commented briefly how CIRCAC has worked with closely with a lot of organizations in Homer and most of the work they've done has been successful the partnerships they've built.

c. Kenai Peninsula Economic Development District (KPEDD) - Tim Dillon, Executive Director and Cassidi Cameron, Special Projects Manager (10 minutes)

Tim Dillon, KPEDD Executive Director, and Cassidi Cameron, Special Projects Manager presented. Mr. Dillon shared that he's retiring at the end of the year and thanked the City administration for their support. He reminded listeners that KPEDD is a private non-government resource focused on sustainable economic development for the Kenai Peninsula Borough. He reviewed KPEDD's efforts toward quality of life five core areas related to technology and communication, workforce and human capital, infrastructure and land use, business climate and entrepreneurship, and regional partnerships. He touched on their work with mariculture locally, and also on efforts Borough and State wide related to housing, transportation, and child care and workforce development.

Cassidi Cameron, Special Projects Manager, is the incoming Executive Director, recognized Mr. Dillon for his leadership and vision. She commented regarding the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) and how it is a federally recognized document that aids in receiving federal funding for projects. Ms. Cameron announced the upcoming Industry Overview Form scheduled April 25, 2024 in Soldotna.

Upon conclusion of their presentation, Mayor Castner presented Mr. Dillon with a recognition from the City and thanked him for his efforts in taking KPEDD from zero to 120 mph. He leaves a tremendous legacy behind him. Mayor Castner said there are very few people he holds in esteem that he wished he could attain, and Tim is one of them.

- e. Economic Development Advisory Commission

Economic Development Advisory Commission Chair Karin Marks reported at their November meeting the Commission agreed to finish their 2024 strategic plan in January to include their work on Ordinance 23-64 regarding short term rentals. This type of ordinance review is new to the Commission so they spent time discussing process. Commissioner Kim brought forward and idea for a winter business survey to assess the impacts of the winter season and encourage ideas. She also gave a 2023 year in review of their accomplishments of adopting their vision and mission statement, participated in public events, involved in the Homer housing conversation, transportation plan, and the guiding growth community conversation. They work with the Chamber of Commerce to broaden economic development in Homer, and supporting funding for the Homer Small Business Advisory position. Upcoming goals include remaining active in the housing conversation, promoting implementation of the Wayfinding and Streetscape plan, participating in the upcoming Comprehensive Plan, and pursue business community engagement in that area.

f. Parks Art Recreation and Culture Advisory Commission

Parks Art Recreation and Culture Advisory Commissioner Leon Galbraith reported at their last meeting they discussed the South Slope Drive Easement connection as a trail connection, recreation department software update, interest in adding Boys and Girls Club as a recreational services, limited recreation department facilities and the possibility of partnering with SPARK, ongoing sidewalk projects, and a portable restrooms plan for next summer, and Ordinance 23-49 reorganization proposal regarding parks and community recreation.

g. Library Advisory Board

Library Advisory Board Member Doug Baily reported at their last meeting they were advised that new fish recognizing donors have been installed on the Library Fish Wall. The sidewalk by the book return was vandalized with spray paint and two juveniles were apprehended and one was brought in by their father and caused to apologize. He reported on the upcoming Big Read program, a project of the National Endowment for the Arts, the title to be studied is *The Cold Millions* by Jess Walter. The Board discussed a letter from the Alaska's Attorney General seeming to be warning libraries around the state about state laws relating to distribution of indecent materials to minors, and Library Director Berry's responding to that. They welcomed their new Student Representative Beatrix McDounough and discussed the Sister City Celebration.

Council Member Lord explained this was a request that came to her from a member of the public. In discussion with Police Chief Robl she learned that Council can change speed limits on city owned roads by passing an ordinance to make that change.

DAVIS/ADERHOLD MOVED TO AMEND LINE 36 TO DROP REFERENCES TO THE PROVISION FOR A TURN AROUND AT THE TERMINATION AND WHICH ARE NOT INTENDED TO BE EXTENDED OR CONTINUED TO FUTURE SUBDIVISIONS.

City Attorney Gatti noted the definition for cul-de-sacs in 11.04.030 that reads cul-de-sac means a street that's closed at one end and required to provide a circular turnaround.

Council Member Lord regained connection to the meeting.

Council Member Lord suggested postponing this to ensure language is correct and accurate.

Council Member Aderhold suggested voting down the amendment with the intent this will be postponed and the sponsor can work on the language. Regarding the amendment, if cul-de-sacs define in another part of code, if this could reference back to where it's defined, then it could read cul-de-sacs and dead end streets.

Council Member Lord supports this amendment and would like time to work on the language to be as cleans as possible. She supports voting down the motion and postponing to word smith a substitution.

Motion failed.

City Manager Dumouchel noted his report in the packet and highlighted information related to the quarterly sales tax report and that we're a little behind last year, the Lighthouse Village development project that will be before the Planning Commission on December 6th, finance reports, and Harbor Expansion update.

There was brief conversation clarifying information in the financial reports.

Council Members Venuti, Aderhold and Lord commented regarding the lack of information in the application of Ms. Williams compared to the other applicant, and that doesn't provide enough for her to be supportive of the appointment. They supported not approving the appointment to allow for more information to be provided.

Council Member Erickson commented in support of the appointment.

Mayor Castner explained that Ms. Williams is very involved with the performing arts community, is an extremely talented singer, and he feels this area is not represented well on the Commission at this time.

Mayor Castner did not vote to break the tie.

Motion failed.

RESOLUTIONS

Memorandum CC-23-269 from City Planner as backup.

VENUTI/ADERHOLD MOVED TO ADOPT RESOLUTION 23-129 BY READING OF TITLE ONLY.

Council Member Erickson commented regarding the importance of having diversity on the steering committee to make sure we're getting different sectors are involved and perspectives are heard.

Council Member Lord noted the proposed make up of two commissioners and one city resident isn't consistent with goal 2. It seems it would be more reasonable to have a larger group and she thinks having council connection on the steering committee would be valuable. She requested input from the City Manager.

City Manager Dumouchel explained the thinking in reducing it to a smaller group was that Council and all the Boards and Commissions will have a part in the process so creating a large committee could end up in a situation where there's a lot of work done but don't finish anything so we don't want to end up too top heavy.

Council Member Davis was under the impression it would be a couple of council members, commissioners, and community members. It seemed important to him that this group would initially steer the consultants on what they're going to put before the public, prior to public outreach meetings being scheduled. Three individuals with none of them elected seems a little thin.

Mayor Castner noted they've hired a professional group who knows what they need to do. He worries that a steering committee turns into a policy committee and starts trying to dictate policy on the overall tenor of the Comprehensive Plan. He wants a steering committee to make sure there are places along the way where things can be dealt with and not put off. He thinks there are places along the way where Council can make policy decisions that help. He just wants a group to help keep the consultants on track.

Council Member Lord pointed out that what the Mayor's suggested isn't included in the resolution and she doesn't see it as being a role of the steering committee. She concurs with Council Member Davis' comments, and agrees with the Mayor that we're working with a very professional consultant. Communication has been a challenge and she thinks having Council Members included is beneficial for that reason.

DAVIS/ADERHOLD MOVED TO AMEND THE RESOLUTION TO INCLUDE TWO COUNCIL MEMBERS, TWO COMMISSION MEMBERS, AND A MEMBER FROM THE PUBLIC.

Concern was expressed that two council members could sort of drive the way things go and that the commissions aren't identified to be represented, and she wouldn't want the committee to be without someone from the Planning Commission.

There was brief discussion regarding goals in the resolution and the appointment process.

Council Member Lord commented regarding goal 3 and if that's the direction to go in, it seems they should scrap the steering committee, have council champions, and develop a robust communications plan that involves the Council and Commissions to meet these goals through the public meetings.

Mayor Castner reiterated he wants a group of eyes to make sure as opportunities come by that they get to the Commissions, that's something that was absent in the port planning process.

There was continued discussion of the goals, scope of work, and makeup of the steering committee.

ERICKSON/VENUTI MOVED TO AMEND THE AMENDMENT THAT IT BE ONE COUNCIL MEMBER, ONE PLANNING COMMISSIONER, AND ONE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ADVISORY COMMISSIONER.

There were comments that it should still include a city resident.

VOTE (secondary amendment): YES: HANSEN, ERICKSON NO: DAVIS, LORD, VENUTI, ADERHOLD

Motion failed.

There was no further discussion on the amendment.

VOTE (amendment): YES: HANSEN, VENUTI, LORD, DAVIS, ADERHOLD NO: ERICKSON

Motion carried.

LORD/ADERHOLD MOVED TO STRIKE LINES 43 THROUGH 50 WHICH IS GOAL 3.

There were comments that goal 3 is redundant with jobs of the Council and Commissions. It was also pointed out that the scope of work is to participate in the public outreach events and that's valid, and that this group might look at the Comprehensive Plan differently than the way a Commission or members of the public might look at it.

VOTE (amendment): NO: ERICKSON, DAVIS, VENUTI, HANSEN, ADERHOLD, LORD

Motion failed.

There was no further discussion on the main motion as amended.

Jan Keiser, city resident Public Works Director, commented regarding the upcoming Homer Drawdown event at Islands and Ocean about peatlands and wetlands and their importance to storm water treatment. There will also be an opportunity to go visit the Kachemak Sponge areas. It's her last Council meeting and she shared three missions to charge them with, support improvements to basic infrastructure, protect the funding sources that have been set up, and continue to support the green infrastructure projects. She thanked her staff and recognized their hard work and dedication to the City.

Jason Rettinger, Site Manager for Alaska Waste, commented regarding Alaska Waste and their support for the communities on the peninsula. He doesn't feel there was ambiguity in the RFP process, they bid it as specified. As Mr. Moore noted earlier Alaska Waste is a nationwide company, but all the sites are locally run.

COMMENTS OF THE CITY ATTORNEY

City Attorney Gatti wished everyone safe and happy holidays.

COMMENTS OF THE CITY CLERK

City Clerk Jacobsen announced openings on Boards and Commissions.

COMMENTS OF THE CITY MANAGER

City Manager Dumouchel recognized Public Works Director for her work in advancing roads, water, sewer, storm water, sidewalks, trails, parks projects, and all the things that make a city work. He's learned a lot working with her, he appreciates efforts she's made to make this a better place, and when she's out doing advocacy she'll see her work everywhere. He thanked her for her work

COMMENTS OF THE MAYOR

Mayor Castner acknowledged that Public Works Director Keiser has gotten a lot done. He highlighted that the Public Works Department is more reactive to the needs of the community since she's been here. He added that the Nutcracker Ballet opens this weekend and runs for two weekends and everyone should see the amazing work that 85 kids who grow up in the Homer area can do.

COMMENTS OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Council Member Lord Rachel commented it's been a delight to work with Public Works Director Keiser, and also with Tim Dillon. She's in Nome attending the annual Reindeer Herder's Association meeting and will spending time with the Harbormaster to learn about what's happing in the Arctic. She noted at their last meeting the adopted a resolution supporting full funding of the Municipal Harbor Matching Grant Program and explained two communities have submitted for those monies. The City has always supported full funding of this matching grant program regardless of whether we have an application in for consideration. This is not for funding the General Investigation Study, as had been reported in the news.

Council Member Hansen thanked everyone who spoke tonight, we have a great community and she's learned a lot. She wished happy birthday to her youngest and oldest tonight.

Council Member Erickson thanked Public Works Director Keiser it's been a pleasure working with her. She wished everyone happy holidays, and to stay safe. She's looking forward to 2024.

Council Member Davis thanked Public Works Director Keiser. He commented about the successful bingo game for Black Friday and Small Business Saturday, a lot of the people who visited his business said they'd been to business they'd never been to because of the game. He thanked Community Recreation and the Running Club for the Thanksgiving Day Turkey Trot.

Council Member Aderhold recognized there were a lot of good comments at their various meetings. She thanked Public Works Director Keiser for all she's done, and said she'll be out of town for the next meeting and will participate remotely. She's had a great year on Council, they've accomplished a lot, and she looks forward to their work in 2024. She wished everyone happy holidays.

December 26, 2023



Introduction and Overview

The US Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) has launched a study for the Homer Harbor Expansion (HHE) to assess the feasibility of building a new harbor basin for large vessels adjacent to the existing small boat harbor. The feasibility study (the Study) will address environmental considerations in addition to economics and engineering feasibility. The City of Homer (the City) will simultaneously identify and evaluate additional criteria needed to support an expansion of the harbor, if an expansion is recommended by the Study. The goal is to identify a realistic and right-sized solution to meet the needs of the large vessel industry in Alaska and thoughtfully plan for future flexibility.

The communications plan (the Plan) is drafted in a manner relative to the needs of the Study and the public. The Plan is a living document and will be modified as the Study advances. The Plan helps to ensure that effective public outreach considers potential barriers to participation by stakeholders and residents who may not traditionally participate in community planning activities, especially those who have Limited English Proficiency (LEP), or who are considered economically and socially vulnerable. It will also adhere to federal requirements including Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Environmental Justice (EJ), Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

The Communications Team will collaborate to manage delivery of the strategies, tools, and tactics outlined in this Plan. Successful delivery will require collaboration and support of the remainder of the project team, Port & Harbor Advisory Commission members, members of the Homer City Council, and other key stakeholders.

Goals

This section lists the Study's overarching external communication goals. The Homer City Council and Port & Harbor Advisory Commission have drafted a Charter Document that defines a shared vision, collective goals and objectives, and success factors for the City's role in the HHE. As follows, communication plays a key role in many of the Charter's identified "success factors" for the Study:

- Proactively collaborate with the community and port and harbor stakeholders to provide meaningful community and stakeholder engagement opportunities
- Provide transparency of the decision-making process and design development
- Promote strong, sustained support and leadership from the City Staff, City Council, and associated Commissions
- Maintain and strengthen relationship with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) to promote sustained support for and collaboration on the study

Stakeholder expectations are managed through an open and transparent outreach process. To support the above success factors, the communications plan will focus on delivering strategies and tactics that:

- Foster collaborative and supportive relationship with and between various governing, advisory, and managing bodies for the Homer Harbor.
- Create community understanding and appreciation for the Harbor and how integral it is to the health and wellbeing of Homer.
- Raise awareness, build support, and gain trust for the Homer Harbor Expansion study, and subsequently for a Harbor expansion should expansion be recommended by the study
- Educate about the goals of and need for the harbor expansion study as well as an expanded harbor in Homer (economy, safety, and connectivity); focus on facts such as data supporting expansion, jobs, shipping, safety, etc.
- Maintain transparency for the Homer Harbor expansion study, concurrent and subsequent efforts.

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- Generate community engagement and feedback, to help ensure:
 - The community members know they are being heard regarding the expansion efforts
 - Community feedback is generated with intent to deliver an outcome that reflects the overall sentiment and needs of the community

Messaging

Talking points, Messaging Document, and FAQs have been developed to support advances and changes, and will be updated regularly to reflect changes to and the status of the Study. - The City has considered a harbor expansion for many years as an expanded harbor will stimulate regional economic growth by meeting today's needs while expanding for future commerce.
 - Without it, the harbor in Homer will be overlooked for maritime trade opportunities and vessels will turn to other ports to accommodate their needs — taking with them jobs and business opportunities.
- We are committed to coordinating robust opportunities for the public to engage and provide input during the Study.
 - o The public will have the opportunity to share their input throughout the process to help us determine the needs and help ensure that community input helps to inform the Study.
 - We want your input to help advance the Study in a way that best serves the entire Homer community.

Stakeholder Database & Comment Management (SOAR)

The team has created and will maintain a stakeholder contact list that includes a diverse group of regional and local stakeholders, including government officials, business owners, local environmental organizations, and study partners. The list will be updated as needed throughout the lifecycle of the Study and will be maintained within a database and comment management system called Strategic Outreach and Reporting (SOAR), which is specifically designed to capture all interactions with stakeholders and synthesize levels of interactions.

The SOAR tool was developed to track all public comments and stakeholders as well as document key stakeholder engagements during the life of a project. This strategic engagement tool allows the project team to enter, manage, and track comments, identify comments that need attention, and communicate follow-up required by team members. SOAR is integrated with the project email and phone number to automatically collect comments in a single database.

The stakeholder list and SOAR database is a living tool that will be actively managed over the life of the project.

Comment Protocol

- A protocol has been developed to streamline tracking, integration, and response to comments received
 from the public. This protocol will be managed by the HDR outreach team and implemented by all Study
 team representatives. Compliance will be monitored, and the protocol can be adjusted as necessary
 throughout the Study.
- The City will be responsible for identifying comments that require immediate responses and for soliciting information and feedback from Study team members to prepare responses. HDR is available to support this effort and collaborate to develop and deliver responses.

Email queries will receive an automated generic response and will be assessed for additional follow-up per the procedures. It is not the intent to respond directly to every single query; the FAQ will be updated to address themes.

Communication Approach & Activities

Regular, consistent Study updates will be communicated via multiple platforms. This section will define the tools and tactics used to address the diversity of the communities and their needs and combine traditional media with newer digital technologies to ensure a broad reach. As appropriate to the platform and community needs, outreach will take into account:

- Using visual and hearing-impaired accessible materials and methods
- Advertising the public meetings in a manner that encourages broad participation
- Achieving inclusivity on the mailing list (i.e., using outreach methods that are likely to engage people who are traditionally underrepresented)
- Verifying that Study outreach is exhaustive and inclusive in part by requesting that the Port and Harbor Commission members and Community Advisory Committee members assist with outreach to improve connections
- Holding public meetings at convenient and accessible locations and times

Public Outreach According to Study Phases

1. **Education** – This stage is expected to happen early in the process to help dispel rumors and to provide data-driven materials and facts to the community. At this stage, the team will conduct scoping meetings to provide the public an opportunity to hear from the project team, learn about the process and history of the study, and allow for public questions and comments.

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- 2. **Discovery** At this stage, the team will continue to engage the public both in-person and virtually to explain the study, why it is being conducted, what the community can expect, and what type of feedback we are seeking. We will use multiple tools and tactics to support the study and continue to educate stakeholders regarding the need for and benefits from the study and harbor expansion in general.
- 3. **Recommendations** This stage is expected to happen once the preferred alternatives have been identified. The Outreach Team will facilitate feedback on the proposed alternatives. At this stage, we will request additional feedback to inform the study and finalize the recommendations.

Each outreach phase is paired with an associated technical deliverable as appropriate. Example: at the Study Alternative's milestone (Date TBD), planned communications has focused on creating awareness and encouraging community input, with the recognition that depending on the time of year, virtual review and feedback enables more participation.

Public Meetings

Public Meetings were previously held in May and September of 2023. One future meeting for review of advanced alternative designs is tentatively scheduled to support review of refined alternatives. Other Public Meetings will be scheduled as the Study progresses through phases.

Community Meetings

The team will attend meetings of existing community groups when invited, when there are opportunities for collaboration, or at major study milestones. This tactic can help build awareness of the study.

City Council

The Homer City Council is a body of six elected officials empowered by State Statute and Homer City Code to represent the citizenry in decisions on their behalf, where four members constitute a majority for a quorum and voting purposes. The City Council meets twice a month, on the second and fourth Mondays of the month in two consecutive meetings: City Council Committee of the Whole at 5:00 pm and City Council Regular Meeting at 6:00 pm. HDR and the City will participate in these meetings for study updates as necessary.

Pop-Up Events/Listening Posts

The team will plan and coordinate (two to four) pop-up events at highly trafficked locations within the Study area. The goal of the pop-up events is to connect face-to-face with the Homer community as this method is well-received in Homer. The goal will be to target those in the marine trades and related fields to ensure we reach this major stakeholder in the outreach process. The dates for these events may align with other outreach events such as Design Charrettes, alternatives updates, etc. or they may reinforce the goal of ensuring the Study collects meaningful public feedback and that community members understand the Study's commitment to keeping them informed. These pop-up events will be used to share information about the study and answer questions. Data may be collected using an optional digital survey. Below is a list of a few community events to consider having a presence in 2024:

- Kachemak Bay Wooden Boat Festival (Kachemak Bay Wooden Boat Society), Annual in September
- Kachemak Bay Shorebird Festival (Alaska Maritime National Wildlife Refuge Island & Oceans Visitor Center and Friends of Alaska National Wildlife Refuge), Annual in May
- Homer Spit Run Half Marathon (Kachemak Bay Running Club), Annual in June
- Homer Farmers Market, May September, Saturdays 10am-3pm; Wednesdays 2pm-5pm

Digital Survey

Surveying will be a highly recommended component in the public involvement process to be promoted at inperson events, through social media, and possibly other mediums. The primary goal of a survey is to engage with stakeholders. The secondary goal is to obtain information from the public such as input on alternatives, to gather open-ended feedback, to solicit communication preferences, and to obtain other data. Surveys provide an efficient way to collect and report quantitative data. Example survey questions might include:

- 1. Are you a current Homer resident?
- 2. Are you a Homer Business owner, or employed near or around Homer?



- 3. How are you impacted by the Homer Harbor Expansion?
- 4. What are you most concerned about with the Homer Harbor Expansion?
- 5. Describe what success looks like for the Homer Harbor Expansion?
- 6. What is your level of satisfaction with the information given about the study?

Study Hotline

The hotline number will be printed on all materials and website and will provide an avenue for stakeholders and any interested party to leave a message. Responses will be managed by the project team and logged in the SOAR database managed by the Outreach team. More details in the Comment Management section.

E-Blasts

In addition to direct stakeholder and community engagement, HDR can provide content for up to six email updates on the progress and status of the study that can be created by HDR and can be delivered by HDR, with approval of the City, through the City's MailChimp account. We recommend e-blasts to be sent in the weeks leading up to each outreach phase to garner high participation rates. E-blasts can additionally provide standalong updates and point recipients to engage with the project website.

Speaker's Bureau

The Outreach Team will facilitate a speaker's bureau calendar of meetings. These meetings include presentations to local clubs and organizations, neighborhood associations, industry groups and other civic groups and organizations that would benefit from receiving accurate up-to-date information about the Study. When requests for speaker's bureaus arise, the Outreach Team will coordinate with the technical team.

Ambassador Program

As the Study progresses and the outreach messaging has been solidified for each phase, individuals from various stakeholder groups can be identified as ambassadors of Study information. Ambassador's primary duty is to serve as a positive public representative outside of the project team to advocate for the Study. This includes attending regular scoping meetings, public meetings, community events, and assisting relationships with legislators, other political figures and other stakeholders. In addition, these individuals would be asked to write opinion pieces in support of the Study that will be included in the City monthly newsletter, op-eds, emails, etc.

City Newsletter

The monthly City of Homer Newsletter includes a section dedicated to the Study progress called the "Homer Harbor Expansion." Three features will be portrayed within this section: (1) a summary from the latest activities within the last month; (2) a Study update; and (3) quotes from local business owners and residents on their thoughts and experiences about the Study.

Media

Prior to key public outreach opportunities, a media advisory may be disseminated to local media to deliver earned media. HDR may draft the releases/advisories; the City will distribute.

Advertising

Limited advertising will be implemented to help raise awareness of key public meetings and/or public comment periods. An advertising plan may be developed based on the City budget.

Study-Specific Interactive Website

A study-specific website has been created as the main repository of information for the public to boost education and awareness. The website will be updated regularly to reflect public outreach opportunities and updates as the study progresses. Key pages include:

Visual Simulation and Mapping

Once the Study has suitably progressed, HDR will create a digital model to showcase proposed design(s), therefore encouraging accurate public visualization to change. This model will be publicized to maximize awareness and engagement.

Like the hotline number, the email alias linfo@HomerHarborExpansion.com will be listed on all collateral materials and website and is a venue for stakeholders and public to ask questions.

Print and Digital Collateral

The HDR team has already created a brand for the study including a Study logo that will be incorporated on all study-related materials. Additional graphics may be created to help convey technical information in a way that is easy to understand. Materials will be posted on the website and can be emailed to key stakeholder groups to facilitate discussion. Our visuals may include:

The Alaska Municipal League (AML) Winter Legislative Conference will take place in Juneau, Alaska February 20-22, 2024. Mayor Castner and Councilmembers Hansen, Lord, and Erickson have indicated an interest in attending.

The AML is a voluntary, nonprofit, nonpartisan, statewide organization of 140 cities, boroughs, and unified municipalities, representing over 97 percent of Alaska's residents. Originally organized in 1950, the League of Alaska Cities became the Alaska Municipal League in 1962 when boroughs joined the League.

Meetings include Alaska Conference of Mayors, AML Board, committees and meeting with Legislators.

Cost estimates for travel include round trip airfare from Homer to Juneau \$700 and room rates at \$239 per night Feb. 16 to 18 only and \$259 per night for any additional nights. Per Diem is \$58 per day, for three meals. Conference cost is \$200. The approximate total cost without any additional night's stay is \$1500 per person.

In consultation with the City Attorney, it's recommended that not more than three Council members attend the conference to avoid potential complications with the Open Meetings Act.

Recommendation: Approve travel for Mayor Castner and Council Members Hansen, Lord, and Erickson to attend the AML Winter Legislative Conference in Juneau, February 20-24, 2024.

Donation of Handheld Radio Units and a Fire Cart to the City of Whittier

The Port & Harbor is decommissioning approximately eight Motorola XTS 5000 and five XTS2500 radios that were originally purchased for use by the Homer Police Department using Homeland Security grant funds approximately 15 years ago. The units are no longer on our grant equipment inventory list with Homeland Security and we are free to re-home them. The Port, HPD, and the Fire Department have no use for these units and ProComm is wiping City data and settings from the devices. The radios were approximately \$5000 each when they were new. At this point in time they can be found for \$100 - \$500 each depending on condition. The value for this lot of radios could range between \$1300 and \$6,500. The City of Whittier's Fire Department has indicated an interest in the radios.

Additionally, the city has a fire cart that is no longer used for operations that the City of Whittier would be interested in adding to their operation. The cart was \$25,000 brand new in the 1980s, it's hard to say what the value would be today as it is a very specific piece of equipment and quite old.

Under Homer City Code § 18.30.040(b) the City Manager may donate property to another municipality when the City Council deems it advantageous to do so. I am recommending that the City Council endorse a donation of approximately thirteen Motorola radios and a decommissioned fire cart to the City of Whittier.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve endorsement of the City Manager's donation of Motorola radios and a fire cart to the City of Whittier

Fiscal Note – Annual maintenance costs for these improvements is estimated to be \$15,000.





Members of the public have occasionally donated funds or property to support the public operations of the City of Homer. Many citizens contributed towards the construction of the new library, for instance, and the City is currently working towards accepting donations for the 40th anniversary celebration of the sister-city relationship with Teshio, Japan.

Historically, the process of accepting or declining donations has been on an ad hoc basis. Homer City Code lacks a section that addresses donations towards City functions in general.

Amending Title 3 would provide clarity by 1. stating that the City can accept donations, 2. spelling out the criteria under which a donation may be accepted or declined, 3. limiting the conditions that donors may attach to the gift, and 4. explaining the City's authority to use funds when no conditions are attached.

Recommendation: Amend Homer City Code to clarify the donation process.

Issue: The purpose of this Memorandum is to request an amendment to the FY24 Capital Budget to address funding for the new restroom at Jack Gist Park.

II. Background: Jack Gist Park needs restroom facilities with flush toilets. The construction of a residential subdivision development adjacent to the park provided the opportunity to connect such a restroom to the water/sewer mains, which would be installed for the subdivision. The City developed a plan, in collaboration with the Homer Softball Association ("HSA"), to take advantage of this opportunity. The idea was that the City would commission the developer's contractor, Arno Construction, to install the water/sewer service connections. Further, the City would pay for the installation of a concrete slab, upon which the HSA would build the wood frame restroom. The HSA committed to building the actual restroom with its own funds.

The FY24 Capital Budget designated \$42,500 from the Homer Accelerated Water and Sewer Program (HAWSP) Fund for the water/sewer service connection. Further, \$77,500 was designated from the General Fund Unassigned Fund Balance, for the construction of the concrete slab. The water/sewer service connections are now installed.

Since the original plan was developed, Public Works developed a new idea, based on a product provide by Comforts of Homer, which builds mobile restroom units for general public use. Public Works has researched these units and concluded they could be cost effectively deployed at Jack Gist Park. Public Works recommends that funds previously designated for the concrete slab be re-appropriated for the acquisition and installation of a mobile restroom unit at Jack Gist Park.

This requires an ordinance directing use of the funds, already appropriated, for this new purpose.

III. RECOMMENDATION: That the City Council amend the FY24 Capital Budget to specify that the \$77,500, already appropriated for a restroom for Jack Gist Park, are hereby re-designated for the purpose of purchasing and install a portable restroom for the Park.

I. Issue: The purpose of this Memorandum is to request an appropriation in the amount of \$150,000 from the HAWSP Fund to furnish two mobile restrooms at Karen Hornaday Park.

II. Background:

The FY24 Capital Budget includes \$30,000 to install new water/sewer connection services for a new restroom at Karen Hornaday Park. The FY25 Capital Budget contains \$150,000 from the HAWSP Fund and \$350,000 from the General Fund Unassigned Fund Balance to build the actual restroom.

We have found a source of high quality mobile restrooms and we will be procuring one for Jack Gist Park. These units would be equally useful at Karen Hornaday Park. The cost of one mobile restroom unit is \$65,000. This means we could install two such units at Karen Hornaday Park, one placed near the Pavilion and one placed adjacent to the Playground, using the FY24 funds and the funds projected to come from the HAWSP Fund in FY25. Assuming the new service lines come in on budget, we may not need to tap the General Fund in FY25.

III. RECOMMENDATION: That the City Council appropriate \$150,000 from the HAWSP Fund to the FY 24 Capital Budget to fully fund two portable restroom units for Karen Hornaday Park.

A. Portable Restrooms for City Parks

Memorandum PARC-23-027 from Parks Maintenance Coordinator as backup

Acting Chair Archibald introduced the item by reading the title and deferred to Parks Coordinator Felice.

Parks Maintenance Coordinator Felice reviewed his memorandum for the Commission. He provided additional comments on the proposed units being used by many communities in Alaska and also in the Lower 48, noting in particular the cost savings to the City.

Parks Maintenance Coordinator Felice facilitated discussion on the following:

- Shipping Costs to Seward from Washington was \$5000 for two units
- The unit could be connected directly to water and sewer services
- The unit would be removed and stored under cover in the winter
 - Location of storage will need to be determined, additional covered storage may need to be constructed.
 - They can be constructed for year round use as they do come equipped with a heater. He reported that communities in Idaho use them year round and they have harsh winters.
- Each unit will have two standard toilet rooms and one ADA toilet room, all rooms will be equipped with porcelain commodes and sinks, can be easily hosed down and cleaned. There will be a ramp with handrails to access the ADA unit.
 - Each trailer will be lowered hydraulically to minimize the height from the ground
 - Wheels & axles remain attached to the unit
 - Unit will be open during park times only and locked by janitorial staff after cleaning.
 Parks maintenance staff or Building Maintenance will unlock units at the beginning of each day.
- Cost of two units is 50% or less of one brick and mortar restroom facility
- Each unit can be constructed in seven days cost is \$60,666.75 per unit as shown
 - Units can be constructed with holding tanks and could serve as replacements for Portable Toilets on the Spit in various locations including Mariner Park
- Units have been used by other communities for as long as 14 years with scheduled maintenance and needed repairs.

Public Works Director Keiser explained that they are prepared to submit an ordinance to be introduced at the November 27th regular meeting and will have public hearing and adopted at the January 8th meeting. They will request that City Council move the funds allocated in the FY25 Budget to FY24 Budget so they can get this done. If Council approves then restrooms would be received and installed in time for baseball season.

Parks Maintenance Coordinator reported that he met with the Adult Softball Association and Little League and both organization support this project. Little League had proposed constructing a two story Refreshment and Scoreboard with restrooms and storage facility but they do not have the funding and the city would not be able to get the funding for constructing something like that for quite some time.

Memorandum from Recreation Manager as backup

Acting Chair Archibald introduced the item and deferred to Recreation Manager Illg

Recreation Manager Illg provided a summary review of the memoranda in the packet. He noted the following:

- City Manager brought forward the ordinance to create the Community Development Department and relocate the Divisions of Economic Development, Planning and Community Recreation from the Administrative Department to within the new Community Development Department, this department will also have the future Building & Code Enforcement Division; transition IT and the Library Divisions into Departments.
- There has been a lot of discussion and public comment, which has been provided for the Commission in the packet, and Council postponed the ordinance to January 8th regarding the concerns received from the public to create and Parks & Recreation Department.
- Council appears to be on board for creating the Library and IT Departments.
- Council asked the City Manager if the Parks, Art, Recreation & Culture Advisory Commission has weighed in on this issue, noting that the Library Board, EDC and Planning Commissions have provided comment.
- Separate but related issue regarding this is the potential to have a soon to be created Parks & Recreation Department.
- Questioned if Community Recreation Division is the right fit for the Community Development Department, or should stay where it is until the Parks and Recreation Department is created instead of jumping around.
- Acknowledged some cross over with Economic Development such as special events because Community Recreation holds a number of events which relate to or work with economic development.

Mr. Illg specifically asked the Commission to comment on what they thought about moving the Community Recreation division under Community Development Department.

Acting Chair Archibald commented on the numerous entities in that planning, parks and rec section of the Ordinance 23-49.

I. Issue:

The purpose of this Memorandum is to request approval to apply for State Revolving Loan Funds for the Beluga Sewer Lift Station before the Principal Forgiveness Subsidy expires.

II. Background:

The FY24 CIP includes \$100,000 for final design of the Beluga Lift Station Improvements and work is on-going. In August 2023, the Alaska Department of Conservation ("ADEC") offered the City a Principal Forgiveness Subsidy in the amount of \$500,000. We learned recently that this offer expires on February 29, 2024, unless we submit a loan application by that date. While we understand the Council has not yet appropriated the funds for the construction of the Beluga Lift Station Improvement Project, we ask for authorization to submit a loan application so we can lock in the Principal Forgiveness Subsidy before it expires. We will address the issue of full funding with the Biennial Budget Adjustment process. In the event the Council does not choose to fully fund the construction at that time, we can inform the ADEC and let the loan go fallow.

III. RECOMMENDATION: That the City Council authorize the City Manager to apply for Clean Water Funds from the ADEC so the Principal Forgiveness Subsidy can be locked in.

The purpose of this Memorandum is to request approval to issue a Task Order to RESPEC Company, LLC ("RESPEC") to design the rebuild of the pressure reducing station in Ben Walters Way.

II. Background:

Ordinance 23-61 appropriates funds from the Water CARMA Fund to rebuild the pressure reducing station in Ben Walters Way.

Luke Rubalcava, RESPEC Company, LLC ("RESPEC"), was requested to submit a proposal to design the project. RESPEC is the only mechanical engineer located in Homer. 

A. Art Donation – Sculpture for Baycrest Hill Overlook

Memorandum PARC 23-023 from Deputy City Clerk as backup

Vice Chair Lowney introduced the item by reading of the title and invited the Clerk to provide her report.

Deputy City Clerk Krause reviewed Memorandum PARC 23-023 for the Commission. She noted that the section in the Policies and Procedures regarding donations outlining the review process was provided to assist the Commission in making their decision.

ROEDL/HARRALD MOVE TO ADOPT THE PROPOSED DONATION OF A LIGHTHOUSE SCULPTURE CREATED BY MOOSERUN METALSMITHS TO BE PLACED IN THE GARDENS LOCATED AT THE BAYCREST HILL OVERLOOK AND FORWARD TO CITY COUNCIL WITH THE RECOMMENDATION TO INCLUDE IN THE CITY OF HOMER MUNICIPAL ART COLLECTION.

Deputy City Clerk Krause facilitated discussion on the following:

- Clarified that the costs for the creation of the donation was being paid by the persons donating the sculpture. The costs to the city would be installation and the labor to effect that installation.
- Trying to visualize the artwork in the actual setting. It would have been preferred to see the drawing superimposed in the location where it will be installed.

- Reviewing the Adopted plan for the Baycrest Hill Overlook this sculpture does not really fit this theme as they were collaborative and the desire is to honor those collaborations.
- The installation of a concrete base within the center of the garden bed will require all the vegetation and dirt to be removed.
 - Parks Maintenance Coordinator Felice stated that it would be scheduled in the fall before
 the first snowfall. They will try to get it all done before hard freeze or it will be done in
 spring time weather dependent May-June.
- Appearance may be seen as an oil derrick and that would not be acceptable, a lighthouse would be okay but unsure how that will be attained as described, not many lighthouses are square.
- Concerns expressed on the proposed wording for the plaque, comments were not in favor of having any plaque due to previous experience from the public on benches and at WKFL.
 - It was noted that the sculpture was also intended to be a trellis which means that it would be support for plants so most of the time plants would cover the plaque then in winter it would be covered in snow depending on where the plaque was placed.
 - Reviewing the donations policy regarding memorials and allowing recognition plaques,
 etc. to limit future donations to Dedicated to the City of Homer from XXXXX
- Reaching out to the donors and artists if there is no timeline to address the Commission's concerns regarding the plaque.
 - o There is a timeline, artists will have the piece completed in approximately 4-6 weeks.
 - Recommendation from Staff was to approve the actual sculpture with conditional approval on the memorial plaque until agreement on content is determined.
 - The plaque can always be mounted after installation of the sculpture.

ARCHIBALD/HARRALD MOVED TO AMEND THE MOTION TO POSTPONE PLACEMENT OF A MEMORIAL PLAQUE UNTIL A MEMORIAL POLICY HAS BEEN ADOPTED BY THE CITY.

There was discussion on the placement of the plaque at the convenience of the Parks personnel.

Commissioner Archibald called for a Point of Order as the discussion is not germane to the amendment on the floor currently.

Deputy City Clerk Krause read back the amendment to the motion.

VOTE: (Amendment). NON-OBJECTION. UNANIMOUS CONSENT.

Deputy City Clerk Krause read back the main motion as amended.

MOVED TO ADOPT THE PROPOSED DONATION OF A LIGHTHOUSE SCULPTURE CREATED BY MOOSERUN METALSMITHS TO BE PLACED IN THE GARDENS LOCATED AT THE BAYCREST HILL OVERLOOK, POSTPONING THE PLACEMENT OF A MEMORIAL PLAQUE UNTIL A MEMORIAL POLICY IS ADOPTED BY THE CITY AND FORWARD TO CITY COUNCIL WITH THE RECOMMENDATION TO INCLUDE IN THE CITY OF HOMER MUNICIPAL ART COLLECTION.

A brief discussion was conducted on the ability of parks staff to install the plaque when the policy was adopted and that not having the plaque would not delay the creation and installation of the sculpture.

VOTE. (Main motion) NON-OBJECTION. UNANIMOUS CONSENT.

Motion carried.

B. 2024 – 2029 Draft Capital Improvement Plan – Review and Recommendation Memorandum from Special Projects & Communication Coordinator as backup

Vice Chair Lowney introduced the item by reading of the title. She noted that the goal of the Commission according to Ms. Carroll is to choose three and to come to some sort of consensus on what the Commission would like. Vice Chair Lowney then opened the floor for recommendations.

Commissioner Fair requested clarification if the Commission was intent to select and recommend projects strictly related to Parks Recreation & Culture or selecting the top three that the Commission thinks are city needs.

Vice Chair Lowney opined that there are no rules.

Commissioner Fair stated, as he did at the Library Advisory Board meeting on Tuesday, that you could throw a dart at any of the projects in the plan and hit stuff that needs to be taken care of for the city. He did not think picking any of them would be wrong.

Vice Chair Lowney interjected that there was an issue last time about the Commission not selecting the Gateway Development Project since the Commission had recommended it previously and added it as a new project before that so it may be better that the Commission recommend related projects.

Commissioner Harrald expressed agreement with Vice Chair Lowney

Recreation Manager Illg voiced his recommendation that the Commission should focus on Parks, Art, Recreation and Culture Projects as that is what Council will expect.

Deputy City Clerk Krause concurred with Recreation Manager Illg but also the Commission has promoted additional projects that benefitted the City as a whole such as a Harbor Project or a New Police Station.

Associate Planner Steffy supported the recommendations previously stated but reiterated the expectation of each advisory body recommending projects related to its focus.

Commissioner Fair commented that ADA stuff should be taking place and that goes across practically all advisory bodies in the city, not picking projects like the Homer Spit Coastal Erosion Mitigation, which affects everything on the spit or the A Frame Water Transmission Line that's going to fall apart, noting that there is just so much, but he will select three parks related projects those will be, in priority order: Karen Hornaday Park Public Restroom Facility, Jack Gist Park Improvements Phase 2 and Homer Spit Coastal Erosion Mitigation

Commissioner Roedl selected the Homer Spit Trailhead Restroom, Svedlund/Herndon Street Sidewalks and Bayview Park Restoration.

Commissioner Harrald selected Kachemak Drive Non-motorized Pathway, Multi-Use Community Center, and Karen Hornaday Park Public Restroom Facility.

I. Issue: The purpose of this Memorandum is to recommend a Task Order to HDR to assist with revising the City's FY23 REACH (Realizing Equitable and Accessible Connectivity in Homer) planning grant application for resubmission the FY24 RAISE grant round.

II. Background: Ordinance 22-39, adopted by City Council in August appropriated \$125,000 to support development and submission of grant applications under the Federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA). Last year, some of these funds were used to contract with HDR to assist with a grant application to the FY23 RAISE (Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity) Federal discretionary grant program.

The application, titled REACH (Realizing Equitable, Accessible Connectivity in Homer), sought Federal planning funds to conduct system-wide planning and prioritization, data collection and analysis, feasibility, environmental review and 65% design for selected sidewalk and trail projects in Homer's Non-Motorized Transportation Plan. The planning grant does not require any City match funds.

While not selected for funding in the FY23 round, Homer's REACH application made it to the Secretary of Transportation's desk for final funding consideration, was Highly Rated and earned the designation as a "Project of Merit." At an application debrief, the Transportation Department encouraged the City to consider applying again in the FY24 round.

The FY24 RAISE program opened in late November with a February 28, 2024 application submission deadline. A Resolution approving a Task Order to HDR to help update and resubmit the REACH application for FY24 RAISE funding is before you for consideration. The scope of work (attached) is estimated not to exceed \$19,000 based on time and effort. The Professional IIJA Grant Writing Services fund has \$44,976 remaining to cover this cost.

TASK ORDER #24-01 IIJA Grant Assistance

This Task Order pertains to an Agreement by and between the City of Homer, ("OWNER"), and HDR Engineering Inc., ("ENGINEER"), dated January _____, 2024, ("the AGREEMENT"). Engineer shall perform services on the project described below as provided herein and in the Agreement.

PART 1.0 PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Update the City's FY23 RAISE Application and submit for FY24 RAISE.

PART 2.0 SCOPE OF SERVICES TO BE PERFORMED BY ENGINEER

Task 1: FY23 RAISE Application

This scope describes HDR's approach to updating The City's FY23 RAISE Application and submitting it to the FY24 RAISE funding opportunity.

We propose to coordinate and lead The City's RAISE application development process while working closely with City staff to agree on key strategic decisions. At least three rounds of review will confirm that the application captures the essence of The City's needs, plans, and expected impacts, and aligns with federal grant program priorities.

1.1 Initial Application Internal Review

HDR will select two senior grant writers who have either reviewed grants for FHWA or won RAISE grants under IIJA. These grant writers will read the FY23 agency debrief notes and then review the FY23 application in detail to provide critical comments aimed at strengthening the application. They will provide suggestions for addressing deficiencies identified in the FY23 debrief.

1.2 Kick-Off Meeting, Grant Program Requirement Checklist, and Application Management

Working closely with The City's staff, HDR will discuss project selection and develop a unique work plan and schedule to address the specific application requirements, including grants.gov workspace and supporting documentation, data, and analyses. This schedule will be used to monitor progress, identify critical path items, meet client deadlines, and document issues and concerns as they arise.

HDR will hold a brief virtual kickoff meeting to:

- Review results of subtask 1.1
- Identify data and other substantive content needed to support the application
- Develop a schedule for grant application

DELIVERABLES

- Grant application virtual kick-off meeting
- Grant application work plan
- Brief virtual meetings twice weekly to coordinate on grant progress
- Oversight and coordination of tasks required to complete grant application
- Assistance preparing for grants.gov submission
- Shared file space

1.3 Grant Application Narrative

HDR will revise the narrative to strengthen it for FY24 RAISE, first focusing on areas identified in the agency debrief then reviewing the entire application. Our grant writing team will revise the narrative and supporting data analyses and guide The City in gathering relevant project documentation.

Concurrently, HDR's graphic designer will utilize the FY23 application template and provide minor updates for dates, pagination, and flow as required by document revisions for FY24 application.

Our team will deliver a draft version of the Application Narrative in MS Word for review and a final version of the Application Narrative in PDF for submission, including the Work Plan appendix and letters of support. We will work with The City to prepare for final submission at least a day before the application deadline, when City staff will upload the documents onto the grants.gov web portal.

DELIVERABLES

- Draft and final versions of a clear, concise, and narrative that answers grant evaluation metrics
- Draft and final layout templates

1.4 Post-Application Debrief

HDR will support The City in reaching out to the grant agency for an application debrief to garner lessons learned from the funder's project review.

I. Issue:

The purpose of this Memorandum is to request authorization to issue a change order to Kinney Engineering's Task Order 22-04, relating to the Heath Street Pavement Reconstruction Project, for increased costs to design a specialized pedestrian crossing.

II. Background:

Resolution 22-073 authorized a Task Order to Kinney Engineering, LLC ("Kinney") to design the Heath Street Pavement Restoration Project. The scope of work was confined to the existing geometry of the road; that is, we did not contemplate changing the existing road grade or alignment. However, one day we participated in a walk-around with folks from the Independent Living Center ("ILC"). This walk took us from the ILF office on Pioneer Avenue through the Poopdeck Trail system to the sidewalk on Hazel Avenue, which ends at the intersection of Heath Street. The ILC folks opined that the intersection of Hazel Avenue with Heath Street is not only non-compliant with ADA requirements, it is dangerous for pedestrians because the sidewalk ends abruptly, vehicles speed around the smoothly curved corner from Heath Street onto Hazel Avenue, and there is no ramp that allows wheelchairs or strollers to safely cross Heath Street to the Post Office. We realized this important pedestrian crossing point needed to be remedied.

I worked with Kinney to research possible solutions. Engineering a solution was challenging because it is a mid-block corssing, which sits at one of the steeper portions of the road, and ties into an existing sidewalk on the east side of Heath Street. We needed to balance issues relating to visibility, slope, and

other geometrical constraints. We eventually settled on a design, which would make the following improvements:

- a. Provide an ADA-compliant "landing" for the Hazel Avenue sidewalk where it meets Heath Street. This will give pedestrians, wheelchairs and strollers a safe place to cross.
- b. Reduce the radius of the curve that flows south from Heath Street to Hazel Avenue. This will require drivers to reduce speed as they go around the curve.
- c. Install a painted mid-block crosswalk from the modified sidewalk on the east side of Heath Street. This will give pedestrians a safe space in which to cross the street and provide for ADA-compliant ramps from the sidewalks to the streets.
- d. Install a Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon ("RRFB") at the crosswalk. This will increase the visibility of the crosswalk. One of the primary comments about crosswalks from motorists during the Transportation Outreach, was that the crosswalks needed to be more visible. The flasher on the beacon will be activated by a controller mounted at the beginning of the crosswalk on both sides of the street.


These improvements will be made at the time the Heath Street Pavement Reconstruction Project is constructed, hopefully within the next couple of years. They will substantially increase pedestrian safety at that location. Further, the engineering solutions developed for this intersection can be replicated at other locations. This is one reason a line item for "ADA Upgrades to Existing Sidewalks" was inserted into the Road Financial Plan, the HART Fund's budget planning document.


We also asked Kinney to do a closer inspection, including taking video camera images of the interior of the existing Heath Street storm drain. This was important because it helped us understand the condition of the storm drain and make a decision about whether it needed to be replaced.

Kinney's itemized costs for this extra work, which is outside of the company's original scope, is \$10,751.25 for the intersection/crosswalk modifications and \$5,430 for the storm drain inspection, for a total of \$16,181.25. We are asking for a small contingency to cover other unforeseen circumstances.

Ordinance 23-62 appropriated \$25,000 from the HART Roads Fund to complete the design of the Heath Street Pavement Restoration Project.

III. RECOMMENDATION: That the City Council authorize a change order to Kinney Engineering's Task Order No. 22-04, related to the Heath Street Pavement Restoration Project, in the amount of \$25,000.

Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons (RRFB)

A marked crosswalk or pedestrian warning sign can improve safety for pedestrians crossing the road, but at times may not be sufficient for drivers to visibly locate crossing locations and yield to pedestrians. To enhance pedestrian conspicuity and increase driver awareness at uncontrolled, marked crosswalks, transportation agencies can install a pedestrian actuated Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon (RRFB) to accompany a pedestrian warning sign. RRFBs consist of two, rectangular-shaped yellow indications, each with a light-emitting diode (LED)-array-based light source. RRFBs flash with an alternating high frequency when activated to enhance conspicuity of pedestrians at the crossing to drivers.

For more information on using RRFBs, see the Interim Approval in the *Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD)*.¹

Applications

The RRFB is applicable to many types of pedestrian crossings but is particularly effective at multilane crossings with speed limits less than 40 miles per hour. Research suggests RRFBs can result in motorist yielding rates as high at 98 percent at marked crosswalks, but varies depending on the location, posted speed limit, pedestrian crossing distance, one- versus two-way road, and the number of travel lanes. RRFBs can also accompany school or trail crossing warning signs.

RRFBs are placed on both sides of a crosswalk below the pedestrian crossing sign and above the diagonal downward arrow plaque pointing at the crossing. The flashing pattern can be activated with pushbuttons or passive (e.g., video or infrared) pedestrian detection, and should be unlit when not activated.

Considerations

Agencies should:2

- Install RRFBs in the median rather than the far-side of the roadway if there is a pedestrian refuge or other type of median.
- Use solar-power panels to eliminate the need for a power source.
- Reserve the use of RRFBs for locations with significant pedestrian safety issues, as over-use of RRFB treatments may diminish their effectiveness.

Agencies shall not:2

- Use RRFBs without the presence of a pedestrian, school or trail crossing warning sign.
- Use RRFBs for crosswalks across approaches controlled by YIELD signs, STOP signs, traffic control signals, or pedestrian hybrid beacons, except for the approach or egress from a roundabout.

I. Issue: The purpose of this Memorandum is to recommend the City issue a Term Contract to Appaloosa Integrated Construction & Consulting Services, LLC ("AICS").

II. Background:

Several of the City's grants with state or federal agencies require the City to use, or exercise good faith efforts to use, MWDBE businesses; that is, businesses owned by minorities, women or disadvantaged individuals. A Best Practice for identifying such businesses is to create a Bidder's List by advertising a Request for Qualifications ("RFQ") for such businesses and creating a roster of firms meeting one or more of the designations. In August 2023, we published a RFQ asking for Statements of Qualifications (SOQ) for services we would likely need for various projects. At that time, no local firms submitted their SOQ. However, a local woman-owned business enterprise ("WBE") has emerged – AICS.

Danielle Stark, the principal of AICS, moved to Homer in 2019. She and her husband, Mike Stark, are well-versed in the construction industry. Danielle worked on residential and commercial architectural projects in multiple states. Mike, a former Bechtel employee, worked on heavy civil projects across the country and internationally, including public works infrastructure and marine projects. Mike's expertise is construction management and project administration. I can see him helping with construction management of various upcoming projects, such as the Raw Water Transmission Line, the Bunnell Avenue Green Infrastructure Project and the Kachemak Sponge Green Infrastructure Project. All of these projects have federal grant funding and will require either the use of, or good faith efforts to use, MWDBEs. A term contract with AICS provides the opportunity for the City to issue task orders for specific work, as needs arise, and thus, satisfy that requirement.

The City of Homer receives revenue from the State of Alaska for fish tax collected by the State in two different ways. The Department of Revenue distributes "Raw Fish Tax" from licensed seafood processors, floating processors and seafood exporters to eligible municipalities. These funds, when received by the City of Homer, are allocated to Fish Dock Revenues.

The second way the City of Homer receives fish tax revenue is through the Alaska Department of Commerce, Community, and Economic Development (ADCCED). ADCCED receives 50% of the undistributed Raw Fish Tax from the Department of Revenue to distribute through a program known as the Shared Fisheries Business Tax Program. The purpose of this program is to provide for a sharing of state fish tax collected outside municipal boundaries with municipalities that have been affected by fishing industry activities. For the Cook Inlet Fisheries Management Area, of which the City of Homer is a part, there are ten communities that will receive a shared portion of that collected shared fish tax. The ten communities are the Municipality of Anchorage, Homer, Kachemak, Kenai, Kenai Peninsula Borough, Seldovia, Seward, Soldotna, Houston, and Palmer.

A Resolution from the Homer City Council is required annually to receive these funds. If any of the communities listed above do not apply by the deadline in March of 2023, then the funds will be reallocated to communities that did apply.

Recommendation:

Approval and adoption of Resolution 24-010

December Update from Councilmembers Hansen & Lord on the Harbor Expansion Project

With direction from the passage of Resolution 23-130, we have worked with staff to stay engaged on the Harbor expansion project through December.

- Met with Representative Vance and Senator Stevens. Staff forwarded the passed resolution, and we discussed the request for additional state matching funds and overall project support.
 - Rep. Vance was very supportive. She would like to help schedule a City presentation to the House Transportation Committee in February during the fly-in. She also encouraged soliciting letters of support from surrounding communities to help illustrate the larger, regional benefit of our harbor. She also thought it would be very valuable to illustrate the City's financial investment in the project (see the next bullet point on developing financial visualizations!).
 - Senator Stevens also expressed support, and noted that the second year of session can be a good year for capital project funding. He & staff asked about community support, and we shared the unanimous approval of Resolution 21-130, and the feeling that although we hit a bump in the road (and that ruffled some feathers), we are committed to seeing the General Investigation through. They encouraged as much demonstration of community/regional support as possible. The Senator suggested that our GI match ask would be high on his list of priorities for the capital budget, and he encouraged us to make sure and visit Juneau to lobby in person for project support.
- Reviewed and provided feedback to staff on ways to visualize project budget and
 expenditures for Council/Commission/legislators/public. Staff are working on finalizing
 this to be ready for our January meeting. The goal will be to show in easy to understand
 graphics: the funding sources and where they are flowing to (overall project
 budget/work-in-kind, owner's representative contract), the breakdown of project
 deliverables within those areas, and then a budget to actual similarly broken down.
- Connected with Assembly member Kelly Cooper and provided a draft resolution (thanks to Jenny for drafting!) for the Borough Assembly to take up at their first meeting in January, supporting the continuation of the GI and supporting a request for additional match funds from the State.
- Connected with the City lobbyists to get information for Council to consider on the possibility of a federal lobbyist. Jenny is including it in the staff update, but we were told that the Corps included \$800,000 in their work plan budget for FY25, which is great news! But that funding will need to hold through the Congressional budget process. It may also be beneficial to have a federal presence for increasing our odds for future federal granting for local services build-out if we do come out with a favorable cost benefit for the harbor expansion, and to be well positioned to secure Corps funding for the next phases again, if the GI is favorable at the end. From Christine & Reggie, it sounds like federal lobbyists would be minimum \$60,000, more likely six figures. We're not sure this is a great use of City funds at this point, but will likely be something we

should keep in mind in the future if there is a green light from the GI. We also talked with C&R about the importance of in-person lobbying in Juneau for additional state match as well as ongoing state support for the project. The AML winter conference is 2/20-22/2024, and staff should be requesting interest from Council on attending ASAP so that C&R can start making appointments with various legislators knowing who will be there.

 Reviewed the communications plan from HDR with staff. We provided one point of feedback (to remove lists of specific entities/organizations), and the communications plan should be included in the packet as an informational item for our first meeting in January.

For our January meeting, we plan to bring forward the Ordinance to set aside Port Reserves to meet the additional \$288k match requirement as laid out in Reso 23-130. We also look forward to reviewing with the Council some financial/budget visualizations from staff.

Sister City Council Champions Report January 8, 2024 From Caroline & Rachel

On Tuesday, January 2nd we met with Dave, Rob, and Lori to discuss the status of Sister City celebration planning efforts by the ad-hoc Sister City Committee. This group is made up of around a dozen interested community members who have been meeting regularly (including within four 'subcommittees') to chart a plan for our 2024 Sister City Celebrations.

We asked several questions and are anticipating bringing forward an ordinance for introduction at our January 22nd meeting for additional funding in the amount of \$20,000 for Sister City activities in 2024. These funds will be requested from either the General Fund CARMA account or the GF Fund Balance.

Dave can provide further details on the proposed programming at our January 22nd meeting, but we wanted to take a minute to provide the Council with an update, and ask for any questions or feedback you might have in advance of an ordinance.

SUBJECT: Attendance Report for 2023 Alaska Municipal League Winter Conference

Wednesday and Thursday, December 6 and 7, 2023 I joined Mayor Castner, and three other councilmembers at the Alaska Municipal League (AML)'s Winter Conference in Anchorage.

From my perspective, the highlight of the conference was a break-out session held at 8:45 am on Thursday on the topic of "Local Government Action on Housing." The session was moderated by John Whiddon of Kodiak, and included panelists from Juneau (Katie Koester), Anchorage (Felix Rivera), Palmer (John Moosey), Ketchikan (Peter Amylon) and Wrangell (Mason Villarma).

The session was well attended by delegations from around the state, and many of the things that other municipalities are considering, or already doing, seemed like they could have applicability here in Homer. Here are some highlights:

- Revamp zoning regs to allow smaller houses on smaller lots as an approved use (no CUP) (Palmer) Zoning must be specific to you don't require 60' rights of way for new streets if that doesn't make sense in your community.
- Encourage Accessory Dwelling Units (ADU) on existing lots without a CUP. If you give people the sense that something can only be done on an "exceptional" basis, with a CUP, they won't do it. (Juneau)
- Try to think about the availability of affordable housing as basic infrastructure that the city spends resources to actively encourage, similar to how it provides clean water, sewage treatment and well-repaired roads clear of snow (Juneau).
- Meet with developers to find out what is holding them back from developing affordable housing in areas where greater density is desired, and work to fix the problem.
- Requiring developers to provide streets and utilities can create a situation where only expensive single-family homes will "pencil out." The city should consider providing this infrastructure in areas where denser, more affordable housing is desired, and then selling lots to developers willing to commit to building such housing. The infrastructure is expensive, but building it first can allow smaller developers to participate, and allow all developers to provide more affordable units.
- Consider taking vacant, city-owned parcels, defining the type of more affordable housing that is desired there (e.g. smaller apartments or condos, or tiny homes) and auctioning them off well below market value to developers willing

to commit to build the desired housing there within three years. To help sell this unorthodox approach, focus on the long term: a lot that sits vacant for another 40 years generates no revenue; a well-developed lot that is disposed of even at below market value, will "pay" for its disposal in the years to come, by generating revenue for the city. (Palmer)

- Take advantage of the Dunleavy administration's desire to move state lands to municipal ownership in exchange for development commitments (talk to DNR).
- Stop mandating large amounts of off-street parking; let developers decide (Anchorage)
- Require 30% of hospital revenues to go to a fund to seed affordable housing (e.g. by offering lower-interest loans, or loan guarantees, for the final 20% of a project in exchange for guarantees that affordable units will be included)
- Consider using a "stick" approach to get existing housing onto the market, by imposing a higher tax rate for properties that are vacant for all or most of the year.

Thank you for the opportunity to attend the Alaska Municipal League (AML) conference December 6-8, 2023. AML is a great opportunity to learn the latest information related to municipal governance and connect with elected officials from communities around Alaska.

AML Takeaways

I attended breakout sessions on preparing for and mitigating environmental impacts, cities of opportunity and social determinants of health, strengthening coastal resilience, new energy – deploying federal investments, economic impact of inflation and demographic change, and National League of Cities 101. I also attended the AML business meeting on Friday morning and voted for resolutions and the slate of the AML board of directors on behalf of Homer.

Some of my key takeaways from the meeting including the following:

- Homer's Mobilizing for Action through Planning and Partnerships (MAPP) regularly assesses the social determinants of health within the southern Kenai Peninsula, and we have the opportunity to incorporate these measures into development of our upcoming comprehensive plan and consider how we think about community health factors as we craft city code.
- Homer's all hazard mitigation plan that was recently updated sets up the city to be able to receive various federal disaster funds if a disaster were to happen in our community. Numerous communities across Alaska have experienced disasters (glacial dam releases, landslides, storm surge flooding, etc.) that we need to be cognizant of. In particular, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) funding may require that we have identified projects in our all hazard mitigation plan and that they are in our capital improvement plan.
- Quite a bit of federal funding coming to Alaska is geared towards rural communities off the road system. This
 makes a lot of sense because there is so much need in communities off the road system. However, it leaves
 me wondering about the opportunities for Homer and the needs we have.
- Numerous state and federal agencies/organizations have coastal and marine data that may be relevant to
 Homer that we should be aware of: Alaska Geospatial Office and Geospatial Council, Alaska Ocean Observing
 System (AOOS), and National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Office for Coastal
 Management. The coastal discussions made me wonder what the current sea level predictions are for Homer.
 Maybe it's time to ask the Kachemak Bay Research Reserve to evaluate this again as their last assessment was
 ~15 years ago.

- There is a lot of federal funding coming to Alaska for energy projects, including renewable energy, grid
 resilience, building out electric vehicle infrastructure, and grants for homes and businesses, but very little of
 that funding seems targeted for a municipality such as Homer.
- Energy-wise, there were a couple themes I found interesting and somewhat head-scratching:
 - There seems to be a push towards electrification, I suppose on the premise that electricity sources will be moving towards renewable sources, maybe? Where does that leave Homer with our electricity source still dependent on natural gas and a recently constructed natural gas pipeline that our community has spent considerable funds towards construction, hook-up, and appliance conversion?
 - The US Forest Service is also pushing for the conversion from natural gas to wood heat sources, which seemed a bit contradictory to me, converting from one limited resource to another, both of which contribute to greenhouse gas emissions, and wood heat has more issues with air quality, but what do I know?
- Most of Alaska Housing Finance Corporation's (AHFC's) programs are for private homes, but one program
 could be beneficial to the city: the Framework for Responsive Code Development which is intended to help
 communities with building and energy codes; there is funding available.
- The bottom line of the economic session is that the economy is good, but the vibes are bad. Prices have increased but salaries have increased ahead of prices, especially for middle and lower wage workers, but the US hasn't experienced inflation like this since the 1970s and early 1980s so it's foreign to most people. In the labor market, there are currently 2 jobs for every worker looking for a job and the labor force is declining as the population ages; Alaska is losing its prime age workforce because they are leaving the state.

It is always interesting to go to the December AML conference. It is a good place to see how optimistic or pessimistic our local governments are.

When the huge Transportation Bill came out and all the funding that could possibly make it into our cities via the grants, was an infusion of excitement that we were going to be able to get money for critical projects and I think we were under the impression that money was quickly going to come to those who were prepared. The reality of the Transportation Bill has hit.

FEMA mitigation funding- the take away from this session was that we need to have a multi-jurisdictional mitigation plan strategy in place (Homer, Kachemak City, KPB). Basically FEMA incidents go into a very large pool.. We need to be prepared no matter whether there is FEMA money or not.

Implementing Asset Management – "Asset Management is an integrated approach involving all organization departments, to effectively manage existing and new assets and deliver services to customers. The intent is to better connect what we are already doing and filling in the gaps. When we apply for grants the Assets "items that helps us add value to an organization" are items such as green infrastructure which includes, our natural assets (wetlands, forest, parks, lakes etc), enhanced assets (rain gardens, bioswales, urban trees and park, stormwater pond etc) and engineered assets (permeable pavement, green roofs, rain barrels green walls, cisterns etc). We need to make sure we have that value listed.

Asset Management core Organizational Elements: People & Leadership, Policy and Governance, Planning and Decision-making, Data & Information, Asset management Practice and Life Cycle Delivery.

I enjoyed the crossover between government and private as these principles are good for both to be more productive and work together.

Coastal Marine – Long Range: Tustumena project is moving forward. They are putting an extra engine in the replacement to keep the boat moving when there are issues. They are looking at standardizing for reliability.

Since arriving in Homer, I have been looking for opportunities to modify the organization in ways that would better integrate teams, better carry out the will of the Council, provide a more transparent view of City operations, and increase the organization's effectiveness at providing services to the City's residents, businesses, and visitors. Over the last three years I have observed how my staff interacts with each other, how our systems work (or don't work) well with each other, and the gaps between where we are as a City right now and where we're aspiring to be as we go through a phase of growth and transformation as a community. I previewed the general vision back in March 2022 at the Council Visioning work sessions, and I have been piloting the proposed changes in the meantime. There have been some changes over time as I tested out the different combinations of divisions and departments. This memo provides a high level overview of the multiple actions that I am proposing which will require Council approval due to their impact on Homer City Code.

As to why I'm bringing an employee organization issue to the Council, it's because a change in code is required to officially create a department. As City Manager I can hire/fire, move employees from one department to another, and create any number of different reporting hierarchies between employees. What I cannot do without Council is officially create a department, and all of our departments (Administration, Finance, Police, Volunteer Fire, Port & Harbor, and Public Works) are defined in Homer City Code. Regarding the creation of any other departments, at this time, I don't believe that any other present division(s) are ripe for elevation to department status. Therefore, I am bringing forward three departmental proposals: IT, Library, and Community Development.



1 - Proposed organizational structure – green denotes new department or proposed future division

Move #1: Creation of a Library Department and an IT Department

In early 2021, I combined the Library and IT Divisions under the leadership of the Library Director. This has been a very successful experiment. Originally I wanted to spin these Divisions out of the Administration Department and keep them together as a new department. That proposal created some controversy and resistance from the Library Advisory Board. In the time since it was introduced, we've had some significant changes in personnel and culture within the IT Division. At this time I am much more comfortable creating standalone departments for each Division. From a management perspective, I'm still going to keep these Departments closely aligned because of the benefits that can be generated when they work with each other.

Move #2: Creation of a Community Development Department

I believe that Homer is poised for significant growth, development, and redevelopment that will have impacts on daily life in Homer, and we need a future-focused department that can take on the challenges this transformative change will have on the community together.

Creating a Community Development Department will bring together planning, economic development, building & code enforcement, and community recreation under one director. This will help focus development in Homer, while also ensuring quality of life programming is integrated into our community's growth. In anticipation of creating a Community Development Department, I created an Economic Development Division and designated an Economic Development Manager in March 2022. That move has been successful and well received by Council, staff, the Economic Development Commission, and external stakeholders. Some elements housed in the Parks Division related to tasks like park & trail planning, beautification, invasive species mitigation, and volunteer coordination have also transferred into Economic Development. We are beginning to lay the groundwork for the creation of a Building & Code Enforcement Division. The special projects team submitted a grant applications to support the adoption and implementation of a building code within the City and it has been selected for further review by FEMA. Community Recreation will benefit from having a dedicated director and additional staff support from the other divisions within Community Development.

Future consideration: Merge the Finance Department into Administration

The integration of Finance into an Administration Department is a common arrangement in cities across the country that have Administrative Services departments. I've been piloting a framework in which Administration and Finance are much more integrated. It has been successful in some ways and faced challenges in others. I want to continue to dial in that concept before I consider bringing an ordinance to Council that would merge the departments.

Fiscal Considerations: The re-organization plan, as proposed, is expected to create very little direct financial impact. The Human Resources Division, with help from the Finance Department, analyzed the changes and expects that we'll see an impact of approximately \$3500 per year between FY24 and FY25. Where the re-organization has more of a financial benefit is in that it makes each department's budget and spending more transparent while also giving the new department heads increased purchasing authority under the procurement manual which streamlines operations.

Staff Recommendation: Introduce/adopt ordinance creating Library, IT, and Community Development Departments.

The Library Advisory Board reviewed and discussed Ordinance 23-49 at their regular meeting on August 15, 2023. They approved a motion expressing support for the creation of a Library Department unanimously.

Excerpt of Approved Minutes for August 15, 2023:

B. Creation of a Library Department

Memorandum LAB 23-011 from Library Director as backup

Chair Finn introduced the item and deferred to Library Director Berry.

Library Director Berry reviewed his memorandum and provided a synopsis of the actions taken at Council level noting there has been no opposition to creating a standalone IT or Library Department. There has been some discussion and questions regarding the Community Development Department. He was asking for a motion of support from the Board to create the Library Department. City Council introduced the ordinance and then postponed until September 25, 2023, there will be a worksession and all the chairs for the advisory bodies will be invited to participate in the discussion.

FAIR/CARSSOW MOVED THE LIBRARY ADVISORY BOARD SUPPORTS THE CREATION OF A STAND ALONE LIBRARY DEPARTMENT FOR THE CITY OF HOMER.

Discussion on the previous sentiment and opposition in the beginning of the Library Director taking on IT and hearing this is great news. Question was posed why the ordinance does not reflect the Library Department when all other departments are titled, such as Department of Information Technology, etc. The Board was informed of the previous historical actions of Council that changed the library from a department.

Boardmember Kuszmaul expressed that she would like it clarified as the Public Library throughout the ordinance since there are a number of different types of Libraries.

Informational Memorandum Library Advisory Board September 20, 2023 CC-23-226

Library Director Berry responded that Public may be easy enough to amend, but does not recommend tinkering with the remaining document since there are so many details. He agreed that there is textual cleanup to remove contraindications required.

Boardmembers noted that while Library Department was not listed under the main listing Public Library was shown and then Library department was under the subheading 2.48.050

Dear City Council and Mayor,

Proposed Ordinance 23-49 states: "The Department of Community Development is created which shall be headed by the Director of Community Development. The Director shall be appointed by the City Manager for an indefinite term and shall be removable by the City Manager. Within this Department will be the City Planner and such other personnel as may be necessary to provide services such as city-wide planning; zoning and platting; etc." This contemplates that the City of Homer would have both a City Planner and a Director of Community Development. One competent individual with the proper qualifications should be able to fulfill the duties of these two positions, especially since the City of Homer does not have planning or platting authority. The City of Homer has been delegated **zoning** powers by the Kenai Peninsula Borough but the city has never requested or been delegated planning powers or platting powers and therefore can only act in an advisory capacity regarding such matters. KPB 21.01.010(B) provides that the Borough Planning Commission shall exercise jurisdiction within the municipal districts, including the City of Homer, regarding planning and platting. KPB 21.01.020(A) states in relevant part as follows: "If a city by resolution of the council requests the assembly to delegate the power to provide zoning, planning, and platting regulation within the city, the assembly shall delegate the power. A city to which the authority is delegated may exercise all powers within the city to the extent that such powers have been granted to the borough by statute, except those powers reserved to the borough by Section 21.01.010." KPB 21.01.020(B) states: "A city that has been delegated any powers pursuant to subsection A of this section shall provide for an appeal from an administrative decision made in the enforcement, administration, or application of a regulation adopted pursuant to the delegated power." At line 70 the proposed ordinance states: "Each department shall be headed by the City Manager until such time as the City Manager shall approve the appointment of a "director" who shall then head the designated department. The director shall be appointed by and be responsible to the City Manager." It makes no sense for the City Manager to approve his own appointments. The City

Council should retain the right to approve the City Manager's appointments of directors. The City Council should also retain the right to terminate those appointments for cause.

The City Manager's proposed re-organization plan and the ordinance implementing it has been repeatedly deferred, seemingly because there have not been enough votes at council to pass it in its current form.

The major sticking point has seemed to be the proposal to combine Parks (currently located in Public Works) and Recreation (currently reporting directly to the City Manager), and to put them in a new Department of Community Development that would also include the Planning Department and future zoning staff.

This proposal has been a concern to many in the community, who desire to see a Department of Parks and Recreation that would more closely reflect the importance our community attaches to this aspect of city governance.

There are some fairly compelling arguments against creating a Department of Parks and Recreation now, including the small size of current staff and budget.

This substitute ordinance would address both concerns by adopting most aspects of the proposed reorganization, with the exception of Parks and Recreation, which would be kept in their current status for the interim (until staff size and budget are sufficient to justify a new department).

Background Information:

At the August 14, 2023 city council meeting, City Manager Dumouchel introduced *Ordinance 23-49* to the City Council that would modify city code to create three new departments: Department of Public Library, Department of Information Technology and a Department of Community Development.

The proposed creation of a Community Development Department would combine the Planning division, the Economic Development division, the Community Recreation division and a soon to be created Code Enforcement Division.

After much written and public testimony relating to the creation of a Community Development Department specifically addressing the concerns of the impacts of combining the Community Recreation division within this proposed new department, the City Council opted to postpone this ordinance until the January 8th City Council meeting to allow for additional review and consideration related to *Resolution 23-047(s)* Establishing Parks and Recreation as a Priority/10 Year Plan.

With the City Manager's approval, Parks, Arts, Recreation and Parks Advisory Commission was requested to review specifically the proposed Community Development Department proposal and provide advisement to the city council regarding this topic.

At the November 16, 2023 Parks, Arts, Recreation and Parks Advisory Commission regular meeting, the Commission unanimously supported creation of the Library and Information Technology departments but for the following reasons does not fully support including Community Recreation within the proposed Community Development department because:

1. The benefits are not clearly defined.

- 2. The organizational chart does not facilitate the elevation of Community Recreation's function, as it would no longer directly report to the City Manager.
- 3. There is no connection to the Planning, Building or Code Enforcement Divisions and limited connection to Economic Development Division under the Community Development Department.
- 4. Support the creation of a Parks and Recreation department to bring forward the importance and value of Community Recreation as expressed by the strong community support.

Recommendation: Amend and Adopt Ordinance creating Library, IT, Community Development Departments (without Community Recreation) and consider creating and passing ordinance to create a Parks and Recreation Department.

It looks like a go for the city to implement a parks and recreation department come the new calendar year 1999.

According to City Manager Val Koeberlein, the City of Homer's 1999 budget includes a full-time parks and recreation position, as well as temporary summer positions.

Koeberlein said that in the past, the city had a parks department under the Public Works Department that was responsible for the beautification of Pioneer Avenue and maintenance at the Hornaday Park and campground.

"We're starting out very small. We're taking one person, and making that into a full-time job. It will still be under the Public Works Department," he said.

Now, with the city's acquisition of the old Homer Intermediate School, and subsequent plans on the school's future use being discussed as a recreation facil-

ity, it seemed a good time for the city to look into In the past, the job was bid out to private collectors. resurrecting the department. "Now that the old Homer school has been deeded over to us, that opened up a facility that could be used as some type of community center, a recreation facility, and we're still trying to determine that," said Koeberlein. "So, along with that, the council has decided that it would be a good time to start a parks and recreation department."

While Koeberlein said that the city is still developing a job description, some duties of the new department will include overseeing both campground facilities in Homer - located above Hornaday Park and on the Homer Spit, and operating the Intermediate School.


"That (campground facilities) would help fund some of this additional personnel for the increased activity and again, the reason for putting one of the part-time persons, full time, was to be able to operate the old Homer school there - the gym for some activities." said Koeberlein.

While the new department is slated to oversee the operations and activities of the Intermediate School, according to Koeberlein it might be only a temporary plan. "That's the initial plan, and that could even change somewhat as we go along," he said.

As for the new department's future home, Koeberlein

said it will be housed at Homer Public Works for now, but could move to a new home at the old Intermediate School in the future. For now, the new department will also be under the public works department until it gets up and going, said Koeberlein.

The new department should have an impact on citizens as it aims to further meet the needs of the community. "It's going to provide another city service to the Homer citizens and surrounding area. Again, I want to emphasize, this is a start," said Koeberlein. "We're trying to minimize the financial impact on the city and as the need - as we generate more revenues -I can see it growing, because it's obvious that there's great demand for that."

I. Issue: The purpose of this Memorandum is to request an additional appropriation in the amount of \$25,000 to complete the final design of the Heath Street Pavement Restoration Project.

II. Background:


Ordinance 22-26 appropriated \$500,000 from the HART Roads Fund to create the Pavement Restoration Program. Shortly thereafter, Resolution 22-073 was adopted, which authorized a Task Order, in the amount of \$140,472, to Kinney Engineering, LLC ("Kinney") to design the Heath Street Pavement Restoration Project, one of the projects in that program. Kinney started work and the design work is now over 95% complete.

We asked Kinney to provide some out-of-scope work to evaluate and design a mid-block crossing at the intersection of Hazel Avenue and Heath Street as well as video camera the existing storm drain. The total cost of this out-of-scope work is \$16,181.25, about 11.5% of the original contract value. The Pavement Restoration Program was closed during the FY24/25 budget process. There is currently no appropriation from which we can pay for this out-of-scope work or provide for any other incidental services, which may be required before to progress the 95% design to a 100% complete Bid Package. Thus, we are seeking an appropriation to cover the \$16,181.25 as well as a small contingency, for a total of \$25,000.

III. RECOMMENDATION: That the City Council appropriate \$25,000 from the HART Road Fund to pay for completion of the design of the Heath Street Pavement Restoration Project.







CURB RAMP CURB & GUTTER, TYPE 5



CURB AND GUTTER TERMINATION TRANSITION



Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons (RRFB)

A marked crosswalk or pedestrian warning sign can improve safety for pedestrians crossing the road, but at times may not be sufficient for drivers to visibly locate crossing locations and yield to pedestrians. To enhance pedestrian conspicuity and increase driver awareness at uncontrolled, marked crosswalks, transportation agencies can install a pedestrian actuated Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon (RRFB) to accompany a pedestrian warning sign. RRFBs consist of two, rectangular-shaped yellow indications, each with a light-emitting diode (LED)-array-based light source. RRFBs flash with an alternating high frequency when activated to enhance conspicuity of pedestrians at the crossing to drivers.

For more information on using RRFBs, see the Interim Approval in the *Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD)*.¹

Applications

The RRFB is applicable to many types of pedestrian crossings but is particularly effective at multilane crossings with speed limits less than 40 miles per hour. Research suggests RRFBs can result in motorist yielding rates as high at 98 percent at marked crosswalks, but varies depending on the location, posted speed limit, pedestrian crossing distance, one- versus two-way road, and the number of travel lanes. RRFBs can also accompany school or trail crossing warning signs.

RRFBs are placed on both sides of a crosswalk below the pedestrian crossing sign and above the diagonal downward arrow plaque pointing at the crossing. The flashing pattern can be activated with pushbuttons or passive (e.g., video or infrared) pedestrian detection, and should be unlit when not activated.

Considerations

Agencies should:2

- Install RRFBs in the median rather than the far-side of the roadway if there is a pedestrian refuge or other type of median.
- Use solar-power panels to eliminate the need for a power source.
- Reserve the use of RRFBs for locations with significant pedestrian safety issues, as over-use of RRFB treatments may diminish their effectiveness.

Agencies shall not:2

- Use RRFBs without the presence of a pedestrian, school or trail crossing warning sign.
- Use RRFBs for crosswalks across approaches controlled by YIELD signs, STOP signs, traffic control signals, or pedestrian hybrid beacons, except for the approach or egress from a roundabout.

Summary Statement:

The City's Fiscal Years 2022 and 2023 Capital Budget, approved by City Council via Ordinance 21-36(S2)(A), appropriated \$100,000 from the Port and Harbor Reserves in support of the Fish Grinding Building Replacement project.

In June of 2022, City administration applied for Dingell-Johnson Sport Fish Restoration Act grant funds from the Alaska Department of Fish and Game to assist with project funding. The award of grant funds was recently approved by the Federal agency managing the awards and we anticipate receiving an obligating award document in January 2024. At that time, staff will prepare an Ordinance for City Council to consider for accepting and appropriating the grant funds.

The City's FY22 Capital budget appropriation will be used to meet the 25% local match requirement. However, the appropriation is set to lapse on June 30, 2024 and needs to be renewed to ensure the funds remain available.

Staff Recommendation:

Adopt Ordinance 23-63 to insure budgeted funds are available as match for Federal grant funds.

I. Issue: The purpose of this Memorandum is to request an appropriation in the amount of \$300,000 from the Water CARMA to rebuild the pressure reducing station in Ben Walters Way.

II. Background:

There is a pressure reducing station in Ben Walters Way, directly under the alignment of the curb/gutter, which will be installed as part of the new sidewalk project. This station is old. It leaks, has outdated plumbing and obsolete electrical works. At first we thought we could abandon this station by demolishing it in place. We proceeded to design the Ben Walters sidewalk with this idea in mind. However, this past summer, we completed work to update Homer's Water Model. This work involved using a computer program to simulate water pressures/flows throughout Homer's water distribution system, augmented by field tests taken at fire hydrants around town. Results from the Water Model demonstrated that the Ben Walters Pressure Reducing Station is an important element of Homer's water distribution resilience; that is, this station allows us to adjust water pressures in multiple branches of the water distribution line, so we can provide continuous water flow to customers in the event an emergency cuts off flow in the immediate proximity. We concluded it is not in the best interests of the public to abandon this pressure reducing station after all.

Once we realized we needed to keep the pressure reducing station at this location, we took a closer look at what was required to bring it to a state of good repair. First, the access port for the station is directly within the alignment of the new sidewalk. As a minimum, we need to relocate the access port so that it doesn't create a conduit for inflow of storm water into the pressure reducing station or create a tripping hazard in the new sidewalk. Next, we need to

repair the plumbing and upgrade the electrical works. We also need to stop ground water from leaking into the station, which will require excavation to expose the concrete vault and applying water proofing. We concluded, with all this work, it would be more cost effective to build a new, above-ground pressure reducing facility, outside the footprint of the road and sidewalk. The estimated cost of doing this is \$300,000. This work needs to be done in conjunction with the sidewalk project, to minimize adverse impact to the water operations and protect the integrity of the new sidewalk. We don't want to have to tear up the new sidewalk to access the old pressure reducing facility.

We are requesting funds from the Water CARMA fund so we can design the rebuild as soon as possible so the work can be done as part of the sidewalk project. Construction of the sidewalk is slated for the summer 2024.

III. RECOMMENDATION: That the City Council appropriate \$300,000 from the Water CARMA fund to pay for design and construction of rebuilding a new Ben Walters Pressure Reducing Station as part of the Ben Walters Sidewalk Project.

The Homer Harbor Expansion General Investigation (GI) was initiated in 2023 and later that year the US Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) communicated to the City that the initial cost for the GI had increased to \$4,154,093 resulting in a need for the City to appropriate an additional \$288,524. Council, the Port and Harbor Commission, and staff have worked together to identify a path forward for funding, and in November 2023 the Council unanimously approved Resolution 21-130 which stated intent to appropriate the City's match for the increased cost of the GI.

The GI was originally priced at \$3 million, however, the USACE decided that we would need to add geotechnical analysis and a ship simulation at a cost of \$1,154,093 to complete a comprehensive report that would lead to a reasonably accurate cost estimate. The City split the cost of the original \$3 million three ways: \$750,000 City of Homer, \$750,000 State of Alaska, \$1.5 million USACE. For the new cost, we are proposing a split of similar proportions which results in a need for \$288,524 from the Port and Harbor Match Reserves. The City will lobby the State for a matching amount from the State Legislature, and USACE intends to cover the remaining funds through future federal budgets.


Study Budget




Spent to Date by Study Budget Category

Summary Statement:

The State of Alaska Department of Transportation and Public Facilities (DOT-PF) is preparing to begin construction this spring (2024) on a major rehabilitation of the Sterling Highway from Anchor Point to Baycrest (MP 157-169).

The highway rehabilitation will include "new roadway pavement, additional shoulder width and the addition of passing/climbing lanes, replacement of bridges and culverts and stabilization of stream banks."

In a series of meetings with the Homer Trails Alliance (HTA) and Homer city staff, DOT-PF personnel have expressed willingness to consider including as part of the project a pedestrian underpass at the Diamond Creek culvert that would provide a connection between existing trail systems: the city's Diamond Creek Recreation Area and Rogers Loop Trailhead on the east side of the Sterling Highway, and the Diamond Creek State Recreation Site trail system ("Diamond Gulch") on the west side of the highway.

However, DOT-PF regulations preclude the department from expending funds on a trail underpass absent a commitment by municipal or other authorities to extend existing trails up to the proposed underpass.

In meetings with DOT-PF, city staff have indicated general support by the city for eventually connecting existing trails to a future pedestrian underpass, but they have been unable to point to any specific plans or funding for such work.

The Homer Trails Alliance has up to 60 volunteers, many highly experienced, who are willing to do much of the trail-building work that would be required – but before beginning any work (in coordination with city staff, of course) a detailed, professional design is required.

This ordinance aims to address DOT-PF concerns about the city's lack of a formal commitment to providing the connecting infrastructure for an underpass. By appropriating this relatively modest amount now for engineering services for a Preliminary Design, the city will be demonstrating in a tangible way its commitment to proceed with the work.

If this tangible commitment does secure agreement from DOT-PF to proceed with the underpass, the funds can then be expended on the design -- and once the design is completed and approved, HTA volunteers, in close coordination with City Staff, will be able to begin work on connecting trails.

Because DOT-PF will begin work on this project in a matter of months, time is of the essence.

Recommendation:

Introduce the ordinance today, so that a public hearing can be held in two weeks. Request that PARCAC review expeditiously, ideally at its next meeting in January, prior to expenditure of funds, to confirm whether HART Funds are available for the full amount, given other needs in the areas of trail construction and maintenance.




- 1. West Homer HTA Map

SUBJECT: City Manager's Report for January 8, 2024 Council Meeting

AMMA/AML Conference

In December I attended the Alaska Municipal Management Association (AMMA) and Alaska Municipal League (AML) conferences in Anchorage.

As president of the AMMA, I was responsible for a large part of the conference's coordination and I also delivered two presentations to the group. I gave an interdisciplinary presentation on public engagement and conflict concepts/frameworks from fields such as political science, energy development, and fisheries management. I also co-hosted a session on generative artificial intelligence for local government with the Deputy City Manager of Juneau. I was re-elected president of the association and will continue my leadership role with the organization in 2024.

When the AML conference got underway, I was joined by the Mayor and Councilmembers Aderhold, Davis, Erickson, and Hansen. During the AML conference I attended sessions on topics such as asset management, social determinants of health, TIFIA funding, and cybersecurity. I also attended a meeting of the Alaska Remote Sellers Sales Tax Commission, the Alaska Municipal League Investment Pool (AMLIP) annual meeting, the AML annual business meeting, and I participated in an Alaska Municipal League Joint Insurance Association (AMLJIA) board meeting as a board trustee. I also made time for a meeting with the owner of a mariculture business that operates seasonally in Homer to discuss their operation and the mariculture scene in Alaska at large.

Audit Update

Finance staff had a discussion with our auditors at BDO laying out the tentative plan for wrapping up the audit. Final review is scheduled for the week of the 8th and the week after we should be able to publish and bring the audit to completion at the second meeting in January.

Meetings with State Legislators

Councilmembers Hansen and Lord, along with me, Port Director Bryan Hawkins, and Special Projects Coordinator Jenny Carroll met with Representative Sarah Vance and Senator Gary Stevens to provide updates on the Homer Harbor Expansion general investigation. Both indicated continued support for the general investigation and are looking forward to meeting with the City in Juneau in February.

Comprehensive Plan Kick Off

In late December, City staff from planning, economic development, and engineering met with Agnew::Beck's comprehensive plan project team for a kick off meeting. We had a discussion about the project timeline, Council goals and interests, ideas for public engagement and outreach, etc. We will be meeting with them weekly for operational discussions to keep the project moving towards timely completion. The intent is to plan for a significant number of interactions with elected and appointed officials while also using staff from all over the organization to assist with outreach and data collection efforts.

Fireworks Support

City staff have collaborated closely with organizers of the New Year's Eve fireworks at Mariner Park. As the event has become more popular, coordinating efforts between Police, Fire/EMS, Public Works and the Port & Harbor has become increasingly important to a safe and enjoyable event. This year's fireworks went well from the City perspective and we look forward to continuing to work with the organizers for the continued improvement of future events.

Homer High Government Class Visits City Hall

The Homer High School Government Class visited City Hall on Tuesday, December 12th for a guided tour, followed by a Q&A session in the Council Chambers with Mayor Castner and Council Members Aderhold, Lord, Venuti, and Erickson. The students had an hour to explore the inner workings of local government, gaining insights into the daily operations of City Hall. The Q&A session aimed to provide a firsthand understanding of the roles and responsibilities of local leaders, allowing students to ask questions and engage in meaningful discussions. The goal of this experience was designed to bridge the gap between classroom learning and practical civic engagement. Mayor Ken Castner emphasized, "Homer High grads are disbursed throughout the City. You need to participate, and that begins with talking and communication." The teens were encouraged to care about the community and be aware of what is being discussed, as they are the future of Homer.

- Homer Small Boat Harbor Vessel Economic Survey being routed through the USACE for approval.
- Preparing permit applications to be ready to proceed with geotechnical investigations; discussed
 advantages of completing the geotechnical survey portion of the investigations in February 2024 so
 data can be used to inform the geotechnical core sampling plan and be ready to move forward when
 study activities resume in full.
- Developing plan for the ship simulation component of the study.

HDR - Owner Representative:

- Nearing completion of the Coastal Numerical Modeling (waves, tides/storm surge, sediment transport)
 of existing (baseline) conditions Report for USACE PDT review; completing the modeling will allow
 progress on the designs once the study fully starts up again and geotechnical data is gathered.
- Preparing HHE Quarterly Report to present to City Council at a January 22, 2024 in which HDR will
 provide an overview of the Coastal Numerical Modeling report they are completing.
- Assisting City staff to implement Communications Plan and to maintain and update HHE website.

City of Homer staff:

- Attended monthly USACE Project Development Team meeting and weekly meeting with HDR.
- Distributed Homer City Council Resolution 23-130 to Governor Dunleavy's office, Jill Schaefer (Governor Dunleavy's Kenai Peninsula liaison), Representative Vance and Senator Stevens.
- Reported to Council that additional HHE match funding was not included in Governor Dunleavy's proposed FY25 budget.

- While being hosted in Juneau by the Marine Exchange of Alaska for their Board Meeting, Port Director Hawkins took the opportunity to meet with:
 - Shareen Crosby, Crosby, the Infrastructure Investment Coordinator for the Office of the Governor to brief her on the HHE study and share Resolution 23-130.
 - Coast Guard Commander Torba to discuss the USCG's interests and input in the Homer Harbor Expansion study and the proposal for a USCG Small Boat Station in Homer. More information about this meeting will be included in the January 8, 2024 City Manager's Report.
- Prepared informational materials for Council Champions in support of developing an Ordinance appropriating additional City match funds (for introduction at the January 8 City Council meeting) and for Resolution of Support requests to the Kenai Peninsula Borough Assembly and the State of Alaska.
- At the request of Council Champions arranged meetings with Representative Vance (12/18) and Senator Stevens (12/20) to discuss status of the HHE study and City's request for additional State match funding in the FY25 State budget.
- Met with Council Champions to review HHE Communications Plan and to develop materials to communicate financial progress of the study.
- Met with J&H Consultants to begin planning for advocacy in Juneau during AML's 2024 Winter Legislative Conference, February 20-22, 2024.
- Ongoing Communications/outreach: Information and updates about the study are being disseminated through the Harbor Expansion website, the City's monthly newsletter and the City of Homer Facebook and Instagram pages.
