After reviewing your renewal documents, AMCO staff has deemed the application complete for the purposes of 3 AAC 306.035(c).

Your application will now be sent electronically, in its entirety, to your local government, your community council (if your proposed premises is in Anchorage or certain locations in the Mat-Su Borough), and to any non-profit agencies who have requested notification of applications. The local government has 60 days to protest your application per 3 AAC 306.060.

At the May 15, 2017 Marijuana Control Board meeting, the board delegated to AMCO Director the authority to approve renewal applications. However, the board is required to consider this application independently if you have been issued any notices of violation for this license, if your local government protests this application, or if a public objection to this application is received within 30 days of this notice under 3 AAC 306.065.

If AMCO staff determines that your application requires independent board consideration for any reason, you will be sent an email notification regarding your mandatory board appearance. Upon final approval, your 2025/2026 license will be provided to you during your annual inspection. If our office determines that an inspection is not necessary, the license will be mailed to you at the mailing address on file for your establishment.

Dear Local Government:

AMCO has received a complete renewal application and/or endorsement renewal application for a marijuana establishment within your jurisdiction. This notice is required under 3 AAC 306.035(c)(2). Application documents will be sent to you separately via ZendTo.

To protest the approval of this application pursuant to 3 AAC 306.060, you must furnish the director **and** the applicant with a clear and concise written statement of reasons for the protest within <u>60 days of the date of this notice</u>, and provide AMCO proof of service of the protest upon the applicant.

3 AAC 306.060 states that the board will uphold a local government protest and deny an application for a marijuana establishment license unless the board finds that a protest by a local government is arbitrary, capricious, and unreasonable. If the protest is a "conditional protest" as defined in 3 AAC 306.060(d)(2) and the application otherwise meets all the criteria set forth by the regulations, the Marijuana Control Board may approve the license renewal, but require the applicant to show to the board's satisfaction that the requirements of the local government have been met before the director issues the license.

At the May 15, 2017, Marijuana Control Board meeting, the board delegated to AMCO Director the authority to approve renewal applications with no protests, objections, or notices of violation. However, if a timely protest or objection is filed for this application, or if any notices of violation have been issued for this license, the board will consider the application. In those situations, a temporary license will be issued pending board consideration.







STAFF REPORT

Specific Request / Purpose as stated in the petition:

The petition proposes to vacate the section line easement as depicted in submittal documents. The southerly portion of the easement and underlying property is located within Homer City limits, while the northerly portion is within the Kenai Peninsula Borough.

Vacate the section line easement as depicted in the submittal documents. The section line easement effectively splits the subject parcel into two halves. The easement vacation will allow for the unification of the property while maintain public legal access across the lot.

<u>Notification:</u> The public hearing notice was published in the October 3rd issue of the Peninsula Clarion and the October 2nd issue of the Homer News as part of the Commission's tentative agenda.

The public notice was posted on the Planning Commission bulletin board at the Kenai Peninsula Borough George A. Navarre Administration building. Additional notices were mailed to the following with the request to be posted for public viewing.

Library of Homer Post Office of Homer

Eighteen certified mailings were sent to owners of property within 300 feet of the proposed vacation. Five receipts had been returned when the staff report was prepared.

Twelve notifications were emailed to agencies and interested parties as shown below;

Legal Access (existing and proposed):

The location of the section line easements is located on Lot 2, Arno Subdivision (Plat HM 2001-78). The Northern section of the parcel is outside city limits and the south portion is within the City of Homer. For assessment tax purposes, the borough assigned two parcel numbers to Lot 2.

Legal access to the property is provided by Diamond Ridge Road and the section line easements by code. Diamond Ridge Road is a 100-foot state-maintained dedication abutting Lot 2 to the north.

33-foot section line easements are located on the north and south sides of the section line between Sections 12 and 13, Township 6 South, Range 14 West. These easements are proposed to be vacated and are labeled and depicted on the exhibit being a total width of 66-feet. The portion of the section line easement petitioned to be vacated is undeveloped. There is a structure located to the south of the section line easement on the property. Staff recommends the structures be accurately shown on the drawing.

A 20-foot-wide pedestrian access easement is proposed to be granted with the finalization of the section line easement vacation plat. The easement is located along the northern boundary, adjacent to Diamond Ridge Road and extends along the east and west lot boundaries to the section line easement location. The easement is depicted and labeled on the preliminary plat.

Block length is not compliant with no roads coming back to a connection to complete a block. The vacation of the section line easement has no effect on the block length compliancy.

SOA DOT comments	DNR & DOT have joint authority over section line easements. A section line easement, once established, can only be vacated by the proper authority. A section line easement vacation will not be valid without DNR & DOT approval on the plat. Please go through the DNR Easement Vacation process to pursue a section line easement vacation.

Site Investigation:

There appears to be a shared driveway from Diamond Ridge Road that provides access to the affected lot and property to the east. Structures are located on the southern portion of the property, near the section line easement but do not appear to be encroaching. The driveway within lot two crosses the affected section line easement. No other improvements appear to be situated within the section line easement to be vacated.

Per KPB GIS Imagery KWF Wetlands layer, wetlands classified as riverine is located on the northern boundary of the lot. No wetlands are within the section line easement petitioned to be vacated.

Diamond Ridge Creek is located within the adjacent parcel to the south and crosses the section line easement to the east approximately 0.32 miles and to the west approximately 1.23 miles. The creek does not intersect with the portion of the section line easement to be vacated.

According to the KPB GIS Imagery topography layer, steep topography affects the subject parcel. Slopes exceeding 20% are located within the section line easement proposed to be vacated.

The River Center review determined the lot is in a FEMA Flood Hazard Zone but no depiction and no note is necessary for the Section line Easement Vacation drawing. if this does come back as a plat the River Center would like to review the plat again. City of Homer noted the south portion is in Zone D, flood hazards undetermined.

The proposed plat is not located within an Anadromous Waters Habitat Protection District according to the River

Center review.

Staff Analysis:

Originally the land consisted of the SE1/4 of the SE1/4, of Section 12 and the NE1/4 of the NE1/4 of Section 13, all located within Township 6 South, Range 14 West, Seward Meridian. The land was divided by deed, Book 271, Page 580 in 1997. A corrective deed was recorded in 1998 correcting the legal description. In 2001, Arno Subdivision subdivided the land into Lots 1 and 2.

According to information provided by the Kachemak Nordic Ski Club website, a portion of the Lower Baycrest trail is located to the west approximately 0.54 miles to the west along the common section line 12 and 13. At this time, access to the trail is by Roger's Loop Road. The trail system does not connect to the portion of the section line easements petitioned to be vacated.

The neighboring parcels are all privately owned and currently have legal access by existing roads. A couple of the adjacent parcels contain enough area to be subdivided in the future; however, the locations of Diamond Ridge Road and Diamond Creek would need to be considered in the design.

A 10-foot utility easement including 20-feet within 5-feet of the side lot lines was granted by the parent plat, Arno Subdivision (HM 2001-78) adjacent to Diamond Ridge Road. **Staff recommends** the surveyor depict and label the easement. Relocate the proposed pedestrian easement south of the existing utility easement.

According to the sketch and non-objection comments by Utility Agencies, no utilities exist within the affected section line easement.

The Homer Advisory Planning Commission heard the vacation request during the August 20, 2025 meeting and granted approval by unanimous consent. The City of Homer staff report states that city water and sewer are not available at this time and public works has no objections.

A plat finalizing the section line easement shall follow if the vacation is approved by the Planning Commission. **Staff recommends** the surveyor confirm with the city and KPB Platting Department, what requirements are needed on the final plat for the proposed pedestrian easement.

20.65.020. - Planning commission recommendation on state easements.

The planning commission serving as the platting authority has no authority to vacate public easements under the jurisdiction of the state. The planning commission will provide a recommendation on proposed vacations of state-managed easements within the borough. Applications to vacate a section line easement or other state-managed easement must comply with KPB <u>20.65.040</u> and will be considered in accordance with KPB <u>20.65.050</u>. The applicant is responsible for all submittals required by the state. Final authority for approval and platting of the vacation of any public easement under the jurisdiction of the state rests with the state.

20.65.050 - Action on vacation application

- D. The planning commission shall consider the merits of each vacation request and in all cases the planning commission shall deem the area being vacated to be of value to the public. It shall be incumbent upon the applicant to show that the area proposed for vacation is no longer practical for the uses or purposes authorized, or that other provisions have been made which are more beneficial to the public. In evaluating the merits of the proposed vacation, the planning commission shall consider whether:
 - 1. The right-of-way or public easement to be vacated is being used;

Surveyor comments: The section line easement affecting Sections 12 & 13 (T. 6 S., R. 14 W.) is entirely undeveloped.

Staff comments: The portion of the section line easement petitioned to be vacated is undeveloped. The driveway within lot two crosses the affected section line easement.

2. A road is impossible or impractical to construct, and alternative access has been provided; **Surveyor comments:** This petition proposes to maintain legal public access by granting a 20' wide public pedestrian access easement adjacent to the exterior boundary of the property, while maintaining connectivity with the section line easement on either side of the subject parcel.

Staff comments: No wetlands are within the section line easement petitioned to be vacated. Slopes exceeding 20% are located within the section line easement proposed to be vacated. Relocate the proposed pedestrian easement south of the existing utility easement.

The surrounding area is fully developed and all planned or needed rights-of-way and utilities are constructed:

Surveyor comments: Diamond Ridge right-of-way is fully constructed and provides access through Section 12. Westwood Avenue is fully constructed and provides access to the east. There are no existing utilities within the easement area to be vacated.

Staff comments: The neighboring parcels are all privately owned and currently have legal access by existing roads. A couple of the adjacent parcels contain enough area to be subdivided in the future; however, the locations of Diamond Ridge Road and Diamond Creek would need to be considered in the design. According to the sketch and non-objection comments by Utility Agencies, no utilities exist within the affected section line easement. The City of Homer staff report states that city water and sewer are not available at this time and public works has no objections.

4. The vacation of a public right-of-way provides access to a lake, river, or other area with public interest or value, and if so, whether equal or superior access is provided;

Surveyor comments: The Roger's Loop trail system is located approximately 1.25 miles to the west of the subject property.

Staff comments: A portion of the Lower Baycrest trail is located to the west approximately 0.54 miles to the west along the common section line 12 and 13. At this time, access to the trail is by Roger's Loop Road. The trail system does not connect to the portion of the section line easements petitioned to be vacated. Diamond Ridge Creek is located within the adjacent parcel to the south and crosses the section line easement to the east approximately 0.32 miles and to the west approximately 1.23 miles. The creek does not intersect with the portion of the section line easement to be vacated.

The proposed vacation would limit opportunities for interconnectivity with adjacent parcels, whether developed or undeveloped;

Surveyor comments: This petition proposes to maintain legal public access by granting a 20' wide public pedestrian access easement adjacent to the exterior boundary of the property, while maintaining connectivity with the section line easement on either side of the subject parcel.

Staff comments: A couple of the adjacent parcels contain enough area to be subdivided in the future; however, the locations of Diamond Ridge Road and Diamond Creek would need to be considered in the design.

6. Other public access, other than general road use, exist or are feasible for the right-of-way; Surveyor comments: This petition proposed to maintain legal public access by granting a 20' wide public pedestrian access easement adjacent to the exterior boundary of the property, while maintaining connectivity with the section line easement on either side of the subject parcel.

Surveyor comments: The section line easement affecting Sections 12 & 13 (T. 6 S., R. 14 W.) is entirely undeveloped. There are no existing utilities within the easement area to be vacated.

Staff comments: According to the sketch and non-objection comments by Utility Agencies, no utilities exist within the affected section line easement. The City of Homer staff report states that city water and sewer are not available at this time and public works has no objections.

8. Any other factors that are relevant to the vacation application or the area proposed to be vacated. **Surveyor comments:** The section line easement effectively splits the subject parcel into two halves.

The easement vacation will allow for the unification of the property while maintaining public access across the lot.

Staff comments:

A KPB Planning Commission decision denying a vacation application is final. A KPB Planning Commission decision to approve the vacation application is subject to consent or veto by the KPB Assembly, or City Council if located within City boundaries. The KPB Assembly, or City Council must hear the vacation within thirty days of the Planning Commission decision.

The Assembly will hear the vacation of the northern portion of the section line easement at their scheduled October 28, 2025 meeting

The City Council will hear the vacation of the southern portion of the section line easement at their scheduled October 27th, 2025 meeting.

Only the area approved for vacation by the assembly or council may be included on the plat. The final plat must be recorded within one year of the vacation consent.

No reapplication or petition concerning the same vacation may be filed within one calendar year of the date of the final denial action except in the case where new evidence or circumstances exist that were not available or present when the original petition was filed.
- K. An appeal of the planning commission, city council or assembly vacation action under this chapter must be filed in the superior court in accordance with the Alaska Rules of Appellate Procedure.

Analysis: The petition proposes to vacate the section line easement as depicted on the submitted vacation petition diagrams. The petition proposes to maintain legal public access by granting a 20' wide public pedestrian access easement along the northern lot line, adjacent to Diamond Ridge Road, See attached plat. This lot is one legal lot split by City of Homer boundary. For Borough tax assessment purposes, the borough indicates two lots; one in and one out of Homer City Limits.

The section line easement affecting 12 & 13 (T. 6 S., R. 14 W.) is entirely undeveloped. Diamond Ridge Road right-of-way is fully constructed and provides access through Section 12. Westwood Avenue is fully constructed and provides access to the east. The lands to the east have been subdivided and have constructed, maintained access. There are no existing utilities within the easement area to be vacated.

KPB Code

20.65.050(D)(1-8) - Vacations

The (Kenai Peninsula Borough) planning commission shall consider the merits of each vacation request. A platted dedication to public use of land or interest in land may be vacated if the dedication is no longer necessary for present or future public use and in all cases the planning commission shall deem the area being vacated to be of value to the public. In evaluating the merits of the proposed vacation, the planning commission shall consider whether:

1. The right-of-way or public easement to be vacated is being used;

5. The proposed vacation would limit opportunities for interconnectivity with adjacent parcels, whether developed or undeveloped;

Staff Response: The proposed vacation would not limit opportunities for interconnectivity with adjacent parcels.

6. Other public access, other than general road use, exist or are feasible for the right-of-way;

Staff Response: The subdivider has granted a 20' wide public pedestrian access easement.

7. All existing and future utility requirements are met. Rights-of-way which are utilized by a utility, or which logically would be required by a utility, shall not be vacated, unless it can be demonstrated that equal or superior access is or will be available. Where an easement would satisfactorily serve the utility interests, and no other public need for the right-of-way exists, the commission may approve the vacation and require that a utility easement be granted in place of the right-of-way.

Staff Response: Public Works has no objection.

8. Any other factors that are relevant to the vacation application or the area proposed to be vacated.

Staff Response: The subdivider has granted a 20' wide public pedestrian access easement.

Public Works Comments: Public works has no objection to the vacation of the section line easement.





The Alaska Municipal League (AML) 75th Annual Local Government Conference is scheduled in Anchorage, Alaska, December 8-12, 2025, in Anchorage, Alaska.

The AML is a voluntary, nonprofit, nonpartisan, statewide organization of 140 cities, boroughs, and unified municipalities, representing over 97 percent of Alaska's residents. Originally organized in 1950, the League of Alaska Cities became the Alaska Municipal League in 1962 when boroughs joined the League.

Meetings include Newly Elected Officials (NEO), Alaska Conference of Mayors, board committees and meeting with Legislators.

Cost estimates for travel include round trip airfare from Homer to Anchorage at \$375 per person or mileage at \$0.70 per mile, and room rates at \$169-\$189 plus tax per night. Per diem is \$58 per day, for three meals. Conference registration for NEO only is virtual at no cost or \$225 in person. Conference registration is \$350, and Alaska Conference of Mayors is \$150.

Background

During the design process for the current Homer Public Library building, the architects envisioned installing a security grille between the meeting room and the main floor, allowing the meeting room to be used outside of library hours.

City Council previously appropriated \$30,000 for work on such a grille, and staff applied for grant funding to provide the remaining balance needed to complete the job. It gives me great pleasure to report that the Rasmuson Foundation has generously offered a grant of \$19,000, sufficient to fully fund the project according to the cost estimates produced in February 2025. Any cost overruns would have to come from another source.

I recommend accepting the Rasmuson grant. There is no required match.

We recently received notice from the Pacific States Marine Fisheries Commission that the City of Homer is eligible to receive a portion of the 2020 Gulf of Alaska (GOA) Pacific Cod Federal Fishery declared disaster relief funding. The distribution is part of the spending plan authored by the Alaska Department of Fish and Game to provide relief in the form of direct payments to municipalities and boroughs that rely on fishery income that makes up a significant share of local budgets supporting education, public works, and port operations.

Typically, revenue from fish landings is generated under the state's Fishery Business Tax, where a 3% tax is applied to shore-based landings, with the revenue shared 50/50 between the state and the municipalities/boroughs where the landings occur. In areas with both a municipality and borough, the revenue is split equally between the two entities.

To be eligible for the disaster relief funding, the City had to show GOA Pacific Cod landings in 2020 or in three of five years from 2015–2019, have GOA Pacific Cod landings exceeding 10,000 pounds in at least three of six years from 2015–2020, and have 2020 GOA Pacific Cod landings below their 2015–2019 average.

The City's allotment, a one-time payment in the amount of \$13,137.38 is a pro-rated percentage of the disaster funding based on each affected community's share of total losses among all eligible communities. There are no stipulations on how the funds are used; communities can use disaster funds however they would have otherwise used collected raw fish taxes.

Recommendation: Accept and appropriate the 2020 Gulf of Alaska Pacific Cod Federal Fishery disaster relief funds and authorize the City Manager to execute the appropriate documents.

ADF&G recommended direct payments totaling \$709,000 to municipalities and boroughs that depend on revenues from GOA Pacific Cod landings and related activities. These entities were affected by the disaster because fishery income makes up a significant share of local budgets supporting education, public works, and port operations. The state's 3% Fishery Business tax on shore-based landings is split equally between the state and the municipalities or boroughs where landings occur; if both applied, revenues are divided 50/50 between them.

To qualify, communities had to:

- 1. Show GOA Pacific Cod landings in 2020 or in three of five years from 2015–2019.
- 2. Have GOA Pacific Cod landings exceeding 10,000 pounds in at least three of six years from 2015–2020.
- 3. Have 2020 GOA Pacific Cod landings below their 2015–2019 average.

Funds were distributed proportionally to each community's share of total losses. If represented by both a municipality and a borough, funds were split evenly. Eligible landings occurred in:

- Kodiak and Kodiak Island Borough
- City of Whittier
- City of Seward, City of Homer, and Kenai Peninsula Borough
- City of Cordova
- City of Unalaska/Dutch Harbor
- City and Borough of Juneau
- City of Sand Point, City of Akutan, City of King Cove, and Aleutians East Borough

I. Issue:

The purpose of this Memorandum is to request approval to award the design contract for the A-Frame Transmission Line Replacement Project to RESPEC Company, LLC.

II. Background:

This project is to replace the 60-year-old, cast iron trunk line carrying water from the treatment plant to the west side of Homer. The line runs from the water treatment plant down the steep hill behind the hospital to feed into the water mains on Mountain View and Island View. The Public Works Department is concerned that the ground, which is on a 50 – 65% slope, will move, from earthquake or slope slumping, causing the aging pipe to fail.

The City submitted a questionnaire to receive a loan from the ADEC's State Revolving fund. The State Revolving Fund doesn't technically issue grants, but they can issue loans and then forgive a portion of the loan, which they call principal forgiveness. The loan for the A-Frame Transmission Line Replacement Project is for \$1,331,882 and was awarded principal forgiveness equal to the full value of the loan.

III. Proposals Received:

In accordance with the procurement policy manual, the City advertised a request for proposals in the Homer News on August 21 and 28, 2025 and in the Anchorage Daily News on August 24, 2025. Proposals were opened at 3:00 PM on September 24, 2025, and three proposals were received. These proposals were scored by a team of three evaluators according to criteria

established in the RFP documents. Below is a table showing the proposals received along with their respective scores and prices.

HDR scored the most points. However, the procurement policy manual gives the City the authority to reject any bids or proposals that exceed the engineer's estimate by more than 15%. The Public Works Department created an engineer's estimate that valued the combined cost of design and construction at \$1,331,882. HDR's proposal for \$733,605 and the line item for design in the engineer's estimate is \$250,000. HDR's price exceeded the engineer's estimate by over 300%. Therefore, based off the Procurement Policy 2.7b, which states that "Bids that exceed the Engineer Estimate by more than 15% may be rejected", the Public Works Department has recommended rejecting their proposal and awarding the contract to RESPEC, who had the next highest score.

IV. Recommendation

The Public Works Department recommends that the City Council of Homer Alaska award a contract for the design of the A-Frame Transmission Line Replacement Project to RESPEC Company, LLC of Anchorage Alaska in the amount of \$190,289.

I. Issue:

The purpose of this Memorandum is to request approval to award the construction contract for the Raw Water Transmission Line Replacement Project to Southcentral Construction, Inc.

II. Background:

The Raw Water Transmission Line is a very old cast iron pipe that conveys water from the Raw Water Pumphouse on the shore of Bridge Creek Reservoir to the Drinking Water Treatment Plant. This pipe has had numerous cracks/failures in recent years due to the age and condition of the pipe. A catalyst of this project is being proactive, because if the City experienced a serious earthquake, a major failure is possible that could leave the entire City without water for a prolonged duration. The City Council adopted Ordinance 20-56, which appropriated \$215,000 which was later increased to \$247,585 by Ordinance 21-18 for the design of a new raw water transmission line.

The City received a grant from the Alaska Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Management through the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program which was accepted by Ordinance 23-58. The grant originally awarded was \$2,109,033 but was increased to \$2,229,333 to include the installation of new fiber optic cable running parallel to the water main.

III. Bids Received:

In accordance with the procurement policy manual, the City advertised an invitation to bid in the Homer News on August 7 and 14, 2025 and in the Anchorage Daily News on August 10, 2025.

Bids were opened at 2:00 PM on September 19, 2025, and six bids were received as listed in the table below. As indicated in the table below, Southcentral Construction, Inc was the lowest responsive bidder.

Issue:

The purpose of this Memorandum is to recommend award of Term Contracts for Engineering/Architectural/Survey Services.

Background:

The City practice for engaging engineering, architectural, and survey services has been to use a Term Contract procurement methodology. Under this methodology, Term Contracts have been issued to multiple firms who submitted proposals in response to a publicly advertised Request for Proposal (RFP). The proposals were evaluated, and Term Contracts were issued to firms deemed qualified to perform engineering services for specific Categories of Service. Task Orders with project specific scopes, schedules, and budgets were later negotiated and issued to cover work related to specific projects. The Term Contract RFP in 2017 awarded Term Contracts to 12 firms for engineering services over the 5-year term. In 2022, term contracts were awarded to all 16 proposers and over the term was expanded to 26 firms under term contracts.

The 2025 RFP for Term Contracts took a more conventional approach and returned to the limited number of Term Contracts being issued under specific engineering, architectural, and survey disciplines. The intention was to limit the number to less than 5 firms from each engineering discipline. Additionally, the City is preserving the right to issue individual RFPs for more complicated projects in the best interest of the City; and sidestep the Term Contracts in order to secure the most qualified and cost-effective engineering services.

Recommendations:

The City has received the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation (ADEC) Clean Water Revolving Loan Agreements for the Water Master Plan and Wastewater Master Plan. Each loan is in the not to exceed amount of \$75,000, provided with \$75,000 principal forgiveness. Each loan has a 0.5 percent loan fee that will be deducted from each disbursement.

Homer's existing Water and Wastewater Master Plans were developed in 2006, with a planning horizon of 20 years.

A Request for Proposals (RFP) has been advertised for Professional Engineer Services for 2025 Water & Wastewater Plan. The 2025 Water & Wastewater Plan is an engineering document that will benefit the City's systems. The scope of work includes The project consists of:

Furnishing all labor, materials, equipment, tools, supervision, and other facilities necessary to prepare a master plan. This effort will include

- Creating a computer model of the existing water and wastewater system,
- Identifying how service can be most effectively extended into areas not currently served,
- Determining what improvements to the existing system will be needed to support expansion,
- Defining the cost and suggesting a schedule for necessary future capital improvements, and
- Incorporating water and sewer data into the City's GIS information system.
- Evaluating water treatment plant, fire flow transmission, distribution, and storage capacities.
- Evaluating wastewater treatment plant, piped collection system and pump station capacities.
- Computer modeling prepared as part of this plan will allow the City to understand (before development occurs) what impact it will have on the existing wastewater and water system.

1.03 Loan Amount

Article 2. General Terms and Conditions

The Borrower shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, requirements, and ordinances for the planning, design, construction, implementation, and administration of the Project and this Agreement, including but not limited to those identified in the General Terms and Conditions and Attachments.

2.01 Accounting Practices

The Borrower shall separately account for all monies received from the Alaska Drinking Water Fund and shall maintain project accounts in accordance with generally accepted governmental accounting principles. The Department shall have the right to audit Borrower's records related to the Project.

2.02 Timely Use of Funds

- a. Concurrent with the execution and delivery of this Agreement, or as soon thereafter as practicable, the Borrower shall take all steps necessary to complete the Project in a timely manner in accordance with all applicable loan conditions.
- b. The Department will, in its discretion, revoke this Agreement if the Borrower has not initiated (e.g., solicited a design or construction contractor for the project, applied for notice to proceed for construction projects, incurred eligible expenses, etc.) the Project within one year after signing the Agreement.

2.03 Disbursement of Funds

Subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, the eligible project costs less other funding sources will be disbursed by the Department upon receipt and approval of Disbursement Requests and Quarterly Project Status Reports.

The Borrower shall submit Disbursement Requests and Quarterly Project Status Reports to the Department via the Division of Water's Online Application System (OASys). OASys may be accessed at the following link: https://dec.alaska.gov/water/oasys.

- a. Disbursement Requests and Quarterly Project Status Reports must be submitted to the Department within 30 days following the end of each calendar quarter.
- Should the Borrower fail to submit the Quarterly Project Status Reports as required, the
 Department will not process subsequent Disbursement Requests until a Quarterly
 Project Status Report is received.
- c. Departmental approvals required by this Agreement will not be unreasonably withheld.

- d. The Department will disburse funds only as necessary to complete the Project. Any funds remaining after completion of the Project will remain in the Alaska Drinking Water Fund.
- e. Borrower shall provide the Department with written evidence of materials and labor furnished to and performed upon the Project and such receipts of the payment of the same, releases, satisfactions and other signed statements and forms as the Department may reasonably require.
- f. The Department may at any time review and audit requests for disbursement and make adjustments for, among other things, ineligible expenditures, mathematical errors, items not built or bought, unacceptable work and other discrepancies.

2.04 Principal Forgiveness

As part of this Agreement, the Department has offered the Borrower \$75,000 of subsidy, in the form of principal forgiveness.

- a. Subsidy will be applied to each disbursement at 100% until all available subsidy has been applied.
- b. If no disbursement request is made within one year, the Department may take action to rescind the subsidy offer.

2.05 Loan Fee

a. The Department will charge a fixed fee of one-half of one percent (0.5%) of the total amount of financial assistance disbursed. This fee shall be deducted from each disbursement at the time of payment.

2.06 Notification

Any disbursement or repayment made by the Department or Borrower under this Agreement shall be delivered by electronic transfer or by registered or certified mail.

2.07 Compliance with Laws, Regulations, Etc.

The Borrower shall comply with, and require its contractors and subcontractors to comply with, all applicable federal and state laws, rules, guidelines, regulations, and requirements to include, but not limited to, the following:

- a. The "List of Federal Laws and Authorities (Federal 'Cross-Cutting' Authorities)" as identified in Exhibit "A" and made a part hereof.
- b. Lobbying

No portion of the loan amount may be used for lobbying or propaganda purposes as prohibited by 18 U.S.C. Section 1913 or Section 607(a) of Public Law 96-74.

c. Title I – Employment of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990

When applicable, the Borrower shall comply with Title I-Employment of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (P.L. 101-336) and in accordance with Title I of that Act, shall not discriminate against a qualified individual with a disability because of the disability of such individual in regard to job application procedures, the hiring, advancement, or discharge of employees, employee compensation, job training, and other terms, conditions, and privileges of employment.

d. Title II-Public Services of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990

When applicable, the Borrower shall comply with Title II-Public Services of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (P.L. 101-336) and in accordance with Title II of the Act, no qualified individual with a disability shall, by reason of such disability, be excluded from participation in or be denied the benefits of the services, programs, or activities of a public entity, or be subjected to discrimination by any such entity.

e. Title II, Part 35, Section 35.151 of the Americans with Disabilities Act "New Construction and Alterations"

When applicable, the Borrower shall comply with Title II, Part 35, Section 35.151 of the Americans with Disabilities Act "New Construction and Alterations."

- i. Design and construction: Each facility or part of a facility constructed by, on behalf of, or for the use of a public entity shall be designed and constructed in such manner that the facility or part of the facility is readily accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities, if the construction was commenced after January 26, 1992.
- ii. Alteration: Each facility or part of a facility altered by, on behalf, of or for the use of a public entity in a manner that affects or could affect the usability of the facility or part of the facility shall, to the maximum extent feasible, be altered in such manner that the altered portion of the facility is readily accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities, if the alteration was commenced after January 26, 1992.
- iii. Accessibility standards: Design, construction or alteration of facilities in conformance with the Uniform Federal Accessibility Standards (UFAS) (Appendix A to 41 CRF part 101-19.6) or with the Americans with Disabilities Act Accessibility Guidelines for Buildings and Facilities (ADAAG) (Appendix A to 28

CFR Part 36) shall be deemed to comply with the requirements of this section with respect to those facilities, except that the elevator exemption contained at section 4.1.3(5) and section 4.1.5(1)(j) of ADAAG shall not apply.

f. Title III, Part 36, Section 36.401 of the American with Disabilities Act "New Construction"

When applicable, the Borrower shall comply with Title III, Part 36, Section 36.401 of the Americans with Disabilities Act "New Construction." Except as provided in paragraph (b) and (c) of the Act, discrimination for purposes of this part includes a failure to design and construct facilities for first occupancy after January 26, 1993, that are readily accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities.

g. Title III, Part 36, Section 36.402 of the Americans with Disabilities Act "Alterations"

When applicable, the Borrower shall comply with Title III, Part 36, Section 36.402 of the Americans with Disabilities Act "Alterations."

- i. General: Any alteration to a place of public accommodation or a commercial facility, after January 26, 1992, shall be made so as to ensure that, to the maximum extent feasible, the altered portions of the facility are readily accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities, including individuals who use wheelchairs.
- ii. Alteration: An alteration is a change to a place of public accommodation or a commercial facility that affects or could affect the usability of the building or facility or any part thereof.
- h. 2 CFR Part 180, Responsibilities of Participants Regarding Transactions

The Borrower shall fully comply with Subpart C of 2 CFR Part 180, entitled "Responsibilities of Participants Regarding Transactions." The Borrower is responsible for ensuring that any lower tier covered transaction, as described in Subpart B of 2 CFR Part 180, entitled "Covered Transactions," includes a term or condition requiring compliance with Subpart C. The Borrower is responsible for further requiring the inclusion of a similar term or condition in any subsequent lower tier covered transactions. The Borrower acknowledges that failing to disclose the information required under 2 CFR Part 180 may result in the delay or negation of this assistance Agreement, or pursuance of legal remedies, including suspension and debarment.

2.08 Project Completion

Nothing contained in this Agreement shall be construed as an obligation or pledge of the Borrower to appropriate or expend general funds or revenues of the Borrower to repay the Subsidy, or operate or maintain the Project Facility.

2.09 Amendments and Modifications

This Agreement may only be modified or amended in writing and executed by the authorized representatives of all parties to this Agreement.

2.10 Loan Repayment

In the event that the subsidy is revoked per Section 2.02(b), this Agreement may be amended to include loan repayment conditions.

2.11 Disputes

The Borrower shall raise any concerns or issues it may have regarding the Project with the Department promptly and prior to project completion. If those concerns or issues are not satisfactorily resolved, the Borrower shall promptly give written notice to the Department with a detailed description of the continuing concerns or issues. Jurisdiction and venue for any legal dispute shall be in the Superior Court for the State of Alaska, Third Judicial District at Anchorage, and in no other court or location. In the event of a legal dispute, both parties knowingly and voluntarily waive their right to trial by jury (including any advisory jury) and elect to have the dispute tried only to a judge. In the event of litigation, the prevailing party shall be entitled to an award of its reasonable, actual attorney's fees and costs of litigation. Each party has had an opportunity to review this Agreement with legal counsel of its choosing (or waived such opportunity), therefore this Agreement shall not be interpreted in favor of either party. This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Alaska.

2.12 Termination

The Department may cancel all or any part of this Agreement if:

- a. Any representation or other statement made by the Borrower to the Department in connection with its application for a loan from the Alaska Drinking Water Fund is incorrect or incomplete in any material respect;
- b. The Borrower has violated commitments made in the Approved Application and supporting documents, has not adhered to the regulations of the Alaska Drinking Water Fund (18 AAC 76), has violated any of the terms of this Agreement; or
- c. The financial position of the Borrower has, in the opinion of the Department, suffered a materially adverse change.

2.13 Indemnification

The Borrower shall defend with counsel of the Department's choosing, indemnify, and hold harmless the Department and the State of Alaska, and their agents, servants, contractors, and employees, from and against any and all claims, demands, causes of action, actions, and liabilities arising out of, or in any way connected with this funding or the Project for which the funding is made, howsoever caused, except to the extent that such claims, demands, causes

of action, actions or liabilities are the proximate result of the sole negligence or willful misconduct of employees or agents of the Department or the State of Alaska.

2.14 Change of Ownership

The Borrower may not sell, transfer, assign, or encumber any of its rights, obligations, or assets related to this loan or Project without express prior written consent of the Department. If the Borrower intends to sell, transfer, assign, or encumber any of the rights, obligations, or assets related to the loan or Project, it must provide the Department with at least 60 days written notice prior to the sale, transfer, assignment, or encumbrance.

If the Department has not consented to the sale, transfer, assignment, or encumbrance of the rights, obligations, or assets related to the loan or Project, upon that sale, transfer, assignment, or encumbrance, and at the Department's sole discretion, the loan may be immediately due and payable in full. Alternatively, at the Department's sole discretion, the Department may approve the new owner to take on the rights, obligations, or assets related to the loan or Project, contingent upon successful approval by the Department of the same Financial Capacity Assessment and approvals that the original Borrower was subject to. In the event of any sale, transfer, or assignment of the rights, obligations, or assets related to the loan or Project, the Project must continue to adhere to the project description as outlined in the original loan agreement.

In all cases, the owner of the rights, obligations, or assets related to the loan or Project must maintain the Project for the life of the Project.

Article 3. Definitions

Except where the context clearly indicates otherwise, terms used in this Agreement will have the meaning ascribed to them in this section.

- a. "Approved Application" means the application submitted to the Department on August 22, 2025, together with all attachments and supporting documentation, as approved by the Department.
- b. "Agreement Period" means the time period commencing on the date this Agreement is signed by the Department's Finance Officer and terminating on the date the Borrower repays the loan in full.
- c. "Eligible Project Costs" include the following costs disbursed from the Alaska Drinking Water Fund, estimated to not exceed \$75,000 for engineering, surveys, plans, estimates, specifications, necessary insurance, financial and environmental investigations, laboratory testing, resident engineering, force account, legal expenses, and any other necessary miscellaneous expenditures, minus the amount of any grant applicable foregoing costs.
- d. "Project" means the activities or documents described in Article 1.02.
- e. "Project Facility" means the water treatment plant, distribution system, or related facilities in which Project activities are occurring.
- f. "Subsidy" means principal forgiveness awarded under this Agreement.

Article 4. Signatures

This Agreement is binding upon the parties specified below, and to any person, office, or board succeeding either of the parties. This Agreement may not be assigned by the Borrower without written consent of the Department.

Nothing in this Agreement, whether or not accepted, may be deemed to constitute a contractual obligation on the part of the Department until the Agreement is signed by all parties.

The City has received the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation (ADEC) Clean Water Revolving Loan Agreements for the Water Master Plan and Wastewater Master Plan. Each loan is in the not to exceed amount of \$75,000, provided with \$75,000 principal forgiveness. Each loan has a 0.5 percent loan fee that will be deducted from each disbursement.

Homer's existing Water and Wastewater Master Plans were developed in 2006, with a planning horizon of 20 years.

A Request for Proposals (RFP) has been advertised for Professional Engineer Services for 2025 Water & Wastewater Plan. The 2025 Water & Wastewater Plan is an engineering document that will benefit the City's systems. The scope of work includes The project consists of:

Furnishing all labor, materials, equipment, tools, supervision, and other facilities necessary to prepare a master plan. This effort will include

- Creating a computer model of the existing water and wastewater system,
- Identifying how service can be most effectively extended into areas not currently served,
- Determining what improvements to the existing system will be needed to support expansion,
- Defining the cost and suggesting a schedule for necessary future capital improvements, and
- Incorporating water and sewer data into the City's GIS information system.
- Evaluating water treatment plant, fire flow transmission, distribution, and storage capacities.
- Evaluating wastewater treatment plant, piped collection system and pump station capacities.
- Computer modeling prepared as part of this plan will allow the City to understand (before development occurs) what impact it will have on the existing wastewater and water system.

• Report with recommendations

- Maps of existing and future water and wastewater systems
- Computer modeling/GIS database information
- 20-year capital project list with cost estimates

The 2025 Water & Wastewater Master Plan will come to the City Council for review prior to being adopted.

1.03 Loan Amount

Article 2. General Terms and Conditions

The Borrower shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, requirements, and ordinances for the planning, design, construction, implementation, and administration of the Project and this Agreement, including but not limited to those identified in the General Terms and Conditions and Attachments.

2.01 Accounting Practices

The Borrower shall separately account for all monies received from the Alaska Clean Water Fund and shall maintain project accounts in accordance with generally accepted governmental accounting principles. The Department shall have the right to audit Borrower's records related to the Project.

2.02 Timely Use of Funds

- a. Concurrent with the execution and delivery of this Agreement, or as soon thereafter as practicable, the Borrower shall take all steps necessary to complete the Project in a timely manner in accordance with all applicable loan conditions.
- b. The Department will, in its discretion, revoke this Agreement if the Borrower has not initiated (e.g., solicited a design or construction contractor for the project, applied for notice to proceed for construction projects, incurred eligible expenses, etc.) the Project within one year after signing the Agreement.

2.03 Disbursement of Funds

Subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, the eligible project costs less other funding sources will be disbursed by the Department upon receipt and approval of Disbursement Requests and Quarterly Project Status Reports.

The Borrower shall submit Disbursement Requests and Quarterly Project Status Reports to the Department via the Division of Water's Online Application System (OASys). OASys may be accessed at the following link: https://dec.alaska.gov/water/oasys.

- a. Disbursement Requests and Quarterly Project Status Reports must be submitted to the Department within 30 days following the end of each calendar quarter.
- b. Should the Borrower fail to submit the Quarterly Project Status Reports as required, the Department will not process subsequent Disbursement Requests until a Quarterly Project Status Report is received.
- c. Departmental approvals required by this Agreement will not be unreasonably withheld.
- d. The Department will disburse funds only as necessary to complete the Project. Any funds remaining after completion of the Project will remain in the Alaska Clean Water Fund.

- e. Borrower shall provide the Department with written evidence of materials and labor furnished to and performed upon the Project and such receipts of the payment of the same, releases, satisfactions and other signed statements and forms as the Department may reasonably require.
- f. The Department may at any time review and audit requests for disbursement and make adjustments for, among other things, ineligible expenditures, mathematical errors, items not built or bought, unacceptable work and other discrepancies.

2.04 Principal Forgiveness

As part of this Agreement, the Department has offered the Borrower \$75,000 of subsidy, in the form of principal forgiveness.

- a. Subsidy will be applied to each disbursement at 100% until all available subsidy has been applied.
- b. If no disbursement request is made within one year, the Department may take action to rescind the subsidy offer.

2.05 Loan Fee

a. The Department will charge a fixed fee of one-half of one percent (0.5%) of the total amount of financial assistance disbursed. This fee shall be deducted from each disbursement at the time of payment.

2.06 Notification

Any disbursement made by the Department under this Agreement shall be delivered by electronic transfer or by registered or certified mail.

2.07 Compliance with Laws, Regulations, Etc.

The Borrower shall comply with, and require its contractors and subcontractors to comply with, all applicable federal and state laws, rules, guidelines, regulations, and requirements to include, but not limited to, the following:

- a. The "List of Federal Laws and Authorities (Federal 'Cross-Cutting' Authorities)" as identified in Exhibit "A" and made a part hereof.
- b. Lobbying

No portion of the loan amount may be used for lobbying or propaganda purposes as prohibited by 18 U.S.C. Section 1913 or Section 607(a) of Public Law 96-74.

c. Title I – Employment of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990

When applicable, the Borrower shall comply with Title I-Employment of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (P.L. 101-336) and in accordance with Title I of that Act, shall not discriminate against a qualified individual with a disability because of the disability of such individual in regard to job application procedures, the hiring, advancement, or discharge of employees, employee compensation, job training, and other terms, conditions, and privileges of employment.

d. Title II-Public Services of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990

When applicable, the Borrower shall comply with Title II-Public Services of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (P.L. 101-336) and in accordance with Title II of the Act, no qualified individual with a disability shall, by reason of such disability, be excluded from participation in or be denied the benefits of the services, programs, or activities of a public entity, or be subjected to discrimination by any such entity.

e. Title II, Part 35, Section 35.151 of the Americans with Disabilities Act "New Construction and Alterations"

When applicable, the Borrower shall comply with Title II, Part 35, Section 35.151 of the Americans with Disabilities Act "New Construction and Alterations."

- Design and construction: Each facility or part of a facility constructed by, on behalf of, or for the use of a public entity shall be designed and constructed in such manner that the facility or part of the facility is readily accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities, if the construction was commenced after January 26, 1992.
- ii. Alteration: Each facility or part of a facility altered by, on behalf, of or for the use of a public entity in a manner that affects or could affect the usability of the facility or part of the facility shall, to the maximum extent feasible, be altered in such manner that the altered portion of the facility is readily accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities, if the alteration was commenced after January 26, 1992.
- iii. Accessibility standards: Design, construction or alteration of facilities in conformance with the Uniform Federal Accessibility Standards (UFAS) (Appendix A to 41 CRF part 101-19.6) or with the Americans with Disabilities Act Accessibility Guidelines for Buildings and Facilities (ADAAG) (Appendix A to 28 CFR Part 36) shall be deemed to comply with the requirements of this section with respect to those facilities, except that the elevator exemption contained at section 4.1.3(5) and section 4.1.5(1)(j) of ADAAG shall not apply.
- f. Title III, Part 36, Section 36.401 of the Americans with Disabilities Act "New Construction"

When applicable, the Borrower shall comply with Title III, Part 36, Section 36.401 of the Americans with Disabilities Act "New Construction." Except as provided in paragraph (b) and (c) of the Act, discrimination for purposes of this part includes a failure to design and construct facilities for first occupancy after January 26, 1993, that are readily accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities.

g. Title III, Part 36, Section 36.402 of the Americans with Disabilities Act "Alterations"

When applicable, the Borrower shall comply with Title III, Part 36, Section 36.402 of the Americans with Disabilities Act "Alterations."

- i. General: Any alteration to a place of public accommodation or a commercial facility, after January 26, 1992, shall be made so as to ensure that, to the maximum extent feasible, the altered portions of the facility are readily accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities, including individuals who use wheelchairs.
- ii. Alteration: An alteration is a change to a place of public accommodation or a commercial facility that affects or could affect the usability of the building or facility or any part thereof.
- h. 2 CFR Part 180, Responsibilities of Participants Regarding Transactions

The Borrower shall fully comply with Subpart C of 2 CFR Part 180, entitled "Responsibilities of Participants Regarding Transactions." The Borrower is responsible for ensuring that any lower tier covered transaction, as described in Subpart B of 2 CFR Part 180, entitled "Covered Transactions," includes a term or condition requiring compliance with Subpart C. The Borrower is responsible for further requiring the inclusion of a similar term or condition in any subsequent lower tier covered transactions. The Borrower acknowledges that failing to disclose the information required under 2 CFR Part 180 may result in the delay or negation of this assistance Agreement, or pursuance of legal remedies, including suspension and debarment.

2.08 Project Completion

Nothing contained in this Agreement shall be construed as an obligation or pledge of the Borrower to appropriate or expend general funds or revenues of the Borrower to repay the Subsidy, or operate or maintain the Project Facility.

2.09 Amendments and Modifications

This Agreement may only be modified or amended in writing and executed by the authorized representatives of all parties to this Agreement.

2.10 Loan Repayment

In the event that the subsidy is revoked per Section 2.02(c), this Agreement may be amended to include loan repayment conditions.

2.11 Disputes

The Borrower shall raise any concerns or issues it may have regarding the Project with the Department promptly and prior to project completion. If those concerns or issues are not satisfactorily resolved, the Borrower shall promptly give written notice to the Department with a detailed description of the continuing concerns or issues. Jurisdiction and venue for any legal dispute shall be in the Superior Court for the State of Alaska, Third Judicial District at Anchorage, and in no other court or location. In the event of a legal dispute, both parties knowingly and voluntarily waive their right to trial by jury (including any advisory jury) and elect to have the dispute tried only to a judge. In the event of litigation, the prevailing party shall be entitled to an award of its reasonable, actual attorney's fees and costs of litigation. Each party has had an opportunity to review this Agreement with legal counsel of its choosing (or waived such opportunity); therefore, this Agreement shall not be interpreted in favor of either party. This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Alaska.

2.12 Termination

The Department may cancel all or any part of this Agreement it:

- Any representation or other statement made by the Borrower to the Department in connection with its application for a loan from the Alaska Clean Water Fund is incorrect or incomplete in any material respect;
- b. The Borrower has violated commitments made in the Approved Application and supporting documents, has not adhered to the regulations of the Alaska Clean Water Fund (18 AAC 76), has violated any of the terms of this Agreement; or
- c. The financial position of the Borrower has, in the opinion of the Department, suffered a materially adverse change.

2.13 Indemnification

The Borrower shall defend with counsel of the Department's choosing, indemnify, and hold harmless the Department and the State of Alaska, and their agents, servants, contractors, and employees, from and against any and all claims, demands, causes of action, actions, and liabilities arising out of, or in any way connected with this funding or the Project for which the funding is made, howsoever caused, except to the extent that such claims, demands, causes of action, actions or liabilities are the proximate result of the sole negligence or willful misconduct of employees or agents of the Department or the State of Alaska.

2.14 Change of Ownership

The Borrower may not sell, transfer, assign, or encumber any of its rights, obligations, or assets related to this loan or Project without express prior written consent of the Department. If the Borrower intends to sell, transfer, assign, or encumber any of the rights, obligations, or assets related to the loan or Project, it must provide the Department with at least 60 days written notice prior to the sale, transfer, assignment, or encumbrance.

If the Department has not consented to the sale, transfer, assignment, or encumbrance of the rights, obligations, or assets related to the loan or Project, upon that sale, transfer, assignment, or encumbrance, and at the Department's sole discretion, the loan may be immediately due and payable in full. Alternatively, at the Department's sole discretion, the Department may approve the new owner to take on the rights, obligations, or assets related to the loan or Project, contingent upon successful approval by the Department of the same Financial Capacity Assessment and approvals that the original Borrower was subject to. In the event of any sale, transfer, or assignment of the rights, obligations, or assets related to the loan or Project, the Project must continue to adhere to the project description as outlined in the original loan agreement.

Homer All-Ages and Abilities Pathway (HAAP) Project Update

I am pleased to report positive momentum on the HAAP project. On October 16, Council Member Parsons and city staff met with Romo Marasigan, Alaska Department of Transportation (ADOT) Planner for Homer, and two engineers from the Department of Natural Resources for a site visit of the HAAP project. Mr. Rys Miranda and Mr. Rangell Soriano of the Department of Natural Resources, State Parks Division, will develop the design, and Mr. Soriano, as Project Manager, will also possibly provide construction management on the project for ADOT.

The purpose of the visit was to conduct a comprehensive walkthrough of the original project scope, with particular attention to the City's prioritized HAAP sections for development under the Transportation Alternatives Program grant. This on-site visit allowed the state team to gain knowledge of the terrain and discuss existing conditions and specific challenges with Public Works staff in order to develop a more accurate project cost estimate. This information will be essential as we move forward with negotiating the Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) for the project. Once the MOA has been reviewed by the State's law division, it will come to the City for review in consultation with the City Attorney.

We appreciate the collaborative partnership between ADOT and DNR, and will be very excited to see meaningful progress on this project that will fill critical gaps in our sidewalk network to enhance safety and accessibility for all users.

Selection of Mayor Pro Tem for 2025/2026

Per Homer City Code 2.08.080, Mayor's absence: At the first meeting of the Council following certification of the municipal election each year, there shall be appointed a Mayor Pro Tempore, by majority vote of the Council, to act as Mayor during the Mayor's temporary absence or disability.

Pursuant to Council's Operating Manual: A Mayor Pro Tem shall be elected by the majority of the Homer City Council. The term of the Mayor Pro Tem shall be until the call for election by the Homer City Council of a New Mayor Pro Tem. The Mayor Pro Tem shall, in the absence of the Mayor, act as Mayor of the City of Homer as though they themselves had taken the Oath of Office of Mayor with all duties, responsibilities and powers of the office of the Mayor of the City of Homer. The Mayor Pro Tem, when acting in that capacity, does not lose the privilege or duty to vote as a Councilmember.

Pursuant to Council's Operating Manual: Council Seat-Customarily the selection is by seniority. Senior members may choose a different seat prior to the junior members being seated. The Mayor Pro Tempore shall have first seating choice and then the Senior Councilmembers and so on and so forth. (Resolution 04-89)

RECOMMENDATION:

Councilmember ______is selected/appointed as Mayor Pro Tempore for the City of Homer for 2025/2026.

After Council selects the Mayor Pro Tempore they may have first seat choice, including remaining where they are currently seated.



Eric Lane Sidewalk and Paving

A decision from City Council is needed before the contractor can finalize paving plans for Eric Lane. Two items require clarification: the treatment of the sidewalk area and the width of the paved surface.

1. Sidewalk Treatment

The September 23, 2024, and September 4, 2025, memoranda from the City Manager and Public Works Director recommended that the area designated for a future sidewalk remain gravel until funding becomes available to construct a curb-separated sidewalk with proper drainage improvements.

Councilmembers Davis and Parsons concur with this recommendation. Constructing a paved sidewalk contiguous with the travel lanes and separated only by a painted fog line would not provide a safe pedestrian environment—particularly during winter months when pavement markings are obscured by snow and ice. Additionally, the City does not currently have funding to build even that, let alone a permanent, curb-separated sidewalk that meets long-term standards. Leaving the shoulder area gravel at this time maintains safety and flexibility while preserving the right-of-way for future improvement.

2. Paving Width

The second issue involves the width of the paved surface. Current best practices for collector streets recommend approximately **28 feet of pavement**, allowing for two 10-foot travel lanes (no center line) with 4-foot paved shoulders on either side of the fog lines. However, the City's **1985 Road Standards Manual** may require a wider cross-section, which could encourage speeding in an area where speeding is already a challenge even with the road unpaved. If so, Council may wish to consider whether those older standards should be revised to reflect contemporary guidance and context-sensitive design principles.

Recommendation:

That City Council hold a discussion during this meeting with the City Manager, Public Works Director, and staff to confirm a shared approach on sidewalk treatment and paving width for Eric Lane, with the goal of providing clear direction to staff and the contractor so the project may proceed efficiently and safely.
