Session 25-19 a Regular Meeting of the City Council of Homer, Alaska was called to order on Monday, August 11, 2025 by Mayor Rachel Lord at 6:00 p.m. at the City Hall Cowles Council Chambers located at 491 E. Pioneer Avenue, Homer, Alaska, and opened with the Pledge of Allegiance.

CALL TO ORDER, PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mayor Lord called the meeting to order and invited everyone present to stand for the Pledge of Allegiance.

City Clerk Krause called attendance, a full Council was in attendance.

Mayor Lord invited the public to comment on any item on the agenda with the exception of the following:

- a. Ordinance 25-44(A)(S), Appropriating \$250,000 from the HART Trails Fund for the Development of a Trailhead and Trail Segment on the East Side of the Sterling Highway.
- b. Ordinance 25-47, Amending the FY26 Capital Budget to Fund Anticipated Maintenance to the Seawall.
- c. Ordinance 25-48(A), Amending the FY26 Capital Budget to Fund Anticipated Repairs or Maintenance to the United States Coast Guard (USCGC) Cutter **Buoy Tender** Berth Space.
- d. Ordinance 25-49, Appropriating \$52,500 from the Load and Launch Reserves Fund for the Purpose of Making Improvements to the Launch Ramp Area.
- e. Ordinance 25-50, Appropriating \$20,000 from the Port Reserves Fund for the Purpose of Installing a Drywell in Lot 12B.
- f. Ordinance 25-51, Appropriating \$30,000 from the Port Reserves Fund for an Engineering Assessment of the Homer Harbor Steel Grid.
- g. Ordinance 25-52, Amending HCC to Provide for an Increase of 0.3% Sales Tax for the Purpose of Financing a Multi-Purpose Community Recreation Facility, and Submitting the Question of such Sales Tax Increase to the Qualified Voters of the City at the Regular Election in October.

Kate Finn, city resident, expressed comments on the leadership vacuum and strongly supported an interim chief and second in command for EMS and Fire and understood why the Request for Proposal was put on hold. She noted the number of businesses who responded to the RFP requests and tossed away all but three of them which she thought had potential. She further noted her interest in the results of the ISO survey, supporting the Ordinance 25-55 for a public information campaign on the Community Rec Center and believed Resolution 25-070 to allow temporary structures for retail purposes in vacant lots was extremely wide and unspecified agenda for possible change and what affect would this have on existing businesses, will they be ADA compliant, water, sewer, noting the devil is in the details.

Heath Smith, city resident, commented on Resolution 25-073, noting the possibility of improvement but viewed it as dysfunctional. He expressed the historical intent to get traffic, trucks and big boats to the harbor and not intended for the commercial buildup that currently is making it the main access though town thus bypassing the city center. He advocated for careful and thoughtful planning to overcome previous mistakes and not repeat them.

Samantha Cunningham, provided comments on putting the RFP, noting when she was a part-time employee experiencing a team building exercise and they put the word "Changes" on the table before the group and they had to write down how they felt. She related that she wrote positive, new, growth, beginning and then noted that another employee wrote destabilization, loss, disruption and thought that was a really different perspective. Ms. Cunningham related that incident to what is currently being experienced by the fire department today and not having a proper command in place. She advocated for an interim fire chief to be appointed or hired stating what has been done in the past.

Karin Marks, stated she was speaking as the Chair of the Economic Development Advisory Commission, expressed comments on Resolution 25-070 recommending that the Commission would be a good place to refer the resolution as well as the Planning Commission. She advocated that the Commission can provide a perspective on the idea outside of the planning process.

a. Julianne Lienenveber, Public Affairs Specialist, Commander, Navy Region Northwest re: Navy Training Activities in the Gulf of Alaska

Commander, Navy Region Northwest Chief of Staff Captain Jason Sherman U.S. Pacific Fleet and Marine Biologist Andrea Balla-Holden presented to Mayor Lord and City Council regarding upcoming military training exercises in the Gulf of Alaska referred to as Exercise Northern Edge scheduled August 14-29, 2025. They reviewed experiences from previous exercises in May 2023 and shared studies of impacts on marine and wildlife, mitigation and protective measures employed, and planning strategies.

Council expressed their appreciation for the visit and listening to the community concerns regarding the

c. Borough Report

Kelly Cooper, Assembly person, provided a summary report of the August 5, 2025 Borough Assembly meeting. She provided brief summations on the following:

- Initiative on the ballot in October to hand count ballots and if that passes how it affects the city, added costs, plus additional workers required to provide the labor necessary to hand count ballots starting in 2026.
 - The use of machines which are tabulators, they do nothing but count the marks made for each candidate.
 - Machines are tested thoroughly prior to every election.
 - Having been proven during each time a recount has been requested that the machines are accurate.
- Requesting the State to reduce the speed limit on East End Road to Kachemak Drive from Rochelle.
 - Requested copies of Homer Resolutions to add to the Borough request.
- Ordinance implementing a Seasonal Sales Tax was pulled due to the number of items on the ballot
- Ballot proposition to adjust the spending cap to accommodate inflation
- Ballot proposition for increase in mil rate for the pool at the Ninilchik School
 - Boundary Clam Gulch to South of Happy Valley
- Ordinance to move in-kind maintenance from Borough to the School District
- Provided update on the Recycling being removed from private businesses
 - Will provide information on how much land is remaining in the Homer Landfill
 - o Commercial businesses have to pay for their trash versus residential
 - Commercial businesses are required to pay for depositing cardboard.
 - More information for the public on management and enforcement of regulations.
- Borough recently hired someone to manage the website and social media
- Burning has been done daily due to the higher amount of brush being dumped.
- d. Comprehensive Plan and Title 21 Status Update Report

City Manager Jacobsen announced the Public Hearing for the Comp Plan Update at the Planning Commission August 20th meeting at 6:30 p.m. noting there were paper copies available at City Hall in the downstairs lobby and a link on the city website. A brief discussion ensued defining the management plan as 273 acres as stated in the DCRA Plan document.

VOTE. (Amendment) NON-OBJECTION. UNANIMOUS CONSENT. Motion carried.

ADERHOLD/DAVIS MOVED TO AMEND LINE 13 TO INSERT NEW WHEREAS CLAUSE, "WHEREAS, THE CITY OF HOMER ADOPTED ORDINANCE 07-03 AND ACCEPTED OWNERSHIP OF TWO PARCELS TOTALING 273 ACRES OUTSIDE THE CITY LIMITS AND IN THE DIAMOND CREEK AREA AS PART OF THE FOREST LEGACY PROGRAM TO KEEP PUBLIC PARK LAND IN PERPETUITY; AND"

A brief discussion ensued on the Forest Legacy Program and what the rules are regarding the program and if it would allow a trail.

ADERHOLD/DAVIS MOVED TO AMEND LINE 48, TO INSERT NEW WHEREAS CLAUSE, "WHEREAS, USING HART TRAILS FUNDS TO PURCHASE A PARCEL FOR USE AS A TRAILHEAD FOR TRAILS IN THE DCRA PLAN IS AN APPROPRIATE USE OF THE FUNDS; AND"

Discussion on the following points:

- Location and purpose of the whereas
- Use of HART Funds to purchase land for a trails outside town when there is a need to improve trails in town
- Amended at the last meeting to purchase a parcel
- Clarified that it is an appropriate use of HART funds and has been done previously with another trailhead.

VOTE.(Amendment). NON-OBJECTION. UNANIMOUS CONSENT.

Mayor Lord called a five-minute recess at 8:08 p.m. She called the meeting back to order at 8:13 p.m.

 it and giving it to staff rather than leaving it solely to the judgement of the staff
 - o Having input from the Chamber of Commerce would be of great value as well, from Robert Green, Small Business Development
 - Postpone to the end of September and refer to the September 9th EDC meeting and Planning Commission September 3rd meeting
- Concern on impacts to "brick & mortar" businesses
 - o Supporting temporary structures does not support the existing businesses
- Several preferences were recommended:

Ms. Venuti expressed her amazement at all the visitors to the Homer Spit and at one point being against expansion of the Harbor but seeing how busy it has become she is very supportive of it now.

Mayor Lord offered additional comments on the Celebration of Life for Roberta Highland and how much she had done for the community, and it was well attended by about 250 people, lots of August birthdays including her daughter Sadie turning 12.

Staff is requesting approval to proceed with drainage improvements on Tract 2 of the Fishing Hole Subdivision to resolve longstanding storm water issues that impact both Fishing Lagoon users and adjacent campers. Specifically, we recommend the installation of a drywell this fall to mitigate the persistent flooding and improve year-round accessibility for truck staging and commercial use.

Background

Tract 2 of The Fishin Hole subdivision is located along Homer Spit Road and includes the basin of the Fishing Lagoon as well as a paved trail, parking lots, public restrooms, and fish cleaning tables. The adjacent tract 1-A is home to campsites, the building leased to Pier One Theatre, and a seasonal vessel repair yard.

Tract 2 has become a collection point for stormwater and runoff from the fish cleaning tables. The lack of drainage presents not only a functional problem for users of the Fishing Lagoon, but also a long-term liability for the City infrastructure on the site.

Proposed Solution

After a discussion with the Public Works team, staff recommends the installation of a drywell on Tract 2 to handle storm water runoff and eliminate the recurring ponding problem. Drywells have been successfully used elsewhere on the Homer Spit and represent a cost-effective and low-maintenance drainage solution.

This work should be completed this fall, before winter conditions return. Addressing the issue now while contractors are mobilized to install additional dry wells on the Homer Spit can provide cost efficiencies.

Funding

Staff recommends using funds from the Fishing Hole CARMA to fund the cost of this improvement.

Recommendation

Staff respectfully request approval for funding and implementing this drainage solution from the Fishing Hole CARMA Fund.

- Attend at least 6 hours of continuing education (CE) during the current two-year cycle (7/1/2025-6/30/2027).

Please note that in addition to the above requirements, non-profit and school/public libraries have additional requirements. Non-profit organizations must have at least quarterly (4) public board meetings and **submit minutes** to **eed.library.grants@alaska.gov**. School libraries must execute and keep in force a **binding legal agreement** between the school district and the public library governing body. The governing body of the public library may be the municipal assembly, an advisory board appointed by the municipal assembly, or the board of directors of a non-profit corporation.

The State Library audits the records of selected libraries at the end of the grant year and reclaims any grant funds not properly accounted for. Also, any portion of this grant money not spent or encumbered by June 30, 2026, should be returned to the State Library. You may request a brief extension to spend unused FY2026 grant funds.

Alaska Public Library Assistance Grant Agreement FY2026

This agreement made and entered into on Tuesday, August 19, 2025, by and between the **Alaska State Library**, hereafter referred to as the Grantor; and the **Homer Public Library**, hereafter referred to as the Grantee.

Whereas, the State of Alaska has appropriated funds for public library assistance; and whereas, the application of the Grantee for a grant for public library assistance has been approved. NOW THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual covenants herein contained the parties hereto agree as follows:

The Grantor will agree to:

- 1. Furnish funds in the amount of \$7000(dispersed after the agreement is received).
- 2. Provide advisory services in furtherance of the grant project.
- 3. Acknowledge the Grantee's eligibility for additional grants and services.

The Grantee will agree to:

Provide at least the following services free to residents of the municipality or community:

- Establish and maintain a collection of books and other materials for loan;
- Provide access to interlibrary loans;
- Provide **reference** information; and
- Provide programming for children.

Abide by the conditions set forth in its application, guidelines, and approved by the Grantor, including:

- Expend at least \$3500 on library materials and online services for each outlet.
- The number and timing of open hours;
- The existing and ongoing **educational requirements** for the library director.
- Have trained paid or volunteer staff on duty in the library during the scheduled open hours.

Maintain accurate financial records for auditing purposes.

- Return any grant funds unexpended or unencumbered by June 30, 2026, and all funds for which there is no proper accounting.
- Receive prior approval from the Grantor for **any line item change** that exceeds 10% of the line item, except that no prior approval is required for: Line item changes of less than \$100; or line item changes that add funds to library materials and online services.
- **Expend local funds** of at least \$7000 for project purposes. Repay any portion of grant funds that have not actually been matched by local funds over the course of the grant period. Local fund match can include volunteer service as described in the Guidelines.
- Expended funds must be clearly attributable to public library (not school) services and operations.

Uphold specific governance requirements

- Non-profits will maintain "Good Standing" with the State and submit minutes of required quarterly public board meetings to the Grantor.
- School/public libraries will have an agreement between the school district and the public library governing body.

Submit reports, certifications, and contact information such as:

- The online **Public Library Annual Report** (PLAR) by September 1, 2026.
- The follow-up signed certification for the PLAR
- Any changes in director or library contact information within 30 days.

The Cities of Homer and Kachemak have worked together for many years through an intergovernmental agreement and vehicle lease to provide emergency services to the City of Kachemak.

When this relationship began, the City of Kachemak had a refurbished tanker housed in their fire station and no fire department to provide service, and the City of Homer had an established fire department and the ability to provide service to both cities. The cities developed an intergovernmental agreement for the City of Homer to provide emergency services in exchange for use of their tanker and 1 mil of City of Kachemak property tax equivalent.

The City of Kachemak purchased a 2024 Pierce Enforcer Tanker at the same time the City of Homer purchased theirs, causing us to update our intergovernmental agreement and tanker lease agreement that were approved with Resolution 14-007.

Both cities wish to continue this relationship and update the necessary agreements. In working with the City Attorney, we developed the newly titled Services Agreement between the City of Homer and the City of Kachemak for Emergency Fire, Rescue, Haz-Mat, and Emergency Medical Services that includes more modern language and incorporates the vehicle lease so there is one document to manage.

The City of Kachemak has reviewed and approved the agreement.

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt a resolution approving the Services Agreement between the City of Homer and the City of Kachemak for Emergency Fire, Rescue, Haz-Mat, and Emergency Medical Services and authorize the City Manager to negotiate and execute the agreement.

INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT FOR EMERGENCY SERVICES

This Intergovernmental Agreement for Emergency Services is made and entered into this 1st day of January, 2014 between the City of Kachemak, Alaska, hereinafter referred to as Kachemak City, and the City of Homer, Alaska, hereinafter referred to as the City of Homer.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, Kachemak City does not have a fire department and desires to obtain fire protection, emergency medical services, and allied services for the residents within the corporate limits of Kachemak City through an intergovernmental agreement, and has in its possession and/or control certain facilities and equipment which can aid in the provision of fire protection services and emergency medical services to both cities, and;

WHEREAS, The City of Homer has an established Fire Department organized and created for the purpose of providing fire protection services. Emergency medical services, and other related services, and can provide these services to both cities, and;

WHEREAS, The City of Kachemak and the City of Homer, understand and agree upon the need for, and desire for, mutual efforts and close cooperation with each other to provide efficient and effective fire protection services and emergency medical services to the public at low cost;

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties agree as follows:

TERM: The rights, responsibilities, and obligations created by this Intergovernmental Agreement for Services shall commence on the 1st day of January, 2014, and shall continue in force and effect until and unless terminated as herein provided.

TERMINATION: This Agreement may be terminated by either party upon written notice served upon the other party not less than ninety (90) days prior to the effective date of termination.

RELATIONSHIP: Kachemak City and The City of Homer agree and understand that the relationship created by this Agreement is solely for providing fire protection services, emergency medical services, and other related services.

INSURANCE: Kachemak City shall be excluded from any and all liability resulting from the use of its vehicle(s) by the Homer Volunteer Fire Department and shall also be excluded from any responsibility for bodily injuries to members of the HVFD, which might result from such use. The City of Homer shall provide Vehicle Physical Damage Insurance, Automobile Liability, and General Liability Insurance, covering all members of Homer Volunteer Fire Department, and/ or vehicles leased or used by HVFD which are the property of Kachemak City. Such liability insurance coverage shall be in the amount of \$1,000,000.00 single limit coverage or such other limits as may be agreed upon by both parties. Vehicle Physical Damage Insurance coverage shall be for the "Actual Cash Value" of the vehicle(s). Kachemak City shall fully reimburse the City of Homer for the cost of such

liability and physical damage insurance within 30 days of receipt of a statement from the City of Homer.

ADMINISTRATION OF THIS AGREEMENT: Kachemak City shall appoint an Agreement Administrator who shall administer this Agreement on behalf of Kachemak City, and the City of Homer shall appoint an Agreement Administrator who shall administer this Agreement on behalf of the City of Homer.

RESPONSIBILITES OF THE CITY OF HOMER: The City of Homer agrees to provide Kachemak City with fire protection services meeting at a minimum the requirements for a Class -8 ISO, emergency medical services at an Advanced Life Support level, and other allied services generally provided by the fire department. In addition the City of Homer will operate and maintain the leased vehicle in compliance with the Vehicle Lease Agreement.

RESPONSIBILITES OF KACHEMAK CITY: So as to enable the City of Homer to provide the fire control and emergency medical services as established by this Intergovernmental Agreement for Services, Kachemak City agrees to provide the City of Homer with the use of the fire station in the Kachemak Community Center without charge, use of the fire truck and equipment in accordance with the vehicle lease agreement, and payment of a contract fee equal to 1 mil of taxable real property in Kachemak City as established by the Kenai Peninsula Borough Assessor's Office. The payment of the contract fee shall be made in two equal installments due by the 1st of August and the 1st of February of Kachemak City's fiscal year.

AUTHORITY OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT: The Fire Chief or other fire department officers of the Homer Volunteer Fire Department shall have the exclusive authority, consistent with State Law and City Ordinances, to direct all firefighting or emergency operations and all emergency service personnel shall be subject to their orders. They shall have the use and control of all emergency service facilities, equipment, and resources.

ALASKA LAW: This Agreement shall be interpreted, administered, and executed in accordance with the laws of the State of Alaska and the ordinances of the City of Kachemak and the City of Homer, and such portions of this Agreement as may be found contrary to public policy shall be voided.

ENTIRE AGREEMENT: This Intergovernmental Agreement for Services and the Vehicle Lease Agreement constitute the entire agreement and understanding between the parties. This Intergovernmental Agreement for Services cannot be amended, modified, or changed by attachment, except by written instrument signed by both parties.

The COH acknowledges that Kachemak City is not responsible for providing any maintenance and/or service for the Fire Truck. COH will make all claims for service and/or maintenance solely to the supplier, vendor and/or manufacturer.

INSURANCE: Kachemak City shall be excluded from any and all liability resulting from the use of its vehicle(s) by the Homer Volunteer Fire Department ("HVFD") and shall also be excluded from any responsibility for bodily injuries to members of the HVFD, which might result from such use. The COH shall provide Vehicle Physical Damage Insurance, Automobile Liability, and General Liability Insurance, covering all members of HVFD, and/or vehicles leased or used by HVFD which are the property of KACHEAMK CITY. Such liability insurance coverage shall be in the amount of \$1,000,000.00 single limit coverage or such other limits as may be agreed upon by both parties. Vehicle Physical Damage Insurance coverage shall be for the "Actual Cash Value" of the vehicle(s). KACHEAMK CITY shall fully reimburse the COH for the cost of Tanker Liability and Physical Damage Insurance within 30 days of receipt of a statement from the COH.

ADMINISTRATION OF THIS AGREEMENT: The Kachemak City Mayor shall administer this Agreement on behalf of Kachemak City, and the COH Fire Chief shall administer this Agreement on behalf of the COH.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE CITY OF HOMER: The COH agrees to provide Kachemak City with fire protection services to maintain the best possible ISO rating for emergency medical services at an Advanced Life Support level, and rescue services provided by the fire department.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF KACHEMAK CITY: So as to enable the COH to provide the fire, rescue, hazmat, and emergency medical services as established by this Agreement, Kachemak City agrees to provide the COH with the unrestricted use of the fire station in the Kachemak Community Center without charge. KACHEAMK CITY is responsible for maintenance, repairs, and upgrades to the fire station, and to keep the fire station clear of items not used for fire response. COH is not responsible for damage to non-fire related materials or equipment stored in the fire station. Use of the fire truck and equipment described herein and payment of a contract fee equal to 1 mil of taxable real property in KACHEAMK CITY as established by the Kenai Peninsula Borough Assessor's Office. The payment of the contract fee shall be made in two equal installments due by August 1st and February 1st of Kachemak City's fiscal year.

INCIDENT COMMAND: The Homer Fire Chief and Officers shall have incident command authority over responses to emergency dispatches within Kachemak City, and all emergency service personnel and responding emergency assets shall be subject to their orders in accordance with

Incident Command System Protocols.

 DETERMINATION OF PRIORITY: It is mutually understood and agreed that the dispatch of any personnel or equipment in response to a request for assistance shall be subordinate to the needs and responsibilities of the COH fire department as determined by its fire chief. The COH Chief's judgment as to the level of resources which should be withheld in order to respond to any actual or potential requests for assistance or public emergencies within the geographical area regularly served by the responding party shall be conclusive. No violation of this Agreement shall be considered to have occurred if, for any reason, in the judgment of the COH fire chief, a response to an emergency dispatch might jeopardize the fire or other protection provided to COH.

OPERATIONAL CONTROL

Control of Fire Fighting: The fire chief of the party requesting assistance, or his authorized representative, shall have the sole responsibility for conducting all firefighting or emergency operations at the scene; however, such requesting fire chief may delegate management authority over all or any part of such operations to any responding fire chief.

Incident Scene Management: The requesting fire chief, or his authorized representative, may request that a responding fire chief, or his authorized representative, assume management authority over the control and direction of all or any part of the firefighting operations at the fire or emergency; however, the requesting fire chief shall not, by relinquishing such control, be relieved of his overall control and responsibility for the operation.

IMMUNITIES TO CONTINUE: This Agreement is not intended to, and it shall not be construed to, waive, relinquish, alter, amend or vitiate in any manner whatsoever, the privileges or immunities otherwise provided by law to either of the parties hereto or to any of their officers, employees, volunteers or other agents, whether in the course of responding to a request for assistance under this Agreement or otherwise. Each party and all such individuals shall have and retain all privileges and immunities otherwise applicable to the performance of the same or similar functions within the party's own area.

NOT EMPLOYEES OR AGENTS: Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to render or establish any officer, employee or volunteer of any one of the parties the agent, employee, representative or volunteer of any of the other parties and all such personnel shall be and remain, for all purposes and at all times, the personnel of the party providing such personnel.

NO WARRANTY: By entering into this Agreement, or taking any action pursuant to it, neither party is making any representation or warranty, whether express or implied, concerning the training or reliability of its personnel or that of the other party, or with respect to the safety, durability or reliability of its firefighting apparatus or equipment or that of the other party. Each party expressly disclaims any such express or implied approval or warranty.

Summary

The fender unit at the inside berth of the Deep Water Dock has been successfully repaired and the berth is fully back in service. During repairs, we encountered unforeseen conditions that required significant changes to the original plan. As a result, the total cost of the project exceeded the approved amount. We request an additional \$16,000 to cover these necessary expenses.

Background

We initially planned to reuse abandoned construction piles from the dock's initial build to support the repaired fender. After lifting and removing the fender unit, we discovered that both support pin piles had sheared off approximately four feet above the mudline and could not be reused. This required us to start from scratch.

Our team located suitable piles from our spare parts inventory, but we had to piece them together from remnants and weld them to meet the required length. We relocated the fender unit slightly along the dock to reach undisturbed substrate and fabricated a custom driving template to ensure proper alignment for the new piles. These additional steps required more labor, materials, and equipment time.

Justification

Given the circumstances and the critical function of the fender at this berth, I made the decision to proceed with the modified repair plan without delay. No viable alternative that would serve the City's interest better than completing the repair as quickly and effectively as possible. The total with overage of \$61,275 reflects the actual costs of this necessary work. Considering the complexity of challenges and the urgency of restoring the Deep Water Dock's berth functionality, this expense is reasonable and justified.

Recommendation

Approve Ordinance 25-53 authorizing an additional \$16,000 to cover the cost overage for the Deep Water Dock fender repair.

The Deep Water Dock, built in 1990, has three berths for ships to moor and is designed for large vessels that are too big to utilize the Homer Small Boat Harbor. The dock's outer face measures 345 feet but can accommodate vessels up to 800 feet long by extending past the dock when moored. Offset fenders are crucial for protecting the Deep Water Dock and support piles from the weight and impact of large vessels mooring at the dock. These fenders are designed to absorb shock during docking operations and the inside berth fenders weigh



approximately 30,000 lbs. The fender system is designed to slide overtop of two pin piles that are driven into the seafloor and then are bolted to the dock face with brackets. Between the fender and dock are large rubber shock absorbers to assist with potential impact that can occur when a ship arrives at the berth.

Fender Damage and Cause

Port Maintenance discovered a damaged fender on the Deep Water Dock on the inside berth. Bolts that support the fender have corroded, and several timbers on the fender are damaged or broken.

Staff also noted that the fender unit had dropped by six inches and appeared to just be hanging from the dock fasteners.

The issue was traced to old piling infrastructure left during the original construction of the Deep Water Dock which is protruding from the seafloor and interfering with this fender unit.


Repair Plan

Fortunately, Port Maintenance has a rebuilt spare fender for the inside berth, saving costs. However, because of the physical size (14' wide, 35' long, and almost 30,000 lbs) specialized crew and equipment are needed for its installation.

• A mobile crane will be necessary to be positioned on the dock to lift and remove the current

fender and replace it with the "ready-to-go" rebuilt fender.

- A diver will be required to cut off and remove the derelict piling that was left from the original installation of the deep water dock.
- Drill and epoxy new anchoring bolts into the dock face to secure the fender brackets to the dock.
- Once the dock is ready, the new fender will be installed and bolted into place with the assistance of the mobile crane.



Request for Single-Source Contractor

Due to the specialized nature of this this fender repair, it is crucial to hire Alaska Industrial Services, LLC, a contractor experienced in dock fender systems, underwater cutting, crane operations, and structural fastening. Their familiarity with this dock ensures repairs are done correctly and on time. Choosing single source

procurement ensures that the contractor will have the necessary tools, equipment, and expertise, eliminating the need for multiple contractors.

This repair plan to replace the dock fender will ensure the continued functionality of the inside berth for vessels using the Homer Port facility. Authorization of a single-source procurement will ensure the Deep Water Dock will be repaired correctly and timely to provide a fully operational fender.

Recommendation: Homer City Council approve Ordinance 25-34 amending the FY25 budget by allocating \$45,500 and authorizing single source procurement for the fender repair.

I. Issue: The purpose of this Memorandum is to request \$1,200,000 for the construction of the Highland Drive Culvert Replacement Project.

II. Background:

Public Works staff was made aware of the side slope of Highland Drive failing and sloughing in mid-January due to the wet and warm winter. This location is where Highland Drive crosses the drainage headwaters of Bidarki Creek. Bidarki Creek flows through a culvert located at the base of the canyon, crossing with Highland Drive, with side slopes approaching a 1 to 1. The upstream side of the road crossing is approximately 15-feet to the stream bed elevation and the downstream side of the road crossing is approximately 30-feet to the stream elevation. The age of the culvert is estimated to be approximately 30-years and the pipe is well past its expected life.

The Public Works Department has been closely monitoring the conditions on Highland Drive because the erosion and sloughing is continuing to occur and working its way towards the road and has already exposed approximately 5-feet of road bed geotextile fabric and a communication line. As of February 17, 2025, the erosion was within approximately 5-feet of the guardrail along the road edge and is currently within 3-feet. As a safety precaution, the roadway was narrowed to one lane crossing this section of road, and 50% weight limit signs were posted at the intersections of Highland Drive and West Hill Road as well as the intersection of Rogers Loop and Sprucewood Drive.

After soliciting design proposals from three qualified term contractors, the Public Works Department awarded the design of the project to RESPEC Engineering. A final design was completed by RESPEC on July 18, 2025. The Engineer's estimate for construction was \$1,065,256. However, given the current bidding climate, it would be prudent to include some extra contingency funds for higher than expected bids or unforeseen change orders during construction.

III. RECOMMENDATIONS: That the City Council appropriates \$1,200,000 towards the construction of the Highland Drive Culvert Replacement.

I. Issue: This memorandum serves to support the Ordinance requesting funding for the purchase of new GPS Survey Equipment.

II. Background: The City owns and utilizes survey equipment for a multitude of purposes, such as: utility locates; locating infrastructure; locating property lines, right-of-way lines, and easements. The Public Works Department relies upon this vital equipment nearly daily. The existing GPS equipment was purchased used approximately 5 years ago. The exact age of this equipment is not known, however through research, the IT Department has identified that the last manufacture date for this model was 2012, which would place the age of this equipment at a minimum of 13-years old and likely older.

The Public Works Department and IT Department teamed together to create a Capital Budget request to replace this unit because IT identified this as a potential security vulnerability. Due to the City's current fiscal situation, the IT Department determined a "work around" that could be done to isolate the GPS device from our network and thereby providing a layer of protection from the vulnerability. Based upon this discovery, combined with competing capital requests, the Public Works Department and IT Department decided that this purchase could be "put-off" to another year since the current GPS was still functional.

Two weeks ago, the GPS Survey Equipment had a catastrophic failure and no longer functions. Since this unit is no longer supported by the manufacturer, it is not repairable. The lack of a GPS unit makes us 100% reliant on hiring a surveyor to do simple tasks or putting off work until a replacement unit is purchased.

III. RECOMMENDATIONS: That the City Council appropriate \$40,000 towards the purchase of new GPS Survey Equipment.

Water and Wastewater Master Plan

In 2023 Council authorized the City to apply for two loans through the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation State Revolving Loan Fund for a Water Master Plan Update and a Wastewater Master Plan update. The legislation is Resolution 23-094 and 23-095 and attached for quick reference. According to the legislation the existing Water and Wastewater Master Plans were completed in 2006 with a 20-year planning horizon. Through the loan process the City was awarded \$75,000 in principle forgiveness for each loan, \$150,000 total. It's been almost three years and we're at risk of having these fall off the Intended Use Plan, so Public Works is planning to put this out for RPF as one project for both plans to realize some savings. In the event it creeps over \$150,000 it will require a budget amendment that would be split between the water and wastewater CARMA funds.

Soldotna Field House

On August 15th I attended the opening reception for the new Soldotna Field House and walked away inspired. Their work on this vision began in 2000 and after many years of not giving up they have constructed a 54,000 square foot pre-engineered metal building designed to serve as an athletic and community event facility with a multi-purpose sport court, removable turf field, and an ADA-accessible elevated walking and jogging track. The facility is designed to maximize flexibility and is large enough to host statewide tournaments and other major events. I encourage stopping by and taking a look when you're in the Soldotna area.





Homer Multi-Purpose Community Recreation Center, what's next?

Ordinance 25-46(A) that proposed a ballot proposition asking the voters to approve a 0.3% sales tax for the purpose of funding a multi-purpose community recreation center in Homer failed at the last Council meeting. After visiting the Soldotna Field House and learning more about their process I'd like to bring back some possible next steps for Council to keep the momentum moving while this remains a Council priority.

Multi-Purpose Community Recreation Building Non-Endowed Field of Interest Fund

Resolution 25-049 authorized the City Manager to work with the Homer Foundation on establishing a nonendowed field of interest fund for the future community recreation building. The Homer Foundation Board has asked that the City advise them what the alternate plan for the fund will be if the community recreation building is not built. A possible recommendation is Community Recreation Programming and Equipment. Looking forward to Council's input at the meeting.

Homer Electric Property

The Homer Electric Association (HEA) property on Snowbird/Lake Street did not sell in their recent bid process. I spoke with their Chief Operating Officer last week and he explained that given the value of the property, they would be willing to consider a land trade if the City has property of similar value. HEA's minimum bid for the lot was \$965,000. If Council would like to talk more about this, I can work with Community Development and bring something back in September. If not, we can shift focus back to consideration of the City owned property in the Town Center area, or others as directed.

II. Background:

We've received an update from the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation (ADEC) about the FY24 Intended Use Plan for the State Revolving Loan Fund (SRF) and related Principal Forgiveness Subsidies. There is good news. The City's been offered Principal Forgiveness Subsidies for several important projects. One of them is a Water Master Plan Update.

Homer's existing Water Master Plan was developed in 2006, with a planning horizon of 20 years. In some ways, this 2006 report is still timely. The population was projected to be 9,699 people in 2020. It is 2023 and we have not reached that population within Homer's city limits. The average demand for water was projected to reach 1,330,000 gallons per day in 2021. In 2022, our Average Daily Flow was 533,000 gallons per day, with a Daily Maximum Flow of 1,138,000 gallons. However, change has occurred and is likely to continue.

Homer is contemplating the expansion of its Port facilities, which could increase water demand. The areas outside Homer's city limits are expanding and substantial amount of that expansion relies on water trucked from Homer. The Water Master Plan states,

"If the water source were to shut down, the community would have sufficient storage for approximately 3.3 days during the summer, assuming the Water Treatment Plant has a power

supply...Sometime after 2016, a supplemental reservoir may be required to provide additional water to the system in the event of a low flow event (drought)."

Droughts do happen. It was a drought that caused Seldovia to run out of water in 2018 and require water to be transported from Homer to Seldovia.

We have already begun looking further into the future. For the past three years, Homer has been working with the Kachemak Bay National Estuarine Research Reserve (KBNERR) to develop a groundwater map and budget for the groundwater affecting the Bridge Creek Reservoir, Homer's only water source and its weakest link. KBNERR's report will be submitted soon and we need help putting their research into context with our long term water plans as well as calibrate our water plans with the effects of climate change. An update to the Water Master Plan would help us accomplish these efforts, thereby substantially improving the resilience and security of the City's water distribution system.

We've been offered a Principal Forgiveness Subsidy in the amount of \$37,500 for a Water Master Plan Update. The estimated cost is \$80,000. It is necessary to submit a loan application to the ADEC in order to "lock in" the Principal Forgiveness Subsidy. Once we the loan is offered to us, we will present Council with an ordinance appropriating the funds.

III. RECOMMENDATIONS: That the City Council authorize the City Manager to apply for a \$80,000 loan from the ADEC for the Water Master Plan Update.



There is good news. The City's been offered Principal Forgiveness Subsidies for several important projects. One of them is a Waste Water Master Plan Update.

Homer's existing Waste Water Master Plan was developed in 2006, with a planning horizon of 20 years. In some ways, this 2006 report is still timely. The population was projected to be 9,699 people in 2020. It is 2023 and we have not reached that population within Homer's city limits. The Waste Water Treatment Plant (WWTP) has a design capacity of 880,000 gallons per day, peak flow. In 2006, the average daily flow was 390,000 gallons per day. Today, we are running at over 50% capacity,. However, change has occurred and is likely to continue.

Homer is contemplating the expansion of its Port facilities, which could increase demand on the WWTP. The areas outside Homer's city limits are expanding and some of that expansion trucks septic tank septage to Homer. We've been making substantial investments to renovate the WWTP systems – clarifiers, blowers and more. We need to know what the overall affect is on the continued longevity of our system. Further, Homer is still experiencing high rates of Inflow & Infiltration (I & I), which directs drainage from roof drains, footing drains and leaking manholes to enter the sewer pipe

lines, causing the WWTP to treat clean water. There are days when we run at capacity due to I & I. Further, regulations have changed over the past few years, making our discharge permit's operating parameters more stringent. We see this trend continuing as time goes by.

We've been offered a Principal Forgiveness Subsidy in the amount of \$75,000 for a Sewer Master Plan Update. The estimated cost is \$80,000. It is necessary to submit a loan application to the ADEC in order to "lock in" the Principal Forgiveness Subsidy. Once the loan if offered to us, we will present Council with an ordinance appropriating the funds.

III. RECOMMENDATIONS: That the City Council authorize the City Manager to apply for an ADEC loan in the amount of \$80,000 for the Sewer Master Plan Update.

As the City moves forward with the Community Recreation Center (REC Center) project, it is important to start looking at the funding for the project. It is very important that the City provides the community, as a whole, the ability to donate to the REC Center project, and rally around this great cause. Creating the fund will provide the Community with event fundraising and personal donations opportunities.

The Homer Foundation offers a program where the community, as individuals and organizations, can deposit money for this project. The program allows for tax deductible donations, along with fund raisers, and potential fund pledge drives (which could be billed and collected through the foundation). These funds would be used only for the hard assets of the building and sports equipment.

The City would need to deposit a minimum of \$10,000 for the initial creation of the fund, and then the community could deposit their donations through the Foundation. This is a non-endowed fund, meaning that the REC Center project would have access to all of the money. It will be managed by the Foundation under the guidelines established.

While the City does not know what the costs for the building and equipment will be, a starting goal of \$3 million dollars would be great.

Annual Destruction of Inactive Records

In accordance with HCC 2.08.010(g), the City Clerk's office has completed the annual inactive records destruction process.

On June 5, 2025, Department Heads were notified of the inactive records that were eligible for destruction, and as a result, 146 boxes of records were approved, pulled, and staged in the Council Chambers. Arctic Shred of Anchorage, Alaska performed on-site shredding of 3650 pounds of inactive records on July 25, 2025.

Arctic Shred travels from Anchorage to the Peninsula annually to provide their on-site service and then brings the shredded materials to their facility in Anchorage for appropriate disposal. This is the City Clerk's Office second year working with Arctic Shred for our inactive records destruction.

Copies of the Inactive Records Storage Forms and memorandums approving destruction are available in the City Clerk's office for review.

To date, the City Clerk's office has received 25 boxes of inactive records from various city departments, and those boxes have been logged in and stored in the storage areas located within City Hall. That number will likely increase by a minimum of 30 boxes as we approach years end.
